The writer was unable to identify the names JOHN CARR or TOM PRTOFOSKY in the indices of this office.

On January 29, 1950 informant verbally furnished the following information concerning the identity of JOHN CARR and TOM PRTOFOSKY.

JOHN CARR was described as being between 35 and 40 years of age, negro, six feet tall, weighed 165 pounds, dark complexion, black close cropped hair, brown eyes, broad nose.

TOM PRTOFOSKY was described as Russian or Jewish, age 40 to 50 years, wore glasses, short slender build, five feet four inches or five feet five inches in height, weighed 150 to 145 pounds.

The names of JOHN CARR and TOM PRTOFOSKY are being indexed to this memorandum.

According to informant, "BOB KLOSKY called the meeting to order. He said this was a conference for all leaders in the City as well as other Eastern Pennsylvania Communist leaders, to put forth the program and role of the Communist Party for the coming year. The agenda read as follows: Electing a chairman for the conference, the program of the Party - to be discussed by BOB (KLONSKY), open discussion, report by BEN WEIS, press report by J. SCHNIDERMAN, BETTY GANNETT, summary by ED STRONG. He, (KLONSKY) proposed CHICK KATZ, who is literature director for the district, for chairman. The members agreed (around 120 leaders were present). The meeting was officially under way.

"BOB (KLONSKY) was the first speaker. He spoke on the role and work of Reds for the coming year. He emphazied the infiltration of Party members into non-Communist organizations. This he stated was known as building the 'united front'. This then is the chief role they are to play. He also stressed that members working in non-Communist movements, must not lose ties with the Party. Their work, he said, was to lay the ground work for the understanding of Marxist methods and to carry the program of the Communist into these groups. Also sell The Worker. He warned again and again, in the building of the 'united front', party members should not become burried

"in these groups, but no leaders and apply the needs of the people and the struggle in conjunction with the Party's program.

"He stressed recruiting people who were active in mass organizations, people who had large contacts. This way the movement would involve more people indirectly. He warned not to try and force the Communist way down the non-Communist group throats. He said tact, teaching and deeds would bring the people around to their way of thinking. For instance, he said, Communists working in the Civil Rights Committee for the freedom of BYARD JENKINS were in the fore front of that fight, and in so doing had been able to recruit several people for the Party. The same held true for the 'Trenton Six Committee'. While Communists did not form these committees, they are the fighting forces, he said for the negro's rights in each case.

"Again he stressed the importance of the 'united front'. This in any way of thinking seems to be the Party's chief aim, building the 'united front'. They are excited about it and it is on every Communist tongue. They are discussing it in the national headquarters, the city districts, the sections and everywhere. Build the 'united front' is their slogan. The open discussion that followed seemed to bear out my reasoning. After BOB (KLONSKY) finished speaking the floor was thrown open for discussion. Speakers were allotted seven minutes each. The first person to get the floor was a BILL BROCKMAN from the Broad Street Section. He asked for more help from the District to maintain the gains they had made in that Section.

"BILL CRAWFORD, Section Organizer, from West Chester, Pa., was next. He told of his work in N.A.A.C.P. and in the 'united front with Santa', as he phrased it. He said by this he meant they were (the Communists) in conjunction with other organizations directing an Xmas party for children of the neighborhood. After this he planned numerous programs with non-Communist groups.

"Next person to speak was a student from William and Mary College in Virginia. He was introduced as SANDY (BERLIN). He told about the importance of the 'united front. He told of HENRY WALLACE coming to Norfolk to speak, of the Chief of Police saying he (WALLACE) would not speak unless to a segregated audience. SANDY being a good Communist felt something must be done about this. He together with a number of his friends went to

"Virginia State College and interested students as well as the faculty in fighting the people's view. Consequently he said, MALLICE did come and did speak. The group of students numbered 90 and became ushers for the meeting. They succeeded in seating white and colored along together. Thus the first non-segregated meeting was held in Norfolk. He (SANDY) related that as a result of this the newly organized group became permanent and intended to remain so. He warned Communists not to try and dominate in the beginning, because these tactics may cause you to find yourself kicked right out of the mass organization entirely. In other words use these non-suspecting people to carry on the Communist work. Next a woman called FRANCES (GABO), - - - - Section Organizer in the Strawberry Mansion area - - - - urged the building of the 'united front'. HAROLD ADAMS (should be HAROLD ALLEN) a very young negro lad leader from the Youth League spoke. He asked the district to do something about the plight of this league in regards to its Party ties. He said that they were doing good work but had no guidance from the Party. He wanted a meeting with the district to see what their future role would be in reference to the 'united front'. Then came JEAN HOOD, second wife of BILL HOOD, she reiterated the importance of the 'united front'. A new recruit in person of a negro man from South Philadelphia took the floor. He has been president of a new club in the South Philadelphia area. He spoke of a social affair planned after the holidays, to raise funds for the Party. He spoke of a condemned apartment house, housing from twenty families. He has succeeded with the help of BOB (KLONSKY) to establish a Housing Committee using most of the people involved to fight for the fixing of this place. He also told us, that when it rains some people living in that area had to go to friend's home to keep dry. The holes in the roofs are numerous. - - - - this man's name is HIRSH DAVIS. The club started with five people, in less than a month they had 15. He admitted that most of these were recruits from the apartment house. The crowd warmly applauded DAVIS and encouraged him to keep up the good work.

"Then CHICK KATS introduced BEN ADAMS who gave a summary of his work in fighting against taxes imposed on Philadelphians. He also urged the comrades to unite with other organizations to overthrow the corrupt Republican machine. He said it wasn't so much who the candidates were, but it would matter that these candidates once elected must be made to work for the welfare of the people and this could be done only by a strong 'united front'.

"Then BETTY GANNETT, Assistant Secretary of the National Committee was introduced. She spoke on the 'united front', the plot of Wall Street to get rid of the leadership of the Party. She said they failed as Wall Street would fail again and again to try to stop the Communist movement. She said the Party with the aid of the people would move forward to victory. She stressed building the Party as well as the 'united front'. She said, without the Party there would be no 'united front'. Although she was disappointed with recruiting, this year showed a slight increase throughout the country. She then read a letter from the National Committee to the City District, asking the city district to make ED STRONG permanent chairman of the Eastern Chapter of Pennsylvania in place of PHIL BART who is being called to New York to work as understudy, if the leaders were failed permanently or for any length of time. She (GANNETT) said that BART was only one from various sections in the country who was being trained for national leadership. The letter was signed by EUGENE DENNIS. She said the City Director had approved the selection wholeheartedly as she hoped the leaders from the various sections that were present today would do. Everyone in the room stood and applauded to show their feeling for ED (STRONG), and to approve the National Committee's and District's choice. She praised ED's work in the Party and also PHIL BART's work. After this a five minutes recess was granted.

"On resumption of the conference the informant advised that (IRVIN) KATZ said due to the lateness some of the agenda would be cancelled. A few reports were given by people, one of them DIANE TYSON from York, a guy named JEAN (EUGENE PETRYK) from the Lehigh Section and of course MOTHER BLOOR.

"She (MOTHER BLOOR) berated the leaders and speakers for not having tied the farmers in with the building of the 'united front'. She said in Allentown where she lived, they were doing a wonderful job with the farmers as far as recruiting and selling The Worker was concerned. She told of the young Slav-farmers being recruited. She told the leadership to keep its eye on Buck's County because they intended to have a Slavic Club working in the near future.

"PHIL BART then gave his farewell address, outlining the work the comrades must do in order to help ED STRONG in his new role. He stressed registration and of course the 'united front'.

"JESSIE SCHNIDERMAN spoke on the press, lashing out at clubs that were slow in getting subscriptions. She set a goal of 600 subs by January 28, 1950. She criticized the woman from Strawberry Mansion for saying that she had raised the subs from 15 to 60 saying most of them were already members, that she wished to reach non-Communists through the press.

"ED STRONG gave the summary. He as everyone else urged the building of 'united front'. He said things were moving rapidly and the Party must be ready to move also. He said if events in China were any forecast, then Mr. TRUMAN would be looking for a new home or headquarters. He (STRONG) said it was false to say the Communists advocated the overthrow of the Government by force or by shooting our chief or members of congress. He said, the Communists through the understanding of the people, through the united front would decide on who would be their leaders. He said he didn't expect TRUMAN to be looking for headquarters in 1950. BETTY GEMMETT broke in from the side lines saying 'not that we wouldn't like to see it.' ED (STRONG) agreed but again repeated that if things moved as fast as in China then it wouldn't be long.

"He (STRONG) also urged the selling of the press and the reading of more literature and less meetings. He said during his administration he intended to show the comrades that quality instead of quantity in meetings was more important.

"BOB KLOSKY pointed out that the appointment of ED STRONG should be brought to the attention of the public especially the negroes, Communist and non-Communist. He said this should lead to strengthening the party's position in mass negro organizations. He also suggested that January be used as a get acquainted month with ED STRONG. That throughout the city banquets should be given, parties and dinners by various sections and ED STRONG as a guest speaker. The last point was notions.

- "1. Build the united front
2. 600 subs by January 28th.
3. Recruiting 100 new members by January 18th.
4. Registration of all members completed by January 15th.

Motions approved by leadership.

Comments were many because there was no representation from the "Synnfield Clubs".

A person described as HAROLD ADAMS was determined, from description given by informant, to be in reality HAROLD ALLEN.

The individuals known as SANDY, FRANCES and JIM, from descriptive information furnished by informant have been determined to be SANDY BERLIN, FRANCES GABOR and EUGENE PETRYK.

All names appearing in parenthesis have been added by the writer, after determining from informant that these were the persons meant by her, for purpose of clarifying this report.

The files of this office contain two references to a DIANA TYSON, which references appear to be identical with the DIANE TYSON mentioned in this memorandum. These references are as follows:

61-81-1-B-68-12. New York [redacted] advised Special Agent H. P. LARSON and Special Employee A. E. FALLER on October 6, 1949 that DIANE TYSON born in 1916, member of IWO Lodge #97, York, Pa.

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100-91-1B-68-72. Informant [redacted] Street, York, Pa., advised Special Agent H. C. CARROLL, date not stated but presumably on or about May 26, 1948 that DIANE TYSON opened a meeting of the Spanish Anti-Refugee Fund sponsored by the Joint Anti-Fascist Refugee Committee held at the Womens Club, 226 East Market Street, York, Pa., on May 6, 1948, by singing America.

It is suggested that a case be opened on DIANE TYSON.

The report of ONDI [redacted] on the aforementioned meeting is being placed as an exhibit in the informant's file.

Re New York tel to Pittsburgh, 2-7-50, advising of this subject's trip to Western Pennsylvania and West Virginia, and Pittsburgh tel to Bureau and New York, 2-8-50, advising the purpose of this subject's presence in this division.

It was ascertained that the subject upon his arrival in Pittsburgh obtained a room at the Fort Pitt Hotel, 10th Street and Penn Avenue, subsequently checking out of this hotel at 10:30 AM, February 8, 1950. It was ascertained from Mr. HOWARD CALDWELL, Assistant Manager, Fort Pitt Hotel, that BART made no outgoing telephone calls.

Pittsburgh CNDI PI-10, of known reliability, on February 8, 1950, advised SE [redacted] that PHIL BART, who just came to Pittsburgh from New York, visited CP, District Five, headquarters on February 8, 1950. This informant advised that during BART'S visit at Party headquarters he held a lengthy discussion with WILLIAM ALBERTSON, Organizational Secretary, District Five, CP. The major portion of this discussion was concerned with the "Worker" circulation in the Western Pennsylvania District of the CP; the coal mining situation with regard to the coal strikes; and how to bring the Communist Party to the coal miners. Also during this discussion BART mentioned that with regard to changes in the national office setup (of the CP-USA) JOE goes out; GUS is to go to New York; ANDY (ONDA) is to go to Ohio; and STELLA is going into the Literature Department. Informant advised that in answering a question put forth by WILLIAM ALBERTSON concerning who was to pay for the "Worker" and "Daily Worker" newspapers that were being given out free to the coal miners BART answered that the Cultural Section of the Party was to pay for this distribution.

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Informant stated that BART advised that he had at one time lived at 2200 Center Avenue, Pittsburgh, Pa., in the year 1932.

On February 8, 1950, Pittsburgh CNDI PI-9, of known reliability, advised SA JOSEPH R. MARZALEK on this same date that PHIL BART had made reservations and had planned to leave Pittsburgh at 6:15 PM on February 8, 1950, traveling by bus to Charleston, W. Va., where he was to meet with IRVING WEISSMAN, Chairman, CP, District 22.

advised SA JOHN B. WOODRUFF, Pittsburgh Division, that IRVING WEISSMAN, Chairman, CP, District 22, called a special meeting of CP members in Charleston, W. Va., on February 6, 1950, and that during this meeting WEISSMAN announced that PHILIP BART was coming to Charleston, W. Va., from the CP National Headquarters in New York City for the sole purpose of assisting the coal miners in West Virginia. A CP meeting was called for February 9, 1950, for the purpose of having all West Virginia CP members meet with BART who was to outline the CP'S activities among the striking coal miners.

CHRY [] reported that BART arrived in Charleston, W. Va., at 2 AM on February 9, 1950, whereupon he immediately went to the home of IRVING WEISSMAN, 3418 Virginia Avenue, remaining there the rest of that night and most of that same day so that he could fully discuss the conditions of the CP in West Virginia with IRVING WEISSMAN.

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On February 10, 1950, Informant [] orally advised SA JOHN B. WOODRUFF that a CP meeting was held at 8 PM on February 9, 1950, at the home of Major VEASLEY (CP member) 1324 Washington Street, East Charleston, W. Va. BART and eight other CP members attended this meeting which was called to discuss the coal miners situation and to plan the action the CP should take in helping the coal miners. During this meeting the subject, speaking to those present, stated that the (coal) miners must, and will, win this fight. BART stated that the members of the Party must be present in the coal fields continually in order to secure subscriptions for the "Worker" and also new CP members. BART said the Party will permit the miners to receive the "Worker" on credit and to join the "Party" without paying the required dues. After the coal miners strike is settled the miners can then pay the CP their membership dues and/or subscription payments a little at a time until they are even with the Party. In this way, BART said, the Party will build up its membership and become stronger than ever. BART said that he felt that the area surrounding Cabin Creek, W. Va., (a concentrated coal mining area) was the best section of West Virginia, in which to start their concentrated activities; that a minimum of twenty-five new (CP) recruits and fifty "Worker" subscriptions should be obtained while the coal miners were still on strike; and that in order to achieve this number Party members must continually contact the miners and "flood" them with CP literature. BART offered CP national resources for use in aiding the coal miners and stated that anything that was necessary to build CP good will must

be done. Informant stated that BART ended his speech by stating that "some years ago it was felt that we would have to go over and help the Chinese. Now they will come over and help us in our fight to establish a true government of the people in America."

On February 11, 1950, informant [] reported that IRVING WEISSMAN and PHILIP BART traveled to Fairmont, W. Va. No meetings were scheduled in Fairmont because of the secrecy of the contacts, but instead two or three individuals were to meet with BART and WEISSMAN in their car to discuss the coal miners' situation.

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Informant advised that before leaving for Fairmont, BART said the longer the miners are on strike the more opportunity there will be to obtain new recruits, therefore, unrest should be stirred up among the miners so that the strike will be prolonged as long as possible thus giving a better opportunity to build the Party among the coal miners.

On February 13, 1950, Pittsburgh OMDI [] of known reliability, advised SA THOMAS J. ALLEN that PHIL BART had been in Charleston, W. Va., contacting CP members who in turn were contacting officials of the UMW locals urging them not to permit the coal miners to return to the mines. Informant [] advised that the coal miners were also urged to resist the enforcement of the Taft-Hartley Act.

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[] advised that PHIL BART and IRVING WEISSMAN contacted CP members at Fairmont and Manington, W. Va., on February 11, 1950, instructing these Party members to present the CP ideas to the various UMW locals. Informant stated that BART, WEISSMAN, and RALPH and IVA ORTH as well as other CP members contacted coal miners in the Cabin Creek, W. Va., area on February 12, 1950. This same informant advised that during a conversation with BART the latter mentioned that he had been in the Party for many years, having previously worked in Indiana where he used Indianapolis, Indiana, as his base. BART informed the informant that his, BART'S, wife had been working for a long time for the Veterans Administration covering the majority of the Kentucky and Indiana area.

It is pointed out at this time that during a portion of BART'S stay in West Virginia []

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[]. It is requested that should this information be incorporated in an investigative report, suitable paraphrasing be used to protect the identity of this informant.

Informant [] reported that BART left Charleston, W. Va., on February 13, 1950, allegedly enroute to Pittsburgh, Pa. Informant stated that BART said he had been expected to stay in West Virginia at least a week to ten days but because of the small number of miners in West Virginia (who were also CP members) he believed he could do more good in Pittsburgh because there were more coal miners (who were also members of the CP) available to talk to. Informant [] stated that BART was disappointed and somewhat disgusted with the reception he received in West Virginia principally because there were not many West Virginia coal miners who were members of the CP to work with in connection with the coal strike.

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Informant [] subsequently advised that BART left Charleston, W. Va., on February 13, 1950, to return to New York City.

Copies of this communication are designated for the New York and Philadelphia Offices since it is not known at the present time which office is the office of origin in this case.

It is requested that if any of the foregoing information is incorporated in an investigative report, appropriate paraphrasing be used so as to conceal the identity of the informants mentioned herein.

ROBERTS LEAVES WORKER; PHIL BART NEW MANAGER

The management of the Daily Worker and The Worker announced that Joseph Roberts is leaving his position of general manager of our paper to assume other responsibilities in the working-class movement. Eagle-Lion Upset Because This Paper Rejected Pro-War Film Ads

Last week, Eagle-Lion Films submitted three advertisements to the Business Office of the Daily Worker plugging its pro-war film *Guilty Of Treason*. (See review by Jose Yglesias elsewhere on this page.)

When the Business Office rejected the ads, the movie company charged in a press release that the paper had violated freedom of the press. They said the ads had been accepted by all other New York newspapers.



It is true that the Daily Worker rejects advertising for red-baiting, war-mongering, anti-Negro and anti-Semitic films and that such ads are accepted by all other big newspapers. Unlike them, the Daily Worker would no more think of accepting such ads than we would think of accepting ads for scab-made products from companies and organizations that are on strike and are being picketed.

As Phil Bart, General Manager of the Daily Worker informed Eagle-Lion: "We reserve the right to reject any advertisement which we consider detrimental to the policies which we support."

In respect to advertising, Daily Worker policy is the same as that of all other papers except we don't pretend to hide the fact that we reject ads injurious to labor and the nation. Other papers reject all kinds of advertising openly, at the same time posing as defenders of freedom of the press.

Only the other day, to cite one instance, the New York Post rejected an ad for a memorial meeting for Franklin Delano Roosevelt because the speakers included Ted O. Mackrely, former editor of the Post, now editor and publisher of *The Compass*; Arthur Miller, author of *Death Of A Salesman*, and W.E.B. Du Bois, the distinguished Negro leader.

It is only when the Daily Worker rejects an ad for a poisonous commodity like *Guilty Of Treason* that the charge of violation of freedom of press is raised.

That the offering of the ads to the Daily Worker was nothing but an Eagle-Lion publicity stunt to win attention to a film which did poorly even in predominantly Catholic neighborhoods out of town is shown by two facts:

1. This is the first ad Eagle-Lion has tried to place with the Daily Worker in years.
2. The Daily Worker was the only paper in New York that was considered for advertising space in advance of the opening of the picture.

They knew only too well that the ads for this dangerously pro-war film would be rejected.

