There are 10,413 persons represented in the Security Index as of June 15, 1964. Of the total, 8,058 or 77.4 per cent are communists.

A detailed table, enclosed in duplicate, shows as of June 15, 1964, the distribution of the subjects by field office, nationalistic tendencies, dangerousness, sex, race, citizenship and "special lists." A key to abbreviations is enclosed.

SUGGESTION It is suggested that in submitting reports covering the investigation of individuals in Security Matter cases (100 classification where no local dissemination is called for at the time of the report being written, that only one copy of the report be prepared for the office of origin rather than the currently required three copies. During the comprehensive review of selected Security Index cases made in connection with the preparation of letterhead memoranda for Secret Service under the TROPUS (Travel of the President in the United States and Commonwealth of Puerto Rico) project, it was determined that very few copies of reports had been disseminated locally after the time of the initial report. The future preparation of only one copy of such reports for the office of origin would be in the interest of conserving file space, typing paper, and carbon paper. Not in (see page 2)

Current practice or rule (Include manual citation as well as facts) The current practice is to submit 3 copies of each of these reports to the office of origin or to prepare 3 copies if your office is office of origin. (Manual of Rules and Regulations, Section 9, page 11; FBI Handbook, Part I, page 94)

Advantages of suggestion and annual savings (include basis for estimate) As indicated above, the advantages of this suggestion would lie in the conservation of file space, typing paper and carbon paper. (The suggester is not in a position to estimate the monetary saving which would accrue through adoption of this suggestion.) If such a suggestion is adopted relating to the submission of reports in Security Matter cases relating to individuals, the Bureau might wish to further consider the adoption of a similar policy relating to all 100 classification cases.

Disadvantages of suggestion In the rare instance where it is necessary to make a dissemination of one of these reports subsequent to its original preparation, there would not be an additional copy to disseminate. However, that rare instance, a copy could be rapidly duplicated by duplicating equipment already in the field with a minimum loss in time or expense. It is felt the advantages outweigh this disadvantage.

Suggestion is not recommended. During a time of national emergency, additional copies of Security Matter reports may be needed for dissemination and for use in discharging Bureau's responsibilities, and it does not appear feasible to attempt to reproduce copies of these reports at the time of such emergency.



all cases does an office of origin have three copies of each report in its file. As an example, when a case is transferred from one office to a new office, only one copy of each report is transmitted to the new office of origin. It should also be noted that in those instances in Security Index cases where an annual report is not required, only one copy of the field office letter to the Bureau, reporting verification of residence, employment, and negative informant contacts, is maintained in the field. These two exceptions to the present rule would appear to be Bureau approved precedents for adoption of this suggestion.

There are over 1500 Security Index subjects alone in the Los Angeles Division, on which a report is submitted at a minimum interval of once every year. In addition to the Security Index subjects, there are numerous reports submitted concerning individuals in the Reserve Index (Sections A and B) and other individuals who are not included in either the Security or Reserve Indexes. If dissemination is to be made, it is normally made at the time of original preparation of the report and in that case, the required number of copies would be prepared. There are very few instances of local dissemination of reports following the original date of preparation.

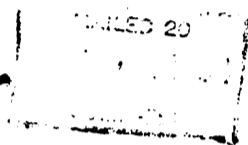

Due to approval of a former suggestion, Form FD-154, Verification of Information on Security Index Cards, has been revised to include an item, "A letterhead memorandum should be submitted to the Bureau and Secret Service" with ballot boxes for checking "Yes" or "No." This change was made to act as a flag to alert personnel that Form FD-366 should be submitted. In addition, floating serials as proposed by suggester are kept to an absolute minimum since good records management dictates mail should be serialized into file.

SUBJECT: DELINQUENCY IN SECURITY INVESTIGATIONS

General

SYNOPSIS:

Each month we follow the field closely on the status of security work by analyzing the backlog of pending cases and delinquency in espionage, internal security, security matter and foreign intelligence cases in classifications 65, 100 and 105. Status of these cases as of June 30, 1964, is set forth below.

In June there was a decrease in pending active matters in the entire field in the security classifications from 20,505 to 19,201. Delinquent matters decreased from 2,109 to 1,611. The percentage of delinquent matters decreased from 10.2 per cent to 8.3 per cent.

Letters are being sent to the offices indicated by asterisks on page four herein, commenting on their delinquency and pointing out the necessity for bringing their security cases to a current status.

RECOMMENDATION:

The field will continue to be followed closely regarding security delinquency and you will be advised of the results of the review of the July, 1964, administrative reports.

DETAILS:

The June, 1964, administrative reports from all offices indicate that the total pending active matters in classifications 65, 100 and 105 decreased from 20,505 to 19,201. Delinquent items decreased from 2,109 to 1,611. The percentage of delinquent items decreased from 10.2 per cent to 8.3 per cent.

The following statistics show the status of pending work, including both pending active and pending inactive matters, and delinquency for all field divisions for the last four months.

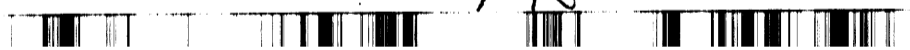

SUGGESTION: That memoranda prepared by the field for dissemination by Legats concerning U. S. security subjects traveling abroad be divided into sections under following captions:

1. Travel (to include countries to be visited and times of visit, if known)
2. Subversive Activities (to include summary of known and alleged subversive activities such as membership in or sympathy with subversive organizations, espionage, etc.)
3. Description (to include physical description and background data of subject with passport number, if known).

PRESENT PROCEDURE: At present, the various pertinent data concerning these individuals are set forth in letterhead memoranda in no particular order.

ADVANTAGES: Suggester feels proposed procedure would increase the clarity of these communications and reduce reviewing and processing time.

OBSERVATIONS: Domestic Intelligence Division considered the proposal and opposed adoption. They commented that they did not believe the data to be so complex as to require use of separate headings. They noted that but three headings were suggested and advised that, in many cases, one sentence would suffice under the headings, "Travel," and "Subversive Activities." Further, the majority of the Legats (including Bern) have to translate the material into another language and any form desired could be used at that time.

In view of the comments of Domestic Intelligence Division, Training Division agrees that the problem is not such as to warrant a requirement that data be set out under headings as suggested.

RECOMMENDATION: That the idea not be adopted. On approval, no further action is necessary; receipt of the suggestion was acknowledged previously.

It is not believed that data is sufficiently complex to require use of separate headings. Only three headings are suggested and in many cases one sentence would suffice under the headings "Travel" and "Subversive Activities." Majority of Legats (including suggester) have to translate the material into another language and any form desired could be used at that time. Recommend against adoption. Bureau manuals contain no instructions regarding the format of letterhead memoranda and it is not believed desirable to establish a specific rule to cover a particular situation of limited application such as is suggested.

CUBAN EMERGENCY PLANS
INTERNAL SECURITY - CUBA

By memorandum dated June 23, 1964, you were advised that as of that date there were 87 Cuban aliens on the Security Index (SI). Since that date two Cuban aliens have been added to the SI making 89 the present total of Cuban aliens on the SI.

During this same period the total number of individuals included in the "Cuban" Special Section of the SI which section includes both aliens and U. S. citizens increased from 202 to 205. The present total of individuals on the regular SI tabbed C (for pro-Cuban) increased from 274 to 276. Our investigations are continuing and the field is being closely followed to insure the Bureau objectives are met. You will be kept advised of progress in this matter.

Initial dissemination to Secret Service in Security Index cases under instructions issued the field April 13, 1964, has now been completed with the exception of a limited number of subjects whose names are carried in the Espionage Special Section of the Security Index. Memorandum Mr. [redacted] to me of June 9, 1964, recommended that in some instances no dissemination be made in these cases as to do so could seriously jeopardize our penetration of Sino-Soviet-Cuban espionage operations. (46 names in this section)

At the inception of this program, there were 10,371 names included in the Security Index. During the period beginning Friday, April 17, 1964, and ending June 12, 1964, 193 names were added to the Security Index and dissemination has been made in these cases. During this same period, 144 names were cancelled from the Security Index and dissemination had been made in some of these cases prior to cancellation.

