SUBJECT: SECURITY INVESTIGATIONS OF INDIVIDUALS ADOCUMENTATION OF HEPORTS

In connection with the Summary Report Program dealing with individuals included in the Security Index and completed in all offices with the exception of New York in July, 1954 (New York completed this project May 1, 1956), we required the field to set out on administrative pages complete documentation of information contained in details of the report. This documentation consisted of five elements, namely (1) identity of the source, (2) date of activity and/or description of information, (3) date information was received, (4) identity of Agent receiving information, and (5) location by file number of the original exhibit in the office files.

This procedure was necessary at that time in order to be certain field offices correlated all information concerning each subject in an individual file to enable up to be in a position to readily locate any documentary evidence or intelligence information required by United States attorneys for possible use at hearings in the event the Emergency Detention Program should go into effect.

Since March, 1952, in addition to the above, the five elements of documentation have been set out in channelizing memoranda directed to individual subjects case files, thus enabling us to determine immediately from a check of the channelizing memoranda the exact location in the office of the original source of information.

The Domestic Intelligence Division is considering the continued necessity for setting forth complete documentation in these reports now that the Summary Report Program has been completed throughout the field. The possibility exists that, if we can eliminate items two, three and four from our reports, there will be a considerable saving in paper, file space, Agent time in preparing and reviewing reports, stenographic time in transcription and will speed the production of reports in the field, enabling Agents engaged in security investigations to spend more time in actual investigations.

Prior to a final recommendation in this matter, however, it is deemed desirable to solicit specific recommendations from several of the larger offices having a large number of security cases.

RECOMBENDATION:

If you agree, there is attached a proposed letter to Los Angeles, copies to San Francisco, New York, Newark, Philadelphia, Washington Field and Detroit, requesting the comments of these offices as to the desirability of eliminating the above-mentioned items from the administrative pages of security reports on individuals. The Eureau presently has under consideration the elimination of certain items of documentation from the administrative pages of reports involving individual security subjects.

Project, completed in all offices by July 14, 1954, with the exception of New York which completed this Froject by May 1, 1956, the Eureau required complete documentation on the administrative pages of information contained in the details of the report. This documentation consisted of five elements, namely (1) identity of the source, (2) date of activity and/or description of information, (3) date information was received, (4) identity of higher receiving information, and (5) location by file number of the original exhibit in the office files. Since Larch, 1952, it has been a Bureau requirement that these five elements be contained in channelizing memoranda directed to the various files.

Under consideration is the possibility of eliminating items two, three and four of the documentation, bearing in wind that, under our process requirements with regard to the preparation of reports, items two and three are contained in the details of the reports and item four would be reflected in the channelizing removands directed to the files or could be readily obtained from the original documents, the location of which would be reflected in the last item of documentation on the administrative pages.

Each month we follow the field closely on sof security work by analyzing the backlog

Each month we follow the field closely on the status of security work by analyzing the backlog of pending cases and delinquency in espionage, internal security, security matter and foreign intelligence cases in classifications 65, 100 and 105. Status of these cases as of May 31, 1956, is set forth herein.

In May, there was an increase in pending active matters in the entire field in the security classifications from 14,717 to 16,377. Delinquent matters decreased from 1,783 to 1,753. The percentage of delinquent matters decreased from 12.1% to 10.7%.

Letters are being sent to Charlotte,
Indianapolis and San Antonio, indicated by asterisks
on page five herein, commenting upon their delinquent
condition and pointing out the necessity of bringing
their security cases to a current status.

RECOMMENDATION:

The field will continue to be followed closely regarding security delinquency and you will be advised of the results of the review of the June, 1956, administrative reports.

The May, 1956, administrative reports from all offices reflect that the total pending active matters in classifications 65, 100 and 105 increased from 14,717 to 16,377. The delinquent items decreased from 1,783 to 1,753. The percentage of delinquent matters decreased from 12.1% to 10.7%.



SYNOPSIS:

the status of security work by analyzing the backlog of pending cases and delinquency in espionage, internal security, security matter and foreign intelligence cases in classifications 65, 100 and 105. Status of these cases as of June 30, 1956, is set forth herein.

