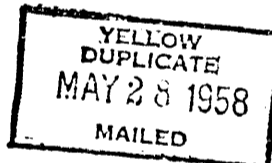

SECURITY INDEX - GENL

SYNOPSIS:

Each month we follow the field closely on the status of security work by analyzing the backlog of pending cases and delinquency in espionage, internal security, security matter and foreign intelligence cases in classifications 65, 100 and 105. Status of these cases as of May 31, 1958, is set forth herein.

In May, there was an increase in pending active matters in the entire field in the security classifications from 15,735 to 15,798. Delinquent matters increased from 1,503 to 1,841. The percentage of delinquent matters increased from 9.6% to 11.7%.

Letters are being sent to the offices indicated by asterisks on pages four and five herein, commenting upon their delinquency and pointing out the necessity of bringing their security cases to a current status.

RECOMMENDATION:

The field will continue to be followed closely regarding security delinquency and you will be advised of the results of the review of the June, 1958, administrative reports.

DETAILS:

The May, 1958, administrative reports from all offices reflect that the total pending active matters in classifications 65, 100 and 105 increased from 15,735 to 15,798. Delinquent items increased from 1,503 to 1,841. The percentage of delinquent items increased from 9.6% to 11.7%.

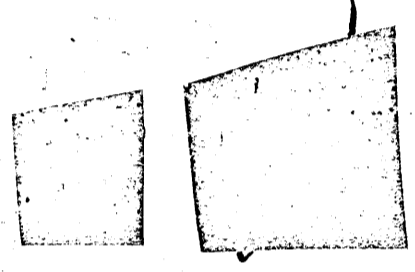

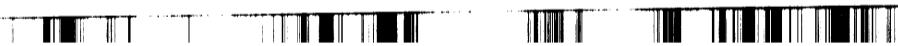

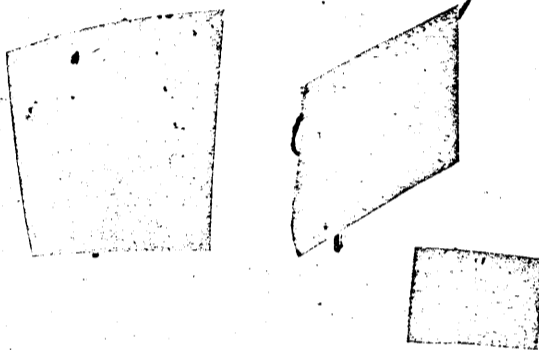

SUBJECT: SUBVERSIVE CONTROL SECTION
GUIDANCE POLICY FOLDERS

Supervision of individual cases of a security nature is handled in the Subversive Control Section on a geographical basis with each supervisor handling one or more offices (except for the very large offices wherein responsibility is divided on an alphabetical basis). This enables the individual supervisor not only to follow each case on an individual basis, but to learn the manner in which any particular office is handling its security investigations.

In order to enable the supervisor to establish a pattern of handling cases by each office and to assist him in guiding that office in proper carrying out of Bureau programs, the following procedure has been followed:

A guidance folder has been established for each office into which folder have been placed copies of correspondence to the office giving advice and instruction as to the handling of particular cases and general instructions concerning programs. Not every item has been placed in this folder, but only those concerning matters of a nonroutine nature. By retention of these guides for moderate periods of time and regular examination of them in such guidance folders, it has been possible to establish patterns of action by a particular office which are at variance in any respect with Bureau policies and programs; thus facilitating guiding the office into proper channels. A similar guidance folder has been maintained for Security Matter-Fraud Against the Government cases.

The various guidance folders are maintained by the Supervisors in Charge of the five respective units of the section so that they are readily available to him and to each supervisor in the unit. These folders are purged on a semiannual basis on January 1 and July 1 of each year, then discarding any material more than six months old.

RECOMMENDATION:

That the continued maintenance of guidance folders of this type be approved in the interest of more efficient supervision of the security matter investigations.

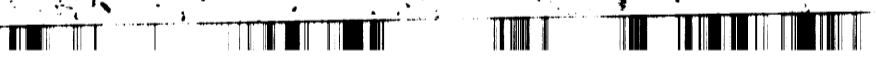

Upon completion of the Security Index review in October, 1955, we had approximately 12,870 names included in the Security Index (SI). Today there are 12,924 names included therein. The initial review was deemed essential to insure that all cases were sound as the Department had advised it was unable to review these cases, thus leaving the FBI, in effect, the sole judge as to who was to be included in the SI. Consideration was also given to the fact that in excess of 98% of these individuals are citizens of the United States. Specific criteria were established at the inception of the review as guidelines to be utilized in determining a subject's potential dangerousness. These criteria continue to be used as guidelines in connection with additions to, retention in and deletions from the SI.

