Yours letter of March 21, 1956 file

In reference to your observation to the reference of Senator and Mrs. Thomas W. Hardwick on page 2, chapter 5, whose home figured in the bombings in Washington in June of 1919, I wish to advise that Hardwick was a United States Senator from 1914 to 1919. His term expired in March. He later became Governor of Georgia and served in this capacity from 1921 to 1923, and later became Special Assistant to the Attorney General and died in 1944.

He was General Counsel for the old McCormick Committee in 1934 investigating Nazi activities and he was active in the American Civil Liberties Union as a member of the Board of Directors in 1941.

In the hearings and accredited reports covering the bombings, Hardwick is referred to as "Senator Hardwick." I, accordingly, think that even though he had been out of office for a few months when the bombings occurred, that it is still proper to refer to him as Senator. Hardwick's biographical data appears in the Biographical Dictionary of American Congress, 1774-49, page 1266.

I was frankly very pleased when Mr. Holloman conveyed your inquiry because I was glad that you had read the chapter this encloses

MR. TOLSON:

We have checked the information which George Sokolsky furnished to the effect that Emma Goldman had returned to the United States and that he saw her at the Music Academy in Brooklyn.

The New York Times index reflects that she was given permission to return to the United States in 1934 on a 90-day visit and did lecture in New York City. In 1921, she left Russia as did Berkman. Goldman lived in Germany and England and finally came to Canada and received permission for a 90-day visit to the United States. During that period of time, she also allegedly visited Washington.

We are, accordingly, putting in a few lines in a footnote indicating that in 1934 she obtained permission for a 90-day visit to the United States where she delivered a series of lectures. In New York City she met George Sokolsky who was lecturing in an adjoining room and she told Sokolsky she wanted to die in the United States but she returned to Canada where she died in 1940.

You will recall that Berkman committed suicide in 1936 in Nice, France.

George Sokolsky has returned to me the first 6 chapters of the book with the notation "this is a good and thorough job but it looks awfully long." George has mentioned several times on the phone his enthusiasm for the book. He has made several minor observations on points to emphasize dealing with the early period of communism which were excellent. One is that Emma Goldman returned to the United States after being deported. He met her at the Music Academy in Brooklyn where by coincidence both were lecturing in different rooms. She told George she wanted to die in the United States. George told her he did not know how he could help her. She left shortly thereafter and died abroad. We are going to use this as a footnote.

The publishers will need approximately one week for what they call styling, fitting into shape and etc. As a matter of fact, the publishers will have to count every word in the book in order to figure out how many number of pages they will need for the book and the size of the pages and etc.

It was pleasant to talk with you today. Let me tell you once again how happy I am to be associated with you and to look forward to a number of meetings. I am delighted that you are immediately going to take some time off and that in two weeks or less we can look forward to a revised manuscript. Mr. Rigg and I are delighted that you generally approve of our suggestions, and we feel more than confident that the resulting book will do much good. Of course I stand ready to spend a day or two with you at the proper time.

At Ed's request, I am returning the second version of the foreword. Both he and I favor the first version, but it does seem that a combination might be even more effective. The first half of page 1 of the "new" foreword appears somewhere in the manuscript itself, but I suggest that we might start the foreword "I remember very distinctly..." down through "...our Western civilization". These 18 lines would then be followed by the original foreword after deleting the first paragraph.

I rather favor this suggestion and hope that you will consider it. The "new" foreword is attached.

Both Ed and I like the original arrangement in its broad outlines, but I think that you may have a good idea in suggesting a brief case history to start off the book. This would certainly entice the reader's interest and lead him on. I can also see your point about following this with the beginnings of Communism in the United States, although I am not certain that this would be any more effective than the present arrangement. Ed probably pointed out to you that in the present version we thought chapters 7 and 8 should precede Chapters 4, 5, and 6. In short, I do think a punchy opening chapter would help, but I believe that the reader would be hooked even if the chapters in Part II, as presently constituted, followed immediately.

I suggest that you call me after you get going, or that you let me know and I will call you.

Dear Lou:

I'm sending the original of this letter to Washington, and also a carbon to London, in order to relieve by that much the pile of things waiting for you on your return. I find I have many things to say:

1. First, it was a real joy to see you again. As a byproduct of your visit, I later reviewed our correspondence file for those busy times in 1954 and 1955. It reminded me of how closely we were working then and it seemed good to be back in touch with you again. Marie The and I greatly enjoyed our visit with you and I have pondered a lot since then about some of the personal things we talked about. I have a few further thoughts in that area for our next meeting.

2. Second, over the weekend, I gave a rapid reading to the revised manuscript of "Communism in the United States". It was delightful to see how well it stands up. And, to the extent that updating has been done, the book seems actually strengthened by the various references to Geneva, Stalin's "downgrading," Hungary, Krushev, etc.

