This is to advise that on March 11, 1949, former Special Agent HOWARD V. ROSS, who is a personal acquaintance of the writer, telephonically furnished the following information.

Mr. ROSS, who is an attorney at 120 Broadway, New York, New York, stated that recently one of the attorneys in his firm had lunch with a member of the law firm of Debevoise, which firm is handling the defense of ALGER HISS. Former Agent ROSS did not furnish the names of either of these individuals. He stated, however, that the person from the Debevoise Law Firm told the man in ROSS' law firm that they know definitely "that the phones in their office are tapped and that the phone of ALGER HISS is tapped." Consequently, this individual stated, ~~that~~ whenever the Debevoise Firm wishes to communicate with ALGER HISS telephonically, this contact is made from a public phone booth "downstairs" presumably in the building in which the Debevoise Law Firm is located.

Mr. ROSS stated that he wanted to furnish this information to the Bureau for any value that it might have concerning the HISS case. This information was furnished to Supervisor TUOHY, who requested that a memorandum be submitted.

SAMUEL GARDNER WELLS

Reference is made to memorandum of Special Agent L. W. SPILLANE. (Serial 1314), in which it was indicated that CHAMBERS had stated that during the 1940's while he was employed with "Time Inc.", he mentioned the names of ALGER HISS and DONALD HISS as well as some of the circumstances of this case to SAMUEL GARDNER WELLS, religion editor of "Time Inc.". He said that WELLS was still employed by "Time Inc." and that he had been instrumental in having CHAMBERS join the Episcopal Church. The writer was assigned a lead to interview WELLS concerning CHAMBERS and his background. The writer made a contact with ISABEL TORRANCE, Time-Life International, 9 Rockefeller Plaza, New York City, Telephone CI 5-4400, and it was determined that WELLS is on foreign assignment for Time-Life International, and has been in Tokyo, Japan, for the past two months. He will be away from the United States and in Japan for an indefinite period and is not expected back before at least four months.

In view of the fact that WELLS is not available for interview and will not be for a substantial period of time, it is not contemplated at this time that any further effort will be made to interview him concerning CHAMBERS.

At 12:40 pm on March 17, Mr. Leo Laughlin of the Bureau called advising that Mr. CLEVELAND, attorney for CHAMBERS, was trying to get in touch with CHAMBERS. Mr. Laughlin wanted to know where CHAMBERS was.

I advised him that CHAMBERS, insofar as we know, is at his farm in Maryland today. I suggested that he have Mr. CLEVELAND attempt to reach CHAMBERS there.

Mr. HORACE SCHMAHL, who was employed as a private investigator by Mr. EDWARD McLEAN, attorney for ALGER HISS at the outset of this investigation, telephonically contacted the writer at 1:30 PM, March 16, 1949, advised that he had been contacted by reporters for the "World-Telegram" and also the "Daily Mirror" and had been questioned whether or not he had conducted any investigation, together with Mr. BROADY, who is presently under investigation in connection with the wire tapping investigation conducted by the District Attorney's Office, New York County, regarding the ALGER HISS-WHITTAKER CHAMBERS case.

Mr. SCHMAHL also stated Mr. McLEAN had called him about an hour ago and told him that he, too, had been contacted by a reporter from the "World-Telegram," and asked if there was any connection between BROADY and the HISS-CHAMBERS case.

Mr. McLEAN advised Mr. SCHMAHL that he had told the reporters he had no comment to make. Mr. SCHMAHL stated he told the two reporters who contacted him that he had an office arrangement with BROADY and knew the latter had done work for McLEAN but could not state anything regarding the nature of it.

Mr. SCHMAHL advised he gave the reporters much double talk but told them he could make no comment regarding the HISS-CHAMBERS case. Mr. SCHMAHL advised that yesterday he had been sent for by the District Attorney's Office and questioned for about five minutes concerning any connection he might have with wire tapping. He stated that the only reason he had been called in by the District Attorney's Office was because of the fact that his telephone number was also listed to BROADY. Mr. SCHMAHL advised he had no knowledge of any wire tapping business taking place in BROADY'S office and that he had severed all connections with BROADY and now had his own office at 62 William Street, telephone Digby 4-1795. He stated he left BROADY'S office because he did not particularly like the type of work in which BROADY was engaged, specifically the divorce cases BROADY was handling.