It was recognized that the very heavy volume of mail would be received over a short period of time placing an added burden on the Records Branch in the processing thereof. This matter was discussed with representatives of the Records Branch and very excellent service was received in connection with this program, particularly from the personnel of the Routing and Filing Units of the Records Branch who were responsible for expeditiously processing the mail as received and getting it into this division as well as the handling and forwarding of numerous files which had to be reviewed in connection with this matter. The promptness on the part of personnel in these two units in handling their duties enabled the prompt review of these memoranda in this division and subsequent dissemination.

As new names are added to the Security Index, dissemination will be made to Secret Service on a continuing basis.

ADVANTAGES: This information which currently appears on the attached card is too susceptible to error since it is not included in the block description column and must be added as a separate item. Adoption of this idea would insure that such statement is not inadvertently omitted from the original Security Index attached card. It would also not be overlooked when subsequent cards are prepared as a result of new face cards being received.

OBSERVATIONS: SAC , Tampa, observed that it appeared proposed procedure would result in uniformity of cards throughout the field and eliminate possibility of essential information not appearing thereon.

The Domestic Intelligence Division recommended suggestion not be adopted for the following reasons:

(1) The face of the Security Index card currently contains a great deal of statistical information and while the information proposed to be placed thereon could be done, definite limitations of space on the face of the card makes it essential that only the most important items be included.

(2) Field compliance with current Bureau instructions would insure this information regarding a subject being armed and dangerous would be placed in the appropriate place on the geographical section Security Index card. The reverse side of this card

contains, as an attachment, a card bearing a photograph, full description, as well as a statement, where appropriate, indicating the subject is armed and dangerous. This is the card which would be physically presented to an agent in the event he were instructed to arrest the subject.

(3) It would be necessary for a field-wide review to be conducted of the Security Index cards and recommendations regarding the proposed procedure to carry out the full intent of the suggestion. This division felt the additional work entailed was not warranted.

(4) Other than at time of apprehension, the only instance in which information concerning a subject's potential dangerousness would appear to be pertinent is in connection with our interviews with these subjects. Agents attempting to interview a security subject are required to be thoroughly familiar with the contents of the file, and they would not rely on information contained on the Security Index card.

Training Division agrees with the views expressed by the Domestic Intelligence Division and feels addition of this information on the face side of the Security Index card is not warranted.

RECOMMENDATION: That the suggestion not be adopted. On approval, no further action is warranted as the suggester has been thanked by prior letter.

ADDENDUM: DOMESTIC INTELLIGENCE DIVISION

The Domestic Intelligence Division recommends against adoptions of the above suggestion for the following reasons:

1. The face of the Security Index card currently contains a great deal of statistical information and while the information recommended to be placed thereon could be done, definite limitations of space on the face of the card makes it essential that only the most important items be included thereon.

2. Field compliance with current Bureau instructions would insure that any information indicating a subject to be armed and dangerous appears in the appropriate place on the geographical section Security Index card. The reverse of this card contains, as an attachment, a card bearing a photograph, full description, as well as a statement where appropriate indicating that the subject is armed and dangerous. This is the card that would be physically presented to an agent in the event he were instructed to arrest the subject.

3. To carry out the full intent of the suggestion it would be necessary for a field wide review to be conducted of the Security Index cards and the subsequent submission to the Bureau of a communication recommending the addition "armed and dangerous" to the face of the card. It is not believed that the additional work entailed is warranted.

4. Other than at the time of apprehension, the only instance in which information concerning a subject's potential dangerousness would appear to be pertinent is in connection with our interviews with these subjects. Agents attempting to interview a security subject are required to be thoroughly familiar with the contents of the file, and he would not rely on information contained on the Security Index card.

Henceforward when preparing reports or other correspondence concerning individuals active in the Progressive Labor Movement (PLM), the Bureau desires that the character Security Matter - PLM be utilized rather than Security Matter - C as in the past.

During the recent racial disturbances in New York City, individuals connected with the PLM played a leading part. In view of the Movement's activity in fomenting racial unrest, New York, the office of origin in this case, and other offices receiving this airtel will immediately take appropriate steps to identify all individuals active in the PLM within their territories. If these individuals have not already been investigated and considered for the Security Index, thorough investigations should be instituted and reports under the character Security Matter - PLM should be expeditiously submitted together with recommendations as to whether or not the individual's name should be included in the Security Index.

All offices should be most alert for the formation of PLM clubs or branches within their territories and any office receiving information concerning the formation of PLM clubs in other field office territories should immediately report that information to the Bureau, New York, and interested offices.

Each month we follow the field closely on the status of security work by analyzing the backlog of pending cases and delinquency in espionage, internal security, security matter and foreign intelligence cases in classifications 65, 100 and 105. Status of these cases as of July 31, 1964, is set forth below.

In July there was a decrease in pending active matters in the entire field in the security classifications from 19,201 to 19,118. Delinquent matters decreased from 1,611 to 1,482. The percentage of delinquent matters decreased from 8.3 per cent to 7.7 per cent.

Letters are being sent to the offices indicated by asterisks on page four herein, commenting on their delinquency and pointing out the necessity for bringing their security cases to a current status.

RECOMMENDATION: *E*

The field will continue to be followed closely regarding security delinquency and you will be advised of the results of the review of the August, 1964, administrative reports.

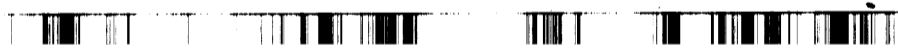

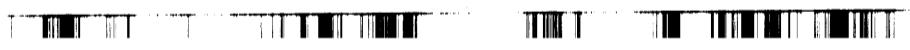
Each month we follow the field closely on the status of security work by analyzing the backlog of pending cases and delinquency in espionage, internal security, security matter and foreign intelligence cases in classifications 65, 100 and 105. Status of these cases as of August 31, 1964, is set forth below.

In August there was an increase in pending active matters in the entire field in the security classifications from 19,118 to 19,456. Delinquent matters increased from 1,482 to 1,852. The percentage of delinquent matters increased from 7.7 per cent to 9.5 per cent.

Letters are being sent to the offices indicated by asterisks on page four herein, commenting on their delinquency and pointing out the necessity for bringing their security cases to a current status.

RECOMMENDATION:

The field will continue to be followed closely regarding security delinquency and you will be advised of the results of the review of the September, 1964, administrative reports.

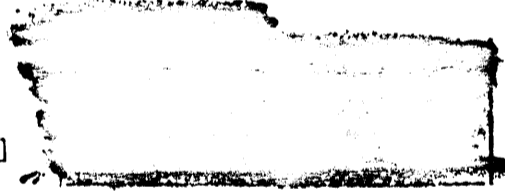

**CUBAN EMERGENCY PLANS
INTERNAL SECURITY - CUBA**

By memorandum dated 8-24-64 you were advised that as of that date there were 90 Cuban aliens on the Security Index (SI). Since that date there have been no additions or deletions of Cuban aliens to the SI. Therefore, the present total remains at 90.

During this same period, the total number of individuals included in the "Cuban" Special Section of the SI, which Section includes both aliens and United States citizens, increased from 211 to 216. The present total of individuals on the regular SI tabbed "C" (for pro-Cuban) increased from 293 to 299. Our investigations are continuing and the field is being closely followed to insure that the Bureau's objectives are met. You will be kept advised of progress in this matter.

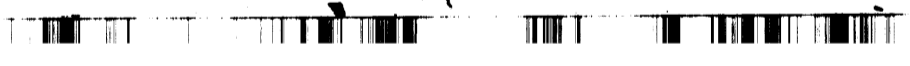

General dissemination instructions in this connection are set out in Section 83K and 87D, Manual of Instructions, which include instructions contained in teletype to all offices dated 12/10/63 captioned "Travel of the President in the U.S. and Commonwealth of Puerto Rico," and airtel to all offices dated 4/13/64 captioned "Travel of the President in the U.S. and Commonwealth of Puerto Rico." The 12/10/63 teletype and the 4/13/64 airtel have been previously commented upon in memorandum dated 9/29/64 from Mr. [redacted] to Mr. [redacted] captioned "Security Index," pursuant to Inspector [redacted] request.

