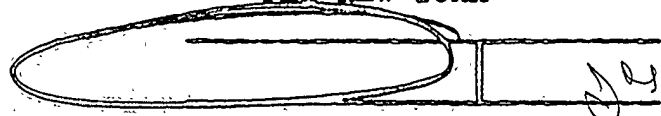

On October 2, 1964, a confidential source, who has furnished reliable information in the past, advised that Bayard Rustin (Organizer of the March on Washington, August, 1963), was in contact on that date with [redacted] (a confidante of Rustin's). Rustin informed [redacted] that he had just returned to New York, and said the conference was excellent (the Southern Christian Leadership Conference Convention (SCLC) held in Savannah, Georgia, from September 29 until October 2, 1964). In that regard, Rustin said he wrote the economics section (of the program of the SCLC) and said it was excellent. It includes "everything" such as the shorter work week, shorter hours, social security until one gets a job, advanced coverage, general dental plan and others, Rustin remarked.

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Rustin, in remarking about accomodations in Savannah, Georgia, said "they" were all received well by the public establishments, therefore, "they" had no problems whatsoever.

According to the source, Rustin said that he and Martin Luther King, Jr. (President of the SCLC) will speak next Sunday (October 10, 1964) in Newark, New Jersey, in behalf of hospital workers who are conducting an organizing campaign in that city. In that regard, Rustin said there might be problems if King sits on the platform with the white Democratic candidate while the Negro Republican candidate is not present. Rustin said, however, that the problem could be resolved by not seating either candidate alongside King.

In "The Saturday Evening Post", issue of July 11-18, 1964, page 76, Bayard Rustin is the subject of a feature article captioned: "The Lone Wolf of Civil Rights". In it, Rustin is said to have come to New York in 1938, as an organizer for the Young Communist League (YCL), and as such, he had the job of recruiting students for the "Party". Furthermore, the article reports that during his first years in New York, Rustin gave most of his earnings to the "Party". He reportedly left the "Party" in 1941, the article states.

The YCL has been designated pursuant to Executive Order 10450.

The "Daily Worker", February 11, 1957, page 1 column 2, reported that Bayard Rustin, Executive Secretary, War Resisters League, was an observer at the 16th National Convention of the Communist Party, United States of America (CP, USA), held in New York City, on February 9-12, 1957.

The "Daily Worker" was an East Coast Communist publication until it ceased publication on January 13, 1958.

A confidential source, who has furnished reliable information in the past, advised on September 25, 1963, that during a meeting of the National Board, CP, USA, on that date, Benjamin J. Davis remarked that, "Rustin calls me constantly--openly."

Another confidential source, who has furnished reliable information in the past, advised on February 19, 20, 1964, that Bayard Rustin contacted Benjamin J. Davis on those dates

and sought his advice as to how he could escape from a speaking engagement to which he was committed. On the latter contact, Davis told Rustin that he was working on his request and had contacted friends who had contacts with the group to which Rustin was to speak.

A confidential source, who has furnished reliable information in the past, advised on January 21, 1964, that as of that date, Benjamin J. Davis was National Secretary of the CP, USA.

"The New York Times", August 24, 1964, page 27, column 4, reports that Benjamin J. Davis, National Secretary, CP, USA, died in New York City on the night of August 22, 1964.

Reference is made to previous memorandum submitted in the above case on September 2, 1964.

The original confidential source, utilized in this matter, furnished the following additional information on September 24, 1964.

This source stated that he could not specifically recall the amount of the grant made to [Redacted] from the Samuel Rubin Foundation, Incorporated, 5 East 64th Street, New York City. It is noted that [Redacted] is [Redacted] Community Council on Housing, 6 East 117th Street, New York City. Source believed that the grant to Gray was in round figures between the sums of \$2500.00 and \$2900.00. He stated [Redacted] set up the Samuel Rubin Foundation, Incorporated, from the proceeds of his business interest in Faberge, Incorporated (perfumes), 5 West 54th Street, New York City. In addition, [Redacted] set up several trusts for his children and grandchildren, naming himself as trustee. The Samuel Rubin Foundation and the various trusts are all controlled by [Redacted] and are located at his premises, [Redacted], New York City.

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This source related that although he originally advised that the grant to [Redacted] came from the Samuel Rubin Foundation, Incorporated, it was conceivable that the money originated in one of the trusts set up by [Redacted] [Redacted] which as indicated, are under his control.

A second confidential source furnished the following information on September 3, 1964:

The Samuel Rubin Foundation, Incorporated, 9 East 64th Street, New York City, is a non-profit philanthropic organization formed in 1949. The officers of the Foundation are Samuel Rubin, President; Cora Weiss, Secretary; and Jay Levy, Treasurer. A financial statement of the Foundation dated December 31, 1960 showed current assets of \$9,513,329.00. The property located at 9 East 64th Street, New York City, was purchased in August, 1963 in the name of the Samuel Rubin Foundation, Incorporated. Contributions from the Foundation include scholarship grants in medicine, research in the field of mental health, special training in anthropological, inter-cultural relations and mental health agencies.

A third confidential source on September 22, 1964, made information available concerning the Samuel Rubin Foundation, Incorporated, 9 East 64th Street, New York City, [REDACTED]

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A fifth confidential source advised in 1953 and 1954, that [REDACTED] was described as a "Party angel" in that he contributed substantial sums of money to the Communist Party (CP) between 1945 and 1948.

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In an interview with Special Agents of the Federal Bureau of Investigation (FBI), on March 22, 1954, [REDACTED] admitted, during World War II, he donated money to the Joint Anti-Fascist Refugee Committee (JAFRC). [REDACTED] stated that he has contributed to numerous organizations and might possibly have also contributed to the Committee for a Democratic Far Eastern Policy (CDFEP)

and to the National Council of American-Soviet Friendship (NCASF).

The JAFRC, the CDFEP and the NCASF have been designated pursuant to Executive Order 10450.

A sixth confidential source advised in September, 1957, that one [REDACTED] owner of a perfume business, was a contributor to the CP up until approximately 1955.

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A seventh confidential source advised in March, 1956, that on March 26, 1956, [REDACTED] while attending the University of Wisconsin, Madison, Wisconsin, was present at a public meeting sponsored by the University of Wisconsin chapter of the Labor Youth League (LYL).

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The LYL has been designated pursuant to Executive Order 10450.

An eighth confidential source advised on November 20, 1958, that [REDACTED] had been the Organizer for the Harlem Region of the CP, but this position terminated during November, 1958.

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A ninth confidential source advised on January 24, 1964, that according to William Patterson, Chairman of the New York District CP, [REDACTED] is no longer a CP member, but is friendly to the CP.

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[redacted] advised on 9/24/64 that [redacted] and [redacted] were fully informed concerning his opposition to the grant to [redacted] and the fact that he counselled against it. However, contrary to the advice of [redacted] and [redacted] were disposed to contribute to [redacted] and did in fact negotiate the donation to him. [redacted] stated that since this transaction, he has heard nothing further from [redacted] or his daughter. The Child Securities Corporation, however, still retains the [redacted] account for investment purposes which account is in a very sizeable amount.

An annual report concerning [Redacted] is due by the NYO 2/5/65. UACB, a lead will be set forth at that time to review IRS records, New York City, for any information reflecting upon the grant to [Redacted] or information of assistance in tracing this contribution.

HYMAN LUMER

A confidential source advised October 5, 1964, that HYMAN LUMER, who is known to the source as the Communist Party (CP) National Educational Director, was in Baltimore, Maryland, from the late afternoon of October 1, 1964, through the evening of October 2, 1964, at which time he took a train back to New York, New York. LUMER stayed at the home of GEORGE MEYERS, 1002 Beaumont Avenue, Baltimore, Maryland, during the night of October 1, 1964. MEYERS is known to the source as the Chairman of the CP District which includes Maryland, Washington, D. C., Virginia and North Carolina.

