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

SUBJECTS TRAVELING ABROAD

It is the impression of this office that agents generally, throughout the field, handle travel cases as such and tend to overlook the security matter aspects of these investigations.

It frequently occurs that when a subject is known to travel abroad, the agent to whom the case is assigned immed- nately prepares a letterhead memorandum incorporating the travely information, the highlights of the subversive information available from the file, and a physical description. Washington Field is requested to check for passport information and to submit letterhead memorandum. Once the travel information is resolved, the agent makes a determination as to whether the subject should be interviewed upon his return. In a number of cases, a reason will be furnished for not interviewing the subject and the case closed. In so doing, the agent may technically rely on a provision in 87D of the Manual of Instructions, Page 38, (7) (b) "No security investigation of an individual shall be closed unless the subject is included in the Security Index or consideration given to interviewing him. (Underlining supplied)

In-preparing letterhead memoranda, it is the practice of the field not to state every item of subversive information. For example, if a subject is an active CP member, the agent does not itemize the subject's membership activities in CP fronts. This reasoning carries over to other less important cases. For purpose of brevity, the agent will state the principal subversive information and disregard other. In most of these cases on individuals not on the Security Index or the Reserve Index, no photograph of the subject is immediately available. In view of the celerity accorded the preparation of the initial letterhead memorandum, the agent does not make it a practice to contact security informants. Quite frequently, additional names for

the subject together with the photograph are supplied by WFO. Understandably, but incorrectly, the agent assumes that he is no longer concerned with the security aspects of the case once he has outlined same in the original letterhead memorandum. Indices of other offices where subject has resided are sometimes not checked. These cases are often closed by letter or airtel with a recommendation that the subject not be interviewed. In these situations, the Bureau has not been apprised of all of the subversive information available on the subject and no real effort has been made by the field to develop information that was not immediately available when the case was opened. It is noted that the Manual of Instructions, Section 87D, Page 47, Item (d) provides, "When, at conclusion of investigation, subject's name is not being recommended for Security Index set out a brief summary statement in the cover pages accompanying closing report showing reasons for decision." This instruction applies only to reports. There is no similar instruction pertaining to cases which are closed by means other than report.

the Iron Curtain, it is felt that this travel, when taken into consideration with other subversive information in the file, warrants more investigation than is generally being accorded.

It is, therefore, suggested that the Manual of Instructions be amended to provide that when an individual on whom there is subversive information travels behind the Iron Curtain, an inestigative report incorporating the travel information and a full scale security matter investigation must be submitted to the Bureau.

It may be that this requirement should be limited to I those individuals normally regarded by the CP as youth.

It is suggested also that the Manual of Instructions on Page 38, cited above, be amended to read, "No security investigation shall be closed on a Security Index subject until consideration has been given to interviewing him."

It is also suggested that the Manual citation appearing on Page 47 be amended to read, "When, at the conclusion of investigation, the subject's name is not being recommended for

Reference is made to your letter dated August 16, 1962.

consideration at the Bureau and certain amendments are being made in Section 87D of the Manual of Instructions in efforts to more clearly define the Bureau's responsibilities with respect to investigations of individuals traveling abroad. Specifically, an addition is being made to Item (c), page 33a, outlining the necessity for a full and complete evaluation of all subversive information concerning individuals traveling abroad with a view toward determining whether additional investigation is warranted as well as a specific requirement that comments concerning such be furnished the Bureau in non-Security Index cases when the Bureau is advised of proposed travel of one of these subjects.

The Bureau has carefully considered your recommendation that a full-scale security matter investigation be conducted when an individual on whom there is subversive/information travels behind the iron curtain. It was felt that the adoption of this suggestion would expand to a considerable degree our investigations in this field, noting, for example, that certain organizations such as the "National Guardian" annually organize tours behind the iron curtain with many of the participants being individuals against whom we have nebulous subversive information such as past membership in the International Workers Order. As you are aware, the standards for opening security investigations as set forth on pages 22 and 23 of Section 87D of the Manual of Instructions are broad and offer the field a wide latitude. These standards should be taken into careful consideration with a view toward opening investigation whenever it is determined that a subject with a subversive background intends to travel abroad. It is believed that the amendment referred to above will insure that such is done.

Letter to New York
Re: SECURITY INVESTIGATIONS OF INDIVIDUALS

be amended to provide that no security investigation be closed on a Security Index subject until consideration has been given to interviewing him. The current requirement that all Security Index subjects previously interviewed with Bureau authority be reinterviewed on an annual basis or the Bureau advised of reasons for not reinterviewing the subject was adopted as the result of recommendations made by Conferences in the Spring of 1956. These interviews, as you are aware, may be conducted in most instances under SAC authority. It is recognized that no specific requirement that other Security Index subjects be considered for interview on a periodic basis exists; however, the Manual does state that consideration should be given to interviews with active subversives. This requirement should be borne in mind in connection with all Security Index cases.

In accordance with your recommendation, the Manual is being changed to require a brief summary statement in any communication closing a case listing reasons why a subject's name is not being recommended for the Security Index. This is not being extended to the Reserve Index because of the limited number of Reserve Index A subjects and the fact that action with respect to adding a subject's name to Section B of the Reserve Index is handled solely in the field.

Your observations and suggestions concerning this matter are appreciated.

SUGGESTION

Suggester states that inasmuch as the Bureau is aware of a deleted Security Index (SI) subject's employment at the time of his deletion from the SI, it is felt that the Bureau, at that time, is in a position to determine if a subject warrants inclusion in the Reserve Index (RI) A. It is recommended that in all cases where the subject's employment indicates he warrants inclusion in the RI-A, the Bureau notify the office of origin that the subject has been deleted from the SI, is being placed in the RI-A and the RI-A cards are being forwarded to the office of origin.

Current Practice or Rule

Section 87D, 7,b, (10), (g), II and III, Manual of Instructions, (Page 62) requires that upon deletion of a subject from the SI, based solery on the application of SI criteria, his SI card containing descriptive data be retained and filed in the RI. At this time, consideration is to be given as to whether subject should be included in the RI-A, and if so, a FD 122a is to be submitted to the Bureau.

Claimed Advantages

eliminate the necessity of the preparation of the FD 122a by the office of origin and thus result in a saving of agent and stenographic time as well as resulting in more expeditious handling of these cases. A FD/122a must receive Bureau approval. It would seem feasible to have the subject's RI status determined at the Bureau at the time of subject's deletion from the SI. It would appear that this would result in a considerable saving of time at the Seat of Government.

Recommendation of Special Agent in Charge

Special Agent in Charge states that suggestion would result in a saving of agent and stenographic time and is worthy of consideration.

VIEWS OF STREAMLINING COMMITTEE, DOMESTIC INTELLIGENCE DIVISION

The matters dealt with by this suggestion are the exclusive responsibility of the Subversive Control Section and, therefore, there are being set forth below the views and recommendations of that Section in which the Streamlining Committee of the Domestic Intelligence Division concurs.

