SUBJECT: DELINQUENCY IN SECURITY INVESTIGATIONS

SYNOPSIS:

Each month we follow the field closely on the status of security work by analyzing the backlog of pending cases and delinquency in espionage, internal security, security matter and foreign intelligence cases in classifications 65, 100 and 105. Status of these cases as of September 30, 1963, is set forth below.

In September, there was a decrease in pending active matters in the entire field in the security classifications from 17,099 to 16,311. Delinquent matters decreased from 1,678 to 1,658. The percentage of delinquent matters increased from 9.8% to 10.1%.

Letters are being sent to the offices indicated by asterisks on page four herein, commenting on their delinquency and pointing out the necessity for bringing their security cases to a current status.

RECOMMENDATION:

The field will continue to be followed closely regarding security delinquency and you will be advised of the results of the review of the October, 1963, administrative reports.

DETAILS:

The September, 1963, administrative reports from all offices indicate that the total pending active matters in classifications 65, 100 and 105 decreased from 17,009 to 16,311. Delinquent items decreased from 1,678 to 1,658. The percentage of delinquent items increased from 9.8% to 10.1%.

The following statistics show the status of pending work, including both pending active and pending inactive matters, and delinquency for all field divisions for the last four months.



SUBVERSIVE CONTROL SECTION PROGRAM EVALUATION

DELINQUENCY IN SECURITY INVESTIGATIONS

1. Origin

In March, 1952, the program of following individual offices on a monthly basis was initiated because of a then existing extremely heavy delinquency in classifications 65, 100 and 105.

2. Purpose

To stress the necessity of reducing delinquency in these categories and the necessity of maintaining these cases in a reasonably current status.

3. Scope

Field wide.

4. Magnitude

This is not a major program from the standpoint of manpower and cost.

3. Over-all Value

This program has resulted in a reduction in delinquency in security classifications and the maintenance of such delinquency in a fairly constant status during the past year. For example, the delinquency average since October, 1962, through September, 1963, in these classifications field wide stood at approximately 8.5 per cent. The highest delinquency recorded during this period was in June, 1963 (10.6 per cent), with the lowest recorded delinquency being in October. 1962 (6.3 per cent).

(SEMIANNUAL REVIEW AND ANALYSIS)

Origin: This program instituted November, 1960. Purpose: Program established to keep track of dangerous individuals of pro-Castro affiliations, activities or sympathies and to insure they are neutralized in event of hostilities involving Cuta. Scope: Program applies to two categories of pro-Castro Security Index (SI) subjects concerning whom we would take appropriate action in case of Cuban emergency. (A) Individuals placed on SI solely on basis of their pro-Castro activities, connections or sympathies. (B) Individuals placed on SI for other reasons (such as members of Communist Party) who, by reason of pro-Castro activities, are considered dangerous in event of hostilities with Cuba and who are tabbed "Pro-Cuban." Tie-In With Other Programs: This program is coordinated with over-all SI program. Case Load: As of 10/23/63 249 individuals are tabbed "Pro-Cuban"; 166 Cubans are listed in the Special Section "Cuban," of which 78 are Cuban aliens. Magnitude: In the event of hostilities with Cuba, the Government could immediately proceed to pick up those individuals listed on the SI who are Cuban aliens. We keep the Immigration and Naturalization Service (INS) informed concerning these aliens, and the Attorney General is having deportation warrants against them prepared for service by INS should the eventuality arise.

Past or Present Weaknesses: No present weaknesses in this program. Program instituted November, 1960, in view of possibility of a break in relations between the U. S. and Cuba or a limited emergency growing out of Cuban situation. Administrative Control: One Supervisor has the direct responsibility for following captioned matter and assuring that the field vigorously presses all aspects of this program. Accordingly, it receives a continuing review. Adequacy and Currentness of Instructions: SAC Letters 60-54 and 62-55 dated 11/22/60 and 10/5/62, respectively, furnished the field over-all instructions concerning this program. These instructions are still current and complete.

Re: SECURITY INDEX - CUBA

<u>Over-All Value</u>: The program serves to more completely discharge our responsibilities in the security field as they relate to the Cuban situation and to insure that our responsibilities are continuously being met.

Contemplated Action: Program should be continued as now constituted. It is contemplated, however, that a review will be made on an individual case basis of SI subjects in the "Cuban" Special Section and, where applicable, separate letters will be submitted to appropriate field offices instructing that certain key leaders in the pro-Castro movement who are of outstanding effectiveness be designated as key figures. It is felt that the activities of certain individuals, such as activities of certain individuals, such as a present head of Fair Play for Cuba Committee and others, should be given special attention on a continuing basis and reports submitted every six months rather than annually as is now required under the SI program. The over-all program will be closely watched to assure that any additional needed changes are effected.

By memorandum 9/20/63 you were advised that as of that date there were 78 Cuban aliens on the Security Index (SI). Since that date there have been no additions or deletions of aliens with regard to the SI and the present total remains at 78.

During this same period, the total number of individuals included in the "Cuban" Special Section of the SI, which section includes both aliens and U. S. citizens, increased from 164 to 166. Further, the present total of individuals on the regular SI tabbed C (for pro-Cuban) increased from 247 to 249. Our investigations are continuing and field is being closely tollowed to insure that the Bureau's objectives are met. You will be kept advised of progress in this matter.

SUBVERSIVE CONTROL SECTION PROGRAMS AND ACCOMPLISHMENTS

Set out below is a brief resume of the programs and accomplishments of the Subversive Control Section covering the period May 16, 1963, to October 15, 1963.

Security Index (SI) maintained in a current status. The names of 10,537 individuals contained in the SI as of October 15, 1963. During the 23-week period May 13, 1963, to October 18, 1963, the names of 256 individuals were added to the Security Index with 542 cancellations. Other changes on existing SI cards totaled 3,736.

Reserve Index (RI) established in June, 1000. There are 1,222 names included in Section A of the RI representing those persons who are in a position to influence others against the national interests in time of an emergency. RI-A cards maintained in up-to-date status at the Bureau and in the field. Cases reviewed annually.

Submission of periodic reports as due being followed closely by administrative tickler. One report received annually in SI cases, semiannually and quarterly in key figure and top functionary cases, respectively. One year moratorium on annual reports by Newark and New York was placed in effect 9/11/63.

Emergency Detention Program up to date with vital records for successful implementation stored away from the Seat of Government and headquarters cities. Lists of SI subjects and places for search under the Master Search Warrant kept current in the Department.

Security Matter, Fraud Against the Government, Perjury and related statutes continue to receive close supervision with an average of 11 Fraud Against the Government cases being opened monthly. One conviction presently under appeal. Indictments against two other individuals considered as fugitives and who presently reside in Russia are outstanding. Another indictment outstanding with trial date to be set October 23, 1963.

Security programs of other Government agencies depend largely on information furnished by the Eureau; therefore, close attention is given to dissemination responsibilities and during above period identities of 31 potential witnesses for administrative hearings made available to other Government agencies.

Puerto Rican nationalist groups advocating independence for Puerto Rico by violent means and individuals associated therewith centinue to receive intensified coverage. Information indicative of petential violence is given prompt and wide discomination to interested Government agencies. Counterintelligence measures have thus far prevented importation of arms and explosives into Puerto Rico although attempts have been made to do so.

In addition, in September, 1963, a highly successful counterintelligence move was directed against the Federacion De Universitation Pro Independencia (FUPI), a Marxist-oriented student organization at the University of Puerto Rico which is affiliated with the communist-controlled International Union of Students. This action, taken at a time when FUPI was just beginning a recruiting drive on the University campus, created panic and dissension in the ranks of the organization and resulted in the suspension of efforts to recruit new members.

SECURITY INVESTIGATIONS OF INDIVIDUALS

SYNOPSIS

Bureau responsibility in this field originated with Presidential Directives, the first one in September, 1939. Purpose is to identify potentially dangerous individuals who are affiliated with subversive movements. This program is field wide and is closely related to the Emergency Detention Program, which involves plans for the apprehension and detertion of potentially dangerous individuals in the event or an emergency.

From October, 1962, through September, 1963, thore was an average of 18,018 pending active cases in classifications 65, 100 and 105. This Section's principal case load falls within the 100 classification and during the same period averaged 8,540 cases per month. Instructions are up to date and administrative controls exercised over the field by tickler system.

