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

- Letter from col. Arthur Slingesby to lord Percy; desires to remove his regiment to better quarters, there being no provision to be had at Hungerford; dissatisfaction from departure of the lieut.-col. with some of his men; Hungerford, 12 Jan. 1643.

This letter belongs to the Percy papers in MS. 395 supra, and has been accidentally misplaced in this volume.

2. Letter from [William] Alington [the third Irish and first English baron] to his brother Hildebrand, at lord Alington's house in Bloomsbury; is slowly recovering health; hopes his brother will marry, as neither he nor Argenton can, to preserve the family; great need of money; Nevers, 19 July, 1668. f. 3.

Seal of arms; a bend engrailed between six billets.

3. The same to the same, in Copenhagen with the ambassador, the earl of Essex; lord Chesterfield is married to the earl of Essex's niece; death of Henrietta Maria, duchess d'Orleans, which most believe was not natural; his brother Argenton has gone into the streights with a letter from the duke of York to sir T. Allen for his removal to VOL. II.

a better ship; again urges Hildebrand to marry, as he himself will never be married again; London, 25 June, 1670. f. 5.

Seal of arms. Lord Alington was married to a third wife in 1675.

4. The same to the same, with an account of the death of their brother, capt. Argenton Alington, in an engagement by two men-of-war the *Advice* and the *Guernsey*, convoying some merchant-men, with seven Algerine ships, on 3 July; Lond., 17 Aug. 1670. f. 6.

The handwriting of this letter, signed "Alington" is quite unlike that of the other letters signed "W. Alington"; and yet they are all certainly by the same writer.

Part of a familiar letter to a friend from lady Diana Verney (daughter of the duke of Bedford), just before her marriage to William lord Alington as his third wife; cares not what her brother Ned and some others say, for she has done a thing to please herself; it is very unkind of Mr. Edward to make such a jest of one she will have so near a relation to, and she hopes it will not come to lord Alington's ears; desires to have two or three good sermon-books, including Dr. Downam's sermon called Abraham's tryall (publ. in 1602); n. d. f. 18.
- 11. The same, as Di. Alington, to a brother, with gossip of the court, &c.; the King and Queen are now their neighbours at Newmarket; the King and the duchess of "Porchmouth" dined at Mr. "Geormons" [Henry Jermyn's at Chieveley] on Thursday, but he himself was not there, for as soon as he heard that the King and court were at Newmarket, he and his lady went to his house in Norfolk; Mrs. "Nelle [Gwynn] could not come this time to Newmarket, by reason her son, my lord Burford, is very ill of this new distemper"; 2 Oct. 1679. f. 20.
- 12. A. Cholmondeley [daughter of Anne St. John the second wife of Thomas Cholmondeley?] to "the hon. Mr. [Hildebrand?] Allington, att Petworth, to be left with the porter of Northumberland Gate, London"; remarks on gorgeous head-dresses of ladies who came to meet the duke [of Somerset], but he was away; 11 July, n. y. f. 22.
- 13. The same to the same (her cousin) "att Mr. Lyons in King Street, St. Jeames, London"; her mother, his [step-] aunt begs him to find a Frenchman to teach "Mr. Charles" the French language, he being too big to be under a maid; Feb. (as appears from the post-mark) 14, n. y. f. 24.

Charles was the eldest son of Thomas Cholmondeley, of Vale Royal, by his second wife.

14. The same to [the same? as] lord Alington at his lodgings in the Pall Mall, London, congratulating him on his accession to the title, and condoling

with him on the death of [his sister] lady Seymour; Dec. (as appears from the post-mark) 19, n. y. f. 25.

Hildebrand Alington succeeded to the Irish peerage in 1691.

15. Mesn[ard?], a French Protestant, to [Hildebrand] Alington, "gentilhomme Anglois au Lyon d'or, à Saumur"; a letter of compliment and of regrets for not seeing him, with notes of public news; mentions Alington's companion, the duke [of Somerset]; Paris, 14 Dec. 1680. Engl. f. 27.

The signature is partly effaced from having been formerly bound in at the back of the volume, but it is probably that of one of two brothers, Huguenot ministers, Jean or Philippe Mesnard.

- 16. William lord Alington to his brother Hildebrand, to the care of mons. Heuch, banker at Paris; has received his letter of 16 Nov. N. S., from Saumur; "your faire one is att present in noe good humour, her father [i. e. visc. Sir John Ernle married Elizabeth, widow of Charles, second lord Seymour of Troubridge, and sister of Hildebrand Alington.

A large volume rolled double in a vellum cover.

In the earlier part the charges are largely for maintenance of all concerned in discovery of the plots and the prosecutions of the plotters, including Oates, Dugdale, and Tong. Frequent rewards of £20 each are given for discovery and arrest of popish priests. The payments to the duchess of Portsmouth are generally at the rate of £17,000 per an., not, as said in J. Y. Akerman's preface to the printed copy (see infra) in one year £136,668 10s. For the passage of chaplains going to the colonies twenty pounds were allowed in each case. Repayment was made in 1682 to Henry Kelsey of £150 lent by him to the King in 1653; and in 1684 to John Irish of £100 for 1000 guilders lent by him to the King when Prince of Wales, 31 July, 1648.

Three sums of £100 each were given for relief of the poor in London and Stepney on account of the hard weather in the winter of 1683-4.

The payments to the Pendrell family are very numerous.

The whole account was printed for the Camden Society in 1851 from a copy, apparently made from this original schedule, which was then in the possession of W. S. Lowndes, esq., of Whaddon Hall, Bucks.

"The above was wrote by Dr. Wilson, a

physitian, one of the best judges of most kinds of antient and modern learning, authors, books, and the best editions of them, 1745, R. R."[awlinson]. The library was sold by auction in Jan. 1745.

The following inscriptions are preserved on pieces of an old torn vellum cover in which these fragments were formerly kept. "Fragments of old manuscripts," in Le Neve's handwriting. The short portions here contained are abridgments of the two last chapters of the fourth book of Durandus, or possibly passages from a different treatise upon which these are founded; with a concluding section having some verbal agreement with the final chapter of Durandus' eighth book, but more in sense than in words. E.g. "Feci diligenter ut potui, non sufficienter ut volui. Presertim cum ex officio tot causarum sim impeditus incursibus nexibus irretitus ut infra breve temporis spacium non" (desunt quædam). End. "Quia vero canonem misse particulatim exposui, ne quid additum vel subtractum seu transpositum videatur, ut legentibus ipsius expositionis levior pateat intellectus, continue totum censui sic scribendum."