Background

The suggestion pertains to Section A of the RI. The RI is comprised of individuals with subversive backgrounds not meeting the SI criteria but who in a time of national emergency are in a position to influence others against the national interest. The RI is broken down into two sections, A and B, with A containing the names of those individuals who in time of national emergency are in a position to influence others against the national interest or are likely to furnish material financial aid to subversive elements due to their subversive associates and ideology.

Reasons for Recommendation Against Adoption of Suggestion

- (1) It would place the entire responsibility of determining whether an individual should be included in RI-A upon the Bureau in those instances in which the SI card is being cancelled. This is a function and responsibility of the office of origin and should be handled by that office.
- (2) The office of origin is in possession of the complete and entire file on its security subject and is in a better position to determine the influence of an individual with subversive ideologies. The agent to whom the case is assigned in the field is familiar with many minor details of the subject's activities which are not available in Bureau files and, therefore, is in a better position to make a recommendation with respect to RI-A status. There would be instances in which a review of the Bureau file would not necessarily indicate that a subject's name should be included in Section A as opposed to Section B. For example, one criterion deals with "other potentially influential persons on a local or national level." The field division being familiar with a particular community or the activities of a subject in social or civic organizations and having more detailed information in its files concerning the subject's activities would be in a better position to assess an individual's capability to possibly influence numerous individuals in the event of a national emergency.

- (3) This suggestion would increase the work at the Bureau by requiring the preparation of a letter to the field whenever a subject's name is being deleted from the SI advising of the Bureau's decision with respect to his RI status. At this time field recommendations for SI cancellation are handled by the return of a copy of the field letter stamped "Security Index card cancelled."
- (4) The adoption of the suggestion would make more cumbersome the mechanical procedures involved in deleting a subject's name from the SI and/or placing his name in RI-A.

It is currently the practice in many of the field offices to submit a Form FD 122a recommending the inclusion of the subject's name in the RI-A concurrent with the submission of a recommendation that the subject's name be deleted from the SI. This facilitates the handling of the matter and involves very little additional effort on the part of the field in the preparation of Form FD 122a.

Alternate Suggestion

As an alternate suggestion it is proposed to make it a requirement that the field submit Form FD 122a whenever it recommends the cancellation of an SI card and the facts in the case indicate that his name should be included in Section A of the RI.

RECOMMENDATIONS:

(1) That the suggestion as stated not be adopted.

(2) That the alternate proposal set out above be adopted. If you agree there is attached a proposed manual change.

ADDENDUM OF TRAINING AND INSPECTION DIVISION,

8/30/62

Training and Inspection Division concurs with Domestic Intelligence Division in recommending against adoption of this suggestion. A basic rule of our operations fixes the responsibility for the investigation and administration of a case upon the Agent to whom the case is assigned in the office of origin. This suggestion deviates from this rule in that suggester proposes that a determination should be made at Seat of Government rather than by office of origin as to whether an individual deleted from SI is to be placed in the RI-A. The office of origin is in a much better position to make this determination than is the Seat of Government.

RECOMMENDATIONS:

1. That this suggestion not be adopted. On approval, no further action is necessary with regard to the suggester as he was thanked by prior letter.

2. As a means of facilitating the procedure decided by the Domestic Intelligence Division with regard to the handling of individuals considered for inclusion in the RI-A, it is recommended that the attached manual revision: be approved.

We presently require the field to promptly advise us upon receipt of any information indicating that a subject of security interest is traveling abroad or intends to travel abroad in order that such information may be brought to the attention of the State Department, the Central Intelligence Agency and appropriate Legal Attaches.

New York letter of August 16, 1962 (attached), suggests that in the case of individuals not on the Security Index (SI) or Reserve Index, the Agents in attempting to immediately comply with Bureau instructions concerning notification of proposed travel and in furnishing a summary of the subversive information against the individual may be overlooking the security aspects of the case once the appropriate communication has been directed to the Bureau concerning the proposed travel. New York notes that these cases are often closed by letter or airtel with a recommendation that the subject not be interviewed.

New York suggests that the Manual of Instructions be amended to provide that when an individual on whom there is subversive information travels behind the iron curtain, an investigative report incorporating the travel information and the full-scale security matter investigation be submitted to the Bureau.

OBSERVATIONS:

Outright adoption of this suggestion would expand to a considerable degree our investigations in this field. For example, whe "National Guardian" annually organizes tours behind the iron curtain and many of the participants are individuals against whom we have nebulous subversive information such as past membership in the International Workers Order. This would expand our standards for opening cases in the security field which are not out in detail in the Manual. To insure, however, that Agents handling these matters

do not "overlook" cases in which we should conduct complete investigations, it is proposed to make a Manual change requiring the field prior to closing one of these cases to advise specifically whether further investigation is warranted or is being conducted on the basis of available facts.

New York suggests that the Manual of Instructions be changed to read: "No security investigation shall be closed on a Security Index subject until consideration has been given to interviewing him."

OBSERVATIONS:

It has been a requirement since June 18, 1956, that the field reinterview all Security Index subjects previously interviewed with Bureau authority prior to the submission of annual reports or set forth a statement in the cover pages to the report outlining the specific reasons why an interview was not being conducted. These interviews are conducted under SAC authority. While there is no specific requirement that other Security Index subjects be considered for an interview on a annual basis or the Bureau advised of reasons why such is not done, the manual does state that consideration should be given to interviews with selected individuals active in subversive organizations for development of additional informants. It is not believed that New York's suggestion with respect to the change should be adopted.

New York notes that the Manual now provides that "When at conclusion of investigation subject's name is not being recommended for Security Index. set out a brief summary statement in the cover pages accompanying closing report showing reasons for decision." New York notes that this instruction applies only to reports and suggests that it be broadened to include cases which are closed by means other than reports.

OBSERVATIONS:

The adoption of this suggestion would insure that the appropriate attention had been given by the field as to whether the facts in the case warrant Security Index consideration and its adoption is recommended.

DELINQUENCY IN SECURITY INVESTIGATIONS

SYNOPSIS:

Each month we follow the field closely on the status of security work by analyzing the backlog of pending cases and delinquency in espionage, internal security, security matter and foreign intelligence cases in classifications 65, 100 and 105. Status of these cases as of August 31, 1962, is set forth below.

In August, there was a decrease in pending active matters in the entire field in the security classifications from 18,718 to 18,542. Delinquent matters decreased from 1,679 to 1,516. The percentage of delinquent matters decreased from 8.9% to 8.1%.

Letters are being sent to the offices indicated by asterisks on page four herein, commenting on their delinquency and pointing out the necessity of bringing their security cases to a current status.

RECOMMENDATION:

The field will continue to be followed closely regarding security delinquency and you will be advised of the results of the review of the September, 1962, administrative reports.



CUBAN EMERGENCY PLANS , INTERNAL SECURITY - CUBA

This memorandum is in response to the Director's inquiry as to what study and plans have been developed regarding handling of the Cuban problem in case of hostilities with Cuba. We have specific programs covering such eventuality.

