SAC Letter 56-56 (L), 10-30-56, set up procedures for the Communist Index (CI). The purpose was to eliminate cases which had no substance and to establish a reservoir of subjects who, in the light of ever-changing conditions, should continually be borne in mind with a view toward possible future investigations under the Security Index (SI) Program. The Communist Index Program has been followed closely. It is now the correct time to give closer consideration to each of these individual cases because of the present international tensions coupled with the planned reconstitution of the Communist Party (CP) around newly developed issues. Analysis and investigation of each of these cases should be most productive in the development of informants; in the development of new evidence to strengthen the SI; and the identification of subjects who, while they have dropped from the CP in a bookkeeping sense on the basis of the Khrushchev revelations, still retain a militant communist attitude.

The Washington Field, Newark, and New York Offices were contacted and advised they have, respectively, 360, 670, and 4600 CI cases. Each of these three offices advised they considered this a most desirable program. The reopening and investigation of these cases will be made in equal monthly divisions for one year. We are instructing the field to submit statistics and accomplishments quarterly. This program will be followed closely and completed 10-15-59.

SUBJECT: DELINQUENCY IN SECURITY INVESTIGATIONS

Index - General ✓

SYNOPSIS:

Each month we follow the field closely on the status of security work by analyzing the backlog of pending cases and delinquency in espionage, internal security, security matter and foreign intelligence cases in classifications 65, 100 and 105. Status of these cases as of September 30, 1958, is set forth herein.

In September, there was an increase in pending active matters in the entire field in the security classifications from 14,327 to 14,512. Delinquent matters decreased from 1,439 to 1,285. The percentage of delinquent matters decreased from 10% to 8.9%.

Letters are being sent to the offices indicated by asterisks on page five herein, commenting on their delinquency and pointing out the necessity of bringing their security cases to a current status.

RECOMMENDATION:

The field will continue to be followed closely regarding security delinquency and you will be advised of the results of the review of the October, 1958, administrative reports.

DETAILS:

The September, 1958, administrative reports from all offices reflect that the total pending active matters in classifications 65, 100 and 105 increased from 14,327 to 14,512. Delinquent items decreased from 1,439 to 1,285. The percentage of delinquent items decreased from 10% to 8.9%.

The following statistics reflect the status of pending work, including both pending active and pending inactive matters, and delinquency for all field divisions for the last four months.

SUGGESTION: That Security Index (SI) cards be kept in Kardex Vertical File (Visible Index); that the colored tabs used in alphabetical section to designate Detcom (emergency detention program) be eliminated, as under new system word Detcom could be seen at a glance; that Bureau furnish only two copies of SI cards to field; and that SI cards be printed on blank white, 5" x 8" cards. (Suggestion was received on 9/15/58 and a letter of thanks acknowledging it was sent on 9/17/58. Suggestion was referred to Domestic Intelligence Division and a thorough study and detailed analysis has been made as summarized below.)

CURRENT PROCEDURE: SI cards kept in file drawers; geographical card (showing location of SI subject) is stapled to description card; colored tab on SI card designates a Detcom subject; three SI cards are furnished to field for each subject; such cards are now printed on 5" x 9" cards which are blank on one side and reverse side printed so description of subject may be filled in the designated spaces thereon.

ADVANTAGES STATED: Would not be necessary to remove SI cards from Kardex File except when new cards are received with changes; no need to staple description card to geographical card; stapling of cards requires time and tends to cause SI cards to catch on to each other and damage cards; descriptions could be more accessible in that card would not have to be removed from index; counting the number of SI subjects or counting by geographical breakdown could be accomplished more efficiently.

DISADVANTAGES STATED: New SI cards and Kardex Vertical holders would have to be furnished to each office; costs would vary depending on number of SI subjects in each office; however, costs would be offset by the advantages stated.

OBSERVATIONS: SAC, Newark believes suggestion to be sound and proposed that one or two offices try it.

Domestic Intelligence Division has studied suggestion and recommends against adoption for following reasons: (1) system would not be workable at Seat of Government as filing and handling SI cards would not be possible in view

of alias cards on SI subjects which are maintained here; (2) SI cards are prepared with true name printed across top of card, followed by other statistical data, i. e., citizenship, etc. If suggestion adopted, the IBM machine used to prepare SI contacts could not run one set of cards for field use and a second set for use at Seat of Government; (3) currently all spaces on top line are utilized to fullest extent and some proposed items could not be added thereto, for example, the word Detcom could not be added to the items; (4) suggester proposes that geographical index cards and descriptive data and photograph of individuals not be physically attached. - Geographical cards will be the operating cards in event of emergency and are the ones which will be handed to apprehending Agents. Therefore, it is definitely believed that the description and photograph of subject should be securely attached to SI card; (5) suggester proposes alphabetical SI cards be prepared manually on typewriter in field offices which would entail additional work for an operation which is easily, accurately and quickly done on IBM machine; (6) Kardex system would be unwieldy in offices having large number of SI subjects; and (7) suggestion does not encompass any provision for geographical breakdown of the Geographical Section of SI cards, nor does it provide for breakdown on Detcom subjects, the special section of index or other breakdowns.

Relative to [REDACTED] proposal that SI cards be printed on plain white, 5" x 8" cards, Domestic Intelligence Division opposes adoption. It is to be noted that SI cards are prepared with a printed list of descriptive items on the back of the card and such items should continue on the cards as the field office, when it receives the initial SI card, types the descriptive data on the back of the card. Further, if SI card is subsequently amended, the old card is attached to the back of the new card, thus eliminating the retyping of the descriptive data, as it will show on the back of the SI card. It was concluded that it is of value to the field to have descriptive items appear on the back of the SI card.

RECOMMENDATION: That suggestion not be adopted. No further action required as suggester has been thanked by letter 9/17/58.