Confidential Informant T-1, of known reliability, advised that PHIL BART had moved from 900 Pine Street, Philadelphia, Pennsylvania on November 15, 1949, to 263 Atkins Avenue, Brooklyn, New York.

Confidential Informant T-2, of known reliability, advised that PHIL BART was presently residing at 263 Atkins Avenue, Brooklyn, New York.

Confidential Informant T-3, of known reliability, advised that the subject had been relieved of his duties as District Organizer of District #3, Communist Party, USA, and was taking a position with the National Organization of the Communist Party, USA. BART also told this Informant that he had been in Philadelphia since December 1, 1945.

On May 27, 1949, Confidential Informant T-3 stated that BART was going to New York City for a period of several months, on a weekly basis, to assist in the work of the defense of the 12 Communist Party leaders who had been indicted in the Southern District of New York for violation of the Smith Act.

On October 18, 1949, Confidential Informant T-4, of known reliability, advised that PHIL BART was in charge of the Defense Campaign for the Communist leaders and was handling the publication program for this campaign.

On December 29, 1949, Confidential Informant T-5, of known reliability, advised that a City Wide Conference of the Communist Party in Philadelphia, Pennsylvania, was held on the 18th of December at 1307 North Seventh Street, Philadelphia, Pennsylvania. This Informant advised that BETTY GANNETT, Assistant Secretary of the National Committee, read a letter from the National Committee to the City District. This letter stated that BART was being called to New York City to work as an understudy, if the leaders are jailed permanently or for any length of time. She (GANNETT) stated that BART was only one from various sections in the country who were being trained for national leadership.

On January 25, 1950, Confidential Informant T-4 advised that the subject was going to go to Boston on January 28, 29 and 30, for the purpose of reorganizing the shop clubs of the Communist Party in that vicinity.

On January 9, 1950, this same Informant stated that BETTY GANNETT had informed that PHIL BART would make a tour of a number of districts of the Communist Party not only to study the clubs but especially to make a survey of the shop clubs.

On February 7, 1950, Confidential Informant T-4 reported that PHIL BART had received an urgent request to be in West Virginia by February 9, 1950. This Informant stated that PHIL BART had planned to meet with BILL ALBERTSON, Organizational Secretary, District #5, Communist Party, USA.

On February 8, 1950, Confidential Informant T-6, of known reliability, stated that BART had arrived in Pittsburgh on that day and intended to go to Charleston, West Virginia the following day. At Charleston, he would attend the special meeting, at which time he intended to outline the Communist Party strategy in connection with the coal strike. BART was

then supposed to organize the distribution of clothing, food, and supplies, to the striking miners and their families. The Informant stated it was the Party's intention to gain the miners' sympathy and thereby obtain new Communist Party recruits.

On February 8, 1950, Confidential Informant T-7, of known reliability, advised that during BART'S visit at Party Headquarters in Pittsburgh, he held a lengthy discussion with WILLIAM ALBERTSON. The major portion of this discussion was concerned with the "Worker" circulation in the Western Pennsylvania District of the Communist Party and the coal mining situation with regard to the coal strike, as well as the question of how to bring the Communist Party to the coal miners. BART was reported to have stated that the Cultural Section of the Party intended to pay for the distribution of the "Worker" and the "Daily Worker" newspapers which were given out free to the striking coal miners.

On February 7, 1950, Confidential Informant T-6 advised that a special meeting of the Communist Party members in Charleston, West Virginia was called on February 6, 1950, and during the meeting the announcement was made that PHIL BART was coming to Charleston for the sole purpose of assisting coal miners in West Virginia. Another meeting was called for February 9, 1950 for the purpose of having all West Virginia Communist Party members meet with BART, who was supposed to outline the Communist Party's activities among the striking coal miners.

On February 10, 1950, this Informant reported that BART spoke at a meeting, stating that the coal miners must and will win the strike. BART stated that the members of the Party must be present in the coal fields continually in order to secure subscriptions for the "Worker" and also to recruit new Communist Party members. BART further added that the Party should permit the miners to receive the "Worker" on credit as well as to join the Party without paying their required dues. After the coal strike is settled the miners would repay the Party for the copies of the "Worker" and the "Daily Worker" as well as pay up their back dues until they were even with the Party. In this way, a little at a time, the Party would build up its membership and become stronger than ever. BART stated that the Party members must continually contact the striking miners and flood them with Communist Party literature. BART offered Communist Party national resources for use in aiding the coal miners and stated that anything that was necessary to build Communist Party good will must be done. This Informant reported that BART ended his speech by stating that "Some years ago it was felt that we would have to go and help the Chinese. Now they will come over and help us in our fight to establish a true government of the people in America."

On February 11, 1950, Confidential Informant T-8, of known reliability, advised that he saw BART in Fairmont, West Virginia. According to this Informant, no meetings were scheduled in Fairmont, but instead two or three individuals would meet with BART in his car to discuss the coal miners situation. BART was reported to have said that the longer the miners are out on strike the more opportunity there will be to obtain new recruits for the Party and, therefore, unrest should be stirred up among the miners so that the strike will be prolonged as long as possible, thus giving a better opportunity to build the Party among the coal miners.

On February 13, 1950, Confidential Informant T-9, of known reliability, stated that PHIL BART had been in Charleston, West Virginia, contacting Communist Party members who, in turn, were contacting officials of the UMW locals urging them not to permit the coal miners to return to the mines. This Informant further advised that the miners were being urged to resist the enforcement of the Taft-Hartley Act.

According to Confidential Informant T-6, BART returned to New York City on February 13, 1950 rather disappointed and somewhat disgusted with the reception he had received in West Virginia principally because there were not many coal miners who were members of the Communist Party to work with in connection with the coal strike.

The March 26, 1950 issue of "The Worker", page 4, column 2, East Coast Communist Sunday newspaper, in an article states that "The Management of the 'Daily Worker' is happy to announce that PHIL BART will take over the position of general manager. Active for over 25 years in the labor and Communist movement, BART has helped to form and build trade unions in many parts of the country. He has held leading Communist Party posts in Ohio, Illinois and Indiana and comes to us after serving as Chairman of the Party in Eastern Pennsylvania."

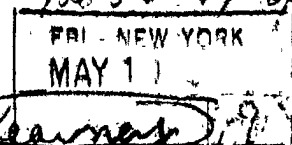

Kings H'way CP Aims at 1,000 New 'Daily' Readers

Inspired by a direct report from the ace Daily Worker press builder at the Ford River Rouge plant, the Kings Highway region of the Communist Party has set out to pace all New York in increasing the circulation of the Daily Worker and The Worker. A conference of 125 club representatives pledged on Sunday to obtain 1,000 new daily Worker readers by Sept. 30.

High point of the conference was a report from Nelson Davis, Detroit's top sub-getter and recently elected vice president in the Production Foundry division of UAW Local 600. The veteran Negro auto worker described the outstanding role played by the Daily Worker and Michigan Worker in fighting for the demands of the Ford workers.

Davis declared that his election was largely due to his record in plugging the sales of these papers and at the same time fighting within the plant for the needs of the workers.

At the end of the all-day conference with speakers including Elizabeth Gurley Flynn, Communist national committee member, and Phil Bart, Daily Worker business manager, the delegates pledged that of the 1,000 new Daily Worker readers, 500 would be obtained through new subscriptions and 500 through regular sales at shops in the streets, mass organizations, apartment houses and at concentration points.

The plan of work called for every Communist shop worker taking one Daily Worker for himself and one for a fellow worker.

It called for each club in the area taking one night a week for selling the paper on the streets, the nights to be alternated among the clubs to guarantee that the paper is sold every night in the week.

At the same time the conference took steps to make certain that the circulation of the weekend Worker would keep increasing, without waiting for special drives. The

region, which obtained 2,500 subs in the recent Worker drive, pledged a regular annual increase in Worker circulation of 1,500. Each club is to obtain at least one sub per week.

Demonstrating the spirit of the conference, delegates walked into the meeting with 93 new subs for the Daily Worker, all gathered in one week.

START COMPETITION

A friendly competition was started between Kings Highway's ace press builder, Hyman Winters and Davis. Winters, who got 300 Worker subs in the last drive, was invited to attend a Detroit press and party building conference.

Main report was delivered by Herbert Gurowitz, organizer of the Bath Beach section. The plan of work, which also called for recruiting 200 new members by July 4, and another 100 by Sept. 30, was placed before the body by Nat Slutsky, regional organizer.

The test of Communist work, Slutsky declared, will be determined by the extent to which the press and the party are built.

Charles Lohman of the county committee, stressed that there were no more important tasks than the building of the press and party in the fight for peace and democracy.

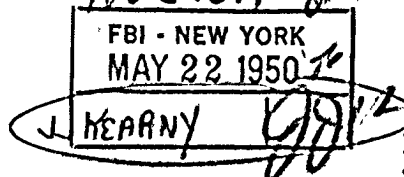

PHILIP BERAL was issued Passport #149013 on December 12, 1929. In his passport application, he stated he was born at Warsaw, Poland on June 28, 1902, that he emigrated to the U.S. in August, 1914 and from 1914 to 1929, he lived in New York; however, he gave as his permanent address on this application as 571 Sigma St., Detroit, Michigan.

This application further showed that BERAL's father was BENJAMIN BERAL and that he was born in 1882 in Warsaw, Poland and was naturalized in the Southern District of New York on December 7, 1920.

This application reflected that BERAL intended to visit England, France, Germany and Poland as a tourist and to visit relatives. He described himself as follows:

Height:	5 ft. 8 in.
Hair:	black
Eyes:	brown

He desired that his passport be forwarded to him at 308 Neptune Avenue, Brooklyn, New York. The identifying witness on this application was MILTON R. FEINMAN, 1470 No. Euclid St., Detroit, Michigan.

The files of the State Department further reflect that the records of the World Tourist Inc. show that BERAL's transportation was charged to the Communist Party and that BERAL was a PRINOFF student and a T.U.U.L. delegate.

~~For the information of the Detroit and New York Offices,~~ GEORGE PRINOFF was the financial advisor of the Communist Party for a number of years and, according to witnesses in the EARL BROWDER case, the PRINOFF account was actually the account of the Communist Party.

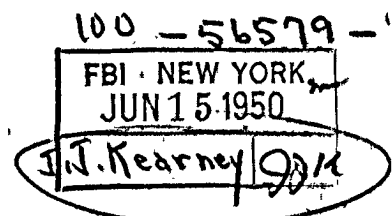

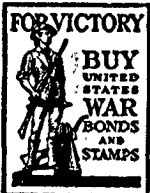

HOUSE UNIT SPEEDS TEST ON CONTEMPT

Cases of 39 Defiant Witnesses in Hawaii Inquiry Are Cited—Daily Worker Manager Balks

By C. P. TRUSSELL

WASHINGTON, June 21—The House Committee on Un-American Activities voted today to speed up court tests of how far a witness might go in refusing to answer questions without being in contempt of Congress.

This action came as Congressional committees, particularly the Un-American Activities group, continued to find questioning of witnesses futile when those under investigation cited the Constitution as providing for their exemption from responses that might be self-incriminating.

Recently the refusals to answer had spread to the Senate side, in the reopened case of State Department documents having fallen into the hands of the late magazine *Amerasia* in 1945. Citation for contempt of Congress has been recommended by the subcommittee investigating charges by Senator Joseph R. McCarthy, Republican of Wisconsin, that Communists have infiltrated the headquarters of American foreign relations.

The House committee indicated that it was in a particularly strong position to seek, first, formal Congressional citations for contempt, and probable handing of the cases to the Department of Justice for grand jury action. Congress, it was noted, usually approves proposed contempt citations.

Instances in Hawaii Inquiry

The House group has at hand instances in which thirty-nine witnesses refused to answer questions in its April investigation of communism in Hawaii. All declinations were based on self-incrimination grounds. The committee agreed today to press all of these cases to a showdown.

Before the day was over, the House committee had made, it was conceded, little if any progress in its investigation into alleged Communist espionage and passport frauds.

One witness, Philip A. Bart of New York, general manager of *The Daily Worker*, Communist newspaper, accused the committee of ignoring the due process of law. Another, Marcel Scherer, a former West Coast labor leader whom the committee apparently attempted to link with "leaks" of atomic secrets from the University of California's radiation laboratory at Berkeley, refused to answer most questions.

Representative Francis E. Walter, Democrat of Pennsylvania and acting committee chairman, said the group would meet Friday to decide whether one or two more test cases would be added to the thirty-nine from Hawaii.

Constitution Invoked

A constitutional issue, it appeared from today's questioning, was whether a witness, conceded to be immune from giving answers that might incriminate himself, could also refuse, under the Fifth Amendment, to answer questions concerning someone else. Many of today's questions called upon the witnesses to say whether to their knowledge other persons were Communists.

Mr. Bart, a native of Poland, who acquired citizenship through the naturalization of his father early in the century, declined to tell his original name. The change

of name, he said, was legal and he was voting under it. Mr. Scherer, originally a Rumanian, was not asked about a possible change.

Largely under investigation, however, was a passport application made in 1932 that sought entry to Europe of one John William Fox. The committee wanted to know whether this was really Mr. Bart. Mr. Scherer appeared to have endorsed the passport request. Both witnesses refused to discuss it.

Frank S. Tavenner Jr., committee counsel, said the group had evidence that Mr. Scherer had attended the Marx-Lenin Institute in Moscow for revolutionary training in such operations as strike strategy, military science, codes, street fighting and civil warfare. He showed Mr. Scherer a copy of a passport application containing his name and a photograph of the applicant. Mr. Scherer declined to answer questions about it.

Hearing Often in Confusion

Mr. Bart, to whom a copy of the "Fox" passport application was shown, declined to identify or repeat its author. Abraham Ungler of New York, his counsel, denounced the committee's proceedings as "highly improper."

On several occasions the tough and go of hot argument threw the hearing into confusion. As Mr. Bart's hearing closed, he was standing and shouting that the committee questions were aimed at incriminating him and "my party." Mr. Walter retorted.

"If you think so much of the Constitution which you are hiding behind you will be willing to cooperate with this committee in finding out what alleged Americans attended the Marx-Lenin Institute."

House Probers To Cite All Who Defied Them

Washington, June 21 (P)—The House Un-American Activities Committee decided today to bring contempt of Congress proceedings against all witnesses who refuse to answer its questions.

As a starter, the committee voted for contempt proceedings against 39 witnesses who refused to answer questions during an investigation of Communism in Hawaii in April.

The decision, taken at a closed session, also applies to those who have declined to talk during Congressional sessions reaching back into last year. The vote was not disclosed.

Rep. Walter (D-Pa.) told reporters that Philip Bart, general manager of the Daily Worker, "probably" will be among the first added to the list.

Bart, a witness today, declined to answer almost all questions put to him. These included whether he had used an alias in obtaining a passport in 1932.

Walter said the committee will consider later this week whether to proceed against Marcel Scherer, one-time West Coast labor leader, who followed Bart on the witness stand.

Bart and Scherer were called primarily for questioning about a passport issued to John William Fox in 1940. The application was witnessed by Scherer.

Bart refused to say whether the photograph on the passport was his; whether he used the passport; whether he went to Russia on it. Scherer refused to say whether he signed the passport application; whether he knew Fox; whether Fox and Bart are the same person.

Both Bart and his New York attorney, Abraham Unger, complained repeatedly that questions asked Bart were "highly improper."

In refusing to answer questions, Bart and Scherer contended their constitutional rights were being infringed.

Bart Rips Move to Gag 'Worker' at Un-American Probe

WASHINGTON, June 21. — In fast and furious verbal battles that had the House Un-American Committee reeling, Philip Bart, general manager of the Daily Worker, today

condemned the committee to its face for attempting to curtail freedom of the press.

The Un-Americans' move obviously had as one of its aims the smearing of the Daily Worker for having publicized the involvement of Un-Americans' chairman John S. Wood (D-Ga.) in a \$1,000 kickback from a man who collected a \$10,000 claim from the government.

Bart forced the committee to retreat from its line of questioning about the Daily Worker when he told them that the committee was infringing on the First Amendment to the Constitution which guarantees freedom of the press.

When the committee's hour-long fishing expedition involving passports and names was brought to an end by acting chairman Francis Walters (D-Pa.) Bart boomed that the committee was trying to "send all America to jail."

Asked by reporters whether Bart would be cited for contempt, Walter said he saw no reason why we shouldn't proceed against him on a charge of contempt.

Throughout the questioning Bart repeated his condemnation of the committee. He reiterated that the committee did not seek answers to questions, but sought

to frame him as it had done many others.

Obviously ruffled by the sharp attack, the sharpest experienced by the committee in the last two years, Walters growled, "If you thought as much of the Constitution as you say you do, instead of hiding behind it, you'd help the committee find out how supervises went to Moscow for training."

"I will never be a part of this committee's attempt to send all America to jail," Bart exclaimed. He rose to his feet with more denunciations of the committee's attempt to smear him and jail him as you have done to others. Walters banged his gavel, and the committee strode from the hearing room.

Accompanying Bart was Abraham Unger, New York labor and civil rights attorney, who kept up a running battle with individual committee members as well. Unger silenced Rep. Harrison (D-Va) and Rep. Francis Case (R-SD), when the two committee members interjected some snide remarks and twisted legal interpretations.

Harrison advised Walters, at one point when Unger was telling the committee it had no right to infringe on the Constitution, that Unger should be silenced. "I don't care to hear from this man," Harrison said.

Unger criticized Harrison for this remark. "I don't say to you, Mr. Congressman, that I don't like to hear from you," Harrison glowered at Unger but didn't open his mouth after that.

Case, in an attempt to confuse Bart, said that his interpretation of the Fifth Amendment involving self-incrimination did not prevent him from answering a question.

"Are you a lawyer," Unger interjected. Case sat silent.

"Oh, you refuse to answer, do you?" Unger said. Case kept quiet. "You know and all lawyers know that your legal interpretation is entirely incorrect," Unger continued. Case remained quiet for the rest of the hearing.

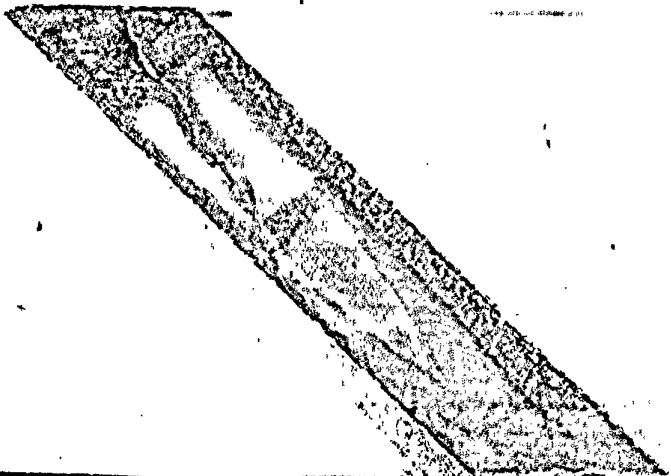

FOX requested that his passport be mailed to him at 1065 Lexington, New York City. This address was deleted and he requested his passport be mailed to him in care of Mrs. R. K. FOX, Mt. Kisco, New York.

FOX furnished the following description of himself:

The records of the Passport Division, Department of State, further disclose that passport No. 358204 was applied for and issued to PHILIP BARD for travel in Switzerland and France on business. The records further reflect that the Department of State was aware that BARD was a member of a contingent destined to fight for the Loyalists in Spain and that this contingent had proposed to sail from the port of New York aboard the SS Normandy on December 26, 1936.