In June, there was an increase in pending active matters in the entire field in the security classifications from 16,377 to 16,900. Delinquent matters increased from 1,753 to 1,800. The percentage of delinquent matters decreased from 10.7% to 10.6%.

Letters are being sent to Chicago and Washington Field, indicated by esterishs on pages four and five herein, commenting upon their delinquent condition and pointing out the necessity of bringing their security cases to a current status.

RECOLUENDATION:

The field will continue to be followed closely regarding security delinquency and you will be advised of the results of the review of the July, 1956, administrative reports.

The June, 1956, administrative reports from all offices reflect that the total pending active matters in classifications 65, 100 and 105 increased from 16,377 to 16,900. The delinquent items increased from 1,753 to 1,800. The percentage of delinquent matters decreased from 10.7% to 10.6%.

The following statistics reflect the status of pending work, including both pending active and pending inactive matters, and delinquency for all field divisions as of December 31, 1951, and the progress for the last four months.



SYNOPSIS:

the status of security work by analyzing the backlog of pending cases and delinquency in espionage, internal security, security matter and foreign intelligence cases in classifications 65, 100 and 105. Status of these cases as of July 31, 1956, is set forth herein.

In July, there was an increase in pending active matters in the entire field in the security classifications from 16,900 to 17,389. Delinquent matters decreased from 1,800 to 1,703. The percentage of delinquent matters decreased from 10.6% to 9.2%.

A letter is being sent to Chicago, indicated by an asterisk on page four herein, commenting upon its delinquent condition and pointing out the necessity of bringing its security cases to a current status.

RECOMMENDATION:

The field will continue to be followed closely regarding security delinquency and you will be advised of the results of the review of the Lugust, 1956, administrative reports.

DETAILS:

The July, 1956, administrative reports from all offices reflect that the total pending active matters in classifications 65, 100 and 105 increased from 16,900 to 17,389. The delinquent items decreased from 1,800 to 1,703. The percentage of delinquent matters decreased from 10.6% to 9.2%.

As reflected in my memorandum of September 12, 1956, analyzing the field delinquency in security classifications 65, 100 and 105, no office has a delinquency in these classifications in excess of 20%. The over-all delinquency was computed at 9% as compared to 22.6% as of August 31, 1955. Thus, the field is in an excellent position to deal with security matters on practically a current basis.

Since September, 1955, constant pressure has been applied to the field to secure more complete coverage of Communist Party (CP) activities and to effect identification of and subject to thorough investigation all current members of the Party. We have stressed the necessity of identifying all CP members and have issued instructions regarding intensification of investigation of Party leaders on all levels of the Party organizational structure, looking toward reaching the above goal.

Characterization Card That a Security Index (SI) Box be initiated in each field office. As a procedure for setting up and maintaining this box, SA that in all pending and closed SI cases the agent to whom case is assigned should immediately prepare a memorandum for subject's case file containing the best available characterization of subject from which a characterization card will be prepared. SAC will specifically designate a clerk to maintain this characterization card box. In case of change in characterization, new card would be placed in the box and a revised memorandum placed in subject's file. In cases where subject is subsequently removed from SI, the subject's card will be removed from the box. In addition, reports in SI cases should hereafter contain statement on Administrative Page that subject's SI characterization card has been reviewed and found to contain current or best available characterization of the

ADVANTAGES STATED: Within six months to one year a characterization card on all SI subjects in each field office will be filed in the SI Characterization Card Box. Suggester believes this box will save a substantial amount of agent personnel time by negating the necessity of file reviewing by a number of reporting agents to obtain a characterization for an SI subject so he might be documented in a report. It would also result in the utilization of a standard characterization on each SI subject rather than a variety of characterizations by individual reporting agents.

OBSERVATIONS: SAC New York, states while certain features of this suggestion are good and have been put into effect in the New York Office, he does not believe the over-all suggestion should not be adopted. (Note: This form is in no way intended to replace file reviews, per se, but is intended to be a ready reference to specific pertinent serials in the case file so that the normal amount of time spent in searching a case file for a specific item can be eliminated or at least greatly reduced.)

