

EXAMPLE FOR PLACEMENT OF ENTRIES: If a finished piece is banically one craft, such as a knitted afghan with a crocheted edge, the best placement of the entry would be in knitting. If it is a knitted afghan with a cross stitch design and a crocheted edge, the best placement would be in Combination Needlework.