The Passport records further revealed that PHILIP BARD was born at 26 Rivington Street, New York City, on February 14, 1912, and that he had never resided outside the United States until 1936. His father's name was listed as SALOMAN BARD, born in Russia, deceased. SALOMAN BARD was alleged to have immigrated to the United States about 1904 and was a naturalized citizen although the date and place of naturalization were not given.

At the time of the 1936 passport application, BARD listed his residence as 46 Bank Street, New York, New York.

The records of the Passport Division disclose that PHILIP BARD, as Executive Secretary of the Abraham Lincoln Brigade whose offices were in New York City, advised Mrs. RUTH B. SHIPLEY, chief of the Passport Division, that one DAVID LASSER, chairman of the Workers Alliance Relief Committee to Aid Americans in Spain, had applied for a passport to visit England, France, and Spain in order to study relief in these countries. The subject at this time requested Mrs. SHIPLEY's assistance in this matter.

The records of the Passport Division contain a newspaper article published April 22, 1937, in the DAILY WORKER. The gist of this article advised that one PHIL BARD, a former cartoonist of the DAILY WORKER and former President of the Artists Union, would address an audience in New York City on experiences with the Abraham Lincoln Battalion which fought for the Loyalists in the Spanish Civil War. This article reflected that PHIL BARD had been injured while fighting in Spain and had been sent home as an invalid considered unfit for military service. The article concluded by advising that PHIL BARD had since become Executive Secretary of the Friends of the Abraham Lincoln Battalion.

On July 27, 1950, Confidential Informant ND-516, of known reliability, advised that HENRY WINSTON (National Organizational Secretary, CP, USA) conferred on that date with JACK KLING (Chairman District No. 18, CP, USA in Milwaukee). KLING told WINSTON that workers (in Milwaukee) were being threatened and four people had already been hospitalized in connection with attempting to obtain peace petitions. WINSTON wanted to know how the CP in Wisconsin was doing on the right to collect the petitions. KLING told WINSTON that more broader forces were sponsoring various statements but people were afraid to speak up. WINSTON suggested that a reporter from the "Daily Worker" come out to Milwaukee to do a story on the situation. WINSTON said that he had already talked to PHIL BART (General Manager, "Daily Worker") who had told him what was being done out in that district.

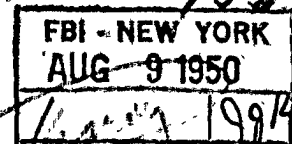

ASAC LALLY was telephonically communicated with on 11 AM on 8/17/50 and advised that PHIL BART may be found in Contempt of Congress in the near future and as a result there may be considerable pressure by Congress to locate him at a moment's notice. Further since he is an important figure in Communist activities, it would seem highly desirable that a surveillance be instituted for the purpose of determining where he will be "resting", which as far as the CP today is concerned means in hiding. ASAC LALLY stated he will place such a surveillance and the Bureau and New York Division will be advised by teletype.

At 10:30 A. M., ASAC Lally, Baltimore, called and advised that PHIL BART, Managing Editor, "Daily Worker", was in Baltimore at the home of FRED FRANKFELD. FRANKFELD is in Washington, D. C., visiting the organizer there. His wife called him there and told him there was someone who wanted to talk to him. Conversation then ensued between BART and FRANKFELD. BART told FRANKFELD there was something urgent came up and he wanted to see him. FRANKFELD said he would prefer to complete his business in Washington, but BART instructed him to return to Baltimore and at the same time told him that he (BART) was going away for a rest. FRANKFELD will leave Washington at 11:00 A. M., and arrive at Baltimore at 11:40 A. M. EDT.

Mr. Lally said there was no indication as to whether or not BART would leave Baltimore immediately after seeing and conferring with FRANKFELD, but from the tenor of the conversation he (BART) is definitely going somewhere. Inasmuch as the possibility exists that BART might be going underground somewhere, Baltimore Office would like to have instructions from NYO as to whether or not Baltimore Agents should surveil BART out of Baltimore to his destination wherever it may be.

ASAC LALLY, Baltimore Office, telephonically contacted the Washington Field Office at 10:15 p.m., August 17, 1950, and advised that BART, a national functionary of the Communist Party, had visited PHIL FRANKFELD, Chairman of District 4 in Baltimore on August 17, 1950. Mr. LALLY stated that BART told FRANKFELD that he, BART, was going to take a rest. This was interpreted by the Baltimore Office as possibly indicating that BART intended to go underground and Baltimore therefore instituted a surveillance. At the time of the call, BART had just purchased a railroad ticket on the 10:39 p.m. train for Washington, D. C. Mr. LALLY stated that Agents of the Baltimore Office would accompany BART unless advised that WFO Agents were available to meet the subject.

This information was later furnished the WFO by teletype from Baltimore.

Agents of the Washington Field Office proceeded to Union Station where contact was effected by the surveilling Baltimore Agents. BART was observed leaving the train at 11:25 Eastern Daylight Savings Time. He immediately engaged a taxi and proceeded under surveillance by an Agent of the WFO and the Agents of the Baltimore Office to the National Airport. There he was overheard to inquire about a flight to Detroit. It was later ascertained that the subject purchased a ticket on Flight 802, Plane No. 412B, Capitol Airlines, leaving at 12:01 EST to Detroit via Cleveland. The schedule of this flight is as follows: Leave Washington 12:01 EST; Arrive Cleveland 1:51 EST; Leave Cleveland 2:05 EST; Arrive Detroit 2:53 EST. The Cleveland and Detroit Offices were immediately advised by teletype of BART'S intended itinerary and were requested to afford proper coverage.

At 12:05 a.m., EST, August 18, 1950, Flight 802 departed Washington, D. C.

The Cleveland Office by teletype dated August 18, 1950, advised that the flight described above had been met but the subject was not observed leaving the plane. Detroit was advised telephonically by Cleveland of the plane's departure.

By New York letter to the Bureau dated August 3, 1950, entitled, "COMMUNIST PARTY, USA-BRIEF; INTERNAL SECURITY-C", the Bureau's attention was called to the opinion of the Court of Appeals, Second Circuit, confirming the convictions of the eleven Communist Party leaders for violation of the Smith Act. It was pointed out to the Bureau that in view of this decision and the reputation of the Circuit Court in this Circuit, it would appear quite certain that the decision will be upheld in the Supreme Court. The Bureau's attention was further called to the fact that the defendants were indicted in a conspiracy indictment in individual indictments under Sections 2 and 3 of the Smith Act. The defendants were not brought to trial on the individual indictments charging them with membership in the Communist Party, well knowing it to be a society of persons who teach and advocate the overthrow and destruction of the government by force and violence.

It was suggested to the Bureau that additional individual members of the Communist Party, U.S.A., could be indicted under the Smith Act and, therefore, the Bureau may desire to refer the names of the individuals to the Department for appropriate consideration. Attached to this letter was the list of persons in this territory which this office recommended as persons to be considered for such prosecution. The subject's name was so listed.

The Bureau by letter dated August 18, 1950, entitled, "COMMUNIST PARTY, U.S.A.-BRIEF; INTERNAL SECURITY-C", referred to our referenced letter and stated that such a list had been transmitted to the Department on October 17, 1949, recommending prosecution. The Bureau in its October 17, 1949 listing listed twenty such individuals. Those from New York were as follows:

'Worker' Manager, 55 Others Cited for 'Contempt' by House

By Rob F. Hall

WASHINGTON—The House on Friday cited Phil Bart, manager of the Daily Worker, for contempt of the House Un-American Committee, and then rapidly cited 55 other witnesses who had refused to act as accomplices in Un-American witchhunts. The list Friday included James J. Mat-

est, organizational director of the United Electrical Workers, four other UE organizers, several scientists; Marcel Scherer, coordinator of the Labor Conference for Peace; Louise Bernan; Frank Hashmilk, of Cincinnati; James Branca, of Washington, and 39 persons active in the Hawaiian labor movement.

As a result of the House action, 56 persons now face prosecution in Federal courts with a possible penalty of one year in prison and \$1,000 fine for each unanswered question.

For bringing the contempt citations before the House, the Un-American Committee was lauded by Rep. Eugene Cox (D-Ga.), John Rankin (D-Miss.) and Henderson Latham (D-Ga.), the Congressmen who last Friday lunged at William Patterson shouting "You black son of a bitch."

MARCANTONIO VOTES NO

All the citations Friday were by voice vote. Rep. Vito Marcantonio (ALP-NY) told the House he wanted the record to show him voting "no" in each case. On Thursday Marcantonio denounced the citations as a nullification of the First and Fifth amendments to the Constitution.

Of the Un-American Committee's list of 56, only two were named. They were Elizabeth Sausly, legislative representative of the Food and Tobacco Workers Union, and Betty Rodman, of Washington, a Progressive Party worker. Rep. John S. Wood (D-Cal.) chairman of the committee, said "further investigation" was necessary in these two cases.

On Thursday the House had voted citations against Julius Epstein, secretary-treasurer of UE, and Steve Nelson, Western Pennsylvania Communist leader. In Epstein's case, Marcantonio forced a roll call vote. Favoring the citations were 372, which included former opponents of the Un-American Committee like Blatnik, Niemiller, Burdick, Celler, Dollinger, Helen Douglas, Javits, Klein and Powell.

The session Friday was poorly attended, and in most cases members didn't bother even to say "ye." Nevertheless House speaker Sam Rayburn would in each instance say, "The ayes have it," and declare the citation resolution adopted.

ONE PER MINUTE

All but the barest formalities—such as reading the specific charges of the Un-American Committee against the victim—and dispensed with. Rayburn gavelled the citations through at the rate of one per minute.

This orderly procedure was interrupted once when Rep. Charles Hoffman (R-Mich.) warned that if

Daily Worker Can't Be Jailed, Says Bart

Phil Bart, manager of the Daily Worker, declared yesterday the citation against him was an attempt to stifle the voice for peace. His statement follows.

"The congressional citation against me as against all others is aimed at stifling all voices fighting for peace. In my case it is especially directed towards the suppression of the lone daily voice, the Daily Worker, which is fighting for the peace of our country and against the Wall Street warmakers.

"But the Daily Worker cannot be jailed. Its voice cannot be silenced. With every attack it will win new support in the fight to save our country from the scourge of a new world war and fascism."

In the proceedings of the House failed to show affirmatively that a quorum was present, the Supreme Court may reverse convictions by a lower court. Hoffman made it clear, however, that he "had no sympathy" with the victims of the committee.

It was interrupted again when Rep. Cox perorated that "every bell in the country should ring out in appreciation" of the Un-American Committee. He heaped ridicule and scorn on former "Jeff" members of the House who in previous times voted in opposition to the Un-American Committee.

"I saw them run yesterday," he said. (Continued on Page 11)

said, referring to their failure to vote against the citation. "In my judgment they are not voting their honest views," Cox said, adding that many of them had been recipients of favors in financial and political support from such organizations as the UE, the FTA and the ILWU.

"They have now turned on their backers and fled," said Cox. Only Marcantonio has stood firm, he said, giving the New York Laborite this brudging praise.

Rep. Rankin followed Cox with a speech suggesting that next on the committee's list should be the White House staff, the State and Justice department and the rings who circulate around the Supreme Court.

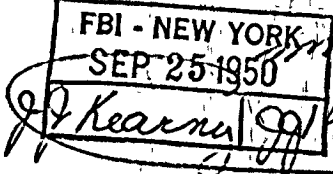

Dear Reader:

America has 1,798 daily newspapers that are owned by employers, by members of the National Association of Manufacturers, by Big Business. Their strong opponents are the two newspapers that are supported and kept alive by the working-class: the Daily Worker and The Worker.

Throughout their history, these two papers not only recorded news, they helped to organize and lead struggles for our people's interests that have made news.

Thumb through the history of modern times and you will see it. Scottsboro, Sacco-Vanzetti, the drive to organize the huge open-shop industries, the fight for democracy, for peace, hundreds of other issues, were not merely recorded in the columns of these papers. You know the answer to that. Daily they din into the ears of their readers that war is inevitable. They clamor for war against the Soviet Union, New China, the people's democracies. They misrepresent the honest, progressive aims of the Korean people and play Syngman

Rhee, the two-bit Chiang Kai-shek as a popular hero. Daily they apologize for the reactionary policies of Wall Street.

Did they, or did they not, support the Taft-Hartley law while the Daily Worker and The Worker fought it tooth and nail?

Do they not back the fascist-like McCarran Act, refuse to lift a finger to repeal it?

They support the lynch rule of the Southern Bourbons. In a word they are the kept press of Wall Street.

Today papers like the Daily Worker and The Worker are needed as never before. They can be decisive in the struggle for democracy when the McCarrans seek to extinguish the light of liberty. At such a time our press throws a brilliant flood of light which gives initiative and inspiration for the struggles before us.

Therefore we appeal to you our readers, as we have in the past, to maintain and build the circulation of our press. It is your paper. It speaks for you. It is responsible to you and you are responsible for it.

Our annual circulation drive will start Nov. 15 and run to Jan. 30, 1951. During this period we are out to increase the circulation by obtaining new readers, renewal of subscriptions which expire at the end of this year and increase the circulation through home delivery routes.

We urge you to join this campaign. We call on our readers to form Readers Groups, Press Committees, Friends of The Worker Clubs, to build the circulation of our press. Get your friends in your shop among your neighbors among our readers to join with you in this effort. Become a Builder for Freedom's Press.

Reaction would like to destroy your paper. They have predicted its demise a thousand times. But in each case it was only a fool's hope which vanished. We will fool them again. Their hopes and designs upon our country must fail.

So we appeal to you in the next months to join the all-out drive to build the circulation of our press.



For the information of the New York and Newark Divisions, an all day Connecticut State Communist meeting was held in New Haven, Connecticut, at 222 Lafayette Street, New Haven, Conn., on October 15, 1950. According to information received from a confidential source of this office, PHIL BART from the National Office of the Communist Party and Editor of the Daily Worker was principal speaker at this meeting. It is noted that at the meeting itself, with the exception of BART, only individuals from Connecticut were in attendance.

It is also to be noted that at approximately the same time that the Connecticut Communist meeting was breaking up that two large busses drove up to the same hall and the individuals in the busses got out and went into 222 Lafayette Street, New Haven, Connecticut. These busses are described as follows:

- No. 1 "Binger For Tours", Bus No. 72 - had New Jersey plate, license number not noted.
- No. 2 "Busses for Hire", No. 330. This bus had New York telephone Plaza 7-3322

In addition to these vehicles, the following automobiles were observed driving to the vicinity of 222 Lafayette Street and the occupants of the vehicles going into the hall: - N. J. License 1V82C and N. Y. License 4C6350.

Build Freedom's Press

Seek 20,000 New Subs

A drive for 20,000 new subscriptions to *The Worker* was launched this week, as Philip Bart, general manager, announced an intensive circulation campaign to be held from Nov. 15 to Jan. 31. The drive will also have as its goal the maintenance of a regular daily circulation of 20,000 for the *Daily Worker*.

A series of conferences of Midwest press representatives held in Ohio, Chicago and Michigan over the weekend has already enthusiastically accepted the plans for the drive in their area, the business office reported.

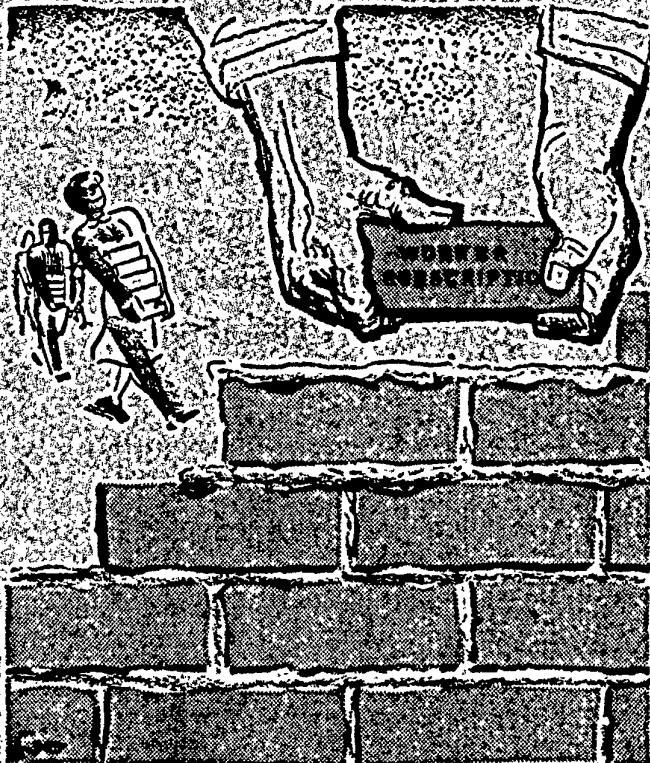
Despite the increased attacks of reaction on the paper, Bart said, its basic circulation is holding well.

These attacks, he said, are being intensified because *The Worker* is boldly exposing the schemes and plots of the warmakers. He cited the fact that such a national magazine as *Collier's* has to devote its chief article of a recent issue to smears against the paper, while other capitalist sheets spew their venom at our paper daily.

At the same time, Bart pointed out, despite the war drive, the McCarran Law, etc., the love for liberty is very strong in our land. The traditions for a free press are very pronounced.

The *Worker* general manager noted that even such organs as Editor and Publisher have been forced to pay lip service to the right of free press by acknowledging the *Daily Worker's* right to continue publication.

In launching the circulation drive, Bart said that today, even less than ever before, a working class newspaper cannot depend entirely on the



distribution agencies used by the capitalist press. He appealed to readers to form readers' groups, local committees and regional groups, as well as to work as individuals to circulate the paper in shops, among trade unionists and in the communities.

The price for a yearly subscription to *The Worker* will continue at \$2.50 during the drive. Prizes to be announced in *The Worker* will be awarded to all persons obtaining five or more subscriptions.

I. BACKGROUND INFORMATION

On November 21, 1949, Confidential Informant T-1, of known reliability, advised that PHIL BART had moved from Philadelphia to 263 Atkins Street, Brooklyn, New York, about November 15, 1949.

II. MEMBERSHIP AND POSITION IN THE COMMUNIST PARTY, USA

On December 22, 1949, Confidential Informant T-6, of known reliability, furnished a mimeographed letter addressed to "All Party Clubs" with the return address "Communist Party, 250 South Broad Street, Room 710, Philadelphia 2, Pa." and dated September 7, 1948. This letter was signed "PHILIP BART, Chairman".

On February 4, 1950 Confidential Informant T-2, of known reliability, advised that a Communist Party Transfer Form was made out in BART's name indicating that BART was being transferred from the Germantown Section at Philadelphia, Pa., to New York State.

Confidential Informant T-3, of known reliability, advised on March 22, 1950 that BART had been carried on the pay roll of the Communist Party, USA, District 3, 250 South Broad Street, from January 1, 1949, to October 7, 1949. In addition to this information, Confidential Informant T-7, of known reliability, advised on February 4, 1950 that the W-2 Income Tax Form for 1949, made out in the name of PHILIP BART, 263 Atkins Avenue, Brooklyn, New York, indicated he had received \$1,941.48 in wages and had \$137.40 withheld for Federal Income Tax.

On May 18, 1950 Confidential Informant T-4, of known reliability, made available a form letter dated May 10, 1950 from the "Daily Worker", 50 East 13th Street, New York 3, New York, which was signed PHILIP BART as General Manager of the "Daily Worker".

Confidential Informant T-5, of known reliability, stated on September 12, 1949 that PHIL BART advised him that date that he had been relieved of his duties as District Organizer, District 3, Communist Party, USA, and was taking a position with the National Organization of the Communist Party, USA. At that time BART said that he had been in Philadelphia as District Organizer since December 1, 1945.