Current practice or rule (include manual citation as well as facts):

At the present time, there is no Bureau rule or provision for each a form as a top sorial in a Security Index case file. A similar form (FD-238) is being used at the present time in 134 type cases and has proven to be a valuable aid.

ADVANTAGES OF SUGGESTION .

The advantages of this form would appear to be basically concerned with the more efficient administrative and investigative handling of a Security Index case as well as to reduce the time consumed in locating specific pertinent serials in a particular security case file. At the present time, cases of this type are becoming voluminous in number of serials and volumes in many Bureau Field Divisions. In the Seattle Office, for example, it is estimated that the average Security Index case is approximately six volumes, with some cases containing as many as fifteen to twenty volumes.

This form would be advantageous to Bureau Inspectors and their aides, the Special Agent in Charge, the field supervisor, and the agent to whom the case is assigned. These advantages are set out below:

A. Advantages of the Bureau Inspector and His Aides.

- 1. During field office inspections, time spent in searching through Security Index case files to ascertain whether or not Bureau requirements for each case have been fulfilled would be greatly reduced. This form would readily point out to the Inspector the pertinent serials of the case file which require the special attention in the case file review. This form would eliminate the present normal time consumed in locating these pertinent serials in the voluminous case file.
- 2. In the event this form is not completely filled out, it would assist the Inspector in determining whether or not an omission had occurred in the investigation of the case being reviewed.

B. Advantages for the Special Agent in Charge.

- 1. This form would enable the SAC to quickly review a case file when determining whether or not a subject should be retained in the Security Index.
- 2. This form would "pinpoint" the pertinent serials of a case file to the SAC when reviewing the investigative work of an agent.
- 3. This form would serve as a ready reference for the SAC in the event it is necessary to quickly ascertain a specific item concerning a Security Index subject, such as the FBI number, criminal record, what agent has observed the subject in the past, etc. This would eliminate a tremendous amount of file review in case containing numerous volumes.

C. Advantages for the Field Supervisor.

- 1. This form would quickly direct the field supervisor to the pertinent serials in a case file in order to determine whether the case has been completely and correctly investigated.
- This form would also assist the field supervisor in locating information regarding matters such as dissemination, previous interviews of the subject, and descriptions of subjects when attempting to identify an unknown subject, thus eliminating the necessary time now consumed in locating the pertinent serial in several volumes of a case file.

D. Advantages for the Agent.

- 1. This form would serve as a constant reminder to the agent of many of the requirements necessary to be completed in a Security Index case.
- This form would serve as a ready reference to the agent in situations which would require the agent to locate a specific serial to handle the matter in question. For example, when a Security Index subject is removed from the SI. it would be necessary for the agent to determine if a Security Flash Notice had been placed previously in the Identification Division. This form would quickly direct the agent's attention to the specific serial, thus eliminating the time which would have been required to personally review each serial of the case file to determine whether or not such a stop had been placed. In addition, at the present time it is necessary to specifically comment on the administrative page of a security report if authority to interview the subject has been received in the past and no reinterview was conducted during current investigation. In many cases, the authority to interview was received several months or years ago and it would take a serial-by-serial check in order to determine whether authority was received and what the results of the interview were. In situations where a subject has moved to a city in the territory of another field division, it is necessary to furnish the new office of origin opies of pertinent reports and serials and this form would enable the agent to quickly locate these in the voluminous file in a minimum of time. At the same time, it would remind the agent that a Security Flash Notice had or had not been placed previously and would eliminate the time necessary to conduct a complete serial-by-serial check to determine

- whether or not a Security Flash Notice had been placed previously so that the Identification Division could be advised of the new office of origin.
- 3. It is believed that this form would generally assist the agent to more completely follow his own case files.

E. Other Advantages.

This form could also serve as a ready reference for a field office in the event the Bureau should desire to ascertain from the field office such figures as the following:

- 1. Number of SI subjects with criminal records.
- 2. Number of reports of SI subjects disseminated, to whom.
- 3. Number of subject's homes considered as possible hideouts.
- 4. In the event it was necessary to determine which Security Index case files contained handwriting samples or specimens of the subject, this top serial form would eliminate a file review to determine this fact. This situation could arise where an anonymous communication is involved and Security Index subjects would be logical suspects.