3. However, one place where I think we could still stand a bit more updating is in the introduction at the ends of Paragraph 1 and 3. Here I would like to see some good strong sentences (maybe lifted from Krushev's recent talks in Prague), to show that the Communist menace under Krushev is just as strong as it ever was under Stalin (Cf. The Krushev quote in Time, July 22, 1957 page 22: "What will the policy be like? ... We will do the same, but with more emphasis.")* I think this is important, Lou, for rightly or wrongly, many people, since 1954, have become indifferent or complacent about Communism. Unless they can be jarred out of this attitude, it is bound to affect both the sale of the book and the spirit in which it is read.

dramatic incidents. I am delighted that so many of these have been left in the manuscript and, since the book is aimed at students, workers, etc, it is desirable to do everything possible to give action and drama to the text. But in our review we should consider these two points:

(a) Style. Our original thought in 1954 was to set these incidents in italics, so that they would jump out and enliven the text but also not interrupt the general flow of the argument. Now I notice that the incidents are inset in the early chapters, but then later on simply run into the body of the text without any typographic emphasis. I still think that some kind of typographic device, either inset or italics, is desirable to give variety and interest to the book.

(b) Tone. Here I think we want to remind ourselves of the mood in which the book will be read. As stated above, many people are now less agitated about the problem than formerly, so we must be sure that descriptions and dialogues do not seem to them over dramatized or too theatrical. Incidents should be dramatic, of course, but I believe they will be stronger if they are understated. I have no specific cases in mind at the moment, except the Question and Answer routine on pages 255-57, but later on I would like to review this aspect carefully.

That's all for now. And even at that, I apologize for a long letter. As you know, I'll be leaving for several weeks in Europe on August 14, but I could come to Washington prior to that time if it seemed desirable. In any event I'll stand by with interest for word from you as to the next move.

I am also very much interested in the idea of a "Reader" project and am doing something on that. But it's probably best to take these matters up one at a time.

I have very carefully read the attached manuscript. It reads too fast. The American public can no longer be divided into laborers and college students. Most Americans go to high school. Most labor leaders are fairly educated men, at least literate.

This book is written in two styles: one style talks right down to the people; the other part is scholarly. This runs through many chapters and makes for irregularity of style.

I believe that this book requires more specific citations and quotations with names, dates and places. It needs plenty of references. To quote a sentence, within actual quotation marks, without a reference to a source is wrong and will hurt the book. It will certainly make it difficult for anyone to use this book in a debate as a reference. Who said it -- Lenin or Hoover?

I think, therefore, that an editorial job needs to be done on this book before it is published to make it fully worthy of the Director's reputation as a leading authority on this subject.

Without doubt, Mr. Hoover has produced a book of major importance for an understanding of the workings of Communism at home and abroad. It has a compelling quality to it--and the further you read the more you want to read.

There are relatively minor improvements that could be made, I believe, along the following lines:

1. Open the book with a chapter that has a narrative appeal, such as Chapter 17 or one of the others like it. This would be using the same technique we used in The FBI Story to lead the reader into the book--and once he's into it, he'll read it.

2. Place the second chapter--the discussion of dialectics--further back into the book. It is heavy going to hit this part of the book so early. It could come later and perhaps would be even more effective since the reader then would have the benefit of some knowledge on the workings of communists and communism.

3. Spell out a bit more why the American communists are so loyal to Moscow and to Russia--emphasizing that there can't be independence of action under the commy aim to change the world according to the gospel of Lenin and Marx.

4. Avoid the use of quotation marks around words and the exclamation points where possible.

5. I agree that wherever the anecdotes can be expanded, it helps make the reading more interesting and gives action to the telling.

6. Give a definition of such words as "secular."

Pursuant to your request, a review has been made of the book "Communism in the United States" which is scheduled to be sent to the publishers today.

This review of the book in final form reflects that the suggested changes made by the Internal Security Section during the course of the previous individual chapter reviews have been incorporated in the final document. This review has been confined to the book itself and no effort has been made to verify and double check the documentation.

OBSERVATIONS:

Our review of this book has prompted the following suggestions:

1. Page iii in the Forward the following sentence appears at the top of the page: "Party officials are shown organizing agitation campaigns, plotting sabotage, and rendering aid to Soviet espionage." It is believed that the statement plotting sabotage should be revised since it is not believed that this statement can be substantiated.

2. Page 2 in paragraph 1 the following statement is made: "A disciplined Party of nearly 20,000 hard core members is now at work, along with an estimated 200,000 fellow travelers, sympathizers, opportunists and dupes." This statement is considerably removed from the estimated Communist Party membership as of June 30, 1957, of 11,504 members which was based on the best information in the field offices. The practice of estimating the number of fellow travelers at 10 to 1 is extremely difficult to document.

- 3. *Revised* Page 40 in the second paragraph the statement is made "Significantly, no country has ever gone communist by the free choice of election! Ballots and communism simply don't mix!" It is believed that it may be desirable to revise or modify this statement in light of the recent British Guiana elections and the surprising strength of communist voting in certain islands and countries.
- 4. *Changed* Page 86. It is believed that the following statement should be added to the third paragraph: "If such testimony becomes necessary." It is believed that this addition would tend to lessen the previous implied idea in the paragraph that each communist who breaks with the Party would be required to testify against the communist movement if his repentance is sincere. This suggested addition would, it is believed, help in the Bureau's current problem in getting ex-communists to furnish information to the FBI.
- 5. *Changed* Page 90 in paragraph 2 the statement is made "The communists of 1919 were a motley lot, vastly different from the highly disciplined, efficiently operating Party of today." It is suggested the last word today be changed to recent years since there are many who would disagree that the Party in its present disruptive state and factionist bickering is an efficiently operating Party today.
- 6. *Changed* Page 227 at the top of the page the statement is made "If a motion is to be made, who will present it? When? Early in the evening while the crowd is small?" The question is raised as to whether or not the small should be changed to the word large. If not, then some further explanation should be made as to why the crowd is small early in the evening.
- 7. *Changed* Page 282 in the last paragraph the statement is made "In fact, long-term preparation for possible sabotage is today being carried out in the underground." Since there is no documentation for this statement, it is not known on what it was based. We might have difficulty in substantially backing up this statement.
- 8. *Changed* Page 283 in the first paragraph the statement is made "Deep in the Party's underground the communists are today vigorously pursuing a program (called colonization),....." It is believed that we would have difficulty in backing up this statement since the colonization program has been carried out in recent years on a relatively small scale.

