





Dear Clyde:

Back on May 26th you wrote Ed Rigg a letter in which you said that your representative in Tokyo had advised that one Leon Picon, Chief, Publications Section, United States Information Service, American Embassy, Tokyo, had indicated that he hoped his office would be able to subsidize publication of a Japanese version of MASTERS OF DECEIT through a reputable publisher. We have not heard further from this quarter, but we have been pressed by another gentleman mentioned in your letter of that same date, namely, Dr. Gunji Hosono, Chairman of the Board of Directors, Japan Institute of Foreign Affairs in Tokyo. He is pressing for a decision as to whether or not we will permit them to make an offer and proceed, should the offer be acceptable, with the publication of MASTERS OF DECEIT in Japan. It would seem to me that any translation they might make would be subject to the approval of Mr. Hoover.

It would be greatly appreciated if you would advise us as to whether we could proceed as to obtaining an offer from the Japan Institute of Foreign Affairs and then deciding whether or not we shall proceed with a contract to permit them to publish in Japan. From a monetary standpoint it is not going to amount to a great deal, I can tell you C-93 62-104277-892 that right now.



Dear Mr. Hoover:

May I express my great admiration of your book, "Masters of Deceit"? It has given me a wealth of material concerning the Communistic system and I hope that, as a citizen, I may make an intelligent use of the same.

I am currently enrolled in a Di**s**cussion Group at $_{\cdot}$ the University of California which is affording an opportunity to discuss "World Politics". But even before reading your book, I became distressed at the trend of this course. I was encouraged by your statement that no information is too trivial to bring to the attention of the FBI, provided care is shown not to damn liberal thinking when it is valid and sincere. So I discussed this course with your people in San Francisco, and received what I consider good advice. $\ I$ was told that there are literally hundreds of courses such as those sponsored by the American Foundation for Political Education on our country's campuses. And, said your man in San Francisco, if I was concerned about this particular group and its bias "This is a Discussion Group so get in there and discuss".

However Lales have written I shall surely do so. the enclosed letter to the American Foundation for Political Education, and sent are deligated the U.S. Treasury Department (for reasons explained therein). I thought you might also find this letter interesting. In all other respects I shall act with the pradence suggested by your San Francisco office. 





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Catholics oppose public schools?

No! But we conduct our own because we want something extra-God and religion

REV. JOHN A. O'BRIEN

Twelfth in a series of articles answering the 20 questions most frequently asked about the Catholic Church.

CATHOLICS do not oppose

ATHOLICS do not oppose the public school.
About one half of the Catholic children attending elementary schools are in public schools, while a much larger percentage are enrolled in public high schools, colleges and universities. Catholics appreciate and admire the splendid work those schools are doing, making our system of free public education from the kindergarten through the university one of the glories of America. In common with glories of America. In common with citizens of all faiths, however, Catholics believe that the ideal system of education is one wherein religion is included so that the young learn about God, their duties to Him as well as to their neighbor. Religion thus provides the basis for effective moral training and the development

It supplies the best incentives for the building of a strong and no-ble character and for the living of a virtuous life. It puts teeth into the moral law and renders it functional, while so-called ethical cul-ture amounts to little more than pretty rhetoric. God and religion constitute the only enduring basis of morality and character.

This is the improtant truth which George Washington, the Fa-ther of our country, uttered in his famous Farewell Address: a truth he wanted to be kept forever be-fore the eyes of his countrymen. "Reason and experience," he said, "both forbid us to expect that national morality can prevail in exclusion of religious principle."

Mirroring the thought of the founding fathers, the first schools and colleges stressed religion and built their curricula around it. For built their curricula around it. For more than 200 years all the colonial schools were church schools, and many of them, particularly in the Spanish and French settlements, were Catholic schools. The present system of tax-supported public schools dates only from 1850. Hence stations dates only from 1000, finite it is simply one of the many systems sanctioned alike by tradition, the constitution and the American concept of freedom of education,

IKE the other church-related schools, the Catholic school is Amercan; its ideals are American, its ideals are Americans; its ideals are American. Because it inculcates patriotism not

merely as a sentiment but, as a religious duty, it is a nursery of the highest type of devotion to country. It is a bulwark of American democracy in which the highest ideals of good citizenship, of social justice, of racial equality, and of friendliness to those of every faith and race are ceaselessly stressed. It is a school in which the children are taught to esteem and love their Protestant and Jewish neighbors, to respect their rights, and to defend with their lives the constitutional rights and privileges of their fellow citizens of all creeds.