The purpose of LUMER's visit, according to the source, was to check into the operation of the New Era Book Shop, 408 Park Avenue, Baltimore, Maryland, and make suggestions with regard to the operation of the book shop.

The source further advised that during the evening of October 1, 1964, LUMER attended a meeting of the New Era Book Shop Committee. Seven of the nine persons present were known to the source as CP members. During the meeting it was brought out that the New Era Book Shop was not showing a profit and may have to close in a month or two because of financial losses. LUMER told the group that Baltimore was not the only book shop of this type which was having problems and that much the same condition obtained throughout the United States. LUMER recommended that they not put so much emphasis on pamphlets but rather concentrate on books. LUMER recommended that they stress books dealing with the Negro struggle and stated that in the Mid-West a book store similar to the New Era Book Shop had obtained books from Africa as well as books written by Negro authors in the United States, all of which dealt with the struggle of the Negro people who were trying to improve their condition. LUMER said that the Mid-Western book store with this type of literature had proven successful.

Re: HYMAN LUMER

LUMER also advised the group that they obtain and try to sell books which were in opposition to Senator BARRY GOLDWATER presently running for the Presidency of the United States.

The source further advised that during the evening of October 2, 1964, LUMER attended a CP meeting during which meeting he talked for approximately an hour on the importance of seeing to it that America became a socialist state. During this talk LUMER said that the CP, USA, was in full agreement with the Soviet Union in its position on the necessity of having a world that was at peace. LUMER stated that Red China which did not support the concept of peaceful coexistence was taking a wrong position and by warlike action might eventually end world civilization.

In the morning [] said that he just talked to [] on the telephone who informed him that [], [] would be arriving at the Buffalo Airport from New York City at 3:00 p.m. that afternoon via American Airlines. [] said he told [] that he would take care of transportation for [] from the airport. After some discussion the [] resolved it by [] keeping the car that day and driving out to the airport to pick up []. After that, [] and [] would come by the University to pick up [] who would remain there as long as he could [].

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At 3:41 p.m. the [] returned home with [] [] commented that the local group did not arrange very much for [] replied that this was perfectly all right with him. [] jokingly wondered if someone was going to pull off a riot that night in Buffalo and then referred to the riots in Rochester. [] commented that there is nothing to worry about in Buffalo because Buffalo is a much different city than Rochester and [] agreed with this.

[] pointed out that Rochester has had racial trouble for a considerable period of time and [] talked about how conservative the racial situation in Buffalo is.

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After some brief conversation in low tones, [] asked [] when he first met someone. [] replied that he met "him" several years ago in connection with the first HCUA hearing in Buffalo. [] said he later met him in New York. This meeting had to do with the riots in San Francisco. [] inquired if this had to do with some of the "Party leaders" and [] replied in the affirmative by saying "I asked him to come over and give us a report San Francisco." [] repeated that this was right after the riots (undoubtedly HCUA) in San Francisco. []

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[] commented that she asked about this person because when he was in Buffalo last she drove him out to the airport and during this occasion they discussed many things (previous information from BU 210-S* disclosed that [] drove FRANK WICKINSON to the airport when he was in Buffalo to give advice regarding HCUA hearings of 4/29 - 30/64):

[] said that "he" takes credit for the way the students conducted themselves at the hearings in Washington. [] said that he was aware of this claim.

[] then mentioned the name "HARVEY O'CONNOR" and [] commented "he takes credit HARVEY O'CONNOR is giving him credit." [] made reference to something which indicated that the National Committee Against HUAC was responsible for persons of importance coming to Buffalo to talk. In this connection he referred to the recent visit and talk made by HARVEY O'CONNOR whom he described as a "nice guy." [] in reply to [] question said that he never met HARVEY O'CONNOR. [] referred to this individual as an older man. [] described O'CONNOR as one who appears to be an extremely honest and decent man who does not hesitate to tell people about the fact that he went to jail for his beliefs at least on one occasion.

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[] then talked about FRANK (PH) taking credit for organizing (anti-HCUA demonstrations, rallies and so forth) in Buffalo. Both of the [] were not inclined to give FRANK (PH) nearly as much credit for this thing as he claimed.

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[redacted] then observed "we have nothing to do with these people. We are friendly, say hello to them, but we don't depend on them. They won't do a g-- d--- thing for you. What it boils down to is if you want money when these things happen they ain't gonna give you anything."

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[redacted] commented "he doesn't have anything, he's living full time on credit." [redacted] referred to one night when "he" was at the [redacted] residence "he" was trying to reach a certain lawyer in Los Angeles. He called six people in that city in an attempt to locate him and had all of the calls charged to his credit card.

[redacted] referred to a friend of his who lives next to him. He identified him as [redacted] (PH). [redacted] described him as "the funniest guy alive." [redacted] then commented that [redacted] (PH) was subpoenaed for "this grand jury."

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[redacted] mentioned that he had a few things to discuss with [redacted] about the Negro community. He wondered about the possibility of further rioting in Rochester. It was [redacted] belief "these are still riots these are political in origin but they are not political in direction." [redacted] (apparently in reference to rioting in Harlem) described that situation as a question of brutality which he referred to as the immediate issue. Among the other issues was one of an economic nature, another which had to do with Negro leadership. [redacted] referred to the fact that when he was in Harlem during this period he felt very unsafe. He said actually the Negro leadership felt the same way. He stated "they couldn't walk the streets for fear of being killed." He described the Negro rioters as being wild because they thought they were betrayed. He referred to them as being hopeless with little to live for.

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[redacted] said that when he saw the situation developing he followed "our line which was demonstrating." [redacted] said that his forces had to take certain action and this consisted of demonstrating. [redacted] referred to thousands of people on the streets on that certain day waiting for the demonstration to take place, "but we didn't have enough cadres to really the city. There

"were thousands of police. They shut the restaurants, subways and stores. There were thousands of people lined up along that route ready to march and of course we knew that demonstration would ever come off. And by simply going ahead with it and defying we'd show the people that there are people who are not ready to back off and who are going to keep fighting. If that demonstration hadn't have been stopped we'd have had ten or fifteen thousand people. That is true! Maybe more! But the police had an army there."

After some low conversation [] continued by saying "it was all our material. That's what they were all shook up about. Because out of it we are beginning to get some leadership and get an organization you got to take chances it's true we had nothing to do with starting the riots. The riots were really spontaneous. But once they started we tried to give direction to it and work it around a program. And that is exactly what they were afraid of that out of this a new leadership would emerge."

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Continuing, [] stated "they put obstacles in our way. Don't underestimate the enemy. Don't forget. We did this with mirrors (ph). We had no in Harlem about a year and one half or two years. Our club had six members and only three of which were worthwhile. We had just started the Defense Council, organizing mothers We had put out a lot of material on but we had nothing. But the truth is that we began to fill a vacuum. A thousand people started to look toward us for leadership and we weren't in a position to consolidate it. This MALCOLM X took he would've emerged the leader of the whole thing which wouldn't have been bad by the way." [] interjected "Oh! I disagree!" [] replied "let's say he was a good guy it wouldn't have been bad. People were saying 'where is MALCOLM'? We had to fill the role. We didn't have the forces to consolidate it. MALCOLM X had a paper that is read by several thousand readers. They have maybe 2,000 members. We had six. They were the major political forces

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"in Harlem. The people hoped he could give leadership." [redacted] commented that MALCOLM X is a big force, and he will be back to build a political movement. [redacted] said that they must build an organization around issues like jobs, housing, freedom to speak and socialism.