9. Page 320 in next-to-last line the statement is made "1948 July 3: Headquarters of Cominform prepared in Bucharest, Rumania." It is suggested that a later date in 1948 be utilized after the headquarters had become occupied.

Pursuant to your request, a review has been made of the draft of the new Chapter 19 "Masters of Deceit" of the book "Communism in the United States." This review has been confined to the material in the chapter itself and no effort has been made to verify and double check the documentation since this is being handled as a separate assignment.

OBSERVATIONS:

Our review of this chapter has prompted the following suggestions:

The controversial nature of the subject matter in this chapter, namely the relationship between communism and the Jewish faith, is extremely delicate and will undoubtedly receive searching analysis by critics, particularly those seeking a basis for attack on the Director.

It is felt that the inclusion of a chapter on this subject matter is highly desirable in view of the unusually high percentage of individuals of Jewish extraction who are currently in leadership positions inside the Communist Party, USA, (CPUSA).

The main purpose of such a chapter is to settle, once and for all, that the communist movement is absolutely incompatible with the philosophy and traditions of the Jewish people and that those individuals of Jewish extraction who have joined the CPUSA are renegades and by such continuing membership are working toward the eventual complete destruction of the Jewish religion and culture.

The draft of Chapter 19 contains a number of excellent arguments supporting the above-desired objectives. However, it is believed certain changes in the format of the chapter would strengthen the over-all desired objective:

1. It is felt that the chapter could be shortened by eliminating certain explanatory and documentary details which, while pertinent to a lengthy discussion on the subject, are believed to be a bit too involved for an individual chapter of this nature, for example:
 - a. Page 2 is devoted chiefly to a commentary on Paul Novick and certain of his writings. While Novick is an important communist and his writings are pertinent, it is believed that this particular item could be condensed.
 - b. Pages 10, 11 and 12 go into considerable detail relative to the disintegration of Jewish education and cultural pursuits over the years inside the Soviet Union. It is believed that this entire point could be made by quoting from the report made by the five Jewish rabbis who traveled to Russia during 1956. In their report they stated "Under Stalin, every vestige of Jewish cultural and communal life was liquidated. To this day, there is still no Yiddish stage, newspaper or literature." (Page 6, pamphlet entitled "The Status of the Jews Behind the Iron Curtain.") "In all of Russia, we were told that there are at most only 100 rabbis, not one of whom is much below the age of 70. Most of those we met were closer to 80. The reason is simple. Not a single rabbi has been ordained or brought into the country for over 40 years." (Page 19, pamphlet entitled "The Status of the Jews Behind the Iron Curtain.")
2. The conclusion of the chapter, it is felt, could be bolstered by giving it a more positive approach, such as getting across the necessity for people of Jewish faith to become militantly anticommunist since the success of communism on a world-wide basis would be the death blow to Judaism and all Jewish traditions.
3. In addition to the above, certain penciled suggested changes have been made in the draft copy of the chapter.

Mr. Baumgardner's memorandum of September 24, which is attached and which was prepared by Supervisor Herman Bly, suggests the shortening of the chapter by eliminating explanatory and documentary details, which he feels might be too involved for an individual chapter. He makes specific suggestions with reference to page 2, which refers to Paul Novick, probably the outstanding Jewish propagandist for communism; on pages 10, 11, and 12, where we go into considerable detail regarding the disintegration of Jewish education and cultural pursuits over the years inside the Soviet Union, that the entire point could be made by quoting from the report of the five rabbis who traveled in Russia during 1956; and that the conclusion should be bolstered by a positive approach getting across the necessity for the Jewish people to become militantly anti-communist.

With reference to my observations to Mr. Bly's comments, I desire to point out that this chapter is lengthy necessarily so to put in the evidentiary details. This is largely a condensation of the monograph which had such a splendid reaction. We need to emphasize the Soviet treatment of Jews in order to take advantage of the psychological effect of the concern presently in the Jewish community against the treatment of Jews in Russia. It is necessary, I believe, to put the evidence in. I had also hoped that this chapter later could be used as an article. It might possibly be widely distributed by the American Jewish Congress, B'nai B'rith, or the Anti-Defamation League who in fact might, because of this chapter, really push the book.

With reference to our failure to quote from the report of the five Jewish rabbis, this was deliberate. I, of course, knew of this report; in fact, I had read it. After all, this is our story and not the story of the five Jewish rabbis. What we have to say is supported by the report of the five Jewish rabbis. By leaving them out this gives Jewish organizations an opportunity to come along and say we supported the Jewish rabbis and their findings; in other words, they can be expected to support this chapter of the book.

