OF INDIVIDUALIS - OF AL

SYNOPSIS:

Each month we follow the field closely on the status of security work by analyzing the backlog of pending cases and delinquency in espionage, internal security, security matter and foreign intelligence cases in classifications 65, 100 and 105. Status of these cases as of April 30, 1957, is set forth herein.

In April, there was an increase in pending active matters in the entire field in the security classifications from 16,128 to 16,441. Delinquent matters decreased from 1,922 to 1,570. The percentage of delinquent matters decreased from 11.9% to 9.5%.

Letters are being sent to the offices indicated by asterisks on page five herein, commenting upon their delinquency and pointing out the necessity of bringing their security cases to a current status.

#### RECOMMENDATION:

The field will continue to be followed closely regarding security delinquency and you will be advised of the results of the review of the May, 1957, administrative reports.

#### DETAILS:

**Tot**al

The April, 1957, administrative reports from all offices reflect that the total pending active matters in classifications 65, 100 and 105 increased from 16,128 to:16,441. The delinquent items decreased from 1,922 to 1,570. The percentage of delinquent items decreased from 11:9% to 9.5%.

(I) SECURITY INDEX -- Section 87-D of the Manual of Instructions specifies conditions under which a subject's name should be considered for inclusion in the Security Index when he resorts to the Fifth Amendment when appearing as a witness before a governmental body.

In all instances when information is brought to your attention that the subject of a security investigation, past or present, whose name is not included in the Security Index, appears before a congressional committee and resorts to the Fifth Amendment when questioned directly concerning present membership in a subversive organization or when such question calls for a response to past membership in such organization, the case on such individual should be thoroughly reviewed by you with a view toward determining whether the act of seeking refuge in the Fifth Amendment would bring the subject within the Security Index criteria as set forth in Section 87-D of the Manual of Instructions. It is not the Bureau's intent that all such cases be reopened for active investigation, rather, that they be considered on the basis of information presently available.

Submit your recommendation to the Bureau for or against the inclusion of the subject's name in the Security Index in each instance.

Attached suggestion of SA of
Detroit Office, recommends that a form be prepared which
would be the top serial of all Security Index cases, this
top serial to contain ten items of background data. SAC
of Detroit recommends that adoption of this suggestion
be given serious consideration.

Similar suggestions have been made in the past, the most recent being that of SA of Seattle, Suggestion #124-57. At that time, comments of the SACs, Newark, New York and WFO were requested as to the feasibility of the utilization of this form. Newark recommended adoption with certain modifications. New York and WFO recommended against adoption. Domestic Intelligence Division recommended against adoption.

From a review of the suggested form submitted by SA it would appear that a great deal of effort would be made to keep the information contained thereon up to date. For example, the form calls for such information as the make, year and color of automobile or automobiles of subject and spouse and current license number.

SAC feels that this form would be useful on surveillances. However, it would appear that the administrative efforts expended to keep the form up to date would far outweigh any advantages to be gained by the adoption thereof.

## Recommendations and comments of Division Head:

It is recommended that the adoption of this form be given serious consideration and that each office be allowed to make its own decision as to whether or not the form is adaptable to the needs of that particular office.

Past experience of this office has revealed that on frequent occasions, a Subject or his vehicle is spotted on a surveillance, or during the course of a surveillance it is desired to check out the residence and/or employment of a particular Subject. If the particular Agent on the surveillance is not thoroughly familiar with the Subject, delays are possible, inasmuch as the information desired is not immediately available. On occasions, such as at night or on weekends, the information mentioned above is needed but for security reasons, the security index cards are not readily available. It has been the practice of this office in the past to conduct surveillances on known or suspected CP meetings, as well as the more important CP leaders. These surveillances have lead to other Subjects, and it is usually desired that the identity of additional Subjects be established as quickly as possible. The above form would assist in establishing these identities. The above information would also be of assistance in setting up surveillances and conducting other investigations in connection with individual Subjects.

If such a form was adopted, it is proposed that the form would be kept—in a current status by noting the changes of information obtained from neighborhood sources, confidential sources, and other available sources on a continuing basis, as well as information obtained while verifying the Subject's residence and employment by FD-154, and at the time annual or semi-annual reports are submitted. It is believed that by utilizing this procedure, an undue amount of Agent time would not be expended, and that the form would serve a useful, practical purpose.