Written by an early thirteenth century hand, contemporary with the author. There are verbal differences from the considerably later copy in Digby MS. 97, which is somewhat abridged.

Fol. 127 is a blank leaf, having this note in a seventeenth century hand, "In this book 136 folia," and the seven leaves from 128 to 134 are numbered as being the first seven in the volume referred to from which this blank leaf came.

61. Two leaves of a collection of receipts connected with the making of colours and spices, of about the end of the tenth century. ff. 135, 136.

Beg. "De ponderibus. Calculus est ciceris grana duo, et est quarta pars oboli." End. "Specierum et ponderum atque colorum sumpta ex phisicis probamenta finiunt. Amen. Θεου δοξιας."

Below, by the same hand, is this: "Compos voti factus sum qui cognoverim quae sint in structuris et aedificiis adservanda."

62. Two quarto leaves, of probably the beginning of the twelfth century, containing parts of chapters vi-viii. of the *Historia Lausiaca* of Palladius. ff. 137, 138.

Beg. "Inde descendens ostendit ei similes in inferis ibi viros, et ait, Isti sunt smaragdi."

End. "in eadem quidem cella sed in lectulis separatis...debemus.

63. One leaf of an eleventh century Bible, containing from ver. 27 ch. xxxii. to ver. 28 ch. xxxiv. of the book of Exodus. f. 139.

Ver. 5 of ch. xxxiii. is marked in red figures as beginning ch. "xvi," and ver. 27 of xxxiv. as beginning "xvii."

- 64. Two leaves from a thirteenth century MS. of the Digestum Novum juris civilis, with marginal glosses, containing lib. xxxix. tit. i. and lib. xliii. tit. xix. to lib. xliv. tit. ii. ff. 140, 141.
- 65. Small fragment on paper, fifteenth century, of a Latin grammar, containing some of the rules about formation of cases, with mnemonic verses. f. 142.

The following may be a clue to the treatise to which the fragment belongs: "Unde Doctrinale in IIIª de[clinatio]ne sic inquit,

Sempens iens cum prole sua formabit entis" [&c.].

66. Two paper leaves from a court-roll of the manor of Hemlington, [Norfolk] 12 Hen. VIII [1520]. ff. 142, 144.

Amongst the tenants are Robert Wellys, George Cubyte, William Doble, Clement Krapton, George Manne.

67. Ten quarto paper leaves, of the fifteenth century, containing part of an abridged Bestiarium moralizatum, beginning in the story of Jonah and the whale, and ending with the unicorn. ff. 145-153.

The second example, that of eagles, begins thus: "Ubi fuit corpus ibi congregabuntur aquile. Auctor istius libri aquilas vocat sanctos."

The last begins thus: "Natura unicornii est quod projicit post se stercora sua, eum canes sequuntur... Istud animal figurat potentes hujus seculi."

On f. 154 b is an extract from "Phaustus in tractatu suo de prudentia" on the sayings of various philosophers at the sepulchre of Alexander of Macedon.

- 68. Fragment of a declaration signed by apparently one "Cu(?)hecius" on admission to office as scribe or secretary of the papal archives in 1594. f. 155.
- 69. One leaf of a treatise, in questions and answers, on canonical laws, containing the end of a chapter about archbishops and the beginning of chapter "vii. De abbatibus et prioribus responsa"; fourteenth century. f. 156.

Ch. vii. begins, "Quando potest abbas vel prior dare licenciam monacho suo vel canonico suo intrandi religionem arcciorem? Dic quod tunc primo cum illam religionem invenerit, et paratus sit illum recipere." The treatise appears to be the work of a Cistercian. Hearne has written at the foot of the leaf, "A very good fragment, in which many things about abbats and priors. Abbats ought to be presbyters. From Mr. Bagford."

70. Two leaves from a twelfth century copy of St. Augustine's Commentary on the Psalms, containing the end of the exposition on Ps. cxxix, and the beginning of that on Ps. cxxx. ff. 157, 158.

Noted in Tho. Rawlinson's hand, "For Mr. Hearne," and by Hearne, "an excellent fragment of an exposition on the Psalms, from Tho. Rawlinson, esq."

- 71. One leaf from a thirteenth century commentary upon the *Digestum Novum*, containing some of the *tituli* in lib. xlvii; e.g. "de abigeis," "de crimine expilatæ hereditatis," "de crimine stellionatus." f. 150.
- 72. One leaf from an early fourteenth century MS. of the *Digestum Vetus*, containing part of tit. vi. lib. iv, with the glosses of Accursius. f. 160.
- 73. Two leaves from an early fourteenth century MS. of a very full concordance, or index, to the Bible, extending from the word canens to carmina. ff. 161-2.
- 74. One leaf from the presentments at a court-leet of the manor of Ormesby, Norfolk, in the time of Edw. III, containing very many cases of hamsok. f. 163.

An old endorsement mentions various courtleets of the reign of Edw. I as being "rollid togeder."

- 75. Small fragment of what appears to be a certificate of matriculation issued by the rector of grammar schools in a French university (probably Paris), licensing a bookseller ("librarius"), for which a fee of "dix sols" was paid; 17—, 1414. f. 164.
- 76. One leaf from an early fourteenth century copy of the book of the prophecies of B. Hildegard called Liber Pentacronon, compiled by Gebeno, prior of Eberbach, containing from sect. xii. part ii. to the end of that part. f. 165.

A copy of the book exists in Digby MS. 32, and this leaf extends from f. 63 b of that vol. to f. 66. It exhibits, however, many verbal diferences; e.g. where the Digby MS. at the beginning of § xvii. has, "Nunc enim sunt tempora quasi in oblivione Dei et lassa in certamine Christi, sed fama volat in mendaciis per vicissitudinem vanitatum, quasi Deum videant, sed tamen nesciunt eum," this leaf has, "Nunc enim sunt tempora que in oblivione Dei et lassa in certitudine Christi, si fama volat in mendaciis per vicis-

situdinem vanitatum, que Deum videant sed tamen nesciunt eum." There are also lines giving references at the beginning or end of sections which are omitted in the Digby MS.; e.g. at the end of xvi, "R. [qu. rubrica?] Ex epistola ipsius ad Eugenium papam quando Treverense celebravit consilium"; at the end of xvii, "R. Quando magnum scisma futurum sit, de quadam epistola virginis."