By SAC Letter 60-54, dated 11/22/60, we established a special program to keep track of dangerous individuals of pro-Castro affiliations, activities or sympathies. Such persons are placed on our Security Index. and, as of 9/24/62, 57 individuals (including 13 Cuban aliens) were so included. In addition, we have specially tabbed 162 other individuals, included. In addition, we have specially tabbed 162 other individuals, such as communists, et cetera, who are on the Security Index but who also such as communists, et cetera, who are on the Security Index but who also have shown pro-Cuban sympathies. Thus, we can immediately segregate a total of 219 individuals who are considered dangerous, who are actively or sympathetically avowing the cause of Castro.

Upon notification by the Department of State, Bureau Agents, together with a State Department official, would proceed to the United Nations and take these Cuban officials into protective custody. As of 9/1/62 there were seven Cuban officials and four dependents at the Cuban Mission. These officials would then be taken to their residences, where they would pack such belongings as they could carry and would be taken to a detention center designated by the State Department. Following the initial pickup by Bureau Agents, they would be turned over to Immigration and Naturalization Service agents for transport to the detention center and handling thereafter.

The present Attorney General has been advised of all phases of our Security Index program and the program to place officials of enemy onations in protective custody. By letter 2/1/62 the Attorney General was advised that Cuba was included with the Soviet-bloc nations under the possible internment program. We have not, however, specifically raised the question with the Attorney General as to action to be taken against Cuban efficials and other pro Cuban individuals considered dangerous in the event of hostilities with Cuba alone.

RECOMMENDATION: SI subjects sympathetic to communist China.

It is recommended we send a brief note to the Attorney General, specifically pointing out that, in the event of hostilities with Cuba, we have presently 219 pro-Cuban dangerous individuals on the Security Index; that 20 of these are aliens and could be apprehended on the basis of deportation warrants; that the remainder would be placed under close observation by the FBI; and that we would be prepared to place Cuban officials and their dependents in protective custody upon proper instructions from the Department of State. A letter to the Attorney General along these lines is attached for your approval.

Buckground

There are two categories of pro-Castro Security Index subjects concerning whom we would take appropriate action in case of Cuban emergency:

- (A) Individuals placed on Security Index solely on basis of their pro-Castro activities, connections, or sympathics;
- (B) Individuals placed on Security Index for other reasons (such as members of Communist Party) who, by reason of pro-Castro activities, are considered dangerous in event of hostilities with Cuba and who are tabled "Pro-Cuban."

Standards for including an individual on the Security Index bised on pro-Captro activities or tabbing a Security Index subject as "Pro-Cubin" were set forth in SAC Letter 60-54 dated 11-20-30 (memorandum 11-15-30 attached). These criteria call for the inclusion of persons and are clearly shown to be potentially dangerous based on a substantial showing of data within following standards:

- (A) Leadership or prominent activities in pro-Castro group plus one or more of following activities in behalf of Castro regime; preparing or distributing propaganda, collecting funds, acts of violence, sutchligence activity;
- (D) Overt acts or statements establishing reasonable grounds for believing individual's loyalty would lie with Cuba in case of war.

In connection with individuals recommended for addition to Security Index, there must be a clear showing that there has been a continuing sympathy for aims and objectives of Cuban Covernment since 10-1-This date has with lifeaut since, at that time, the Cuban Covernment had clearly and openly identified itself as being procommunist, pro-societ bloc and anti-united States.

Results of Positive Action Taken

in the United States has substantially neutralized organized activity on behalf of the present Cuban regime. We have caused Fair Play for Cuba Committee (FPCC) and July 25th Movement leaders to be brought before Grand Juries, have conducted widespread and penetrating interviews of their members, and have heavily infiltrated informants into their ranks. The FPCC was recently described to our Agents as merely a "translation bureau" by its erstwhile leader, Richard Gibson, who has since gone to live in Algeria. Only two of six top July 26th Movement leaders have not fled to Cuba; one of the two is an informant and the other is at complete odds with the small following left. In addition, a substantial number of the other rabid Castro supporters have decided it is too hot here and returned to Cuba.

Recommended Action

The effectiveness of the steps taken has undoubtedly silenced some of the Cubans here who remain basically in sympathy with Castro's aims. In view of this and in the face of the mounting Cuban crisis, we have carefully reappraised our Security Index standards and believe the following steps will prepare us for the special handling and isolation of others who may be threats to our security in the event of an emergency.

- (1) Regarding individuals placed on Security Index solely by reason of pro-Castro activities, it is believed we should add an additional category; namely, Cuban nationals who, since 10-1-60, have by their statements or activities (verified by investigation) evidenced support of Castro or a communist regime in Cuba. We would be dealing here with persons who would be enemy aliens in the event of war with Cuba.
- (2) Regarding the tabbing of current Security Index subjects as "Pro-Cuban," it is recognized that, as a practical matter, the over-whelming majority of the 11,243 (as of 9-14-62) subjects on the Security Index are pro-Cuban in outlook. Hembers of the Communist Party, the Socialist Workers Party or the Nationalist Party of Puerto Rico, for example, would obviously be sympathotic towards the revolutionary, communist and anti-American Castro regime, but it is not proposed that we tab all such individuals as "Pro-Cuban." To do so would in effect mean invoking the entire Emergency Detention Program in connection with a Cuban emergency.

What we propose to do is instruct the field that during their required review of cases on Security Index subjects (approximately 1000 are reviewed each month) they must consider recommending for pro-Cuban

tabbing all subjects who have in any manner demonstrated strong sympathy towards the Castro regime and who, by reason of their background, employment or activities, would pose a threat of sabotage or other disruptive activities in the event of Cuban hostilities.

Upon approval, we will promptly advise the Attorney General and the Internal Security Division of the Department of our revised standards.

Each month we follow the field closely on the status of security work by analyzing the backlog of pending cases and delinquency in espionage. internal security, security matter and foreign intelligence cases in classifications 65, 100 and 105. Status of these cases as of September 30, 1962, is set forth below.

In September, there was an increase in pending active matters in the entire field in the security classifications from 18,542 to 18,927. Delinquent matters increased from 1,516 to 1,638. The percentage of delinquent matters increased from 8.1% to 8.6%.

Letters are being sent to the offices indicated by asterisks on page four herein, commenting on their delinquency and pointing out the necessity of bringing their security cases to a current status.

RECOMMENDATION:

10/2/62 advised that Manual changes would be submitted in connection with setting up new standards for inclusion of certain Cuban nationals on Security Index. Standards for placing pro-Castro individuals on Security Index and Criteria for placing pro-Castro individuals on Security Index and tabbing others on Index as pro-Caban have been furnished to field tabbing others 60-54 and 62-55. These Manual changes have been in SAC letters 60-54 and 62-55. These Manual changes have been prepared and pertinent data set forth in above-mentioned SAC letters are incorporated therein. are incorporated therein.