Leaders of all faiths are dis-

Leaders of all faiths are dis-Leaders of all faiths are disturbed by the fact that the millions of pupils in our public schools are receiving no education in religion. In an article, "Our Crop of Religious Illiterates" in The Christian Mentury, the Rev. Dr. Harry E. Fosdick, a leading voice in American Protestantism, declares: "In our public schools the pupil comes into contact with every major so-cial interest — save one. With scru-pulous regard for sectarian neutrality, we have excluded all instruc-tion in religion from general edu-cation. Religion is thus discounted in the eyes of youth. It does not seem important. As a result, recent generations of American youth have grown up ignorant of religion and indifferent to it."

A way must be found, he con-cludes, to incorporate the teaching of religion in the public school system if we are to reverse the downward trend of religious illiteracy and of respect for religion itself. One thing is sure: religion and morality cannot remain positive forces in America if we continue to allow our children to grow up in religious illiteracy.

THE formulators of our penal laws, the judges, the district attorneys, the wardens and guards of our prisons and houses of detention, the probation officers, the psychiatrists and the general public, would learn a great deal if they could listen, unnoticed, to the conversations between prisoners "in stir."

While the expression "in stir" specifications and the strength of the str

oners "in stir."

While the expression "in stir" specifically refers to our state and federal penitentiaries, it can also be used to describe local jails and houses of detention. There, the population usually consists of three classes of wrong-doers: those who are awaiting trial; those who are awaiting sentence after trial; and those who are serving slight sentences for misdemeanors.

In New York City, the jurisdiction of the Children's Court extends over youthful offenders up to 15 years of age. Those be-

offenders up to 15 years of age. Those be-tween 16 and 19 years of age, are amen-able to the Adolescents' Court. For the sake of these two age groups, I have visited houses of detention. Sometimes; the purpose is purely spiritual. Sometimes it is mixed, including a desire to arrive at the truth in a case, so that the youthful offender may not be damaged by too preemptory or too severe action on the part of the court. Generally speaking, a first offender is given

every possible consideration in the Children's Court, the Adolescents' Court and even the County Court.

Sometimes, however, the consideration reaches the ridiculous. On one occasion, I heard a judge sentence a self-confessed rapiets to "probation in the custody of his parents," the same locale he was inhabiting at the time he committed the crime. Most times, the handling of juvenile and adolescent cases evinces a laudable & delicate balancing of justice and mercy.

FOR many centuries, houses of detention used to imitate the bastille type of architecture. Only in recent years, have penologists and public spirited citizens been able to convince the government and the people that a house of detention is funda-mentally a place to detain prisoners and not, except in the case of those convicted of

not, except in the case of those convicted of misdemeanors, a place to punish them.

In certain sections of our country, newly erected houses of detention have gotten rid of prison smells and prison cruelties, without sacrificing prison discipline. One "stir" I know of, is the latest word in modern architecture and prison comfort. It sweeps unward like a swaphony of also and steel architecture and prison comfort. It sweeps upward, like a sympiony of glass and steel, towards the sky. Its chapel and recreation rooms are large and airy. Its cells, one to a detainee, are clean and livable, if not entirely inviting. Pastel colors have replaced the old and depressing grays. But, as one adolescent assured me, I"it makes no difference how they are painted; they're still hors."

no difference how they are painted; tney re still bars."

What do the enforced inhabitants do, while awaiting trial or sentence? Unfortunately, they do nothing. They just wait. They are not gainfully employed. They eat in an attractive mess hall. They are locked up around sunset or shortly thereafter. They are let out of their (Continued on page 15)

In memoriam: Nagasaki-August 8, 1945

It was August 8, 1945, when the Abomb wiped out Nagasaki, the largest Catholic colony in Japan. Many of the people were gathered in their beautiful Church of the Immaculate Conception, the biggest Catholic abunch in the Fer Free biggest Catholic church in the Far East, serving a congregation of 12,000 people, most of them descendants of the people converted by St. Francis Xavier. About 8,000 of them were killed that day. Those

vere killed that day. Those taking refuge in the church were crushed with their pastor, Father Nishida, as the building collapsed about them.

It has become clear with the passing years that the use of the bomb was completely unnecessary. Japan was down and out and suing for peace long before Hiroshima and Nagasaki.