Volume III, Section 87D (Security Investigations), page 57, paragraph (7)(b), concerning the whereabouts of Security Index subjects, should be amended in accordance with the portion underscored:

The whereabouts of all Security Index subjects should be known at all times. ^o ~~The residence and business addresses of all Security Index subjects must be checked at least once each six months, except those imprisoned and those who were included in the Security Index because of disaffection for the United States (defection to a Sino-Soviet-bloc country), (see Section 105G, page 4m). The residence and employment of those who were included in the Security Index because of disaffection for the United States must be verified every thirty days. The case of any Security Index subject who is out of the country must be followed at least each six months to determine if he has returned to this country.~~ ^{sent}

Perfect arrangements to be advised on a current basis of any indication that the subject is engaged in subversive activities, is exhibiting violent tendencies, or plans to change his residence or employment. Periodic checks to verify residence or business addresses may be made under appropriate pretext by telephone, or other expeditious means.

In order that other portions of the Manual of Instructions will be in conformity with the above changes, an insert should be added to Section 105G, page 4m, as follows: NOT RECORDED

3. Disaffection of United States citizens abroad. 3 104

The Bureau has a continuing interest in United States citizens who travel to foreign countries, particularly ^{since} ~~particularly~~ Sino-Soviet-bloc countries, including Cuba, ¹⁰⁻¹⁻⁶ and who by their actions or statements while abroad indicate a disaffection for the United States. While our responsibilities do not include inquiries into the activities of such persons while they are abroad, we must take appropriate action concerning them upon their return to the United States. The following indicia are to be utilized in defining individuals in the above category: (a) a desire to renounce United States citizenship; (b) a desire to seek citizenship in a Sino-Soviet-bloc country; (c) a renunciation of or application for the United States; (d) an intent to remain in a Sino-Soviet-

bloc country for an extended period because of a preference for the communist system. Individuals who defect from the United States military services to Sino-Soviet-bloc countries and who subsequently return to the United States and revert to civilian status would also come under Bureau's jurisdiction. Upon receipt of information that an individual as described above has returned to the United States, letterhead memorandum should immediately be prepared for dissemination to Secret Service in accordance with instructions contained in Section 87D, page 51, paragraph (9).

Immediate investigation should be instituted to determine the suspect's background, activities, the circumstances surrounding his disaffection, and his potential dangerousness. Each such individual should be considered for inclusion in the Security Index.

Subjects who are included in the Security Index as a result of disaffection for the United States should be handled in accordance with provisions of Section 87D, Manual of Instructions, pertaining to Security Index subjects; however, their residence and employment must be verified every thirty days in accordance with Section 87D, page 57, paragraph (7)(b).

An insert should be made in the Index to Section 87D, Manual of Instructions, on page 52 b, Volume III, as follows:

Defectors to Sino-Soviet-bloc countries, 57

A second insert should be made on the same page as follows:

Disaffection of United States citizens abroad, 57

An insert should be made in the General Index to the Manual of Instructions, Volume IV, page 14a, at the bottom of page as follows:

The conference was of the unanimous opinion that the existing Security Index criteria provides a sound basis for the evaluation of such cases from a Security Index standpoint and that no change in the existing criteria of either a liberalizing or constricting nature is necessary or desirable. 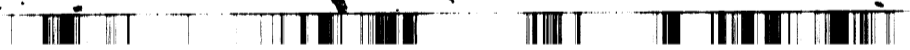


SECURITY INDEX CRITERIA

- (A) Subject has had membership or participation in the activities of a basic revolutionary organization within the last 5 years as shown by overt acts or statements established through reliable sources, informants, or individuals.

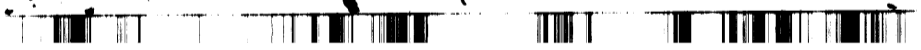
The Independent Socialist League (ISL) has been listed in Section 87D, Manual of Instructions, as a basic revolutionary organization for purposes of the Security Index. This organization went out of existence in September, 1958, and no new names are being added to the Security Index based upon membership in this organization and now only 21 individuals are included in the Security Index whose organization affiliation is listed as ISL.

The proposed attached Manual changes delete the ISL as a basic revolutionary organization and deletes references to the ISL in connection with recommendations for additions to the Security Index.

We are adding a considerable number of individuals to the Security Index based upon membership in the Progressive Labor Movement (PLM), a relatively new far left Marxist oriented organization formed by former Communist Party members. The proposed attached Manual changes lists the PLM as a basic revolutionary organization as well as listing it as information which should appear on Security Index cards when the subjects thereof are affiliated with this organization.

If you agree, the attached Manual changes should be forwarded to the Training Division for appropriate handling.

With respect to specific questions from Inspector regarding the Security Index and matters relating to dissemination to Secret Service there is attached our comments on each of the questions involved.

ACTION:

That this memorandum and attachment be referred to Inspector pursuant to his request.

1. What changes have been made regarding dissemination to Secret Service?

By teletype to all offices dated December, 10, 1963, captioned "Travel of the President in the U. S. and Commonwealth of Puerto Rico," we instructed the field to immediately initiate a review of Security Index, Reserve Index, and pending security cases as well as a review of files relating to ultra-rightist, racists, and fascist for the purpose of identifying individuals in these categories possessing: (1) emotional instability or irrational behavior, (2) persons who have made threats of bodily harm against officials or employees of federal, state, or local government or officials of a foreign government, (3) individuals expressing strong and violent anti-United States sentiments and who have been involved in bombings or bomb making or whose past conduct indicates tendencies toward violence, and (4) individuals whose prior acts or statements depict propensity for violence and hatred against organized government. The field was instructed to immediately disseminate information concerning any individuals falling into the above categories and was given a 30-day deadline for the completion of the initial review. The field was further instructed to disseminate to Secret Service information concerning any individuals subsequently identified as falling within the above categories. This is a continuing program. Prior to this date the basic dissemination policy dealt with actual or implied threats against the President, the President elect, their families, and the Vice President. Also see item 3 below.

2. Has Secret Service adopted any new criteria and, if so, when and what are the changes?

In a conversation with Mr. June 15, 1964, Chief of Secret Service furnished Mr. a proposed guideline for law enforcement and intelligence agencies in referring information to Secret Service for its assistance in fulfilling its presidential protective responsibilities. The basic guideline furnished by Secret Service is:

A threat to physically harm the President, members of his immediate family, the President elect, the Vice President, et cetera or to cause him and them embarrassment whether it is by an individual or a group or organization should be furnished to Secret Service.

Beyond the basic type of information, Secret Service lists three factors to be considered in determining what other type of information is desired. They are:

- 1. Interest of individual or organization.
- 2. Capabilities of the individual or organization.
- 3. Activities of the individual or organization.

In commenting upon the above factors, Mr. [redacted] indicated that the interest of the individual or organization is the prime factor to be considered but must be coupled with their capability and activity in making a determination for referral to Secret Service. It was indicated that the interest must be toward the President or others for whom Secret Service furnishes protection, or other high Government officials in the nature of a complaint together with an expressed or implied determination to use other than legal means to satisfy any grievance real or imagined.



It was indicated that after the interest phase is met then the activity which would encompass previous mental instability, history of violence and the capability for furthering the interest would dictate whether the case should be referred to Secret Service.

Mr. [redacted] / proposed guidelines were discussed in a memorandum from Mr. [redacted] to Mr. [redacted] dated 6/16/64 at which time it was pointed out that the guideline developed by Secret Service if adopted by us would somewhat narrow the present dissemination policies to Secret Service and it was recommended that we continue our present policy with respect thereto.