This leaf was formerly the cover of 8° C. 707. Linc.

- 77. A very small fourteenth century slip cut from a treatise on canon law, and noted by Hearne, "about benefices." f. 166.
- 78. Small slip from a fourteenth century treatise on canon law, about marriage. *ibid*.

 Noted by Hearne "De nuptiis."
- 79. Small slip cut from an early thirteenth century MS., containing on one side part of Bede's comment (found also in Rabanus Maurus) on Gen. xlix. 17, and on the other a comment on Ps. xiii. 3, both passages dealing with "Serpents," as Hearne has noted. ibid.
- 80. Confirmation by Constantius Patritius, prothonotary apostolic, etc., and "Montis viani secundæ erectionis prorector," of a resignation (as it seems), "sub annuo reditu scutorum quinque," by Alexander Nereus to the chaplains of the late Pope Innocent IV in St. Peter's, of his right which he held for life conjointly with them as "creditores montis Viani in locis novem," by grant from Nicolaus Enriquez de Errera; 14 August, 1617. f. 167.

"Regta lib. 2 fol. 113."

- 81. Slightly mutilated copy of a printed broadside giving a summary of the privileges with regard to confessions and indulgences granted to the Great Hospital at Compostella. f. 168.
- Printed [at Lyons, by Jacques Sacon] in 1503.

 82. A leaf of vellum containing the following list of contents in a MS. in which it formed a fly-leaf, written by a late fifteenth century owner:—

"Attinet iste liber dominum ad cognomine Medley,

Dicitur Edwardus, scire quicunque ferat. Et continentur in hoc volumine septem libri: Speculum de confescione.

Ars bene moriendi.

Speculum humane vite, in duobus libris.

Speculum conversionis peccatorum.

Speculum ecclesie.

Liber elevacionis mentis ad Deum." f. 169.

Mr. Madan has noted that the same owner has written a similar inscription in the book numbered 8vo O 4, Art. Libellus sophistarum ad usum Oxon, printed in 1512.

This leaf was formerly used as a wrapper for a portion of Rawl. MS. G. 85, which was formerly numbered C. 945.

- A collection of fragments from various ecclesiastical service-books.
- 1. One leaf from a Collectarium of the end of the twelfth century, in 8vo, containing the capitula and collects for the Nativity and Assumption of B. M. V. and the Nativity of SS. Peter and Paul. f. 1.
- 2. Two leaves in folio from a Breviary of English use, containing the collects and gospels and petitions "in letania majore" for the week of the fifth Sunday after Easter and the feast of St. James, and for the vigil and day of Pentecost, to the beginning of the sequence; eleventh century. ff. 2, 3.
- One leaf in folio of an early thirteenth or late twelfth century Lectionary, containing lections iii-ix, apparently for the Epiphany, on the prophecy of Balaam and the witness of John Baptist. f. 4.

These lections are not found in the Sarum, York, or Roman uses.

The first page has the name of "John Boughe" scribbled on it. The second page has this note by Hearne: "Fragmentum de stella magos dirigente, ut de Balaami asina, &c."

5. Two fragments from a late thirteenth century Psalter, in double columns, containing parts of Pss. xxx, xxxi, and xxxiv, xxxv. ff. 6, 7.

The following memorandum is scribbled on the second leaf: "Resayvyd for fylds for 11 yerys, Item of Mr. Wylliam Knyvet xj, of John Botty xiijd, of John Galard iijd, of Peter Martyn xxijd, John Agar, iiijd."

- 6. Two leaves, in double columns, from a fourteenth century Sarum Breviary, containing lections iii—viii for the day of a confessor and abbot "de communi," with responsories and their music, and the common for many confessors and for a virgin and martyr, with music; fol. ff. 8, 9.
- 7. Two leaves in double columns, from a fourteenth century Lectionary, containing lections v-ix for the day of St. Machutus and i-viii for that of St. Edmund, archbp.; fol. ff. 10, 11.

Sarum Legendæ, ut supra, xv Nov.

8. One leaf from the commencement of a Missal, containing the *Benedictio aquæ et panis*; fourteenth century; fol. f. 12.

A versicle for Easter-tide, "Vidi aquam egredientem de templo," &c. is given, which is not in the printed Sarum Missals.

- 9. One leaf from a Psalter of the fourteenth century, containing Pss. xv-xvii for Sunday, with the antiphons and their music; fol. f. 13.
- 10. Fragment of a leaf from a Litany "pro defunctis," with the invocations of saints; double columns, early thirteenth century; fol. f. 14.

SS. Columbanus, Columba and Macharius are included, and S. Thomas is interlined.

11: One column from another folio Litany, for general use, of the thirteenth century. f. 15.

SS. Dunstan, Cuthbert, Edmund, Neot, Etheldreda, Mildreda and Osyda are included.

12. Two leaves from a quarto Breviary of the end of the twelfth century, containing offices in Sept. for Exaltation of the H. Cross, Oct. of Nat. of B. V. M., SS. Nichomedis, Eufemia, Lucian and Germinian, Matthew, Cosmas and Damian, and Michael. ff. 16, 17.

These offices do not agree with those in any printed English uses nor in that of Aberdeen, nor in the Roman. They most nearly correspond to Hereford. For the Exaltation of the Cross the sixth lection begins "Tandem pulsatus Dominus lacrimis Christianorum," the Gospel is "Non est arbor bona quæ facit fructus malos," and it is followed by a homily of Bede beginning "Juxta principalem." The office for St. Michael's day corresponds more nearly to the Hereford use than any other; but while the first three lections are the same, the fourth, fifth and sixth begin respectively, "Cherubin vero esse," "Qui rursus ad Colosenses," and "Cum ergo illis quatuor."