#### ADDENDUA

It is believed that this purging of channelized memoranda should be limited, at first at least to SI subject case files since these cases all have had surmary reports prepared. On the other hand, it is believed that channelized memoranda should not be purged from security-type cases of individuals not now in the Security Index, inassuen as the possibility exists that these channelized memoranda would be necessary for the preparation of a summary-type report in the future. It is our copinion that once the charmelized memoranda have been properly utilized and included in a subsequent report, the channelized memoranda then lose their value to the particular case as compared to the excessive urawer space utilized by these voluminous case files. Purging the case file of these memoranda does not deprive the particular case file of any of the information originally contained therein, inasmuch as each report by cover letter carries the administrative information as to the location of the original informant report in the office files of the informant. Further, the "A" file of the security informant will continue to maintain an identical copy of the purged channelized memoranda. To illustrate this space problem, suppose six different security informants report information concerning a "People's World" fund-raising function at which fifty S.I. subjects were in attendance. Each channelized memorangum of each informant's report would probably require at least two pages, and therefore each case file would contain twelve pages of channelized memoranda. Once this event and the subject's participation thereat has been reported in a report, these channelized memoranda could be destroyed without depriving the case file of any of the information previously contained therein.

Inasmuch as security-type reports were prepared with the location of the original informant's report in the administrative section at the time of the inauguration of the summary report project on all Security Index subjects in 1954, it is believed that all charmelized memoranda which contained information already and subsequently incorporated in a subsequent report could be purged as far back in the S.I. subject's case files as the summary report. Again, this purge should be limited to only those charmelized memoranda used in the preparation of a report.

This purging system should not include channelized memoranda based on information from Misur, Tesur, Fisur, or other sources, but should be limited to only live security informants and their reports.

This purging system would not raise any problem with reference to perializing, since at the time of purging a charge-out also could be placed on the top serial of the volume indicating to the result of the result

By such a system of purging, it is believed that vast amounts of drawer and cabinet space could be saved throughout the field offices and would improve the efficiency of security-type investigations. Estimates of space savings are set out below.

Channelized memoranda normally are not used for indexing and they are practically never referred to after the information contained therein has been included in a report in the individual case file. If reference to a particular destroyed channelized memorandum is needed, the administrative section of the report immediately indicates the location of the original informant notes. Further, the exhibit envelope containing the informant's notes also contains a notation indicating the serial number or the channelized memorandum in the informant's "A" file.

An examination of some individual case files reveals that by such a purging system the case files could be reduced to one-third their present size.

- 1. A review was made of only the last five volumes of the multi-volume case file entitled

  Seattle file 100-12883, who is carried as a Key Figure in the Seattle S.I. The following observations were noted:
- A. In its present form, the last five volumes of this case file alone measures 62 inches in depth, including file covers.
- B. If channelized memoranda used in the preparation of reports in this case file were purged, 717 pages of paper would be eliminated. These (1) pages measure approximately 3 3/4 inches, which would amount to a saving of 3 3/4 inches of space in five volumes.
  - C. A cabinet drawer permits 24 inches of usable space and, conservatively estimating, it is believed that a cabinet drawer normally accommodates 21 volumes of security-type case files. Therefore, it is estimated that in a full drawer approximately 15 1/2 inches of space would be saved if such specialized files were purpose of channelized memoranda as described above.

space, and conservatively estimating, it is believed that a full drawer of similar type case files with —the same type of purging would eliminate 10 1/2 inches of space now used. Thus, a saving of 16 1/2 inches of space would be saved in each drawer. It is noted that the savings in this review compare most favorably with the estimate made in example No. 1 above.

At the present time, the Seattle Office has 384 S.I. subjects, and it is estimated that each case file would average about four volumes per subject. With 384 S.I. subjects, it is then estimated that S.I. subject's case files number 1,536 volumes. Considering 21 volumes per cabinet drawer. it is estimated that S.I. subject case files take up 73 cabinet drawers, or 14.5 cabinet If 16 inches or 2/3 of each cabinet drawer space could be saved through this purging system, it is estimated that in the Seattle Office alone 9.5 cabinets could be saved now. Since each cabinet costs about \$66.30, it is believed that \$629.85 could be saved if this purging system were put into effect. Considerable other savings would result as this purging system is put on a continuing basis after the submission of a report on each S.I. subject. On a Bureau-wide basis this savings would be considerable, not only from a monetary scandpoint but from a space standpoint.