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[redacted] asked "where is [redacted] in all of this"? There followed some brief conversation in low tones and then [redacted] remarked "the point is that we are trying to build a in Harlem around various issues and socialism We have the Harlem Defense Council, which is being organized on the concept of defense , also the defense of themselves..... We give out a lot of educational literature. We have classes, clubs, forums and meetings on issues. It's very hard."

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[redacted] then commented "but are we organized so the next time something happens there is not this matter of spontaneous riots but there are dozens of organized..... [redacted] reply was "that's right!" [redacted] laughingly interjected "and flags!"

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[redacted] then said "that's what we are trying to do. But it's not easy. Any organization that has white people up there is out. It's got to be Negro." [redacted] asked "how are we going to get these Negroes"? [redacted] replied "Negroes are sometimes attracted to radicalism at the national level. Like we know we have worked with a lot of Negroes in halls that wouldn't be caught dead with you on the street in Harlem. Like this [redacted] I met with [redacted] last week. [redacted] (PH) of the A number of people in Harlem, Negroes who are leaders who understand." Some low conversation follows.

[redacted] stated "we're not looking for publicity. I turned down a hundred interviews in the last six months. We don't give interviews to anybody. We don't need it. We don't want it now." [redacted] then remarks something to the effect that they still have the same problem which is "we don't have enough trained people."

Re New York let 9/23/64 captioned "CIRM, IS-C," copy to Atlanta, which advised of information obtained from NY 694-S* to the effect that Martin Luther King, Jr., had dropped Stanley David Levison as an advisor as a result of an exposure of their relationship by columnist Joseph Alsop. It was also reported that Levison had informed Party functionary Lem Harris that he, Levison, went to the National Jewish Committee (NJC) in an effort to work his way back into the racial field following his dismissal by King. Levison is reported as having sold the NJC on the idea of a small businessmen's committee which is composed of whites and Negroes whose purpose is to aid Negro people to get into small businesses. The NJC is headed by Levison and has an appropriation of \$100,000.

It appears obvious, on the basis of the information furnished by NY 694-S*, that King's action to dismiss Levison as an advisor was done not because Levison is a communist, but only because King found it expedient to do so on the basis of the Alsop exposure. It may therefore be expected that Levison will again find his way to furnishing advice to King and such advice will be received and even sought by King. Receiving offices should therefore be extremely alert in the investigation not only of captioned matter, but of King and Levison, as well as their frequent intermediary, [redacted] to any available information developed bearing upon the King-Levison relationship. The Bureau must be promptly advised of all pertinent information obtained.

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On the basis of the information contained in relet, the NJC is not identifiable in Bufiles. New York is instructed to furnish the Bureau any further information available concerning the NJC, Levison's activities therein, and so forth.

WASHINGTON: The young girl's voice was soft and fell easily on the ear. The dreamy singsong of her speech made her sound more like a mystic than a revolutionary.

"We are all engaged in a struggle," she said. "Why are we struggling?"

"We want to feel good," she said. "Society is twisted around. It's trying to twist us around."

Communism makes Yvonne Bond feel good. It brought her into the Progressive Labor Movement and recently it brought her before the House Un-American Activities Committee to testify about her activities.

She didn't testify much there, taking the Fifth Amendment more than 40 times. Even now, speaking to a rally opposing the committee, she spoke less than five minutes.

Others took up the slack, among them Conrad Lynn, a Negro lawyer from Harlem filled with bitterness toward the white man. Lynn is not a member of the PLM, but he shares many of its attitudes.

"We are going to face more repression, not less," said Lynn. "Society is beginning to struggle in its early death throes."

"It may last a period of time, but it is in its last stages where it will resort to the utmost cruelty."

"Let us make our alliance first," he cried, "with the black ghettoes of America!"

* * *

Group Backed Visit to Cuba

Handbills announcing the meeting were put out by the Student Committee for Travel to Cuba. Under the auspices of the committee, 84 young Americans traveled to the island on an unauthorized trip this summer.

Called to testify by the House committee, the student group counterattacked with a handbill headlined: "Why does HUAC harass Cuba travelers? Because Cuba has smashed racism!"

"HUAC is composed of the bitterest enemies of the Negro people," the handbill said. "HUAC wants to keep the black people of America in fear and misery by never letting them know how FREEDOM NOW was achieved in socialist Cuba!"

Although the meeting was held in the heart of Washington's Negro district, there were almost no local Negroes there. There was only the familiar hard core of the student travelers and their

friends, the young men with beards and sandals, the girls with straight hair and no makeup.

A young white man who did not go to Cuba and does not belong to the PLM explained almost apologetically why he was present.

"The left in America has been destroyed," he said. "This is all there is."

"Why don't they investigate the right? They get bigger and bigger — Billy James, Hargis, Robert Welch, Fred Schwarz. No, all they do is pick on the left."

Then he turned to listen to Ed Lemansky, a young PLM firebrand from Brooklyn, tell him why elections in America mean nothing.

"The Republicans gave us the millionaire Goldwater versus the millionaire Rockefeller versus the millionaire Scranton. The Democrats have given us the millionaire Kennedy and now the millionaire Johnson. That's a choice?"

His Only Job Is to Agitate

Lemansky made his choice last year, choosing the Progressive Labor Movement. He hasn't held a job since May, 1963, and seems to do nothing but function as an agitator for them.

The PLM's history is briefly told, at least when you listen to Jake Rosen tell it.

Rosen, 25, was born in New York, but now lives in Atlanta. He is a neat young man with a winning smile and no beard, charming and courteous when he wants to be.

"Seven or eight or nine of us resigned from the Communist Party," he said. "Every-

time we wanted to do something active, we were thwarted by the leadership."

The Progressive Labor Movement was founded in January, 1962. The chairman is Milton Rosen and the vice chairman is Mortimer Scheer. Both were formerly members of the Communist Party in New York.

"It's a young movement," said Jake Rosen. "Almost all of us are in our twenties. Milton is the oldest one — 37 — but he's almost the only one over 30."

* * *

Communists 'Old Fogies?'

A non-member who has been watching the group for a year or two said "this bunch (the PLM thinks the American Communist Party is run by a bunch of old fogies. They are young and they see a chance to get to the top quicker in a new organization."

Jake Rosen's statement that the PLM founders resigned from the Communist Party is contradicted by both the party and the Un-American Activities Committee. They say the group was expelled.

All agree that the PLM is oriented toward the violent revolutionary tactics of the Chinese Communists.

In Moscow this month, shortly before her death, Elizabeth Gurley Flynn, chairman of the American Communist Party, condemned the PLM for "adventurist actions

and provocations" during the Harlem race riots this summer.

The New York Police Department agrees. Shortly after the riots subsided, they arrested William Epton, the leader of the PLM in Harlem, and charged him with criminal anarchy.

To Epton's rescue, carrying \$10,000 in bail money, came Albert Maher, 22, of Houston and New York, one of the most colorful figures on the current socialist scene.

Maher's father is a millionaire-oil man. Young Maher is a tall Texas-type with Confederate-style sideburns and a Buffalo Bill moustache. He is a member of the PLM, which has bulked large in the activities of the Student Travel Committee since its inception.

* * *

Pair is Under Indictment

Two PLM members, Lee Levi Laub and Stefan Martinot, are presently under indictment for conspiring to organize and promote the first trip to Cuba by 59 students last year.