In all of the above comments regarding advantages, it is intended that the sole purpose of this form is to reduce time normally spent in reviewing a voluminous case for a specific item such as those listed on the form itself.

F. Color of Form.

In the event this form is used, it is suggested that it be printed on colored paper, either pink or green, in order to clearly distinguish itself.

DISADVANTAGES OF THIS FORM.

1. It would appear that the implementation of this form at this time would cause a file review to be made merely for the purpose of filling out this form, thus creating a situation which the form is intended to reduce. However, it is believed that this form could be utilized and filled out at the time of the next investigative or annual report preparation, at which time the case must be reviewed anyway.

2. This form would be of little benefit in field offices where—there are relatively few Security Index subjects and a small amount of activity on the part of the individual subjects, or in cases consisting of one or two volumes.



SYNOPSIS:

status of security work by analyzing the backlog of pending cases and delinquency in espionage, internal security, security matter and foreign intelligence cases in classifications 65, 100 and 105. Status of these cases as of August 31, 1956, is set forth herein.

In August, there was a decrease in pending active matters in the entire field in the security classifications from 17,389 to 16,243. Delinquent matters decreased from 1,703 to 1,472. The percentage of delinquent matters decreased from 9.2% to 9%.

-As reflected later herein, no office had a scilinguous in security classifications in excess of 20%, the highest delinquency recorded being that of the Miami Office at 18.3%. This represents the first instance since December, 1951, in which this has occurred. During the past year, the field has made excellent progress in reducing security delinquency as reflected by the over-all security delinquency of 22.6% as of August 31, 1955, as compared to the over-all security delinquency of 9% as of August 31, 1956.

RECOMMENDATION:

The field will continue to be followed closely regarding security delinquency and you will be advised of the results of the review of the September, 1956, administrative reports.

DETAILS:

The August, 1956, administrative reports from all offices reflect that the total pending active matters in classifications 65, 100 and 105 decreased from 17,389 to 16,243. The delinquent items decreased from 1,703 to 1,472. The percentage of delinquent matters decreased from 9.2% to 9%.

The following statistics reflect the status of pending work, including both pending active and pending inactive matters, and delinquency for all field divisions as of December 31, 1951, and the progress for the last four months.

After crossing the supervisor's Losk, the momorandum is routed to the Security Index Clerk who will maintain an unserialized file section of these documentation on individual subjects in alphabetical order. When a new documentation, is received for a subject, the clerk substitutes this for the old one When there is no change in a subject's status or no later documentation (cont'd)

Current practice or rule (include manual citation as well as facts): When proparing a Security report, an agent must review the main file on each individual to be documented.

1) In vica of the constant need for up-to-date documentation of Security Index subjects in Security reports, this procedure will assure availability.

2) It will save considerable agent time spent in file reviews to obtain such documentations each time a report is propared, inasmuch as the agent will find all necessary documentations in one file in alphabetical

3) It will save clerical time required to locate and obtain files otherwise needed for decumentation.

Disadvantages of suggostion:

It would take about two minutes more of the agent's time to dictate a memorandum if a new documentation is submitted when preparing a report.

SUGGESTION FOR FORM TO BE USED AS TOP SERIAL IN SECURITY INDEX CASES

(-11 PA) - " ReBu routing slip, 9/25/56 transmitting a proposed form which has been suggested as a top serial in security index cases in order to make readily available the location of certain pertinent serials in the file.

With respect to Item I on the proposed form, it is the consensus of opinion of Agents and Supervisors on security work that summary reports are readily located through means of the pink cover sheet and that the location of the annual reports presents no particular problem. The elimination of Item I is suggested.

With respect to Items 2 and 4 it has been suggested that a sub-line be added under each to indicate, in the case of key figures only, whether the photograph and handwriting specimens have been furnished to the Bureau.

It has been suggested that an item be added between items 9 and 10; namely, "Neighborhood Source or Plant Location Available."