With reference to the closing with an appeal to the Jewish people to become anticommunist, this would be too patently propagandist in my opinion. We make the point that the communists are against the Jews and this is the conclusion that the reader will inevitably come to and I think we weaken ourselves by making an appeal to Jews.

Mr. Sizoo stated that he agreed with Mr. Bly's observations and is inclined to think the chapter too lengthy and that the details tend to obscure the basic points being made. I talked to Sizoo. He thinks we have too much on the treatment of Jews in Russia. The chapter, I think, necessarily has to be long to include the evidence.

Mr. Belmont, in his addendum, states that the chapter is not in keeping with the rest of the book as to presentation and style, that it is too long, that it doesn't hang together to get across the basic thought, that he seriously questions whether there should be a separate chapter singling out Jews, and that if it is to be treated at all it should be in an existing chapter.

The style, of course, is no different than in numerous other chapters. The chapter is, of course, presented so that it can be lifted as an article. It is lengthy because it is necessary to cite the evidence. We do not single out the Jews as the preceding chapter deals with the Negroes and the chapter following this deals with religion generally.

I had Don Whitehead read Chapter 19 today. He thought it was excellent; that it hung together well; that he didn't think it was too long; that the evidence cited in there builds and makes a very solid case. He thought the chapter

should stay. Mullen had a similar opinion. Although Mullen told me that the chapters got out of sequence on his desk and that as he was reading the chapter on Jews he wondered why they had been singled out, when he read the chapter on Negroes he thought this was excellent.

I have talked to Mr. Belmont further. His point is that he thinks this chapter is too obvious and that by singling out the Jews we draw too much attention to them. He further stated that he thought others might raise the question why pick out the Jews. He further thought that this chapter doesn't carry the simple message that the rest of the book carries and that it is out of place in its present form.

I, frankly, cannot agree with the above conclusions of the Domestic Intelligence Division. I do think, however, that we should send the two chapters on the Negroes and Jews to George Sokolsky and Irving Kaufman. I think we should leave them in the manuscript as submitted to the editors of Henry Holt and after the editors have gone over the matter and they do not make any comment, then I think we should raise the specific questions that have been raised by Messrs. Bly, Belmont, and Sizoo. Mr. Sullivan has gone over the chapter and he likes it.

We still have pending the review of this chapter. George Sokolsky, Irving Kaufman and Bill Nichols all have now reviewed the chapter. All feel very definitely the chapter should go in the book. All were very praiseworthy of the chapter.

George Sokolsky made a few minor suggestions which consisted of adding a sentence or two which really was very good. George's comment was "This is very good. The effect is to make the CP anti-Semitic." Bill Nichols thinks very definitely the chapters are excellent and should go in as does Harry Shaw of Henry Holt.

We have now concluded everything in the revision, and prior to submitting it to you I am awaiting Harry Shaw's so-called styling and copy-editing, which is due here Friday night or Saturday. Once this is received and reviewed, the book will then be ready to go to press.

In connection with the chapter on the Jewish people, to head off any bigots from claiming that the Director whitewashes the Jews, I have inserted two quotes from the American Jewish League Against Communism as follows: The American Jewish League Against Communism, which is headed by the American Jewish patriot George E. Sokolsky, as early as 1948 stated that "Soviet Russia's million and a half Jews are the forgotten people of the world." The League lists among its proudest achievements that "...it was the first American organization to expose and document the communist anti-Jewish policies." (a)

I also did this for another reason. Last spring the American Jewish League Against Communism set out to buy 10,000 to 12,000 copies of "The FBI Story" to send to rabbis. I have now learned that they ended up by buying 30,000 copies which they sent to every rabbi in the United States and to the executive directors of all Jewish Community Centers. As a result,

This belief is held in the United States, too. A disciplined Party
of hard-core fanatical members is now at work, with their fellow travelers,
sympathizers, opportunists and dupes. Communists in our country, though
small in numbers, do not feel lonely. They have faith in the "big red brother"
who will come to their help. William Z. Foster's hope, a Red America, is
today inspiring thousands of Party members and sympathizers to determined
effort. They want to add America to Soviet Russia's list of conquests.

There has been a tendency in recent years to discount the
menace of domestic communists solely because there has been a decline in

Party membership. In fact, some have gone so far as to say the "...party
(4a)
...is almost over."

In 1922, when Communist Party membership reached 12,400, William Z. Foster said "... We no longer measure the importance of revolutionary organizations by size. In some places where there are only one or two men, more results are obtained than where they have larger
(4b)
organizations...."

This has been the communist line down through the years. Foster in 1951 stated: "Communist strength... cannot be measured even approximately by statistics.... The Communist Party strength runs far
(4c)
beyond all formal measurements."

The Party's membership reached a low in 1930 when it had 7,500 members and a peak of 80,000 in 1944; its membership at 5-year intervals since then has been as follows: 1935-30,000; 1940-55,000 (a drop of 15,000 from 1939); 1945-64,600 (a drop of 13,400 from 1944); 1950-43,200; 1955-23,600; and by the summer of 1957 the membership had further declined. However, over the years it has been estimated by the communist leaders themselves that for every Party member ten others are ready, willing and able to
(4d)
do the Party's work.

