SUBJECT DELINQUENCY IN SECURITY AND RACIAL MATTERS INVESTIGATIONS

#### SYNOPSIS:

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Each month we follow the field closely on the status of security and racial matters work by analyzing the backlog of pending active cases and delinquency in espionage, internal security, security matter, foreign intelligence and racial matters cases in classifications 65, 100, 105 and 157. Status of these cases as of July 31, 1965, is set forth below.

In July, 1965, there was a decrease in pending active matters in the field in classifications 65, 100 and 105 from 20,069 to 19,957. Delinquent matters decreased from 1,705 to 1,624. The percentage of delinquent matters decreased from 8.5 per cent to 8.1 per cent.

During the same month, pending active matters in the 157 (Recomb) classification increased from 4,232 to 4,681 while delinquent matters increased from 385 to 618. The field-wide delinquency in this classification increased from 9.1 per cent to 13.2 per cent.

Letters are being sent to the offices indicated by asterisks on pages 4 and 5 herein, commenting on their delinquency and pointing out the necessity for bringing their cases in these classifications to a current status.

#### ACTION:

The field will continue to be followed closely regarding delinquency in the 65, 100, 105 and 157 classifications and you will be advised of the results of the review of the administrative report for August, 1965.

RE: DELINQUENCY IN SECURITY AND RACIAL MATTERS INVESTIGATIONS

#### DETAILS:

The July, 1965, administrative reports for all offices indicate that the total pending active matters in classifications 65, 100, and 105 decreased from 20,069 to 19,957. Delinquent items decreased from 1,705 to 1,624. The percentage of delinquent items decreased from 8.5 per cent to 8.1 per cent. These same reports disclose that in the 157 classification total pending active matters increased from 4,232 to 4,681; delinquency increased from 385 to 681; and the percentage of delinquency increased from 9.1 per cent to 13.2 per cent.



#### SYNOPSIS:

Each month we follow the field closely on the status of security work by analyzing the backlog of pending active cases and delinquency in espionage, internal security, security matter, foreign intelligence and racial matters cases in classifications 65, 100, 105 and 157. Status of these cases as of August 31, 1965, is set forth below.

In August, 1965, there was an increase in pending active matters in the field in classifications 65, 100 and 105 from 19,957 to 20,472. Delinquent matters decreased from 1,624 to 1,398. The percentage of delinquent matters decreased from 8.1 per cent to 6.8 per cent.

During the same month, pending active matters in the 157 classification increased from 4,681 to 5,162 while delinquent matters increased from 618 to 919. The field-wide delinquency in this classification increased from 13.2 per cent to 17.8 per cent.

Letters are being sent to the offices indicated by asterisks on pages 4 and 5 herein, commenting on their delinquency and pointing out the necessity for bringing their cases in these classifications to a current status.

#### ACTION:

The field will continue to be followed closely regarding delinquency in the 65, 100, 105 and 157 classifications and you will be advised of the results of the review of the administrative report for September, 1965.

Memorandum for .... RE: DELINQUENCY IN SECURITY INVESTIGATIONS

#### DETAILS:

The August, 1965, administrative reports for all offices indicate that the total pending active matters in classifications 65, 100, and 105 increased from 19,957 to 20,472. Delinquent items decreased from 1,624 to 1,398. The percentage of delinquent items decreased from 8.1 per cent to 6.8 per cent. These same reports disclose that in the 157 classification total pending active matters increased from 4,681 to 5,162; delinquency increased from 681 to 919; and the percentage of delinquency increased from 13.2 per cent to 17.8 per cent.

1. Origin: This program instituted November, 1960.

Purpose: To keep track of dangerous individuals having pro-Castro sympathies and who are engaged in activities considered inimical to the United States to insure they are neutralized in event of hostilities involving Cuba.

Scope: Program applies to two categories of pro-Castro Security Index subjects against whom appropriate action would be taken in case of emergency.

(A) Cuban Special Section (individuals on Security Index solely based on their pro-Castro activities or sympathies).

(B) Security Index tabbed C for "Pro-Cuban."