RECOMMENDATION:

If you approve, attached changes will be made to Section 87 D, Volume III, Manual of Instructions.

PROPOSED CHANGES IN MANUAL OF INSTRUCTIONS

Section 87 D, Volume III, should be changed as follows. Changes and additions are underscored:

- Page 45. Following should be inserted as II and III under paragraph (3) (a). Present paragraph II of (3) (a) should be changed from II to IV.
- Careful consideration should be given to recommending for inclusion in the Security Undex those individuals who in the light of the clear identification of the Cuban Covernment as procommunist, pro-Soviet Ploc and anti-United States, would be deemed dangerous or potentially dangerous to the internal security of the U.S. in the event of an emergency involving Cuba and the U.S. In connection therewith, there should be a substantial showing of data within the following standards:
 - An individual has served as a leader or officer or has substantially participated in the activities of a pro-Castro organization and has engaged in activities which have included either the preparation or distribution of pro-Cuban or anti-U. S. propaganda; the active collection of funds for any agency or representative of the Cuban Government or for a pro-Castro group, which runds are not intended for the relief of human suffering or other charitable purposes; active participation in acts of violence against anti-Castro individuals or groups or against the United States; or the active collection of intelligence data regarding the national defense of the United States or which would serve the purposes of the Cuban Government as opposed to the interests of the United States, where there are reasonable grounds to believe that such data is to be or has been conveyed to any agency or representative of the Cuban Government.
 - (B) An individual, whether he has participated in organizational activity or not, has engaged in one or more activities specified in (A) above and it has been clearly established, by overt acts or statements or other evidence, that there are reasonable grounds to believe the loyalty of the individual would lie with the Cuban Government in the event of armed conflict between the Cuban Government and the United States.

Attached to the Form FD-122 should be an additional page containing a concise summary of facts which prompt the recommendation for this tabbing. These instructions in no way affect the character of cases under which subjects are currently being investigated. Security index cards sent to the field on such subjects will contain the capital letter "C" on the left side of the card at the beginning of the second line. These cards should not be kept in the "Cuban" Special Section of the Index and those cards should be tabbed with a metal tab as mentioned in paragraph (11) (e) 1., page 64, under tabbing of cards.

Line 4 of paragraph III., page 52, Section 87 D, should be changed to read as follows:

In recognition of the mounting tension between Cuba and the United States, additional standards for placing individuals on the Security Index based solely on their pro-Castro activities and sympathies have been established to complement the standards outlined in SAC letter 60-54.

For example, those with certain specialized military training, those employed at key facilities, and those who have received training in police work or the use of explosives would warrant special consideration. FD-122 with succinct summary should accompany the annual report in each case where "pro-Cuban" tabbing is believed warranted.

We forward to the field quarterly an alphabetical list of each office's Security Index (SI) in order that the SI cards maintained in the field may be checked and reconciled with Bureau records. The next list is due to be forwarded to the field following the running thereof by the Statistical Section October 15, 1962.

In conjunction with the reconciliation of the field's SI with Bureau records, we propose to again conduct a survey to classify each SI subject by occupation and type of product manufactured or service rendered. Previous surveys conducted along these lines were in October, 1953, and August, 1959. Periodic surveys of this type have proved valuable in affording us overall data regarding the concentration of dangerous subversion in the various phases of the industrial and economic life of the country. Through this data we are able to analyze the present penetration of communists in various occupational fields such as the teaching profession, the medical and legal professions, heavy industry, unions, et cetera. In the past we have found this type of information useful in our planning and programs.

This can be done at this time with little additional effort on the field's part.

ACTION:

If you agree, the occupational survey will be conducted in conjunction with the reconciliation of field records with Bureau records and appropriate instructions will be issued the field following running of the October 15, 1962, SI list.

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SUBVERSIVE CONTROL SECTION PROGRAMS AND ACCOUPLISHMENTS

Set out below is a brief resume of the programs and accomplishments of the Subversive Control Section covering the period October 10, 1961, to August 31, 1962.

Security Index (SI) maintained in current status. The names of 11,200 individuals contained in the SI as of August 31, 1962.

Reserve Index (RI) established in June, 1960. There are 1014 names included in Section A of the RI representing those individuals who are in a position to influence others against the national interests in time of an emergency and who should receive priority attention following apprehension of SI subjects. RI A cards maintained in up-to-mate status at the Bureau and in the field. Cases reviewed annually. Following recommendations of the Internal Security-Espionage Conference June 29,1962, a review of RI B cases was initiated to be completed over a one year period.

Dissemination responsibilities closely supervised to insure adequate discharge or our responsibilities. As example of the importance of prompt dissemination of information, of interest to other Government agencies, information was recently developed indicating that the son, of a subject of a security investigation had received an appointment at the Naval Academy at Annapolis. The results of our investigation were promptly furnished the Navy and the appointment was subsequently canceled.

Requests for informants for possible appearance as witnesses at various types of ackinistrative hearings conducted by other Government agencies in connection with their security programs continues at a high level. During the above period we have made available to other Government agencies the identities of 176 potential witnesses.

PERIODIC REPORTS PROGRAM

1. Origin

Annual reports in Security Index (SI) cases have been required since completion of the Summary Report Program 7-14-54 (New York Office 5-1-56). In certain type cases periodic reports were required at specified intervals for many years prior to 1954; i.e. key figures, top functionaries.

2. Purpose

To insure that current information is available to the Bureau in report form in order to keep the Bureau, as well as the Department, advised of the status of SI cases and in order to discharge our responsibilities of dissemination to other interested agencies in the executive branch of the Government.

3. "Scope

All offices participate in this program.

4. Tie In with Other Programs

Closely related to the Emergency Detention Program, which deals with plans for the apprehension and detention of potentially dangerous individuals in time of an emergency.

5. Case Load

As of 10-15-62 there were 11,195 SI subjects, each requiring at least one report a year. Some of these cases require more frequent reports; namely (a) top functionaries, quarterly reports. There are 35 individuals considered as "top Functionaries." They represent the

highest degree of leadership in subversive organizations and their activities are constantly being followed. (b) Key figures - semiannual reports required in key figure cases presently numbering 557. These individuals represent leadership in subversive organizations on regional, district and state levels and we follow their activities closely.

6. Magnitude

This is a major program as evidenced by the fact that in all SI cases investigations must be brought up to date and reports submitted at specified intervals on all SI subjects. Under this program there would be approximately 12,000 separate reports submitted annually. This does not include investigations and reports on individuals currently being nominated for the SI.

7 Administrative Controls

Each Supervisor handling security matter cases utilizes a tickler system to insure that reports are submitted when due by the field.

8. Adequacy and Currentness of Instructions

Instructions dealing with this program are found in Section 87D of the Manual of Instructions. This Section of the Manual is up to date.