Considerable question arises in connection with item 12 as to whether the indexing of pertinent names is concerned with the addition of current material to the file or whether it is contemplated that a complete page by page review would have to be made of each file at this time before the form can be inserted. It will be seen that with respect to files of several sections which have been in existence for a period of several years would present considerable problem from the standpoint of reviewing to see that all pertinent indexing had been done. It has been suggested that this item either be eliminated or clarified in the instructions for the use of the form.

It is believed that items 16 and 17 are unnecessary and add nothing to the form which would be of value to an Agent from reviewing the file. The inclusion

of these 2 items tends to make this a "super - check" list, which has a tendency to make the handling of security cases a mechanical operation; thus lessening the need for investigating initiative.

Several Agents have suggested that items 9 and 10 should be made optional depending upon the circumstances in each case. In this connection it is believed that this could be handled as a matter or good judgement and any item included in the form which was not of particular concern in an individual case could be marked 'not applicable."

It is believed that this form in security index cases would serve a very good purpose and would be of value particularly to Agents who were not so familiar with security-type work. Its adoption in some form, such as suggested by the revisions outlined above, is recommended.

It is pointed out that Attorney Counsel for San Juan Smith Act defendants, has not yet filed any motion for dismissal based on the basis of no clear and present danger. The information contained in referenced San Juan radiogram was obtained in the following manner.

On 9/27/56. Departmental Attorney that Acting U. S. Attorney advised SA had stated to him on the previous day that he, had been advised in confidence by U. S. District Court Judge had indicated to him, Judge in a private conversation in the Judge's chambers, that he was contomplating filing a motion for dismissal of the indictments of the san Juan Smith Act defendants based on the fact that no clear and present danger to the security of the country exists, and pointing out that the membership of the Fartido Comunista Puertorriqueno (Communist Party of Fuerto Rico) (PCP) is only 55 members.

The source of information is not available, nor is the criteria which he used to include persons as members of the PCP.

The best available estimates from SJ 233-S, SJ 239-S*, and SJ 346-S, all of whom have furnished reliable information in the past, indicates that the present membership of the PCP in fuerto Rico is 37. The criteria used for inclusion in this number is based upon qualifications of attendance at meetings, payment of dues, performance of duties assigned by the PCP, and statements from FCP officials naming such individuals as members.

The San Juan Division is attempting to determine the source of information as to the PCP membership. Informants are in the process of being recontacted to determine the accuracy of the total membership figure of 37. The mine the accuracy of the total membership figure of 37. Each month we follow the field closely on the status of security work by analyzing the backlog of pending cases and delinquency in espionage, internal security, security matter and foreign intelligence cases in classifications 65, 100 and 105. Status of these cases as of September 30, 1956, is set forth herein.

In September, there was an increase in pending active matters in the entire field in the security classifications from 16,243 to 16,257. Delinquent matters increased from 1,472 to 1,904. The percentage of delinquent matters increased from % to 11.7%.

Letters are being sent to the offices indicated by asteriete on pages four and five herein, commenting upon their delinquent condition and pointing out the necessity of bringing their security cases to a current status.

PRESENT PROCEDURE: Files must be reviewed to locate above items.

ADVANTAGES STATED: Suggester states that in the Seattle Division the average Security Index case consists of approximately six volumes. Form would be a ready reference to specific items contained in the case file. Suggester states that the form is not intended to eliminate file reviews, per sc.



Section 87-D of the Manual of Instructions requires the field to give particular attention to the obtaining of a photograph of a subject whose name is included in the Security Index. Further, once the photograph has been obtained, the field is instructed to continue to be alert for the existence of more recent photographs which may become available. Our instructions are, however, that these cases are not to be left in a pending status merely for the purpose of obtaining photographs and it merely for the observation of the Subversive Control Section has been the observation of the Subversive Control Section that, in some instances, reasonable efforts are not being exerted to obtain these photographs prior to closing cases.

Photographs are extremely valuable as an investilocative aid; means of identification, and would be of
limmeasurable value in the event the Emergency Detention
Program is invoked and we were required to apprehend all
Security Index subjects.

RECOMMENDATION:

In order to insure that the field is giving this matter appropriate attention, it is recommended that the administrative page of reports being submitted in these cases reflect that a suitable photograph is or is not available. If you agree, there is attached a proposed SAC letter and appropriate Manual change.