(Individuals placed on Security Index for other reasons such as members of Communist Party who by reason of pro-Castro activities and/or sympathies are considered dangerous in the event of hostilities with Cuba).

2. Tie In With Other Programs: Program is co-ordinated with over-all Security Index program. As of 9/30/65 339 individuals were tabbed "Pro-Cuban;" 235 individuals were included in "Cuban Special Section" of which 96 were aliens.

Magnitude: In the event of hostilities with Cuba, the government could immediately proceed to pick up those individuals listed on the Security Index who are Cuban aliens. We keep Immigration and Naturalization Service informed concerning the aliens and the Attorney General is having documents prepositioned against them which documents would facilitate their arrest by the Immigration and Naturalization Service should the eventuality arise.

3. Administrative Control: A Bureau supervisor has direct responsibility for following this matter and assuring field handles program paperly. Accordingly, it receives a continuing review.

Adequacy and Currentness of Instructions: SAC letters

60-54 dated 11/22/60, 62-55 dated 10/5/62, 63-61 dated 12/17/63 and 64-58 dated 9/29/64 furnished the over-all instructions re program. Specific instructions concerning disaffection of United States citizens abroad were set forth in Bulet to all offices dated 9/17/64. With regard to Cuba, these instructions relate to individuals who have manifested disaffection from United States since 10/1/60. Instructions are current and complete.

Instructions re dissemination were furnished field in SAC letters 64-48 (C) dated 9/29/64 and 65-10 (G) dated 3/9/65. Instructions with respect to dissemination to Secret Service were reiterated to the New York Office by letter dated 6/7/65 captioned "Nationality Group Coverage, IS-Cuba."
- 5. Past or Present Weaknesses: Program instituted in view of possible limited emergency growing out of situation existing between United States and Cuba in 1960. Program serves to more completely discharge our responsibilities in Security field as they relate to Cuba and to insure that these responsibilities are continuously being . met. No present weakness in the program.
- 6. Contemplated Action: Program should be continued as now constituted.

SUBJECT: DELINQUENCY IN SECURITY INVESTIGATIONS

#### SYNOPSIS:

Each month we follow the field closely on the status of security work by analyzing the backlog of pending active cases and delinquency in espionage, internal security, security matter, foreign intelligence and racial matters cases in classifications 65, 100, 105 and 157. Status of these cases as of September 30, 1965, is set forth below.

In September, 1965, there was an increase in pending active matters in the field in classifications 65, 100 and 105 from 20,472 to 20,523. Delinquent matters decreased from 1,398 to 1,337. The percentage of delinquent matters decreased from 6.8 per cent to 6.5 per cent.

During the same month, pending active matters in the 157 classification increased from 5,162 to 5,299 while delinquent matters decreased from 919 to 540. The field-wide delinquency in this classification decreased from 17.8 per cent to 10.2 per cent.

Letters are being sent to the offices indicated by asterisks on pages 4 and 5 herein, commenting on their delinquency and pointing out the necessity for bringing their cases in these classifications to a current status.

#### ACTION:

The field will continue to be followed closely regarding delinquency in the 65, 100, 105 and 157 classifications and you will be advised of the results of the review of the administrative report for October, 1965.

Memorandum for RE: DELINQUENCY IN SECURITY INVESTIGATIONS

#### **DETAILS**:

The September, 1965, administrative reports for all offices indicate that the total pending active matters in classifications 65, 100, and 105 increased from 20,472 to 20,523. Delinquent items decreased from 1,398 to 1,337. The percentage of delinquent items decreased from 6.8 per cent to 6.5 per cent. These same reports disclose that in the 157 classification total pending active matters increased from 5,162 to 5,299; delinquency decreased from 919 to 540; and the percentage of delinquency decreased from 17.8 per cent to 10.2 per cent.





#### SYNOPSIS:

Each month we follow the field closely on the status of security work by analyzing the backlog of pending active cases and delinquency in espionage, internal security, security matter, foreign intelligence and racial matters cases in classifications 65, 100, 105 and 157. Status of these cases as of October 31, 1965, is set forth below.