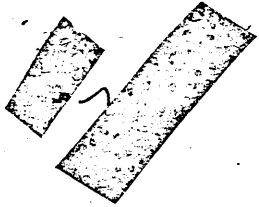
DOMESTIC INTELLIGENCE DIVISION

The Domestic Intelligence Division recommends against adoption of this suggestion for the following reasons:

- 1) The system would not be workable at the Seat of Government as the filing and handling of cards by the Kardex File System at the Seat of Government would be impossible because of alias cards.
- 2) Security Index (SI) cards are presently set up with the true name printed across the top of the card, along with certain other statistical data, such as citizenship status, tabbings for Detcom, key figure, etc., followed on succeeding lines by aliases, key facility number if any, residence and employment addresses. The suggestion proposes that this procedure be reversed. The IBM machine could not run a card for the field as proposed in this suggestion and, subsequently, run the card for the Seat of Government under the present system.
- 3) All spaces on the IBM machine on the top line are currently utilized to the fullest extent and some of the items encompassed in the suggestion could not be added thereto. For example, there are not enough spaces to spell out the word "Detcom" as suggested. In addition, the suggestion does not allow spaces for such items as office of origin, key figure or top functionary tabbing.
- 4) The suggestion proposes that the geographical Index card and the descriptive data and the photograph of the individual not be physically attached. The geographical SI cards will be the operating cards in the event of an emergency; ~~that is,~~ ^{these are} the ones that will be handed to apprehending Agents. It is definitely believed that the description and photograph of a subject should be securely attached to the SI card to which it pertains.
- 5) The suggestion proposes that the alphabetical SI card be prepared manually by typewriter in the field office. This would certainly entail additional work for an operation that can be easily, accurately and quickly accomplished on the IBM machine.

6) It is believed that the Kardex System would be unwieldy in those offices having a large number of SI subjects.

7) The suggestion does not encompass any provision for the geographical breakdown of the Geographical Section of the SI. It does not provide for the breakdown dealing with Detcom subjects, the Special Section of the SI, or other special breakdowns, such as Unavailable and Out of the Country.

Those included thereon as "Sympathetic to Communist China" have printed on the cards immediately under the master name on the left-hand margin of the card a small letter "k." The cards bearing the letter "k" have not been forwarded to the field. However, they have been so tabbed at the Bureau for ready identification.

You listed in referenced letter names of those individual Security Index subjects either of Chinese extraction or regarded as sympathetic to communist China. Bureau records reflect that you failed to list among the "Other - Chinese" Bureau file and as "Sympathetic to Communist China" Bureau file

SUBJECT: SECURITY INVESTIGATIONS OF INDIVIDUALS

The Independent Socialist League (ISL), a revolutionary socialist organization based on the theories of Marx, Engels and Lenin as interpreted by Leon Trotsky, was removed from the list of organizations designated by the Attorney General under EO 10450 on 7/18/58. Following this action, we advised the Department by letter of 8/4/58 that the Security Index (SI) contained the names of individual members of the ISL based on information developed regarding their affiliation with and activities in that organization. We further advised that we would continue to conduct investigations of individual members and in those instances in which information developed warranted such action their names would be included in the SI.

The ISL has now dissolved (approximately 9/15/58) and has merged with the Socialist Party - Socialist Democratic Federation (SP-SDF) which was not a subversive organization and not under Bureau investigation. Individual members of the ISL were urged to join the SP-SDF. However, by reason of the merger of the two organizations, the ISL members did not automatically become members of the SP-SDF. Following this merger, instructions were sent on 10/2/58 to pertinent offices instructing that investigation of local branches of the ISL be closed out when such branches actually dissolved and that no active investigation be conducted of the new organization without prior Bureau authority. ISL informants have been instructed to join the new organization in efforts to determine its aims and purposes, as well as any name change which may result, and after the aims and purposes are ascertained and the organization's character has been determined, consideration is to be given as to whether further investigation of the organization should be conducted.

These individual members of the ISL whose names are included on the SI are there because of evidence developed indicating that they represent a potential threat to the internal security of the country in the event of emergency. However, since the dissolution of the organization and its merger with the SP-SDF, an organization we are not investigating at this time, the following recommendations are made with respect to individual investigations of former members of the ISL.

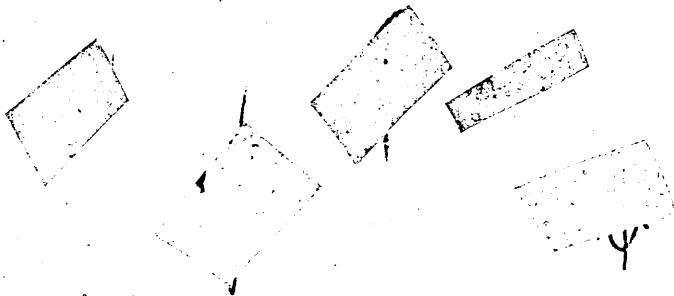
RECOMMENDATIONS:

1) That reports submitted in the cases of these subjects be continued under the caption "Internal Security - ISL" or "Security Matter - ISL," as the case may be.

2) That the field, in following the activities of these subjects, be particularly alert for development of any information that would have a bearing on the subject's SI status, either for removal or retention, with specific attention being afforded to the developing and reporting of revolutionary statements and activities on the subject's part that would indicate a continued threat to the internal security of the country.

3) That the field be instructed to use care in the continued active investigation of these individuals in order to avoid any possible charge that we are investigating the SP-SDF.

Since March, 1953, we have been investigating functionaries or leaders of the Nation of Islam, members of the military section of this organization known as the Fruit of Islam, and active participants carrying out fanatical and disloyal aims and purposes of the organization. At that time, there were nine temples located throughout the United States. This organization has continued to grow and today there are 23 temples in existence with an estimated membership of approximately 3,000. The names of 337 individuals are included on the Security Index based on their affiliation with this organization.

There has been a lack of uniformity throughout the field in the classification under which investigations of individual members of this organization have been opened. For example, many offices will open a case under the 105 classification (Internal Security - Nationalistic Tendency) which is in error as this classification should be limited to (1) allegations of subversive activity in the United States on part of a person or organization having a definite foreign interest or connection, (2) a person in the United States alleged to have been engaged in subversive activity abroad, (3) visiting or residing members of foreign subversive organizations, (4) individuals who maintain liaison or close association with members of foreign legations in the United States who come within the above three items.

RECOMMENDATION:

In view of the increasing number of individual investigations of members of the Nation of Islam and to provide uniformity for the handling thereof throughout the field, it is recommended that the field be instructed to open all cases in this category under the 100 (Security Matter) classification. If you agree, there are attached a proposed SAC letter and Manual change.