Mr. SCHMAHL stated he was never a partner of BROADY, but merely had space in his office and had a sort of working agreement with him. Mr. SCHMAHL stated that 99% of his own work involves insurance investigations.

Mr. SCHMAHL advised that if there is anything further in this regard he would contact this office and inform Mr. Tuohy of any developments.

On March 16, 1949, while CHAMBERS was being interviewed on another matter, photographs of the former residence of LAUCHLIN CURRIE at Marginal Acres near Hancock, New Hampshire, were exhibited to CHAMBERS. It will be recalled that CHAMBERS indicated that in the late summer of 1937 he made a trip with ALGER and PRISCILLA HISS from Washington, D.C., to the summer home of HARRY DEXTER WHITE in New Hampshire; talked to WHITE and thereafter returned to Washington.

At the time these photographs were sent to the New York Office there was also attached a handwritten memorandum of SA. F. M. Connors of the Boston Office, which includes a diagram of the house and roads leading to this farm. After examining the sketch of the various roads and the house, CHAMBERS stated that he is 100% sure that the general layout of the roads and the house is identical with his recollection of the layout of these roads and property at the time he visited them in 1937. Upon examination of the photographs he was somewhat reluctant to make a positive identification of this house. He pointed out that in the first instance he recalls the house as being painted white, whereas instant farmhouse is painted a red color. CHAMBERS also has no recollection of the "wagon shed" which is attached to the rear of this property. He did, however, pick out one photograph which shows a secondary road and lane leading up to the home, together with second growth brush and timber. He stated that this photograph most closely resembles the general geography of the layout.

In view of CHAMBERS' failure to positively identify this farmhouse, it is suggested that MRS. HARRY DEXTER WHITE be again interviewed to determine whether she has any possible information that this was the summer home occupied by the WHITES in 1937. As a possible aid it is suggested that she furnish the location of the summer residence occupied by the WHITE family in 1936 and 1938. In the event that no positive information is readily obtainable from MRS. HARRY

DEXTER WHITE it is suggested that arrangements be made to interview LAUGHLIN CURRIE, the owner of these premises, to determine whether he had any documentary or factual information indicating that WHITE occupied this farmhouse during the summer of 1937. It will, of course, be helpful if the actual dates of WHITE'S residency at this farmhouse can be ascertained. This is important in view of the fact that investigation to date has placed the time of this trip as between August 10th and August 15th, 1937.

During the course of the interview with WHITTAKER CHAMBERS on March 16, 1949, he provided the information set forth hereinafter.

CHAMBERS stated that sometime in about 1935 the unknown subject "BILL", who was his superior at that time, mentioned an individual by the name of COL. DEAN IVAN LAMB. CHAMBERS stated that he never heard of this individual before, but at some future time learned that LAMB was reportedly an international adventurer; that at one time he was connected with the Chinese Air Force, and still another time had some association with a Central American air force, possibly that of Nicaragua.

"BILL" proposed to CHAMBERS that the latter get in touch with LAMB to determine if any "documents" could be secured through LAMB. CHAMBERS said that he did not recall that any special type of documents were referred to other than possibly "intelligence documents."

CHAMBERS said that he did not know just how to go about approaching COL. LAMB. He determined that LAMB was located somewhere in New York City. Then, he continued, he discussed the matter with ALGER HISS and the latter suggested that he, HISS, make this contact with COL. LAMB. CHAMBERS stated that he agreed to this and that HISS did, shortly thereafter, come from Washington, D. C. to New York City and contact COL. LAMB. However, CHAMBERS stated, this contact had no results, to his knowledge. He admitted that he did not know any of the details of the meeting between LAMB and ALGER HISS and claimed that he had forgotten just where the meeting had taken place other than that it was possibly in some hotel in New York City.

