All orders from unknown Correspondents must be accompanied by a sufficient Remittance or Bankers' or other satisfactory References. To save cost and trouble of Booking, a Remittance should in all cases be sent with Orders under 10s. in value.

ACCOUNTS—DISCOUNTS.—All accounts are due net in three months: we however allow a discount of 5%, i.e., 1s. in the pound, on all orders of 20s. and upwards, when accompanied by a remittance, or when paid within fourteen days of date of invoice.

CHEQUES, MONEY ORDERS, AND POSTAL ORDERS.—Should be made payable to DANIELS BROS. LIMITED, and crossed "BARCLAY & Co., LIMITED," Bankers, Norwich. Letters containing coin must be registered according to Post Office regulations.

CARRIAGE ON GOODS.—We pay carriage on the following Articles to any address in the British Isles:—

PACKAGES.—All packages are charged at the lowest cost price, and are not returnable, unless sent back in good condition, and Carriage Paid, within fourteen days of receipt of goods. Customers are particularly requested to put their name and address on each package, and to advise us by post when returned, or they cannot be credited.

All Fruit Trees, Roses, and Shrubs, will be so packed as to stand a journey of a week or ten days without injury. Should the packages arrive at their destination during a severe frost, it will be advisable not to unpack them, but to keep them cool and moist out of the reach of frost, until a change of weather takes place.

PACKETS.—Will our customers kindly note that, in all cases where Seeds are quoted by the "Packet," this is the minimum quantity that we can supply; smaller quantities or half-packets are not sold by us.

CO-OPERATION IN SENDING ORDERS.—Allotment holders, Cottagers, and members of Cottagers' Garden Societies, requiring individually but small quantities of Seeds and Seed Potatoes, if they join together in sending their orders, will be allowed a special discount of ten per cent. to be taken in seeds, besides the usual discount of five per cent. for cash, thus:—for every 20s. remitted, 23s. worth of seeds may be ordered. No order can be recognised under these terms unless over the net value of One Pound, and accompanied by prepayment in full. Each order will be packed separately and all can be consigned in one package, but full name and address of each customer ordering under this arrangement should be sent.

ORDER EARLY.—All orders are executed in the rotation in which they are received, and we would ask our customers to send us their orders as soon as possible after receiving this Catalogue. If every one waits for favourable weather, or until seeds are actually needed for sowing, it involves such a rush that an excessive strain is put upon our large staff of executants, and sometimes delay is as a consequence unavoidable.

WARRANTY.—We are extensive growers of many years' experience, and take the greatest possible care to supply only reliable seeds of the finest stocks and growing quality; it must however be distinctly understood, that we give no warranty expressed or implied as to description, quality, or productiveness, or any other matter relating to the seeds or plants we supply, and will not in any way be held responsible for any failure of crop. If the purchaser does not accept the goods upon these terms they must be returned at once.

RECOMMENDATIONS.—The many kind recommendations to new customers with which we have been favored in the past have been very gratifying. Should any of our customers have friends requiring Seeds, Plants, &c., to whom a copy of our *Illustrated Guide* would be acceptable, we shall feel much obliged by an intimation of the fact.

CORRESPONDENCE.—Our customers having occasion to write to us respecting any order previously sent by them, will much facilitate attention to their letters if they will kindly state the date on which the order was sent, and if remittance was enclosed name the amount; this will enable us more readily to identify their orders on reference to our Registers.

ADDRESSES.—Full Name and Address should be sent with every communication, and nearest Railway Station should be stated with every order, as much time is thereby saved, especially in our busiest season, when we often receive from 1000 to 1500 letters daily. In consequence of this large correspondence, we suggest that, at all seasons, Cut Flower Orders and other Urgent Letters should be so marked on the envelope.

CHANGE OF RESIDENCE.—We shall esteem it a favour if our customers, on changing their residences, will kindly favour us with their new addresses, so that we may be able to send them our Catalogues as usual.

REMITTANCES:—A remittance, or draft on a London Bank, should accompany all orders from unknown correspondents.



These are carefully selected to suit any locality, and are offered packing and postage FREE. Where our customers, however, prefer to make their own selection of varieties from the body of the Catalogue an extra amount should be added to their remittance towards the cost of packing and postage. In the case of heavy seeds such as Peas and Beans the postage is an important item. All Vegetable and Flower Seeds can be supplied at any time or season.

PACKING OF PLANTS, TREES, Etc.:—All orders for these have special attention by our Export Packers, the plants being prepared and packed with the greatest care so as to ensure the best chances of successful transit, an important matter in dealing with perishable merchandise, and an extra amount should in all cases be remitted towards the cost of such special packing.