(H) SECURITY INVESTIGATIONS OF INDIVIDUALS -- The Independent Socialist League (ISL), a revolutionary socialist organization based on the theories of Marx, Engels and Lenin as interpreted by Leon Trotsky, and its youth counterpart, the Young Socialist League (YSL), formally dissolved and merged with the Socialist Party - Socialist Democratic Federation (SP-SPF) and its youth counterpart, the Young People's Socialist League (YPSL), respectively, on or about September 15, 1958. Former members of the ISL and YSL were urged to join the SP-SPF and the YPSL, respectively. These latter two organizations are not under investigation by this Bureau.

There are included in the Security Index the names of individuals formerly affiliated with the ISL. Their names are included therein because of evidence developed indicating that they represent a potential threat to the internal security of the country in the event of an emergency. The fact that these individuals have lost their organizational affiliation with the ISL does not necessarily indicate that they present less of a potential threat to the internal security of the nation. Therefore, active investigation of those individuals whose names are included in the Security Index because of past affiliation with the ISL should be continued as in the past until a determination is made as to whether they present a potential threat to the internal security of the country.

In continuing the investigation of these individuals, report fully any information developed concerning a subject's activities that would have a bearing on his Security Index status. If facts are developed that would warrant deletion of his name from the Security Index, such a recommendation should be submitted. Conversely, if facts are developed that would justify the continued retention of his name in the Security Index, such facts should be reported in detail. Particular emphasis should be given to the development and reporting of revolutionary statements and activities on the subject's part indicating that he continues to present a potential threat to the internal security.

Inasmuch as the SP-SPF is not under investigation, care should be taken to insure that continued investigation of these individuals does not result in unfounded charges that the Bureau is investigating that organization.

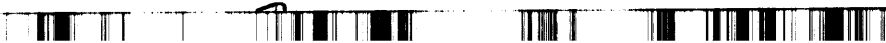

SYNOPSIS:

Each month we follow the field closely on the status of security work by analyzing the backlog of pending cases and delinquency in espionage, internal security, security matter and foreign intelligence cases in classifications 65, 100 and 105. Status of these cases as of October 31, 1958, is set forth herein.

In October, there was an increase in pending active matters in the entire field in the security classifications from 14,512 to 15,432. Delinquent matters decreased from 1,285 to 1,194. The percentage of delinquent matters decreased from 8.9% to 7.7%. Matters received during October in these categories totaled 8447. Matters closed totaled 7562.

Letters are being sent to the offices indicated by asterisks on page four herein, commenting on their delinquency and pointing out the necessity of bringing their security cases to a current status.

RECOMMENDATION:

The field will continue to be followed closely regarding security delinquency and you will be advised of the results of the review of the November, 1958, administrative reports.

DETAILS:

The October, 1958, administrative reports from all offices reflect that the total pending active matters in classifications 65, 100 and 105 increased from 14,512 to 15,432. Matters closed totaled 7502.

Security Index

SUGGESTION: a GS-5 employee assigned to the Classifying Unit of the Records Branch, has suggested through the Streamlining Committee that Correlation summaries be prepared on deceased security index subjects. She suggested as an alternative that all index cards pertaining to a deceased security index subject be listed on a search slip and placed in the main file of the security index subject; thereafter, the index cards could be destroyed and merely one information card placed in the index advising searchers that the references to the individual were listed on a search slip in the main file.

ADVANTAGES: advised that the adoption of her suggestion would remove many index cards from the index and would save some time in the conducting of a name search.

CONCLUSIONS: The Records Branch does not favor adoption of the suggestion. It is believed that the separation index utilized in the Records Branch is adequate to handle numerous index cards on any one particular individual which present a problem in conducting a name search. Through the use of the separation index, numerous index cards on any one individual are removed from the general indices and placed in a separate index. Accordingly, suggestion should be considered unfavorable. The preparation of Correlation summaries would be entirely too expensive to justify the same and the adoption of her alternative would be placing another system in effect which would be merely a duplicate of a present system utilized by the Records Branch.

RECOMMENDATIONS:

1. Unfavorable.

In connection with the submission of periodic reports in Security Index (SI) cases, the field is required to comment specifically on a number of different items of an administrative nature and, for this purpose, we utilize a form (FD 305) which is the last page of the cover memorandum submitted with reports in such cases.

(Suggestion Dated 10-13-58)

Supervisor of this Section has suggested that this form FD 305 be amended to include a statement as to whether the SI card in a particular case is or is not tabbed Detcom, whether the subject's activities do or do not warrant Detcom tabbing, and if such is warranted the reason therefor.

Stated Advantage:

It would insure that the field is giving appropriate attention as to whether an SI subject should be tabbed for priority of apprehension, i.e. Detcom.

Streamlining Committee Recommendation:

The Streamlining committee has considered the above suggestion and recommends favorably with the following modification:

That the Form FD 305 be revised to include the following:
"Subject's SI card (is) (is not) tabbed Detcom.
His activities (do) (do not) warrant Detcom tabbing."

It is believed that as worded above the addition of this statement to the Form FD 305 will insure that the field is giving appropriate consideration as to whether a subject should or should not be tabbed Detcom. Limitations of space on the present one-page form would preclude the addition of any lengthy statement as to why a subject should be tabbed Detcom.

Suggestion considered by Bureau and not adopted for following reasons: (1) While Identification Division had no objection to retention of security flash, that Division felt that an express provision should be made in the Manual of Instructions for the ultimate removal of the flash notice at such time as the subject becomes deceased or is considered no longer as one in whom the Bureau has a security interest. Security Index - Gen

Each month we follow the field closely on the status of security work by analyzing the backlog of pending cases and delinquency in espionage, internal security, security matter and foreign intelligence cases in classifications 65, 100 and 105. Status of these cases as of November 30, 1958, is set forth herein.

In November, there was an increase in pending active matters in the entire field in the security classifications from 15,432 to 17,480. Delinquent matters increased from 1,194 to 1,903. The percentage of delinquent matters increased from 7.7% to 10.9%. Matters received during November in these categories decreased from 8447 to 8367. Matters closed decreased from 7562 to 6312.

Letters are being sent to the offices indicated by asterisks on page four herein, commenting on their delinquency and pointing out the necessity of bringing their security cases to a current status.

RECOMMENDATION:

The field will continue to be followed closely regarding security delinquency and you will be advised of the results of the review of the December, 1958, administrative reports.

SUBJECT: 0 SECURITY INDEX

The Security Index (SI) today contains names of 12,838 persons who are included therein because it has been determined they represent a potential danger to the internal security of the U.S. in event of an emergency. Additions to SI are made daily as information is developed indicating such potential dangerousness on part of individuals being investigated.