This year's tour was led by Lemansky, another PLM member. HUAC said the airplane tickets for this year's trip were bought by two other PLM members, Yvonne Bond and Morton Slater, but Miss Bond refused to testify about it and Slater was attacked by a member of the American Nazi Party before he could be questioned.

PLM members and Student Committee sympathizers are currently hip-deep in another organization called the May 2nd Movement.

Said Anthony Murad of New York, a PLM member who visited Cuba this year:

"It is designed to protest imperialism everywhere — Viet Nam, the Congo, Venezuela. We hope it will prove to be the movement which finally involves students in radical political action."

* * *

The Movement Starts at Yale

The May 2nd Movement was founded at Yale University last March 14. Members of the PLM, the Communist Party, and the Socialist Workers Party all took part. It is called the May 2nd Movement because that was the date of its first public rally.

The movement got rolling in earnest last month with a rally in New York on Aug. 8 and in Los Angeles on Aug. 10. In Los Angeles, who is a Negro, was the speaker at the first rally, called to protest "Johnson's war in Viet Nam."

Nine student travelers were arrested on charges of disorderly conduct at the second rally. Among them was Maher, charged with hitting a policeman's horse with a picket sign.

At present, the PLM — Student Committee — May 2nd complex appears to have two main activities: agitating against U.S. involvement in Viet Nam and encouraging more militant protests by American Negroes.

In the future, for Lerman, at least, is a larger aim. As he told the House committee, he counsels violence against the government "when the times are ripe . . . when the heavy-handed repression of a tyrannical government grows too great . . ."

A confidential source, who has furnished reliable information in the past, advised on October 6, 1964, that [redacted] was in contact with [redacted] Southern Christian Leadership Conference (SCLC) office in New York City on that date. [redacted] told of having gone to Savannah, Georgia (to attend the SCLC Convention which was held on September 29, 1964 through October 2, 1964), and while there he went to see Martin Luther King, Jr. (President of the SCLC). He said he wished that he had not gone to see him because of his "indefiniteness and vagueness over several pressing organizational matters."

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In elaborating on the problems concerning the SCLC, [redacted] said he had in mind the SCLC office in New York City, and in that regard, said the trouble exists over the fact that [redacted] (employee of the SCLC in New York) refuses to abide by directives emanating from the SCLC office in Atlanta. ReBulet 10/7/64 which referred to recently developed information that Martin Luther King, Jr., allegedly dropped Stanley David Levison as an advisor after an April, 1964, exposure of their relationship by columnist Joseph Alsop. Inasmuch as it appeared obvious that such action on the part of King would have been taken only because it would have been expedient to do so and not necessarily because of Levison's communist background, receiving offices were instructed to be extremely alert in the investigation not only of captioned matter, but of King and Levison, as well as their frequent intermediary, [redacted] to any available information developed bearing upon the King-Levison relationship.

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New York airtel 9/30/64, copies to Atlanta, reported information obtained which revealed that as of 9/29/64 Levison was being consulted by [redacted] concerning matters of the Southern Christian Leadership Conference (SCLC), which King heads. There was also an indication that [redacted] of the New York office of the SCLC was contacting Levison on a matter pertaining to the SCLC. The evidence obtained on 9/29/64 would seem to indicate that Levison is still being used as an advisor to King even if only indirectly.

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Atlanta airtel 10/7/64, copy to New York, reports that King is to arrive in New York City 8:44 p.m., 10/10/64, and will remain there until departure for St. Louis, Missouri, 10/12/64. He may stay at either the Savoy Hilton or the Astor Summit Hotel.

Mr. F. J. BAUMGARDNER called from the Bureau today and referred to communication from the Atlanta Office indicating that MARTIN LUTHER KING would be in New York on 10/10/64 for about three days.

Mr. BAUMGARDNER said the Bureau desired the NYO to afford physical surveillance coverage of KING, insofar as this could be done with absolute security, for the purpose of determining whether he makes any direct or indirect contacts here with STANLEY LEVISON. Mr. BAUMGARDNER suggested that KING could possibly be maintaining contacts with LEVISON through an intermediary, most likely [redacted] [redacted], possibly BAYARD RUSTIN or other persons, and he suggested we also include in our surveillance coverage [redacted] and LEVISON. The purpose would be to determine any mutual meetings, direct or indirect contact, between KING and LEVISON.

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Mr. BAUMGARDNER referred to information furnished by this office to the effect that KING reportedly stated that since publication of the ALSOP article, KING has terminated his contacts with LEVISON. Mr. BAUMGARDNER said the Bureau has serious doubts concerning the veracity of KING'S statements in this regard, suspecting that KING is still maintaining contact with LEVISON for counsel and advice, but doing it now indirectly through intermediaries. The Bureau would like evidence of these intermediary contacts if we are able to develop it. Our coverage at least should be as extensive as possible, consistent with security, to determine whether or not such contacts are being made. Mr. BAUMGARDNER instructed that we afford as much manpower as may be necessary to attain this objective.

"The Star-Ledger", daily newspaper published at Newark, New Jersey, stated in the issue dated October 12, 1964, that Reverend Martin Luther King, national civil rights leader, addressed two groups in Newark, New Jersey, on October 11, 1964.

"The Star-Ledger" stated that in a speech to about five hundred members of the New Jersey Division of Local 1199, Hospital and Drug Workers Union, affiliated with the Retail, Wholesale and Department Store Union, AFL-CIO, King abandoned a long-time political neutralism and urged the members to vote against the Goldwater-Miller ticket on November Third.

According to the article, King was also the featured speaker before one thousand one hundred persons at a dedicatory dinner of Leaguers, Incorporated, a Newark organization that has financed educational scholarships for Newark children.

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In an airtel and LHM dated 5/26/64, captioned as above, there was reported that [redacted] was in contact with [redacted] (SCLC representative in New York City), on 5/22/64. During their contact, [redacted] related the results of a recent conversation she had with STANLEY (LEVISON). She told of instructions received from LEVISON which she was to relate to [redacted].

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Airtel and LHM dated 6/26/64, captioned "CPUSA-NEGRO QUESTION; COMMUNIST INFLUENCE IN RACIAL MATTERS", reported that on 6/25/64, [redacted] and LEVISON were in contact. LEVISON related that he had recently met with [redacted] and had worked on a new statement to be issued in an effort to collect money for the SCLC. [redacted] suggested that they (LEVISON and [redacted]) obtain KING's okay before releasing the statement.

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On 6/30/64, in an airtel and LHM, captioned, "CPUSA-NEGRO QUESTION; COMMUNIST INFLUENCE IN RACIAL MATTERS", the NYO reported a contact between LEVISON and [redacted] which took place on 6/27/64. They walked to the Delta Airlines Terminal, where they were met by an unknown Negro male and unknown Negro female, who were in a 1964 Lincoln Sedan, bearing 1964 Pennsylvania license number 4A6679. From the airport they drove directly to the Drake Hotel, 400 Park Ave., NYC, where KING and LEE got out at 9:20 p.m. and went into the hotel.

On 10/11/64, at 10:35 a.m., Special Agents observed KING, BERNARD LEE and an unknown Negro female leave the Drake Hotel lobby. In front of the hotel they were met by an unidentified Negro male (possibly the same as mentioned before) who was driving the same Lincoln. From the hotel they drove

On 10/11/64, NY 4212-38, a source close to HAROLD RUSSELL, advised that RUSSELL was in contact with one [redacted] who advised that he would pick up RUSSELL, KING, LEE and [redacted] in front of the Drake at 4:45 p.m., to take them to Newark where KING was to speak. RUSSELL told [redacted] that a woman who worked with KING would also accompany them in the limousine.