Every SI case is subjected to a penetrative review in the Subversive Control Section not only upon receipt of periodic reports required in these cases but in each instance that a case comes up for review on tickler or otherwise. In connection therewith, our basic objective is to insure that we have included therein those individuals who would constitute a potential threat in time of emergency and each review of a security case is approached from this standpoint. Our criteria are sufficiently elastic to permit the retention of an individual's name in the SI when facts developed depict him as a dangerous individual even though evidence is lacking of membership and activity in a revolutionary organization within prescribed periods. These cases are critically analyzed with this fact in mind in every instance.

We do not take steps to remove a name from the SI immediately upon determining that he is no longer a member of a prescribed organization. Many individuals in recent years belonging to the extreme left wing or the right wing of the Communist Party (CP) have publicly severed connection with the Party; however, many of these individuals remain confirmed Marxists and represent a potential threat and are retained in the SI. A classic example is that of

and member of the right-wing faction of the CP who resigned from the Party. He is a confirmed Marxist, a communist and a threat to the internal security of the United States.

Interviews with security subjects are taken into consideration in connection with these reviews; for example, a positive statement to interviewing Agents indicating continued adherence to aims and purposes of a revolutionary organization is considered an overt act within the SI criteria. A negative interview in and of itself is not considered an overt act for placing or retaining a name in the SI in the absence of other specific facts indicating such action. However, refusal to cooperate is certainly taken into consideration along with other facts in arriving at a determination of the dangerousness of an individual.

As an example of the importance we attach to the SI program and the thoroughness with which we approach this problem, each recommendation for addition to the SI is thoroughly analyzed on three separate levels of operation within the Section with the final decision being made at the Section Chief level except in borderline cases which are referred to you. Conversely, no individual's name is removed from the SI solely on review of one supervisor. Each such case is critically and carefully analyzed at more than one level. We feel that these steps are essential to insure that this Index is maintained in the best possible condition should it become necessary to institute the Emergency Detention Program (EDP). Attached are the basic criteria we utilize in analyzing SI cases. It should be noted that item (4) of the criteria is relied on heavily in analyzing these cases in the absence of evidence of overt acts or statements on the part of a subject within specific time limits.

Problems dealing with the SI and the EDP have been approached with the clear understanding that the world situation is in a most critical period and that the EDP is the basic cornerstone of our entire operations in the security field in the event of a sudden emergency. Plans for effecting the apprehension and detention of SI subjects are in a high state of readiness and geared for instantaneous action. The presidential proclamation that would "trigger" the EDP has been reviewed and approved by the President. This proclamation is contained in the "Emergency Kit" of the President awaiting only his signature should an emergency arise.

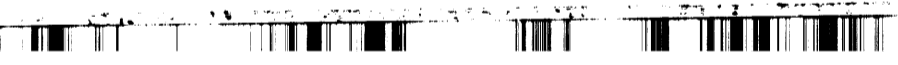
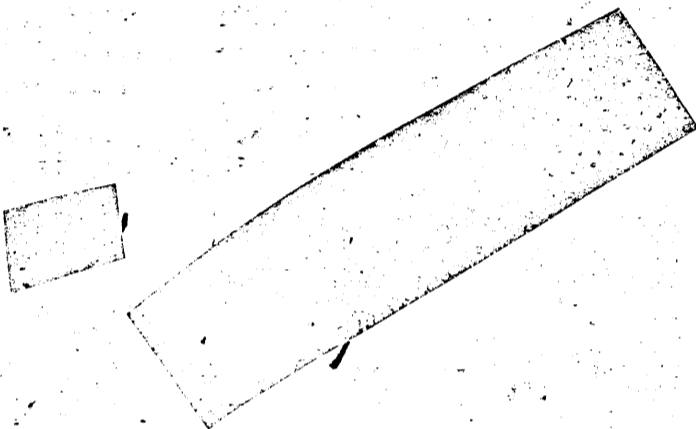

OBSERVATIONS:

In connection with the SI and application of the SI criteria thereto, these criteria are practical and workable provided they are not accepted blindly. The fact that we adhere to the basic principle, namely, is this person potentially dangerous in the event of an emergency, is clearly reflected by the fact that we repeatedly deny requests from the field to remove people from the Index. We are able to do this by liberal interpretation and application of criterion number (4) which places weight on the past activities of a subject and his potential threat arising as a result of such past activities.