The placing of an individual's name in SI does not, of course, mean that, having once been adjudged dangerous, he permanently remains so. Developments in the international situation and other factors cause change of viewpoint in many Communist Party members. It consequently is necessary to constantly re-evaluate each case to be certain the individual continues to represent a danger and to remove his name from the Index if he no longer does so.

This re-evaluation is made in each case at least yearly upon submission of the annual report and more frequently if and when the case comes up for attention on tickler or otherwise. The field is required, in submitting the annual report, to furnish its recommendation, with reasons therefor, as to continuation in or deletion from the SI. The supervisor on the substantive desk reviews the report, the field's recommendation and the entire file to arrive at his conclusion in this regard. If deletion is recommended or if facts justifying the recommendation for retention are not completely clear, the supervisor refers the matter to the supervisor in charge of his unit who makes his independent review and determination concerning the case. In those cases in which facts clearly indicate the correct conclusion as to retention of the individual in the SI or deletion of his name therefrom, the final determination is made at this level. In the event, however, there are differences of opinion as to the merits of the case or where any appreciable room for doubt exists, then the matter is passed on by the supervisor in charge for determination by the Section Chief and, in some cases, by the Assistant Director. In those instances in which the Bureau disagrees with the field's recommendation for deletion a letter advising the field of specific reasons for the Bureau's action is sent to the Assistant Director and in cases in which special questions exist to the Associate Director for approval prior to transmittal. A letter advising field of cancellation contrary to its recommendation and reasons for such action is sent to field from Section Chief level, unless special problem exists, in which event the letter clears through the office of the Assistant Director.

Recommendations for the addition of a new name to the Security Index are handled in the same fashion as above except that final determination to include the individual's name on the Security Index can only be made at the Section Chief level or higher. Thus, recommendations for additions to the Index receive three considerations in the section. It is believed desirable and necessary that this practice be followed inasmuch as the inclusion of an individual's name on the Security Index means that in the event of an emergency, he will be immediately apprehended and detained under the provisions of the Emergency Detention Program, which provisions provide for no recourse to the courts and provide for detention without right to the Writ of Habeas Corpus.

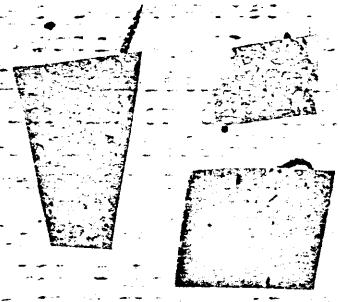
Any case being considered, whether for addition to the Index or either retention in or deletion therefrom, which presents particular complexities, is referred to the Assistant Director by memorandum for decision as to the Security Index status of the subject.

The foregoing outlines the mechanics by which consideration is given to the Security Index status of the subjects of cases. In such considerations, the criteria established in April, 1955, to measure potential dangerousness are utilized as guides in arriving at the correct answer to the essential question, "Does this individual represent a potential danger to internal security in the time of emergency." This determination is made taking into consideration all the facts developed in the individual case that would have bearing on a subject's potential dangerousness regardless of whether the evidence developed is of a legally admissible nature, or is obtained from inadmissible sources or is a combination thereof. While we make every attempt to develop legally admissible evidence in these cases, we do not insist that a determination of a subject's potential dangerousness rest solely on such evidence. In each instance in which we add a name to the Index or retain a name in the Index, the case is fully reviewed to insure that we have proof to substantiate our belief that the individual presents a potential threat to the internal security. The criteria afford practical and workable assistance in arriving at a conclusion and are sufficiently elastic so that, when applied with the necessary judgment, the complex questions which arise can be resolved. The present criteria are well devised for this purpose. They were not intended to be nor can they or any other criteria be rigid rules since the ultimate point to be determined is not whether a case fits a particular rule, but whether the subject of the case represents a danger. SECRET CRITERIA FOR PLACING AND RETAINING
NAMES IN THE SECURITY INDEX

- 1) Subject has had membership or participation in the activities of a basic revolutionary organization within the last 5 years as shown by overt acts or statements established through reliable sources, informants, or individuals.
- 2) Subject has had membership or participation in the affairs of one or more front organizations, which adhere to the policies and doctrines of a revolutionary group, in a leadership capacity or by active substantial participation in the furtherance of the aims or purposes of the front organizations within the last 3 years as shown by overt acts or statements established through reliable sources, informants or individuals.
- 3) Investigation has developed information that an individual, though not a member or a participant in the activities of a subversive organization, has anarchist or revolutionary beliefs and is likely to seize upon the opportunity presented by a national emergency to endanger the public safety as shown by overt acts or statements within the last 3 years established through reliable sources, informants, or individuals.
- 4) Although investigation has failed to establish overt acts or statements on the part of a subject within the time limits set out above, facts have been developed which clearly and unmistakably depict the subject as a dangerous individual who could be expected to commit acts inimical to the national defense and public safety of the U.S. in time of emergency.

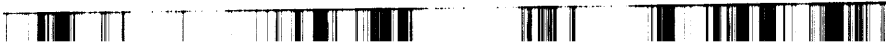
SUBJECT: SECURITY INDEX

During Domestic Intelligence Division inspection the Subversive Control Section was found to have excessive administrative overhead due to the amount of supervisory time being spent in administrative type functions compared to actual supervision of investigative matters. One of the factors contributing to this condition was the review of each field recommendation concerning additions to the Security Index on 4 levels in the Section whereas 3 levels would be sufficient and, in fact, record approval existed for review on only 3 levels in the ordinary case.

The attached memorandum from the Domestic Intelligence Division sets forth the present handling of recommendations for inclusion in, continuance on, or deletion from the Security Index. Included therein is the procedure now being followed of having all field recommendations for additions to the Security Index approved by the SOG Supervisor on the substantive desk, his Supervisor in Charge, and on the Section Chief level. Prior to the inspection there was an unnecessary intermediate level between the Supervisor in Charge and the Section Chief wherein one person also passed on all such recommendations for coordination purposes whereas coordination on Section Chief level would have been adequate. Of course, in any questionable cases where such action is warranted, the recommendations are forwarded to the Branch Chief, Assistant Director and higher.

RECOMMENDATION:

It is recommended that the attached memorandum of the Domestic Intelligence Division setting forth the mechanics of evaluating and re-evaluating Security Index cases be approved as sound and consistent with the findings of the recent inspection.