As time progresses, space allotted for case files becomes more critical when considered with the rapid growth of security-type case files, as compared with other classifications. At the present time in the Seattle Office there are 530 cabinot drawers being used in the closed section for 100-classification only, while 850 cabinot drawers are presently being used in the closed section for all other classifications. The 100-classification files now occupy 35 per cent of the closed file space, and this 38 per cent is the most rapid-growing section of the entire closed file section.

1.

As for as the Seattle Office is concerned, the cost of office spuss is \$3.10 per square foot per year, and 2,287 square

feet of space is alloted to cabinet space consumption at the cost of \$7,089.70 per year. It is estimated that each cabinet plus sufficient space for opening the drawers consumes nearly a square feet of space, and therefore each cabinet saved could save about \$12.00 per year. Saving cabinet space does not immediately bring about a savings to the office involved, but it could have a bearing in the long run when an office cutgrows its present space and requires an additional floor or rooms. The acquisition of new floor space costs large sums of money, and at the same time increases additional security problems, etc.

Office security file situation ranks about 8th or 9th in size within the Bureau, and therefore there is bound to be more savings in the larger offices in the Bureau.

## Other Administrative Matters to be Considered

Channelized memoranda meeting all other purging qualifications should not be purged if one of the following exists:

- A. Containing a notation indicating an 0-1 form has been received, etc.
- B. Containing notation for opening and assigning case, or other administrative notation.
- C. Containing any indexing.

It is believed that purging should be the responsibility of the reporting agent, who could make notations of serials to be purged on the indices search slip which must be filed in the case file when a report is submitted. The CCO could then nurse the file as indicated, and make proper notation on a green charge-out slip for each file from which channelized memoranda were purged.

This suggestion is being submitted in the interest of economy to the Dureau and with the thought of possible streamlining of a Bureau procedure.

# Recommendations and Comments of Division Head

With the ever-increasing problem of file drawer space and the simplerly increasing cost not only for cabinets but also and the simplerly increasing dost not only for eachieus but also for flore area, I fool that the Bureau should consider the suggestion of these two agents very, very carefully. #### SYNOPSIS:

Each month we follow the field closely on the status of security work by analyzing the backlog of pending cases and delinquency in espionage, internal security, security matter and foreign intelligence cases in classifications 65, 100 and 105. Status of these cases as of July 31, 1957, is set forth herein.

In July, there was a decrease in pending active matters in the entire field in the security classifications from 15,915 to 15,407. Delinquent matters decreased from 1,798 to 1,734. The percentage of delinquent matters remained at 11.3%.

Letters are being sent to the offices indicated by asterisks on pages four and five herein commenting upon their delinquency and pointing out the necessity of bringing their security cases to a current status.

#### RECOMMENDATION:

The field will continue to be followed closely regarding security delinquency and you will be advised of the results of the review of the August, 1957, administrative reports.

#### DETAILS:

Total

24,762

The July, 1957, administrative reports from all offices reflect that the total pending active matters in classifications 65, 100 and 105 decreased from 15,915 to 15,407. The delinquent items decreased from 1,798 to 1,734. The percentage of delinquent items remained at 11.3%.

The following statistics reflect the status of pending work, including both pending active and pending inactive matters, and delinquency for all field divisions as of December 31, 1951, and the progress for the last four months.

SUGGESTION: That all channelized memoranda emanating from security informants' reports be purged from Security Index oubjects' case files inflowing the submission of a summary type or annual type report which contains the necessary information concerning the particular subject and the reported event.

PRESENT PROCEDURE: Section 107G, Manual of Instructions, requires that all information reported by an informant, orally or written, must be made a matter of record, properly indexed, evaluated and channel ized.

ADVANTAGES STATED: Will keep individual case files from becoming bulky and voluminous and thereby resulting in considerable savings in filing space.

DISADVANTAGES STATED: Information concerning other persons attending a certain function with the particular subject is not readily available in the subject's case file. The suggesters believe that this information is needed only on rare occasions, such as when a subject is interviewed and it is desired to question him about persons he should know.

Seattle, recommends that the Bureau considerable this suggestion in light of the ever-increasing problem of filing space and the similarly increasing cost of file cabinets and flock space.