After COL. BORIS BYKOV became CHAMBERS' superior, the latter told BYKOV of the episode involving COL. LAMB. CHAMBERS stated that his point in telling BYKOV this story was more or less to show just what "a crazy idea" the whole thing had been. However, CHAMBERS stated, BYKOV'S reaction was just the opposite and he was very eager to approach LAMB again. He stated, however, that ALGER HISS should not be in any way

involved in the business. After some deliberation, CHAMBERS related, he and BYKOV decided to use LEE PRESSMAN in this second approach to COL. LAMB. CHAMBERS did not know any of the particular details concerning the original meeting between PRESSMAN and LAMB other than that they met in New York City. At this meeting the matter of LAMB cooperating was more or less left hanging, that is, according to CHAMBERS, he did not say "yes" nor did he say "no". When PRESSMAN reported this information BYKOV decided that CHAMBERS should meet LAMB himself using "the utmost caution". CHAMBERS stated that he, Chambers, was very much afraid of LAMB and was very much opposed to the whole operation of approaching and possibly using him. However, he stated, he arranged the meeting in the manner set forth below.

He stated that around 123rd or 124th Street and Riverside Drive, there is a long flight of stone steps, possibly 40 in number, which lead up from the park level to Riverside Drive. CHAMBERS said that at a certain hour, which had been prearranged, he stationed himself at the parapet at the top of the stairs where he could see what was going on below and all around him. He said he had instructed PRESSMAN to bring LAMB, after several changes of conveyances and by a circuitous route to the foot of these stone steps. He stated that at the appointed hour he saw PRESSMAN and LAMB at the bottom of the steps and had a full view of them while they climbed the stairs. LAMB, according to CHAMBERS, had no previous knowledge of where this meeting was to take place. CHAMBERS stated that when LAMB and PRESSMAN reached the top of the steps, he, CHAMBERS, approached them. He claimed that at that time he instantly decided to break off all relations with LAMB. He said that he had a very brief conversation with him during which, to the best of his recollection, he said that he was glad to meet LAMB and that any future contacts would be arranged through LEE PRESSMAN.

CHAMBERS commented at this point that he did not feel that PRESSMAN was using his own name in this particular operation.

Immediately thereafter, CHAMBERS said goodbye to LAMB, and taking PRESSMAN with him he walked to 125th St., where they took a cab and moved from the area as quickly as possible. CHAMBERS stated that he instructed PRESSMAN that he was to have nothing further to do with LAMB. Further, he said that he himself therefore, had never had any more associations or contacts with LAMB.

Finally, CHAMBERS stated, he did not know where LAMB secured the title of "Colonel" but it was his opinion that it had nothing to do with the American Army. It was also his opinion that LAMB is now deceased. He provided the following description of LAMB:

Age	In his 40's (1935)
Height	5' 5"
Build	Slight
Complexion	Rather dark
Nationality	American
Characteristics	- Wore an artist's black bow tie; very 'shifty' looking.

In view of the alleged contact between COL. LAMB and ALGER HISS, as related hereinbefore by CHAMBERS, it is suggested that appropriate investigative steps be taken to determine if LAMB is still alive. In the event he is still alive, interview should be had with him for any information he may be able to provide with reference to this matter. In this connection it might be noted that the writer has checked the New York Times Index for the years 1937 to 1948, and no reference was contained therein indicating that COL. LAMB was deceased. It was noted that an individual, probably identical with the person mentioned by CHAMBERS, was listed as MAJOR DEAN IVAN LAMB in the Times Index for 1944 and 1945. Likewise a check of the New York indices reflects that there are a number of references to MAJOR DEAN IVAN LAMB. These indices have not been reviewed by the writer. *T.C. made*

During the course of the interview with WHITTAKER CHAMBERS on March 15, 1949, he provided the information set forth hereinafter.

Mr. CHAMBERS stated that sometime in 1936 LINCOLN STEFFENS contacted him, possibly through MAXIM LIEBER. He asked that CHAMBERS meet him at the Commodore Hotel in New York City. It turned out that the purpose of this meeting was to get CHAMBERS to write a biography of STEFFENS close friend--FILENE, who was the individual for whom the large department store in Boston, Massachusetts is named.

