## Mathematics:sconsidered

 by many students as one of the most complicated groups of classes at P.C.H.S.. Students are required to complete 4 math classes whether they are in the professional pathway or not. Classes offered in the math department include; Algebra I and II, Geometry, Pre-Calculus, Trigonometry, Calculus and Conceptual Math.Algebra I, taught by Mrs. Rhea, focused on equations and graphing and was the gateway to all higher math courses. Geometry, taught by Mr. DiPasquale and Mr. Sutton, employed students to deal with right angles, congruent triangles, parallel planes, points, etc. From Geometry, students can progress to Algebra II, where they apply the skills learned earlier on. Mr. DiPasquale taught the more challenging classes, which include Pre-Calc and Calculus, while Mr. Sutton taught Trigonometry.