PRESENT PROCEDURE: When preparing a security report, the Agent preparing such report must review the main file on each individual if a documentation of the Security Index subject is to appear in the report. Documentations are not needed on some Security Index subjects.

SUGGESTION: Suggested that each time an Agent submits a Security report on a Security Index subject assigned to him, he will submit a memorandum containing the latest complete documentation of his subject. After the memorandum is reviewed by the supervisor, it should be placed in an unserialized file section and maintained in alphabetical order according to subjects names. It is further proposed that when a new documentation is prepared for the alphabetical file, the outdated memorandum will be removed. When there is no change in a the outdated memorandum will be removed. When there is no change in a subject's status or no later documentation written since last report, subject's status or no later documentation written since last report, the Agent need merely write a routing slip reflecting "No change in documentation" each time he submits a report.

Suggester states that for security purposes, the alphabetical file containing the documentaion of the subjects should be maintained under the same maximum security as afforded the Security Index Cards.

ADTANTAGES STATED: Suggested procedure will (1) assure availability of current documentation at all times, (2) save considerable Agent time spent in file reviews to obtain such documentation each time a report is prepared inasmuch as the Agent will find all necessary documentations in one file in alphabetical order, (3) save clerical time required to locate files needed for documentation.

DISADVANTAGES STATED: Suggested procedure would token approximately two minutes more of Agent's time to dictate a personadum if a new documentation is submitted when preparing a negarity.

OBSERVATIONS: SAC Newark, recommends the suggestion be adopted in large offices having a substantial number of persons on the Security Index. He feels the suggestion will save a substantial amount of Agent and clerical time.

Certain suggestions were considered and recommended at the Internal Security - Espionage Conference of 10/22-23/56.

Full details regarding these suggestions are contained in my memorandum of today dealing with this Conference. To implement the recommendations made, there is attached a proposed SAC letter. The items discussed therein are mentioned briefly below.

1. Report Writing (Individuals)

The Conference recommended that, in connection with security investigations, when an individual is reported in attendance at numerous routine meetings of a subversive organization by an informant, such repetitious meetings not be set out in detail but that the field be allowed to "lump" the meetings by utilizing a summary statement.

2. Documentation of Organizations in Security Reports

We currently document organizations mentioned in security reports immediately following the first instance in which the organization is mentioned in the details. The Conference recommended that such documentation be included in an appendix immediately following the details of the report. In this matter, the field would be permitted to mimeograph or otherwise mechanically reproduce lengthy documentation of organizations for attachment to security reports.

3. Communist Index

The Conference recognized that the Communist Index presently in the field is unwieldy and of little value and suggested steps that should be taken to revitalize this Index to make it a true reservoir of cases that should be considered for investigative attention in the event we should, during the time of an emergency, apprehend those individuals included in the Security Index.

4. Security Informants

- A. The Conference recommended that we maintain flash notices posted in the Identification Division against an informant's fingerprints for one year after an informant is discontinued.
- B. The Conference recommended that the Bureau issue instructions that leads to obtain background information on potential security informants should be covered within 30 days.
- C. The Conference recommended that, when contacts are made under the Security Informant Program to determine whether an individual will cooperate, the Agents be allowed to continue the interview concerning that individual's own activities provided he indicates a desire to cooperate at that time and has been at any time in the past a member of a basic revolutionary organization.



BELINQUENCY IN SECURITY INVESTIGATIONS

SYNOFSIS:

Each month we follow the field closely on the status of security work by analyzing the backlog of pending cases and delinquency in espionage, internal pending cases and delinquency in espionage, internal security, security matter and foreign intelligence cases in classifications 65, 100 and 105. Status of these in classifications 65, 100 and 105. Status of these cases as of October 31, 1956, is set forth herein.

In October, there was a decrease in pending active matters in the entire field in the security classifications from 16,257 to 15,979. Delinquent matters decreased from 1,904 to 1,446. The percentage of delinquent matters decreased from 11.7% to 9%.

Letters are being sent to the offices indicated by asterisks on pages four and five herein, communiting upon their delinquent condition and pointing out the necessity of bringing their security cases to a current status.