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At 4:00 p.m., 10/11/64, Special Agents observed KING, LEE, [redacted] RUSSELL and an unidentified female departing the hotel. They were met by an unknown Negro male, described as 30-35, 6', 150 lbs., slender build, medium complexion and with thin mustache. The man (believed to be [redacted]) arrived in a chauffeur driven Cadillac limousine, license, N.J. 6W1739. All of the above entered the limousine and drove to the Lincoln Tunnel.

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On 10/12/64, at 11:20 a.m., Special Agents observed KING, LEE, [redacted] and the same unknown female exit from the Drake Hotel. They were observed to carry small hand grips. They hailed a taxi cab which went north on Park Ave., NYC. For security reasons, the surveillance was terminated.

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A suitable pretext to the Drake Hotel disclosed that HAROLD LEE, "his wife" and party, checked out at 11:15 a.m.

Records of Trans World Airlines, NYC, reflected on 10/12/64, that HAROLD LEE and "wife" had reservations on Flight 171, departing NYC at 12 noon, 10/12/64, for St. Louis, Missouri. It is noted that KING and LEE were to go to St. Louis on 10/12/64.

Physical surveillances on LEVISON and [redacted] as well as sources on [redacted] and RUSSELL, failed to disclose contact with KING by either of the above.

A meeting of C.P. Club #1 Manhattan, W. was held on September 28th, 1964, at [redacted] apart., [redacted] at [redacted] New York City.

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The following club members were present at this meeting: [redacted].

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[redacted] (Miss) chaired the meeting. [redacted] made a report on the election campaign. Her report was based on a report made by [redacted] organizer of the Manhattan County CP to the West Side (Manhattan) Section of the C.P.

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In her report [redacted] underlined that "We, as Communists, must work in this election campaign for the total defeat of GOLDWATER."

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She stated that "GOLDWATER represents the extreme revolutionaries and atomaniacs in the country... the Republican party is the instrument of the Fascist forces which are out to gain control of the government and this will lead to a total nuclear war..." [redacted] stated that "President JOHNSON committed himself to peace; to peacefull negotiations. We must constantly remind JOHNSON that this commitment is not just a campaign commitment. The role of the Communist Party in this election campaign is to help in the building of a broad mass movement which will defeat the GOLDWATER-ultra-right forces and will hold JOHNSON to his pledge peacefull negotiations and peacefull settlements of all outstanding international issues..."

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Everyone present at the meeting participated in the discussion on the [redacted] report.

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NY 100-26603-C2003

[] stated that "holding President JOHNSON to his commitment to peacefull negotiations is of prime importance. I think that it is the duty of the club (C.P. #1) in this community to make to people aware of this pledge of JOHNSON."

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[] proposed that this C.P. Club should from now on engage in the distribution of election campaign literature at street corners; to work with peace, civil rights groups and all other organizations which are engaged in the campaign to defeat GOLDWATER and all other Republican party candidates.

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[] proposed that the club should print a leaflet "in the name of some kind of an organization" based on GUS HALL's pamphlet "The 11th Hour" for distribution in the neighborhood.

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[] told the meeting that this will not be necessary because "the party will have shortly election campaign literature for mass distribution."

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The meeting decided to buy 500 copies of GUS HALL's "The 11th Hour" for distribution in the area of the club. It was decided that the members of this should approach different organizations in the community offering their services to help in the election campaign work.

The meeting decided to have a table for 10 people to the press dinner (Oct. 18 at the Statler-Hilton Hotel, N.Y.C.) and to collect funds for donation for the Worker fund drive at the dinner.

It was decided to have a "fund raising party" for the "party (C.P.) or the Worker or both" at [] apartment on November 21st, 1964. [] announced that "CORE opened an office at 100 W. 82nd St., N.Y.C. Club members are being urged to visit the office and to help in the work of this important civil rights organization."

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The next meeting of the club will be held at the same address on October 12th, 1964.

This was about April or May, 1964. At that time he lived in the Bronx (street not known) with his wife, a very good-looking girl who formerly lived in Boston, Mass. At that time he began attending or frequenting the newly opened offices of the Muslim Mosque, Inc., Room 128, Hotel Theresa, NYC. He continued his visits to that office on a daily basis for several months. The nature of his business there, however, is not known, nor is his position known. Recently, somewhere around June of 1964, his visits to MMI grew less frequent and he visited there once or twice a week at night. It was at that time that he secured employment with [redacted] accounting for his less frequent attendance at MMI headquarters. His job consisted of teaching youngsters athletics at the [redacted] St. YMCA [redacted]. He was seen nearly every night during the riots in Harlem only; he acted as an observer and did not participate at all. He regularly attends various street rallies in Harlem square on Saturday afternoons; for example he was seen at the 8/22/64 rally held by the Harlem Unity Committee & at the Adam Clayton Powell Day Rally held 138th St. & St. Nicholas, 9/27/64. He is only an observer at these rallies and has no function thereof.

On October 14, 1964, Lieutenant [redacted] Newark, New Jersey, Police Department Headquarters, advised that Newark Police on October 14, 1964, arrested one [redacted] Newark, New Jersey, white male, born [redacted] at Detroit, Michigan. According to the Newark Police report Central Complaint Number [redacted], dated October 14, 1964, [redacted] was arrested on a complaint filed by [redacted], Newark, New Jersey, charging [redacted] with Assault and Battery. Complainant stated she had been physically assaulted about the head, arms, and shoulders and her thumb and hand were injured during the assault. The Newark Police arrest report noted that complainant claimed that she had been constantly harassed by Hayden.

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The police report further stated that complainant claimed she was forced to sign a notarized agreement under threat of violence to her, and under threat of picketing her property at [redacted], and her residence at [redacted] Newark. The agreement was signed by [redacted] and one [redacted]. Complainant stated these two men told her that if she did not comply with their wishes, they would spread her name all over the city and disgrace her.

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On October 16, 1964, Inspector [redacted] and Detective [redacted], Fifth Precinct, Newark, New Jersey, Police Department, made available a copy of the following agreement:

After that time, [redacted] shall pay \$8 per week until the kitchen is repaired and open for use. After that, [redacted] shall pay \$10 per week rent.

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4. The Newark Community Union Project, through its representatives [redacted] [redacted], agree to suspend all legal proceedings, demonstrations and mass leafletting against [redacted]. The suspension will remain in effect so long as the above agreements are being carried out in good faith.

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5. If [redacted] desires to evict [redacted] for any reason, or if the above agreements are violated in the opinion of any of the undersigned parties, there shall be an immediate meeting of the undersigned parties before any action is taken.

NK T-1 advised on December 23, 1963, that [redacted] born [redacted] at Detroit, Michigan, can be characterized as a "crusader" who possesses a passion for unpopular causes. The source believed that [redacted] was completely loyal to the United States.

NK T-2 advised on August 6, 1960, that [redacted] then an undergraduate at the University of Michigan, was a campus leader and [redacted] during the Fall semester of 1960. This source stated that [redacted] was a member of the Student Government Council of the University of Michigan, was a University of Michigan delegate to the National Student Congress, and during the Summer of 1960, visited campuses throughout the United States regarding National Student Association affairs.

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NK T-2 described [redacted] as a responsible, aggressive, student leader whom he regards as completely loyal to the United States. NK T-2 said that [redacted] work was crusading, and [redacted] possessed inexhaustive energy which takes him to leadership capacity. This source said [redacted] supported the Student Government Council's endorsement of "sit in" demonstrations in the South and he has worked on integration matters. NK T-2 said that [redacted] activities were based on sincere personal conviction, and the source said he has never known [redacted] to be a member of, or sponsor of, any student organization at Michigan University known to the source as containing communists or communist sympathizers.