III. ACTIVITY IN DISTRICT 3, COMMUNIST PARTY, USA

On March 9, 1950 Confidential Informant T-13, of known reliability, advised that BEN WEISS, the Treasurer of District 3, Communist Party, USA, had sent \$2,000 of the money collected for the National Communist Party Fund Drive directly to PHIL BART and was to send an additional \$3,000 on March 14, 1950 and \$5,000 on March 21, 1950. The informant understood that originally WEISS made the check out to the Communist Party but BART made arrangements to destroy the first check and WEISS was to send another check made out in the name of the "Daily Worker".

This same informant stated on August 4, 1950 that PHIL BART of Communist Party National Headquarters wanted another \$1,000 from District 3, Communist Party, USA, immediately and on August 15, 1950 the informant advised that this \$1,000 was furnished directly to BART in two installments of \$500 each.

IV. KNOWLEDGE OF THE AIMS AND PURPOSES OF THE COMMUNIST PARTY

Confidential Informant T-10 reported that PHIL BART spoke at the Membership Leaders Meeting held the afternoon of December 18, 1949 at 1306 North Seventh Street. T-10 stated that BART was the final speaker

and summarized the agenda of the meeting. According to the informant, BART said that every action led by the Communist Party is to advance the struggle of the workers to a higher class and also to eliminate the capitalistic system, the cause of the workers problem. BART further stated that the lessons of the Communist Information Bureau will be of great help to the Party in the United States and the members should study these lessons carefully and follow their suggestions.

T-10 advised that ROBERT KLONSKY, District 3 Organizational Secretary, had talked at this same meeting and advised all those present to study the lessons of the Communist Information Bureau which were published in the November 29, December 2 and December 9, 1949 issues of the Cominform Newspaper, "For A Lasting Peace, For A People's Democracy!"

In elaboration of a reference to the newspaper "For A Lasting Peace, For A People's Democracy!" and decisions of the Cominform, T-10 said that on the evening of December 18, 1949, a meeting of the Communist Party was held at Garvey Hall, 1609 West Columbia Avenue, in honor of the 70th Birthday of JOSEPH STALIN. Written invitations to the meeting were distributed by the "Communist Party of Eastern Pennsylvania and Delaware" and admission was by this invitation only. The informant did not report BART as being present at this meeting although the majority of persons who attended the meeting on the afternoon of December 18, 1949 at 1306 North Seventh Street were also at the evening meeting.

At this latter meeting, ROBERT KLONSKY expounded on the lessons of the Communist Information Bureau and said that in November 1949 a meeting of the Communist Information Bureau was held in Hungary. This meeting was attended by representatives of the Communist Parties of Bulgaria, Rumania, Hungary, Poland, the Soviet Union, France, Czechoslovakia and Italy. An exchange of opinions at this convention resulted in complete agreement by the attendant Communist Party representatives who unanimously adopted corresponding resolutions. KLONSKY said these resolutions were printed in the November 29, December 2, and December 9, 1949 issues of the Cominform Newspaper, "For A Lasting Peace, For A People's Democracy!", an organ of the Information Bureau of the Communist and Workers Party published at 56 Valeriu, Brănești, Bucharest, Bulgaria.

T-10 advised that KLONSKY stated that these resolutions would form a basis for study by the Communist Party, USA, and would constitute the party line for the Communist Party, USA, in 1950 along with the following additional material:

JOSEPH STALIN's "A Political Biography" copyrighted in 1949 by the International Publishers Company, Inc., New York City!

The December 1949 issue of "Political Affairs"

Article "STALIN On His Seventieth Birthday" by ALEXANDER BITTELMAN

Page 18, article "United Front Is The Key To Victory Over Reaction" by GUS HALL.

The December 1949 issue of "Soviet Russia Today"

The three issues of the newspaper, "For A Lasting Peace, For A People's Democracy!" referred to above, as well as the December 1949 issue of "Political Affairs", the book "JOSEPH STALIN, A Political Biography", and the December 1949 issue of "Soviet Russia Today" were obtained at the December 18, 1949 evening meeting at 1609 West Columbia Avenue by the informant and are in the possession of the Philadelphia Field Division.

On December 1, 1949 SAs JOSEPH E. FLAHERTY and HERBERT F. GREATHOUSE overheard the proceedings of a meeting held in Room 307, William Penn Hotel, Harrisburg, Pa. Identifications of those present at this meeting were made by SAs J. CLIFFORD OUSLEY, FRANCIS J. SANDIN, GEORGE A. STRONG, FLAHERTY, GREATHOUSE and Confidential Informant T-15, of known reliability.

December 18, 1949 by the District 3 Committee.

KUZMA

On August 3, 1949 Confidential Informant T-5 advised
KUZMA was Trade Union Secretary, District 3, Communist
Party, USA.

ZALMON GARFIELD

On February 27, 1949 the "Evening Bulletin", Philadelphia
newspaper, contained an article stating GARFIELD was
appointed Pennsylvania State Director of the Progressive
Party on February 26, 1949. Confidential Informant T-16,
of known reliability, reported in August 1949 that
GARFIELD had been a member of District 8, Communist
Party, USA, in the autumn of 1948.

MRS. ZALMON GARFIELD

On July 13, 1950 Confidential Informant T-15 described
MRS. GARFIELD as a "Communist Party member".

THELMA DALE

The August 1949 issue of the "Philadelphia Progressive," a pamphlet issued by the Progressive Party of Philadelphia, reflects that DALE joined the Progressive Party staff in Philadelphia as an Organizer on August 1, 1949. Confidential Informant T-17, of known reliability, stated that DALE was elected to the New York State Committee of the Communist Party at a special State Convention held in July and August 1945 in New York City.

BEITSCHER

Confidential Informant T-17, of known reliability, advised in December 1948 that BEITSCHER was the new Regional Director of the Progressive Party in Philadelphia. Confidential Informant T-18, of known reliability, has stated that BEITSCHER was a member of the Communist Party and frequently conferred with Communist Party officials concerning matters of mutual interest.

WRIGHT

Confidential Informant T-15 advised that WRIGHT was Regional Director of the Progressive Party in the Pittsburgh area.

JOHNSON

Confidential Informant T-14, of known reliability, on November 30, 1949 described JOHNSON as National Legislative Director of the Communist Party.

At this meeting while discussing the role of the American Labor Party in New York, JOHNSON advised the others present that VISHINSKY was in accord with the attacks of the American Labor Party against DULLES, candidate for U. S. Senator from New York. JOHNSON referred to this action as part of the United Front Campaign. JOHNSON also stated that the Progressive Party or any third party, the Civil Rights Congress and the

National Association For The Advancement Of Colored People should be members of the United Front and thereby the Communist Party would have coltrol of many front organizations.

At this meeting ED STRONG spoke generally of the terms under which the United Front would support candidates in the Pennsylvania elections.

Regarding the United Front Campaign of the Communist Party, Confidential Informant T-10 on November 29, 1949 advised of the following:

PHIL BART attended and spoke at a District 3 Section Organizers Meeting for all sections outside Philadelphia held on November 27, 1949 at the residence of BOB JAFFE, 235 North Church Street, Robesonia, Pa. JAFFE is Section Organizer for the Southeastern Pennsylvania Section. The informant stated that this meeting was attended by representatives from the Southeastern, Anthracite, Wilmington and Lehigh Valley Sections of District 3, as well as BOB KLONSKY, JOE KUZMA and ED STRONG from District 3 Headquarters.

The informant stated that BART stated at this meeting that the Communist Party must develop the role of the Soviet Union to the American working class. BART said that those present must review the Communist Party line as related to the American working class, examine it and learn how to apply it in day to day work. BART said this line of our party is a correct line. The aim of capitalism is to isolate the Communist Party and the left Progressive forces in this country. The Progressive Party is not yet the mover of a broad political movement. The Progressive Party in Pennsylvania must get to work speedily in order to mobilize broad forces. We must become a force in the Political Action Committee and the Labor Education League. The National Association For The Advancement Of Colored People has called a conference on Civil Rights from January 15 to January 17, 1950 in Washington, D. C. This conference can be made into a broad peoples conference. The Communist Party must use its influence in shaping resolutions for this conference and must continue the fight for a United Front action for the interests of the working class.

At this same meeting, ED STRONG stated that the Communist Party must employ United Front tactics and ROBERT KLONSKY spoke concerning the character of the Communist Party's work in the United Front Campaign. KLONSKY stated that party clubs must become the center for United Front action and that the Communist Party must move its membership out into the masses.

KLONSKY also stated that on December 21, 1949 a book would be published honoring the birthday of JOSEPH STALIN, and this book should be made the basis for an ideology study of the Communist Party's aims and purposes for all Communist Party members.

Records of United States District Court, Washington, D.C., in the case of United States versus PHILIP BART, criminal number 1746-50, reflect that the Grand Jury was impaneled on October 3, 1950, was sworn in on October 4, 1950, and returned a True Bill against BART, charging that on June 21, 1950, BART appeared as a witness before a sub-committee of the House Committee on Un-American Activities in Washington, D.C., and refused to answer pertinent questions asked him by the Committee. The indictment includes 32 counts, which consist of the 32 questions asked the defendant that he refused to answer. The indictment was filed in open court on November 20, 1950.

The presentment, dated November 16, 1950, charging the defendant with violation of Section 192, Title 2, United States Code, was filed on November 20, 1950.

The defendant was arraigned in United States District Court for the District of Columbia on November 24, 1950, before Judge BURNITA S. MATTHEWS. He entered a plea of not guilty. DAVID REIN appeared as the defendant's attorney for the arraignment only.

Bond was set at \$1500.00 and was presented on November 24, 1950, by ROY WOOD in the form of two United States Treasury bonds in amounts of \$500.00 and \$1000.00 respectively. It is noted that ROY WOOD is chairman of the Communist Party for the District of Columbia.

It is further noted that no warrant was issued for the defendant's arrest, and that he appeared voluntarily.

Washington Field Office will follow and report further court action in this matter.

Indict UE Leaders, 'Worker' Manager For Defying House Un-Americans

WASHINGTON, Nov. 20.—National leaders of the United Electrical Workers were indicted here today by a federal Grand Jury for contempt of the House Un-Americans. Also indicted was Philip Bart, General Manager of the Daily Worker and The Worker.

Altogether, 12 were indicted. All were ordered arraigned Friday. Julius Finspat, UE's secretary-treasurer, was indicted on 68 counts, leaving him open to 96 years in jail and \$68,000 in fines if convicted. Philip Bart, general manager of the Daily Worker, was indicted on 32 counts. Mrs. Louise Berman was indicted on 25 counts. Both told the committee in hearings conducted this year, that the Constitution protected them from the committee's traps.

Indictments were also handed down against: James J. Matles, UE organizational director, seven counts; Thomas Quinn, UE leader in Pittsburgh, one count; Frank Panzino, UE leader in Pittsburgh, three counts; Talmadge Raley, UE leader in Cincinnati, 11 counts; Esther Tice, UE leader in Cincinnati, three counts; Clarence Hickey, atomic scientist of Brooklyn, three counts; James Branca, former Washington, D. C., teacher, eight counts, and Frank Hasbmall, Cincinnati, five counts.

The 12 were among a group of 56 witnesses cited by Congress for contempt of the committee last August. Of this group, 33 were residents of the Island of Oahu in Hawaii. A federal grand jury there had already indicted all 39.

Walter Hitz, U. S. attorney said indictments against the remaining

five committee victims was "imminent." The five are Steve Nelson, Pittsburgh Communist leader; Marcel Scherer, New York Labor Peace Committee coordinator; Giovanni Rossi Lomanitz, David J. Bohm and Irving D. Fox, all physicists.

Charles, another U. S. attorney, said arrangements have already been made to arraign the 12 in U. S. District Court here Friday. Murray said the surrender of eight of the 12 has already been indicated. He said warrants for the remaining four would probably be issued. These four are Bart, Hasbmall, Branca and Hickey.

Trial dates will be set upon arraignment, Murray said.

In New York, Phil Bart declared: "This is a McCarran indictment of myself by the Washington Grand Jury. It has already netted among its victims many Americans among whom is my outstanding prisoner, Eugene Dennis, General Secretary of the Communist Party, who is now serving in West Street jail under a similar indictment which has grown out of the Un-American Committee's actions. I, like all other victims of this committee, am confident that we will be vindicated by history before the American people."

requested by the National Committee of the Communist Party to release PHILIP BART, the District Chairman. The National Committee in doing this felt that in the general interest of the Party the addition of BART to the national cadre would tend to further strengthen and reinforce that cadre.

The Informant stated that the Party, in the heightening of its propaganda work, would expect BART to take over active Party leadership in coordination of all aspects of literature publication and distribution. The National Committee also felt that BART would be able to become an active assistant in the work of the Organization Department.

On February 4, 1950, Confidential Informant T-3, of known reliability, advised that PHILIP BART had paid his dues to the Germantown Section of the Communist Party at Philadelphia, Pennsylvania, through December, 1949. This Informant stated that BART had been transferred from the Germantown Section of the Communist Party at Philadelphia to the New York State Communist Party. The Informant stated that BART would reside at 263 Atkins Avenue, Brooklyn, New York.

The "Daily Worker" issue of March 23, 1950, Page 5, Column 1, carries a column which reflects that PHILIP BART was named General Manager of the paper. The column states, "The management of the 'Daily Worker' is happy to announce PHIL BART will take over the position of general manager. Active for over 25 years in the labor and Communist movement, BART has helped to found and build trade unions in many parts of the country. He has held leading Communist Party posts in Ohio, Illinois, and Indiana and comes to us after serving as chairman of the Party in Eastern Pennsylvania.

"We are confident PHIL BART will have the full cooperation of our readers and the progressive movement in his efforts to bring a new year in circulation growth of 'The Worker' and 'Daily Worker'."

On March 20, 1950, Confidential Informant T-2 advised that the subject, as a promotional idea for further interesting new circles in "The Worker", had advised all districts of the Communist Party that the issue of "The Worker", Sunday, April 16, would be devoted to the birthday anniversary of THOMAS JEFFERSON and the fifth anniversary of the death of FRANKLIN D. ROOSEVELT. The Informant stated that BART felt that certain other special editions had obtained new friends, so would this edition, and therefore urged all districts to attempt to get new literature for "The Worker."

The "Daily Worker" issue of April 11, 1950, Page 11, Column 1, carries an article by DAVID PLATT, "Daily Worker" movie critic, concerning the review by the "Daily Worker" of an ad from the Eagle Lion Films

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for the film "GUILTY OF TREASON." The article quotes the subject as saying: "We reserve the right to reject any advertisement which we consider detrimental to the policies which we support. In respect to advertising, 'Daily Worker' policy is the same as that of all other peoples, except we don't pretend to hide the fact that we reject ads injurious to labor and the nation. Other papers reject all kinds of advertising openly, at the same time posing as defenders of freedom of the press."

Confidential Informant T-2, on March 31, 1950, advised that a meeting of the New York County Press Directors was called for on April 12, 1950 at 35 East 12th Street, New York City. At this meeting Informant stated that BART was going to deliver the main address relating to the recent National Committee meeting.

Confidential Informant T-4, of known reliability, advised that PHILIP BART was scheduled to address the Kings County Section of the Communist Party, the club press directors, and representatives of all industrial concentration clubs on April 20, 1950 at 363 Fulton Street, Brooklyn, New York. BART's speech was concerned with a report on the recent national plenum, mainly dealing with the utilities of the Communist Party Press and its use in club concentration work.

The "Daily Worker" issue of May 16, 1950, Page 9, Column 1, reflects that PHILIP BART, "Daily Worker" business manager, had addressed a meeting of 125 club representatives of the Kings Highway Region, Communist Party, New York State, on May 14, 1950.

Confidential Informant T-2 advised that PHILIP BART was a member of the National Finance Committee, Communist Party, USA. The Informant stated that BART was present at a meeting of the Finance Committee on May 31, 1950, which was held at National Communist Party Headquarters, New York City.

The "Daily Worker" issue of June 21, 1950, Page 2, Column 4, carries the following item:

"UN-AMERICANS SUMMON 'WORKER' MANAGER TODAY"

"PHILIP BART, general manager of the Daily Worker, has been called for questioning this morning before the House Un-American Committee in Washington.

"Rep. John S. Wood (D-Ga), chairman of the committee, signed the summons. Wood did not state the matters on which he proposes to question BART. The calling of the manager of a newspaper which has been playing a leading role in the fight for peace, indicated that the committee may be opening a new campaign of warmongering."

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The New York Times issue of June 22, 1950 carried an article concerning subject's testimony before the House Committee on Un-American Activities. The article states, ".....One witness, PHILIP A. BART of New York, general manager of 'The Daily Worker,' Communist newspaper, accused the committee of ignoring the due process of law. Another, MARCEL SCHERER, a former West Coast labor leader whom the committee apparently attempted to link with 'leaks' of atomic secrets from the University of California's radiation laboratory at Berkeley, refused to answer most questions.

"Representative FRANCIS E. WALTER, Democrat of Pennsylvania, and acting committee chairman, said the group would meet Friday to decide whether one or two more test cases would be added to the thirty-nine from Hawaii.

"A constitutional issue, it appeared from today's questioning, was whether a witness, conceded to be immune from giving answers that might incriminate himself, could also refuse, under the Fifth Amendment, to answer questions concerning someone else. Many of today's questions called upon the witnesses to say whether to their knowledge, other persons were Communists.

"Mr. BART, a native of Poland, who acquired citizenship through the naturalization of his father early in the century, declined to tell his original name. The change of name, he said, was legal and he was voting under it. Mr. SCHERER, originally a Rumanian, was not asked about a possible change.

"Largely under investigation, however, was a passport application made in 1932 that sought entry to Europe of one JOHN WILLIAM FOX. The committee wanted to know whether this was really Mr. BART. Mr. SCHERER appeared to have endorsed the passport request. Both witnesses refused to discuss it.

"FRANK S. TAVENNER, Jr., committee counsel, said the group had evidence that Mr. SCHERER had attended the MARX-LENIN Institute in Moscow for revolutionary training in such operations as strike strategy, military science, codes, street fighting and civil warfare. He showed Mr. SCHERER a copy of a passport application containing his name and a photograph of the applicant. Mr. SCHERER declined to answer questions about it.

"Mr. BART, to whom a copy of the 'FOX' passport application was shown, declined to identify or repudiate it. ABRAHAM UNGER of New York, his counsel, denounced the committee's proceedings as 'highly improper'.

"On several occasions the touch-and-go of hot argument threw the hearing into confusion. As Mr. BART's hearing closed, he was standing and shouting that the committee questions were aimed at incriminating

"him and 'my party.'

"Mr. WALTER retorted: 'If you think so much of the Constitution which you are hiding behind you will be willing to cooperate with this committee in finding out what alleged Americans attended the Marx-Lenin Institute'."

The "Daily Worker" issue of June 22, 1950, Page 3, Column 1, carries an article concerning the House investigation. The article states:

"In fast and furious verbal battles that had the House Un-American Committee reeling PHILIP BART, general manager of the Daily Worker today condemned the committee to its face for attempting to curtail freedom of the press.

"The Un-Americans' move obviously had as one of its aims the smearing of the Daily Worker for having publicized the involvement of Un-Americans' chairman JOHN S. WOOD (D-Ga) in a \$1,000 kickback from a man who collected a \$10,000 claim from the government.

"BART forced the committee to retreat from its line of questioning about the Daily Worker when he told them that the committee was 'infringing on the First Amendment to the Constitution which guarantees freedom of the press'.