By the end of 1944, the Emperor of Japan had asked the Holy See to in-

the Emperor of Japan had asked the Holy See to inservene on his behalf and prepare for formal peace negotiations with the United States, the Holy Father himself to act as intermediary. Also involved were Cardinal Fumisoni Biondi, head of the Sacred Congregation for the Propagation of the Faith (which also serves as the Vatican! information service), Archbishop Pietro Tatsuo Doi of Tokyo, two of the Cardinal's representatives in Tokyo, and members of the Office of Strategic Services working in Italy on contacts developed through the Vatican.

Rear-Admiral Ellis M. Zacharias of

Rear-Admiral Ellis M. Zacharias of the United States told the story a few years ago in Look:

years ago in Look:

"Unfortunately," he wrote, "nobody outside the Navy Department and the O.S.S. seemed to take the opportunity seriously. In fact, the State Department told the O.S.S. to discontinue its efforts, since American public opinion 'might never approve of a peace negotiation with the help of the Roman Catholic Church."

In January and February of 1945, the In January and February of 1945, the Japanese Government once again put out peace "feelers." Two days before President Rossevelt left for Yalta, General Douglas MacArthur had put in his hands Japanese peace overtures practically the same as those finally accepted in August. MacArthur urged the President to start negotiations immediately and warned against letting Russia in on the Far Eastern War.

Mr. Rossevelt discarded General MacArthur urges the President of General MacArthur urges the President of General MacArthur urges and MacArthur u

Mr. Roosevelt discarded General Mac-Arthur's information and advice with the remark that "MacArthur is our greatest general and our poorest politician."

So the President himself went to Yalta So the President himself went to Yalta and made those concessions to Stalin which have since made Russia the greatest power in the Far East and played a vital role in the emergence of Communist China. The war against Japan, which he now knew to be needless, was allowed to drag its costly and bloody way through all the slaughter of Iwo Jima and Okinawa, lasting for another six months.

HOW do we know these things? The eminent historian Harry Elmer Barnes tells the story in a recent issue of National Re-

"It so happens," he says, "that Mac-"It so happens," he says, "that Mac-Arthur's document passed over the desk of a high-ranking military officer in Washington who was greatly disturbed at what he feared might happen at Yalta. He wished to get MacArthur's communication on record so it could not be destroyed by Mr. Roosevelt or his associates or hidden away from the public for many years as 'top secret' material.

secret' material.

"Hence, he called in his friend, Walter Trohan of the Chicago Tribune, and suggested that Trohan make an exact copy of the Japanese overtures. But he first bound Trohan to absolute secrecy and confidence until the end of the war. Trohan kept his promise, but on the Sunday after V-J Day (August 19, 1945) Trohan published the material in full in the Chicago Tribune and the Washington Times-Herald. Despite the very timely and separational nature of the very timely and sensational nature of the Trohan article, no prominent newspapers, so far as I know, noticed or published it either then or at any time since.

"The authenticity of the Trohan article

was never challenged by the White House or the State Department, and for very good reason. After General MacArthur returned from Korea in 1951, his neighbor in the Waldorf Towers, former President Herbert Hoover, took the Trohan article to General MacArthur and the latter confirmed its accuracy in every detail and without qualification."

qualification."

It defies explanation why President Roosevelt, knowing that Japan had been "licked" since late 1944, nevertheless invited, and even bribed Stalin to get into the Far Eastern War and scoop up the spoils for the Kremlin, As we know, Russia did not declare war until August 8, two days after Hiroshima and the day that Nagasaki was wined out.

Nagasaki was wiped out.

And when former President Truman comes out and says, as he did this spring, that "I think the sacrifice of Hiroshima and

that "I think the sacrifice of Hiroshima and Nagasaki was urgent and necessary for the prospective welfare of both Japan and Allies" — one wonders if he is being cynical or just covering a colossal blunder.

Harry Elmer Barnes has the personal testimony of "an American public figure of the greatest eminence and with perhaps the best reputation for unquestionable probity of any leading American statesman since George Washington himself, to the effect that Mr. Truman knew all about the situation by early May, 1945, and admitted that further fighting, to say nothing of atomic bombing, was quite unnecessary to win the war and bring an early peace.