In October, 1965, there was a decrease in pending active matters in the field in classifications 65, 100 and 105 from 20,523 to 20,300. Delinquent matters increased from 1,337 to 1,400. The percentage of delinquent matters increased from 6.5 per cent to 6.9 per cent.

During the same month, pending active matters in the 157 classification increased from 5,299 to 5,458 while delinquent matters increased from 540 to 587. The field-wide delinquency in this classification increased from 10.2 per cent to 10.8 per cent.

Letters are being sent to the offices indicated by asterisks on pages 4 and 5 herein, commenting on their delinquency and pointing out the necessity for bringing their cases in these classifications to a current status.

# ACTION:

The field will continue to be followed closely regarding delinquency in the 65, 100, 105 and 157 classifications and you will be advised of the results of the review of the administrative report for November, 1965.

The October, 1965, administrative reports for all offices indicate that the total pending active matters in classifications 65, 100, and 105 decreased from 20,523 to 20,300. Delinquent items increased from 1,337 to 1,400. The percentage of delinquent items increased from 6.5 per cent to 6.9 per cent. These same reports disclose that in the 157 classification total pending active matters increased from 5,299 to 5,458; delinquency increased from 540 to 587; and the percentage of delinquency increased from 10.2 per cent to 10.8 per cent.



Each month we follow the field closely on the status of security work by analyzing the backlog of pending active cases and delinquency in espionage, internal security, security matter, foreign intelligence and racial matters cases in classifications 65, 100, 105 and 157. Status of these cases as of December 31, 1965, is set forth below.

In December, 1965, there was a decrease in pending active matters in the field in classifications 65, 100 and 105 from 20,034 to 19,774. Delinquent matters decreased from 1,413 to 1,370. The percentage of delinquent matters decreased from 7.1 per cent to 6.9 per cent.

During the same month, pending active matters in the 157 classification decreased from 5,416 to 4,927 while delinquent matters decreased from 950 to 938. The field-wide delinquency in this classification increased from 17.5 per cent to 19.0 per cent.

Letters are being sent to the offices indicated by asterisks on pages 4 and 5 herein, commenting on their delinquency and pointing out the necessity for bringing their cases in these classifications to a current status.

The field will continue to be followed closely regarding delinquency in the 65, 100, 105 and 157 classifications and you will be advised of the results of the review of the administrative report for January, 1966.

The December, 1965, administrative reports for all offices indicate that the total pending active matters in classifications 65, 100, and 105 decreased from 20,034 to 19,774. Delinquent items decreased from 1,413 to 1,370. The percentage of delinquent items decreased from 7.1 per cent to 6.9 per cent. These same reports disclose that in the 157 classification total pending active matters decreased from 5,416 to 4,927; delinquency decreased from 950 to 938; and the percentage of delinquency increased from 17.5 per cent to 19.0 per cent.

## SIGURITY INVISTIGATIONS OF INDIVIDUALS

### SYLOPSIS

Bureau responsibility in this field originated with Presidential Directives, the first one in September, 1939. Purpose is to identify potentially dargerous is dividuals who are affiliated with subversive revenents. This program is field wide and is with subversive revenents. This program, is field wide and is closely related to the Emergency Detention Program, which involves plans for the apprehension and detention of potentially dargerous individuals in the event of an emergency.

From November, 1964, through October, 1965, there was an average of 19,551 pending active cases in classifications 65, 100 and 105. This Section's principal case load falls within the 100 classification and during the same period averaged 9,000 cases per north. Instructions are up to date and administrative centrols exercised over the field by tickler system.

Other programs arise from security investigations of individuals and include interviews with subversives. We consider an interview in each case. The Security Index contains 10,156 names as of October 15, 1965. An average of 4 Fraud Against the Government cases per month have been opened since Povember, 1964. Requests for availability of witnesses from Coast Guard and Defense continue high. The identities of 22 potential witnesses were rade available during the period November 1, 1964 through October 31, 1965.