9. Over-all Value

When information is developed clearly indicating that a subject no longer should be scheduled for apprehension, prompt action is taken to remove his name from the SI. SYNOPSIS:

Each month we follow the field closely on the status of security work by analyzing the backles of pending cases and delinquency in espionage, internal security, security matter and foreign intelligence cases in classifications 65, 100 and 105. Status of these cases as of October 31, 1962, is set forth below.

In October, there was an increase in pending active matters in the entire field in the security classifications from 18,927 to 20,314. Delinquent matters decreased from 1,638 to 1,287. The percentage of delinquent matters decreased from 8.6% to 6.3%.

Letters are being sent to the offices indicated by asterisks on page four herein, commenting on their delinquency and pointing out the necessity of bringing their security cases to a current status.

RECOMMENDATION:

The field will continue to be followed closely regarding security delinquency and you will be advised of the results of the review of the November, 1962, administrative reports.

SECURITY INVESTIGATIONS OF INDIVIDUALS

SYNOPSIS

Bureau responsibility in this field originated with Presidential Directives, the first one in September, 1939. Purpose is to identify potentially dangerous individuals who are affiliated with subversive movements. This program is field wide and is closely related to the Emergency Detention Program, which involves plans for the apprehension and detention of potentially dangerous individuals in the event of an emergency.

From November, 1961, through October, 1962, there was an average of 19,179 pending active cases in classifications 65, 100 and 105. This Section's principal case load falls within the 100 classification and during the same period averaged 9,269 cases per month. Instructions are up to date and administrative controls exercised over the field by tickler system.

Other programs arise from security investigations of individuals and include interviews with subversives. We consider an interview in each case. The Security Index contains 11,195 names as of October 15, 1962. An average of 10 Fraud Against the Government cases per month have been opened since November, 1961. Requests for availability of witnesses from Coast Guard and Defense continue high. The identities of 220 potential witnesses were made available during the period October 16, 1961, through October 31, 1962.

DETAILS

1. Origin

Presidential Directives, the initial one being issued in September, 1939, and since repeated on several occasions. These Directives charge the Bureau with the responsibility for investigation of individuals in the internal security field. It is the collecting

agency of the entire executive branch for subversive information and has the responsibility of seeing that such information is distributed to those Government agencies having a legitimate interest therein.

2. Purpose

That identification and investigation of individuals who, because of affiliation with subversive organizations, may present a potential threat to the internal security in the event of an emergency and the development of evidence of violations of Federal statutes on the part of these individuals. If, during the course of a security investigation, it is determined that a subject does pose a potential threat to the internal security, he is scheduled for apprehension under the Emergency Detention Program by the inclusion of his name in the Security Index.

3. Scope

Field wide.

4. Tie In With Other Programs

Closely related is the Emergency Detention Program which deals with plans for the handling of individuals/included in the Security Index in the event of all emergency. Also closely related are the various security programs of other Government agencies, such programs depending to a large extent on information developed by us and disseminated to such agencies.

5. Case Load

Basically, these cases fall in security classifications 65, 100 and 105. During the period November, 1961, through October, 1962, the average field case load in these classifications was 19,179 pending active matters.

The Subversive Control Section is primarily responsible for investigations of individuals under the 100 classification although we do have cases on individuals under the 105 classification, such as the affiliates of the Nationalist Party of Puerto Rico. During the 12: months' period November, 1961, through October, 1962, there was a

monthly average of 9,269 pending active matters in classification 100 throughout the field.

6. Magnitude

This program is major from the standpoint of costs and man power and, as such, is referred to in the budget material.

7. Past or Present Weaknesses

Close attention is given the entire operations in this field in efforts to insure that we are fully discharging our responsibilities thereunder. Instructions are issued the field as needed and during the past year appropriate instructions have been issued dealing with the passport and employment sanctions as they pertain to Communist Party members provided by the Internal Security Act of 1950.

8. Administrative Controls

The field is followed closely on its over-all delinquency in the three security classifications mentioned previously. This is handled on a monthly basis. In addition, we follow the field by tickler on pending matters in the field of which we have knowledge and we follow the field for submission of periodic reports in Security Index cases to insure that such are submitted when due.

9. Adequacy and Currentness of Instructions

Instructions dealing with security investigations of individuals are contained in Section 87D of the Manual of Instructions and are in a current status.

10. Over-all Value

Determination of identities of individuals who should be apprehended in the event of an emergency in order to minimize possibilities of espionage, sabotage and subversion. Dissemination of information of intelligence value to other Government agencies concerning individuals and matters in which they have a legitimate interest. Budget purposes.

OTHER PROGRAMS ENCOMPASSED IN AND/OR ARISING OUT OF SECURITY INVESTIGATIONS OF INDIVIDUALS

SECURITY INDEX

As noted previously herein, one of the purposes of security investigations is to determine the identities of individuals who, because of affiliation with subversive organizations, may be considered a potential threat to the internal security in the event of an emergency. When such information is developed, the name of the individual concerned is included in the Security Index.

We presently have included in the Security Index names of 11,195 (as of October 15, 1962) individuals. Each Security Index case is thoroughly re-evaluated at least once annually at the Dureau and in the field to insure that the cases are sound in every respect should it be necessary to invoke the Emergency Detention Program. If it is found that the subject's activities no longer justify the retention of his name in the Security Index, immediate steps are taken to insure that his name is removed therefrom.

RESERVE INDEX

In June, 1960, the then Communist Index, maintained only in the field, was renamed the Reserve Index and a program of bringing the cases of individuals whose names were included therein up to date was instituted. We broke the Reserve Index into Section A and Section B. Section A contains a list of individuals who should receive priority consideration from the standpoint of investigation, interrogation or other action following implementation of the Emergency Detention Program. Section A cards are maintained at the Sear of Government and in the field. These cases are reviewed on an annual basis and brought up to date. We presently have included in

Section A of the Reserve Index the names of 1,047 (as of November 8, 1962) individuals. Section B cards are maintained only in the field.

Following recommendations of the Internal Security-Espionage Conference of May, 1962, a review of Section B Reserve Index subjects was undertaken on a field-wide basis, this review to be completed within one year.

DISSEMINATION - INCLUDING CHECKS FOR AVAILABILITY OF INFORMANTS AND SOURCES

Security reports are disseminated to numerous interested agencies throughout the executive branch of the Government. By far the vast majority of such reports received are disseminated outside the Bureau. The responsibility of such dissemination necessitates careful and thorough evaluation of each report to assure that it is absolutely accurate both in form and content.

We are continuing to receive a heavy volume of requests from various departments of the executive branch of the Government for the availability of witnesses appearing in reports previously disseminated for appearance at hearings being conducted by such agencies as the Department of Defense and United States Coast Guard in efforts to remove subversives from access to classified data and/or restricted areas.

During the period October 16, 1961, through October 31, 1962, the identities of 220 potential witnesses were made available to these agencies for possible utilization at hearings.