The fluctuations in the American Party parallel those in foreign countries. The record clearly establishes that Communist Parties have the power of swift and solid growth when the opportunity arises. The following figures reflect how Party membership can dwindle and then spurt as
(4e)
reflected by the experience in individual countries:

In Italy, Party membership went from 6,000 in 1943 to 1,500,000 in 1951; in France, membership went from 20,000 in 1929 to 400,000 in 1956; in Syria, membership went from 250 in 1931 to 10,000 in 1956; in Brazil, membership went from 25,000 in late 1947 to 100,000 in 1956; and in Indonesia, membership went from 30,000 in 1953 to 500,000 in 1956.

When the Communist Party was at its peak in the United States it was stronger in numbers than the Soviet Party was at the time it seized power in Russia.

The size of the Party in the various Soviet Satellites at the time they came under Soviet control discloses how a well organized band of Revolutionaries can impose their rule over the majority population, as reflected by the following tabulation:

Pursuant to your request, a review has been made of pages 2, 2a, and 2b of Chapter I; and pages 388 to 396 of Chapter XXIV. This review has been confined to the book itself, and no effort has been made to verify or double-check the documentation since this is being handled as a separate assignment.

We have no suggested changes to make in this portion of the book. The review of Chapter XXIV completes our review of the entire book.

OBSERVATIONS:

We found the book, except for the few changes, deletions or modifications previously suggested, to be an excellent book on the complicated, widely-discussed, but little understood subject of communism. This book is long overdue, and should play a leading role in the free world's fight against its greatest enemy.

If this book is properly presented by the publishers, and thoroughly understood by the reviewers, it should be hailed as the first authentic guide and practical textbook ever written on the subject of communism. It is hoped that it will not be sensationally publicized and become "just another" anti-communist book.

It should be presented as a book to be carefully read by every American interested in the future of America and its democratic traditions. An appeal should be made to all parents to read the book, and they in turn will make sure that their children read it when they reach maturity. An appeal should be made to philanthropists, individuals in charge of endowment funds, and civic-minded organizations to underwrite the cost of placing copies of the book in every school and public library throughout the country. that the book should have tremendous acceptance abroad if translated into foreign languages. It should give individuals fighting communism in other countries, both inside and outside the iron curtain, much moral support as well as courage in carrying on their anticommunist work.

It is believed that this calm objective approach to the book will in the end result in much wider acceptance than a more sensational approach, which might quickly lose its momentum.

On page 2B the second full paragraph contains the statement that when the Communist Party was at its peak in the U. S. it was stronger in number than the Soviet party at the time it seized power in Russia. Thereafter in the table on the bottom of that page, Communist Party membership in Russia at the time the communists took over is shown as 80,000 which is the same as peak Communist Party membership in the U. S. It is suggested that appropriate change be made in phraseology.

Your memorandum of 9-16-57 revealed that you called Ed Rigg, who had previously stated that he would like to come by and see the Director. You explained the pressing matters facing the Director at the moment and suggested that the visit be deferred until Mr. Rigg and Harry Shaw, Editor-in-Chief of Henry Holt and Company, come to Washington to go over the manuscript of the Director's book, "Communism in the United States." Mr. Rigg stated the early part of the week of 9-23-57 would be excellent for him, as he would be tied up in New York on 9-26 and 27. The following information has been ascertained concerning Mr. Rigg:

BIOGRAPHICAL DATA:

ED Rigg

Edgar Taylor Rigg is President and Director of Henry Holt and Company, 383 Madison Avenue, New York 17, New York. He was born in 1900 at Baltimore, Maryland, and resides at 23 Glen Washington Road, Bronxville 8, New York. (Poor's Register, current issue) The New York Office ascertained in 1953 that Rigg was formerly a Vice President of Standard & Poor's Corporation and was elected to the presidency of Henry Holt and Company on April 1, 1949. (94-41128-8)

INFORMATION IN BUREAU FILES:

Bufile 100-345150-9 reveals that the Director wrote Rigg in September, 1950, to thank him for Henry Holt and Company's having sent Mr. Hoover a copy of "Smersh," a book revealing operations behind the Iron Curtain and emphasizing the ruthless and brutal treatment of human beings in communist-controlled Europe.

There was no further information identifiable with Rigg located in Bufiles.

I spent practically the whole day, Monday, October 28, with Harry Shaw going over additional word changes that we had made in the book and going over the copy editing which, for the most part, consisted of the deletion of an article, a redundant phrase, a regrouping of words, and the styling of the manuscript. All word changes were included in my master copy which Mr. Stukenbroeker is now transferring to the Director's copy, a copy which will be maintained by Mr. Nease, and a copy maintained by him.

In connection with the book project I wish to set forth the following brief resume of various people in the Bureau who have been of primary assistance.

NEW YORK HERALD TRIBUNE
"MASTERS OF DECEIT"

By reference from the Director's Office at 12:15 PM today, Wick talked on the telephone with Luke Carroll, News Editor of the New York Herald Tribune, calling from New York. Carroll said his people had seen Ed Rigg of Henry Holt and Company relative to newspaper syndication of "Masters of Deceit." This syndication would be handled in the same manner as the New York Herald Tribune handled President Eisenhower's and Prime Minister Churchill's books.

Mr. Carroll said that the newspaper syndication, of course, is but a partial syndication from the standpoint of text but would be printed in all papers purchasing it at the same time the book is released. Carroll said that his people simply can't "go to grips" with Ed Rigg. The Herald Tribune further sensed that Rigg believes the matter of syndication is a decision for Mr. Hoover to make and that he (Rigg) simply will not make it.