"This distinguished public figure told

"This distinguished public figure told me personally," says Barnes, "in the presence of a prominent witness, that, having learned the above facts and being shocked by the continuance of needless bloodshed in the Pacific, he went to have a talk with

in the Pacific, he went to have a talk with President Truman. The latter assured him that he was well acquainted with the facts about the Japanese desire for peace, the lack of any need for further military activity, and the good prospect for an immediate negotiated peace.

"But he went on to say that he was new on the job and did not feel equal to the formidable task of interferring personally to check the persistent bellicosity of Stimson and the Pentagon hierarchy, who were determined to carry on to the bitter end—as we now know until they were ready to try out their new military 'toy,' the atom bomb.

"The bomb was the 'pet' project of

'toy,' the atom bomb.

"The bomb was the 'pet' project of Stimson, who had been given general authority over its development. Truman did nothing to arrange an armistice and negotiate, but, finally, months later when Japan had virtually collapsed, approved the bombing of Hiroshima and Nagasaki."

But was it not perhaps the Bomb that actually ended the war and forced the Japanese to surrender? This is apparently what Mr. Truman meant in saying that he ordered the bombing of Hiroshima and Nagasaki "for the prospective welfare of both Japan and the Allies."

It was not, says Barnes, And he quotes the United States Strategic Bombing Survey to prove it. As early as 1946, the Survey stated that "The Hiroshima and Nagasaki bombs did not defeat Japan, not by the testimony of the enemy leaders who by the testimony of the enemy leaders who

Nagasaki bombs-did not defeat Japan, not-by the testimony of the enemy leaders who ended the war did they persuade Japan to-accept unconditional surrender. Japan would have surrendered even if the atomic bombs had not been dropped, even if Rus-sia had not entered the war, and even if no invasion had been planned or contem-plated."



Mr. Truman's final defense of the bombing was the Japanese provocation at Pearl Harbor, where it now appears according to the most benign possible interpreta-

Pearl Harbor, where it now appears according to the most benign possible interpretation, according to Dr. Barnes, that "President Roosevelt kicked Japan in the shins, handcuffed the United States, bared its back, and dared the Japanese to shoot."

Even so, making the Japanese record as black as possible, the Hiroshima City Council's reply to Mr. Truman is conclusive and unanswerable:

"Had your decision been based on the Imperial Japanese Navy's surprise attack on your, country's combatants and military tacilities, why could you not choose a military base for the larget? You committed the outrage of massacring 200,000 noncombatants as revenge, and you are still trying to justify it."


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

Oh, pineapplel It is a very fine fruit.' I do not understand why it is so mexpensive? It is a great delight to eat this yellow "American cabbage". I know my dear American reader, you will be very insulted, and i know the American Fruit company also will be very angry at me, because I called this wonderful fruit a cabbage.

You must believe my personal story about this "yellow cabbage".

Everybody know how the American Government, during the second World

War spent II billion dollars to help Soviet Russia. I remember quite

well, for at the time when the American newspaper publisher Willam

Randolph Hearst and his fellow correspondents visited Moscow and conferred

with Kruschev ,I was serving a twenty-five year sentence for espionage

against the Soviet Russia. Eight years of my life I spent as a

slave laborer in the infamous concentration camp known as Abez.

Abez, the name of the small village in Komi Accr was only 100 miles from the North Sea. Abez was a small slave labor camp, not as large as other Russian camps such as Vorkuta, salajka, Salajke, Narilsk; Kalima, Karaganda, Dubrov lg, Inta, Uhta, all notorious "health resorts". I'ts population consisted of eight thousand slave labor men and four thousand women prisoners. Our day's work was extremely hard and hazardous and the hours were long. We would work fourteen hours a day on the USA river, which flowed near the village. My job was to cut the ice on the river which was needed to freeze the reindeer meat. They had no refrigeration in Abez.

It was 5:00 A.M. the time: January, 1955. I left the third (3B) camp with 400 others prisoners. It was 41 degrees below zero. My eyes

69-10-1277-904 ENCLOSURE the Vahta (sentry box) and watched me with a smile on his face. He was listening to a Soviet song being played in the Vahta called "We are for Peace". Dear Reader I will tell you something. Captain Sokolov was a nice man! He did not have headaches! His monthly salary was 6000 rubles but very often he got more. Every years he proved himself a detoted son of the mighty communist party, by freezing 200 to 300 slave laborers in the red USA river. Besides the money he got the highest medal the "social hero" from the Soviet government.