CUBAN EMERGENCY PLANS INTERNAL SECURITY - CUBA

This memorandum sets forth Bureau's position regarding apprehension of Cuban aliens on the Security Index in case of a limited emergency. In view of Department's ruling that Immigration and Naturalization Service (IMS) must participate in apprehension of these aliens (as they are required to serve orders to show cause), we are leaving matter of apprehension entirely up to IMS. Letter to this effect is being sent to the Attorney General and appropriate instructions are being issued to field.

By way of background, we wrote Attorney General on 10/18/62 concerning Cuban aliens on Security Index. We pointed out that in case of conflict with Cuba, activities of these individuals could be neutralized by their arrest on deportation warrants. We propose this be handled in same fashion as planned arrest of dangerous Chinese aliens during 1955 Formosan crisis; namely, that warrants be issued by Attorney General and served by Bureau Agents and that subjects arrested then be held for subsequent AS action.

Assistant Attorney General of Anternal Security
Division later advised that current HIS regulations (base | on
court rulingssince Formosan crisis) require that orders to show
cause be served on aliens by HIS officer at same time or prior to
service of deportation warrants. Yeagley proposed that undated
warrants and orders to show cause be issued now by HIS District
Directors and, when occasion demands, that apprehensions be made
jointly by HIS and Bureau Agents. He inquired whether we would
agree to this procedure. On Director's instructions was
told we preferred not to comment on this proposal and were leaving
it up to Department. Department thereafter arranged to have HIS
Headquarters issue instructions to HIS District Directors for
issuance of undated warrants and orders to show cause for those
Cuban aliens now on Security Index.

Director commented that since we had no authority, we should leave apprehensions up to INS.

We are, therefore, advising Attorney General that in view of advice received from it is felt apprehensions should be handled entirely by IMS. We will, of course, continue to the roughly investigate pro-Castro Cuban aliens and, where appropriate, add them to the Security Index. We will also continue to promptly furnish IMS with copies of our reports in these cases so that IMS will have the benefit of all our investigation in case this program is invoked and IMS is ordered to undertake the apprehensions.

Reference is made to my letter dated September 26, 1962, which concerned our program with regard to Cuba in the event of hostilities with that country.

Enclosed is a memorandum setting forth the names, home and business addresses of those Cuban aliens presently carried on the Security Index. In the event of conflict with Cuba, the activities of these individuals could be quickly neutralized by their being taken into custody on the basis of deportation warrants of arrest. With regard to such action, your attention is directed to a memorandum from the Office of Legal Counsel addressed to the Attorney General dated. February 7, 1935, and captioned "Chinese Communist Activities in the United States, Internal Security - Ch." This document sets forth the basis for the issuance of deportation warrants of arrest that call for the apprehension of dangerous aliens during a period of limited emergency. Warrants of this type which were issued by Ar.

General, on February 11, 1955, called for the arrest of Chinese aliens listed on the Security Index. This action took place during the Formosan crisis which involved the United States and Communist China.

The warrants executed by Mr. were delivered to this Bureau and plans at the time called for the warrants to be served by Special Agents of this Bureau in the event of hostilities between the United States and Communist China. The individuals named in the warrants were to be taken into custody and held in a Federally approved jail for subsequent action by the Immigration and Naturalization Service (INS).

In view of the rapid deterioration of the Cuban situation, it is requested that deportation warrants of arrest be executed for those named in the attached list and that such warrants be forwarded to this bureau for service in the event of hostilities between United States and Cuba in accordance with the procedures devised during the Formosan crisis.

We presently have included in the Security Index a group of individuals scheduled to receive priority attention in the event the Emergency Detention Program is invoked. Specific criteria is utilized in so scheduling these subjects and is based upon the degree of threat represented by the continued liberty of these individuals in time of emergency. These are referred to as "Detcom" subjects.

My memorandum of October 14, 1958, recommended that the field be required to state in the cover pages to incoming reports whether a subject's Security Index card is or is not tabbed Detcom and whether the subject's activities do or do not warrant such tabbing. It was further recommended that Form FD-305, which is utilized in Security Index cases as the last page of cover pages to reports to record certain administrative data, be amended to provide for merely checking blocks with respect to Detcom tabbing. The field was subsequently advised of the existence of these forms but was told that the forms should not be ordered until existing supplies were depicted.

During the course of the recently completed inspection of this Division, the Inspector noted that some offices continue to use the old FD-305 and that in some instances fail to make observations thereon concerning a subject's Detcom status. The Inspector suggested that the necessity of commenting upon this matter in cover pages to Security Index reports be reiterated to the field by SAC Letter.

SYNOPSIS:

Each month we follow the field closely on the status of security work by analyzing the backlog of pending cases and delinquency in espionage, internal security, security matter and foreign intelligence cases in classifications 65, 100 and 105. Status of these cases as of November 30, 1962, is set forth below.

In November, there was a decrease in pending active matters in the entire field in the security classifications from 20,314 to 18,253. Delinquent matters increased from 1,287 to 1,435. The percentage of delinquent matters increased from 6.3% to 7.8%.

Letters are being sent to the offices indicated by asterisks on page four herein, commenting on their delinquency and pointing out the necessity of bringing their security cases to a current status.

RECOMMENDATION:

The field will continue to be followed closely regarding security delinquency and you will be advised of the results of the review of the December, 1962, administrative reports.

DETAILS:

The November, 1962, administrative reports from all offices indicate that the total pending active matters in classifications 65, 100 and 105 decreased from 20,314 to 18,253. Delinquent items increased from 1,287 to 1,435. The percentage of delinquent itmes increased from 6.3% to 7.8%.

Intelligence Division, the Inspector suggested that consideration be given to the elimination of the 5 x 8 card index system maintained in the Subversive Control Section and at Quantico consisting of subjects' names who are included in the Security Index and Reserve Index-A and the substitution therefor of a detailed listing of the identities of these individuals by the Statistical Section on a monthly basis or on a more frequent basis if necessary. In suggesting this, the Inspector expressed the opinion that the elimination of these indices should result in a reduction of clerical personnel in this Division and possibly at Quantico.

The Security Index is the heart of our Internal Security Program. It encompasses a list of individuals subject to summary apprehension and detention in time of an emergency without recourse to courts. It must be entirely accurate at all times because of the above factor and meticulous attention is afforded this Index in efforts to assure that it is accurate and truely represents a list of individuals presenting a potential threat to the internal security of the Nation. The present card index system for this index has for many years proven to be entirely feasible, workable, and easily maintained in an up-to-date status on a day-to-day basis. The same is true of the keserve Index-A which represents a group of individuals who should receive priority attention with respect to investigation, interrogation or other action following apprehension of Security Index subjects. 28

The set of Security Index cards and Reserve Index-A cards maintained at Quantico represent the only complete set outside of Washington, D. C., and were placed there for emergency use should under enemy action the Security Index at the Seat of Government be destroyed. It also represents a backup of field Security Index cards should they be destroyed by enemy action, and under such circumstances would be the sole guide of individuals to be apprehended under the Emergency Detention Program. The Executives Conference on August 10, 1954; September 13, 1954; and January 25, 1956, considered the question as to whether copies of reports on Security Index subjects should be stored at Quantico. It was concluded that the

cost and time involved would not be warranted as from an operational standpoint, the Security Index cards maintained there would permit the necessary action to safeguard the internal security of the country in the event of an emergency. For these reasons it would be absolutely essential to continue to keep this index in an up-to-date status on a day-to-day basis.