- 13. Half of a folio leaf from, as it seems, an Antiphonary, having "In dedicatione ecclesie ad missam officium," with the musical notes; fourteenth century. f. 18.
- 14. Two small folio leaves from a Sarum Evangeliary, containing the gospels from St. John for Sunday, Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday in Passion week; fourteenth century. ff. 19, 20.
- 15. Two folio leaves from the Breviary offices for Whit-Sunday and Trinity Sunday containing the hymn "Beata nobis gaudia," the sequence "Alma chorus Domini," and the hymn "Adesto sancta Trinitas"; with musical notes; double columns; fourteenth century. ff. 21, 22.
- 16. Four large folio leaves from a Sarum Breviary containing the choral portions and collects of the service from Easter Eve to Easter Monday; with musical notes; double columns; fourteenth century. ff. 23-26.
- 17. Half of one leaf from a Sarum Missal, containing

- the Thursday and Friday in Easter-week; fol., double columns, latter part of fourteenth century. f. 27.
- 18. These are printed at the end of the Sarum Missals. Noted by Hearne, on f. 30 b, as "Fragmentum Missalis cujusdam antiqui."

20. One leaf from a Missal, containing antiphons, secreta, prefaces, &c. "in tempore Paschali" and on the day of Pentecost, with the lesson from St. John xvii. at matins on the latter day, and the commencement of "De sancta cruce officium," i.e. the feast of the Invention of the Holy Cross; fourteenth century, large fol., double columns. f. 32.

The collect "de sancta cruce" is that which in the Sarum Missal is given to the feast of the Exaltation. Noted by Hearne as "A most curious fragment; from Mr. Bagford. Aput for Apud." The following inscription is in the margin: "Mea affectio, mea afflictio. Non pudet vivere, nec piget mori. R. Young. Nomen et omen."

21. One leaf from a Sarum Missal, containing the office for Saturday in the fourth week of Lent; small fol., double columns, fourteenth century. f. 33.

The following amusing note is written by Hearne in the margin: "This is a curious large hand, done for the aged and such as had but indifferent eyes, at least for persons of the best quality."

22. Two leaves, mutilated, from an Antiphonary, containing the portions for St. John Baptist's day, with the musical notes; large fol., double columns, fifteenth century. ff. 34, 35.

There is a noticeable peculiarity in one of the rubrics, in its containing a date: "Si hoc festum infra oct. Trinit. vel festivitatis Corporis Christi evenerit, ut anno Domini M°.ccc°\u00b10 primo," &c.

23. Two leaves, mutilated, from a Sarum Missal, with the offices for Saturday in the September Ember week, and for the feasts of SS. Maurus, Marcellus, Prisca and Wlstan; in fol., double columns, fifteenth century. ff. 36, 37.



24. One leaf, mutilated, from a Lectionary, containing eight lections for the feast of St. Margaret, and the beginning of the first for St. Praxedis; in fol., double columns, of the end of the twelfth century, beautifully written. f. 38.

The use is not that of Sarum, or York, or Hereford which uses have nine lections for St. Margaret's day, all differing from each other. Formerly belonging to Hearne.

- 25. Half of one leaf from a Sarum Missal, containing the greater part of the sequence for Ascension day, "Rex omnipotens die hodierna," with musical notes; in fol., fifteenth century. f. 39.
- 26. One leaf from a Sarum Missal, for the Thursday and Friday in the third week in Lent; in fol., double columns, fifteenth century. f. 40.
- 27. One leaf from a Breviary, for the Monday in Easter week, with musical notes; in fol., double columns, fourteenth century. f. 41.

Neither Sarum nor York use; the lections on the Gospel (which begin "Ecce audistis, fratres karissimi") being different. A rubric preceding "feria ii" runs, "Si aliquod festum vel jejunium in hac ebdomada forte contigerit, nichil de festo, nichil de jejunio fiat, quia cum Christo resurrexerunt sancti, et in Christo omnes sunt resuscitati, et festum resurrectionis Christi commune est omnibus sanctis. Ideo in hac ebdomada nichil fiat de festis alicujus sancti."

28. One leaf from a Missal, for the Friday and Saturday after Ash Wednesday; in fol., double columns, fourteenth century. f. 42.

Not Sarum, York, or Hereford. The first communion collect on Friday begins, "Spiritum nobis Domine tue caritatis infunde"; the collect on Saturday, "Observationis hujus jejunii annua celebritate letantes."

- 29. Two leaves of a Psalter, containing vers. 126-145 of Ps. cxix and Pss. cxxvi, cxxvii, cxxviii, 1-4; in octavo, fourteenth century. ff. 43, 44.
- 30. Fragment of one leaf from "Officium mortuorum" with the prayers for one just dead: for a bishop, a priest, &c.; in fol., double columns, twelfth century. f. 45.

Not Sarum, York, or Hereford use, but more nearly agreeing with Hereford. One of Hearne's fragments.

31. Fragment of one leaf from the end of a Missal, with two of the "orationes generales," "pro vivis et defunctis," and the post-communion "Sumpta sacramenta," followed by an office for St. Eadberga's day, with a lection from the book of Wisdom; in small fol., double columns, end of twelfth or beginning of thirteenth century. f. 46.

On the reverse of the leaf are added, in blank spaces by hands of the fifteenth century, collects

in an office "beati Joh. abbatis," and collects found at the end of the Sarum Missal "in commemoratione Corporis Christi."

32. One leaf of a rhyming hymn to our B. Lord, containing six complete seven-line stanzas, and two lines; in small quarto, fifteenth century. f. 47.

Beg. (1st line of a stanza) "Pactum in baptismate fac nos adimplere."

End. (1st line of a stanza) "Salva nunc ecclesiam servos spiritales."

33. One leaf from a Breviary, with part of the commemoration of St. Paul (30 June), at the third nocturn and at lauds, with musical notes; in octavo, double columns, early fourteenth century. f. 48.

The lections are differently divided from, and shorter than, those in the Sarum Breviary.

- 34. A very small fragment of an early thirteenth century Breviary, with four lines from the office for the Purification of B. V. M. f. 49.
- 35. Small fragment, being the inner half, of a duodecimo leaf, of thirteen lines, with the collect "pro quacunque tribulatione" which is among the "Memoriæ communes" at the end of the Sarum Missal; followed by "Memoria de Trinitate," and a fragment of a prayer for temporal blessings for families; fourteenth century. f. 50.

Noted by Hearne, "Fragment of the Roman Breviary; for the ladies or nunns."

36. One leaf from a duodecimo Sarum Breviary, containing part of lect. ix and of the lauds for the feast of Corpus Christi, with musical notes; early fourteenth century. f. 51.

