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History of the CCC

The Civilian Conservation Corps (CCC) came into being shortly after Franklin D. Roosevelt took office in March 1933. It was terminated in 1942 as the United States entered World War II. The CCC was considered to be the most successful emergency program of the Roosevelt administration.

During this period of over nine years, approximately three million young men (enrollees) served in the program plus another million or so military personnel, state personnel, educational advisors and other supervisory personnel.

At the peak of the program in 1936, there were 650,000 enrollees on duty located in 2,700 CCC camps throughout the nation.

The billions of trees planted, the millions of acres of land reclaimed; the park, bridges, dams, and fire trails built; plus all the other projects, are still much in evidence today.

Equally important, the CCC took millions of unemployed young men off the streets, gave them hope, helped them to be self-supporting and build self-respect and taught them how to be men. Man learned to read and write, obtained diplomas, learned a trade. A large percentage served their country honorably and with distinction in World War II. Most went on to be outstanding citizens and a credit to their country and communities



mon in camp, you may say. We agree with you, they are the safest, do they always APPEAR to bo doing the safe thing? The work leader must not only avoid things that aro unsafo, but he must avoid anything that might seem the least bit unsafe to his most unskilled and untrained worker. C.C.C. onrolloos aro like humans everywhere. They do, or try to do, the things they see those in authority doing. Sometimes boss will take a chance, bocause he thinks it is a chance worth taking. Tho boss knows just how far he can go, however, and stops there. The average onrolloo doos not tako into consideration all of this. He merely sees the boss doing a thing that he, the enrollee, has boon warned against. It can't be SO wrong if he ean do it- passes through the enrollees mind. Later he tries it and is hurt. Is he entirely to blame? He blames the foreman. One of the best lessons of Safoty is to always practice what you pronch.

SECTION II, ORGANIZATION AND ADMINISTRATION Bar. 41. Specific Disciplinary Prohibitions. a. RETURN OF ALLOTHENT MONEY TO AMROLLESS. return of allotment money to enrollers is prohibited and enrolless who receive such money from their allottoes will be subject to discharge. The type of discharge to be given may be either an henorable. or an administrativo dischargo in the discretion of the corps area commander and based upon the circumstances which develop during the investigation and hearing.

b. GAME LAWS. District and company commanders will take stops to see that National, State, county, and local game laws are not violated by enrollees.

c. GAMBLING. All forms of gambling by the members of the C.C.C. in the camps and elsowhere are strictly forbiddon.

d. AUTOMOBILES. The operation of automobiles privately owned by onrollees is inconsistent with the basic condition upon which enrollment in the C.C.C is promised, and is forbidden. Violation, discharge.