I feel that the elimination of the above indices and the substitution therefor of a monthly or even more frequent listing of Security Index and Reserve Index-A subjects by the Statistical Section is neither feasible, desirable, nor conducive to easy management, nor would enable a reduction in clerical personnel for the following reasons:

- 1. As the Inspector has noted, elimination of the card indices and substitution of lists therefor would require a supplemental record of changes not incorporated in the list. During the past year, monthly changes in these indices have approximated 1,050. Considerable clerical efforts would be involved in the Division in maintaining a supplemental record from month to month in sufficient detail as to readily identify any particular change made during the month. Further, to establish an absolutely accurate list at any given time, it would be necessary to suspend operations both in the Division and in the Statistical Section until all changes on hand at a given time had been processed and recorded on the IBM-equipment.
- 2. Present system centralizes control for efficiency in insuring that the proper number of cards are sent to the field and accuracy of the information contained thereon. It provides for handling by personnel at all times under the direct responsibility of a Special Agent Supervisor trained in security work who can control and handle problems.
- 3. Any list compiled for the purpose of replacing the present Security Index card system would of necessity be in considerably greater detail than the present lists which are prepared on a monthly basis. For example,

the November 15, 1962, alphabetical list, although composed of 204 pages, contains a bare minimum of information listing only a subject's master name, race, sex, birth date, Bureau file number and office of origin. More than one list would have to be compiled, one setting forth the names of the individuals together with all the pertinent data now appearing on the Security Index cards, another list such as is presently prepared on a monthly basis for placing in the hands of the Department as we do not want to place a list containing detailed data appearing on the Security Index cards in the Department' hands. A third list would be necessary of all aliases and prepared in such a manner as to match up an alias with a master name. Based upon a check of 200 cards beginning at the first of the alphabet, it was found that there is an average of 2.57 aliases for each master. name. This list in itself would be composed of approximately 39,700 names.

Under the present card index system, we are able to select within the Division from this index the identities of aliens of 40 different countries upon a moment's notice, as well as identities of individuals falling within six Special Sections of the Index and individuals employed in key facilities so designated by the Department of Defense Should lists be substituted, an additional 47 lists would have to be run and supplements of changes made therein maintained from month to month if we are to accomplish what we presently can with the card index system. These lists would become extremely bulky, unwieldy, hard to work with and create considerable clerical effort in maintaining their current status.

4. Under present planning, the Security Index card is to be used as an administrative device to record apprehension in the event of an emergency. At that time expeditious handling will be essential and cards would be much more maneuverable than would the lists.

In summary, I cannot envision any alternate system from the one presently in existence which could be adopted at a savings in clerical personnel without loss of accuracy and control. This Division is responsible for the accuracy of the Security Index

although the field is specifically charged with the responsibility to likewise check the accuracy of Security Index cards upon receipt from the Bureau. This Division is also charged with specific responsibility for control of the Security Index Program and the implementation of the Emergency Detention Program in time of an emergency. Therefore, centralized control should be maintained within the Division and it is my definite feeling that it can best be accomplished by maintaining the present system.

RECOMMENDATION:

That the current system of card indices be continued.

ADDENDUM OF INSPECTION DIVISION

It appears that the Subversive Control Section could handle its normal work in an entirely satisfactory manner and at a saving in clerical personnel without maintaining these indices. The only persuasive argument for maintaining these cards here and at Quantico is the possible need for them in the event enemy attack should result in loss or inaccessibility of duplicate cards kept in the field. In view of the unpredictable nature of the conditions which might prevail after such attack, the Inspection Division feels it would not be justified in recommending elimination of these indices. It, therefore, recommends that the present system remain in effect.

It has been observed that Domestic Intelligence Division (Dib) maintains at Seat of Covernment a 5° x 8° card

at Seat of Covernment a 5° x 5° card index of all Security Index subjects and all Section A. Reserve Index subjects. Alias cards are also included therein. It also maintains at Quantico similar indices for use in connection with the Emergency Detention Program in case of emergency. A considerable amount of clerical and supervisory time is spent in maintaining these indices.

It is also noted that alphabetical, geographical and special schedules are printed by the foucher - Statistical Section wouthly and as otherwise required.

It would appear that a complete study of this rituation would result in elimination of the afore-mentioned 5" x 8" card indices and a revision of the present schedules to serve the purposes presently served by the 5" x 8" cards. This should result in reduction of clerical personnel in the DID and possibly at quantico.

A detailed study of the situation is suggested for submission to interested Eurepu officials.

Security Index is maintained on 5" x 6" cards as in field offices, except that the cards do nt bear the descriptive data as is set forth in detail on the cards in the field. SECURITY INVESTIGATIONS OF INDIVIDUALS FRAUD AGAINST THE GOVERNMENT

The purpose of this memorandum is to recommend that the New York Security Index list be checked by use of the Bureau's electronic data processing equipment against approximately 35,000 IBM cards presently maintained by the New York City Post Office for the temporary Post Office employees who worked during the 1961 Christmas Season.

If any Security Index subject is found among these 35,000 former employees, it would indicate a violation of the False Statement Statute, Title 18, USC, Section 1001, because the employee would necessarily have falsified his application with respect to subversive affiliation in order to get the job

The Post Office Department has not made any name checks on these employees because of their large number, the short duration of their employment, and the fact that their positions are classified as nonsensitive. We have noted that Security Index subjects in large cities other than New York have been so employed. These violations have been discovered by our Agents in the course of their regular security investigations. In New York City this method is uncertain tecause of the large number of Security Index subjects and the large number of temporary Post Office workers. New York has not yet turned up with any such violations.

The New York City Post Office will furnish us the 35,000 IBM cards. The name and address on the cards can be compared electronically with the same information on the Security Index list and possibly identical persons located. Informal inquiry of the Voucher-Statistical Section indicates that this is feasible and can be done speedily and at negligible cost.

New York City Post Office to retain any applications for these employees until this check can be made. It is known that some of these applications have been destroyed. The application would be necessary to support prosecutive action, but even if the application for a Security Index subject has been destroyed, we would still be in a position to determine if such an electronic check would be feasible in the future

Memorandum to Mr. Re: SECURITY INVESTIGATIONS OF INDIVIDUALS

The New York postal authorities have been advised that the Bureau is not assuming any responsibility for checking Post Office applicants and that our interest is limited to discovering violations over which we have jurisdiction. Post Office personnel contacted concerning this matter will, of course, not be given any information concerning the Security Index.

RECOMMENDATION:

If approved, that the New York Office forward the IBM cards to the Voucher-Statistical Section for the purpose described above.