Other programs arise from security investigations of individuals and include interviews with subversives. We consider an interview in each case. The Security Index contains 10,587 names as of October 15, 1963. An average of 11 Fraud Against the Government cases per month have been opened since November, 1962. Requests for availability of witnesses from Coast Guard and Defense continue high. The identities of 90 potential witnesses were made available during the period November 16, 1962, through October 15, 1963.

<u>DETAILS</u>

Origin

Presidential Directives, the initial one being issued in September, 1939, and since repeated on several occasions. These Directives charge the Bureau with the responsibility for investigation of individuals in the internal security field. It is the

collecting agency of the entire executive branch for subversive information and has the responsibility of seeing that such information is distributed to those Government agencies having a legitimate interest therein.

2. Purpose

The identification and investigation of individuals who, because of affiliation with subversive organizations, may present a potential threat to the internal security in the event of an emergency and the development of evidence of violations of Federal statutes on the part of these individuals. If, during the course of a security investigation, it is determined that a subject does pose a potential threat to the internal security, he is scheduled for apprehension under the Emergency Detention Program by the inclusion of his name in the Security Index.

3. Scope

Field wide.

4. Tie In With Other Programs

Closely related is the Emergency Detention Program which deals with plans for the handling of individuals included in the Security Index in the event of an emergency. Also closely related are the various security programs of other Government agencies, such programs depending to a large extent on information developed by us and disseminated to such agencies.

5. Case Load

Basically, these cases fall in security classifications 65, 100 and 105. During the period October, 1962, through September, 1963, the average field case load in these classifications was 18,018 pending active matters.

The Subversive Control Section is primarily responsible for investigations of individuals under the 160 classification although we do have cases on individuals under the 105 classification, such as the affiliates of the Nationalist Party of Puerto Rico. During the 12-month period October, 1962, through September, 1963, there was a monthly average of 8,540 pending active matters in classification 100 throughout the field.

6. Magnitude

This program is major from the standpoint of costs and manpower and, as such, is referred to in the budget material.

7. Past or Present weaknesses

Close attention is given the entire operations in this field in efforts to insure that we are fully discharging our responsibilities thereunder.

8. Administrative Controls

The field is followed closely on its over-all delinquency in the three security classifications mentioned reviously. This is handled on a monthly basis. In addition, we follow the field by tickler on pending matters in the field of which we have knowledge and we follow the field for submission of periodic reports in Security Index cases to insure that such are submitted when due.

9. Adequacy and Currentness of Instructions

Instructions dealing with security investigations of individuals are contained in Section 87D of the Manual of Instructions and are in a current status.

10. Over-all Value

Determination of identities of individuals who should be apprehended in the event of an emergency in order to minimize possibilities of espionage, sabotage and subversion. Dissemination of information of intelligence value to other Government agencies concerning individuals and matters in which they have a legitimate interest. Budget purposes.

OTHER PROGRAMS ENCOMPASSED IN AND/OR ARISING OUT OF SECURITY INVESTIGATIONS OF INDIVIDUALS

SECURITY INDEX

As noted previously herein, one of the purposes of security investigations is to determine the identities of individuals who, because of affiliation with subversive organizations, may be considered a potential threat to the internal security in the event of an emergency. When such information is developed, the name of the individual concerned is included in the Security Index.

We presently have included in the Security Index names of 10,587 (as of October 15, 1963) individuals. Each Security Index case is thoroughly re-evaluated at least once annually at the Bureau and in the field to insure that the cases are sound in every respect should it be necessary to invoke the Emergency Detention Program. If it is found that the subject's activities no longer justify the retention of his name in the Security Index, immediate steps are taken to insure that his name is removed therefrom.

RESERVE INDEX

In June, 1960; the then Communist Index, maintained only in the field, was renamed the Reserve Index and a program of bringing the cases of individuals whose names were included therein up to date was instituted. We broke the Reserve Index into Section A and Section B. Section A contains a list of individuals who should receive priority consideration from the standpoint of investigation, interrogation or other action following implementation of the

Emergency Detention Program. Section A cards are maintained at the Sent of Government and in the field. These cases are reviewed on an annual basis and brought up to date. We presently have including Section A of the Reserve Index the names of 1,222 (as of October 1963) individuals. Section B cards are maintained only in the field.

Following recommendations of the Internal Security-Espiona Conference of May, 1962, a review of Section B Reserve Index subjects was undertaken on a field-wide basis, this review to be completed within one year. This review was accomplished, bringing this Section of the Reserve Index up to date.

DISSEMINATION - INCLUDING CHECKS FOR AVAILABILITY
OF INFORMANTS AND EQUECES

Security reports are disseminated to numerous interested agencies throughout the executive branch of the Government. By far the vast majority of such reports received are disseminated outside the Bureau. The responsibility of such dissemination necessitates careful and thorough evaluation of each report to assure that it is absolutely accurate both in form and content.

We are continuing to receive a heavy volume of requests from various departments of the executive branch of the Government for the availability of witnesses appearing in reports previously disseminated for appearance at hearings being conducted by such agencies as the Department of Defense and United States Coast Guard in efforts to remove subversives from access to classified data and/or restricted areas.

During the period November 16, 1962, through October 15, 1963, the identities of 90 potential witnesses were made available to these agencies for possible utilization at hearings.

FRAUD AGAINST THE GOVERNMENT AND OTHER VIOLATIONS ARISING OUT OF SECURITY INVESTIGATIONS

One of the principal violations has been violation of the Fraud Against the Government Statute arising primarily from a subject's failure to list membership in a subversive organization Memorandum for Re: SUBVERSIVE CONTROL SECTION ---- Program Evaluation

when executing such documents as personnel security questionnaires. We have averaged opening 11 cases per month in this category during the past year and these cases are handled on one desk for uniformity. The principal difficulty in connection with these cases has been the developing of witnesses other than current active valuable informants who can testify to a subject's membership in the prescribed organization.

In addition, we have under investigation a number of possible violations of Title 8, United States Code, Section 1185 (illegal travel) arising out of our operations in the internal security field. One indictment is outstanding with the trial date to be set 10/23/63. Two additional indictments involving irregularities in the use of passports are outstanding and the subjects thereof are considered fugitives presently residing in .ussia.

ACTION:

This program and various facets thereof will continue to receive close attention in this Section.

PERIODIC REPORTS PROGRAM

1. Origin

Annual reports in Security Index (SI) cases have been required since completion of the Summary Report Program 7/14/54 (New York Office 5/1/56). In certain type cases periodic reports were required at specified intervals for many years prior to 1954; i.e. key figures, top functionaries.

2. Purpose

To insure that current information is available to the Bureau in report form in order to keep the Bureau, as well as the Department, advised of the status of SI cases and in order to discharge our responsibilities of dissemination to other interested agencies in the executive branch of the Government.

3. Scope

All offices participate in this program.

4. Tie In With Other Programs

-- Closely related to the Emergency Detention Program, which deals with plans for the apprehension and detention of potentially dangerous individuals in time of an emergency.

5. Case Load

As of 10/15/63 there were 10,587 SI subjects, each normally requiring at least one report a year; however, by letter dated 9/11/63 a one-year moratorium was placed upon the submission of annual reports in SI cases in the Newark and New York Offices because

of developments in the espionage field requiring a heavy concentration of manpower in these cases. This involves approximately 3,300 SI subjects.

Some SI cases require more frequent reports; namely,
(a) top functionaries, quarterly reports. There are 33 individuals
considered as "top functionaries." They represent the highest
degree of leadership in Subversive organizations and their activities
are constantly being followed. (b) Key figures, semiannual reports
are required in key figure cases presently numbering 518. These
individuals represent leadership in subversive organizations on
regional, district and state levels and we follow their activities
closely.

6. Hagnitude

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This is a major program as evidenced by the fact that, with the exceptions noted above, in all SI cases investigations must be brought up to date and reports submitted at specified intervals. This does not include investigations and reports on individuals currently being nominated for the SI.

7. Past or Present Weaknesses

for well-founded reasons last enumerated in memorandum from you to dated 9/10/63 captioned "Lecurity Index," Bufile it has been maintained that our present schedules for the submission of periodic reports in SI cases are necessary and fully justified, therefore, the moratorium placed upon the submission of such in the Newark and New York Offices does present a present weakness. However, because of the over-riding need for manpower in the espionage field, this action was necessary. It has been made clear to the above two offices that the above action was in no way intended as a limitation on investigative activity in this field and, in fact, should result in a greater concentration of investigative activity in the internal security field as well as in the field of espionage.