"When the committee's hour-long fishing expedition involving passports and names was brought to an end by acting chairman FRANCIS WALTERS (D-Pa), BART boomed that the committee was trying to 'send all America to jail'.

"Asked by reporters whether BART would be cited for contempt, WALTERS said he saw no reason 'why we shouldn't proceed against him on a charge of contempt'.

"Throughout the questioning, BART repeated his condemnations of the committee. He reiterated that the committee did not seek answers to questions, but sought to frame him as it had done many others.

"Obviously ruffled by the sharp attack, the sharpest experienced by the committee in the last two years, WALTERS growled, 'If you thought as much of the Constitution as you say you do, instead of hiding behind it you'd help the committee find out how subversives went to Moscow for training'.

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"I will never be a part of this committee's attempt to send all America to jail," BART exclaimed. He rose to his feet with more denunciations of the committee's attempt to smear him and jail him 'as you have done to others'. WALTERS banged his gavel, and the committee strode from the hearing room."

The "Daily Worker" issue of June 30, 1950 carried an article entitled, "DAILY WORKER MANAGER CITED FOR UN-AMERICANISM." The article relates:

"PHILIP BART, Daily Worker manager, was cited for 'contempt' today by the House Un-American Committee. BART had refused to answer questions by the Un-Americans, and had invoked the constitutional right not to testify against himself.

"Victims of the Un-Americans' latest attempt to jail progressives now includes STEVE NELSON, chairman of the Communist Party of Western Pennsylvania as well as 39 residents of Hawaii.

"PHILIP BART, informed of the citation against him, declared yesterday:

"Although one chairman of the House Un-American Committee was convicted of defrauding the United States government, and its present chairman is under suspicion of using his position for private gain - this thought-police outfit still presumes to pass judgment on the political beliefs of honest people. A contempt citation from this Committee has become a citation for honorable service in the cause of world peace and the welfare of the American people.

"In my case, it is also a sneak attack on the Daily Worker, and therefore an attack against freedom of the press.

"Others, not I, are in contempt of the U.S. Constitution and the United Nations Charter. They have most recently shown their contempt for the will of peace-loving Americans by waging, undeclared war against the people of Korea and Asia'."

On June 8, 1950, Confidential Informant T-2 advised that BART was concerned about a decrease in the circulation of the "Daily Worker." As a result, BART sent a letter to all districts on June 2, 1950 urging them to stimulate the subscription drive for the "Daily Worker," which was under way at that time.

The "Daily Worker" issue of August 13, 1950, Page 2, Column 3, states "THE HOUSE ON FRIDAY CITED PHIL BART, MANAGER OF THE DAILY WORKER FOR CONTEMPT OF THE HOUSE UN-AMERICAN ACTIVITIES," and then rapidly cited 53 other witnesses who had refused to act as accomplices in Un-American witch-hunts. In an attached column BART was quoted as follows:

"The congressional citation against me as against all others is aimed at stifling all voices fighting for peace. In my case it is especially directed towards the suppression of the lone daily voice, the Daily Worker, which is fighting for the peace of our country and against the Wall Street warmakers.

"But the Daily Worker cannot be jailed. Its voice cannot be silenced. With every attack it will win new support in the fight to save our country from the scourge of a new world war and fascism."

The "Daily Worker" issue of November 21, 1950 carried an article "INDICT U E LEADERS, 'WORKER' MANAGER FOR DEFYING HOUSE UN-AMERICANS." This article was datelined Washington, D.C., November 20. The article states, "National leaders of the United Electrical Workers were indicted here today by a Federal Grand Jury for contempt of the House Un-Americans. Also indicted was PHILIP BART, General Manager of the 'Daily Worker' and 'The Worker'....In New York, PHIL BART declared: 'This is a MC CARRAN indictment of myself by the Washington Grand Jury. It has already netted among its victims many Americans, among whom is its outstanding prisoner, EUGENE DENNIS, General Secretary of the Communist Party, who is now serving in the West Street Jail under a similar indictment which has grown out of the Un-American Committee's actions. I, like all other victims of the Committee, am confident that we will be vindicated by history before the American people.'"

"Political Affairs" issue of May, 1950, on Page 168, carries an article by PHIL BART, entitled, "MAKE THE COMMUNIST PRESS A POWERFUL ORGAN OF STRUGGLE." (Extended Remarks to the Plenum). The article states:

"The report of Comrade WINSTON lays down the main approach and objectives in the strengthening of our Party, increase of its membership, and building of our press. His report gave main emphasis to the implementation of our policy of industrial concentration, by means of which our Party can and will deeply root itself in the basic section of the American working class. I wish to single out for more detailed attention one phase of this task and perspective - increasing the circulation and extending the influence of our press, THE WORKER and the DAILY WORKER.

"Our Party, from the day of its founding, has recognized the need and fought for the establishment of a daily Marxist-Leninist newspaper. With deep pride, we proclaimed in a front-page editorial appearing in the very first issue of the DAILY WORKER, January 13, 1924.....'The first English-language Communist Daily in the world has been realized.'

"Although our Party was much smaller at that time than it is today, its influence weaker and its resources more meager, it undertook the task of publishing a daily newspaper; for it recognized the indispensability, for all our Party's work, of a regularly-published, daily Communist press. Our agitational work cannot be anywhere near adequate in the absence of a newspaper that speaks up daily on the issues confronting the working class and the people, interprets them, and helps mobilize and organize the masses for struggle.

"SPECIAL TASK OF THE COMMUNIST PRESS

"The main task of the Communist press in the United States today is to help develop a broad united-front movement of the working class and its allies for democracy, peace and security. Our press must be a powerful organ providing day-to-day guidance in the struggle to bridle the warmongers. It must be a force in the struggle for Negro rights and in labor's fight for higher wages and against the reactionary measures directed against it. It must champion the defense of the Communist Party and all democratic rights of individuals and organizations, now seriously threatened by the Mundt-Fergusons and all other un-Americans. The duty of the Communist press is to crusade on these issues among the millions, in the first place among the workers in the basic industries.

"There are other voices that appeal for united action on various issues and levels of organization. But our press has a special task to perform in developing the united action of the working class, and that is to develop and deepen the class-consciousness of the workers, for the united-front movement can reach higher levels only to the extent that the class-consciousness of the workers, Negro and white, grows and matures. Only when the workers fully grasp the historic role that they can and must play in the anti-imperialist struggle can they make their full strength felt in leading the movement for peace. Only to the extent that their class consciousness is developed can the workers give leadership - staunch, undeviating leadership - to the other classes and sections of the population whose interests and aspirations are menaced by Wall Street imperialism.

"The development of the class consciousness of the workers, as the great guiding spirits and leaders of Communism have many times emphasized, is not an automatic or spontaneous process. It requires the proper fulfillment by the Party of its vanguard role. It requires today the waging of an all-out ideological battle for the exposure and refutation of the Red-baiters and Soviet-baiters, of the cynical imperialist demagoguery of Truman, Acheson and the bipartisans, of the class-collaborationist and pro-war policies and practices of the Social-Democratic and reformist trade-union top leadership.

"That is why the building of the Communist press is of such mighty importance in developing every phase of our work. Press building goes hand in hand with the carrying out of our policy of industrial concentration, of firmly rooting our Party among the workers in the main plants and industries of our country and winning their support and confidence through vanguard participation and guidance in their day-to-day struggles.

"We must help develop higher forms of class solidarity. It begins with the picket line, but proceeds to the recognition that the interests of the capitalists and the workers clash on every issue.

"We should constantly look to the experiences of the Bolshevik Party of Lenin and Stalin, which teach us the vital role of the press in the struggle of the working class. The Bolshevik press played a vital part in raising the class consciousness of the Soviet workers, in building the strong ties between the Party and the masses. PRAVDA was in the center of every struggle, of every united-front movement. In the words of Comrade STALIN:

"The PRAVDA of 1912 was the laying of the cornerstone of Bolshevism in 1917.

"With proper attention and work by our whole Party, the American workers can and will come to see in the Daily Worker, their own paper, their best supporter.

"Comrade FOSTER in his greetings to this Plenum and Comrade WINSTON in his report have stressed the need for the Party's developing the ideological struggle on every front. This is absolutely necessary."

The confidential files of Confidential Informant T-5, of known reliability, contain the name of PHILIP BERAL. The following information is noted in these files:

PHILIP BERAL was issued Passport #149013 on December 12, 1929. In his passport application, he stated he was born at Warsaw, Poland on June 28, 1902, that he emigrated to the United States in August, 1914 and from 1914 to 1929, he lived in New York; however, he gave as his permanent address on this application, 671 Hague Street, Detroit, Michigan.

This application further showed that BERAL's father was BENJAMIN BERAL and that he was born in 1882 in Warsaw, Poland and was naturalized in the Southern District of New York on December 7, 1920.

This application reflected that BERAL intended to visit England, France, Germany and Poland as a tourist and to visit relatives. He described himself as follows:

Height	5'8"
Hair	Black
Eyes	Brown

He desired that his passport be forwarded to him at 308 Neptune Avenue, Brooklyn, New York. The identifying witness on this application was MILTON R. FELDMAN, 1470 No. Euclid Street, Detroit, Michigan.

The files of Informant T-5 further reflect that the records of the World Tourist Inc., show that BERAL's transportation was charged to the Communist Party and that BERAL was a PRIMOFF student and a T.U.U.L. delegate.

GEORGE PRIMOFF was the financial advisor of the Communist Party for a number of years and, according to witnesses in the EARL BROWDER case, the PRIMOFF account was actually the account of the Communist Party.

An Open Letter to the Newsdealers of New York

The following open letter was addressed yesterday by Phil Bart, general manager of the Daily Worker and The Worker, to New York newsdealers:
Dear Newsdealers:

You are good Americans with a living to make. You believe in the Bill of Rights which guarantees the freedom of the press. That means you will agree freedom to print what you oppose, as well as what you favor. We don't know what your politics are, but that's not the issue.

The issue is America's Constitution. Begin making exceptions in one case and you end up by destroying freedom for all.

This is why the widespread protest is rising against the illegal proposals to ban the Daily Worker and The Worker by the officials of the Newsdealers Association. Prompt opposition has come from varied groups, newspapers and unions throughout the country. The American Civil Liberties Union has already branded the ban "an interference with violation of the fundamental rights of the press."

The influential, conservative Washington Post said the same thing. "The traditional democratic practice," it said editorially, has been to let the public read what it wants to read and be its own judge.

The vice-president of the American Newspaper Guild of New York (CIO) has protested. So has the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People. Even the Daily News and the World-Telegram didn't like the idea.

They know that if you begin with this newspaper, it can spread to any newspaper. The little white-haired woman at the meeting Sunday put it best, right out of her own experience. "This will establish a bad precedent," she said, "that will hurt us all. Ban the Worker and what's next? Some of my customers already say 'Ban that Jew paper, the Post.' Others say they don't like the Compass. After a while Republicans will say ban a Democratic paper. It will end up hurting everybody and only the paper that the people in power like will be the one we can sell."

She was right. That's what happens when censorship begins. Out it goes, you like, William Richter's proposals mean censorship.

He is in a conspiracy against the Bill of Rights.

Many newsdealers have already made their views known. They oppose this unconstitutional proposal. They say they have the right to sell any newspaper they please. They have that right.

Richter is trying to create an atmosphere of hysteria in this matter for his own purposes. He talks now of a referendum, not only of the members of the association, but of ALL newsdealers. He needs to ring in all the city's newsdealers into this trouble he's started up.

We are certain you will agree with the Constitution, not with Richter, and the shadowy forces he's fronting for. You agree, we are sure, with the millions in New York who say they have a right to read what they want to read.

Please accept my apology for not replying any earlier as I have been out of town and your letter was just called to my attention.

I am sending you a photograph although I do not know whether it is suitable for your needs.

Congressman Hoode was not the chairman at the hearing of the Un-American Committee when I appeared before it. It was a sub-committee and its chairman was Francis S. Walter of Pennsylvania.

There was a definite anti-Semitic tone to the hearing as there has been on all other occasions. While the chairman played his part with an anti-Semitic undertone to all of his questions, the main task was left to the Counsel for the Committee, Frank S. Tamm, Sr., who is a Southerner and does not leave any doubt of his hatred for Jews. Let me state that this was done not only against myself but also my attorney, Abraham Unger, who is a member of the firm of Unger, Freedman & Yelichow.

The first attempt in this respect was the question about my birthplace, which happens to be Warsaw, Poland. I came to this country at the age of eleven.

Recently, there was an effort to bring this question in again under the interrogation as to my name which is legally Philip Hart, and this fact is known by the Committee.

Furthermore, in the course of the questioning, major reference was made to Jewish organizations. For instance, one of the questions was whether I had any knowledge of the Jewish People's Committee, an organization which existed some seven or twelve years ago in the City. I happen to know nothing about it. My field of work over many years did not bring me in touch with any Jewish organization, although I have been active in movements in the interests of the Jewish people. 18 Must Face Trial On 'Contempt' Charges

Daily Worker Washington Bureau

WASHINGTON, Jan. 31.—Admitting that the Supreme Court decisions in the Blau cases apply to witnesses before congressional committees, Judge James R. Kirkland ruled, nevertheless, that 18 witnesses who invoked the Fifth Amendment must stand trial for contempt of Congress.

Among the 18 is Philip ~~Port~~ business manager of the Daily Worker, who last summer refused to answer questions of the House Un-American Committee concerning the Communist Party on the ground that his answers might tend to incriminate him.

Kirkland held that a witness is within his rights under the Constitution to remain silent before a congressional committee when his answers might lead to prosecution.

But he asserted that a person who invoked this privilege must stand trial and prove that he did so properly.

As a result of this ruling the 18 witnesses must submit lengthy legal procedures at the cost of both time and money.

In the Federal District Court in Honolulu recently, Judge Mitzger directed the acquittal without trial of 39 persons charged, on similar grounds, with contempt of the Un-American Committee.

Kirkland also ruled that a witness can be charged one count for each question he declined to answer, even though all the questions referred to a single incident or event and were asked at one hearing at one appearance before a congressional committee. Some of the defendants in the pending cases are charged with a score of counts. Frederick ~~V.~~ Field is charged with 36 counts.

On 1/5/51, Confidential Informant ND 591 advised that WILLIAM PATTERSON, National Executive Secretary of the Civil Rights Congress, had contacted an individual identified as BILL and told him that he had a job of vital importance for him to do in connection with the Martinville 7. BILL replied that he had his hands full at the present time and did not think that he would be able to handle the assignment. PATTERSON told him that he was leaving town on that date.

The informant said that a woman identified as NETTIE at the Civil Rights Congress Office contacted JEAN SMITH and told her that she had a great deal of work for them to do but could not be over until PATTERSON left which would be around 1 p.m. on that date.

ABE UNGER a little later attempted to contact PATTERSON and was told that he could be reached at AL 4-2215 prior to his departure. The informant said that NETTIE contacted the Vogue Travel Agency where she was told that the \$170 charged for the tickets of WILLIAM PATTERSON included his entire trip including the flight to Los Angeles as well as subsequent stops at San Francisco, Portland, Seattle and Denver.

Later in the day, the informant advised that PHIL BART, General Manager of the Daily Worker, contacted PATTERSON just prior to PATTERSON'S departure and indicated that UNGER had told him about a meeting in UNGER'S office early on that date. By letter dated 2/15/51, a copy of which was forwarded to this office, the U.S. Attorney, at Philadelphia, advised the Attorney General of the following in regard to the captioned matter.

"We have examined the file of this subject very carefully to ascertain if there was any evidence that would support a prosecution for violation of a Federal Law.

"We did not find anything in the evidence that would support prosecution for anything except as a conspirator with others to violate the Smith Act, the validity of which Act is presently under consideration by the Supreme Court.

"There is no question of Bart's membership in the party and his activities on behalf of the party at a national level. His activities on behalf of the party apparently has resulted in promotions and the delegation to him of constantly increasing authority and influence.

"If the validity of the Smith Act is sustained we think that further consideration should be given to the prosecution of this subject and others who are active on behalf of the Communist Party in this district.

"The investigation does not seem to have developed the commission of any one or all, of Sedition, Sabotage, Espionage or Treason."

An attempt will be made in the immediate future to discuss this matter with the Assistant United States Attorney, in Philadelphia, to whom this particular case has been assigned to determine his opinion regarding possible prosecution under the Internal Security Act of 1950.

The Bureau will be advised of the results of this interview.

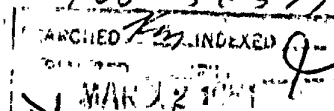

The Informant said that MORRIS DWECK on the same date contacted the Associated Press and United Press city desks to give them the story of JAMES WILSON, negro, age thirty, who was in the Bronx County Jail awaiting extradition to South Carolina. DWECK endeavored to have the news service publicize the details of WILSON'S incarceration.

Later on the same day a woman identified as IDA contacted ABE WEISBURD at the CRC Office, and told him there were several matters concerning his own office which had to be handled. She indicated that a Miss SILINS (phonetic) had called him from the Langwell. WEISBURD said he was going there from the CRC Office and would give them their money.

Hails 'Worker' Sub Gains in Midwest

Steel, machine equipment, auto and other factory workers in the heavily industrialized midwest area around Chicago want The Worker, and hundreds have gotten mail subscriptions during the recent sub campaign, Phil Bart, Worker and Daily Worker business manager, stated yesterday.

Bart has just returned from a week's stay in the midwest, where he discussed results of the campaign with scores of Worker readers in several cities.

Worker campaigners in the Chicago area chalked up 2,600 Worker and Daily Worker subs in the campaign, or almost 20 percent above the 2,200 goal they had set themselves. Nationally, the campaign has hit close to the 25,000 mark, with subs still coming in.

Bart said that among steel workers more than 300 subs were obtained by Worker campaigners in the mills, who had set themselves the objective of 250. Supporters in three mills had decided to go after 40 each. In one area, one obtained 158 among them. One worker alone obtained 28 subscriptions.

In the electrical, machine tool, heavy equipment industries, Work-

er campaigners obtained more than 350 subs after setting themselves the goal of 200. In one midwest area where Worker backers obtained 170 subs, they got most of them from railroad workers.

CLIMAX YEAR'S WORK

Bart described the work of one group of six Worker supporters in the South Side of Chicago, the midwest's Harlem, who obtained 100 subscriptions in the course of the drive. This was a result of the fact that they had sold papers throughout the year, and were able to get subs from the many people who had been reading the paper through their activity. The group is working on an elaborate year-round plan to spread the paper widely in the community in which its members live.

Bart said also that in two highly industrialized communities he visited in Ohio, Worker campaigners had set themselves goals of 100 subs in each city among factory workers, and in both cases were close to it. They intended to complete, and go on from there to develop programs for year-round activity in spreading the paper. In Michigan, where Worker campaigners had fallen short of their goals in the drive, they were now working out a program of activity to meet those goals, and also to develop regular circulation activity.

On April 6, 1951, Supervisor Warren T. Marchessault and the writer were in conference with ROY COHN, Confidential Assistant United States Attorney, Southern District of New York, at his request concerning the various cases of Communist Party members presented to the United States Attorney at the direction of the Bureau and the Department in October, 1950. COHN indicated a desire to go ahead with prosecution at an early date but is concerned over questions of policy concerning the theory under which the cases should be presented, that is, whether under

1. Individual indictments under the Smith Act based on membership in the Communist Party with knowledge of its aims and purposes;
2. McCarran Act registration or espionage sections;
3. Any other Federal violation by the individual subjects, such as prosecution for false or fraudulent statements in government matters, ie, a falsified statement to the Immigration and Naturalization Service or other government agency.

