

DIES FROM HYDROPHOBIA.

John S. Richardson, assistant secretary of the West Virginia Coal Association, died of rabies on a Chesapeake and Ohio Railway train Wednesday night, Aug. 25th at Thurmond, enroute from Huntington to a Baltimore hospital for Pasteur treatment.

Bitten by a pet bull dog a few days ago, the wound was cauterized and had seemingly healed. On Wednesday symptoms, which doctors said plainly indicated rabies, developed. His wife, Mrs. Marion Richardson, being at the point of death at the time could not be told of her husband's death. Mr. Richardson was 33 years old.

turn, and his family, growing uneasy, went
to look for him and found him dead on the
ground with a hole through his neck, evi-

tion. The epidemic has attained alarming proportions and in some parts of the county whole droves of hogs have died in the past two weeks.

Some assert that the disease is hog cholera, but others who have had experience with the disease claim it is not.

A quarantine has been established in the unaffected districts to prevent the spread of the disease, and it is hoped the epidemic can be checked. Already a heavy loss has been sustained by a number of farmers in Wood county, and owing to the fact that both hogs and horses have been affected by the disease.

Two weeks ago a mad dog bit the cow and a week ago the animal became wild and without warning turned on the three members of the family and the hired man and bit them—all as they sought to help her.