With reference to human faces in some of the initial letters, Hearne makes the following note: "Fragmentum breviarii alicujus. In quo et plane digni sunt vultus humani, pariter atque notæ musicæ. Ad hujusmodi vultuum formam sive exemplum vultus etiam occurrunt in parietibus aliisque ædificiis vetustis."

37. Two leaves from an octavo Gradual, with the versicles, &c. for the Tuesday and Wednesday in Easter week, with the musical notes; thirteenth century. ff. 52, 53.

Noted by Hearne, "Fragment of a book of divine offices, about the year 1300." Not by an English hand.

38. Fragments of two leaves from a Lectionary, containing parts of the lections for the Conception of B. V. M., St. Gilbert of Sempringham, St. Albinus and St. Ambrose; in fol., double columns, late fourteenth century. ff. 54, 55.

These leaves would seem to be of some unknown use. The days commemorated are far apart in the Kalendar, being 8 Dec., 13 Oct., 1 March, and 4 April.

- 39. Small tattered fragment of a twelfth century Breviary or Gradual, with beginning of hymn ("Crux fidelis") &c., for the feast of the Invention of the Cross; with musical notes. f. 56.
- 40. Two leaves (not consecutive) from a Missal or Gradual, with part of the order at the *Benedictio fontium* on Easter Eve, and the hymn *Salve festa dies*; with musical notes; small quarto, end of fourteenth century. ff. 57, 58.

Noted by Hearne: "Particula consuetudinarii ecclesiam circumeundi die Paschali."

41. Two fragments of a folio leaf from a Sarum Missal, containing part of the office for the day of the Purif. B. V. M.; fourteenth century, double columns. ff. 59, 60.

Noted by Hearne: "Divine offices."

42. Portion of one leaf from a Sarum Missal, with part of the office for Saturday in the fourth week of Lent; fol., double columns, beginning of fifteenth century. f. 61.

Noted by Hearne: "Piece of divine offices."

43. Two leaves from an eleventh century Responsoriale (as it seems) with part of the office for St. Laurence's day, giving the responsories in full (with musical notation in one instance), and the initial words only (for the most part) of antiphons, verses, and psalms; together with the commencement of the office for the Assumption; small octavo, double columns. ff. 62, 63.

Marked with the initials of Thomas Rawlinson in his usual monogram.

44. Kalendar formerly prefixed to some office-book, wanting the months of Nov. and Dec.; in 4to, fourteenth century. ff. 64-8.

Apparently the book of which this kalendar was part belonged to some house in Essex. On 3 June there is an addition by a fifteenth century hand, "Translacio sancte Osithe virginis et martiris," and on 3 Oct. "Dedicacio ecclesie sancti Petri Colcestrie." On 20 June at the entry "Translacio sancti [Edwardi regis]," the two last words have been obliterated and "Benedicti abbatis" substituted by the original scribe, although the Transl. of St. Benedict occurs in red ink in its right place on 11 July. On Sept. 16 and 22 the feasts of St. Edith and St. Maurice are red-letter days. "Obitus Ricardi Dyer" is entered by the original scribe at 30 Aug., and the following entries have been made by later hands: 17 March, "obitus Johanne Selby, anno Domini Mcccccv, et anno r.r. H. septimi xx."; 30 Apr., "sancti Erkenwaldi episcopi deposicio"; 1 July, "obitus Willelmi Pirton, militis"; 22 Aug., "Isto die rex Henricus VII. super se assumpcit coronam regni Anglie, et victoriam habebat de rege Ricardo."

45. One duodecimo leaf probably from a *Manuale* with the concluding portion of a burial office, with musical notes; fourteenth century. f. 69.

It was the last leaf in the book to which it belonged.

46. Two leaves from an octavo Missal containing part of the office for St. Mary Magd., with the commemorations of SS. Wandregesilus and Appollinaris; late fourteenth century. ff. 70, 71.

Noted by Hearne: "Fragmentum de S. Wandregesilo et S. Appollinari, regnante, ni fallor, Ricardo II^{do}."

- 47. One leaf from an octavo Missal containing the greater part of the *Missa de Trinitate*; fourteenth century. f. 72.
- 48. One leaf from an octavo *Horæ sec. usum Sarum*, with the last two verses of the hymn at vespers *Ave maris stella* and the *Magnificat*; late fourteenth century. f. 73.
- 49. Small fragment of, possibly, a Gradual, with music to words from Zeph. i. 15-17, "—tribulationis dies miserie et vindicte dies tube et clangoris," &c., and a versicle, "Elevavitque vocem cum fletu"; fourteenth century. f. 74.
- 50. Two small fragments from two leaves of a Breviary (not of Sarum use), with a few lines of lections on the days of SS. Peter and Paul and the Visitation of B. M. V. ff. 75, 76.

Noted by Hearne: "Fragment of Divine offices. In it something de corona justiciæ."

51. One leaf of a thirteenth century Psalter, containing parts of Pss. lxxiii, lxxiv; small 4to. f. 77.
Noted by Hearne: "Fragmentum Psalterii."

52. Two leaves of a 12mo book, with versicles and responsories used in Lent; early fourteenth century. ff. 78, 79.

Not written by an English hand.

- 53. The lower portion of a leaf of a book of private prayers; double columns, late fourteenth century. f. 80.
 - I. "De sancto Acca episcopo." Beg. "Summi Regis sacerdos Acca sacerdos Acca patrone clementissime."
 - 2. "De sancta Maria." Beg. "Domine Jesu Christe Dei fili vivi, qui es via, veritas et vita, miserere mei et a subitanea morte libera me."
 - "De sancta Maria." Beg. "O domina misericordissima sancti Dei genitrix."
 - 4. "De sancto Andrea apostolo." Beg. "Sancte et pie Andrea, apostole Christi, ad pietatis tue januam suppliciter tibi clamo."

It is probable that the prayers were written by a monk of Hexham.

The chronicle begins:—"fuit divulgata et indictata pro tradicione et nigromancia." The Act of Parl. begins:—"Blessid be Jhu," and ends, "prejudised or hurt by thise present actes"; as at pp. 378-9, vol. v. of the Rotuli Parliamentorum. It is here followed by the oath (imperf.) taken thereupon by the Parliament to preserve the right of Richard duke of York, which is not printed in the Rolls.