COHN believed prosecution under the Smith Act was the most likely possibility. He will contact the Department during the week of April 9th regarding questions of policy as to the law under which the Department desires these cases to be presented. He is hopeful that, if possible, he will bring these cases before a Grand Jury within the month of April 1951 or shortly thereafter.

Reports on all subjects were presented to the United States Attorney, Southern District of New York, in 1950 and it is believed he has been made aware of all information reflecting Federal violations. However, at COHN'S request, this office will review the files on the individual subjects in order not to overlook any possibility of prosecution for violation under Point 3, mentioned above.

The agents to whom these cases are assigned should immediately review their files in this connection to discover

1. Whether any possible Federal violation other than prosecution under the Smith and McCarran Acts is probable;
2. Whether information concerning such violation was included in the reports already submitted to the United States Attorney;
3. Whether there is information in the file which could through further investigation be developed making prosecution under Point 3 possible.

This must be handled promptly in view of the expected early date of presentation to a Grand Jury. Results of file reviews which indicate a possible violation under Point 3 above, if not already included in report submitted to the United States Attorney, should be submitted in report form. If the information has been submitted in report form a letter to the United States Attorney pointing out the possibility of prosecution under Point 3 above should be prepared. In the event that the review reflects no probable or possible prosecution under Point 3 a memorandum to that effect should be prepared for the individual files.

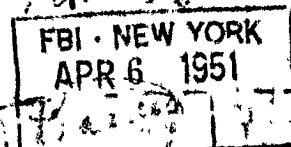

On 4/3/51 Confidential Informant ND-516, of known reliability, advised that on this date GUS HALL (National Secretary, CP USA) conferred with one HY (possibly identical with HY LIBER) and SID STEIN (Assistant National Labor Secretary, CP USA). The informant further advised that at this time HY and STEIN were in Cleveland. HY informed HALL that he intended to leave Cleveland via plane Wednesday night with STEIN. He indicated that he would stay with STEIN who lives near the airport. HY is in poor health. HALL informed HY that he would arrange for him to go to a camp or get him on a farm. HALL recommended the camp and estimated the cost would be \$30 per week. HY said that he would be in to see HALL on Thursday morning. HALL agreed, but indicated that he would not be in the office all day Wednesday. HALL asked STEIN how the special project he had spoken about to him was progressing. STEIN replied that they had talked it over and were lining up a few things. HALL mentioned that the first step must be taken in the next few days and said that talking will not accomplish anything. HALL complained about an individual who did not get anything done on the project, especially in the main town of "that" industry. Speaking on behalf of JOHNNY WILLIAMSON, HALL told STEIN that WILLIAMSON had talked with PHIL (possibly PHIL BART, General Manager "Daily Worker"), and would take it up with STEIN.

Reference is made to information received from CBP 182 on 10/12/50 to the effect that one PHIL BART was to come to New Haven on the morning of 10/15/50 presumably for the purpose of attending a Communist meeting.

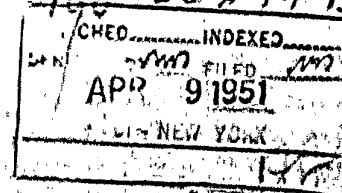
The writer began a surveillance at the home of SIDNEY TAYLOR, 190 S. Genessee St., New Haven, Conn. at 8:20 A.M. on 10/15/50. It was noted at that time that the automobile of TAYLOR was not parked in the vicinity of the latter's home.

The writer proceeded to the Union Station of the N.Y., N.H. and Htfd. R.R. and at 8:40 A.M. observed a green dodge, bearing Connecticut registration 5L 767 parked just beyond the entrance of the railroad station when the busses park. It is noted that this automobile is registered to ANN TAYLOR. There is set out below the log of the surveillance of the writer:

- 8:59 A.M. SIDNEY TAYLOR left railroad station alone and entered car described above and drove to 222 Lafayette St., New Haven, Conn.
- 9:02 A.M. SIDNEY TAYLOR arrived at 222 Lafayette St., New Haven, Conn.
- 9:45 A.M. BOB EKINS and wife drove up to 222 Lafayette St. in an approximately 1940 gray Plymouth sedan with Connecticut license 5C 345, accompanied by an unidentified male. EKINS double parked his car and after a few moments talk with his wife entered 222 Lafayette St. MRS. EKINS, wearing a red coat and no hat, drove off from 222 Lafayette St. The unidentified male also entered 222 Lafayette St.
- 10:02 A.M. A Willys Jeep station wagon, bearing Connecticut license CB 366, drove up to 222 Lafayette St. and passed the hall. [redacted] was observed in the rear seat of this station wagon. The writer drove to Price and Lafayette where the following individuals were identified in this jeep station wagon.

CLARE ARBITMAN VITTORIA, [redacted] and an unidentified male, described as 5' 7", 175 to 185 lbs., stocky, wearing brown suit, has glasses and bushy brown hair. This individual was driving the jeep station wagon. (Note the files in N.H. Division reflects that Conn. license CB 366 is a jeep registered to the employer of VICTOR VITTORIA, husband of CLARE ARBITMAN VITTORIA, and description in files on VICTOR VITTORIA closely fits description of unidentified male observed by the writer to be driving the jeep.

10:11 A.M. JACOB GOLDRING was observed walking up Lafayette St. from Congress Avenue toward 222 Lafayette St. and entered 222 Lafayette St.

10:20 A.M. Surveillance temporarily discontinued.

It is noted that in the above memo that surveillance indicated that individuals entered 222 Lafayette St. It is to be noted that these individuals entered the far left entrance of 222 Lafayette St. as one looks at the building. It is noted that when this surveillance was begun it was believed that BART would be met at the railroad station in New Haven and taken to some meeting place in the New Haven area but it was not believed that the meeting would take place at 222 Lafayette St. in view of the fact that the Communist Party Leaders at the present time are "security minded". When it was apparent that this meeting was being held at 222 Lafayette St., the writer contacted ASAC JOSEPH F. SANTOIANA and he instructed that SA SALVATORE F. DUCIBELLA, SA [redacted] and SA [redacted] assist in the surveillance. b6 b7C

SA SALVATORE F. DUCIBELLA and SA JOHN C. MANNING reinstated surveillance at 12:20 P.M. and the results of the surveillance are set out below.

12:35 P.M. The following individuals were observed leaving 222 Lafayette St. and walked down Lafayette St. in the direction of Congress Ave.

[redacted] JACK GOLDRING, [redacted] BOB EKINS, ETTY EKINS, [redacted] (this is a tentative identification), FRANK PETERSON, [redacted] CLARE ARBITMAN VITTORIA, VICTOR VITTORIA and PHIL BART. b6 b7C

It was noted that the following individuals had their lunch at Pete & Paul's Restaurant:

FRANK PETERSON; ETTY EKINS; an unidentified male described as : : approximately 30-32 year old, 5' 7", 140 lbs., dark brown or black hair, brown eyes, had no glasses, wore no hat, had a slender built. (A review of the files in New Haven Division reflects that this individual may be identical with STANLEY MIKLOWSKI.); an unidentified female, 24-27, 5' 2" to 5' 4", approximately 115 lbs., slightly wavy long brown hair, wearing babooska; BOB EKINS; an unidentified male approximately 32 years old, 5' 11", medium blond hair, slightly wavy and combed straight back. This individual sat between BOB EKINS and PHIL BART. PHIL BART.

In addition to these individuals the following unidentified persons were observed coming from 222 Lafayette St. at 12:35 P.M. and returning to 222 Lafayette St. at 1:20 P.M.

Unknown male, about 6', blond hair, bald head, slender build, not wearing hat; unknown male, approximately 5' 8" to 9", brown hair, no hat; These latter two individuals are the same two who at 9:45 A.M. entered the Pete & Paul's Restaurant as noted previously in this memo. Unknown female, approximately 35 to 40, about 5' 5", 125 lbs., light brown hair, wearing black coat with yellow trim, no hat; unknown female who accompanied the last described unknown female. This person was just slightly shorter than the other and approximately same, however had brown hair and wore no hat.

5:35 P.M. The last two unidentified females were observed leaving 222 Lafayette St. and walked down Lafayette St. in the direction of Congress Ave.

5:40 P.M. A group of the individuals left 222 Lafayette St. and walked down Lafayette St. toward Price St. and some of these individuals were observed entering the jeep bearing Conn. license CB 366; some entered a Plymouth bearing Conn. license which is believed to be 6D 675 and BOB EKINS and person identified as VICTOR VITTORIA were observed entering a Plymouth bearing Conn. license 5C 345.

SA [redacted] and SA [redacted] surveilled this jeep from the corner of Prince and Lafayette to parking lot opposite the Taft Hotel Garage on Crown St. SA SALVATORE F. DUCIBELLA and SA JOHN C. MANNING surveilled this jeep from this parking lot to Hartford, via the Merritt Parkway, and the following is the result of this surveillance.

5:45 P.M. Left New Haven. The jeep was being driven by the unidentified, tall, blond hair, bald-headed individual previously set out in this memo. Arrived in New Britain via Conn. Route #71 at approximately 7:00 P.M. and one individual was left off in the housing project on Myrtle St. In this connection it is noted that STANLEY MIKLOWSKI resides at 649 Myrtle St. in the housing project, New Britain, Conn.

The jeep, still being driven by this unknown male, drove to the 300 block of W. Main St. in New Britain and let out another male passenger. It could not be clearly seen who left the jeep at this point but it is noted that [redacted] New Britain, Conn. The jeep, carrying three passengers at this point, then drove to the Sea Food Restaurant on Spring St. in New Britain and all individuals, consisting of two males and one female, left the jeep and entered the Restaurant. It was noted that these individuals were CLARE ARBITMAN VITTORIA and [redacted] They sat in the last booth on the right hand side as you enter the Restaurant and the unidentified male sat on the bench facing the door.

It was noted at this time that a more complete description is as follows. 6' to 6' 2", approximately 175 to 180 lbs., dirty blond hair, partially bald with a slight wisp of hair down, the center, egg shaped head, long pointed nose, slightly bulvis at the end, cleft chin, strong features. This individual did most of the talking with CLARE ARBITMAN VITTORIA making some responses to conversation made by this unknown male. [redacted] did not participate to any great extent in the conversation but all three were closely huddled apparently in an endeavor to keep whatever they were saying to themselves. SA MANNING and DUCIBELLA were two booth removed from these individuals and were not in any position to hear any of the conversation.

It was noted that as these individuals left the jeep that a package wrapped in newspaper was observed to fall. This package was retrieved by SA MANNING and DUCIBELLA and was noted that this package contained 12 copies of magazine "Political Affairs" issue of October 1950 and one copy of the magazine "Masses and Mainstream". These publications have been appropriately identified and will be routed to the 1A Exhibit Envelope on the case file CP, USA, Pamphlets and Publications. The remaining copies will be routed to the agents in this office for review for information purposes. It was noted that when these individuals left the Restaurant that they appeared to express some concern over the loss of the package, in that they seemed to look around the immediate area of where the jeep was parked and it was concluded that they were attempting to locate the package.

8:30 P.M. These three individuals left the Sea Food Restaurant, entered the jeep and drove down Stanley St. in New Britain where the tall blond described above was let out in the 100 block of Stanley St. in New Britain. A review of the Security Index cards of individuals in the New Britain area fails to reflect any individual residing on Stanley St. or any individual who answers the description of the above captioned individual. It is recommended that an investigation be conducted in an effort to ascertain who this individual is.

CLARE ARBITMAN VITTORIA drove the jeep after the unidentified male was let out to Hartford, Conn. and she drove to Blue Hills Ave., parked the car in front of 44 Blue Hills Ave. It is noted that she left [redacted] off at the intersection of Blue Hills Ave. and the main artery that runs just below 44 Blue Hills Ave. [redacted] then walked from Blue Hills Ave. one block to Adams St. and was observed to enter [redacted]. It is noted that the files of this office reflect that [redacted] Hartford.

It is noted there is no possible way to ascertain the specific purpose for the meeting at 222 Lafayette St. on Oct. 15, 1950. It is believed that possibly this meeting was called to discuss the proposed plans of action by the Communist Party in Connecticut in view of the current international situation and the presently inactive Internal Registration Act of 1950.

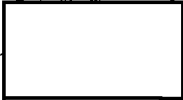

It is also noted that there were very few individuals present from the New Haven area although there appeared to be a substantial number of representatives of Communist Party members of the outlying section. It is also to be observed that none of the informants of the New Haven Division were in attendance at the meeting.



A surveillance of this Communist Party Meeting revealed it was held at Ukrainian Hall, 222 Lafayette Street, New Haven, Connecticut, and the results of this surveillance are included in memorandum dated October 19, 1950, two copies of which, are being forwarded to the New York Office as enclosures to this letter.

It will be noted that this surveillance revealed that PHIL BART was in attendance at this meeting and the memorandum is being submitted to your office for information.

The identification of PHIL BART was effected from a photograph of PHIL BART, made available by the New York Office, inasmuch as BART is considered one of the top functionaries of the Communist Party.

Why We Rejected Warmongering Ad

A few days ago the Daily Worker received an advertisement for the Arthur Koestler-Sidney Kingsley play "Darkness at Noon" for publication in today's issue. The advertisement

was rejected by Philip Bart, general manager of the paper, for the following reasons:

Darkness at Noon is a warmongering play. "Its content," Bob Lauter stated in his review in the Daily Worker on Jan. 18, "is a defense of Trotskyite spies. Its purposes are clear. They are an attempt to justify the sniveling cowardice, the colossal duplicity and the utter moral bankruptcy of Koestler's heroes: The Trotskyite criminals . . ." It appears, said Lauter, "at a moment when MacArthur is creating Korean Lidices under the guise of an anti-Communist spectacle . . . it offers an intellectual content which is absolutely indistinguishable from that of Westbrook Pegler . . . the corruption and decadence of the Broadway stage has now reached the point where what might make

The Daily Worker rejected the ad for Darkness at Noon because we do not accept advertising for war-mongering, redbaiting, anti-Negro and anti-Semitic plays," said Bart. "Such ads are rejected along with ads for scab made products submitted to us from time to time by companies and organizations that are on strike and are being picketed. We reserve the right to reject any advertisement which we consider harmful to the policies which we support."

Bart pointed out further that "Daily Worker policy with respect to advertising is the same as that of all other papers, except we don't pretend to hide the fact that we reject ads dangerous to labor and the country. Other papers reject all kinds of ads openly, at the same time hypocritically posing as defenders of freedom of the press."

That the offering of the ad for Darkness at Noon was nothing but a cheap publicity stunt to win more attention to the pro-war play is clear from the following:

- The play has been running for nearly three months. This is the first ad submitted to the Daily Worker. In fact it's the first ad for a Broadway play submitted to this paper in several years.

- The ad itself does not fit into a tabloid newspaper such as the Daily Worker. It arrived in the Business Office in the form of a cut one column wide, 19 inches in length. Daily Worker columns, as any advertising agency knows, are 15 inches in length.

The producers sent the ad to us knowing only too well that it would be rejected. This shabby publicity trick is entirely in keeping with the character of Darkness at Noon.

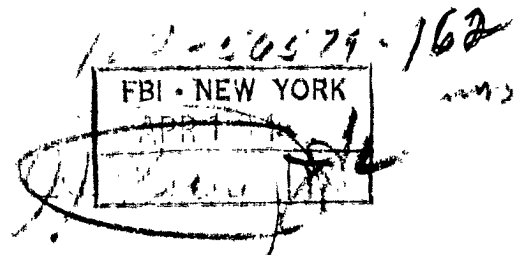

WE INFORMED YOU, our readers, in a front page editorial of the Daily Worker on Jan. 19 that "the circulation of our paper is dangerously low." As a result of the circulation drive we can report to you NOW that we have received 4,000 subscriptions thus far bringing our total circulation to 50,000. More than 21,800 were for The Worker and 2,190 subscriptions for the Daily Worker. And they're still coming in.

Our enemies gloated when we sounded the warning signal of the dangerously low circulation. Every newspaper and radio reported this news. Blustering Drew Pearson made his usual "I predict" that this paper would go out of existence in 60 days. Pearson has been reached with the results of our drive but is no longer interested. The capitalist sheets have our reports but they no longer find it news worthy.

It was not an easy job. But our readers proved it can be done. Capitalist advertising and circulation tricks did not work here. It required a crusading spirit. A

recognition that this was part of the struggle for peace. It meant getting subs for a paper which fights for peace. And the people desire peace, consequently the opportunities to build the circulation of this paper grew immensely.

IN THE MIDST of the drive a reactionary clique dominating the New York Newsdealers association joined in an effort to intimidate our readers. They announced that their members would vote on barring the paper from their newsstands. But New York readers with an objective of 10,000 subscriptions reached a total of nearly 14,000 subs for The Worker and 773 for the Daily Worker.

Chicago, the heart of the great industrial mid-west, obtained over 2,500 subs of an original goal of 2,200. Similar reports can be given for New Jersey, Connecticut, Maryland, Virginia, Colora-

do, Missouri, Montana, Oklahoma and Wisconsin. Our readers in other states are continuing to reach the goals they set for the drive.

Great interest and concern in increasing the circulation of the Daily Worker was shown in many parts of the country. Of some 2,200 Daily Worker subscriptions more than two-thirds came from outside New York City.

WE STRESS now as we did before that the continued growth of circulation depends on our readers. They alone help increase the number of readers and raise the funds to cover the deficit of this paper. This is a different kind of paper—it is the workingman's paper. It belongs to the men and women who fight for peace, help develop the struggle for Negro rights, fight against the bosses and for the interests of the masses of people. The profiteering capitalist sheets cannot understand this—that's why they expect and look for us to close up.

The circulation drive was successful. It must now stimulate a regular and consistent campaign to build this paper every day. We emphasize what we said in our editorial last January: "What is necessary is for every reader to make himself a personal distributor and carrier of the paper."

THIS VENTURE should not be confined to a brief campaign period only. It should take place regularly. We urge our readers to continue getting subs. Set yourself a goal of one or two a week. Arrange to get a bundle of 2 or 3 papers to sell to your shop mate, friend or neighbor. Help us to raise the funds necessary to cover our deficit.

Never was the urgency for building a Marxist paper greater than today. Never was the need greater to reach the people with the message of this paper. So we present you with this report confident that with your help we will continue to spread the voice which rings out for peace—**THE WORKER AND THE DAILY WORKER**

Fund Drive at Half Way Mark

THE WORKER has hit the \$100,000, half-way mark in its drive for \$200,000 to meet its annual deficit, Philip Bart, the paper's general manager, announced. Bart paid tribute to the efforts of the Communist Party organizations throughout the country to support the paper as well as to the great many individual readers who have contributed.

Coupled with the announcement that one-half of the drive has been successfully completed was Bart's appeal for continued effort to guarantee that the full \$200,000 needed be in on schedule by May 1.

While the bulk of the money in thus far came from organized supporters of the paper, Bart pointed to the fact that many hundreds of individuals, contributing small sums ranging from 50 cents to upwards of \$5 have mailed in to The Worker some \$5,000.

The Kings County Communist Party last week reached \$110,000 turned in toward a goal of \$167,000 for the Communist Party's national fund appeal. The Brooklyn Communists fulfilled their pledge to Henry Winston, national organization secretary, to raise \$50,000 within six days. Among Brooklyn community and industrial organizations to go over the 100 percent mark were Red Hook, longshore and bakers.

When The Worker launched its appeal a few weeks ago, pro-war and anti-labor newspapers throughout the country joined in a chorus of delighted anticipation of the paper's folding up.