RECOMMENDATION:

The field will continue to be followed closely regarding security delinquency and you will be advised of the results of the review of the November, 1956, administrative reports.

TETAILS:

from all offices reflect that the total pending active matters in classifications 65, 100 and 105 decreased from 16,257 to 15,979. The delinquent items decreased from 1,904 to 1,446. The percentage of delinquent matters decreased from 11.7% to 9%.

Instructions contained in SAC Letter 56-56 (L) dated 10/30/56 dealing with the subject matters indicated below necessitate numerous changes in Section 87 C and D, Section 107 of the Manual of Instructions, and Part I of the FBI Handbook.

Report writing -- Authorizing the field to set forth in a summarizing statement the subject's attendance at numerous routine meetings of a subversive organization at which the subject is not reported as having taken an active part therein and nothing transpires that is pertinent to set forth in a report on the individual.

Documentation of organizations in security reports -Authorizing the field to set out documentation of subversive
organizations other than those cited by the Attorney General
under Executive Order 10450 as an appendix to reports and
further sutherizing the field to mimeograph or otherwise
mechanically reproduce the documentation for organizations
frequently referred to by it in security reports.

Communist Index -- Instructions were contained in referenced SAC Letter with regard to revitalizing the present Communist Index in order that it would more accurately reflect the names of persons who should be continually borne in mind from the standpoint of the security of the nation with a view toward possible investigation, interrogation or action at some future date.

4. Security informants -a. Instructions with regard to the retention of flash notices for one year following discontinuance.

b. Instructions that leads to obtain background information of potential security informants are to be handled by auxiliary offices within 30 days.



(I) SECURITY INVESTIGATIONS OF INDIVIDUALS - PHOTOGRAPHS OF SECURITY INDEX SUBJECTS -- Current Bureau instructions are that all logical leads must be covered in an attempt to obtain photographs of subjects of Security Index cards during the course of your investigation of these subjects.

Effective immediately, the administrative page of reports in Security Index cases should contain a statement with regard to the existence of a suitable photograph.

(L) SECURITY INVESTIGATIONS -- In response to certain suggestions made by field representatives at the Internal Security - Espionage Conference held at the Seat of Government, October 22 - 23, 1956, the following instructions are to be placed into effect immediately:

A. Report Writing (Individuals)

In connection with security investigations of individuals, it frequently occurs that an informant will report a subject's attendance at numerous routine meetings of a subversive organization over the space of a few months. At many of these meetings, the subject is not reported as having taken an active part therein and nothing transpires that is pertinent to set out in a report on the individual concerned.

Effective immediately, items of this nature may be set forth in investigative reports on individuals in a summarizing statement to the effect that "T-l advised on various dates from June - October, 1956, that the subject was in attendance at 25 meetings of the National Council of American-Soviet Friendship between the dates June 1 and October 1, 1956." The reliability of the informant should. of course, be set forth in accordance with current Bureau instructions.

Information reported in the above manner will be documented on the administrative pages by setting forth (1) the identity of the source, (2) the period of activity involved, i.e., June 1 - October 1, 1956, and (3) the file number and serial scope reflecting location of informant's original reports covering meetings in question.

This procedure is being set up to avoid detailed specific reporting of repetitious meetings of routine nature. It in no way removes responsibility from the field to report all items of pertinence to the Bureau, bearing in mind the fact that Bureau files must be complete insofar as matters of substance are concerned. Information tending to establish a subject's knowledge of the Information aims and purposes of the subversive organization with revolutionary aims and purposes of the subversive organization with which he is affiliated must be specifically reported in detail.

B. Documentation of Organizations in Security Reports

In connection with security reports, it has been the practice to include the documentation of organizations mentioned therein immediately following the first instance in which such organization is referred to in the report.

Effective immediately, the documentation of organizations a mentioned in security reports, other than organizations cited by the Attornev General under the provisions of Executive Order 10450,

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will appear as an appendix to the report.

Each organization will be documented on separate sheets of paper and, for this purpose, each office will mimeograph or otherwise mechanically reproduce the documentation for organizations frequently referred to by it in security reports. You will utilize the Bureau-approved thumbnail sketch. These items of documentation should be set up in the appendix in alphabetical order and this appendix will, of course, be disseminated along with the main body of the report.