In addition to the above, in August, 1964, Secret Service drafted a sample letter to be directed by the various field offices of Secret Service to chiefs of police throughout the country outlining Secret Service's responsibility for protecting the President of the United States. In this letter Secret Service indicated that basically it should be furnished with any information coming to the police department's attention of a threat to physically harm the President, members of his family, the Vice President, et cetera or to cause him or them any embarrassment whether it is by an individual or a group or organization. Secret Service indicated that it would also like information of any individual or group of individuals who physically harms or threatens to harm any local, state or nationally elected officials. In connection with this type of information Secret Service indicated that it would like to receive any detailed data contained in the files such as background, mental condition, propensity for violence, possession of firearms and so forth. A copy of the sample letter as well as a copy of the proposed letter to all Secret Service field offices was obtained for review and in connection therewith the Director commented "be certain we do not take the lead in this project. It is one for Secret Service decision." Following an analysis which is contained in a memorandum from Mr. [redacted] to Mr. [redacted] dated 9/11/64 captioned "Liaison with U. S. Secret Service" the Director approved advising Secret Service that the Bureau had no objection to their proposed letter to local law enforcement agencies.

The matter of dissemination to Secret Service is being followed in order to determine whether, or not the Commission's report and/or action of any committees which follow the Commission's report suggest any change in our dissemination procedures to Secret Service. Also, liaison is being maintained with Secret Service concerning the letter they contemplate sending to all Chiefs of Police to determine if this calls for any change in instructions to the field.

3. Are all names on the Security Index now going to Secret Service?

By airtel to all offices dated 4/13/64 the field was instructed to immediately begin preparation of letterhead memoranda for dissemination to Secret Service in all Security Index cases. A 30-day deadline was set for all offices with less than 1,000 Security Index subjects. Those offices having in excess of 1,000 Security Index subjects were advised that the review must be completed within 60 days. Memorandum from Mr. [redacted] to Mr. [redacted] of June 17 recorded completion of the initial review.

As new names are added to the Security Index, letterhead memoranda are furnished to Secret Service. In addition, we keep Secret Service advised on a continuing basis of changes in the status of these Security Index subjects with respect to residence, employment and death.

4. There is another index, the Reserve Index, Sections A and B.

We have disseminated to Secret Service memoranda on individuals whose names are included in this Reserve Index whose activities fall within the instructions contained in the December 10, 1963, teletype to all offices referred to previously herein. Blanket dissemination of all cases has not been done inasmuch as these individuals are not active in a subversive movement at this time and have not been active therein within a period sufficient to bring them within the Security Index criteria.

5. Are all defectors on the Security Index and are their names going to Secret Service?

In arriving at a determination as to the dangerousness of an individual, we have considered individuals who have defected, revoked or sought revocation of their U.S. citizenship in favor of a Sino-Soviet-bloc country, who have returned to the U.S. and who have taken no positive steps to counteract such action. It is necessary that any individual who engaged in activities indicating disaffection for the U.S. be considered for inclusion in the Security Index.

We have arranged with the Defense Department to be advised promptly by the military services of the identity and background of any member of the military services who has returned to civilian status in the U.S. after defecting to a communist-bloc country from the military service.

We have arranged with the State Department, the Central Intelligence Agency and the military agencies to be notified when information comes to the attention of such agencies concerning U.S. citizens who return to the U.S. after traveling to foreign countries, particularly Sino-Soviet-bloc countries including Cuba and while there indicated a disaffection for the U.S. To assist these other agencies and our field offices in defining a person who has indicated disaffection for the U.S., we have furnished each with the following criteria:

- a. a desire to renounce U.S. citizenship,
- b. a desire to seek citizenship in a Sino-Soviet-bloc country, including Cuba,

c. a repudiation of or antipathy for the U.S., d. an attempt to remain in a Sino-Soviet-bloc country for an extended period because of a preference for the communist system.

Information we receive in connection with individuals who fall in one of the criteria listed above is immediately disseminated to Secret Service, both locally and at headquarters level. In addition, such individual is considered for inclusion in the Security Index and when an individual of this category is included in the Security Index because of disaffection for the U. S., his residence and employment are verified every 30 days. Changes in a subject's status, residence, and employment, are promptly called to the attention of Secret Service.

6. What examinations and evaluations of the Security Index criteria have been made?

The present Security Index criteria was furnished the field by SAC Letter 55-30 dated April 12, 1955, after Executives Conference consideration and Departmental review and concurrence. It has been evaluated periodically since that date, namely, at each internal security-espionage conference which has periodically been held at the Seat of Government composed of supervisors from our major offices with the most recent consideration by this conference being September 28, 1964. In addition, it has been periodically reviewed and analyzed within the Division in connection with our over-all program evaluation matters. It was analyzed in memorandum from Mr. [redacted] to Mr. [redacted] dated December 11, 1963, captioned "Security Index." It was the subject of study during the course of the July, 1964, inspection of this Division. No changes as such have been made with respect to the initial specific criteria, copy attached. However, in memorandum from Mr. [redacted] to Mr. [redacted] dated December 11, 1963, it was recommended and approved that an elaboration on the factors to be taken into consideration in arriving at a decision with respect to a subject's Security Index status be furnished the field. This was done by SAC Letter 63-61(F) dated December 17, 1963.

Attached are the factors presently outlined for field guidance and Roman Numerals 18 through 23 are the added factors set out in the above-mentioned SAC Letter.

7. What is the need for these names clearing through Mr. --- why not Mr. --- : Where is the Index maintained and how does it operate?

With respect to the first question listed above, recommendations for additions to the Security Index emanating in the sections under Inspector --- (Subversive Control, Internal Security and Liaison Sections) are approved by Mr. ---. Recommendations for additions to the Security Index emanating in the sections under Inspector --- (Soviet, Nationalities Intelligence and Research-Satellite Sections) are approved by Mr. ---.

The physical maintenance of the Security Index at the Seat of Government is handled in the Subversive Control Section, Room 823 RB. This Index is a 5 by 6 card Index containing a subject's name as well as certain statistical data, background information, and separate off-colored cards are contained in the Index on each alias. Additions, deletions, and changes are made in this Index daily by clerical personnel. The data is recorded on magnetic tape maintained in the Voucher-Statistical Section, and the printing of the cards both for the Seat of Government and the field offices is done by the Voucher-Statistical Section from information forwarded to that Section.

With respect to the review involved in adding a subject's name to the Security Index, upon receipt of a recommendation from the field office that such action be taken, the facts in the case are reviewed by the substantive supervisor, the supervisor in charge of the particular unit, the section chief, inspector-in-charge of the branch, assistant director or person acting in his behalf, with the final decision being made in Mr. --- Office.

Determination of Dangerousness of an Individual:

In Section 87D of the Manual of Instructions the above topic is discussed in which it is pointed out that the dangerousness of the member or affiliate of a subversive organization does not necessarily depend upon his personal characteristics, such as aggressiveness or a disposition to violence. Continuing, the Manual specifies that an individual's loyalty to a subversive organization and principles is a primary factor to take into consideration in evaluating his potential dangerousness. It is further pointed out, however, that regardless of evidence of subversive affiliation all evidence developed during the course of a security investigation must be carefully weighed for the purpose of determining whether the subject's activities depict him as a potentially dangerous individual in time of a national emergency. Further, this Section points out factors having a bearing upon an individual's potential dangerousness are numerous and will vary in each case in degree. Thereafter, there are set out in this Section of the Manual 23 factors specifically listed as among those that should be considered in arriving at a determination as to whether the subject represents a potential dangerousness. These 23 factors are set forth on the following pages:

- I. Long continued membership in a subversive organization
- II. Affiliation with or attendance at training schools, especially leadership schools
- III. Frequent or regular attendance at organizational meetings and functions
- IV. Subscriptions to publications of a subversive organization
- V. Possession of or continued study of revolutionary literature
- VI. Preparation or distribution of subversive propaganda and/or literature
- VII. Holding positions in the subversive organization or in other organizations of a front character which indicate confidence of such organizations in his loyalty
- VIII. Espousal of a subversive doctrine exemplified in his acts and utterances
- IX. Contributions to or collections of funds for the organization
- X. Recruitment of new members
- XI. Revolutionary background
- XII. Participation in picket lines in which the subversive organization is interested or which it has fostered, or in demonstrations, riots, mass meetings, or pressure group activity fostered by the organization
- XIII. Violation of penal laws arising out of activities as a subversive
- XIV. Active service in armed forces supported by a subversive movement, such as service in the Loyalist Forces during the Spanish Civil War which were supported by communists