Carroll pointed out that time is of the essence since he understands publication is set for February, 1958. The time element is important said Carroll, since a massive condensation job must be done on the book and also a selling job to various newspapers. There is also the problem of selling it on a world-wide basis through the Herald Tribune syndicate which is all set up for just this type of thing with offices in Paris, London, etc.

Carroll pointed out the Herald Tribune would feel "mighty bad" if some other paper or outlet printed the syndication in New York City or other major cities since the New York Herald Tribune had long been in the FBI's camp.

Wick pointed out to Carroll, by arrangements between Mr. Rigg and Mr. Hoover, all matters of this type should be presented to Rigg who would in turn take them up with Mr. Hoover if he deemed it advisable.

Memorandum to Mr. Tolson:

As you will recall, the first galley proofs received from Henry Holt and Company contained the textual material for Parts 1 through 4. We have carefully reviewed and proofread this material. Suggested changes, corrections and comments have been marked directly on the galley proofs.

No major changes have been made. Suggested changes have pertained chiefly to correcting misspelled words, improving clarity and strengthening sentence structure. In some instances we have inserted new, up-to-date material, for example a new schedule of dues payments for Party members, mention of the demotion of Marshal Zukov in Russia and the conviction of Col. Abel on espionage charges. Likewise, on occasions, we have cut some material from the text. This has occurred when the material seemed, upon careful reading, to be redundant.

The manuscript which we received from Holt obviously had not been previously proofed as we found a large number of misspellings, etc. In many instances, as you know, the publisher changed our original punctuation. We have attempted to follow Holt's styling, inserting or deleting punctuation only when we felt meaning and clarity would be best served.

We have closely coordinated all our suggested changes with the Domestic Intelligence Division. They have had occasion to see all such changes. The manuscript has also been read by Inspector William C. Sullivan of the Central Research Section.

On galley 72, next to last paragraph, line one, at the request of the Domestic Intelligence Division, we have deleted the word "respected" in referring to the "Jewish Daily Forward." In galley 73, second line from the top, the word "respected" has again been eliminated in referring to Jewish organizations. On the same galley, paragraph 5, we have deleted the name of George Sokolsky, identified there as "the American Jewish patriot." The Domestic Intelligence Division felt that to mention Sokolosky in this connection, and not any other patriotic American who also is fighting communism, would not be fair.

On galley 75, paragraph 3, we have deleted the words "The scholar" in describing Solomon M. Schwarz, economist and author whose material we used freely. Schwarz was chief of social insurance in Alexander Kerensky's provisional government in Russia just prior to Bolshevik revolution in 1917. Bufiles reflect he is a moderate socialist who believes that in the distant future, a socialist economic system will and should prevail in the United States. Associates describe him as a militant anti-Bolshevik.

FBI Chief Issues New Red Alert

By **ROGER STUART**,
World-Telegram Staff Writer.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 25.—Is there still a "clear and present danger" in the machinations of Communists here in the United States?

J. Edgar Hoover says emphatically there is. And the chief G-man, who knows better than anyone the insidious ramifications of Communist subversion, lays bare the complex tale of this plague in "Masters of Deceit," scheduled for publication in 1958.

Twenty years ago, the director of the Federal Bureau of Investigation wrote his first book. Called "Persons in Hiding," it told how the FBI had smashed notorious gangs and rounded up innumerable "public enemies" of that strangely lawless era between two world wars.

Second Book Due.

Now his byline is to appear on a second volume. Both Mr. Hoover and the FBI, whose skillful operations he has supervised for nearly 34 years, have grown enormously in prestige during the two-decade interval since the first book was written.

But of greater significance is the altered world which will greet his new volume. Indeed, it's in consequence of gravely menacing developments, together with the inescapable challenge thereby posed to the free world, that the FBI director's book has been planned.

"It is unfortunate but true," he warned only the other day, "that the propaganda machine of the Communist party has lulled large segments of our

people into a false sense of security. It has worked day and night to spread the illusion that it has declared its independence of Moscow. The Communist party remains the tool of a foreign power, fanatically dedicated to Godless communism."

Highly Disciplined.

Even while the party in this country seeks to spread the notion that factionalism is rife within it, according to Mr. Hoover, the truth is that it's a highly disciplined organization, currently consolidating its position under new leadership, which is "more stern and undeviating in its Soviet loyalty."

Aware of new Communist efforts to infiltrate areas heretofore untouched—plus intensification of propaganda campaigns among industrial workers, teen-agers, church groups, and civic organizations—the G-men are "ready to

shoulder added burdens," their boss says.

But that, he holds, isn't enough. There are limits to the resources of law-enforcement agencies. Without additional public support, the goal of security for the nation easily could fall short of achievement.

An Aroused Public.

Only an aroused public, cognizant alike of the danger and of the problems involved in meeting it, can assure essential corrective action.

Mr. Hoover's urgent desire is for American citizens to understand—and profit by—such stern truths as these:

- Communism is a scourge that has neither weakened nor changed its philosophy; it is as hypocritical as ever, as devoted to destroying the American concept of freedom as ever.

- At this instant, Communists are endeavoring to sow division and disunity among U.S. citizens, to pit race against race, group against group.

Espionage Continues.

- Soviet-directed espionage aimed at securing our military, scientific and industrial secrets continues unabated.