ACTION:

We will continue to afford the SI cases careful attention and will continue to critically analyze each such case with respect to addition to, retention in or deletion from the SI. Our plans for implementing the EDP have been, are and will continue to be under constant review to insure the adequacy thereof.

CRITERIA FOR PLACING AND RETAINING NAMES
IN THE SECURITY INDEX

- 1) Subject has had membership or participation in the activities of a basic revolutionary organization within the last 5 years as shown by overt acts or statements established through reliable sources, informants, or individuals.
- 2) Subject has had membership or participation in the affairs of one or more front organizations, which adhere to the policies and doctrines of a revolutionary group, in a leadership capacity or by active substantial participation in the furtherance of the aims or purposes of the front organizations within the last 3 years as shown by overt acts or statements established through reliable sources, informants or individuals.
- 3) Investigation has developed information that an individual, though not a member or a participant in the activities of a subversive organization, has anarchist or revolutionary beliefs and is likely to seize upon the opportunity presented by a national emergency to endanger the public safety as shown by overt acts or statements within the last 3 years established through reliable sources, informants, or individuals.
- 4) Although investigation has failed to establish overt acts or statements on the part of a subject within the time limits set out above, facts have been developed which clearly and unmistakably depict the subject as a dangerous individual who could be expected to commit acts inimical to the national defense and public safety of the U.S. in time of emergency.

My memorandum of today advised concerning the criteria utilized in determining the potential dangerousness of individuals with a view to inclusion of their names in the Security Index (SI). Such memorandum described the critical analysis each case receives before a conclusion is reached as to either addition to or deletion from the SI, noting that the Bureau is in effect the sole judge in these matters since the Department has advised that it is unable to review all these cases. In this connection, requested to be advised as to what review is being made by the Department now.

The SI today contains the names of 1,037 individuals concerning whom the Department has advised us that it has reviewed cases under the criteria being utilized and has approved the inclusion of the names of these individuals in the SI. The Department is continuing its sampling of SI cases and from time to time furnishes us with lists of the cases so reviewed and approved.

The field is advised to submit on September 1 and March 1 of each year the status of the Security Index Report Program.

RECOMMENDATION

Escalate the Security Index Report Program of the field.

DISCUSSION

It is believed that the field has completed the backlog of summary reports accumulated in Security Index Report areas and that the need for summary reports of the status of this program has diminished. The NCA Office in the field has been one of the first to complete for some period of time.

Current practice or rule (include manual citation as well as facts): To obtain the information that could readily be located on reference top sheet, considerable Agent time is expended in searching through files and in many instances several volumes of a file are checked.
Advantages of suggestion:

(1) This form would make readily available, in the least amount of time, pertinent information, thereby eliminating the necessity for Agents to sometimes review voluminous files. (2) The presence of this form as a top sheet would make readily available information many times necessary for use in surveillance activity and investigations. (3) Facilitate handling and current upkeep of the operations of the Security Index system.

SUBJECT: DELINQUENCY IN SECURITY INVESTIGATIONS

SYNOPSIS:

Each month we follow the field closely on the status of security work by analyzing the backlog of pending cases and delinquency in espionage, internal security, security matter and foreign intelligence cases in classifications 65, 100 and 105. Status of these cases as of July 31, 1958, is set forth herein.

In July, there was a decrease in pending active matters in the entire field in the security classifications from 15,246 to 14,295. Delinquent matters decreased from 1,777 to 1,377. The percentage of delinquent matters decreased from 11.7% to 9.6%.

Letters are being sent to the offices indicated by asterisks on pages four and five herein, commenting upon their delinquency and pointing out the necessity of bringing their security cases to a current status.

RECOMMENDATION:

The field will continue to be followed closely regarding security delinquency and you will be advised of the results of the review of the August, 1958, administrative reports.

DETAILS:

The July, 1958, administrative reports from all offices reflect that the total pending active matters in classifications 65, 100 and 105 decreased from 15,246 to 14,295. Delinquent items decreased from 1,777 to 1,377. The percentage of delinquent items decreased from 11.7% to 9.6%.

The following statistics reflect the status of pending work, including both pending active and pending inactive matters, and delinquency for all field divisions for the last four months.