CHAMBERS stated that he declined this offer and suggested the name of ROBERT CANTWELL to STEFFENS as being an individual who might possibly write this biography. It was CHAMBERS' understanding that CANTWELL did actually prepare this biography, but it was never published.

CHAMBERS said that at the time of his visit with STEFFENS at the Commodore Hotel, the latter was occupying a suite there. While CHAMBERS was talking to STEFFENS, he observed that a door between the rooms of the suite was ajar and he heard loud talking in the next room. CHAMBERS stated that STEFFENS explained this talking by nodding towards the door and stating, "ANNA LOUISE STRONG is in there."

CHAMBERS said at this time he had a long personal conversation with STEFFENS. He said that STEFFENS stated that he, CHAMBERS, was more a Bolshevik than any other American he had met, and that "the future of the country lay in hands of men of my type." However, CHAMBERS stated that he thought STEFFENS was possibly disturbed by his, CHAMBERS, Bolshevik realism. He related

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that as he was leaving and was walking down the hotel corridor, STEFFENS came out of his room and shouted, "Keep a warm spot in your heart WHITTAKER".

CHAMBERS stated that STEFFENS knew him as "HUGH JONES". He is unable to recall just how STEFFENS knew this, and stated that he cannot recall using this name. However, it is entirely possible that he might have reviewed a book or books for the "New Republic" using that name.

Sometime in about September, 1948 after one of CHAMBERS' appearances as a witness for the House Committee on Un-American Activities, LEONARD LYONS telephoned him at Time, Inc. LYONS informed him that he had just observed a letter which was in a publication of collected letters of LINCOLN STEFFENS, and which was allegedly written to CHAMBERS by LINCOLN STEFFENS. He subsequently ascertained that although he had never received this letter, according to the book, STEFFENS is supposed to have written a very laudatory letter commenting on the articles that CHAMBERS wrote for "New Masses" in 1932. CHAMBERS also heard about these letters in STEFFENS' book through one of Time's foreign correspondents. According to this correspondent, the latter had been traveling with ELLA WINTERS, the wife of LINCOLN STEFFENS. It appears that in about 1947 she was traveling with this Time correspondent, SAMUEL G. WELLS, in the Russian zone of Germany. It was on this occasion that the WINTERS' woman told WELLS about the letters that her husband had written to CHAMBERS. She declared at this time that she could not believe that a man who wrote such stories in "New Masses" could have broken with the Communist Party.

LINCOLN STEFFENS is, of course, best known for an auto-biography which he wrote and, according to CHAMBERS, was one of the most famous "muckraisers." At one time he was WOODROW WILSON's observer during the Russian revolution in 1919 and was also active in some capacity for WILSON at the Paris Peace Conference in 1919. According to CHAMBERS, he was a perennial fellow traveler.

According to CHAMBERS, STEFFENS is alleged to have met ELLA WINTERS at the Paris Peace Conference when she was the secretary to LLOYD GEORGE. She was

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also a fellow traveler, and possibly became a member of the Communist Party at some later period.

It is suggested that an effort be made to locate the abovementioned publication, "Collected Letters of LINCOLN STEFFENS", so that the letters allegedly written to CHAMBERS by STEFFENS may be reviewed for any value that they might be to this investigation.

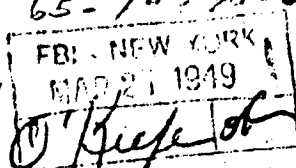

Reference is made to the report of SA J. L. KIRKLAND, 3/8/49, Philadelphia, Pa., in the above entitled matter. This report sets out a lead to interview CHAMBERS to determine whether CHAMBERS was a camera enthusiast, and whether he possibly may have taken any photographs of ALGER or PRISCILLA HISS while the CHAMBERS family were spending the summer of 1935 at Smittown and New Hope, Pa.