**DAHLIAS, BEGONIAS, ROSES, } Dahlias and Begonias are supplied for Export
FRUIT TREES & OTHER PLANTS }** in dry tubers only, and must in all cases be left to our own selection of sorts. See pages 121 & 122. The Dahlias offered on pages 142 to 145 are as young green plants, and quite unsuitable for Export. Tubers of these, also Fruit Trees, Roses, Chrysanthemums, Pelargoniums, &c., can only be sent out late in the Autumn or during Winter, when they are in a dormant condition.

CUSTOMS OR POSTAL REGULATIONS:—Where special regulations or restrictions are in operation regarding the importation of Potatoes, Plants, Trees or Tubers, it will greatly help us if our customers will kindly make themselves acquainted with those which apply to their particular province, and give particulars of such at the time of ordering, to enable us to comply with them if possible, and thus prevent delay in delivery, or confiscation.



NEW AND CHOICE VEGETABLE SEEDS FOR 1910.

PEA, DANIELS' EXPRESS. A grand new first early Marrowfat variety, growing to the height of about 18 inches, and of great productiveness, bearing a profusion of handsome dark green pods $4\frac{1}{2}$ to 5 inches in length, well filled with Peas of the most delicious marrow flavour. In habit of growth it somewhat resembles Competitor, but the pods are much darker in colour and better filled. RUNNER BEAN, DANIELS' WHITE EMPEROR. A fine new variety, bearing a heavy crop of long straight pods, quite equal to the Scarlet Emperor. The seed and flowers are white, and it has a good vigorous constitution. It will make a most valuable variety for exhibition, whilst its heavy cropping and fine quality render it most useful for all purposes. Per pkt. 1s.

It is a continuous bloomer, a free setter, an abundant bearer, and continues in fruit for a very long period. The large, splendidly coloured fruits, which are produced in handsome clusters of eight to ten or twelve, are very deep, almost round in form, and very solid and heavy, whilst in flavour it is all that can be desired. This fine Tomato is admirably suited for growing in pots. DANIELS' PRINCE EDWARD. This grand new Potato is a seedling from our celebrated Duke of York, crossed with The Factor. 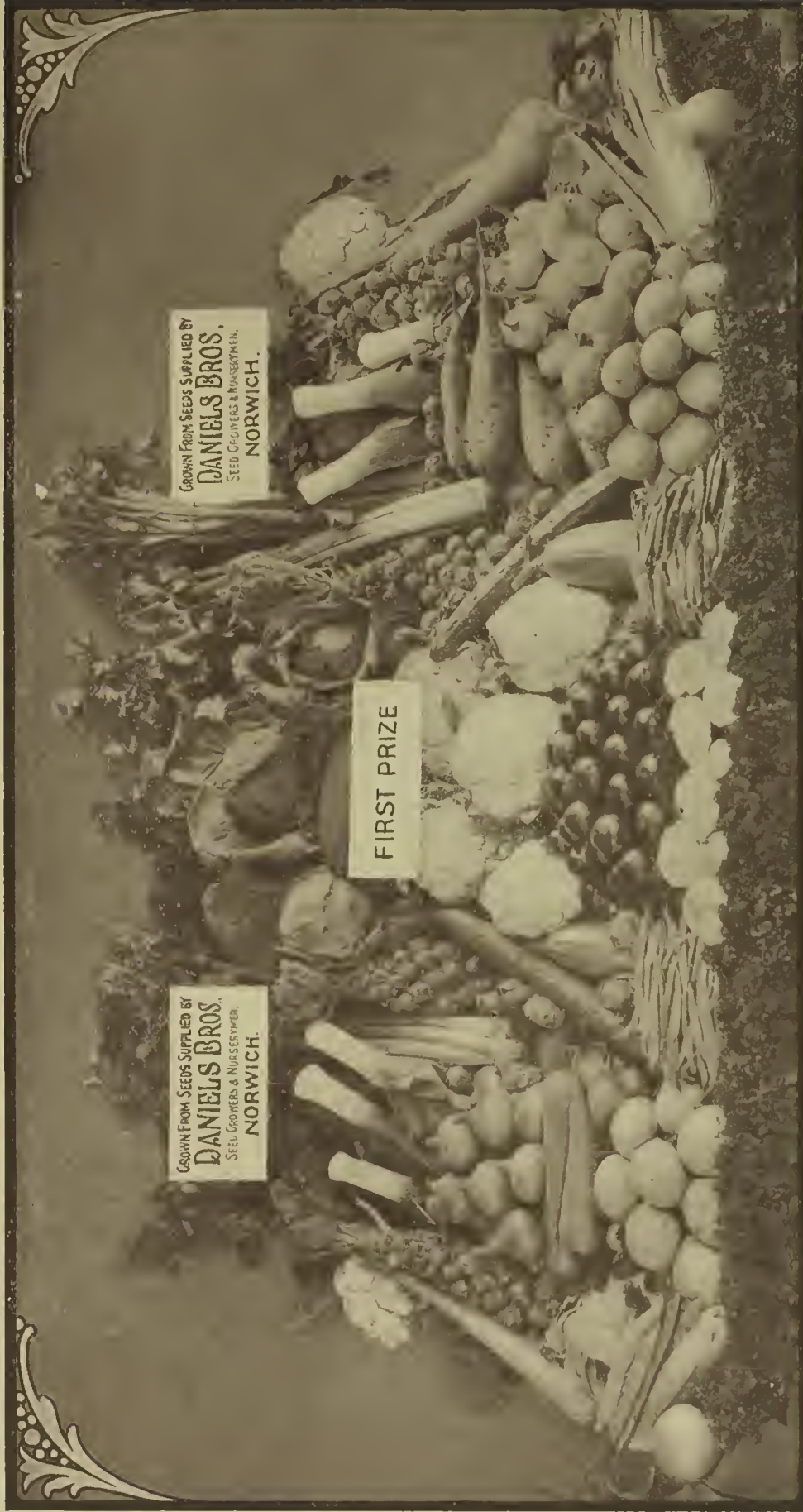

