The Ciné-Kodak—Model B

In its complete simplicity and ease of operation Ciné-Kodak, Model B, is a marvel to the amateur and a delight to the expert. Hand cranking is entirely eliminated; the motive power is all in a spring motor which controls the timing as well. Load the camera with daylight film, obtainable in either 50 or 100-foot reels—it takes but a second, as easy as loading a Kodak—wind the spring, point the camera at scene or subject, release the lever and the movie's in the making—instantly.

Close-ups follow distant views, action follows action, without any adjustment for focus or time. When ready to make the movie, there's only one thing to consider: which of four diaphragm openings to use—a turn of a dial makes that adjustment, and an exposure guide beneath the dial tells which stop to choose for the prevailing light condition. Nothing complicated, no bothering details to remember or forget. That's cinematography reduced to severest simplicity.

Motion pictures excel only when camera movement is not perceptible in the screened picture. Ciné-Kodak, Model B, in action qualifies in this respect, too. Embodying the fundamental principle of all hand cameras it is designed so that it may be operated at waist height, the only position where undue movement during exposure may be prevented.

Emphatic economies have been effected as far as the operation of this camera is concerned, due primarily to the film which it uses. Ciné-Kodak film is 16 millimeters wide (approximately $\frac{5}{8}$ of an inch) as against 35 millimeters for professional film, and through a special process the film that made the exposure is the identical one employed for projection. Obviously the savings here are significant—over four-fifths as compared with equipment using standard width film.

And the purchase price of Ciné-Kodak film includes processing by Eastman experts. Expose the reel, mail it to an Eastman Laboratory and it comes back to you without charge, postpaid, ready for projection.

In every respect Ciné-Kodak, Model B, is a motion picture camera in a hand camera size, built to produce motion pictures for the amateur in as simple a fashion and on as inexpensive a scale as he is now familiar with in still photography. It squares to Eastman standards in every way, and these standards are neither vague nor varying.