Two slightly mutilated paper leaves in quarto, containing four prayers in English, viz. two "when ye entre into prayer"; one "to be delivered from errours," "especiallie from the obstinate secte of hypocrites the malignant maynteyners of free will, with other papisticall and most dangerous errours"; and one for use "in collegio Trinitatis [apud Cantabr.], 8 Jan. 1562," for blessing upon the college, and the conversion or despatch of "slow bellies, fylthy swine," and "malicious compassers and gredy wayters for the [restoring?] of darkenes and papistrie." ff. 64 b, 65.

It is probable that these prayers are by Thomas Cartwright, who was admitted a fellow of Trinity college in 1562.

Butts, of Thornage, Norfolk; to Mr. Will. Reede, Mr. Butts, Mr. Hopkins, his cousins Thos. Rooper and — Shout, Sir Thomas Bromley (asking him to intercede for him with his father), Mr. Dethick, Mr. Wheeler (with an account of his journey to Paris), Mr. Bodley ("the merchant that dwelleth in Maiden Lane"), his brother, and Mr. Angelo. The first letter is dated 23 Jan. 1578[-9] and the last 11 Jan. 1579[-80].

It contains the latter half of the story of Malchus and the commencement of the life of St. Jerome. Knyvett."

The latest event noticed is the succession of Pope Innocent XI, which took place in 1676.

Inc. "Ad honorem Dei et Virginis gloriose, necnon sanctorum confessorum Francissi [et] Antonii, [et] episcopi Lodowici, in hoc opusculo kalendarii, ad meridiem tamen universitatis Exonie (sic) composito, a fratre Johanne Somer, ordinis Minorum, iste ordo observetur."

The following passages mark the date: "—descendendo ergo cum annis Domini, videlicet ab anno Domini 1443"; and, "Incipit autem ciclus primus, qui jam anno Domini 1444, et terminabitur ultimus anno Domini 1500."

The bishop Lewis mentioned in Digby MS. 5, as well as in this MS., would seem to be Lewis Charleton, bishop of Hereford, who died in 1363. Lewis de Luxemburgh, bishop of Ely, died in 1443, the year in which the calculations in this MS. begin.

The leaves are in small folio, fastened together with a piece of untanned leather, and are so folded as to form a small octavo pocket almanae.

A hand of the last century has written on the first page of this volume that it contains "juvenile collections of the famous Joseph Mead." This is certainly entirely erroneous. The writing does not resemble his, and in 1618 he was B.D. and aged 32; and although he Latinized his name as Medus he does not appear to have ever used the form Meddus. The notes are evidently those of a very young man or lad such as the Joseph Meddus of Exeter college was in the year 1618.

On the blank leaves of the volume another hand has made many trivial insertions.

Memorandum book of Edmund Warcupp of Lincoln's Inn, from 1652 to 1666, chiefly containing notes respecting a law-suit in 1652-4 with Bernard Dormer respecting the will of William Dormer, of Bethnal Green (made 21 March, 165½, and proved 16 July, 1653), to whom Warcupp appears to have been executor. These include all the charges, fees to counsel, &c. There are also notes about a law-suit with Lawrence Hyde in 1657, lists of bonds for money lent from 1629 to 1650, and notes of disputes in Dec. 1666 about the laying down of water-pipes by the New River Company in Covent Garden, Gray's Inn Lane and Russell Street.

The writer's name is ascertained from the following entry on f. 69: "I Edmd. Warcupp was borne the 4th day of July, beinge wednesday, between eleven and twelve of the clocke at night, in the yeere 1627." Relatives mentioned by him are his father, his brothers Robert and William, col. Warcupp, Rod[olph] Warcupp, Giles Warcupp, "my brother Rouse," "my uncle Gill," and "cousin Saunders."

The monthly calendar is written on the recto The leaf containing January is of each leaf. endorsed with the "dies mali" in the year, and other leaves have the following historical notes on the verso: - March, "Decollatus fuit Thomas comes Lancastrie anno Domini Mo. ccco. xxo primo"; May, notes of the battle of Lewes, 1244, and the capture of Berwick, 1286; June, "Prima pestilencia universalis per totum mundum anno Domini millesimo ccco xLVIIIo," and notes of the battle of "Bannocborn," 1310, and of "Stryvelyn," 1314; July, "Anno Domini Mo. cco. LXº. ixº. in aurora diei Veneris, iiij idus Julii, elevabatur aqua que dicitur Nyd per unum digitum super tabulamentum novi dormitorii, et super suppremum gradum magni hostii occidentalis ecclesie sancte Trinitatis"; battle of "Fawkirk" 1289, and of "Slusez super mare," 1340; and a memorandum that on 13 July 1 Edw. VI. (1547) "ways Kaytterone Gybsone, laytt wysse Edmunde Gybsons, bereyde in ye cherch off Knaysbruche"; August, battle of Evesham, 1265; September, battle of "Halydown hyll" and siege of Berwick, 1319, and "Combustio ville de Maltone citra festum sancti Michaelis per Scotos, ao. Dom. millesimo ccc°. xx1°."; October, "A°. Dom. M°. cccc°. tricesimo secundo, pridie kal. Octobris, elevabatur aqua vocatur Nyd ad gradum chori juxta finem occidentalem tumbe sancti Roberti. Ao. Dom. M°. cccc°. tricesimo iiij°, in nocte sancti Wilfridi in yme, nostrum dormitorium una cum campanili et tribus campanis igne subitaneo consumebatur; and a note of the battle of "Newill Crosse," 1346; December, value of the King's lands in England, Gascony, Ireland, Wales and Scotland, as returned to the Exchequer, excepting the cities in France, £57,004 13s. 4d. On 10 Feb. is this entry, inserted by a later hand, "Obitus domini Ade de Wartre, prioris de Kyrkam, ao. dom. mo. ccco. xuxo." On 9 March a rubricated entry has been erased, as well as a later one which recorded that "Walterus



fundavit domum de Kyrkam anno Dom. M°. C°. XXI." On 3 July the rubricated entry of the Transl. of St. Thomas Ap. has been erased apparently by mistake for that of Becket on 7 July, which remains. In October two entries in red have been erased: the "Festum reliquiarum Ebor. ecclesie" on 19th, to make way for St. Frideswide, and on 23rd, "Obitus [Adeline?] uxoris Walteri..." [Espec, the founder of Kirkham?], to make way for St. Maglorius. Many entries by later hands occur throughout.