Abez was two miles from the USA river, and as we marched we were accompanied by Vologocky sobdiers, armed with rifle and tommygun and I worked a good two or three hours and twenty yap of Siberian dogs. I did not hear the voice of a young Vologocky soldiers around when I felt someone touch my sholdier. I wiped the icy particles The young soldier held his vintovka (rifle) which clung to my face. in his left hand and slid his right hand to his pocket. Perhaps this Russian had a good heart and wanted to gi e me a little mahorka (cheap soviet tebacco). "Eto mye sovecky! (It is not soviet). You are a foreigner? Can you read it?" he said to me. He removed a small can from his pcket. Csto? (What?) I did not understand. Did the (NKVD) want to trick me? I had to be very careful I told myself. "Chitaj" (Read) he ordered. He handed my the can. My eyes ran slowly over the lettering. P. I. N. E. A. P. P. L. E!

No, no. It isn't true. It's impossible. I read it once more. PINEAPPLE. MADE IN THE UNITED STATES OF AMERICA.

But it was true. AMERICAN PINAPPLE!

"Chitaj!" he snapped. It was not a simple voice, it was the order from a Red soldier.

"What shall I do? Oh, my Jesus." If I tell himmit is an American fruit I am sure he will report it to a political officer. What would

happen to me? I am sure I would get 20 days in the camp jail, if I were to praise the American fruit. I made my choice. I was very hungrey. For fourteen hours work I received only a half pound of black bread and two servings of schi(Cabbage soup). I must lie I told myself. I looked to ards heaven and cried to my Lord: I am very, very hungry!

"Eto americanska kapusta!" (It is American cabbage) I replied to the Red solther.

"Americansca kapusta?"

"Da! Da!" (Yes, yes) Americanska kapusta."

I meant to keep the pineapple. It was not for you, I am the slave laborer and I have the prisoner's number on my back.

He looked bewildered for a few seconds and then laughed. My reader he laughed loudly, so loudly in fact that the Siberian dogs stopped barking. I felt as if I were the greatest actor and the great st liar in the world. I did not feel the cold when the Red soldier punched my shoulder and said I could have the American cabbage.

But he said "You understand?"

"Ponyimaju! Ponyimaju!" (I understand, I understand) I told him.

I meant: Go to Hell and let me have this PINEAPPLE.

"Nyichorta Ti nyeponyimajes!" (You don't understand, devil!) he shouted angrily.

What is the matter With him? Did he want to trick me? Did he want the pineapple back? The Soviets promised too much but gave little.

He continued "You can not understand, because you are the friend of Americancapitalists and imperialists. Therfore you got a twenty-five year sentence in a slave labor camp!"

My dear reader he was right. For I was a friend of capitalist America. He spoke to me as a big Soviet state man. Who knows? Perhaps he will be a great general in Soviet Russia. There anything can happen.

I read from his fact the program of the true communist party.

"This can of American cabbage is evidence that the American imperialists wanted to cheat our mother land. Stalin and our communist government was very clever in 1945 when they refused to pay the American captalists the eleven billion dollars. We have enough cabbage. You know yourselve that Soviet Russia is the richest country in the world. Ponyimaju?" And now he was the happiest man in the world. When he left I could hear him muttering, "Americanska kapusta!"

I put my pineapple under the heavy saw I used to cut the ice.

It was only a few seconds before I opened the can. It was not frozen but soft and very, very sweet! I finished half of it's contents and handed the rest over to my slave labor friends.

"Sweets! Sweets! Where did you get it?" they asked.

I swear I did not hear the happy voices of my friends. I took off the gloves from my hands and grabbed the can with half frozen fingers. I did not feel the pain; I did not see the blood when the can cut my fingers.

MY DEAR READER! I HAD BEEN IN AMERICA ON THE RED USA RIVER!

He was very complimentary in his introductory remarks in the opening paragraph of his letter, but his criticism of Chapter 22, regarding "What can you do?" by stating that the Director limits his advice to the singular "You" rather than the collective "You," is indicative of his shortsighted thinking. The phrase "You," which was used in this chapter's title as well as in the narrative, refers, of course, to the reader and is not intended to be confined to any one individual.

He also requested the Director's confidential opinion of his suggestion to defeat a communism, in effect, by severing diplomatic relations with the countries who do not have democratic principles of government. This, of course, is not the type of question that the Director would normally comment upon and is above and beyond the scope of communism as treated in "Masters