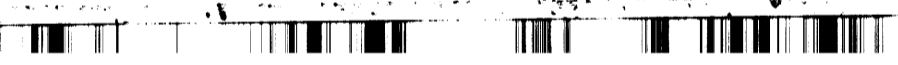

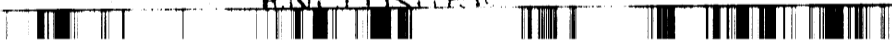

Each month we follow the field closely on the status of security work by analyzing the backlog of pending cases and delinquency in espionage, internal security, security matter and foreign intelligence cases in classifications 65, 100 and 105. Status of these cases as of August 31, 1958, is set forth herein.

In August, there was an increase in pending active matters in the entire field in the security classifications from 14,295 to 14,327. Delinquent matters increased from 1,377 to 1,439. The percentage of delinquent matters increased from 9.6% to 10%.

Letters are being sent to the offices indicated by asterisks on pages four and five herein, commenting upon their delinquency and pointing out the necessity of bringing their security cases to a current status.

RECOMMENDATION:

The field will continue to be followed closely regarding security delinquency and you will be advised of the results of the review of the September, 1958, administrative reports.

DETAILS:

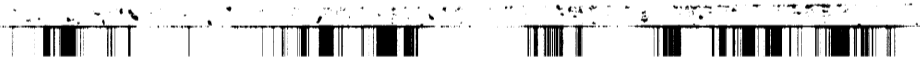

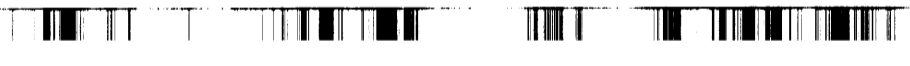

The alphabetical card, since it is to be used only as a control card (M of I - Vol. 3, 87D 6b II), would be made up by the field office at the time the subject is placed on the Security Index. This card would contain only the subject's name, location of geographical card, field office file number, and the word Detcom if so tabbed. (Sample attached.)

- IV. Card on which Security Index cards are printed at the Bureau should be blank, white, 5 x 8 cards.

In order to review any card on the Security Index, it is necessary to remove it from the file drawer.

When an FD-122 is sent making any change on the card, the card is removed from the box in order to type the FD-122 and make temporary notations as to the change.

- II. A colored tab is affixed to each Security Index card designated for Detcom in the alphabetical section to readily identify such subjects. (M of I - Vol. 3, 87D (11) (d) III (B).)
- III. Any time there is any change in information on a Security Index card, a complete set of three cards is furnished to the field office by the Bureau. Field office file numbers must be placed on the cards and the old cards destroyed in both the alphabetical and the geographical sections.
- IV. Security Index cards are now printed on white, 5 x 8 cards, which are blank on one side only. The other side is printed so that a description of the subject can be filled in. This printing is wasted since the M of I - Vol. 3, 87D 4 (k) states that the description and photo should be placed on separate cards from the Security Index cards and then stapled to the Security Index cards.

ADVANTAGES OF SUGGESTION (Continued)

- (b) For review of either photos or names where only fragmentary information, such as initials, sex, race, age, or description is available in Unknown Subject security cases. In many instances a review of the Security Index has aided in identifying subjects. The suggested system would provide a quick method of such a review, often without having to handle each individual card.
- (2) No staples are necessary to secure the descriptive card to the geographical card since the make-up of the Kardex enables them to be secured without staples. At the present the stapling and removing of the staples each time the card is changed not only takes time for a clerical employee who would handle the work in a headquarters city but also valuable agent time for the agent who must handle the emergency set of cards in a resident agency. The staples also tend to cause the cards to catch on to each other and also to damage the top edge of the adjacent card when they are being placed in the box.
- (3) Photographs could be placed on the descriptive cards, which are secured on the reverse side of the Kardex holder, without interfering with the geographical cards because the cards would not be stapled together as they are at the present.
- (4) Descriptions on Security Index cards would be more accessible without having to remove a card from the container.
- (5) Names and field office file numbers of all Security Index subjects would be available without having to handle any of the cards.
- (6) In instances when it would be desired to have a count of Security Index subjects in any field office or in any of the geographical breakdowns of the office, it would be done with greater efficiency.