The present practice of removing a subject from the Security Index is to submit a letter to the Bureau setting forth the Field's recommendation to cancel the Security Index Card on the subject. The card is cancelled only after receipt of advice from the Bureau that the Bureau's Security Index Card has been cancelled.

In all instances where a Security Index Card is cancelled and a Security Index Flash Notice (FD-165) has previously been submitted to the Identification Division, it is necessary to forward a separate communication (FD-165) to the Bureau marked "Attention Identification Division," requesting the cancellation of the Security Index Flash Notice.

It is suggested that when the Field submits a letter requesting the cancellation of the Security Index Card on the subject, the Field submit, as an enclosure to the letter, an FD-165 containing the necessary background information. The Field should, beside the block marked "Cancel Because", leave the space blank. Then after the Bureau agrees to the Field's recommendation, the Bureau can stamp the Field's letter recommending the removal of subject from the Security Index with the stamp "Security Card Cancelled," and also in the same operation stamp the FD-165 in the space left blank for reason cancelling the Security Flash, "Security Card Cancelled." The Bureau could then return the Field's letter bearing the notation "Security Card Cancelled," and transmit via intra-Bureau mail the FD-165 to the Identification Division. This procedure would eliminate the Field's submitting a separate communication (FD-165) to the Identification Division after it had received Bureau authority to cancel the Security Index Card. It would not add any communication burden to the Bureau, as the Bureau could, in one operation, stamp the Field's letter and the FD-165, and then disseminate these communications to the appropriate Divisions.

In the event the Bureau would not concur with the Field's recommendation pertaining to the removal of the subject from the Security Index, the FD-165 could be returned to the Field along with the Bureau's letter advising why it was not removing subject from the Security Index. The Field then could destroy the FD-165.

In keeping with the Bureau's desire to streamline operations, this would eliminate the present practice of submitting a separate communication. The present practice is as follows:

- Step 1 - Field submits letter recommending removal from Security Index.
- Step 2 - Bureau approves, stamps letter, and returns same to Field.
- Step 3 - Field submits FD-165 to Bureau, Attention Identification Division, recommending Security Flash Notice be cancelled.

Thus, if the suggestion is adopted, Step 3 could be eliminated, saving the Bureau and Field clerical time, Agent time, and supervisor time.

Since the present practice is that the FD-165 be sent by Registered Mail, by eliminating Step 3, the Bureau would be able to decrease the Registered Mailing charges throughout the Field.

Delinquency

In 12/51, there existed an extremely heavy delinquency in the field in security classifications 65, 100 and 105 (in excess of 67%). As a result, we initiated a program of following individual offices on a monthly basis concerning their delinquency status, 12 offices at that time. This program was expanded in 3/52 to include all offices.

The purpose of the program was, and has continued to be, to stress the necessity of reducing delinquency in these categories and the necessity of maintaining these cases in a reasonably current status.

The success of this program can best be illustrated by the fact that during the past three years the highest over-all field delinquency recorded in these categories was on 1/31/56 when the percentage of delinquency stood at 13.7%. At that time, the pending active case load stood at 15,079.

During this same period of time, the lowest recorded pending active matters in the field in classifications 65, 100 and 105 was on 7/31/58, the total at that time being 14,295 pending active matters. Delinquency in these categories then stood at 9.6% throughout the field. Since 7/58, pending active matters have increased approximately 19.8% to a high as of 11/30/58 of 17,400 while during the same period delinquency increased only 1.3% or as of 11/30/58 10.9% delinquent matters were recorded in the field.

As can be seen from the above, the effect of this program is reflected in the sharp decrease in security delinquency, thus enabling the field to handle almost on a current basis matters received in these categories. When, following analysis of monthly administrative reports submitted by the field, it is found that an office's delinquency in security classifications is excessive, personal attention letters are directed to the particular office drawing its attention to this condition and instructing that immediate steps be taken to correct the situation.

Periodic Reports Program

Since completion of the Summary Report Program on 7/14/54 (New York on 5/1/56), we have required at least an annual report in all Security Index (SI) cases. For many years prior to 1954, we required reports at specific intervals in certain other types of cases which will be discussed later.

The purpose of the Periodic Reports Program is to insure that current information is available to the Bureau in report form in order to keep the Bureau, as well as the Department, advised of the status of SI cases and in order to discharge our responsibilities of dissemination to other interested agencies in the executive branch of the Government.

This is a major program as evidenced by the fact that there were as of 12/15/53 12,842 SI subjects, each requiring at least one report a year. Many of these cases require more frequent reports and will be commented on below.

Certain administrative controls are exercised at the Bureau to insure prompt submission of reports as required. For example, we utilize a tickler system through which each supervisor is able to follow the field's progress closely. This practice requires the maintenance by each supervisor handling SI matters of approximately 700 ticklers in SI cases, which are, of course, in addition to new cases being received at all times of non-SI matters being handled by him. In addition, the field is required to advise the Bureau twice yearly, 3/1 and 9/1, of the status of this program. Periodic reports required in various types of cases are listed below.

1) Top Functionaries. Presently included in the SI are the names of 34 individuals considered as "top functionaries" in subversive organizations. These top functionaries represent the highest degree of leadership in subversive organizations and their activities are constantly being followed. We require the submission of quarterly reports in these cases.

2) Key Figures. Throughout the field 686 individuals are considered as key figures in subversive movements. These individuals represent leadership in subversive organizations on regional, district and state levels. They represent a high degree of dangerousness and we follow their activities closely requiring the field to submit reports in these cases on a semiannual basis.

3) Key Facilities. The SI contains the names of 384 individuals employed in various plants throughout the country designated as key facilities by the Department of Defense. A listing of these plants as key facilities indicates that they are of vital importance to national security. In order to keep the various branches of the Department of Defense fully informed of the activities of these individuals, we require reports at six-month intervals in these cases.

4) Other SI Subjects. In all other cases, the field is required to submit reports on an annual basis.

In order to effectively discharge our responsibilities in the internal security field, it is our feeling that the above represent the absolute minimum requirements for the submission of reports in the categories listed.

ACTION:

This Program will be followed closely and we will continue to require reports in SI cases in accordance with the schedule set out above.

Security Investigations of Individuals

By various presidential directives, the initial one being in 9/39, the Bureau is charged with the responsibility for investigation of individuals in the internal security field. It is the collecting agency of the entire executive branch for subversive information and has the responsibility of seeing that such information is distributed to those Government agencies having a legitimate interest therein.