8. Administrative Controls

Each Supervisor handling security matter cases utilizes a tickler system to insure that reports are submitted when due by the field.

9. Adequacy and Currentness of Instructions.

Instructions dealing with this program are found in Section 87D of the Manual of Instructions. This section of the Manual is up to date.

10. Over-all Value

Data dealing with this program is included in the budget material. In addition, this program enables us to thoroughly review the SI status of each individual subject on at least an annual basis. When information is developed clearly indicating that a subject no longer should be scheduled for apprehension, prompt action is taken to remove his name from the SI. Conversely, if the investigation developes evidence indicating that the subject yresents a potential threat to the internal security in time of emergency, his name is included in the SI.

Reports in these cases are widely disseminated to various executive departments. Essentially, every security program of other branches of the Government depends to a large extent on information made available to them by us.

ACTION:

This program will be followed closely and we will continue to require reports in SI cases in accordance with the schedule referred to herein.

SUBJECT: DELINQUENCY IN SECURITY INVESTIGATIONS

SYNOPSIS:

Each month we follow the field closely on the status of security work by analyzing the backlog of pending cases and delinquency in espionage, internal security, security matter and foreign intelligence cases in classifications 65, 100 and 105. Status of these cases as of October 31, 1963, is set forth below.

In October, there was an increase in pending active matters in the entire field in the security classifications from 16.311 to 16.989.

Delinquent matters decreased from 1,658 to 1,045. The percentage of delinquent matters decreased from 10.1% to 6.1%.

Letters are being sent to the offices indicated by asterisks on page four herein, commenting on their delinquency and pointing out the necessity for bringing their security cases to a current status.

RECOMMENDATION:

The field will continue to be followed closely regarding security delinquency and you will be advised of the results of the review of the November, 1963, administrative reports.

DETAILS

The October, 1963, administrative reports from all offices indicate that the total pending active matters in classifications 65, 100 and 105 increased from 16,311 to 16,989. Delinquent items decreased from 1,658 to 1,045. The percentage or delinquent items decreased from 10.1% to 6.1%.

The following statistics show the status of pending work, including both pending active and pending inactive matters, and delinquency for all field divisions for the last four months.

SUBJECT: SECURITY INDEX

My memorandum of September 10, 1963, recommended a one-year moratorium on the submission of annual reports in Security Index cases in the New York and Newark Offices. Although I pointed out in that memorandum that I considered the submission of these reports necessary and fully justified, I felt impelled to recommend the moratorium because of the pressing need for manpower in the espionage field in the New York area. My recommendation was approved and the moratorium was placed in effect by letter dated September 11, 1963, and as a result 11 Agents were transferred from the security squads in the New York Office to the espionage squads.

New York Offices as well as by this Division. Both the New York and Newark Offices feel that at this time they can reinstitute the submission of annual reports in Security Index cases and recommend that such action be taken. The various factors taken into consideration in recommending the above action include:

- 1. The savings realized by the discontinuance of submission of periodic reports in Security Index cases in those instances in which the only available information consists of verification of residence and employment and negative contacts with security informants and sources and submission in lieu thereof of a letter to the Bureau, authorized by SAC Letter 63-36 dated July 23, 1963, has been greater than expected.
- 2. It has been the observation of the New York and Newark Offices as well as this Division that failure to submit reports increases the difficulty in affording these cases adequate investigative direction from a supervisory standpoint. Because of the importance of these cases in connection with our

operations in the internal security field, they certainly should be afforded close and continuous supervision. In this connection, the heaviest concentration of Communist Party members in the United States is in the New York area.

- 3. Dissemination of pertinent information to interested agencies in the executive branch of the Government is a primary function of this Bureau and unreported information contained in the field office files hinders the adequate discharge of this function. In this connection, both Newark and New York point out that continued investigation will of necessity generate paper work which is directed to the files and note that the reporting of same would not greatly increase the paper work involved.
- The burden beginning next September 11 to bring these cases up to date would be considerably heavier because of the added accumulation of information in the files than it will be if the moratorium is lifted at this time.
- 5. Although not intended as such, the moratorium has a tendency to de-emphasize security investigations.

CBSERVATIONS:

In view of the comments of the New York and Newark Offices to the effect that they feel that the submission of annual reports can be reinstituted at this time with their presently assigned personnel and because of the reasons enumerated above, it is recommended that the moratorium be lifted. I will follow this matter closely and again cause an analysis to be made of this situation within 60 days and, if it appears that these two offices cannot fully discharge their responsibilities in this field, I will submit appropriate recommendations.



The Director has requested information concerning how long it takes Departmental Attorneys to approve or disapprove one of our recommendations to put a person on the Security Index.

Subjects are placed on the Security Index by the Bureau upon determination that they are potentially dangerous to the internal security of our country in the event of an emergency. The Department does not review individual cases prior to the time they are placed on the Security Index. Following the adoption of the present Security Index criteria, which was concurred in by the Department in April, 1955, the Bureau specifically requested the Department to conduct a review of the Security Index cases. In July, 1955, the Department advised that it would engage in reviewing a "sampling" of our Security Index cases and it has been so engaged since. We furnished the Department each month a list of our Security Index subjects for attachment to the Master Warrant of Arrest maintained by the Department should an emergency occur requiring their apprehension and from this list the Department selects cases for reviewing. For information, as of today approximately 59.4 per cent of the Security Index cases have been reviewed and approved by the Department.

We request the Department to conduct a specific review of a Security Index case when such a subject becomes 1) a U. S. Government employee, 2) a foreign government employee and 3) an employee of the United Nations. We also request the Department to specifically review a case previously reviewed and approved by it prior to taking action with respect to removing a subject's name from the Security Index.

These reviews are generally conducted by the Department within a thirty-day period.

Pursuant to the Director's question as to whether it is accepted practice of State Department to allow individuals who have renounced their citizenship to return to the United States. State Department was consulted on November 25, 1963. (Memorandum to me dated November 25, 1963).

In connection therewith, asked 1) "Shouldn't these people who have renounced U. S. citizenship be on the Security Index? 2) Do we investigate all such people?"

With respect to the second question, it is the general practice to conduct a security investigation in cases or derectors who subsequently return to the United States. Investigation is begun on basis of defection and return and is for the purpose of determining 1) Whether they may have been recruited for Soviet intelligence in this country while abroad, and 2) Whether their activaties are such as to indicate that they represent a potential threat to the internal security of the Nation in the event of a national emergency.

All information developed during the course of the investigation, including the fact of defection on the part of the individual concerned, is taken into consideration in arriving at a decision as to whether the individual's activities are such as to depict him as a dangerous individual who would pose a threat to the internal security in the event of a national emergency and, therefore, should be scheduled for apprehension.

In the past we have felt that a defector who subsequently returned to this country and indicated by his words and deeds acknowledgment of his initial folly and repentance thereof and concerning whom investigation failed to develop additional facts depicting the individual as a dangerous person, should not be listed in the Security Index and thus scheduled for apprehension and detention in the event of a national emergency. However, all defectors could be placed on the Security Index on the theory that their defection, their act of renouncement of their citizenship, and their subsequent return would indicate possibility of long-range development as a Soviet agent. In this connection, there is no way to positively establish through investigation that their repentance of their actions are legitimate and, since permission to return must of necessity be granted by the Soviet Union, there does exist a long-range Soviet agent potential.

We have found that the Security Index criteria afford practicable and workable assistance in arriving at a conclusion and are sufficiently elastic so that when applied with the necessary judgment the complex questions which arise can be resolved. These criter are well devised for this purpose. They were not intended to be nor can they or any other criteria be rigid rules since the ultimate points be determined to not whether a cose fits a norticular rule but to be determined is not whether a case fits a particular rule but whether the subject of the case represents a danger. The breadth of these criteria is demonstrated by Criterion (D) which reads: investigation has failed to establish overt acts or statements on the part of a subject within the time limits set out above, facts have b developed which clearly and unmistakably depict the subject as a dargerous individual who could be expected to commit acts inimical t the national defense and public safety of the U.S. in time of emerg A copy of the Security Index criteria is attached as Exhibit A.