- XV. Constant support of the Soviet Union in acts and utterances
- XVI. Acting as a courier for the subversive movement or as a confidential mail drop therefor
- XVII. Constant participation in the activities of a subversive organization or advancement of the organization's aims or interests, especially when such participation involves financial sacrifices or personal inconvenience or disadvantage
- XVIII. Contacts with Sino-Soviet-bloc establishments (including Cuba) where purpose of contact cannot be determined or contact indicates communist sympathies
- XIX. Contacts with Sino-Soviet-bloc, Cuban, or Yugoslav intelligence agents where purpose of contact cannot be determined or contact indicates communist sympathies
- XX. Individuals who have defected, revoked, or sought revocation of their U. S. citizenship in favor of a Sino-Soviet-bloc country, who have returned to the U. S., and who have taken no positive steps to counteract such action.
- XXI. Statements or activities on a subject's part establishing reasonable grounds to believe that his loyalty would lie with a Sino-Soviet-bloc country in the event of armed conflict between the U. S. and a Sino-Soviet-bloc country.
- XXII. Training and/or participation in espionage, sabotage, or intelligence activities
- XXIII. A history of emotional instability or irrational behavior on the part of an individual with a subversive background whose prior acts depict a propensity for violence and hatred against organized government

(C) SECURITY INDEX - CHINA - CUBA -- Arrangements have been worked out with the Department and the Immigration and Naturalization Service (INS) for the special handling of Chinese and Cuban aliens on the Security Index (SI) in time of a limited emergency. As a result thereof, any information received through our sources in connection with our SI responsibilities indicating a change in residence and/or employment of a Chinese or Cuban alien on the SI would be of immediate interest to INS on a local level. INS headquarters and the Department have also expressed a desire to promptly receive information of this type in addition to that routinely furnished by reports and letterhead memoranda.

Form FD-366 has been devised and is currently being utilized in connection with our program to keep Secret Service promptly advised of changes of residence and/or employment of SI subjects. In view of the above, when submitting form FD-366 reporting changes concerning Chinese and Cuban aliens in the future, furnish one copy to INS as well as Secret Service locally. Also furnish four copies instead of the normal two copies to the Bureau for appropriate dissemination at the Seat of Government.

Bear in mind, however, in filling out the reference on the FD-366 that some memoranda have been expressly prepared for dissemination to Secret Service only, and have not been furnished to the Department or INS; therefore, the copy furnished INS locally and two of the copies furnished the Bureau should reference the last communication to INS.

Origin: This program instituted November, 1960. **Purpose:** Program established to keep track of dangerous individuals of pro-Castro affiliations, activities or sympathies and to insure they are neutralized in the event of hostilities involving Cuba.

Scope: Program applies to two categories of pro-Castro Security Index (SI) subjects concerning whom we would take appropriate action in case of Cuban emergency. (A) Individuals placed on SI solely on basis of their pro-Castro activities, connections, or sympathies (Cuban Special Section). (B) Individuals placed on SI for other reasons (such as members of Communist Party) who, by reason of pro-Castro activities are considered dangerous in event of hostilities with Cuba and who are tabbed C for "Pro-Cuban."

Tie-in with Other Programs: This program is coordinated with overall SI program. As of 9/15/64, 299 individuals were tabbed "Pro-Cuban"; 216 Cubans were listed in the "Cuban" Special Section of which 90 were aliens. **Magnitude:** In the event of hostilities with Cuba, the Government could immediately proceed to pick up those individuals listed on the SI who are Cuban aliens. We keep the Immigration and Naturalization Service (INS) informed concerning these aliens and the Attorney General is having deportation warrants against them prepared for service by INS should the eventuality arise.

Administrative Control: One of our supervisors has the direct responsibility for following captioned matter and assuring that the field vigorously presses all aspects of this program. Accordingly, it receives a continuing review. **Adequacy and Currentness of Instructions:** SAC letters 60-54 dated 11/22/60; 62-55 dated 10/5/62; 62-61 dated 12/17/63 and 64-68 dated 9/29/64 furnished the field overall instructions concerning this program. Specific instructions concerning disaffection of U. S. citizens abroad were also set forth in Bulletin to all field offices dated 9/17/64. With regard to Cuba these instructions specifically relate to individuals who have manifested disaffection from the U. S. since 10/1/60. These instructions are still current and complete.

(SEMI-ANNUAL REVIEW AND ANALYSIS)

Dissemination: Pertinent data concerning all SI subjects is furnished to Secret Service both at field and headquarters level. In addition, dissemination concerning individuals included in Cuban Special Section is made to Department, CIA, State, and the military intelligence agencies. Dissemination concerning Cuban aliens is also made to INS both at field and headquarters level in accordance with INS request. The most recent instructions concerning dissemination to the Department and INS were included in SAC letter 64-48 (C) dated 9/29/64.

Past or Present Weaknesses: Program instituted November, 1960, in view of possibility of break in relations between the U. S. and Cuba or a limited emergency growing out of the situation. This program serves to more completely discharge our responsibilities in the security field as they relate to the Cuban situation and to insure that our responsibilities are continuously being met. No present weaknesses in this program.

Contemplated Action: Program should be continued as now constituted.

SUBJECT: DELINQUENCY IN SECURITY INVESTIGATIONS

INDEX - GENERAL

SYNOPSIS:

Each month we follow the field closely on the status of security work by analyzing the backlog of pending cases and delinquency in espionage, internal security, security matter and foreign intelligence cases in classifications 65, 100 and 105. Status of these cases as of September 30, 1964, is set forth below.

In September there was an increase in pending active matters in the entire field in the security classifications from 19,456 to 19,957. Delinquent matters decreased from 1,852 to 1,311. The percentage of delinquent matters decreased from 9.5 per cent to 6.5 per cent. *W*

Letters are being sent to the offices indicated by asterisks on page four herein, commenting on their delinquency and pointing out the necessity for bringing their security cases to a current status.

RECOMMENDATION:

The field will continue to be followed closely regarding security delinquency and you will be advised of the results of the review of the October, 1964, administrative reports.

DETAILS:

The September, 1964, administrative reports from all offices indicate that the total pending active matters in classifications 65, 100 and 105 increased from 19,456 to 19,957. Delinquent items decreased from 1,852 to 1,311. The percentage of delinquent items decreased from 9.5 per cent to 6.5 per cent.

This form is submitted separately and makes no reference to previous communications furnished to the Bureau. The request stands on its own. Frequently, a current report is submitted simultaneously with the request for interview which report makes reference to the interview request. In other instances, however, a current report is not required in accordance with instructions set forth in Section 87D, page 38. Form FD-122 recommending that subject be placed on Security Index or that an existing Security Index Card be changed is also submitted separately with no reference to any previous or current communication. 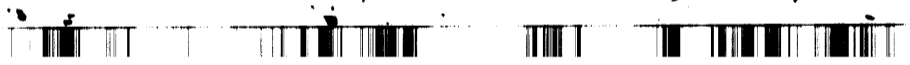

report is required. In other instances wherein changes are recommended in SI card, a letterhead memorandum must also be furnished to the Bureau suitable for dissemination to Secret Service and other interested agencies. Frequently, the FD-336 or FD-122 will reach the case supervisor at the Bureau within a day or two of its submission. However, the report usually requires several additional days to process depending on size and volume. The case supervisor then has a piece of action mail which in some instances requires that a current, up-to-date report also be in his possession in order to properly handle. Due to lack of any appropriate reference the supervisor must then determine from records whether a report has also been received by the Bureau. In some instances, the report may not have yet been recorded. As an alternative, he may hold the incoming request or recommendation for a suitable period of time awaiting receipt of a report. It would be of assistance to the substantive case supervisor to know whether or not a report was submitted by the field at the time of submission of the FD-336 or FD-122 or date of last communication. This would save unnecessary checking and uncertainty and eliminate possible delay in handling. It would also eliminate, as has happened in some instances, the taking of action on one of the above-mentioned forms, only to have a report come floating in a few days later, which may have altered the Bureau's action. The inclusion of a reference on the above forms will be a field reminder and a flag for the Bureau supervisor. While it is difficult to assess the actual savings involved, it would eliminate a certain amount of uncertainty, unnecessary checking of records and possible embarrassment.