- The subversive movement always has presented a far more deadly menace than the CP membership figure would indicate—and it is still so.

Equally concerned, meanwhile, with "the worst wave of lawlessness ever" to confront this nation—particularly its "shameful, expanding juvenile crime picture"—Mr. Hoover has very definite views to

share with his countrymen on this subject. Among them:

- The present situation, to a considerable extent, has resulted from the "shallow thinking" of too many Americans who, in the late 1940s "felt our growing crime problem was merely a dying manifestation of the moral let-down" after World World II.



On page VII, pursuant to the suggestion of the Domestic Intelligence Division, we have added a brief paragraph urging that members of the Communist Party should read the book. It was felt that this would be of value and also connect with our chapter in the text on why communists break with the Party.

It is noticed that the foreword is not dated. Although the text has been written to make it as independent as possible of the time element, it is felt that a "cut off" date of 1957 would be advisable. This would show the reader that events occurring after that date obviously were not considered. Moreover, the date of 1957 would lend itself better to our discussion of many events than the publication date of 1958. Accordingly, (page VIII) we have added "December, 1957."

The Domestic Intelligence Division has read the galley proofs as well as seen all of our suggested changes. Likewise, Inspector William C. Sullivan has read the proofs.

SUBJECT: MASTERS OF DECEIT

Mr. [redacted] of the manufacturing department of Henry Holt and Company called at my office this afternoon. He brought page proofs of the book. He hopes to release the book on March 10, 1958, which means that the book should be printed and bound by the middle of February allowing roughly four weeks for copies to be sent to book distributors throughout the country. We will now read the page proofs of the book which Mr. [redacted] brought with him. We discussed a schedule whereby we will return the page proofs to him by January 7, 1958. We will then proceed to preparing the index and will plan to have a manuscript copy to him by January 13. Within a week he hopes to have page proofs of the index for us to check.

[redacted] indicated that the page proofs, after they are returned to him, will be set up as plate proofs. He said that we were free to see these if we so desire but that it would mean postponing publication date for roughly a week or until March 17. In the Whitehead book we reviewed two sets of proofs namely the galley proofs and the plate proofs. In this book we have three stages of review, galley proofs, page proofs and plate proofs. I frankly do not see why we need to review the plate proofs in this instance, and unless advised to the contrary, we will not ask to see them.

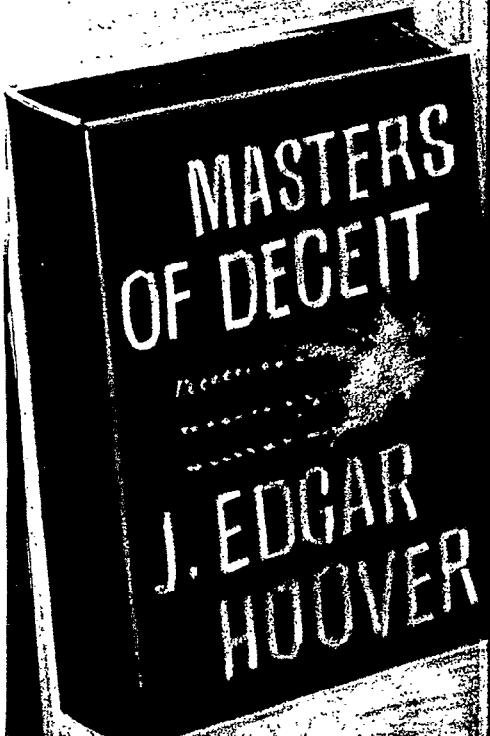

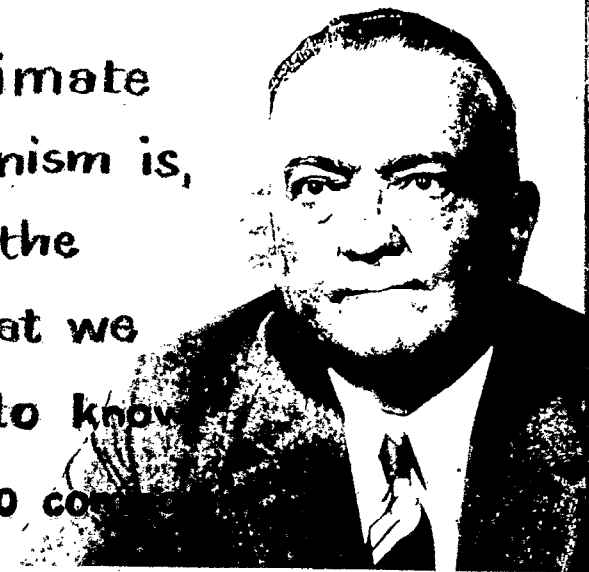

On January 3, 1958, Mr. Edgar T. Rigg of Henry Holt and Company, Inc., called Mr. Tolson and advised he had placed in the mail a letter containing proposed phraseology for use in an advertisement for Publishers' Weekly dealing with captioned book. *[Signature]*

Mr. Rigg desired that the Bureau look the phraseology over and clear it with him on Monday, January 6, 1958.

The material has arrived and has been reviewed. The advertisement will appear in the February 3, 1958, issue of Publishers' Weekly and indicates 60,000 copies of this book will be printed with \$25,000 allocated for initial advertising.