The primary purposes of security investigations of individuals are twofold, namely (1) to determine the potential dangerousness of an individual in the event of an emergency and (2) to develop evidence of violations of Federal statutes on the part of such individuals. If, during the course of one of these investigations, it is determined that a subject presents a potential threat to the internal security, he is scheduled for apprehension under the Emergency Detention Program by the inclusion of his name in the Security Index.

Investigations of this type are field wide and as of 11/30/58 there were 17,480 pending active cases in security classifications 65, 100 and 105 (the classifications under which the majority of security investigations are conducted) representing approximately 20.9% of the entire pending active matters in the field. There was a total of 15,534 "pending here" matters as of 11/30, representing approximately 24.8% of all such matters in the field. As can be seen from the above figures, this is a major program from the standpoint of manpower and cost and as such is referred to in the budget material in the form of "Confidential - Off the Record" data.

The Subversive Control Section is primarily responsible for investigations of individuals under the 100 classification although we do have cases on individuals under the 105 classification, such as affiliates of the Nationalist Party of Puerto Rico and the Nation of Islam. For comparative purposes, during the period from 7/1/57 through 11/30/57 the field handled 22,347 matters in the 100 classification and during the same period of 1958 the field handled 23,799 such matters representing approximately 6% increase in such matters handled during the first four months of the fiscal year 1959.

Certain administrative controls are exercised over this program. For example, we follow the field closely on its over-all delinquency in the three security classifications mentioned previously. This is handled on a monthly basis. We follow the field by tickler on pending matters in the field of which we have knowledge and we follow the field for the submission of periodic reports in Security Index cases to insure that such are submitted when due.

In connection with these cases, one particular investigative technique is worthy of mention, namely our interview program which was initiated in 1949 and is continuing. Available figures reflect that since the initiation of the interview program in 1949 and through the month of 11/52 in excess of 41,000 interviews have been conducted with persons possessing a history of subversive affiliation. These interviews have not only served as a disruptive tactic but we have developed voluminous intelligence data and it is, of course, our best source for development of informants. In Security Index cases we consider reinterviews with each on an annual basis.

As an example of the value of such reinterviews, the Chicago Office recently interviewed an active member of the Communist Party (CP) and an employee at CP headquarters in Chicago. She proved receptive to the interview, providing very valuable intelligence information, has been developed as an informant, and is expected to be extremely valuable. This individual had previously been interviewed on two separate occasions, in 6/54 and 3/56, and on both occasions she refused to discuss anything with the interviewing Agents.

Fraud Against the Government

As mentioned above, one of the purposes of these investigations is to seek out violations of Federal statutes. We presently have pending in the Subversive Control Section 125 cases involving possible violations of the Fraud Against the Government Statute arising primarily from subjects' failure to list membership in a subversive organization in executing such documents as Personnel Security Questionnaires. In these cases, because of security angles, the Department makes a preliminary review of each to determine whether it presents possibilities of successful prosecution prior to referring the case to the U.S. attorney. Consequently, very careful and intensive supervision, as well as investigation, is required. Our principal difficulty in connection with these cases has been the development of witnesses other than currently active and valuable informants who can testify as to a subject's membership in a proscribed organization.

Dissemination

Security reports are disseminated to numerous interested agencies throughout the executive branch of the Government. By far the vast majority of such reports received are disseminated outside the Bureau. The responsibility of such dissemination necessitates careful and thorough evaluation of each report to assure that it is absolutely accurate, both in form and content.

Making Witnesses Available to Other Agencies

Essentially, every security program of other branches of the Government depends to a large extent on information and witnesses made available to those agencies by us. Among such programs are the Industrial Personnel Security Program of the Department of Defense, Coast Guard Screening Program, various Immigration and Naturalization Service programs, such as deportation and denaturalization, and action taken by the military agencies against their personnel. This particular phase of our operations arose subsequent to the decision holding the then existing Coast Guard screening procedures invalid and strongly implying that the subjects of security hearings should be confronted with the witnesses against them.

Receipt of requests from various agencies for availability of witnesses appearing in our reports are referred to the field with appropriate instructions. The final decision with respect to whether a witness can be made available to the requesting agency is in each case made at the Bureau. In each instance, a thorough study is required to determine the possible effect on the Bureau's internal security responsibilities should the witness be made available for testimony. In addition, when advising these agencies of the availability of a potential witness, it is essential that we also advise such agency of any information contained in our files reflecting upon the reliability or credibility of such witness.

During the period from 10/1 through 11/30/58, we received requests from various agencies as to the availability of 180 witnesses, exclusive of Special Agents and public sources, and during this same period we were able to advise the requesting agencies of the identities

and availability of 57 potential witnesses. It is noted that we had previously made available during the period from 12/56 through 9/59 352 sources, exclusive of Special Agents and public sources, to the U.S. Coast Guard for its possible use in connection with the Coast Guard Screening Program.

SUGGESTION: That when the field submits to the Bureau a letter requesting the cancellation of the Security Index Card on a subject, the field also submit as an enclosure, form FD-165, which is a field office wanted-flash-cancellation notice. The FD-165 is directed to the Identification Division as an instruction to place or cancel a stop in its files, to record a wanted notice or a flash notice and to furnish the identification record. SA suggests that after the Bureau approves the cancellation of a Security Index Card the FD-165 form could be stamped to show reason for cancelling the Security Flash as "Security card cancelled" and the FD-165 could then be routed to the Identification Division. This would save the field from submitting a separate communication after it received Bureau authority to cancel the Security Index Card.

OBSERVATIONS: By my memorandum to you dated 11/10/58, it was approved that the Security Flash Notice would no longer be removed when the person was removed from the Security Index. This change was adopted as the result of a suggestion made by SA San Francisco (Suggestion #536-59). Manual provisions are now being printed to reflect this change. As a result, there is no basis for any further consideration of SA suggestion since we will no longer cancel the Security Flash just because a person is removed from the Security Index.

RECOMMENDATION: That this suggestion not be adopted. No further action is necessary since SA was thanked by letter of 12/12/58.