#### DETAILS

#### 1. Origin

Presidential Directives, the initial one being issued in September, 1939, and since repeated on several occasions. These Directives charge the Bureau with the responsibility for investigation of individuals in the internal security field. ### 5. Cone Land

Basically, these cases fall in security classifications 65, 100 and 105. During the period November, 1964, through October, 1965, the average field case load in these classifications was 19,551 pending active matters.

The Subversive Control Section is primarily responsible for investigations of individuals under the 100 classification although we do have cases on individuals under the 105 classification, such as the affiliates of the Nationalist Party of Puerto Rico. Buring the 12-month period November, 1964, through October, 1965. During the 12-month period November, 1964, through October, 1965, there was a monthly average of 8,992 pending active matters in classification 100 throughout the field.

### 9. Identicy and Currentness of Instructions

Instructions dealing with security investigations of individuals are contained in Section 87D of the Manual of Instructions and are in a current status.

We presently have included in the Security Index names of 10,156 (as of October 15, 1965) individuals. Each Security Index case is thoroughly re-evaluated at least once annually at the Bureau and in the field to insure that the cases are sound in every respect should it be necessary to invoke the Emergency Detention Program. If it is found that the subject's activities no longer justify the retention of his name in the Security Index, immediate steps are taken to insure that his name is removed therefrom.

### RESERVE INDEX

In June, 1960, the ther Corrunist Index, maintained only in the field, was renamed the Reserve Index and a program of bringing the cases of individuals whose names were included therein up to date was instituted. We broke the Reserve Index into Section A and Section B. Section A contains a list of individuals who should and Section or other action from the standpoint of investigation, receive priority consideration from the standpoint of investigation, interrogation or other action following implementation of the interrogation or other action following implementation of the imergency Detention Program. Section A cards are maintained at the Seat of Government and in the field. These cases are reviewed on an arnual basis and brought up to date. We presently have included in Section A of the Reserve Index the rames of 1,609 (as of October 1), 1965) individuals. Section B cards are maintained only in the field.

Section B. Reserve Index, cases are completely reviewed in the field on a biannual basis.

DISSEMINATION - INCLUDING CHECKS FOR AVAILABILITY

Security reports are disseminated to numerous interested agencies throughout the executive branch of the Government. By far the vast majority of such reports received are disseminated cutside the Bureau. The responsibility of such dissemination

assure that it is absolutely accurate both in form and content. In April, 1964, we initiated a program of dissemination of letterhead memorandum in all Security Index cases to Secret Service in connection with its responsibilities for Presidential protection. Initial dissemination was accomplished by early June, 1964, and as names of individuals are added to the Security Index appropriate letterhead memoranda are submitted to Secret Service. In addition, we keep Secret Service advised of changes in the status of these individuals on a continuing basis.

We are continuing to receive a heavy volume of requests from various departments of the executive branch of the Government for the availability of witnesses appearing in reports previously disseminated for appearance at hearings being conducted by such agencies as the Department of Defense and United States Coast Cuard in efforts to remove subversives from access to classified data and/or restricted areas.

During the period November 1, 1964, through October 31, 1965, the identities of 22 potential witnesses were made available to these agencies for possible utilization at hearings.

FRAUD AGAINST THE GOVERNMENT AND CTHER VICLATIONS ARISING
OUT OF SECURITY INVESTMENTATIONS

One of the principal violations has been violation of the Fraud Against the Government Statute arising primarily from a subject's failure to list rembership in a subversive organization when executing such documents as personnel security questionnaires. We have averaged opening 4 cases per month in this category during the past year and these cases are handled on one deak for

uniformity. The principal difficulty in connection with these cases has been the developing of witnesses other whan current active valuable informants who can testify to a subject's membership in the prescribed organization.

In addition, we have under investigation a number of possible violations of Title 8, United States Code, Section 11°5 (illegal travel) arising out of our operations in the internal security field. One conviction has been obtained, which is presently under appeal.

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

### 'SYNOPSIS:

Each month we follow the field closely on the status of security work by analyzing the backlog of pending active cases and delinquency in espionage, internal security, security matter, foreign intelligence and racial matters cases in classifications 65, 100, 105 and 157. Status of these cases as of January 31, 1966, is set forth below.