Domestic Intelligence and Training and Inspection Divisions recommend unfavorably. Variations of this suggestion have been considered unfavorably on several occasions in the past. The Executives Conference on 7/6/53 considered Suggestion #272-53 which called for the removal and destruction of channelizing memoranda after the reports had been parted incorporating pertinent contents thereof. SYNOPSIS: Security Index-Gentle

Each month we follow the field closely on the status of security work by analyzing the backlog of pending cases and delinquency in espionage, internal security, security matter and foreign intelligence cases in classifications 65, 100 and 105. Status of these cases as of August 31, 1957, is set forth herein.

In August, there was a decrease in pending active matters in the entire field in the security classifications from 15,407 to 15,111. Delinquent matters decreased from 1,734 to 1,463. The percentage of delinquent matters decreased from 11.3% to 9.6%.

Letters are being sent to the offices indicated by asterisks on pages four and five herein commenting upon their delinquency and pointing out the necessity of bringing their security cases to a current status.

#### RECOMMENDATION:

The field will continue to be followed closely regarding security delinquency and you will be advised of the results of the review of the September, 1957, administrative reports.

Total

The August, 1957, administrative reports from all offices reflect that the total pending active matters in classifications 65, 100 and 105 decreased from 15,407 to 15,111. The delinquent items decreased from 1,734 to 1,463. The percentage of delinquent items decreased from 11.3% to 9.6%.

Current instructions call for the field to analyze cases of Security Index (SI) subjects twice yearly with a view toward determining whether their activities are such as to warrant their continued retention in the SI. This is done at the semiannual verification of residence and employment and at the time the annual report is submitted. With the annual report, the field must state that "the case has been re-evaluated in the light of the SI criteria and the subject continues to fall within such criteria" or that, if the case for does not meet the criteria, a letter has been directed to the Bureau recommending cancellation of the SI card.

Although the field is complying with the above provision, \
recent incidents have made it apparent that, in a number of instances, thorough analyses have not been made of these cases, resulting in recommendations by the field for the continued retention of a subject's name in the SI when, in fact, the information developed regarding his activities did not warrant such action.

In order to further impress upon the field the absolute necessity of critically analyzing these cases and to insure that such is done, it is believed desirable at this time to restate the Bureau's position by an SAC letter and, further, to require the field, in addition to setting forth a statement that an individual still meets the criteria for retention in the SI, to set forth in a concise statement the exact basis for its recommendation.

By memorandum dated 2/24/54, the Department was furnished the identities of former Security Index (SI) subjects then serving in the Armed Forces and was advised that, upon the induction into the armed services of subjects listed in our SI, we deleted their names armed services of subjects listed in our SI, we deleted their names therefrom since under the Delimitations Agreement the military services at that point assume complete responsibility for such indiviservices at that time, we have advised the Internal Security Division duals. Since that time, we have advised the Internal Security Division of the Department by memorandum in each case when an SI subject entered the armed services. In addition, we disseminate to the Records Administration Branch a copy of a closing report showing the subject's entrance into the military.

#### OBSERVATIONS:

It appears that no real purpose is served in informing the Internal Security Division of the Department by memorandum of a subject's entrance into the military service except in those cases in which the Department has previously reviewed and approved the subject's name for the SI. It is believed that the transmittal of a closing report reflecting a subject's entrance into a branch of the armed services to the Records Administration Branch should suffice with the exception mentioned above.

### RECOMMENDATION:

That we advise the Internal Security Division of the Department of a subject's entrance into the armed services by memorandum only when the case has previously been approved by the Department for inclusion in the SI, such advice to be coupled with our routine memorandum informing of the deletion of his name from the SI. We will, of course, continue to forward closing reports reflecting a subject's entrance into the military service.

status of security work by analyzing the backlog of pending cases and delinquency in sepionage, internal security, security matter and foreign intelligence cases in classifications 05, 100 and 105. Status of these cases as of October 31, 1957, is set forth herein.

In October, there was an increase in pending active matters in the entire field in the security classifications from 15,044 to 15,069. Delinquent matters decreased from 1,694 to 1,334. The percentage of delinquent matters decreased from 10.8% to 3.5%.

Letters are being sent to the offices indicated by asterishs on page five herein commenting upon their delinquency and pointing out the necessity of bringing their security cases to a current status.