The general advertisement appears satisfactory. Included will be the contents of the book. It is noted that in the contents under Chapter 4, the dates 1919-21 have been omitted in the proposed advertisement. It is suggested that the full title of this chapter should be included and read as follows: How U. S. Communism Began, 1919-21. It is also noted that definite articles have not been initially capitalized in the proposed advertisement, and in Chapter 22, the word "you" is underlined. It is not felt that these minor variations are pertinent.

RECOMMENDATION: *I see no need for change*

That Mr. Rigg be telephonically contacted and advised that the proposed phraseology in the advertisement is satisfactory but that it is suggested the full title of Chapter 4, including the dates 1919-21, be utilized.

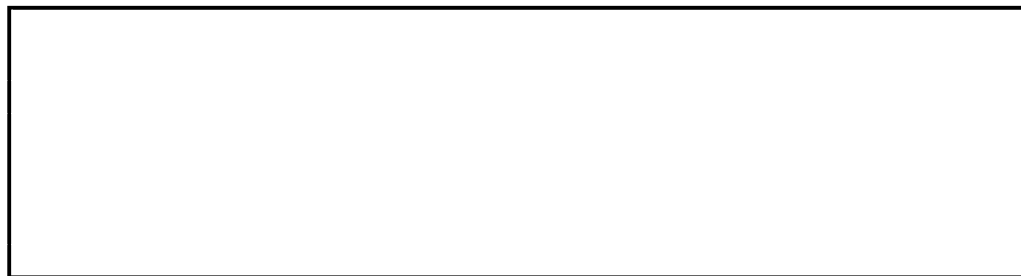

We have completed the compilation of the material for the index. As you remember, the Henry Holt representative advised us that we could have a maximum of 770 lines (for a total index of eight pages). This meant we had to be very selective in our choice of material. Moreover, to make the index as valuable as possible we have indexed key communist terms, such as "democratic centralism," and also used cross references.

We have prepared the index in the manner suggested by Henry Holt; that is, placing our material in a four-inch column (which would be equivalent to one line of printed index). We now have a total of roughly 750 lines (allowing for space between the letters of the alphabet), or just about the allowable maximum. However, since we do not know exactly how our printed lines will measure to the printed version, we have marked a number of items with red pencil, indicating that, if cutting is needed, these can be deleted. This suggestion was made by Henry Holt. (The appropriate instructions have been marked on the manuscript copy). This gives us complete control over the final version.

RECOMMENDATION:

Mr. Edgar T. ~~Rigg~~, of Henry Holt & Company, called. He is sending in a letter today a proposed advertisement layout for use in book sections of larger papers throughout the country for our approval. He indicated we could use the same theme if we like it in any law enforcement magazines which might use material pertaining to the book. I told him that I thought a simple and straightforward announcement would be suitable for such magazines as the IACP publication, etc.

Mr. Rigg stated that he let his own people think over the matter of the first printing order. He was quite pleased that all of them thought the original order should be increased to 75,000 copies.

Mr. Rigg stated that Brownie ~~Reid~~, of the New York Herald Tribune, called him and was quite upset that he did not get the syndication rights for the book. Mr. Rigg explained to him that in the light of Mr. Reid's statement that the book should be amplified by statements from Mr. Hoover with respect to Soviet espionage activities he, Rigg, decided not to go along with the Herald Tribune plan and that he, Rigg, accepted full responsibility for the decision to arrange for the syndication of the book through King Features.

With respect to photographs for use in the newspaper syndication, Mr. Rigg stated that King Features did not have any special ideas along this line except the possibility of some informal shots of Mr. Hoover. I am trying to ascertain whether we have any such photographs which could be forwarded to Mr. Rigg for King Features' use or whether we could refer them to pictures which may have been taken by outside concerns which could be secured by King Features.

In my last conversation with you, I had been under the impression that you would call Ed direct and, equally, he indicated that he would call me before a final decision had been made. Mayhap it is a fait accompli at this point, but I had hoped we would have the opportunity to discuss the matter further before any decision was taken.

Mr. Rigg said that he had talked with Clyde Tolson and that Mr. Tolson had indicated on your behalf that you did not favor the possible consideration of adding supplemental material to the book for various reasons, including national security.

Whatever happens on this particular book and the syndication, I would certainly suggest that something positive be said about current Soviet espionage to counteract a growing complacency toward the Soviet conspiracy in this country. It had seemed to me at the time we talked that it might be logical for you in this book to do so.

Perhaps at a later date, you would be willing to work with the Herald Tribune on something in this area. While I have great admiration for [redacted] and Hearst in general, I feel it is not unimportant for material of this kind to reach a certain audience which, for one reason or another, may not always read the Hearst papers.



Mr. McGuire of my office is intimately acquainted with Mr. Burke Walsh, editor of the NCWC News Service, and has advised me that Mr. Walsh has been most friendly to the Bureau down through the years and has from time to time rendered specific complimentary service to the Bureau. The NCWC News Service through its teletype and mailing news facilities covers almost 1,000 various Catholic publications in the United States, as well as magazines and journals in numerous other countries. Mr. McGuire suggests that he personally see Walsh and give him the attached outline of the Director's book and that consideration also be given to having Walsh arrange for the book, when it does come out, to be reviewed so that the Book Review Section of the NCWC News Service can have an additional book review of "Masters of Deceit" to offer through their facilities.