In evaluating a security case for the purpose of determining whether subject thereof falls within the Security Index criteria, Section of the Manual of Instructions contains 17 specific factors that mu be taken into consideration in arriving at a determination as to whether a subject represents a potential threat, including such fa

as "constant support of the Soviet Union in acts and utterances" and Violations of penal laws arising out of activities as a subversive." The Manual specifically points out that the above factors are not all inclusive and will vary with each case in some degree. We propose to enlarge upon the specific factors that must be taken into consideration by the addition of 6 other factors relating primarily to Soviet-satellite internal security matters and including a factor dealing with individuals who have defected, revoked or sought revocation of their United States citizenship in favor of the Sino-Soviet-bloc countries who have returned to the United States and 1/1 who have taken no positive steps to counteract such action. These new factors as well as those already listed will not automatically result in individuals engaging in such activity being included on the Security Index but our listing of them in the Manual will make it mandatory that anyone engaging in such activity be considered for the Security Index and that activities in these categories will be evaluated in connection with the individual's over-all sympathies and actions in deciding whether he should be included in the Security Index. The Manual will still point out that the factors enumerated are still not all inclusive, however, as has been indicated, the proposed additions will afford field personnel as well as supervisory personnel at the Seat of Government a more detailed guideline for consideration in arriving at a determination as to whether subject represents a potential danger in time of an emergency and thus should be included in the Security Index. The additional 6 factors are attached as Exhibit B.

CRITERIA FOR PLACING AND RETAINING NAMES IN THE SECURITY INDEX

- (A) Subject has had membership or participation in the activities of a basic revolutionary organization within the last 5 years as shown by overt acts or statements established through reliable sources, informants, or individuals.
- (B) Subject has had membership or participation in the affairs of one or more front organizations, which adhere to the policies and doctrines of a revolutionary group, in a leadership capacity or by active substantial participation in the furtherance of the aims or purposes of the front organizations within the last 3 years as shown by overt acts or statements established through reliable sources, informants, or individuals.
- (C) Investigation has developed information that an individual, though not a member of a participant in the activities of a subversive organization, has anarchist or revolutionary beliefs and is likely to seize upon the opportunity presented by a national emergency to endanger the public safety as shown by overt acts or statements within the last 3 years established through reliable sources, informants, or individuals.
- (D) Although investigation has failed to establish overt acts or statements on the part of a subject within the time limits set out above, facts have been developed which clearly and unaistakably depict the subject as a dangerous individual who could be expected to commit acts inimical to the national defense and public safety of the U.S. in time of emergency.

SYNOPSIS:

Each month we follow the field closely on the status of security work by analyzing the backlog of pending cases and delinquency in espionage, internal security, security matter and foreign intelligence cases in classifications 65, 100 and 105. Status of these cases as of November 30, 1963, is set forth below.

In November, there was an increase in pending active matters in the entire field in the security classifications from 16,989 to 17,040. Delinquent matters increased from 1,045 to 1,621. The percentage of delinquent matters increased from 6.1% to 9.5%.

Letters are being sent to the offices indicated by asterisks on page four herein, commenting on their delinquency and pointing out the necessity for bringing their security cases to a current status.

RECOMMENDATION:

The field will continue to be followed closely regarding security delinquency and you will be advised of the results of the review of the December, 1963, administrative reports.

DETAILS:

The November, 1963, administrative reports from all offices indicate that the total pending active matters in classifications 65, 100 and 105 increased from 16,989 to 17,040. Delinquent items increased from 1,045 to 1,621. The percentage of delinquent items increased from 6.1% to 9.5%.

of a Conclusion of the national security lines.

For your assistance, the assistance of your investigative personnel engaged in security work, and for the assistance of your supervisory staff, the following specific factors, in addition to the ones presently enumerated in Section 87D of the Manual of Instructions, are set forth for consideration in arriving at a determination as to whether a security subject falls within the Security Index criteria, represents a potential danger in time of an emergency, and thus should be included in the Security Index.

- (1) Contacts with Sino-Soviet-bloc establishments (including Cuba) where purpose of contact cannot be determined or contact indicates communist sympathies.
- (2) Contacts with Sino-Soviet-bloc, Cuban or Yugoslav intelligence agents where purpose of contact cannot be determined or contact indicates communist sympathies.
- (3) Individuals who have defected, revoked or sought revocation of their United States citizenship in favor of a Sino-Soviet-bloc country, who have returned to the United States, and who have taken no positive steps to counteract such action.
- (4) Statements of activities on a subject's part establishing reasonable grounds to believe that his loyalty would lie with a Sino-Soviet-bloc country in the event of armed conflict between the United States and a Sino-Soviet-bloc country.
- (5) Training and/or participation in espionage, sabotage, or intelligence activities.
- A history of emotional instability or irrational behavior on the part of an individual with a subversive background whose prior acts depict a propensity for violence and hatred against organized government.

The above factors, including the various factors presently set forth in Section 87D of the Manual of Instructions, are not all inclusive but are set forth for the purpose of providing a more detailed guideline and all must be considered in evaluating the facts developed during the course of the investigation.

In view of our responsibilities in the internal security field, most careful attention must be afforded this aspect of our operations and all security cases should be closely examined for the purpose of determining whether sufficient facts are available to depict the subject as a dangerous person whose activities warrant the inclusion of his name in the Security Index. When such a determination is made, appropriate recommendation to include his name in the Security Index should be made promptly.

SECURITY INDEX

The Security Index is a list of individuals determined through investigation as representing a threat to the internal security of the country in the event of an emergency involving the launching of an attack on this country by the Soviet bloc. It is an administrative device through which the expeditious apprehension of the individuals whose names are included therein in such an emergency is to be accomplished.

As of November 15, 1963, this Index contained the names of 10,519 individuals.

From the above group we have identified and tabled 1,967 individuals who because of their training, violent tendencies and prominence in subversive activity represent the greatest threat in time of a national emergency and are scheduled for priority in time of a national emergency and are priority Apprehension apprehension. This is referred to as the Priority Apprehension Program, code name DETCOM.

Attached Exhibit A is a copy of the Security Index criteria, including the criteria utilized in adding names to the Security Index based upon support of the present Cuban regime.

Attached Exhibit B is a copy of the criteria utilized in tabbing for DETCOM.

In connection with all individuals recommended for addition to the Security Index in consideration of the above-mentioned standards there must be a clear showing, by overt acts or statements or other evidence, that there has been a continuing sympathy for the aims and objectives of the Cuban Government since 10/1/60.

CRITERIA FOR PLACING AND RETAINING NAMES IN THE SECURITY INDEX

- A. Subject has had membership or participation in the activities of a basic revolutionary organization within the last 5 years as shown by overt acts or statements established through reliable source, informants, or individuals.
- B. Subject has had membership or participation in the affairs of one or more front organizations, which adhere to the policies and doctrines of a revolutionary group, in a leadership capacity or by active substantial participation in the furtherance of the aims or purposes of the front organizations within the last 3 years as shown by overt acts or statements established through reliable sources, informants, or individuals.
- C. Investigation has developed information that an individual, though not a member or a participant in the activities of a subversive organization, has anarchist or revolutionary beliefs and is likely to seize upon the opportunity presented by a national emergency to endanger the public safety as shown by overt acts or statements within the last 3 years established through reliable sources, informants, or individuals.
- D. Although investigation has failed to establish overt acts or statements on the part of a subject within the time limits set out above, facts have been developed which clearly and unmistakably depict the subject as a dangerous individual who could be expected to commit acts inimical to the national defense and public safety of the U. S. in time of emergency.

Activity in Support of Cuban Regime

An individual has served as a leader or officer or has substantially participated in the activities of a pro-Castro organization and has engaged in activities which have included either the preparation or distribution of pro-Castro or anti-U. S. propaganda; the active collection of funds for any agency or pro-Castro group, which funds are not intended

PRIORITY APPREHENSION PROGRAM (DETCOM)

Each Security Index subject is considered for DETCOM tabbing when he falls within one or more of the following categories:

- A. All top functionaries and key figures
- B. Currently active communists or members of any basic revolutionary organization (active within past year) when there is evidence of one or more of following:
 - Activity as local organizers or leaders in the organization
 - Special training at Lenin School or Far Eastern Institute in Moscow
 - 3. Experience as picket captains, strong-arm men, or active participation in violent strikes, riots, or demonstrations
 - Violent statements or strong revolutionary tendencies as shown by their activities
- Persons active in Communist Party underground
- D. Any other Security Index subject whose activities, past or present, regardless of membership in a revolutionary organization, clearly and unmistakably depict the individual as a potential saboteur, espionage agent, or disruptionist in the event of an emergency

SYNOPSIS:

Each month we follow the field closely on the status of security work by analyzing the backlog of pending cases and delinquency in espionage, internal security, security matter and foreign intelligence cases in classifications 65, 100 and 105. Status of these cases as of December 31, 1963, is set forth below.