In this connection CHAMBERS was interviewed on March 15, 1949 and he related that other than the photographing of documents about which he has related in his signed statement, he was never "a camera enthusiast". He did state, however, that his wife owned a box camera during the time they were at Smittown and New Hope, and that she still has this camera in her possession. He stated that he cannot recall that he took any pictures with this camera while he and his family resided at Smittown and New Hope, Pa. He stated that no photographs had ever been taken of ALGER or PRISCILLA HISS by him or his wife. He stated that both he and his wife have talked this situation over on numerous occasions, and have made a thorough examination of their premises and have never been able to come up with such a photograph.

In connection with the investigation being conducted by the Philadelphia office in the vicinity of New Hope, Pa., CHAMBERS stated that there is a very good possibility that the real estate agent in New Hope, through whom the "Stone House" on the TOM and MARY MARSHALL farm was rented, might recall seeing ALGER HISS and CHAMBERS when the rental for this farm was arranged. It is CHAMBERS present recollection that ALGER HISS was with him when he went to this real estate agent in New Hope, Pa.

In the event that this real estate agent, whose name CHAMBERS recalls as being ROBERTS, has not been interviewed, a lead should be set out in the next investigative report to have this individual interviewed and a photograph of ALGER HISS exhibited to him.

During the interview had with FRANKLIN SPIER, the former friend of Mr. and Mrs. CHAMBERS, on March 14, 1949, the latter related that Mr. and Mrs. CHAMBERS resided at the SPIER farm for a period of some months in 1932. During this interrogation, SPIER informed SA Lawrence Bracken that he had heard from his, SPIER's, wife that sometime while the CHAMBERS family was occupying his farm, either CHAMBERS or his wife buried some material in back of the SPIER farm. SPIER related that this act was probably prompted by the fact that the German-American Bund had purchased property adjacent to the SPIER farm, and CHAMBERS, for some reason or another, had decided to secrete some material which he had in his possession at that time.

On March 15, 1949 these facts were brought to the attention of Mr. CHAMBERS, and he related that he had absolutely no recollection of having secreted any material on the SPIER farm at any time. He did state, however, that the only thing of consequence that he had in his possession at that time, in so far as the Communist Party was concerned, was Communist propaganda, and that if anything had been secreted it would probably have been this type of material.

On March 15, 1949 the agents from the Baltimore office interviewed Mrs. CHAMBERS and she recalled that shortly after their marriage, in 1931, she and her husband took up a "periodic residence" at the SPIER farm, near Glenn Gardener, New Jersey, and that they eventually moved from the farm in the Fall of 1933. Sometime during their residence at the farm, Mrs. CHAMBERS buried a letter-size metal file containing miscellaneous Communist pamphlets and literature, which she did not desire to have discovered in their possession. This was buried in the truck garden plot near the barn. After moving from the farm in the early Fall of 1933, Mrs. CHAMBERS returned to the SPIER farm and recovered the letter-size metal file with its contents. On this occasion Mrs. CHAMBERS told Mr. and Mrs. SPIER about the concealment of this file and they helped her locate and recover same.

Subsequent to the recovery, Mrs. CHAMBERS stated that they disposed of the Communist literature and pamphlets by destroying them or giving them away. She was unable to recall whether there was anything but Communist pamphlets and literature in the file at the time it was buried, and denied that there was anything belonging to the CHAMBERS presently buried on the SPIER farm.

Mrs. CHAMBERS was able to recall this date clearly because she was pregnant at the time and the child was born in October, 1933. Mrs. CHAMBERS further denied that there was ever any confidential documents buried on the SPIER farm to her knowledge. She likewise denied that she had informed Mrs. SPIER that there was any confidential documents secreted in this metal file.

On March 16, 1949 Mr. CHAMBERS was informed of the remarks made by his wife in connection with this incident, and he stated that at that time this did not refresh his recollection in any way whatsoever, and that he could not add anything to what his wife said. He did indicate, however, that on his return to his farm in Maryland, he would discuss this matter with his wife and thereafter would inform agents of any additional material that he had obtained in this connection.