NK T-5 advised on September 3, 1964, that [redacted] had become the main leader of the Newark Community Union Project, formerly known as the Newark Full Employment Project.

NK T-3 advised on February 27, 1964, that several days previously one [redacted] of Swarthmore College, Swarthmore, Pennsylvania, had stated that he was planning to hold a seminar on Marxism in the Spring of

1964 at Swarthmore College. [redacted] felt he was competent to lead the seminar. [redacted] identified himself with the orthodox pro-Soviet position regarding Marxism and stated that he is from the background and tradition of old line Marxists. [redacted] stated he was respectful of the thinking of Lenin during his generation and of Mao Tse Tung in the present generation.

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The Newark Police report also noted that complainant had stated that the assault by [redacted] was caused when he sought to retrieve the copy of the agreement which complainant had in her possession. When she refused, she said that [redacted] assaulted her.

Detective [redacted] advised that he learned from [redacted] the complainant, that [redacted] had threatened to kill her. It was the intention of Newark Police Department to arrest [redacted] on October 16, 1964 (following his court appearance) on a charge of "Threatening to Kill". Detective [redacted] advised that this charge would require that this matter be brought before the Grand Jury. [redacted] advised that [redacted] was free on bail awaiting court appearance on October 16, 1964, in Municipal Court, Newark, New Jersey.

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According to Inspector [redacted] and Detective [redacted] who were contacted October 16, 1964, Hayden failed to appear as scheduled in Municipal Court, Newark, on October 16, 1964. [redacted] advised that the case will be carried over and in the event [redacted] does not appear in court in the next several days, a warrant for his arrest will be obtained.

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NK T-4 advised on October 15, 1964, that a group of nine Negroes, seven men and two women, met with Newark City Councilman Lee Bernstein on the evening of October 14, 1964, to discuss the details of [redacted] arrest, and to determine how [redacted] could be released from jail. NK T-4 said that the group was very critical of Bernstein, was very sympathetic to [redacted] and was infuriated by the failure of city authorities to honor [redacted] counter-complaint against [redacted] which [redacted] tried to file at the time of his arrest. This source said that the group told Bernstein they would hire a lawyer for [redacted] defense.

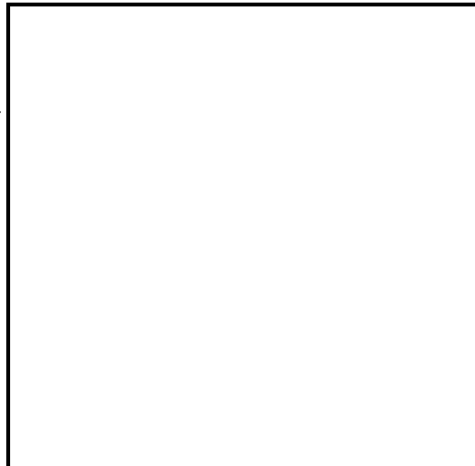

On October 15, 1964, a confidential source, who has furnished reliable information in the past, advised that Bayard Rustin was in contact with A.J. Muste on that date. Rustin said his purpose in contacting Muste was to discuss plans concerning Martin Luther King's trip to Europe to accept the Nobel Peace Prize. In that regard, Rustin said he had been asked by King to accompany him (to Oslo, Norway) for the purpose of handling arrangements for him. Rustin, the source said, remarked that King did not trust any of the people "around him" to be knowledgeable enough to know whom he should or should not contact when he goes over to accept the award.

Rustin, in commenting on King's request, said he thought he should go, but was faced with a problem as to where he could get the money which would be needed for transportation,

as well as other expenses incidental to the trip. In regard to his expenses, Rustin said he thought "we" should appeal to some of "our friends" (Rustin's and Muste's friends) to raise the money.

With regard to King's use of the money that he will receive with the award, Rustin said Coretta King (wife of Martin Luther King) desired that Martin place in trust \$5,000 for each of their children's education, but that King opposed the suggestion. As a consequence of their indecisiveness as to what to do with the money, Rustin said Martin King had invited him down to Atlanta on Monday, October 19, 1964, to discuss what the money should be used for.

Rustin told Muste that he was of the opinion that King should make a decision and an announcement to the effect that of the \$54,000 award, he was going to set aside \$30,000 for the Southern Christian Leadership Conference (SCLC) for the express purpose of teaching the doctrine of non-violence. He said this could be accomplished through the establishment of institutes in this country for the purpose of acquainting young people with the tactics and philosophy of non-violence. As to the remaining \$24,000, Rustin said he was of the opinion that it should be placed in trust for the children of the Kings. This, Rustin said, would benefit the children because Martin was not a wealthy man. He said his only reservation about the trust for the children was whether it would appear to the public that the Kings were trying to take care of their own (alluding to King's provision for his children).

Muste said in reply to Rustin's feelings about the children of King, that he did not think that King should provide for them but instead, should give all the money to the SCLC. This, Muste said, would not subject King to criticism

for keeping a part of the money for himself. Rustin said he was of the opinion that if King does give away part of the money, then it should go exclusively to the SCLC for the purpose of teaching non-violence, and for nothing else. He said the SCLC could raise funds for its regular budget. Muste agreed, stating that King received the Prize for advocating non-violence, therefore, should apply the money for that purpose.

Rustin, in commenting on his forthcoming meeting with King, said King wanted him to help him prepare a speech which he would make (apparently in regard to his decision about what to do with the money). In that regard, Rustin asked Muste to prepare a few thoughts that he could use when he meets King.

According to the source, Rustin and Muste concluded their contact with a promise of Muste that he would help Rustin raise the money with which to make the trip with King.

The April 14, 1957 issue of "The Worker," an east coast Communist publication, page 16, column 1, described A.J. Muste as the dean of the Socialist pacifists.

On October 5, 1964, [redacted] dropped
by the name of [redacted] stating he had gone home to
St. Louis and then went to New York and had just returned.
The reason he wanted to see [redacted] was that in his opinion
a very serious situation is developing in the civil rights
movement. [redacted] stated that as a little bit of
background the Council of Federated Organizations was under
very serious attack as a result of a split in the ranks of
CORE over the Freedom Democratic Party. It seems that
certain groups of leaders of CORE are supposedly under the
influence of the agencies that have been giving grants and
financial assistance to CORE and these leaders have become
disturbed at the turn of events in Mississippi and its
counterparts being reflected in certain northern cities,
particularly in Chicago. It seems that these forces are
concerned that unsavory coalitions are being formed
around the Freedom Democratic Party concept. As far as
CFOO itself, there is a growing gap between the established
old guard leadership of organizations such as CORE, NAACP
and in some instances SNCC and the field workers of these
various organizations. That is the people active in the
field in the South are not allowed to participate in policy

decisions of their organizations. As a result there has been growing antagonism. The meeting held in New York by CORE which [] attended was crashed by certain field workers from Mississippi. A great deal of arguing ensued, mainly around the responsibility of CORE to help forward the Freedom Democratic Party movement. [] stated it seemed that a meeting was held and sponsored by the Church Federation at which the established Negro leaders, that is such leaders as FARMER, MARTIN LUTHER KING, WILKINS and so forth, were present. At this meeting, as reported by FARMER to the National Executive Committee of CORE, the Church Federation people were greatly concerned that the left and particularly Reds, were infiltrating the civil rights movement through the actions around the Democratic Freedom Party. They cited examples of the actions of SNCC in getting the National Lawyers Guild to handle their cases rather than the other lawyers group that was sent down by the Federation. They also indicated that the action by the Freedom Democratic Party people at the Atlanta Convention went too far and showed the influence of certain left thinking. FARMER was criticized by his staff people for taking a critical roll of the Freedom Democratic Party at the Atlanta Convention without

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going further into detail, [] stated that if possible some approach must be made to try and unite the forces interested in the Freedom Democratic Party movement into a struggle against Red baiting because in his opinion this is the weapon they are going to use to try and disrupt the activities of the Freedom Democratic Party as well as to attack COFO.

