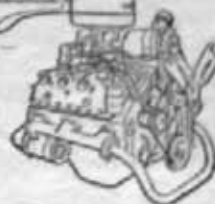

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## LIKES THE ARMY

If anyone wants to know how well off one is as a member of the United States Army he should go out to Fort Frances E. Warren, Wyoming, and talk with Private Anton Perusek of Cleveland, who only three years ago was in the Yugoslav army.

He hasn't heard from his mother, brother or sister whom he left in Yugoslavia in 1939 when the American consul in Zagreb got him out of the army and returned him to this country. Born at Slaty Fork, W. Va., he had returned to Europe with his parents when he was three years old.

He was compelled to join the Yugoslav army when he became twenty in 1937. He spent 15 months in the army before the consul extricated him on the grounds that he was an American citizen.

Over there he got \$2.60 as his pay for the entire 15 months of service. Here he gets \$21 a month. He can go to Cheyenne—the nearest town—any night he has free time. Over there he couldn't leave the reservation for the first three months of enlistment.

Here he gets up at 5:45 a. m., and is finished for the day at 4:30 p. m. Over there he got up at

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twenty in 1937. He spent 15 months in the army before the consul extricated him on the grounds that he was an American citizen.