ADVANTAGES OF SUGGESTION (Continued)

- II. The colored tabs used under the present system can easily be jarred loose from the cards when they are in use or even when being moved into a security locker at the end of a work day. Since the word Detcom itself would be visible on the alphabetical card, there would be no need for the tab and greater accuracy could be achieved.
- III. (1) The number of 5 x 8 cards used in the maintenance of the Security Index would be sharply decreased since the Bureau would only have to furnish two cards instead of three when there were any changes in the information on the cards.
 (2) The card made up by the field office employee at the time the subject is put on the Security Index would remain in the alphabetical section until the subject was either removed from the Security Index or transferred to another division. There would be no necessity of removing the alphabetical card each time the residence and/or employment is changed.
- IV. The over-all cost of maintaining the Security Index would be lowered because the blank cards would be cheaper than those with a printed description form which are now being used.

in that the containers now holding the Security Index cards would be used to house the growing Communist Index, which in many instances would soon necessitate the purchase of new containers.

(K) CHINESE COMMUNIST ACTIVITIES IN THE UNITED STATES - INTERNAL SECURITY - CH - SECURITY INDEX -- Your attention is directed to SAC Letter 55-14 (I) which provided that whenever form FD-122 was submitted recommending Security Index card on a subject of Chinese extraction the words "Other - Chinese" should be shown in the space calling for statement as to his race and that the Chinese extraction should be mentioned specifically in any communication recommending cancellation of Security Index card on any such subject. It further provided that with respect to persons not of Chinese extraction who have shown definite sympathies with Communist China and who were being recommended for the Security Index, the form FD-122 should include under "Miscellaneous" a statement to the effect "sympathetic to Communist China."

The present critical situation in the Far East makes it mandatory that Security Index cards on all subjects within these two categories are appropriately tabbed in order that the subjects may be immediately identified and their names furnished to the Attorney General in the event he decides that special handling of their cases may be dictated by emergency conditions. The tabbing of the cards is dependent upon the inclusion of the phrases "Other - Chinese" and "sympathetic to Communist China" in the forms FD-122 submitted by the field.

You should review the procedures established in your office to assure that the necessary phrasing is being included in all appropriate instances and to assure that it has been included in all such cases on subjects within these two categories who have been recommended for Security Index consideration since the issuance of SAC Letter 55-14. See that all Agents handling cases on subjects of this type are aware of the above provisions and are complying with the instructions. Manual revision is being prepared and will be forwarded in the near future.

SUBJECT: SECURITY INDEX

There are presently 13 Americans, not of Chinese extraction, who are on the Security Index because of their sympathies toward Communist China. By memorandum to the Chinese desk 2/9/55 a special card index was set up on the Chinese desk to permit special attention to these cases in the event of open hostilities arising from the then-existing Formosan crisis. Present critical situation in Far East dictates continued maintenance of a system in order that Security Index subjects having Chinese Communist sympathies may be identified and their names furnished to Department on short notice in the event of an emergency.

Security Index is maintained by use of IBM cards prepared by Statistical Section. A check with that Section has revealed it is feasible to place a special symbol on cards covering above Americans having Chinese Communist sympathies which will permit machine sorting of these cards and preparation of list whenever required. Accordingly, the Statistical Section has placed an arbitrary symbol (the letter K) on Security Index cards relating to the 13 Americans, not of Chinese extraction, who are sympathetic to Communist China and will place this symbol on cards of any future Security Index subjects falling within the same category. The Nationalities Intelligence Section will secure a list of these subjects on or about the 15th day of each month for the purpose of reviewing it as to additions, deletions, and changes in status and will retain each list, until superseded by the next monthly list, on the Chinese desk in order that it will be readily available if required by the Department in event of emergency.

As soon as the first list of subjects in this category is received from the Statistical Section, the special card index being maintained in this connection will be discontinued. Thereafter, Chinese desk supervisors will keep each monthly list up to date until the succeeding monthly list is received by making notes thereon as to any additions or deletions revealed by the daily processing of incoming mail from the field.

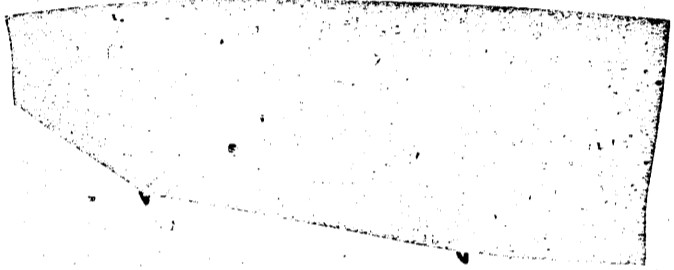