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[] indicated that he had certain indications that such an internal struggle was taking place, however, he did not know it was so widespread. He further stated that he had met with certain individuals in Chicago to try and get a unified approach to supporting COFO but that it had been bogged down by certain internal problems.

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[] stated that [] should attempt to make some time available later in the week so that the two of them and possibly someone else could sit down and have a full scale analysis of the situation and discuss where they should go.

[] stated he would try and squeeze out some time, however, he was going to Milwaukee on Tuesday, the 6th, but would be back on Wednesday and possibly they could arrange something for Thursday. [] stated he would wait for [] to call him.

WILLIAM PATTERSON acted as Chairman. [redacted] gave a follow up report on the 1964 elections. His report was practically a repeat of his report to the committee meeting of August 8, 1964, in which he said that the main role of the Party is to see that Senator BARRY GOLDWATER is not elected President in November. He commented briefly on the necessity of registering new voters.

[redacted] was welcomed back to New York.

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NY 100-26603

[redacted] (phonetic) commented on upstate voter registration activity and predicted no white backlash there. [redacted] also reported on registration of voters in her area.

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[redacted] LNU spoke briefly on the school boycott by [redacted] scheduled for New York City. Other persons also commented on registration progress in their areas and on the scheduled school boycott.

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[redacted] was heard speaking to [redacted] concerning the Negro American Labor Council (NALC) membership. He said the Trade Union Council was after him to get NALC material and membership figures. He referred to the State of Race conference, which the NALC is scheduled to call sometime in October in Washington, D.C. He wanted to know what is happening in preparation for this conference. [redacted] said that she doubts it will be held, since she had heard nothing further on this conference, but noted that there is an executive meeting of the NALC on September 14, 1964, and that she may get more information.

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[redacted] asked about the proposed CP conference on civil rights and wanted to know when it will be held. [redacted] said the Party has been short-handed with deaths and the WILLIAM ALBERTSON affair, but that he will try to push it.

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A memorial for ELIZABETH GURLEY FLYNN was announced as being scheduled for September 22, 1964, at 40 East 35th Street.

Introduced the chairman for evening.

Judge HUBERT DELANEY.

"More Police Department members are unfit for service than any other civil servants."

Traced the history of Riots in Harlem.

1936: Protest of Negros against job discrimination in Harlem. Not a race riot.

1941: Police started it. It was during war time and fortunately he was not called. He would have refused to serve in a "Jim Crow" army.

A rookie cop from West 126 Street Harlem area who should never been stationed there in the first place was instrument that started the riot.

LA GUARDIA was the Mayor. There was damage and looting not a race riot. Otherwise many people would have been killed.

"Violence begets violence. I am against violence in any form."

Those who claim that police should use night sticks are wrong it only leads to community becoming enraged.

"Not every cop is a villian."

"Why can't we make the police the guardian of the populace and not the enemy of the people." In many ways he respects Commissioner MURPHY but he was wrong to defend Lt. [] and not suspend him. He has hurt the Police force and the people of this city.

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Judge ~~DELAHAY~~ introduced the principal speaker for the evening--Councilman THEODORE WEISS. He has introduced a bill to the council which is buried in committee which would institute a Police Review Board.

[] of P.B.A., claims WEISS is part of a Communist plot.

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Commissioner MURPHY thinks it is out to destroy the Police Department. MURPHY has helped his (WEISS) cause by keeping the issue alive. Thus permitting public sentiment and subsequent public approval.

When WEISS introduced this bill in April, 1964, it was not an issue. But the public hearing of June 16th, 1964, the 1600 police in uniform interfering with press coverage and even members of council getting into building helped to make public aware of this issue.

Organizations have endorsed his bill, however, rank & file members have not backed it actively.

The City Council is greatly influenced by the Mayor who has control of council. He has not made a move, therefore, action on bill will be very slow. Mayor apparently does not wish to become involved. Council will only be moved by action of the people.

WEISS was upset by the announcement of ECLC concerning the meeting. The cartoon depicting the police as brutal was a complete condemnation of all police. This is a smear and the ECLC should not be guilty of general condemnation.

The Police rank and file are as descent as the rest of the citizens. There is only a small percentage who behave improperly.

It is to the advantage of the Police Department to weed out the undesirable.

There has been a breakdown of confidence in the Police Department by the people.

The Civilian Review Board will not solve all sociological problems. Even many will not be helped but it will solve the Police Department-civilian relationship.

It basically would be made^{up} of 9 members appointed by the Mayor. None to have any police department affiliations. To serve 3 years each. They would be not salaried. There would be paid staff & executives.

It would be useful in cases of excessive and unnecessary force. Complaints would come from:

1. Individual
2. Organizations representing individuals.

The substance of the complaint would go to Commissioner of Police. He would in turn give a report to the board. The board would decide if a public hearing was indicated or not.

However, the police officer could demand a hearing if he wished to exonerate his name.

The Board would have the power to supoena. It would have an investigative staff. The hearings could be held with attorneys representing the complant & policeman.

If the board found facts to indicate brutality the findings would be sent to Mayor and Police Commissioner with recommendations for punishment. The Board would have power to recommend and not power to discipline.

The power to discipline must not come from the City Council otherwise we would have a polically influenced police force.

As of now all these hearings are secret.

"We must spred a glare of publicity" to see that justice is done.

It is true that the majority of complaints do not stand up. However, the citizens believe that there is a "white wash". They have lost trust in the Police Department.

Judge DELANEY-announced the presence of pamphlet concerning "Know Your Rights" re police interegation etc. The "No Knock Law" and the Stop & Frisk Law are unconstit-
utional under the 1st and 4th amendments. The Judge next introduced [redacted]

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He read two letters of complaint about police brutality and the inaction they recieved.

He told of his own involvement. A drunken police sergeant--a police captain who refused to listen to [redacted] a false arrest--physical beatings. Case was dismissed. [redacted] sued Police Department--Dismissed. He realized through these personal experiences how people must feel. The frustration which often leads to crimes of anger not of need.

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He endorsed the Civilian Review Board. He said it is necessary. People support the bill but are afraid to speak out.

The fear of reprisal makes them feel impotent. The Civilian Review Board would help to bring out the people.

It was announced that there was a member of "Adult Volunteer Service Corps of Associated Community Teams, Inc" in the audience. He distributed petitions to be signed. (See addenda).

Question from the floor

Q. What could the Civilian board recommend?

Answer.

Dismissal, suspension or fine of the guilty officer.

Q. What board do the police have now?

Answer.

A board made up of Deputy Commissioners and these are considered civilians yet they all have other police duties.

1. Commissioner [redacted] - Public Relations
2. [redacted] - Police woman
3. Commissioner E. MC CABE - former FBI and head of "Hack" Bureau

Question: How could the recommendations be guaranteed enforcement?

Answer - The Police Commissioner would be under public hearing. He would be forced to act:

1. Agree with findings
2. Disagree and increase punishment
3. Disagree and reduce punishment.

Councilman WEISS:

The recent announcement by J. EDGAR HOOVER of FBI condemned the Civilian Board by claiming that in two cities (Philadelphia & Rochester?) the pressure of the Civilian Review Board tied the policemen's hands during recent riots. This is a lie. He (HOOVER) claimed police were afraid to act because of charges of brutality. Investigation by WEISS & others paid in Rochester police were contented with Civilian Board, the only complaints came from the equivolent Police Benevolent Association.

