can be kept within reason so that they will not be too great menace to game birds and poultry and furnish a valuable supply of fur. The trouble with October is that fur is usually well nigh worthless and the animals so easily killed.

---

A young friend of mine went into the fur buying business this winter as a sideline. So far he has paid out around three thousand dollars for fur, and made expenses and wages. He has sold fur skins in the following numbers: Foxes 62; minks 28; coons 40, skunks over 1000; possums over 700; wild cats 7; muskrats over 100; weazels 60. There are four or five other buyers. Some of the trappers ship direct and the season is not yet over. So my guess that fur is annual cash crop of \$20,000 in Pocahontas County still stands.