In December, there was a decrease in pending active matters in the entire field in the security classifications from 17,040 to 17,013. Delinquent matters decreased from 1,621 to 1,420. The percentage of delinquent matters decreased from 9.5% to 8.3%.

Letters are being sent to the offices indicated by asterisks on page four herein, commenting on their delinquency and pointing out the necessity for bringing their security cases to a current status.

RECOMMENDATION:

The field will continue to be followed closely regarding security delinquency and you will be advised of the results of the review of the January, 1964, administrative reports.

DETAILS:

The December, 1963, administrative reports from all offices indicate that the total pending active matters in classifications 65, 100 and 105 decreased from 17,040 to 17,018. By memorandum dated 12/24/63 you were advised that as of that date there were 81 Cuban aliens on the Security Index (SI). Since that date two Cuban aliens have been added to the SI and one deleted as he had departed the United States and returned to Cuba. The present total of Cuban aliens on SI is 82. During this period the total number of individuals included in the "Cuban" Special Section of the SI, which Section includes both aliens and United States citizens, increased from 168 to 169. Further, the present total of individuals on the regular SI tabbed C (for pro-Cuban) increased from 254 to 262. Our investigations are continuing and the field is being closely followed to insure that the Bureau's objectives are met. You will be kept advised of progress in this matter.

The Reserve Index is designated to represent those persons who, in the light of ever changing conditions, should be continually borne in mind from the standpoint of the security of the country with a view to possible investigation, interrogation, or other action under the Security Index Program. It represents a group of individuals who, next to Security Index subjects, present the greatest potential threat to the entire security of the country in time of an emergency.

This index is divided into two sections-Section A and Section B. Section A is designed to represent a group of individuals because of their predominantly professional backgrounds are scheduled to receive prior consideration with respect to investigation and/or other action following apprenension of Security Index subjects.

Section A is reviewed annually, the review consisting of at least verification of residence and employment and contacts with informants. Today there are 1,268 cases falling in the Section A category.

The last review of Section B of the Reserve Index was initiated in June, 1962. We propose to initiate a review of Section B of this index to cover a one-year period for the purpose of again bringing it up to date. In this connection, the value of the Reserve Index is directly in proportion to the attention afforded it. The review will include verification of the residence and employment of the subjects as well as contacts with informants and confidential sources. This will insure that we are not overlooking any presently dangerous individuals whose names should be returned to the Security Index; bring our knowledge of this group of individuals up to date; and enable us to explore the possibility for the development of potential witnesses, sources, and Informants from among this group.

It is proposed that this review be accomplished over a 12-month period. Based upon estimates, it would appear that the total cases involved will approximate 10,000 throughout the field.

REQUEST FOR INSERT - SECTION 87-D MANUAL OF INSTRUCTIONS

Section 87-D of the Manual of Instructions pertains to security investigations of individuals. Included in this Section are the highly complicated and technical rules and procedures pertaining to the Security Index. — ()

It is believed that it would be most helpful in the supervision of our investigations if each Agent in the Soviet Section could have readily available a copy of this particular Section. It is believed that the individual Agents have a constant need for checking the Manual provisions as they pertain to the Security Index.

At the present time, we have four complete sets of the Manual of Instructions strategically located in the Soviet Section. However, in view of the constant need for checking Section 37-D, if a copy could be made available to each Agent Supervisor, it would materially assist our operations.

ACTION:

It is recommended that this be referred to the Administrative Division and that 16 copies of the Manual of Instructions insert, Section 87-D, be furnished to the Soviet Section. It will not be necessary that these Sections be individually charged out since they will be maintained by the Supervisors in their desks.

INTERNAL SECURITY - CUBA

Subject, a U. S. citizen, is twenty-five years of age and is married to a Cuban national. He is an engineer by proxession and has been a permanent resident of Cuba since 1960 employed as Director of Production, Planta Sulfometales, Ministerio de Industrias, Puerto de Santa Lucia, Pinar Del Rio, Cuba, in production of sulfuric acid.

No positive information has been developed indicating subject is actively involved in or supporting other pro-Castro activities and no information has been developed indicating subject was actively engaged in communist or subversive activities while previously in the U.S. which would warrant his inclusion on the Security Index.

Subject's parents were born in Russia. Father, and mother, reportedly were International Workers Order members prior to 1951 and an uncle, was a Communist Party section treasurer in New York, New York, in 1947. Subject was a member of the Sane Ruclear Policy Committee in 1958 and attended the Seventh Youth World Festival in 1959. During a visit to the U.S. in November, 1960, subject was evasive during interview with INS officials and reportedly wore a beard. Subject is presently included on the Reserve Index, Section B, in the New York Office.

ODSERVATIONS:

From the above it appears that subject's activities of an organizational nature would not qualify him for the Security Index. He is not an avowed Marxist nor has he committed overt acts or made inflammatory statements indicating he would be dangerous to the internal security of the U.S. in the event of a national

emergency. His continued residence and employment by the Castro regime in Cuba, considering the present relationship between the U. S. and Cuba coupled with his known background as indicated above, would indicate, however, pro-Cuban and anti-U. S. sympathies on the part of the subject.

In the past when a U. S. citizen has gone to Cuba for employment or other reasons and investigation has failed to develop additional subversive data warranting his inclusion on the Security Index, appropriate stops have been placed to insure that we were notified of the individual's return to the U. S. at which time additional investigation would be conducted to determine whether subject's activities warranted his inclusion on the Security Index. It is felt, however, that in view of present world conditions, specifically as relating to Cuba, that continued voluntary presence in Cuba of subject would indicate pre-Castro and anti-U. S. sympathies which would warrant his inclusion on the Security Index.

SUBJECT: DELINQUENCY IN SECURITY INVESTIGATIONS

SYNOPSIS:

Each month we follow the field closely on the status of security work by analyzing the backlog of pending cases and delinquency in espionage, internal security, security matter and foreign intelligence cases in classifications 65, 100 and 105. Status of these cases as of January 31, 1964, is set forth below.

In January, there was an increase in pending active matters in the entire field in the security classifications from 17,013 to 17,609. Delinquent matters decreased from 1,420 to 1,266. The percentage of delinquent matters decreased from 8.3 per cent to 7.1 per cent.

Letters are being sent to the offices indicated by asterisks on page four herein, commenting on their delinquency and pointing out the necessity for bringing their security cases to a current status.

RECOMMENDATION:

The field will continue to be followed closely regarding security delinquency and you will be advised of the results of the review of the February, 1964, administrative reports.

DETAILS:

The January, 1964, administrative reports from all offices indicate that the total pending active matters in classifications 65, 100 and 105 increased from 17,013 to 17,309. SYNOPSIS:

Each month we follow the field closely on the status of security work by analyzing the backlog of pending cases and delinquency in espionage, internal security, security matter and foreign intelligence cases in classifications 65, 100 and 105. Status of these cases as of February 29, 1964, is set forth below.

In February, there was an increase in pending active matters in the entire field in the security classifications from 17,609 to 18,474.

Delinquent matters increased from 1,266 to 1,400. The percentage of delinquent matters increased from 7.1 per cent to 7.5 per cent.

Letters are being sent to the offices indicated by asterisks on page four herein, commenting on their delinquency and pointing out the necessity for bringing their security cases to a current status.

RECOMMENDATION:

The field will continue to be followed closely regarding security delinquency and you will be advised of the results of the review of the March, 1964, administrative reports.

DETAILS:

The February, 1964, administrative reports from all offices indicate that the total pending active matters in classifications 65, 100 and 105 increased from 17,609 to 18,474. Delinquent items increased from 1,266 to 1,400. The percentage of delinquent items increased from 7.1 per cent to 7.5 per cent.

The following statistics show the status of pending work, including both pending active and pending inactive matters, and delinquency for all field divisions for the last four months.

xerox copies can be prepared. Destruction of existing extra copies would take clerical time but would provide additional cabinet space. It could be done annually when channelizing memoranda are destroyed in each file after the preparation of the annual report.

Recommendations and Comments of Division Head

I would recommend that the file copies being retained in the office of origin be reduced from 3 to 2, not 1 as suggested by SA since there is always the possibility that it may be necessary to disseminate copies to the USA at some future date. It would appear that one copy remaining in the file would be adequate. Further, I would recommend acceptance of the suggestion of stripping the security files down to 2 copies, rather than 1 as suggested, so as to effect savings in file space.