Inclusion of a reference line on both forms as suggested would considerably enhance efficiency in handling of the forms by the individual supervisors and their clerks. Adoption would also result in decreasing the number of "up-to-date" searches now being conducted by Records Section in efforts to locate an incoming report which possibly does not exist. Since the suggestion need not be put into effect until the present supply of preprinted forms is exhausted, no substantial cost is involved. No other objections are apparent.

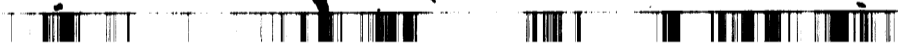

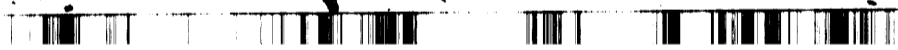

Annual reports in Security Index (SI) cases have been required since completion of the Summary Report Program 7/14/54 (New York Office 5/1/56). In certain type cases periodic reports were required at specified intervals for many years prior to 1954; i.e. key figures, top functionaries.

2. Purpose

To insure that current information is available to the Bureau in report form in order to keep the Bureau, as well as the Department, advised of the status of SI cases and in order to discharge our responsibilities of dissemination to other interested agencies in the executive branch of the Government.

3. Scope

All offices participate in this program.

4. Tie in With Other Programs

Closely related to the Emergency Detention Program, which deals with plans for the apprehension and detention of potentially dangerous individuals in time of an emergency.

5. Case Load

As of 10/15/64 there were 10,391 SI subjects, each normally requiring at least one report a year.

Some SI cases require more frequent reports; namely, (a) top functionaries, quarterly reports. There are 29 individuals considered as "top functionaries." They represent the highest degree of leadership in subversive organizations and their activities are constantly being followed. (b) Key figures, semiannual reports are required in key figure cases presently numbering 496. These individuals represent leadership in subversive organizations on regional, district and state levels and we follow their activities closely.

6. Magnitude

This is a major program as evidenced by the fact that, with the exceptions noted above, in all SI cases investigations must be brought up to date and reports submitted at specified intervals. This does not include investigations and reports on individuals currently being nominated for the SI.

7. Administrative Controls

Each Supervisor handling security matter cases utilizes a tickler system to insure that reports are submitted when due by the field.

8. Adequacy and Currentness of Instructions

Instructions dealing with this program are found in Section 87D of the Manual of Instructions. This section of the Manual is up to date.

9. Over-all Value

Data dealing with this program is included in the budget material. In addition, this program enables us to thoroughly review the SI status of each individual subject on at least an annual basis. When information is developed clearly indicating that a subject no longer should be scheduled for apprehension, prompt action is taken to remove his name from the SI. Conversely, if the investigation develops evidence indicating that the subject presents a potential threat to the internal security in time of emergency, his name is included in the SI.

Reports in these cases are widely disseminated to various executive departments. Essentially, every security program of other branches of the Government depends to a large extent on information made available to them by us.

This program will be followed closely and we will continue to require reports in SI cases in accordance with the schedule referred to herein.

By memorandum dated 9/23/64 you were advised that as of that date there were 90 Cuban aliens on the Security Index (SI). Since that date there have been three additions of Cuban aliens to the SI. Three other Cuban aliens have been deleted from the SI inasmuch as they have returned to Cuba. The present total of Cuban aliens on SI remains at 90.

During the same period, the total number of individuals included in the "Cuban" Special Section of the SI, which Section includes both aliens and U. S. citizens, increased from 216 to 219. The present total of individuals on the regular SI tabbed "C" (pro-Cuban) increased from 299 to 302. Our investigations are continuing, and the field is being closely followed to insure that the Bureau's objectives are met. You will be kept advised of progress in this matter.

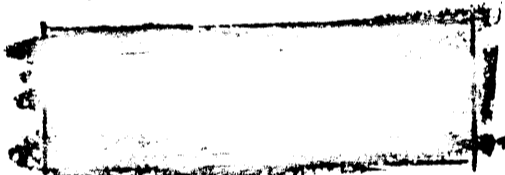

 It is suggested that, whenever a characterization of a Security Subject is prepared, a copy of that characterization should be placed on a separate sheet of paper or on a form for this purpose. This characterization would identify the sources and would show the date it was prepared. This sheet or form would be filed as a "floating" unserialized page at the top of the last volume of the file in the same manner as Form FD-159 is now filed. As the Subject engages in additional activities, the characterization would be brought up to date whenever the characterization is used and also made current whenever the case is reopened for further investigation.

Current practice or rule (include manual citation as well as facts) The current practice is to review the file and references and prepare a characterization each time it is required, which means that much time is wasted on repetitious work each time a characterization is required.

Advantages of suggestion and annual savings (include basis for estimate)
 Bureau requirements are that persons participating in racial demonstrations be identified and that such persons be characterized when subversive background information is known. This requires characterization of numerous individuals under conditions when speed as well as accuracy is essential. Under this suggestion, a dated characterization would be readily available as required. Only a review of material accumulated since the last characterization would be required to bring the characterization up to date. Under prior systems, there was a danger of using outdated characterizations which were maintained in special files. Under this plan, the characterization is in the file, easily located, and readily made current.

Disadvantages of suggestion
 This plan involves use of an unserialized item at the top of a file

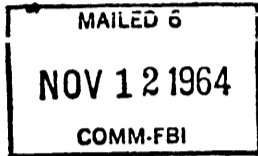

Similar ideas have been considered in past and not adopted. The additional effort required to keep characterization up to date not justified due to limited need. Each report submitted in Security Index case requires inclusion of a succinct summary in cover pages justifying retention of subject in Security Index. This statement, when properly completed is, in fact, a current characterization of individual and readily available. In numerous instances, a current characterization is not what is needed in a report; for example, a report is being prepared on a subject and information is available indicating he was previously associated with another individual of subversive background a number of years ago. To show persons of subject's association, it would be necessary to characterize the associate's activities during the period of association and in a current characterization. Training Division recommends current suggestion not be adopted.

SYNOPSIS:

Each month we follow the field closely on the status of security work by analyzing the backlog of pending cases and delinquency in espionage, internal security, security matter and foreign intelligence cases in classifications 65, 100 and 105. Status of these cases as of October 31, 1964, is set forth below.

In October there was an increase in pending active matters in the entire field in the security classifications from 19,957 to 20,269. Delinquent matters increased from 1,311 to 1,481. The percentage of delinquent matters increased from 6.5 per cent to 7.3 per cent.

Letters are being sent to the offices indicated by asterisks on page four herein, commenting on their delinquency and pointing out the necessity for bringing their security cases to a current status.

RECOMMENDATION:

The field will continue to be followed closely regarding security delinquency and you will be advised of the results of the review of the November, 1964, administrative reports.

The October, 1964, administrative reports from all offices indicate that the total pending active matters in classifications 65, 100 and 105 increased from 19,957 to 20,269. Delinquent items increased from 1,311 to 1,481. The percentage of delinquent items increased from 6.5 per cent to 7.3 per cent.

The following statistics show the status of pending work, including both pending active and pending inactive matters, and delinquency for all field divisions for the last four months.

DELINQUENCY IN SECURITY INVESTIGATIONS

1. Origin

In March, 1952, the program of following individual offices on a monthly basis was initiated because of a then existing extremely heavy delinquency in classifications 65, 100 and 105.

2. Purpose

To stress the necessity of reducing delinquency in these categories and the necessity of maintaining these cases in a reasonably current status.

3. Scope

Field wide.

4. Magnitude

This is not a major program from the standpoint of manpower and cost.

5. Over-all Value

This program has resulted in a reduction in delinquency in security classifications and the maintenance of such delinquency

in a fairly constant status during the past year.* For example, the highest delinquency recorded during this period was May, 1964 (10.2 per cent), with the lowest recorded delinquency being in October, 1963 (6.1 per cent).

We will continue to follow this program closely to insure that field delinquency in security classifications is kept at a minimum.