An English calendar, with various tables, prognostications and symbols, of most singular and curious character.

It is written in red and black on six sheets of vellum, of unequal size, so divided into squares as to fold up into six booklets for the pocket, with numerous figures in gold and colours. The chief contents of the several fasciculi are these following:—

- 1. Seven squares, of which the outer one forms the cover, and three are blank on one side. The sphere of the heavens, with our Lord on the Cross in the centre, and the evangelistic symbols at the corners; figures of the Annunciation, and "Harry ye Haywarde" with his dog "Talbat."
- 2. Twenty-four squares. On one side a monthly calendar, with figures illustrating all the saints' days and festivals throughout the year; on the other side illustrations of the rural occupations of the several months, and of the signs of the zodiac, with English verses above each of the latter, beginning thus with Sol in aquario, "Ye sonne ys here in his syne pat is seson forto reyne, And forto snewe and forto frese, and also schewynge forto lese. As pe pichar turnep op so doune so schangip p wedrus in pis seysoune."
- 3. Eight squares. On one side, "Signa planetarum;" the figure of St. Christopher, carrying the Christchild, with two prayers to him, in Latin, ending with these verses:
 - "Christophori sancti speciem quicunque tuetur, Illo nempe die nullo languore gravetur."

English verses on the planetary influences, beginning with these on Sol:

Figure of "Peris pe Pyndare." On the other side "Tabula planetarum" for the 24 hours on each day of the week. "De tonitruo: docet ista tabula quod significat in quolibet mense," with symbolical figures representing the character of the several months as prognosticated by thunder.

- 4. Sixteen squares. On one side, "Celum empurium in quo Deus est;" a curious table of numerals; eight pictures representing Adam and Eve in Paradise, with their expulsion, Adam digging and Eve weaving, and the sacrifice and death of Abel. On the other side a series of pictorial prognostications from the planetary signs of the months, and, at the foot, notes of twelve days in the year in which "quicunque jejunaverit in pane et aqua securus erit de gaudio paradisi si contritus et confessus fuerit."
- 5. Sixteen squares, of which one is blank. On one side, the death of Adam and his entering the mouth of hell, with the risen Christ delivering the imprisoned souls, while a demon with a horn in his mouth cries "Out, out, aroust;" some prognosticatory symbols: "horologium cum sole;" "sors decima ejecta;" English verses on the distance from earth to heaven, according to "Rabe Moyses be goode clerke" [i.e. Maimonides] viz., that to reach the highest heaven, it would be equal to the distance walked by a man in 7700 years, each year consisting of 305 (sic) days, at 40 miles a day, each mile being 2000 cubits. A moneyreckoning table, with this heading: "Deners despendu le joure cum bene amount par ane. E comence par vne oufe, se est a sauer xxiiij oufes pur vne denere." On the other side, a series of mystical planetary tables, with the human figure as dominated by the signs, and our Lord as victor over Death.
- 6. Sixteen squares. The Nativity, with figures of the Three Kings, and our Lord on the Cross between SS. Mary and John; a table of numbers. On the other side a long series of enigmatical numerals and signs.

Numerals are represented by a dot for a unit, by the mark] for 5, and O for 10; but there are also some other numeral-signs.

On the reverse of the first leaf of fasc. i. Hearne has written this note: "Suum cuique, Tho. Hearne, Oct. 17, 1719. This strange odd book (upon which I set a very great value, having never seen the like) was given me by the Rt. Reverend Father in God William (Fleetwood) Ld. Bishop of Ely, to whom I am oblig'd upon many other accounts." Another former possessor,

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early in the 17th cent., has also inscribed a note: "J. P. C. S. matrimonium sacramentum magnum. A. H."

The MS. is now preserved in a box.

A table of the contents in four volumes of miscellaneous notes relative to universal history, ancient and modern, to the geography of various countries, and to manners and customs. The latest date appears to be in a notice "Of the tax of polemoney in Poland ao 1673." Very neatly written.

The following heading is prefixed: "A generall table directing to the observables contayn'd in severall volumes."

A note-book of arms and devices borne on the "cornets" of captains in the Civil War in 1642, in the northern expedition of 1640, and that into Ireland in 1642; being chiefly of some of the captains on the side of the Parliament, including those of the city of London.

The first 26 leaves contain arms and devices in colours; the rest of the volume (which for the last ten leaves is reversed) has them only in very rough trick. There are a few miscellaneous coats of arms, among which are some belonging to the families of Crow and Parker of Norfolk, Walker of Yorkshire and Kent, Lucas, Noble, Frend and Fownes.

The names of the captains are entered in the index to this Catalogue.

On ff. 37 b-37 are a few roughly-scribbled doggerel verses expressing regret for leaving Scotland for service in England and Ireland. On the cover is a printed label, coloured, of the inscription on the cornet of capt. Markham.

Wood's copy (Wood, 514. 44) is marked by him with the name "Winnyard," which is thus confirmed by this contemporary transcript.

Samuel Chappell matriculated (according to Foster's *Alumni Oxonienses*) as a servitor at Lincoln college in July, 1659.

The following note is prefixed by Hearne, "A. D. 1719. Simon Chapell, alias Grater, who

wrote this book, was formerly of Lincoln coll. Oxford. He afterwards lead a strange obscure life, and was called Grater from his using a grater to grate his bread with. Sometimes he was called the old philosopher. He us'd to take his rounds from one college to another, and would seldom accept of above a halfpenny. He died in Oxford, and was buried by contribution of scholars in Magdalen parish church yard 7 or eight years since."

On a fly-leaf, 3 b at the beginning, Thomas Rawlinson has written, "wants letter G. which some base hand has torne out," i.e. the leaf containing on one side the sentence for F. and on the other the initial G. For the letter Z. there is an epistle to one Zachary Bennington, recommending one Thomas Lammering to be secretary to Sir John Crompton, knt.

On the first of the fly-leaves is the note, "E libris Roberti Wilkinson ex dono patris anno Dni 1660," altered by another hand to "1659, Oxon," but this was evidently written in the eighteenth century, and appears to be intended

for a copy of a note which appears on the first page of the book itself, a page formerly hidden by being pasted down, "Robert Wilkinson, his book, September 14 anno Domini 1661, ex dono patris." The name of "Thomas Whitmore" is scribbled several times on the same page; and that of James Gray "at Clappam," 5 Sept. 1673, on f. 24 b.