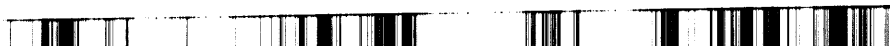

SYNOPSIS:

Each month we follow the field closely on the status of security work by analyzing the backlog of pending cases and delinquency in espionage, internal security, security matter and foreign intelligence cases in classifications 65, 100 and 105. Status of these cases as of December 31, 1958, is set forth below.

In December, there was an increase in pending active matters in the entire field in the security classifications from 17,480 to 18,450. Delinquent matters decreased from 1,903 to 1,888. The percentage of delinquent matters decreased from 10.9% to 10.2%. Matters received during December in these categories increased from 8,367 to 8,754. Matters closed increased from 6,312 to 7,826.

Letters are being sent to the offices indicated by asterisks on page four herein, commenting on their delinquency and pointing out the necessity of bringing their security cases to a current status.

RECOMMENDATION:

The field will continue to be followed closely regarding security delinquency and you will be advised of the results of the review of the January, 1959, administrative reports.

DETAILS:

The December, 1958, administrative reports from all offices reflect that the total pending active matters in classifications 65, 100 and 105 increased from 17,480 to 18,450. Delinquent items decreased from 1,903 to 1,888. The percentage of delinquent items decreased from 10.9% to 10.2%. Matters received during December in these categories increased from 8,367 to 8,754. Matters closed increased from 6,312 to 7,826.

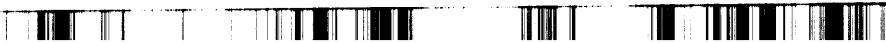
Each subject of a security investigation is regarded as a potential source of information or as a potential security informant. Therefore, each is considered for possible interview prior to closing the case. In connection with Security Index subjects previously interviewed with Bureau authority, the field gives consideration to reinterviews in each instance at the time periodic reports are submitted and, if a reinterview is not conducted, advises the Bureau of the circumstances making such a reinterview inadvisable.

We have noted a tendency on the part of many field offices in the recent past to give such reasons, for not considering the subject for interview or reinterview as the case may be, as (1) the fact that the subject is currently active in a subversive movement, and (2) the fact that subject was uncooperative upon occasion of a previous interview. Experience has shown that both reasons are invalid if no other factors mitigating against such an interview exist.

Our interview program has over the years been the most productive source for development of informants and intelligence information and, in addition, has been a very effective disruptive tactic. To insure continued close attention to this phase of our investigations, it is believed desirable to again direct the field's attention to the importance of this program and the necessity for close attention thereto.

PERSONAL ATTENTIONSECURITY INVESTIGATIONS OF INDIVIDUALS

On January 12 and 13, 1959, a conference was held at the Bureau attended by representatives from 14 field offices and the Legal Attaches from Ottawa, Canada, and Mexico City, Mexico. This conference was held for the purpose of analyzing our entire operations and our goals and objectives in the internal security-espionage field. Among the programs discussed at this conference were (1) the program for identification of Communist Party (CP) members, (2) the Security Index program, and (3) the Communist Index program.

1) Identification of CP Members

The conference discussed the problems confronting the field in attempting to establish sound estimates as to the current CP membership, in achieving positive identification of individuals belonging to the CP and other revolutionary groups, and in developing sufficient information concerning their activities as to warrant inclusion of their names in the Security Index. It noted that frequently fragmentary information is obtained from a source or from a highly confidential technique which, if pursued by the use of other investigative techniques, will result in definitely tying in the information with a specific individual. It was the unanimous opinion of the conference that the employment of photographic surveillances, physical surveillances and the development of anonymous sources require the use of a considerable amount of manpower and, further, that it is often necessary to utilize some or all of these techniques to obtain the desired information. Field representatives noted that there have been some instances in the past where a lack of available manpower has made it necessary to forego the use of these investigative aids. In this connection, the Bureau noted a decrease in the use of these techniques during the past year, particularly in the development of highly confidential sources which have proven to be very successful in the past and provide the type of data required to implement this program.

We cannot depend exclusively upon security informant coverage for development of information desired under this program but must utilize every investigative technique available to us if we are to fully discharge our responsibilities in the security field.

2) Security Index Program

The conference recognized that the summary apprehensions which will be effected in a time of emergency make it necessary that each individual case being considered for the Security Index receive careful consideration and that the responsibilities of the Bureau under this program are grave. The unanimous opinion was that proper application of the existing criteria for inclusion of individuals on the Security Index provides effective means of dealing with the situation and that no change in such criteria of either a liberalizing or constrictive nature is necessary or desirable. Such criteria are not to be so blindly applied as to lose sight of the basic requirement that the Index include all persons who represent a potential danger to internal security. Promptness in initiating and thoroughness in completing investigations of individuals being considered for possible inclusion on the Security Index are, of course, of prime importance and must be given close attention.

3) Communist Index Program

The results obtained in the brief time since initiation of the Communist Index program were discussed. Investigations initiated under this program have already resulted in the inclusion on the Security Index of several individuals, the development of new security informants, location of individuals employed in sensitive positions, and development of considerable intelligence data as a result of cooperative interviews. The Communist Index constitutes a reservoir and basis from which both informants and Security Index subjects will be developed. Consequently, this Index must be carefully maintained so that it continues to contain names of all individuals properly belonging therein because of past affiliation with subversive

movements. The conference was of the opinion that the program will prove to be of considerable value and should be pursued in accordance with current Bureau instructions.

It is readily apparent that the investigations of individual Communist Party members are of paramount importance in view of the Bureau's responsibility for the identification and thorough investigation of every potentially dangerous individual. It is your personal responsibility, therefore, to assure that these investigations are thorough and complete. Sufficient experienced manpower must be assigned to these investigations so that all available investigative techniques can and will be utilized when necessary and appropriate. This matter must receive continuous and preferred attention in each office.

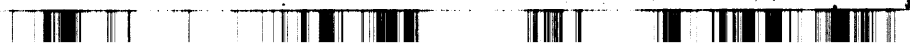

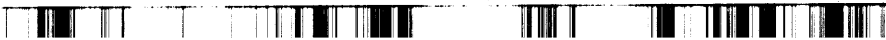

SYNOPSIS:

Each month we follow the field closely on the status of security work by analyzing the backlog of pending cases and delinquency in espionage, internal security, security matter and foreign intelligence cases in classifications 65, 100 and 105. Status of these cases as of January 31, 1959, is set forth below.