But many of the American men and women who sent in their contributions sent along these very same editorials with their own added pledge that they would never let America's paper for peace die.

By letter dated 2/15/51, a copy of which was forwarded to this office, the USA at Philadelphia advised the Attorney General in regard to the captioned matter as follows:

" We do not find anything in the evidence that would support prosecution for anything except as a conspirator with others to violate the Smith Act, the validity of which act is presently under consideration by the Supreme Court. There is no question of BART's membership in the party and his activities on behalf of the party at a national level. . . . If the validity of the Smith Act is sustained, we think that further consideration should be given to the prosecution of this subject and others who are active on behalf of the COMMUNIST PARTY in this district."

By letter dated 3/23/51, the Philadelphia Office requested the advice of the USA as to whether there is any possible violation involved in instant case under the provisions of the Internal Security Act of 1950. No response has been received to date from the USA in this regard.

E. Pennsylvania Completes Goal in the Fund Drives

A delegation representing the Eastern Pennsylvania District of the Communist Party met with William Z. Foster, national chairman of the Communist Party, at his home Saturday morning, and presented him with two checks totaling over \$9,000. The money constituted fulfillment of the Pennsylvania district's pledge to meet their quotas in the Communist Party and Daily Worker fund drives on or before May 1.

The delegation comprised Bob Klonsky, organizational secretary of the Eastern Pennsylvania Communist Party; Ben Weiss, district treasurer and Section Organizer of Philadelphia's waterfront; and Bill Crawford, chairman of the Delaware County Communist Party. Carl Reinstein, national treasurer of the Communist Party, was also present.

Phil Bart, General Manager of the Daily Worker, sent a message congratulating the Pennsylvania Communists on their splendid job

in mobilizing financial support for the paper and meeting the deadline.

In welcoming the three-man delegation Foster spoke of the "soft spot in his heart" he has always had for Philadelphia. He spoke feelingly of the 14 years of his childhood and youth which he spent there and told of his first jobs and his first experience in the labor movement there. This was in the Philadelphia carmen's strike of 1894 when he was 13 years old. Foster told how the local kids piled marble from a nearby tombstone maker's on the tracks to prevent scab-driven cars from going through. It was in Philadelphia, too, six years later, that Foster first met up with the Socialist movement to which he has since devoted his life.

BIGGEST FIGHT
 "We now confront the biggest fight in the Party's history," Foster pointed out, "in the fight against the fomenting of a new world im-

perialist war. Will Wall Street be permitted to drown the world in blood in its quest for world domination?"

"The task is made more difficult," he stated, "by the role being played by many so-called labor leaders who have aligned themselves with those who are preparing another bloodbath for the workers."

"This task, the struggle for peace, is one to test the mettle of the entire Party," Foster emphasized. "And in this situation the Party needs finances as never before. Money is needed to carry on the peace fight, to defend the Party, and to support the Daily Worker and Worker."

"Never," Foster continued, "were these papers so important as they are now when they are almost alone, among all the newspapers of the country, in a clearcut opposition to the war drive based on fun-

understanding of the issues involved.

"The success of our fund drives are indispensable to the struggle for peace which our Party is carrying on. People are being fooled by the propaganda that the Soviet Union is on the offensive and the United States are on the defensive. We must counter this falsehood. Money is urgently needed to finance this work."

Foster told the delegation he was confident that the Communists of Eastern Pennsylvania, together with friends and sympathizers, will do more than their share of the job. "Every Communist," he went on, "is now being tested as never before in the history of the Party."

"The historic task and supreme test of our Party is to fight against this war. In doing so we are in fundamental harmony with the people of America and of the world. This is the strength of our position."

Foster autographed several copies of his new book, Outline Political History of the Americas, which the three-man delegation took back with them to Philadelphia. The Communists of Eastern Pennsylvania, who met their obligations to the Party Fund Drive and The Worker Fund Drive on schedule, still have before them the huge task of raising \$25,000 to finance the party's fight for peace.

The autographed books are to be used as prizes and presented to outstanding workers in the peace fight at a banquet to be held in Philadelphia on May 5. On that date, according to Bob Klonsky, the organization expects to complete its \$25,000 goal.

"And on May 5," says Klonsky, "having completed our fund drives, we will swing right into a two-month drive for 1,000 subs to The Worker!"

Philip Bart Convicted of 'Contempt'

WASHINGTON, May 3.—Philip Bart, general manager of the Daily Worker, was convicted of contempt of Congress today by Federal District Judge Burnita Shelton Matthews. The trial was held without a jury.

Bart had been indicted on 32 counts and was charged with refusing to answer questions put to him by members of the House Un-American Committee last June.

The government dropped 24 of the original 32 counts, covering questions which Bart had refused to answer on the grounds of possible self-incrimination. The last 11 'contempt' cases brought to court by the Truman administration had ended with acquittals on the basis of such defense pleas.

In asking for dismissal of the eight-count case against Bart today, defense counsel pointed out that seven of the eight remaining charges dealt with questions which had been irrelevantly put by the Un-Americans at the committee hearing.

The eighth count, Bart's counsel charged, concerned a question over which The Worker's manager had claimed his right to avoid self-incrimination.

HEAD OF RED PAPER GUILTY IN CONTEMPT

Bart Is Convicted of Refusing
to Answer Questions Put
by House Committee

WASHINGTON, May 3 (AP)—Philip Bart, general manager of The New York Communist Daily Worker, was found guilty today of contempt of Congress for defying the House Committee on Un-American Activities.

Federal Judge Burnita S. Matthews convicted him on eight contempt charges after the Government, during the one-day trial, dropped the remaining twenty-four counts of an original thirty-two-count indictment. Bart faces a possible jail term of one year and a \$1,000 fine. He waived a jury trial. Judge Matthews held that the 49-year-old admitted Communist gave no good excuse for refusing to reply to questions asked by the House committee at a hearing last June. She also ruled that the committee had a right to ask the questions in its investigation into subversive activities.

After presentation of the Government's case, Charles B. Murray, the prosecutor, abandoned the twenty-four counts on which Bart clearly raised his privilege against self-incrimination.

Defense lawyers argued that the same self-incrimination plea pro-

tected Bart from replying to a question about who his associates were when he was a Communist party organizer in the Mid-Nineteen Thirties. However, Judge Matthews held that since Bart freely admitted that he was a party worker, he had no right to refuse to name his associates.

Six of the counts on which Bart was convicted dealt with queries about his original name. The defendant was born in Poland and became a naturalized American after his family moved to this country when he was 10.

Bart asserted that his name was none of the committee's business, but Judge Matthews ruled the in-

vestigators had a right to force full disclosure of a witness' identity.

On the remaining count, Judge Matthews held that Bart's plea of freedom of the press was no excuse for not listing jobs he had held.

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Daily Worker Editor Is Guilty of Contempt

Washington, May 4 (AP)—Philip Bart, general manager of the Daily Worker, Communist Party newspaper, has been convicted of contempt of Congress.

Federal Judge Matthews, who heard the case without a jury, late yesterday found Bart guilty on eight counts. The Government had dropped 24 other counts.

Contempt of Congress is punishable by a fine of up to \$1,000 and by up to a year in jail.

Bart was allowed to continue at liberty under \$1,500 bail. No date for sentencing was announced. Bart's attorney Abraham Unger, said the conviction will be appealed.

Bart appeared before a House Un-American Activities subcommittee June 21, 1950, and refused to answer several questions.

Worker' Manager Guilty of Contempt

Philip Bart Is Convicted in U. S. District Court

WASHINGTON, May 3 (AP).— Federal District Judge Burnita S. Matthews today convicted Philip Bart, general manager of "The Daily Worker," Communist paper, of contempt of Congress.

Judge Matthews, who heard the case without a jury, convicted Bart on eight contempt counts. The government earlier had dropped twenty-four other counts in the indictment.

Judge Matthews ruled that six of the questions Bart refused to answer on the ground they were not pertinent were in fact pertinent to an inquiry conducted by the House Committee on Un-American Activities.

She further ruled that two questions Bart refused to answer on the ground of possible self-incrimination should have been answered. She said he waived his privilege against possible self-incrimination by identifying himself as a one-time Communist party organizer. She also said she did not feel Bart had any apprehension he would be indicted and prosecuted if he had answered.

Judge Matthews allowed Bart to remain free on \$1,500 bail pending sentence. No date for sentencing was fixed. Bart's attorney, Abraham Unger, said he would appeal the decision. Mr. Unger had sought to have the contempt indictment thrown out, arguing that some of the questions put to Bart by a subcommittee June 21, 1950, were not pertinent to the inquiry. He also contended that the committee failed to direct Bart to answer.

Bart refused to answer some questions on the ground his answers might tend to incriminate him. Mr. Unger insisted he was within his Constitutional rights in so doing.

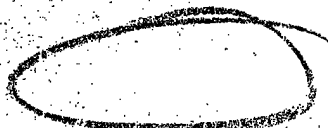

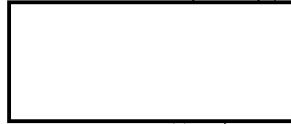

On Tuesday night I attended a Bx. County functionaries meeting, at 1301 Boston Rd. (the Prospect Section headquarters) the main points which were discussed were the opening of the Bx. County fund drive and the Willie Mc Gee case.

The meeting did not start until a quarter to ten, and the following people were present, Esther Moses, Gene Perlstein, Charlie Goldrick Rose Charnley and her husband, Bill Johnson from the Prospect Section 

 Anna Moses, June Fishstein,  and her husband and about twenty five other people.

Bill Johnson opened the meeting, proposing a member of

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the prospect section as Chairlady for this meeting, the membership voted and passed on this proposal. The agenda as proposed for this meeting was as follows: a report by Phil Bart, managing editor of the Daily and Sunday Worker, on the fund drive and the necessity of reaching our quota as quickly as possible, the second point was the case of Willie M'Gee, immediate action must be taken, we must organize activities around this important case now that we have the opportunity, all must participate in these forms of activity in order to insure the quick freedom of M'Gee.

Phil Bart was introduced and he appeared nervous at first but as he spoke he gained confidence and this is the essence of his report:

The fund drive is a very important one, it is nothing new, nor is there a guarantee that this will be the last one. These fund drives are important for a number of reasons, first to maintain the upkeep of our Daily and Sunday worker, the high cost of printing etc is not becoming lesser but is becoming greater due to the high cost of living. If we had to depend upon the actual circulation of the paper, then we could not survive, but it would be impossible to discontinue the paper, so therefore it is only proper that those people who support us by their subs. and by reaching the paper that we continue to print the paper. It is a necessity to the working class and to all are thousands of sympathizers that we continue to bring before the American people the high cost

of living, the Korean situation, the many day to day problems which arise before them, and so it is very necessary that this fund drive be a huge success.

Phil quoted some figures about the drive, how \$175,000 is needed for the 'Daily and Sunday Worker' and how \$200,000 is needed for the defense of our Party, its leadership etc.

Phil explained the meaning of a free press, how a few people control the newspaper field, and they distort the true meaning of facts, and how recently when the Daily was in the midst of its sub drive, and while its circulation was dropping to a new low, the enemies of our paper predicted that we would fold up very soon, but in a few weeks we overcame our deficit and instead

gained thousands of new readers.

This shows that the people are looking for someone to lead them in their struggles and will fight when oppressed.

Phil explained how this fund drive is going to help the paper and the defense of our Party. The cost of printing and running a paper is on the upgrade due to the high cost of materials, and the money for this end of the business comes from subscriptions and the fund drive.

The money for salaries of employees depends also on the fund drive, if there is no money the employees do not receive any pay, and in this respect right now the workers are not receiving their just deserts.

It is in this light that we come to appeal for a successful drive to continue the work started by Lenin when he said that we cannot

function successfully without a paper and secondly to see that enough money is realized for the immediate defense of our Party, for a Southern reorganization of our Party, for Negro equality and job discrimination, for the fight to repeal the McCarran Act and numerous other campaigns outlined by the party leadership.

Phil did not break down the quotas because this year each group was taking their own quotas, and they would be worked out on that basis.

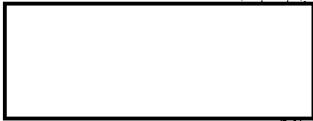

A review of the records of the United States District Court of the District of Columbia in the following described cases revealed that certain United States Treasury (bearer) bonds were presented as bond in lieu of cash. The Treasury Department in Washington, D. C., has advised that that department maintains no record of the ownership of bearer bonds. It was suggested that an inquiry at the various Federal Reserve Banks concerned might reveal the disposition of questioned bonds. It is felt that such an inquiry might lead to the establishment of the identity of heretofore unknown sustainers of the Communist Party.

C., in the case of PHILIP BART, criminal case number 1746-50, reflect that BART, who is General Manager of the "Daily Worker", was indicted by a Federal Grand Jury on October 4, 1950, charging him with violations of Section 192, Title 2, U. S. Code, 32 counts. BART had refused to answer pertinent questions before a subcommittee of the House Committee on Un-American Activities. He was arraigned on November 24, 1950, at which time he pleaded not guilty. Bond was set at \$1500.00 and was presented on November 24, 1950, by ROY WOOD in the form of two U. S. Treasury bonds in the amounts of \$1000.00 and \$500.00. It is pointed out that ROY WOOD is Chairman of the Communist Party of the District of Columbia.

As a matter of interest, BART was convicted on eight counts by Judge BURNITA MATTHEWS on May 3, 1951. Sentence is pending.

The records of the U. S. District Court reflect that the above mentioned \$1000.00 Treasury bond was a 2½ percent bond of 1967-72, dated November 15, 1945, number 22769-H.

The Treasury Department has advised that this bond was shipped, general stock, to the Federal Reserve Bank of San Francisco, October 22, 1945, case, order and notice number 83, in the amount of \$5,000,000.00.

The records of the U. S. District Court reflect that the aforementioned \$500.00 bond is a Treasury 2½ percent bond of 1967-72, dated November 15, 1945, number 57520L.

The Treasury Department has advised that the above bond was shipped, general stock, to the Federal Reserve Bank of Philadelphia, October 23, 1945, case, order and notice number 87, in the amount of \$12,000,000.00.

The Pittsburgh Office is requested to contact the Pittsburgh Branch of the FRB and ascertain the ultimate disposition of the Treasury bonds described above in the case of HAROLD CHRISTOFFEL.

The Philadelphia Office is requested to contact the FRB of Philadelphia and determine the ultimate disposition of the \$500.00 Treasury bond described in the case of PHILIP BART.

On November 20, 1950, PHILIP BART was indicted (thirty two counts) for violation of Section 192, Title 2, United States Code. On November 24, 1950, subject was arraigned and entered plea of "not guilty". Bond of \$1500 was set. On the same date the subject's recognizance was taken, bond having been offered in the form of United States Treasury Bonds, which were received of ROY WOOD.

It is noted ROY WOOD is the current Chairman of the local Communist Party in Washington, D. C.

On December 19, 1950, DAVID REIN entered the case as one of the subject's attorneys, and on the same date motions to dismiss the indictment, and points and authorities in support thereof were filed.

On January 19, 1951, the motion to dismiss the indictment was argued and submitted.

On January 26, 1951, motions of the defendant to dismiss the indictment and for bill of particulars heretofore argued and submitted were all denied.

On February 21, 1951, a praecipe was noted withdrawing the appearance of DAVID REIN as counsel for the defendant.

On April 4, 1951, an affidavit in support of continuance was filed.

On May 3, 1951, the defendant waived his right of a trial by jury, and with the consent of the Government and the approval of the Court, the defendant's trial started. On the same date the Government elected to proceed on Counts 1,2,3,4,5,6,7,8 and 10 of the indictment. The Government made an oral motion to dismiss Counts 9 and 11 through 32, and this motion was granted. A motion on May 3, 1951, was also made for judgment of acquittal which was denied. The Government then withdrew Count Number 10. On May 3, 1951, the Court rendered a verdict of "guilty" on Counts 1 through 8 of the indictment, and the subject's case was referred to the Probation Office of the Court. The defendant was permitted to remain on bond pending sentence. It is noted that Judge BURNITA MATTHEWS presided while the defendant's case was heard. Subject's attorneys were, in addition to REIN, JAMES T. WRIGHT and ABRAHAM UNGER.

The Washington Post Newspaper of May 4, 1951, published a newspaper article entitled "Court Holds BART Guilty on Contempt".

The newspaper account advised PHILIP BART, General Manager of the New York Communist Daily Worker had been found guilty of contempt of Congress. Federal Judge BURNITA MATTHEWS convicted BART on eight contempt charges. BART, according to the newspaper article, faces a possible jail term sentence of one year and \$1000 fine. In the newspaper account Judge MATTHEWS is reported to have indicated that BART gave no good excuse for refusing to reply to the questions asked by the House Committee on Un-American Activities at a hearing conducted by that agency in June, 1950. Judge MATTHEWS ruled the Committee had a right to ask the questions, and that six of the counts on which BART was convicted dealt with queries about his original name. The newspaper article concluded, advising that BART was born in Poland and became a naturalized American after his family moved to this country when he was ten years of age.

Concerning DAVID REIN, who for a time participated in the defense of the subject, it is noted that he is associated in the practice of law with JOSEPH FORER. Both REIN and FORER have been known to furnish legal counsel to persons identified as Communists. Specifically, REIN acted as attorney of record during 1947 for GERHART EISLER, admitted German Communist, when EISLER was on trial in the District of Columbia for Passport Fraud and Contempt. He was also an attorney for NATHAN GREGORY SILVERMASTER and WILLIAM LUDWIG ULLMANN while these two individuals testified before the House Committee on Un-American Activities during August, 1948, concerning allegations by ELIZABETH BENTLEY that SILVERMASTER and ULLMANN were engaged in espionage while employed by the Federal Government.

Re New York letter to Director dated April 9, 1951, requesting the criminal record of the Subject be reviewed in Detroit, Michigan, and Pontiac, Michigan.

Subject arrested on July 5, 1928, on disorderly persons charge and released by Judge VAN ZELS on July 7, 1928. Arresting officers were WILLIAM DELISLE and ROY PENDERGRASS.

Sergeant [redacted] Identification Bureau, Detroit Police Department, advised on May 24, 1951, that the above officers are not available at the present time to be interviewed concerning the arrest.

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Details of the arrest as written by the arresting officers are as follows:

PHILLIP BART, MORRIS FLEISCHMAN and ALFRED GOATZ are three Bolsheviks. They were arrested at Woodward and Alfred here in Detroit while making speeches. BART is from New York; FLEISCHMAN is from Cleveland, and GOATZ is from Pittsburgh. These men had a lot of Red literature which they were pasting on mailboxes, election boxes, and public buildings. They are very radical and probably have records elsewhere.

/s/ DELISLE and PENDERGRASS

Lieutenant [redacted] Identification Officer, Pontiac Police Department, on May 31, 1951, made available the arrest record of PHILLIP BART which indicated he was arrested on August 14, 1929, at 2:00 p.m., charged with disturbing the peace. Arresting officers were RUDOLPH NARTKER and DAVID GILTIN (both presently Lieutenants on the Pontiac Police Force). The record indicates BART resided at 5427 4th Street, Detroit, and that he was sentenced on September 19, 1929, to \$10 or five days by Judge HARPSTER. Lieutenant [redacted] stated that neither of the reporting officers were presently available for interview concerning this arrest, but the record of the arrest is written up as follows by Lieutenant NARTKER:

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Received call at approximately 12:30 p.m. concerning a man giving a lecture on Baldwin Avenue in front of Plant #5 (Pontiac Motors) located at Howard and Baldwin Avenues, Pontiac, Michigan. GILTIN and myself answered the call and picked up LEO THOMPSON, PHILLIP RAYMOND and PHILLIP BART and brought them in and charged them with disturbing the peace.