In the event the suggestion of SA is adopted, I would recommend an incentive award in the appropriate amount due to the savings effected.

SUBJECT: DELINQUENCY IN SECURITY INVESTIGATIONS

SYNOPSIS:

Each month we follow the field closely on the status of security work by analyzing the backlog of pending cases and delinquency in espionage, internal security, security matter and foreign intelligence cases in classifications 65, 100 and 105. Status of these cases as of March 31, 1964, is set forth below.

In March there was an increase in pending active matters in the entire field in the security classifications from 13,474 to 19,132. Delinquent matters increased from 1,400 to 1,415. The percentage of delinquent matters decreased from 7.5 per cent to 7.3 per cent.

Letters are being sent to the offices indicated by asterisks on page four herein, commenting on their delinquency and pointing out the necessity for bringing their security cases to a current status.

RECOMMENDATION:

The field will continue to be followed closely regarding security delinquency and you will be advised of the results of the review of the April, 1964, auministrative reports.

DETAILS:

The March, 1964, administrative reports from all offices indicate that the total pending active matters in classifications 65, 100 and 105 increased from 18,474 to 19,132. Delinquent items increased from 1,400 to 1,415. The percentage of delinquent items decreased from 7.5 per cent to 7.3 per cent.

The following statistics show the status of pending work, including both pending active and pending inactive matters, and delinquency for all field divisions for the last four months.

PURPOSE:

To consider the feasibility and desirability of furnishing names, address, background, and subversive data on our Security Index (SI) subjects (approximately 10,400) to Secret Service.

DETAILS:

The basic premise upon which we presently make dissemination to Secret Service in connection with its responsibilities for the protection of the President is "Do we have information depicting this individual as representing a potential threat to the President?" Specific criteria which will be set out later herein are utilized in this connection.

Advantages of furnishing Secret Service the SI List:

It would appear that the only advantage in such dissemination would accrue only if one of the subjects on this list should make an attempt on the life of the President or actually succeeded in assassinating him. In such an attempt, we would be in a position to state that this individual's name had been furnished Secret Service as representing a possible threat to the President.

Disadvantages:

does not necessarily indicate that he represents a threat to the President. We have numerous names of individuals in the professional field such as lawyers, doctors, and educators whose names are on the SI because of their affiliations with subversive movements indicating that they would represent a potential threat to the internal security of the Nation should we get into hostilities with the Soviet Bloc and as such should be apprehended and detained in efforts to prevent espionage, sabotage, and subversion. Some of these people are prominent in their field of endeavor and no information has been developed indicating any tendencies toward actual violence.

10,400 SI cases would present a tremendous problem in preparing them for dissemination to Secret Service. Preparation by the field of succinct summary memoranda in each individual case would be more feasible. However this would present a tremendous burden on our manpower. As new names are added to the SI it would be necessary to furnish same to Secret Service. We could not "purge" the list as names are cancelled except by death as to do so would amount to a certification by us that the individual no longer represented any kind of threat.

- (3) To be meaningful it would require that we keep Secret Service advised of the movement, residence and employment of these individuals. In this connection, numerous changes in the SI approximating 6,000 per year occur. To keep Secret Service informed would, in itself, present a tremendous problem.
- (4) It could conceivably seriously jeopardize our sources. For example, should we furnish Secret Service memoranda on each of 322 SI subjects in the Philadelphia Office who are on the SI because of communist affiliation and should the President visit Philadelphia, Secret Service would, of necessity, have to furnish this list to local police in requesting assistance. Little difficulty would be experienced by communist leaders, should the list be "leaked," in pinpointing our security informants whose names are not included therein. In addition, the list could then possibly be referred to as "FBI Assassin's List."
- (5) It would bog Secret Service down administratively. For example, there are over 2,900 individuals on the SI in the New York Office. On a Presidential visit to New York City, the combined efforts of the entire New York FBI Office, local police, and Secret Service could not possibly keep them all under surveillance.

 (6) The security classification of memoranda furnished Secret

(6) The security classification of memoranda furnished Secret Service concerning SI subjects would range from unclassified to as high as Top Secret. Storage of classified information requires special storage arrangements which may present problems to Secret Service and thus to the security of our information.

arrangements which may present problems to Secret Service and thus to the security of our information.

(7) The SI is an integral part of the Department's Emergency Detention Program. We have heretofore refused to furnish this list outside of the Department while we have had requests for same. Although we do disseminate reports in individual cases, to now furnish Secret Service memoranda on each SI subject would mean that we are placing in the hands of another agency what is in effect the complete SI now in possession of only the Bureau and the Department.

Memorandum to SECURITY INDEX PRESENT CRITERIA UTILIZED IN DISSEMINATION Actual threats against the life of the President, members of his family, or the Vice President are, of course, brought to the immediate attention of Secret Service, both from the field and at the Seat of Government. In/addition to the above, the field, on a continuing basis, furnishes Secret Service identities of subversives, ultra-rightists,/racists, and so forth, identified as (1) possessing emotional instability or irrational behavior (2) who have made threats of bodily harm against officials or employees of Federal, state, or local Government or officials of a foreign government (3) who express or have expressed strong or violent anti-United States sentiments and who have been involved in bombing or bomb making or whose past conduct indicates tendencies, toward violence and (4) whose prior acts or statements depict propensity for violence and hatred against organized government. In this connection, our SI as well as other files were reviewed beginning 12/10/63 for the purpose of identifying individuals falling within the above categories and as identified memoranda concerning these individuals were furnished Secret Service. It is not known how many names of SI subjects were furnished as this information is available only in the field offices. In addition to the above, we do, as a matter of practice, furnish Secret Service reports concerning individuals affiliated with Puerto Rican nationalist groups whose names are included in the SI (approximately 450) because of the propensity for violence on the part of individual members of these groups as evidenced by the 1950 attempt on the life of President Truman at the Blair House as well as the 1954 shooting in the House of Representatives. what about pro-OBSERVATION: Based upon the above, it would appear that the interest: of the Bureau, Secret Service and the President would thus be served by making our dissemination on a selective basis in line with existing practice and that we disseminate on those individuals on whom we have any information indicating that he represents a potential threat to the safety of the President rather than on the basis as the SI. to whether he is ACTION

(SEMIANNUAL REVIEW AND ANALYSIS)

Origin: This program instituted November, 1960. Purpose: Program established to keep track of dangerous individuals of pro-Castro affiliations, activities or sympathies and to insure they are neutralized in event of hostilities involving Cuba. Scope: Program applies to two categories of pro-Castro Security Index (SI) subjects concerning whom we would take appropriate action in case of Cuban emergency. (A) Individuals placed on SI solely on basis of their pro-Castro activities, connections or sympathies. (B) Individuals placed on SI forother reasons (such as members of Communist Party) who, by reason of pro-Castro activities, are considered dangerous in event of hostilities with Cuba and who are tabbed "Pro-Cuban." Tie-In With Other Programs: This program is coordinated with over-all SI program. Case Load: As of 3-19-64, 268 individuals were tabbed "Pro-Cuban"; 184 Cubans were listed in the Special Section "Cuban" of which 85 were aliens. Magnitude: In the event of hostilities with Cuba, the Government could immediately proceed to pick up those individuals listed on the SI who are Cuban aliens. We keep the Immigration and Naturalization Service (INS) informed concerning these aliens, and the Attorney General is having deportation warrants against them prepared for service by INS should the eventuality arise.

Past or Present Weaknesses: No present weaknesses in this program. Program instituted November, 1960, in view of possibility of a break in relations between the U.S. and Cuba or a limited emergency growing out of Cuban situation. Administrative Control: One Supervisor has the direct responsibility for following captioned matter and assuring that the field vigorously presses all aspects of this program. Accordingly, it receives a continuing review. Adequacy and Currentness of Instructions: SAC Letters 60-54, dated 11-22-60; 62-55 dated 10-5-62; and 63-61 dated 12-17-63 furnished the field over-all instructions concerning this program. These instructions are still current and complete.

Memorandum to RE: SECURITY INDEX - CUBA

Over-All Value: The program serves to more completely discharge our responsibilities in the security field as they relate to the Cuban situation and to insure that our responsibilities are continuously being met.

Contemplated Action: Program should be continued as now constituted.