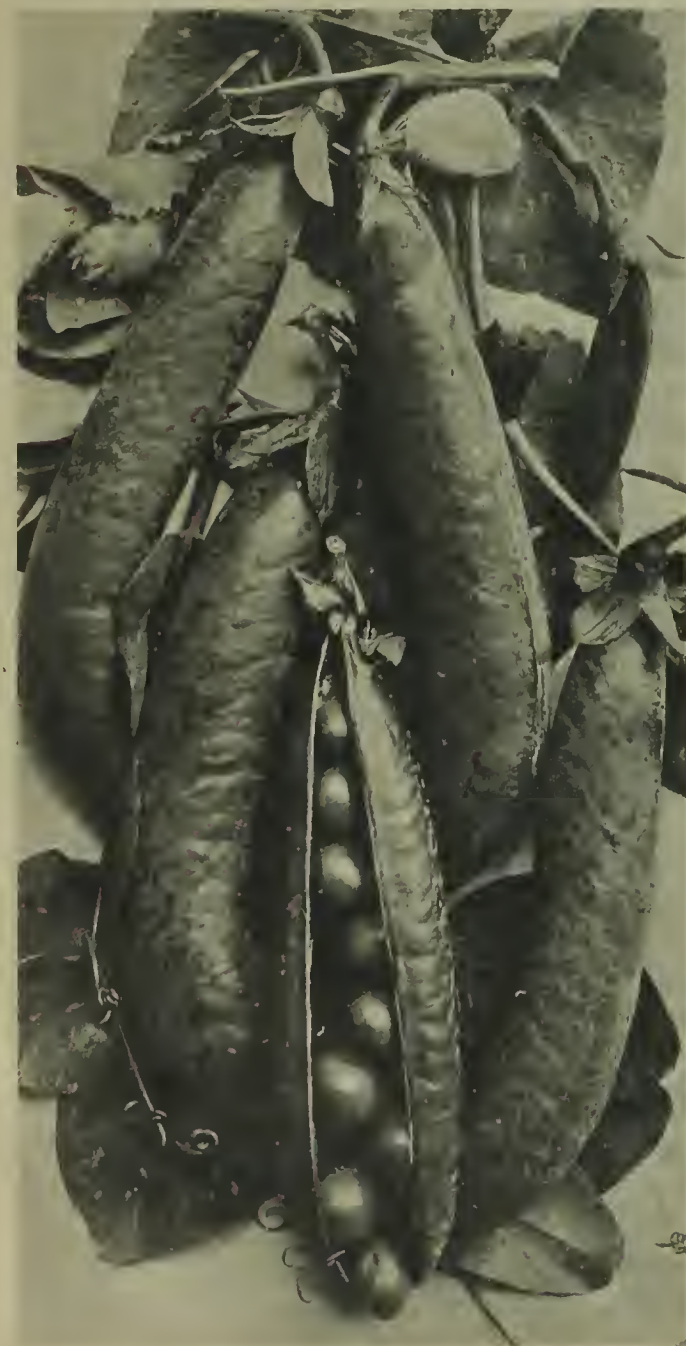

PEAS.