'Worker' Officer Gets 3 Months For Contempt of Red Inquiry

WASHINGTON, June 1 (UP). —Philip Bart, general manager of "The Daily Worker," Communist newspaper in New York was sentenced to three months in jail and fined \$500 for contempt of Congress today for defying the House Un-American Activities Committee.

Federal Judge Burnita Shelton Matthews ordered Bart committed to jail immediately. She suggested that he apply to the United States Court of Appeals for bond.

The judge rejected a plea by Bart's attorney, James T. Wright, that she suspend sentence because the court's probation report showed Bart to be of good character and had no record of previous conviction.

Bart was convicted May 3 on eight contempt charges for refusing to answer committee questions at a hearing last June 21. During his one-day trial the government dropped twenty-four counts of an original thirty-two-count indictment after Bart raised his privilege of self-incrimination. Judge Matthews ruled that Bart

should have answered the remaining eight questions. Fifteen other Congressional witnesses have been acquitted of contempt in Federal court here this year, fourteen after they pleaded self-incrimination.

Defense attorneys claimed that the self-incrimination plea protected Bart from replying to a question about his associates when he was a Communist party organizer in the mid-1930s.

But the judge held that since Bart admitted he was a party worker, he had no right to refuse to name his associates.

Six of the counts on which Bart was convicted dealt with questions about his original name. He was born in Poland and became a naturalized American after his family moved to the United States when he was ten.

Bart claimed his name was none of the committee's business, but the judge ruled that the Congressmen had a right to force disclosure of a witness' identity.

She also held that Bart's plea of freedom of the press was not excuse for not listing various jobs he had held.

Bart Sentenced to 3 Months; Denied Bail

The Worker Washington Bureau

WASHINGTON.—Judge Burnita Shelton Matthews on Friday sentenced Philip Bart, general manager of the Daily Worker, to three months in prison and \$500 fine for contempt of Congress, and then refused to release him on bail pending appeal. James T. Wright, Bart's attorney, immediately prepared to go before the Circuit Court of Appeals in an effort to secure his release on bail.

Judge Matthews had found Bart guilty of "contempt" of the House Un-American Committee in a brief trial here May 3. Bart was charged with 32 counts for refusing to answer questions propounded by the witchhunt committee. Recognizing the weak case it had against Bart, the Government dropped 24 of the counts. The judge ruled that in the remaining eight counts Bart had not properly claimed his privilege under the Fifth Amendment.

Bart's appearance before the House Un-Americans was in June, 1950. When Judge Matthews pronounced sentence Friday morning, she served notice that, in contrast to the usual handling of such cases, she would not continue bail while an appeal was made to a higher court. Bart would be required to go before the Circuit Court of Appeals in a new application for bail, she said.

A U. S. deputy marshal took Bart in custody and by noon he had been transferred to the district jail.

Wright began the preparation of the papers necessary for the application to the Circuit Court and filed them late Friday afternoon.

BAIL FOR PHIL BART!

An Editorial

THE BUSINESS MANAGER of this paper, Phil Bart, is now in prison in Washington, D. C.

It seems that he was "in contempt" of the House Committee on Un-American Activities which sought to turn him into an informer and stoolpigeon.

The trumped-up case of the government was so flimsy, that it dropped 24 out of the 32 counts against him. But the terror-ridden atmosphere of the witchhunts brought him a three-months prison sentence and a denial of bail pending his appeal.

The denial of bail is unusual. It shows a desire to impose political punishment. We urge public protests to Attorney General McGrath urging bail. The contempt is not with Phil Bart; it is with those who flout the democratic heritage of this nation and manipulate power to stifle political opposition to the war-mongers.

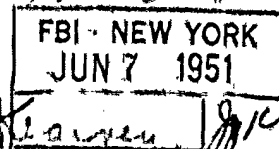

On June 4, 1951 Confidential Informant ND-516, of known reliability, advised SE ROBERT E. BRODERICK that ELIZABETH GURLEY FLYNN (Chairman, Women's Commission, CP, USA) conferred on that date with MARION BACHERACH (Public Relations Director, CP, USA). FLYNN told BACHERACH that she had been busy on matters concerning STEVE (NELSON, Chairman, District No. 5, CP, USA in Pittsburgh), PHIL (BART, General Manager, "Daily Worker") and Mother (BLOOR).

FLYNN explained that STEVE NELSON had checked out of the hospital in Philadelphia on Memorial Day and the police had arrested him on an open charge of assault and battery for the accident in which he had been involved. She said that the attorney had had NELSON released until August. BACHERACH remarked that NELSON was "such an anarchist." FLYNN said that she was "fed up" with NELSON and had written a memorandum to the secretariat asking them to handle him and to tell him that under no circumstances was he to leave Philadelphia. She added that he just could not be trusted and said that she had had a consultation about him and there seemed to be a general agreement in this regard.

FLYNN told BACHERACH that PHIL (BART) had a hearing scheduled that morning about 10:30 and his wife had inquired whether they should secure another lawyer. FLYNN expressed herself as being satisfied with the lawyer (an attorney named WRIGHT) who had been handling BART's case, remarking that this lawyer had done very well in getting BART off with a sentence of only 3 months.

BACHERACH inquired about Mother BLOOR's condition. FLYNN said that Len (HARRIS, Secretary, Farm Commission, CP, USA) was trying to get a woman from the mid-West who used to work for him and is currently employed in a sorority house. He said that she could come East to take care of Mother BLOOR for the whole summer.

Established sources of this office did not provide any information concerning visit of the above-captioned person to Boston, Mass., on May 4, 1951.

As a matter of general information, ND BOS TS-228 on May 8, 1951, made available the results of conversation between DANIEL BOONE SCHIRMER, Legislative Agent for CP, USA, District No. 1, and DAVE ROSENBERG, Secretary-Treasurer, CP, USA, District No. 1. At this time SCHIRMER declared he had received a letter from PHIL BART in New York. The letter stated "they" had available a two-page flyer on McGEE, price of which was \$2.50 per thousand. These flyers, according to the letter as described by SCHIRMER, were to be sent by automobile to New Haven with someone from Boston to be sent to obtain these flyers in New Haven.

As a result of information furnished by ND BOS TS-228, it was revealed that ROSENBERG issued instructions to SCHIRMER to send a telegram to BART ordering 15,000 McGEE Flyers to be sent by train to Boston.

ND BOS TS-228 revealed that SCHIRMER contacted Western Union and dispatched the following message to PHIL BART at 50 East 13th Street, New York:

"Send 15,000 MC GEE flyers by train to Boston."

On June 1, 1951, Confidential Informant T-1, of known reliability, advised that PHILIP BART continues to reside at 263 Atkins Avenue, Brooklyn, New York, with his wife CONNIE BART.

The current issues of the "Daily Worker", an east coast Communist daily newspaper, and "The Worker", the Sunday edition of this paper, of January, 1950, through May 1951, continue to list PHILIP BART as General Manager.

Confidential Informant T-2, of known reliability, on December 1, 1950, advised that BART furnished him with some background information on August 22, 1950. The informant reported that BART stated that he was Secretary-Treasurer of the Upholsterers International

Union, affiliated with the American Federation of Labor, in New York City, in 1926. BART said he had been active as an organizer, state Chairman, and in other leading capacities in the Communist Party, in Philadelphia, Michigan, and Ohio. The informant reported that BART told him that he had participated, in the middle 1930's, in organizing the auto workers and building their union which was the forerunner of the United Auto Workers, CIO, and for a while he was editor of its paper. BART stated that he was 48 years of age and had been active in the working class, progressive, and Communist movements for over a quarter of a century.

Confidential Informant T-3, of known reliability, stated on November 2, 1950, that on that same date BART met with BILL ALBERTSON, trade union secretary, Communist Party, District 7, and BILLY ALLAN, "Daily Worker" correspondent, to discuss the financial condition of the Michigan edition -"The Worker", and its \$8,000 debt to the "Daily Worker". The informant advised that this meeting took place in Detroit.

Confidential Informant T-4, of known reliability, advised that on November 2, 1950, the subject had another meeting with BILLY ALLAN, and other Communist Party, District 7, members to discuss plans to improve the circulation of the Michigan edition of "The Worker", and the "Daily Worker".

Confidential Informant T-3 reported on November 3, 1950, that on that date BART met again with other leading functionaries in District 7 who were interested in the Michigan edition of "The Worker", and at that time they discussed problems connected with the circulation of the Michigan edition of the "Daily Worker", and "The Worker". The informant reported that BART presented to this group two problems for consideration, 1-The ideological campaign, and 2-The acute organizational problem.

"The Worker", issue of December 3, 1950, page 2, column 1, contains an article reporting on "Worker Home Delivery Planned." The article states as follows:

"One of the aims of The Worker circulation drive is the development of bundle deliveries on a permanent daily and weekly basis, Phil Bart, general manager of The Worker and Daily Worker said this week.

"These deliveries to home and shops will be developed into a nationwide system, he stressed.

"Unlike other newspapers," said Bart, "our system of deliveries depend upon conscientious support from readers who will take a bundle of papers into their shops and communities on a regular basis."

"A goal of 4,500 daily and weekly deliveries is set for New York City, he stressed.

"A WORKING CLASS newspaper, Bart declared, cannot depend on the same methods used by capitalist newspapers. Experience has shown that support for the newspaper-financial and circulation-depends on conscientious readers who will through their own efforts spread the newspaper and work for the goals of peace and security which the paper advances, he asserted."

The "Daily Worker", issue of December 5, 1950, page 3, column 1, contains "An Open Letter to the Newsdealers of New York". The article states as follows:

"The following open letter was addressed yesterday by Phil Bart, general manager of the Daily Worker and The Worker, to New York newsdealers:

"Dear Newsdealers:

"You are good Americans with a living to make. You believe in the Bill of Rights which guarantees

"the freedom of the press. That means, you will agree, freedom to print what you oppose, as well as what you favor. We don't know what your politics are, but that's not the issue.

"The issue is America's Constitution. Begin making exceptions in one case and you end up by destroying freedom for all.

"This is why the widespread protest is rising against the illegal proposals to ban the Daily Worker and The Worker by the officials of the Newsdealers Association. Prompt opposition has come from varied groups, newspapers and unions throughout the country. The American Civil Liberties Union has already branded the ban 'as an interference with violation of the fundamental rights of the press.'

"The influential, conservative Washington Post said the same thing. 'The traditional democratic practice,' it said editorially, has been to let the public read what it wants to read 'and be its own judge.'

"The vice-president of the American Newspaper Guild of New York (CIO) has protested. So has the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People. Even the Daily News and the World-Telegram didn't like the idea.

"They know that if you begin with this newspaper, it can spread to any newspaper. The little white-haired woman at the meeting Sunday put it best, right out of her own experience. 'This will establish a bad precedent,' she said, 'that will hurt us all. Ban the Worker and what's next? Some of my customers already say 'Ban that Jew paper, the Post.' Others say they don't like the Compass. After a while Republicans will say ban a Democratic paper. It will end up hurting everybody and only the paper that the people in power like will be the one we can sell.' She was right.

"That's what happens when censorship begins. Cut it any way you like, William Richter's proposals mean censorship.

"He is in a conspiracy against the Bill of Rights.

"Many newsdealers have already made their views known: they oppose this unconstitutional proposal. They say they have the right to sell any newspaper they please. They have that right.

"Richter is trying to create an atmosphere of hysteria on this matter for his own purposes. He talks now of a referendum, not only of the members of the association, but of ALL newsdealers. He seeks to ring in all the city's newsdealers into this trouble he's stirred up.

"We are certain you will agree with the Constitution, not with Richter, and the shadowy outfits he's fronting for. You agree, we are sure, with the millions in New York who say they have a right to read what they want to read."

On December 10, 1950, Confidential Informant T-5, of known reliability, advised that PHIL BART was elected on that date as a delegate from District 3, Communist Party, USA, to attend the 15th National Convention of the Communist Party. The informant advised that BART had been elected to attend the Convention at the request of the National Committee, Communist Party, USA.

Confidential Informants T-6, and T-7, both of known reliability, advised that the subject had been in attendance at the 15th National Convention of the Communist Party, USA, which was held in New York, from December 28, 1950, to December 31, 1950.

The "Daily Worker", issue of March 14, 1951,

page 2, column 3, contains an article, "Hails 'Worker' Sub Gains in Midwest". The article states that the subject had just returned from a week's stay in the midwest where he discussed results of the campaign for "Daily Worker" subscriptions, with the scores of "Daily Worker" readers in several cities.

The "Daily Worker", issue of April 9, 1951, page 3, column 4, contains an item captioned "Why We Rejected Warmongering Ad." The item states as follows:

"The Daily Worker rejected the ad for Darkness at Noon because 'we do not accept advertising for war-mongering, redbaiting, anti-Negro and anti-Semitic plays,' said Bart. 'Such ads are rejected along with ads for scab made products submitted to us from time to time by companies and organizations that are on strike and are being picketed. We reserve the right to reject any advertisement which we consider harmful to the policies which we support.'

"Bart pointed out further that 'Daily Worker policy with respect to advertising is the same as that of all other papers, except we don't pretend to hide the fact that we reject ads dangerous to labor and the country. Other papers reject all kinds of ads openly, at the same time hypocritically posing as defenders of freedom of the press.'

The "New York Times", issue of May 4, 1951, contains an article concerning the conviction of PHIL BART for refusing to answer questions put to him by the House Committee on Un-American Activities. This article states as follows:

"WASHINGTON, May 3 (UP)—Philip Bart, general manager of The New York Communist Daily Worker, was found guilty today of contempt of Congress for defying the House Committee on Un-American Activities.

"Federal Judge Burnita S. Matthews convicted him on eight contempt charges after the Government, during

"the one-day trial, dropped the remaining twenty-four counts of an original thirty-two-count indictment. Bart faces a possible jail term of one year and a \$1,000 fine. He waived a jury trial.

"Judge Matthews held that the 49-year-old admitted Communist gave no good excuse for refusing to reply to questions asked by the House committee at a hearing last June. She also ruled that the committee had a right to ask the questions in its investigation into subversive activities.

"After presentation of the Government's case, Charles B. Murray, the prosecutor, abandoned the twenty-four counts on which Bart clearly raised his privilege against self-incrimination.

"Defense lawyers argued that the same self-incrimination plea protected Bart from replying to a question about who his associates were when he was a Communist party organizer in the Mid-Nineteen Thirties. However, Judge Matthews held that since Bart freely admitted that he was a party worker, he had no right to refuse to name his associates.

"Six of the counts on which Bart was convicted dealt with queries about his original name. The defendant was born in Poland and became a naturalized American after his family moved to this country when he was 10.

"Bart asserted that his name was none of the committee's business, but Judge Matthews ruled the investigators had a right to force full disclosure of a witness' identity.

"On the remaining count, Judge Matthews held that Bart's plea of freedom of the press was no excuse for not listing jobs he had held."

In connection with the Prosecutive Summary being prepared by Philadelphia concerning BART the offices receiving copies of this letter are requested to conduct the following investigations and furnish the information to the Philadelphia Office:

NEW YORK

Little is known of BART's early background during which time he apparently resided in New York. Accordingly, the following investigation is requested.

Will attempt to locate a court record of BART's having legally changed his name from BERAL to BART.

Will secure records of BART's education. He allegedly attended grammar school for seven years and trade school for four years. He may have studied printing and upholstery at the latter school inasmuch as he claims employment as a printer (compositor) from 1921 to 1924 and as an upholsterer from 1924 through 1928.

Will attempt to learn where BART may have been employed and when.

Will also attempt to determine the subject's addresses and early activities while in New York. His father, BENJAMIN BERAL, resided at 611 East 11th Street, when naturalized in 1920.

Will verify from records of the Telephone Company that BART had a telephone listed under the name of PHILIP STRAUSS, Graceland 1468, while residing at 1022 West Dakin Street as noted in the report of SA LEWIS M. LAMASTER, dated August 21, 1943.

Will determine the individual competent to produce in court the letter received by the Office of Civilian Defense in Chicago from BART in which he stated he was a CP organizer. This letter was furnished the Chicago Office on January 16, 1942 by the Office of Civilian Defense.

Will attempt to verify BART's alleged employment as a salesman with the Liberty Leather Finishing Company, 1616 West 14th Street in 1941 as reflected in the report of SA J. E. KELLER dated December 4, 1941.

PITTSBURGH

Pittsburgh letter to the Bureau, March 14, 1950, concerning BART notes that he resided at 2200 Center Street, Pittsburgh in 1932.

Pittsburgh will verify this residence and determine BART's activities while in Pittsburgh.

All offices will provide legally admissible sources for all information secured and should answer promptly.

DETROIT

BART's Identification Record reflects his arrest July 5, 1928 as a disorderly person by the Detroit Police Department, #33112, disposition - discharged; and his arrest on August 14, 1929 by the Pontiac, Michigan Police Department, #2605 for distributing handbills and molesting workmen. The latter charge was disposed of on September 19, 1929 when BART was given a choice of a \$10.00 fine or five days in jail.

Complete information concerning the above arrests should be secured from the Police Departments concerned as well as the identities of the officers competent to produce the records.

BART's address according to the prints received from the Pontiac Police Department was 5427 Fourth Avenue, Detroit, Michigan.

Detroit will ascertain all residences and occupations of BART while residing in the territory of that office and will determine any other activities he may have engaged in.

It should be noted that on August 22, 1950 BART advised a New York Confidential Informant that he was Secretary-Treasurer of the Upholsterers International Union, affiliated with the American Federation of Labor, in New York City, in 1926. BART said he had been active as an Organizer, State Chairman, and in other leading capacities in the Communist Party, in Philadelphia, Michigan, and Ohio. The informant reported that BART told him that he had participated in the middle 1930's in organizing the auto workers and building their union which was the forerunner of the United Auto Workers, CIO, and for awhile he was Editor of its paper.

On June 20, 1951 Confidential Informant ND-516, of known reliability, advised SA [redacted] that ROB HALL (Washington correspondent for the "Daily Worker") requested SRA ZURANSKY (Assistant Bookkeeper at National CP Headquarters) to ask the "Daily Worker" to put the teletype machine in operation as he had been unable to contact the "Daily Worker" direct. He also asked for instructions (as a result of the arrests of the Communist leaders that morning). The informant also reported that PHIL BART (General Manager "Daily Worker") was in Washington on that date and had not heard about the arrests.

Reference is made to the summary dated 4/24/51, entitled "THE LENIN SCHOOL, aka THE LENIN INSTITUTE, THE INTERNATIONAL LENIN INSTITUTE, THE INTERNATIONAL LENIN SCHOOL," and the list entitled, "Individuals Reported to Have Attended the Lenin School," both of which were enclosed with SAC letter #60, dated 6/16/51.

It is noted that the name of PHIL BART is included on the list as having attended the school in 1930 (?). The source of this information is listed as [redacted]

No previous information appears in the files of the Philadelphia Office indicating that BART attended the Lenin School, although he is known to have written the Office of Civilian Defense in Chicago, Ill., a letter, which that agency furnished to the Chicago Office on 1/16/42, in which, among other things, he claimed experience in demolition work.

The Bureau is requested to attempt to determine if the PHIL BART named in the above list is identical with the subject and the circumstances under which [redacted] furnished the information that PHIL BART had attended the Lenin School in approximately 1930.

This information is of importance in connection with prosecutive summary reports presently being prepared on BART, which must be prepared before July 15, 1951.

It is therefore requested that this matter be given expedite attention.