SECURITY INVESTIGATIONS OF INDIVIDUALS

SYNOPSIS

Bureau responsibility in this field originated with Presidential Directives, the first one in September, 1939. Purpose is to identify potentially dangerous individuals who are affiliated with subversive movements. This program is field wide and is closely related to the Emergency Detention Program, which involves plans for the apprehension and detention of potentially dangerous individuals in the event of an emergency.

From November, 1963, through October, 1964, there was an average of 19,098 pending active cases in classifications 65, 100 and 105. This Section's principal case load falls within the 100 classification and during the same period averaged 8,845 cases per month. Instructions are up to date and administrative controls exercised over the field by tickler system.

Other programs arise from security investigations of individuals and include interviews with subversives. We consider an interview in each case. The Security Index contains 10,391 names as of October 15, 1964.

Requests for availability of witnesses from Coast Guard and Defense continue high. The identities of 37 potential witnesses were made available during the period October 15, 1963, through November 1, 1964.

Presidential Directives, the initial one being issued in September, 1939, and since repeated on several occasions. These Directives charge the Bureau with the responsibility for investigation of individuals in the internal security field. It is the collecting agency of the entire executive branch for subversive information and has the responsibility of seeing that such information is distributed to those Government agencies having a legitimate interest therein.

2. Purpose

The identification and investigation of individuals who, because of affiliation with subversive organizations, may present a potential threat to the internal security in the event of an emergency and the development of evidence of violations of Federal statutes on the part of these individuals. If, during the course of a security investigation, it is determined that a subject does pose a potential threat to the internal security, he is scheduled for apprehension under the Emergency Detention Program by the inclusion of his name in the Security Index.

3. Scope

Field wide.

4. Tie In With Other Programs

Closely related is the Emergency Detention Program which deals with plans for the handling of individuals included in the Security Index in the event of an emergency. Also closely related are the various security programs of other Government agencies, such programs depending to a large extent on information developed by us and disseminated to such agencies.

5. Case Load

Basically, these cases fall in security classifications 65, 100 and 105. During the period November, 1963, through October, 1964, the average field case load in these classifications was 19,098 pending active matters.

The Subversive Control Section is primarily responsible for investigations of individuals under the 100 classification although we do have cases on individuals under the 105 classification such as the affiliates of the Nationalist Party of Puerto Rico. During the 12-month period November, 1963, through October, 1964, there was a monthly average of 8,845 pending active matters in classification 100 throughout the field.

6. Manpower

This program is major from the standpoint of costs and manpower and, as such, is referred to in the budget material.

7. Past or Present Weaknesses

Close attention is given the entire operations in this field in efforts to insure that we are fully discharging our responsibilities thereunder.

8. Administrative Controls

The field is followed closely on its over-all delinquency in the three security classifications mentioned previously. This is handled on a monthly basis. In addition, we follow the field by tickler on pending matters in the field of which we have knowledge and we follow the field for submission of periodic reports in Security Index cases to insure that such are submitted when due.

9. Adequacy and Currentness of Instructions

Instructions dealing with Security investigations of individuals are contained in Section 87D of the Manual of Instructions and are in a current status.

10. Over-all Value

Determination of identities of individuals who should be apprehended in the event of an emergency in order to minimize possibilities of espionage, sabotage and subversion. Dissemination of information of intelligence value to other Government agencies concerning individuals and matters in which they have a legitimate interest. Budget purposes.

OTHER PROGRAMS ENCOMPASSED IN AND/OR ARISING OUT OF

SECURITY INDEX

As noted previously herein, one of the purposes of security investigations is to determine the identities of individuals who, because of affiliation with subversive organizations, may be considered a potential threat to the internal security in the event of an emergency. When such information is developed, the name of the individual concerned is included in the Security Index.

We presently have included in the Security Index names of 10,391 (as of October 15, 1964) individuals. Each Security Index case is thoroughly re-evaluated at least once annually at the Bureau and in the field to insure that the cases are sound in every respect should it be necessary to invoke the Emergency Detention Program. If it is found that the subject's activities no longer justify the retention of his name in the Security Index, immediate steps are taken to insure that his name is removed therefrom.

RESERVE INDEX

In June, 1960, the then Communist Index, maintained only in the field, was renamed the Reserve Index and a program of bringing the cases of individuals whose names were included therein up to date was instituted. We broke the Reserve Index into Section A and Section B. Section A contains a list of individuals who should receive priority consideration from the standpoint of investigation, interrogation or other action following implementation of the Emergency Detention Program. Section A cards are maintained at the Seat of Government and in the field. These cases are reviewed on an annual basis and brought up to date. We presently have included in Section A of the Reserve Index the names of 1,418 (as of October 15, 1964) individuals. Section B cards are maintained only in the field.

We have periodically reviewed Section B of the Reserve Index and such a review is currently in progress with completion date scheduled for January, 1965. Following recommendations of the Internal Security - Espionage Conference in September, 1964, instructions have been issued to the field that Section B, Reserve Index, cases are to be completely reviewed on a biannual basis beginning in January, 1965.

DISSEMINATION - INCLUDING CHECKS FOR AVAILABILITY OF INFORMANTS AND SOURCES

Security reports are disseminated to numerous interested agencies throughout the executive branch of the Government. By

far the vast majority of such reports received are disseminated outside the Bureau. The responsibility of such dissemination necessitates careful and thorough evaluation of each report to assure that it is absolutely accurate both in form and content. In April, 1964, we initiated a program of dissemination of letterhead memorandum in all Security Index cases to Secret Service in connection with its responsibilities for Presidential protection. Initial dissemination was accomplished by early June, 1964, and as names of individuals are added to the Security Index appropriate letterhead memoranda are submitted to Secret Service. In addition, we keep Secret Service advised of changes in the status of these individuals on a continuing basis.

We are continuing to receive a heavy volume of requests from various departments of the executive branch of the Government for the availability of witnesses appearing in reports previously disseminated for appearance at hearings being conducted by such agencies as the Department of Defense and United States Coast Guard in efforts to remove subversives from access to classified data and/or restricted areas.

During the period October 15, 1963, through November 1, 1964, the identities of 37 potential witnesses were made available to these agencies for possible utilization at hearings.

On 9-28-64 the Director ordered inquiry to determine if all appropriate administrative action had been taken in handling of Lee Harvey Oswald case. This is being separately reported upon. Director also posed certain questions concerning dissemination policy to Secret Service in connection with President's safety. Some of these matters have been separately covered in memoranda by Mr. [redacted] and the Domestic Intelligence Division 9-29-64. Brief reference to these and answers to remaining inquiries concerning dissemination are summarized herein.

1. Changes in Bureau Dissemination Policy: These changes were set forth in detail in Mr. [redacted] memorandum to Mr. [redacted] 9-28-64 which attached a proposed memorandum to the Acting Attorney General advising him of action taken by Bureau subsequent to 11-22-63 assassination. Briefly Bureau on 12-10-63 sent broadened criteria to all field offices and immediately began dissemination to Secret Service at field and Seat of Government levels of information concerning subversives, ultra-rightists, racists, and fascists falling into one or more of four broad categories. All names on Security Index including defectors, disseminated. Names of 16 espionage subjects on Security Index were specifically approved for exception from dissemination. New names added to Security Index are also furnished and Secret Service is advised in case of changes in residence, employment, or death of individuals whose names were previously furnished. Other names in Bureau security cases where activities are not sufficient to put them on Security Index have been and will continue to be disseminated where they meet the broadened criteria.

2. Changes in Secret Service Criteria: On 6-15-64 Secret Service Chief [redacted] furnished a proposed revised guideline for agencies in referring information. The general guideline stated: "A threat to physically harm the President, members of his immediate family, the President elect, the Vice President, et cetera, or to cause him and them embarrassment whether it is by an individual or a group or organization should be furnished to Secret Service." In addition, Secret Service furnished these 3 guidelines to determine what other type of information is desired: (1) Interest of individual or organization; (2) Capabilities of the individual or organization; and (3) Activities of the individual or organization. Bureau concurred such criteria would narrow Bureau's new dissemination policies, hence, decided to continue its own broadened criteria. As far as known Secret Service criteria as revised 6-15-64 guide other Federal agencies.