In January, 1966, there was a decrease in pending active matters in the field in classifications 65, 100 and 105 from 19,774 to 19,247. Delinquent matters increased from 1,370 to 1,428. The percentage of delinquent matters increased from 6.9 per cent to 7.4 per cent.

During the same month, pending active matters in the 157 classification decreased from 4,927 to 4,794 while delinquent matters decreased from 938 to 761. The field-wide delinquency in this classification decreased from 19.0 per cent to 15.9 per cent.

Letters are being sent to the offices indicated by asterials on pages 4 and 7 herein, commenting on their delinquency and pointing out the necessity for bringing their cases in these classifications to a current status.

#### ACTION:

The field will continue to be followed closely regarding delinquency in the 65, 100, 105 and 157 classifications and you will be advised of the results of the review of the administrative report for February, 1966.

### DETAILS:

The January, 1966, administrative reports for all offices indicate that the total pending active matters in classifications 65, 100, and 105 decreased from 19,774 to 19,247. Delinquent items increased from 1,370 to 1,428. The percentage of delinquent items increased from 6.9 per cent to 7.4 per cent. These same reports disclose that in the 157 classification total pending active matters decreased from 4,927 to 4,794; delinquency decreased from 938 to 761; and the percentage of delinquency decreased from 19.0 per cent to 15.9 per cent.

### SYNOPSIS:

Each month we follow the field closely on the status of security work by analyzing the backlog of pending active cases and delinquency in espionage, internal security, security matter, foreign intelligence and racial matters cases in classifications 65, 100, 105 and 157. Status of these cases as of February 28, 1966, is set forth below.

In February, 1966, there was a decrease in pending active matters in the field in classifications 65, 100 and 105 from 19,247 to 19,234. Delinquent matters decreased from 1,428 to 1,311. The percentage of delinquent matters decreased from 7.4 per cent to 6.8 per cent.

During the same month, pending active matters in the 157 classification increased from 4,794 to 4,832 while delinquent matters decreased from 761 to 655. The field-wide delinquency in this classification decreased from 15.9 per cent to 13.6 per cent.

Letters are being sent to the offices indicated by asterisks on pages 4 and 5 herein, commenting on their delinquency and pointing out the necessity for bringing their cases in these classifications to a current status.

#### ACTION:

The field will continue to be followed closely regarding delinquency in the 65, 100, 105 and 157 classifications and you will be advised of the results of the review of the administrative report for March, 1966.

Memorandum for RE: DELINQUENCY IN SECURITY INVESTIGATIONS

DETAILS: The February, 1966, administrative reports for all offices indicate that the total pending active matters in classifications 65, 100, and 105 decreased from 19,247 to 19,234. Delinquent items decreased from 1,428 to 1,311. The percentage of delinquent items decreased from 7.4 per cent to 6.8 per cent. These same reports disclose that in the 157 classification total pending active matters increased from 4,794 to 4,832; delinquency decreased from 761 to 655; and the percentage of delinquency decreased from 15.9 per cent to 13.6 per cent.

To insure maximum security with regard to our Security Index cards, the two keys which open the above cabinets are being kept in my desk under my immediate control in Room. These keys have been placed in a 3 x 5 box labelled "Security Index Keys."

Under present procedure, the keys are obtained each morning by a clerical employee prior to 9:00 a.m. on work days. After the cabinets in Room have been opened, the keys are returned promptly to my office and placed in the 3 x 5 box in my desk.

### RECOMMENDATION:

That a copy of this memorandum be placed in the Weekend Duty Folder in your office in order that its contents may be available to the supervisors assigned to your office on nights, week ends and holidays. The latter personnel are reminded of the established policy that under no circumstances are the Security Index cabinets to be opened by clerical personnel during nonwork hours. They may be opened by individual supervisors only upon extreme emergencies and then only with your specific approval, the approval of Inspector or myself or persons acting in our absence. If under such emergency, recourse is had to the Security Index cabinets, under no circumstances may any card be removed.