SUGGESTION: In cases in which a subject is more commonly known by an alias, the Security Index (SI) card carry the additional notation "Known as at residence" and "Known as _____ at employment," adjacent to these respective entries

OBSERVATIONS: Suggester feels this would prevent confusion in implementing the Emergency Detention Program since cards will be distributed to individuals who are not familiar with the subjects and sometimes a subject will be more commonly known by an alias than his true name.

The Domestic Intelligence Division commented that the instances under which the circumstances described by the suggester would occur are extremely limited; therefore, it was not felt the existing rules should be altered. The rule now requires that the full correct name of the subject and his aliases must be shown on the SI card. The full correct name is shown as the master name even though subject might be more commonly known by another name inasmuch as the warrants that would be issued under the Emergency Detention Program should be made in the subject's true name.

Two security index cards, one alphabetical, and one geographical, are maintained in a headquarters city. The geographical card is the one that will be used by Agents in effecting apprehensions. The reverse side of this card contains a detailed physical description and a photograph which are placed on it after receipt of the card from the Bureau. There would be no objection if a notation were made on this side of the card showing a subject's more commonly known name and good judgment would indicate this should be done. This could be handled easily in the field office without setting up additional data on the IBM equipment. It is noted that existing instructions (Section 87D, Manual of Instructions, page 50) permit the field to add any data to the reverse side of the geographical Security Index card which will assist apprehension.

The Training Division subscribes to the comments of the Domestic Intelligence Division and feels that the suggester should be so advised by letter with appropriate note for the SAC.

MEMORANDUM RE: SUGGESTION #516-63

RECOMMENDATION:

That the New York Office be permitted to adopt the suggested procedure and the enclosed letter with appropriate instructions for the SAC be sent to the suggester. Receipt of the idea was acknowledged by prior letter.

The instances under which the steps described in this suggestion occur are extremely limited; therefore, it is not believed that the existing rule dealing with the matter should be changed. The rule now requires that the full, correct name of the subject and his aliases must be contained on the Security Index card. The full, correct name is shown as the master name even though the subject might be more commonly known by another name inasmuch as the warrants that would be issued under the Emergency Detention Program must be made in subject's true name.

Two Security Index cards are maintained in Headquarters City: 1) the alphabetical card and 2) the geographical card. The geographical card is the one that will be utilized by the Agents in connection with affecting apprehensions. The reverse side of this card contains a detailed physical description and a photograph, all of which are placed on the geographical card in the field office following receipt of this card from the Bureau. There would be no objection to showing on the reverse side of this card the notation as to the subject's more commonly known name and a good judgement would indicate that this should be done. This can be handled easily within the field office without setting up additional data on the IBM equipment.

Existing instructions (Section 87D, Manual of Instructions, page 50) permits the field to add any data to the reverse side of the geographical Security Index card that will assist in effecting apprehension.

SUBJECT: DELINQUENCY IN SECURITY INVESTIGATIONS

SYNOPSIS:

Each month we follow the field closely on the status of security work by analyzing the backlog of pending cases and delinquency in espionage, internal security, security matter and foreign intelligence cases in classifications 65, 100 and 105. Status of these cases as of December 31, 1962, is set forth below.

In December, there was a decrease in pending active matters in the entire field in the security classifications from 18,253 to 17,997. Delinquent matters increased from 1,435 to 1,715. The percentage of delinquent matters increased from 7.8% to 9.5%.

Letters are being sent to the offices indicated by asterisks on page four herein, commenting on their delinquency and pointing out the necessity of bringing their security cases to a current status.

RECOMMENDATION:

The field will continue to be followed closely regarding security delinquency and you will be advised of the results of the review of the January, 1963, administrative reports.

The December, 1962, administrative reports from all offices indicate that the total pending active matters in classifications 65, 100 and 105 decreased from 18,253 to 17,997. Delinquent items increased from 1,435 to 1,715. The percentage of delinquent items increased from 7.8% to 9.5%.

The following statistics show the status of pending work, including both pending active and pending inactive matters, and delinquency for all field divisions for the last four months.

We now have under investigation a number of Puerto Rican nationalist groups including the Nationalist Party of Puerto Rico. The activities of these nationalist groups have become so entwined that it is not unusual to have an individual connected with two or more of these groups at the same time and the individuals frequently change allegiance from one nationalist group to another.

These factors cause confusion in identifying the true character of the Puerto Rican nationalist cases particularly when running tabulations from Security Index punch cards and in routing incoming mail at the Bureau.

SYNOPSIS: O SECURITY INDEX - GENERALL

Each month we follow the field closely on the status of security work by analyzing the backlog of pending cases and delinquency in espionage, internal security, security matter and foreign intelligence cases in classifications 65, 100 and 105. Status of these cases as of January 31, 1963, is set forth below.

In January, there was an increase in pending active matters in the entire field in the security classifications from 17,997 to 18,157. Delinquent matters decreased from 1,715 to 1,395. The percentage of delinquent matters decreased from 9.5% to 7.6%.

Letters are being sent to the offices indicated by asterisks on page four herein, commenting on their delinquency and pointing out the necessity of bringing their security cases to a current status.

RECOMMENDATION:

The field will continue to be followed closely regarding security delinquency and you will be advised of the results of the review of the February, 1963, administrative reports.

DETAILS:

offices indicate that the total pending active matters in classifications 65, 100 and 105 increased from 17,997 to 18,157. Delinquent items decreased from 1,715 to 1,395. The percentage of delinquent items decreased from 9.5% to 7.6%.

Following passage of the Internal Security Act of 1950, the Department of Defense compiled a list of key facilities which under the provisions of Section 5 of the Act members of a communist action organization are forbidden to hold employment in. This Section of the Act was to become operative only upon publication in the Federal Register of a list of such facilities. We received a list of the key facilities; however, Defense did not publish same as required in the Act. We have carried the added character "Internal Security Act of 1950" in individual reports on security subjects with communist affiliations employed in key facilities.

Following an amendment to the Internal Security Act of 1950 on May 31, 1962, which allowed Defense to post individually plants from which members of communist action organizations could not be employed without violating the terms of the Act, Defense posted approximately 3,600 plants listed as "defense facilities" and provided us with a complete list of such facilities. Although many of the previously mentioned key facilities have likewise been designated as defense facilities the two lists are not synonymous.

Employment in a key facility is not in violation of the Internal Security Act of 1950 unless the plant has likewise been designated as a defense facility pursuant to Section 5 of this Act. Therefore, the character "Internal Security Act of 1950" should no longer be utilized in key facility cases.

ACTION:

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1. There is attached a proposed SAC Letter instructing the field not to use the character "Internal Security Act of 1950" in key facility cases unless such facility has also been designated as a defense facility pursuant to section 5 of the Internal Security Act of 1950. The SAC Letter instructs that this added character must be utilized in the cases of subjects employed in defense facilities when their activities have been of a communist nature.