Security Indox - Dissemination to Secret Service

In accordance with the Director's instructions that all names of our Security Index subjects be supplied to Secret Service, there is attached a proposed airtel to all offices instructing the immediate preparation of letterhead memoranda for dissemination to Secret Service in these cases. A 30-day deadline is being set in all offices having less than 1,600 Security Index subjects. A 60-day deadline is being set in offices having more than 1,000 Security Index subjects; namely, New York, Los Angeles, and San Francisco.

We are instructing that these memoranda contain pertinent background data, residence, employment, and any information indicative of emotional instability or of a propensity for violence, as well as possession of firearms, together with a succinct statement regarding subject's membership and participation in a subversive movement. These individuals are of continuing investigative interest and we are instructing the field to submit appropriate memoranda for dissemination to Secret Service as these subjects change residence or employment. Dissemination will be made at Seat of Government as well as on a local level following review of the memoranda by the Eureau and copies of these memoranda will be directed to Eureau files at the Seat of Government.

December 10, 1963, Instructions Regarding Dissemination to Secret Service

By teletype December 10, 1963, we directed the field to initiate a review of Security Index, Esserve Index, and pending security cases, as well as a review of files relating to ultra-rightists, racists, and fascists for the purpose of identifying individuals falling within four specified categories (attached as Exhibit A) and subsequent dissemination locally to Secret Service. As of now 2,403 names have been furnished Secret Service as falling within the, above categories.

Memoranda regarding these 2,463 individuals were disseminated by the field to local offices of Secret Service. In doing this we were following established Eureau procedures. For example, the field disseminates locally a great deal of information to various Government agencies as a result of name checks or information received indicative of an interest on the part of another Government agency. However, to insure that the matter was subject to Eureau review, we instructed the field to establish a special control file containing the identities of the persons involved and made this control file subject to review by the Inspectors in all field inspections.

Supervision At The Sent Of Government

It is the responsibility of Secret Service to follow up on any information furnished to them regarding a possible threat to the President and we have so told them. We do not attempt to maintain whereabouts or activities of such individuals unless we have pending investigations concerning them. Where we have a pending investigation, the Bureau as well as the field should review dissemination and the attached airtel contains such instructions. The attached airtel instructs that in any pending care where information has been disseminated to Secret Service, changes of address shall be furnished Secret Service locally with copies to the Bureau for filing and dissemination to Secret Service headquarters. If a subject moves to another field division territory, dissemination locally is to be handled by the new office of origin.

We are not attempting to keep track of whereabouts of persons on whom we have disseminated information to Secret Service who are not the subjects of pending investigations. However, if information comes to the attention of the field, through an informant or other source; showing a change of residence or employment and the files show previous dissemination to Secret Service, the field is being instructed to disseminate the new residence or employment data locally.

In addition, we are instructing the field to review its indices for any information regarding actual threats against

This matter is to be handled within 30 days of receipt of this communication in all offices having less than 1,000 Security Index subjects. Those offices having in excess of 1,000 Security Index subjects must complete the review within 60 days.

In non-Security Index cases, as subjects falling within the four categories set out in the 12/10/63 teletype to all offices are identified by you, promptly submit to the Bureau letterhead memoranda in duplicate for referral to Secret Service at the Seat of Government and advise Secret Service locally. Place a copy of such memoranda in your control file. Memoranda prepared on Security Index subjects need not be placed in your control file.

In other than Security Index cases in which memoranda are propared pursuant to the 12/10/03 teletype, it is incumbent upon the Eureau to keep Secret Service advised of the change of residence or employment of those individuals of pending investigative interest. Handlo in the same manner as Security Index subjects. In those instances in which the subjects are not of investigative interest, advise Secret Service locally regarding their change of residence or employment at any time such information comes to your attention.



By nemerandum dated 3/19/64 you were advised that as of that date there were 85 Cuban aliens on the Security Index (SI). Since that date one Cuban alien has been added to the SI and two have been deleted. These two were deleted because they returned to Cuba.

The present total of Cuban aliens on the SI is 84.

During this period the total number of individuals included in the "Cuban" Special Section of the SI, which includes both aliens and United States citizens, increased from 184 to 188. Further, the present total of individuals on the regular SI tabbed C (for pro-Cuban) has increased from 268 to 271.

Our investigations are continuing and the Field is being closely followed to insure that the Eureau's objectives are met. You will be kept advised of progress in this matter.

In addition, these memoranda being prepared contain only a succinct statement regarding a subject's affiliation with and participation in a subversive movement and do not show the source of such information. Therefore, in connection with reporting in other matters it could not serve for reference purposes for Agents handling security investigations.

The suggestion is that this serial be maintained as a top serial in the volume current at time of preparation. It would remain in this volume after it has been closed and a new volume opened and, thereafter, would not necessarily serve as a ready check for supervisory review in connection with dissemination to Secret Service. There are available adequate baleguards to insure that a memorandum is furnished Sacret Service in connection with all Security Index cases.

RECOMMENDATION:

For the reasons outlined above, the Domestic Intelligence Division recommends against adoption of this suggestion. If you agree, this memorandum should be referred to the Training Division.

By zirtel dated 4/13/64, the Bureau instructed the field to prepare letterhead memoranda in all Security Index cases for dissemination to Secret Service in connection with captioned matter. Also to be reviewed were non-Security Index cases as well as files relating to ultra-rightists, racists and facists. The purpose of such reviews was to identify: individuals possessing emotional instability or irrational behavior; persons who have made threats of bodily harm against officials or employees of Federal, state or local government or officials of a foreign government; individuals expressing strong and violent anti-United States sentiments and who have been involved in bombings or bomb-making or whose past conduct indicates tendencies toward violence; and, individuals whose prior actions or state pents depict a propensity for violence and hatred against organized government.

Following initial submission of these memoranda, any changes occurring in the status of these individuals with respect to residence and employment is likewise to be disseminated.

of the Minneapolis Office proposed that FD-154 (Verification of Information on Security Index Cards) be revised to include provision for noting whether a letterical memorandum should be submitted to Bureau and Secret Service. This would flag these cases and insure that Secret Service would be correctly advised.

Domestic Intelligence Division advised that the suggested NOT BIO COLUMN form would be of benefit in insuring that Secret Service was advised of changes West Outside these individuals as they occurred and should be adopted at the next printing of the form. Training Division agrees.

SA also proposed that the procedure of noting "SS" (for Secret Service) on the Reserve Index Cards and file covers of Reserve Index cases and other non-Security Index cases wherein letterhead memoranda have been submitted pursuant to the aforementioned Dureau instructions be approved for use of the field. The procedure was approved for use in the Minneapolis Office by Bureau on 4/20/64. He further proposed that, in those cases in which we have submitted the name of an individual to Secret Service as constituting a danger to the President of the U. S. pursuant to Bureau instructions establishing criteria identifying such persons and no master case file exists on such individual, an index card be prepared concerning the subject's name, address and employment if known plus a statement that Secret Service should be notified of any change in the information.

Domestic Intelligence Division advised with respect to the latter proposal that, under Bureau instructions in the aforementioned airted dated 4/13/64, the field is required to advise Secret Service locally regarding any change of residence or employment in the case of subjects not of investigative interest at time such information comes to attention. The placing of an index card in the office indices is not felt necessary since the information would come to light in connection with any file review conducted of the individual in question.

With respect to stamping "SS" on the Reserve Index cards and file covers of Reserve Index cases and other non-Security Index cases where letterhead memoranda were submitted to Secret Service, they felt other offices may have devised other suitable methods and, before approving the idea for the field, we should solicit the opinions of other offices.

Washington Field Offices and they were unanimously in favor of stamping the notation "SS" on the Reserve Index cards and file covers of Reserve Index cases and non-Security Index cases wherein letterhead memoranda had been submitted to Secret Service. Such a flag would be invaluable to them. The Baltimore Office advised that these cases would be relatively inf. equent in their office since they felt, under the criteria established, such individuals would be subject to reconsideration for inclusion on the Security Index but, because of the infrequency, the notation would be all the more beneficial. For these reason Training Division feels idea should be adopted.

RECOMMENDATIONS: 1 - That proposed revision of Form FD-154 and the procedure for noting "SS" on the Reserve Index cards and file covers of Reserve Index and non-Security Index cases wherein letterhead memoranda have been submitted to Secret Service pursuant to Bureau instructions, be adopted and the attached letter of appreciation be sent to suggester. Receipt of the idea was acknowledged previously.

2 - On approval, this memorandum will be authority for Forms Management Desk, Training Division to take necessary action with next printing of FD-154.