He believes HOOVER inserted this part into his report concerning the riots because of pressure from Police departments who do not want Civilian Boards.

Rochester was undermanned-Therefore, was inadequate to control riot.

The Negro population has increased in few years from 7000 to 38,000 while the overall population is the same and the Negro residential area has remained the same. Thus over crowding led to violence.

CORLISS LAMONT

Two days after the HOOVER riot report, a Civilian Board rebuked the FBI (Warren Commission). Both the FBI and the Secret Service were at fault.

Therefore, it follows if a Civilian Board can set the precedence in the case of the death of a president, it is logical that a Civilian Board should be set up for police.

CLARK FOREMAN

Announced he had a list of city councilmen for those interested in writing.

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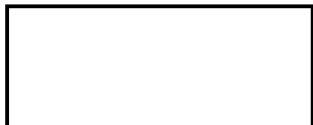

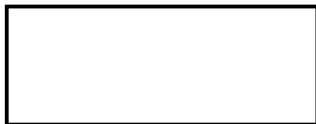

GEORGE WEISSMAN was expecting a long-distance call from [redacted] from the West Coast, who was to telephone in a story for the Militant at midnight. (According to GEORGE WEISSMAN, [redacted] telephones often and WEISSMAN takes down the story in longhand. It is believed that he calls on Tuesday evenings at about midnight.)

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[redacted] was working on an article for the Militant. Prior to that, he was seen talking with [redacted] and he mentioned the name "ANNIE STEIN" and they discussed having ANNIE STEIN take care of putting out a leaflet and distributing it to Negro mothers with reference to the education system in New York City. [redacted] had commented that it is always the Negro mothers who bring up issues involving education in New York City. [redacted] commented that [redacted] and [redacted] send their children to private schools.")

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[redacted] also mentioned that she "had a girl friend named [redacted]" who had worked for a Supreme Court Judge. (This [redacted] was also a legal secretary.)

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It may be noted that a bulletin board and table has already been moved into the Forum Hall by the Downtown YSA. But [redacted] told [redacted] that this (meaning the YSA selling literature there) will not affect [redacted] being in charge of Literature.

It was mentioned that [] will be teaching a class on Marxism in Cuba, beginning Wednesday, October 7.

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[] said that [] and [] had spoken at the street meeting that night and that [] was there also.

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Upon talking with [], it was learned that [] was in a hospital, having been hit on the head with a pipe or similar weapon in a street incident. [] also mentioned that he and [] are planning on renting a five-room apartment on West 118th Street near Columbia University. They need a third person, either male or female, who will have to be a "comrade" (member of SWP or YSA). [] said this will be good for inviting "contacts" and other persons, "comrades", etc. for informal discussions, dinners, etc. He feels that he does not want to associate with dirty, unkempt "bohemian" types and that there are students at Columbia University who are "well dressed and have money."

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The following person was seen in the Forum Hall talking to [] [] said he was a "contact" met at the street meeting that evening.)

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Very well-dressed man, age 28-33, 5'11" tall, attractive, possibly Irish extraction, fair complexion, black hair, cropped close, dark eyes, aquiline nose.

[] said that this person had told him [] and [] that he was a member of the Socialist Party but [] later told [] after this person left, that he did not know anything about the internal organization of the Socialist Party (ergo, per [] he could not possibly be a member of that Party) because [] "tripped him up" on questions about it!

On October 17, 1964, a confidential source, who has furnished reliable information in the past, advised that Bayard Rustin (Deputy Director of the March on Washington) was in contact with [redacted] of the Washington, D.C. branch of the Southern Christian Leadership Conference (SCLC) on that date. [redacted] said he had recently conferred with Martin Luther King, Jr. (President of the SCLC) during which time King said he felt that if "they" could get all the members of the moratorium (the leaders who signed the moratorium against further civil rights demonstrations) to make a tour around the country, it would be worthwhile. [redacted] quoted King as having said that he would go, on the condition that Roy Wilkins (Executive Secretary of the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People) (NAACP) goes, because in the eyes of President Lyndon B. Johnson, Wilkins is the chief spokesman for the Negro people.

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[redacted] told Rustin that if Wilkins did not back King's plan, King has said that he (King) would not stick his neck out (by making the tour). King, according to Fauntroy, said the purpose of the tour would be to encourage voting, and not for the purpose of endorsing President Johnson. King said he did not want it to appear as if President Johnson had him (King) in his pocket.

According to the source, King told [] that he thought the following should be participants in the proposed tour: Whitney Young (Executive Director of the National Urban League); A. Philip Randolph (President of the Negro American Labor Council); Roy Wilkins; James Farmer (National Director of the Congress of Racial Equality) (CORE); John Lewis (Chairman, Student Non-Violent Coordinating Committee) and himself. The following is the proposed itinerary as furnished by King:

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Friday, October 23, 1964, at Cleveland, Ohio
Monday or Tuesday, October 26, 1964, at Los Angeles, with
the possibility of a mass rally on Monday evening in Los Angeles
Wednesday, October 28, 1964, day of rest
Thursday, October 29, 1964, at Chicago
Friday, October 30, 1964, at Detroit
Saturday, October 31, 1964, at Baltimore, Maryland

[] told Rustin that "they" want Rustin to coordinate public relations for the tour. In reply, Rustin said he had a lot of work, but thought he could handle it.

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Rustin, in considering who of the civil rights leaders should be contacted first regarding the proposed tour, said he thought that Roy Wilkins should be the last to be informed of the plans. Fauntroy said that according to Andy Young (Executive Director of the SCLC), Whitney Young had committed himself to go on the tour.

In concluding their contact, Rustin sought information as to where the tour was being arranged. He was told by [] that he was presently handling matters in Washington, D.C.

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With regard to the moratorium mentioned heretofore, it is noted that in "The New York Times", July 30, 1964, page 1, column 1, it was reported that major civil rights leaders conferred in New York City on July 29, 1964, and agreed to recommend to their members to observe a "broad curtailment, if not total moratorium" on all mass demonstrations until after the November 3, 1964 Presidential election.

The same confidential source advised on October 17, 1964, that Bayard Rustin was in contact on that date with an individual who identified himself to Rustin as [redacted] of California. He told Rustin that he was very interested in doing civil rights work, and requested to meet Rustin. Rustin told him that he was too busy because he had a speech at 2:30 PM that afternoon at the headquarters of the Haryou-Act, 137th Street and 7th Avenue, New York, New York. Rustin said he was also busy doing some work for the Domestic Peace Corps.

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It is noted that Haryou-Act is a combination of Harlem Youth Opportunities Unlimited and Associated Community teams, whose purpose is to fight juvenile delinquency and poverty in Harlem.

On October 18, 1964, the same confidential source advised that Bayard Rustin and Harry Wachtel were in conference on that afternoon. Wachtel informed Rustin that he had made reservations for Rustin and himself to fly to Atlanta, Georgia, on October 19, 1964, to meet with Martin Luther King, Jr. According to source, Rustin agreed to meet Wachtel at Wachtel's office at 3:15 PM, October 19, 1964, where they would depart for the airport to catch the 4:15 PM flight to Atlanta.

Wachtel told Rustin that Martin Luther King had said that a two or three hour meeting was all he could physically stand.

With regard to their return to New York, Rustin said he would have to return to the city on Monday, October 19, 1964, because of his heavy work load.

According to the same confidential source, who advised on October 15, 1964, Rustin said he would go to Atlanta to meet with King to discuss what King should do with the award of \$54,000 which he will receive incidental to the Nobel Peace Prize.