It will be unnecessary to attribute the documentation to a particular source. You should, however, indicate the degree of reliability of the source in accordance with current Bureau practice. The administrative page of the report will reflect the symbol number or identity of the source, followed by the name of the organization being documented.

You will document those organizations cited by the Attorney General under Executive Order 10450 by setting forth a statement to that effect in the details of the report in accordance with current Bureau practice.

C. Communist Index

The Communist Index, which was established a number of years ago, has grown unwieldy and is serving very little purpose today. In order that we may obtain maximum benefit from this Index, you should take the following steps, utilizing those Security Index cards which have been cancelled by application of the revised Security Index criteria since April, 1955, as a base:

l. Add Communist Index cards to the above on individuals currently under investigation when, following completion thereof, the information developed does not justify the inclusion of the subject's name in the Security Index when there is evidence of:

a. Membership in a basic revolutionary organization over five years ago, together with some indication of continuing sympathy for the communist movement within the past five years and no reliable evidence of defection.

c. Leadership in a substantial capacity in a major subversive front group over three years ago, together with some evidence of continuing activity or sympathy for the subversive cause within the past three years and no reliable evidence of disaffection.

and/or activity, together with evidence of sympathy for the subversive cause or antagonism toward the present form of Government not warranting placing on the Security Index.

- 2. Review those cases opened and subsequently closed without the subject's names being included in the Security Index since April 15, 1955, and include in the Communist Index the names of those individuals falling in the above categories.
- 3. Include in this Index the names of individuals deleted from the Security Index in the future by application of the Security Index criteria.

This Index should represent those persons, who should be continually borne in mind from the standpoint of the security of the country with a view toward possible investigation, interrogation or action at some future date. It should serve as an administrative aid and working index, reflecting a central repository of the names of individuals having sympathy or affiliation with the Communist Party or other basic revolutionary groups.

Each card should contain as a minimum the following:

- _l. Name and aliases.
 - 2. Office file number.

- 3. Membership and position or association in the subversive group or groups, together with the source and date of the information.
- 4. Residence.
- 5. Citizenship
- 6. Employment.

The Index card should be prepared on 5 x ô inch plain white cards and should be maintained alphabetically. However, if you desire to utilize it as an investigative aid, it may be set up by geographical area in conformance with your integrated investigative system. This should be done only with Bureau concurrence.

When the above steps have been taken, destroy the remaining cards presently contained in your Communist Index.

Expend no investigative or administrative efforts to keep the cards in an up-to-date status. However, destroy all cards on individuals who subsequently become security informants or sources, or subjects of Security Index cards.

You should advise the Bureau when the above has been accomplished. If not completed within 60 days, submit a status letter.

RE: SECURITY INFORMANTS

A. Flash notices

So that personal difficulties of former informants will come to the field's attention, retain flash notices for one year following discontinuance. It is your responsibility to insure that these notices are cancelled at that time or that the Bureau is advised as to why you deem it desirable to continue the flash notice.

B. Investigation of Potential Informants

To expedite background investigation of potential informants, leads to obtain such information must be handled by auxiliary offices within 30 days.

C. Security Informant Program .

SAC Letter 56-34 sets forth circumstances whereby individuals may be interviewed to determine whether they will cooperate. Under authority of this SAC letter it was not permissible to discuss Under authority of this SAC letter it was not permissible to discuss the individuals background with them but the sole purpose of the contacts was to enable the interviewing Agents to determine whether the persons being interviewed might be cooperative. Effective immediately when making such approaches if the individuals have been immediately when making such approaches if the individuals have been members of a basic revolutionary organization and indicate they might cooperate they may be questioned during the initial contact about their own activities in order to further ascertain the extent to which they will cooperate.

Also in conducting interviews under this program if more than one contact is necessary to determine the individuals' degree of cooperation, such recontacts may be made upon the original authorizations. No attempt should be made to develop such individuals as informants or to direct their activities as potential uals as informants until the investigation required by Section 107 of the informants until the investigation required by Section 107 of the Manual of Instructions has been conducted and Bureau authority obtained.