The volume was formerly erroneously placed, notwithstanding its bearing the Rawlinson bookplate and notes of ownership, amongst the Laud MSS.

Generally one line is given to each day, and ordinary recurrent entries are made in contracted form, of which the following, on the first page, for Jan. 21 is a specimen: "P. pp. st. Eccl. o. stud. pr: o. σ_X . o. st: o. coe. o. pf." But others give particulars of his wife and family, journeys to London, &c., apprenticeship of a son, preaching on board a ship, summons before some commissioners for a sermon, visits to sick parishioners, &c., with mention of many Devonshire clergy. And it can be gathered that he was curate to Dr. Wilson, vicar of Plymouth, who is frequently mentioned, and whose death at Plymouth is entered at 4 July and his burial at 8 July, 1643. At 21 Oct. 1640 occurs this entry, "Rogavit me Wilson, An crederem eum non satisfacere officio suo? Negavi me judicem sui; verum si ego vicarius essem, putabam me obligari ad sabbatum plene sanctificandum, idque sumptibus meis, nisi ipse fecissem." At 31 Dec.: "Colloq. cum Wilson de curatu." On 6 Apr. 1640: "Valedixi Wilsono et Trelanio profecturis ad Parliam^t., Deus conservet et benedicat"; but in the list of the Long Parliament in the Returns printed by the House of Commons in 1878, vol. i. p. 481, the members for Plymouth are given as Robert Trelawnye and John Waddon, and no one of the name of Wilson is found either in Devon or Cornwall. Trelawny is mentioned under other dates as well. At 25 Sept. 1641 is this entry: "Visi Dr. Weldum, pastorem ecclesiæ Roxburiensis apud Nov.-Angliam, quocum multa de ritibus ecclesiæ ipsius collocutus.

It appears from Walker's Sufferings of the Clergy (part ii. p. 193) that Thomas Bedford

was Dr. Aaron Wilson's curate at the time of the latter's death, and it may be assumed that he was the writer of this manuscript.

The cover is a fragment of a fourteenth-century treatise on questions of canon law.

propriis locorum nominibus]". The preambles of the duke's patents and the genealogy are also omitted. On the reverse of the last leaf (f. 116) is the following distich, written by the same hand:—

Illustrated with coloured pictures of philosophers teaching, and of the signs and their seasons; and at the end six full-page pictures of the occupations and characteristics prognosticated in nativities under the several signs and planets. At the foot of the last page is an owner's inscription: "Iste liber constat Nycholas (sic) Sydyhat, cum magno gaudio et honore. Amen."

At the beginning of the volume are two leaves (one fragmentary) from a thirteenth-century copy of a Latin poem on grammar and prosody, to the tracing of which the two following lines may perhaps form a clue:

"Quinque vocales sunt, a prior, e.que secunda, I succedit eis, o quarta sit, v.que postrema."

On the reverse of the first of these leaves is the following scribbled memorandum: "Margere Sywhat wyffe unto Nycolas Sywhat lyethe

beryid at yo sowthe porche in yo chercheyerd of Sent Edmonde in Norwych, before yo bay wyndow of yo howse of yo forseyd Nycolas Sywhat in yo aley be her childerne, Jorge Coventre, Harry Coventre, Elyzabet Coventre, Secely Sywhat, ye xvj day of June, yo xiiijto yere of Kynge Harri yo viijth [1522], on whose soulys God have merci." Nicholas Sywhat was mayor of Norwich in 1535. And on the second leafthename" Matth. Stenham has been written in the seventeenth century. Two other leaves of this poem, now obliterated, formed an old cover of the volume. Various parchment fragments have been bound up by Rawlinson as fly-leaves at both ends, from leases, &c., of no interest; a lease of a house in "Leister" Fields, a surrender at the court baron of Stebunheath, alias Stepney, in 1670, sale of a fourth part of a merchant vessel going from Ireland to the West Indies, by Josia Willard to Jonathan Leigh, apothecary, of London for £531 13s. 4d., in 1717, &c.

E., and a preface to the reader by the same, in which a book by Alphonsus Madriliensis is commended, containing "a method of serving God," which is said to be "also translated into the vulgar tounge."

The book is Lorenzo Scupoli's Spiritual Combat, apparently in its second form, as it contains 33 chapters. (See Dr. Pusey's preface to the translation printed in 1846, p. ix.) Chap. 33 is entitled, "Of the oblation of thyselfe."

A long and rambling reply, full of repetitions, by an old and infirm man, barely able to walk (f. 37 b) and much perplexed, addressed to his children, and particularly to his "dear child Harry," stating, in answer to their repeated urging of him to become a Protestant, his reasons for remaining a Roman Catholic. f. 26.

Probably written in the early time of Q. Elizabeth. The writer condemns vehemently the worship of images and the modes of fasting in the Roman Church, but as strongly repudiates Protestant teaching respecting the sacrament of the altar, predestination, and purgatory. He quotes (f. 56b) from his son's letter to him thus:

"O my good child you cry out in your booke most greevously against me, and sayth, O good father, soe long as you live in the papist religion and beleeve in yt as they doe, you live in a most dampnable sinne, for you hate God and keepe none of his commandements." The latter part of the reply was written on a Good Friday (ff. 66 b-67) in a time of "hard and extreame weather" (f. 48 b).

Probably the author may have been one of the Russells, Theodore or Anthony, painters, who were related to Oliver by marriage.

Many title-pages of the books bearing the autographs of owners are interspersed; with regard to most of the other signatures Rawlinson notes whence they were taken, and occasionally adds brief particulars of the writers. The autographs were found loose amongst the Rawlinson MSS. in small paper packets, alphabetically: they are now mounted, and were bound in two volumes about 1862. All the names will be found in the Index to this Catalogue. Amongst them are, Lanc. Andrewes, while apparently an undergraduate, and spelling his name as "Androwes"; "Gulielmus Cecilius, 1551"; "Thomas Cantuarien.," to which Thomas Rawlinson adds the note, "This was our Birmicham martyr Cranmer"; two of Dr. Donne; three of Ben Jonson; one of archbishop Laud; and one of "Lauderdaill, Windsor Castle, 14 Oct. 1658."