In January, there was an increase in pending active matters in the entire field in the security classifications from 18,450 to 19,045. Delinquent matters increased from 1,888 to 2,255. The percentage of delinquent matters increased from 10.2% to 11.8%. Matters received during January in these categories increased from 8,754 to 8,847. Matters closed increased from 7,826 to 9,148.

Letters are being sent to the offices indicated by asterisks on page four herein, commenting on their delinquency and pointing out the necessity of bringing their security cases to a current status.

RECOMMENDATION:

The field will continue to be followed closely regarding security delinquency and you will be advised of the results of the review of the February, 1959. administrative reports.

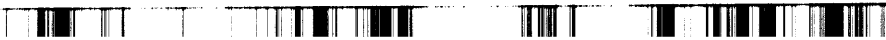

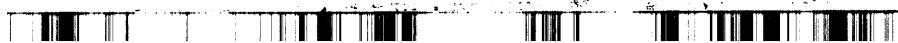

Bulet of 10/2/58 issued instructions to the field with respect to re-examination of cases of all individuals whose names are included in the Communist Index (CI), this re-examination to be conducted in equal monthly installments over a 12-month period. This Index is designed to represent a list of individuals who should, in the light of ever-changing conditions, be continually borne in mind with a view toward possible investigation under the Security Index (SI) program.

In connection with this program, we instructed the field to submit certain statistics on a quarterly basis. Reports from all offices are in and tangible results obtained to date from the above program are as follows:

- 1) The names of 11 individuals have been added to the SI based on investigations conducted under this program.
- 2) The field has developed four security informants or potential security informants.
- 3) 14 individuals were found to be employed in sensitive positions requiring additional investigation or dissemination on our part.

At the inception of this program, there were 17,783 names included in the CI and approximately one-fourth of this total would have been handled by the field as of 1/15/59.

In addition to the results tabulated under items 1, 2 and 3 above, there have been a number of cooperative interviews resulting from investigations conducted under this program. Cooperative interviews under this program produce additional intelligence data, provide sources of information, and provide a potential reservoir of possible witnesses in various type hearings even though interviewees may not be potential security informants.

Re: COLLECTOR INDEX

Review to date of this Index has resulted in the purging of the names of 825 individuals who are either deceased, whose names have been returned to the SI, or who otherwise do not qualify for inclusion in the CI. This, in effect, insures that this Index will, upon completion of the re-examination, contain only individuals who should properly be included therein.

OBSERVATIONS:

The results obtained to date as enumerated above fully justify the time and effort necessarily involved in this re-examination of the CI.

Submitted for information. We will continue to pursue this program and you will be advised of additional results obtained upon receipt of the next quarterly report from the field which is due on 4/15/59.

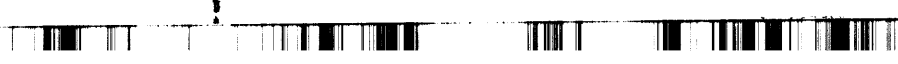

STREAMLINING COMMITTEE CONSIDERATION

The Subversive Control Section Streamlining Committee has considered SA [redacted] suggestion and makes the following observations and recommendations.

This suggestion involves a problem experienced in the Subversive Control Section whereby the substantive case supervisor oftentimes receives a report and action mail relating to that report in separate mail runs. This situation prevails for the most part, when the field submits a report together with a letter recommending interview of subject or recommending deletion of subject's name from the Security Index (SI), and also when the field submits a report together with a Form FD-122 recommending inclusion of a subject's name in the SI. This situation results from the fact that the Records Branch, in line with its policy of priority handling of mail, detaches letters, airtels, etc., from reports and handles such independently of reports (current rules dictate that reports and related documents be paper clipped together when transmitted by the field to the Seat of Government).

SA [redacted] suggests, in substance, that this problem can be avoided by implementing a rule that reports and related action mail be stapled together and that the action mail show the report as an enclosure. In addition, in those cases where a summary report is submitted with an FD-122 recommending inclusion of a subject's name in the SI, SA [redacted] suggests that the FD-122 be shown as an enclosure to the cover page which, under current rules, accompanies all security summary reports.

This matter has been discussed with the Records Branch and appropriate clerical personnel of that branch handling incoming mail have been alerted to the necessity of not detaching reports and related action mail, as described above. Handling of mail in this manner thus eliminates the problem involved herein.

It is felt that issuance of new instructions to the field relating to the assembling of mail is unnecessary inasmuch as the stated problem is being corrected, as reflected above. Additionally, however, adoption of this suggestion is objectionable from the standpoint that action mail, such as letters requesting interviews, letters requesting deletion from the SI, and FD-122s recommending inclusion in the SI, are normally detached from their related reports when they reach the Subversive Control Section and are handled separately; e.g., FD-122 is detached and sent to the Statistical Section for handling and copies of letters requesting interviews are detached and returned to the field with stamped approval. Adoption of SA [redacted] suggestion would, therefore, necessitate the supervisor having to make notations on the transmittal communications as to the disposition of any enclosures. If the supervisor fails to place such notations on the transmittal communications, then the Records Branch would have to place the piece of mail on locate, thus effecting additional work for the Records Branch.

A further objection to this suggestion lies in the fact that adoption thereof would effect an additional administrative burden on the field in that the field, in addition to having to remember another rule which would be an exception to the general rule of handling mail, would also have to assemble reports and related action mail, as described above, in a special manner. It is felt that this, in itself, defeats the purpose of streamlining.

RECOMMENDATIONS:

(1) SA [redacted] suggestion not be adopted for reasons set forth above.

(2) This suggestion be referred to the Training and Inspection Division in order that it be acknowledged.

SYNOPSIS:

Each month we follow the field closely on the status of security work by analyzing the backlog of pending cases and delinquency in espionage, internal security, security matter and foreign intelligence cases in classifications 65, 100 and 105. Status of these cases as of February 28, 1959, is set forth below:

In February, there was an increase in pending active matters in the entire field in the security classifications from 19,045 to 19,292. Delinquent matters increased from 2,255 to 2,371. The percentage of delinquent matters increased from 11.8% to 12.3%. Matters received during February in these categories decreased from 8,847 to 8,211. Matters closed decreased from 9,148 to 7,893.

Letters are being sent to the offices indicated by asterisks on page four herein, commenting on their delinquency and pointing out the necessity of bringing their security cases to a current status.

RECOMMENDATION:

The field will continue to be followed closely regarding security delinquency and you will be advised of the results of the review of the March, 1959, administrative reports.