Also, in August, 1964, Secret Service drafted a proposed sample letter to be disseminated to all chiefs of police by local Secret Service field offices for guidance in their furnishing information. Basically, they requested any information coming to police departments' attention regarding a threat to physically harm the President, members of his family, the Vice President, so forth, or cause him or them any embarrassment whether by an individual, a group, or organization; also like information concerning any individual or group who physically harms or threatens to harm any local, state or nationally elected officials. On memo of Domestic Intelligence Division 9-11-64 Director approved advising Secret Service the Bureau had no objection to the proposed letter to local law enforcement agencies, but Director commented, "Be certain we do not take the lead in this project." Each Special Agent in Charge of local Secret Service field offices has received a copy of this letter and is currently preparing originals over his signature for dissemination to appropriate local law enforcement departments.

3. Are the Security Index Criteria Currently Adequate?: The Security Index has been periodically evaluated and considered adequate for intended purpose, namely, an operational guide to be utilized in time of National emergency for the apprehension and detention of individuals representing a potential threat to internal security. The last actual revision of the Security Index criteria was set out in SAC Letter dated 4-12-55 after the revised criteria had been reviewed and agreed to by the Department. This 1955 criteria revision resulted from Department's advising us in December, 1954, that because of budgetary reasons they would not continue to review and approve cases submitted by Bureau for inclusion on Index. At Bureau's insistence, Department agreed to continue to review a "sampling" of these cases. Bureau told Department 3-9-55 that unless these cases are reviewed by Department the FBI is placed in undesirable position of being both investigator and prosecutor. To minimize this situation, Bureau proposed new criteria for placing and retaining individuals on Security Index. The Department concurred with new criteria except for slight modification. New criteria resulted in reducing number of names on Index from 26,320 on 4-15-55 to 12,903 on 10-24-55. Department has continued to review and approve some submissions but as of 9-15-64 only 66.3% have been reviewed and approved by Internal Security Division of Department.

Security Index criteria were last evaluated 9-28-64 at Internal Security - Espionage Conference being held at Seat of Government. In evaluation of criteria following President's assassination, criteria as they existed were considered broad enough to have warranted placing Lee Harvey Oswald on Security Index, but those responsible took too restrictive a view of the criteria for which administrative action has already been separately taken or recommended. However, in an effort to furnish the field additional guidelines, an SAC Letter was sent out 12-17-63 which, although not altering criteria, listed additional specific factors to aid interpreting criteria. These are believed complete. At present, 10,410 names are on the Security Index.

Considering National emergency purpose for which Security Index exists, the criteria seem currently adequate. Any further broadening of Security Index criteria in face of Department's continuing inability to review and approve all our recommended submissions for the Index is believed undesirable because it would create the risk of the Bureau "holding the bag" rather than the Department. Nevertheless, our dissemination

of information to Secret Service will not be impaired because under our broadened criteria for such dissemination, many names will be included over and beyond those on Security Index. Under the broadened dissemination criteria, the Bureau has sent approximately 18,000 names to Secret Service.

4. Are Bureau Procedures Sound for Adding Names to Security Index?: As described in memo 9-29-64 from [redacted] to Mr. [redacted], the approval of names recommended for inclusion in the Security Index can be done by either Branch Chiefs, or [redacted], after which the Assistant Director approves for Domestic Intelligence Division and final decision is made in Mr. [redacted] Office. Recommendations for inclusion of names on the Index can come from the field or any Seat of Government substantive supervisor having such case on his desk. Such recommendation is then reviewed by the Unit Supervisor and the appropriate Section Chief before going to either Branch Chief.

5. Are the Mechanics for Transmitting Information to Secret Service Adequate?: Yes - these have always been adequate. Briefly, instructions require dissemination either in the field or at the Seat of Government immediately and by the most expeditious means, to be confirmed promptly thereafter by letterhead memorandum. Appropriate control files are maintained to record disseminated information. Where dissemination is made in field, requirement is that Bureau be advised by teletype and that Seat of Government be given copy of letterhead memoranda to permit dissemination at the Seat of Government to Secret Service headquarters. Dissemination is not to be delayed for purpose of verifying information and no evaluation of information should be attempted.

6. Is There Any Way Dissemination Policy or Procedures Can Be Strengthened?: Although the criteria for dissemination and the mechanics are believed adequate and all personnel have been advised by SAC Letter, confirmed by existing Manual of Instructions and Handbook provisions, it is believed that in view of the Warren Commission's findings, conclusions and recommendations, it would be well now to again specifically alert all AGs both field and at Seat of Government, to the fact that they must be completely familiar with the policy and procedures and must assume responsibility for any information coming to their attention through their cases or otherwise and seeing that appropriate dissemination action is immediately taken; they should be told that the Bureau wants as liberal an interpretation of the dissemination criteria as is practicable in favor of the most complete dissemination; also, that this matter be periodically reiterated at conferences, and all personnel reminded that it will be appropriately spot checked during inspections. Proper SAC Letter attached.

RECOMMENDATION: That the attached SAC Letter, reiterating to all field and Seat of Government personnel their responsibilities in connection with dissemination to Secret Service, be approved.

FBI DISSEMINATION TO SECRET SERVICE
RE SAFETY OF PRESIDENT, ETC.

On my memorandum 9/30/64 summarizing the Bureau's expanded dissemination policy to Secret Service in connection with the President's safety, the Director asked why the names of 16 espionage subjects on the Security Index were specifically approved for exception from dissemination.

The exception of these 16 names was based on a memorandum 6/30/64 from to Special Section of the Security Index. These 16 names represented 13 cases in the Espionage to observation that once we disseminate to the Secret Service, we have no control over their further dissemination to other Government agencies or local authorities and we can not take necessary steps to protect our informants without which our coverage of bloc intelligence would be severely restricted. A further consideration against the desirability of disseminating these names to Secret Service would be that it would constitute a serious risk of alerting these espionage subjects to the fact that the Bureau is aware of and has been checking on their espionage activities as a result of an indiscriminate contact by Secret Service or local police working with Secret Service. This would also possibly result in exposing key informants as once the espionage subject is so alerted, he could then very likely deduce the source of our information which would materially hamper our over-all counterespionage program. In fact, the Domestic Intelligence Division has indicated that such exposure might well place some of our valuable informants' lives in jeopardy, particularly those who are Soviet citizens.

Based on the memorandum of the Domestic Intelligence Division of 6/30/64 Mr. stated, "I think O.K. not to disseminate data on these 16," and the Director said, "O.K." A copy of this memorandum is attached.

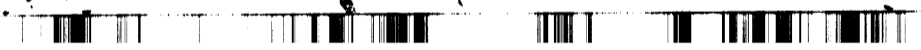

Memo to ^{gen.} 11-12-64 recommended that 16 sensitive espionage cases be removed from the espionage special section of the Security Index and that Liaison Section take immediate steps to retrieve from Secret Service all documents submitted by the Bureau regarding these cases, as well as any index cards or other identifying material maintained by Secret Service on these cases. The Director noted, "Just what would be my explanation if one of these 16 should attempt to kill the President and we had not furnished background to SS? H."

In answer to the Director's question, it should be pointed out that bearing in mind that these 16 individuals have not threatened the President and are not the type to engage in such activity, we would be in the same position as we are in with reference to thousands of other individuals on whom we have investigative coverage or information who are not on the Security Index and whose statements and activities do not bring them within the criteria for dissemination to Secret Service. This would leave the Bureau in the position where it can be stated that all persons who are considered dangerous to the security of this country in time of emergency have been the subject of dissemination to Secret Service.

Mr. [redacted] commented that we should verify the addresses of these 16 subjects every 30 days. It should be noted that each of these subjects is under current active investigation and the whereabouts of each is established much more frequently than each 30 days. We would continue to give each of these subjects close investigative attention.

ACTION: For information. If you approve, we will remove the 16 names from the Special Section (Espionage) of the Security Index and at the same time will arrange for Liaison to discreetly retrieve the names which had previously been furnished to Secret Service.

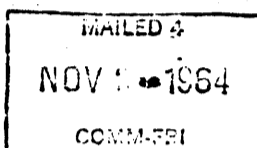