3 - On approval, this memorandum will be authority for Domestic Intelligence Division to issue necessary instructions to the field for noting initials "55" on Reserve Index cards and on file covers of cases mentioned above.

STANDARDS FOR DISSEMINATION OF INFCRMATION TO SECRET SERVICE PURSUANT TO THE BUREAU'S TELETYPE TO ALL SACS DATED 12-10-63 AND THE CHARGE IN BUREAU MANUALS PREPARED 12-26-63

By teletype to all SACs dated 12-10-63 instructions were issued that the field was to review all Security Index, Reserve Index, and pending security cases as well as files relating to ultra rightists, racists, and facists, for the purpose of identifying individuals in these categories (1) possessing emotional instability or irrational behavior, (2) having made threats of bodily harm against officials or.employees of Federal, state or local governments or officials of a foreign government, (3) expressing strong violent anti-United States sentiments and having been involved in bombings or bomb making or having past conduct indicating tendencies toward violence, and (4) whose prior actions or statements depict propensity for violence rod or * hatred against organized government. These instructions were included in Eureau manuals by a change prepared on 12-26-63 which provided that in addition to dissemination requirements which were in effect prior to the assassination of President Kennedy, other dissemination to Secret Service should be made where persons were identified as subversives, ultra rightists, racists, and facists, and falling within the categories outlined above.

During the first week in April, the field was requested to advise the number of individuals who had been the subject of dissemination to Secret Service under the expanded standards and at that time information had been so disseminated concerning 2,452 individuals.**

DISSEMINATION OF INFORMATION TO SECRET SERVICE CONCERNING PERSONS ON THE SECURITY INDEX

Pursuant to instructions an airtel was sent to all field offices dated 4-13-64 providing for the dissemination to Secret Service of basic information concerning all persons listed on the Security Index. This Index is a list of individuals who, because of their affiliation with subversive movements or having revolutionary or anarchistic tendencies, would present a threat to the internal security of this country during a time of war. The field is now reviewing all Security Index cases for the preparation of monoranda for dissemination pursuant to this instruction and as of 5-7-64, 2,826 memoranda have been forwarded to Secret Service in this connection. We have 10,358 individuals on the Security Index, and within the next few weeks dissemination memoranda will be prepared on all these individuals.

SYNOPSIS:

Each month we follow the field closely on the status of security work by analyzing the backlog of pending cases and delinquency in espionage, internal security, security matter and foreign intelligence cases in classifications 65, 100 and 105. Status of these cases as of April 30, 1964, is set forth below.

In April there was an increase, in pending active matters in the entire field in the security classifications from 19,132 to 20,969. Delinquent matters increased from 1,415 to 1,432. The percentage of delinquent matters decreased from 7.3 per cent to 6.8 per cent.

Letters are being sent to the offices indicated by asterisks on page four herein, commenting on their delinquency and pointing out the necessity for bringing their security cases to a current status.

RECOMMENDATION:

The field will continue to be followed closely regarding security delinquency and you will be advised of the results of the review of the May, 1964, administrative reports.

The April, 1964, administrative reports from all offices indicate that the total pending active matters in classifications 65, 100 and 105 increased from 19,132 to 20,969. I have received your suggestion that Form FD-122 be revised in a particular fashion. As a matter of possible interest to you, Form FD-154 is being revised for this purpose at the present time due to a former suggestion. In addition, a form has been approved for use in making certain dissemination to the Secret Service. Other ideas regarding the revision of Form FD-122 have been considered and it was decided this was not necessary.

Although this idea had received prior consideration, I appreciate the interest you displayed in giving me the benefit of your observations on this matter.

SYNOPSIS:

Each month we follow the field closely on the status of security work by analyzing the backlog of pending cases and delinquency in espionage, internal security, security matter and foreign intelligence cases in classifications 65, 100 and 105. Status of these cases as of May 31, 1964, is set forth below.

In May there was a decrease in pending active matters in the entire field in the security classifications from 20,969 to 20,505. Delinquent matters increased from 1,432 to 2,109. The percentage of delinquent matters increased from 6.8 per cent to 10.2 per cent.

The increase in delinquency throughout the field in these categories, particularly in the larger offices, undoubtedly was caused by the concentrated attention the field was required to give in preparing letterhead memoranda for dissemination to Secret Service in all Security Index cases. A separate letter is being forwarded all offices commenting upon this situation and containing instructions to concentrate on reducing their delinquency in the above categories now that dissemination to Secret Servic; of letterhead memoranda in all Security Index cases is practically completed.

RECOMMENDATION:

The field will continue to be followed closely regarding security delinquency and you will be advised of the results of the review of the June, 1964, administrative reports.

Memorandum fc RE: DELINQUENCY IN SECURITY INVESTIGATIONS

DETAILS:

The May, 1964, administrative reports from all offices, indicate that the total pending active matters in classifications 65, 100 and 105 decreased from 20,969 to 20,505. Delinquent items increased from 1,432 to 2,109. The percentage of delinquent items increased from 6.8 per cent to 10.2 per cent.

The following statistics show the status of pending work, including both pending active and pending inactive matters, and delinquency for all field divisions for the last four months.

SECURITY INVESTIGATIONS OF INDIVIDUALS

An analysis of administrative reports for the month of May, 1964, has revealed a substantial increase in delinquency in security classifications 65, 100 and 105 on a field-wide basis.

The Dureau recognized that this situation would probably arise because of the concentrated attention required in complying with Bureau instructions of April 13, 1964, dealing with dissemination of letterhead memoranda to Secret Service in all Security Index cases. This project has, with few exceptions, been completed in all offices; therefore, the Bureau desires that close attention be afforded all delinquent matters in the above classifications in efforts to effect a substantial reduction therein during the month of June, 1964.

I want to again remind you of the importance of name necessity for prompt dissemination to Secret Service of information of interest to it in connection with its responsibilities for protection of the President. As new names are added to the Security Index, letterhead memoranda should be promptly submitted in accordance with current instructions. In other than Security Index cases, you should be guided by the instructions contained in Section 83% of the Manual of Instructions. This matter should be followed closely by you.

The emphasis placed on the preparation of letterhead memoranda for dissemination to Secret Service in Security Index cases, since 4/15/64, is the probable cause of the rise in security delinquency in classifications 65, 100 and 105 during May, 1964, from approximately 6.8%, as of 4/30/64, to 10.2%, as of 5/31/64.

SUGGESTION: A current characterization of a Security Index (SI) subject should be prepared at the time the annual report is written on such subject, typed on a small card and affixed to the SI card. This procedure could be made optional for the field.

PRESENT PRACTICE: No such characterization is attached to the individual SI card!

ADVANTAGES: Agents would have access to up-to-date characterizations on SI subjects thereby eliminating file reviews to obtain them.

OBSERVATIONS: SAC of the Los Angeles Office opposed adoption because he did not believe the time and effort required to prepare the characterization was justified by the limited need for them.

Domestic Intelligence Division also opposed adoption. They agreed with the objections of the SAC and also noted that each report submitted in an SI case requires inclusion of a succinct summary in the cover pages justifying retention of the subject in the SI. This statement when properly completed is, in fact, a current characterization of the incividual and is readily available. Further, in numerous instances, a current characterization is not what is needed in a report. For example, if a report is being prepared or a ubject and information is available indicating he was closely associated with another individual with a subversive background a number of years previously, it would be necessary to characterize the associate's activities during the period of association rather than currently in order to show the pertinence of their contact with each other.

Training Division agrees with the foregoing views. The preparation of the proposed cards would be in effect an unnecessary duplication of material in the annual report and, while it would at times be more readily available than the same data in the report in file, the benefit to be realized is not believed sufficient to warrant the work involved in making and handling the cards.

RECOMMENDATION: That the suggestion not be adopted.—On-approval, no further action is necessary; receipt of the idea was acknowledged previously.

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This Division recommends that the above suggestion not be adopted for the following reasons:

- 1) The additional effort required to prepare the characterization would not appear to justify the limited need.
- 2) In each report submitted in a Security Index case, the field is required to include in the cover pages thereto a succinct statement justifying the subject's continued retention in the Security Index. This statement when properly completed is, in fact, a current characterization of the individual and is readily available.
- 3) In numerous instances, a current characterization of an individual is not what is needed in a report. For example, a report is being prepared on a subject and information is available indicating he was closely associated with another individual with a subversive background a number of years ago. To show the pertinence of such association it would be necessary to characterize the associate's activities during the period of association and not the current characterization.