Cultivation.—Peas form one of the most valuable of garden crops, and when once started into growth, require, under favourable conditions, little attention beyond the staking of such varieties as need support, and mulching and watering in dry weather. Peas require a good rich soil, which should be well trenched, and should receive a liberal supply of well-decomposed manure early in the season. They are essentially a moisture loving plant, and only when the ground is well prepared can really satisfactory results be assured. Given these conditions, it is possible by a succession of sowings to have a continuous supply of Peas for the table from June till October, or even later.

First early varieties should be sown from the middle of January onwards, and the best sorts in this class are **Daniels' Gem of the Season**, **William the First**, and **The Pilot**; if the seed is sown in boxes under glass in January, hardened off in a frame and planted out at the latter end of March or early in April, an advantage of ten days or a fortnight may be gained. Second early and main crop kinds should be sown in March and April, and for late use a succession of sowings at intervals from the beginning of May until the end of June should be made. For these sowings the tall varieties will be found more productive, and not so liable to mildew during hot weather. It should be borne in mind that although most of the **Wrinkled seeded** varieties may be sown in March, we do not recommend this unless the season is exceptionally favourable. We find from a careful record extending over ten years, that little if any advantage is gained by too early sowings, and that Peas sown at the beginning of April take less time to come to maturity than the earlier sown ones. If this rule was more generally followed, we should bear less about had germination amongst this class of Peas especially in cold wet seasons. The seed should be sown in drills and covered at it is desired to grow some other crop between, when the rows may be 12 to 15 feet apart. Let the rows run from north to south thus allowing the plants to receive a maximum of light and air.



DANIELS' EXPRESS.

Peas suffer greatly from the depredations of all kinds of vermin, and it will always be found of advantage to give protection either by wire pea guards or some other means while the plants are growing. The rows should be earthed up before they are staked, and this should be done when the plants are about four inches high. If the tops of the sticks are cut evenly, and the pieces which are cut off placed between the large sticks at the base, they will prevent the plants from falling about, and give them an upward tendency from the start.

A good mulching of manure placed on each side of the row will help to retain the moisture in dry weather. Where this is not possible they must be regularly watered during dry periods, and liquid manure given once a week; a mixture containing four ounces Nitrate of Soda to one gallon of water will be found very useful for this purpose.

When it is desired to grow Peas for exhibition purposes the following points should be observed:—Sow the seed very thinly on ground that has been especially deeply trampled for the purpose, and which has been dressed with old farm-yard manure or the remains of an old mushroom bed. If they are needed for early Summer Shows it may be desirable to raise the seed on turves in a greenhouse and transfer them bodily to the border when about four inches high, but, generally speaking, if the seed is sown in rows in March and April it will be found early enough.

When the plants have shown about four blooms, pinch out the leader or top of the haulm. As soon as the pods have formed, choose the best shaped, and remove the others, leaving only two or three on each plant. Always select the strongest and healthiest plants for this purpose. When ready to gather, do not handle the pods, but cut off with scissors so as to retain their bloom.

BEANS—Broad.

Cultivation.—This highly nutritious vegetable grows well in any good garden soil, but responds readily to liberal treatment and should, therefore, when possible, be grown in well-prepared ground which has received a good supply of manure. The cultivation is of the easiest and everybody should be able to grow them successfully.

The earliest sowing should be made in February with our "Selected Long Pod," this being one of the earliest and best sorts. For the main crop, sow in March and for a succession in April.


The seed should be sown in double rows 6 inches apart, with an intervening space of 3 feet between the pairs of rows; place the seed 6 inches apart in the rows, earth up the plants by drawing the soil around them, when they are about 6 inches high, give a good covering of ashes to keep off the slugs.

When the plants have made a good growth and set a nice quantity of bloom, the centres should be nipped out, thereby throwing more vigour into the pods.



A liberal supply of liquid manure given at intervals during the bearing season will add much to the size of the pods, as also will a mulching of decayed manure, if put on before the hot weather comes.

The Windsor varieties whilst not giving such long pods are of excellent flavour; the best varieties for exhibition purposes are Daniels' Norfolk Giant Long-pod, which produces the finest pods of any of the long-podded sections, and Daniels' Mammoth Windsor, which is by far the best of its class.

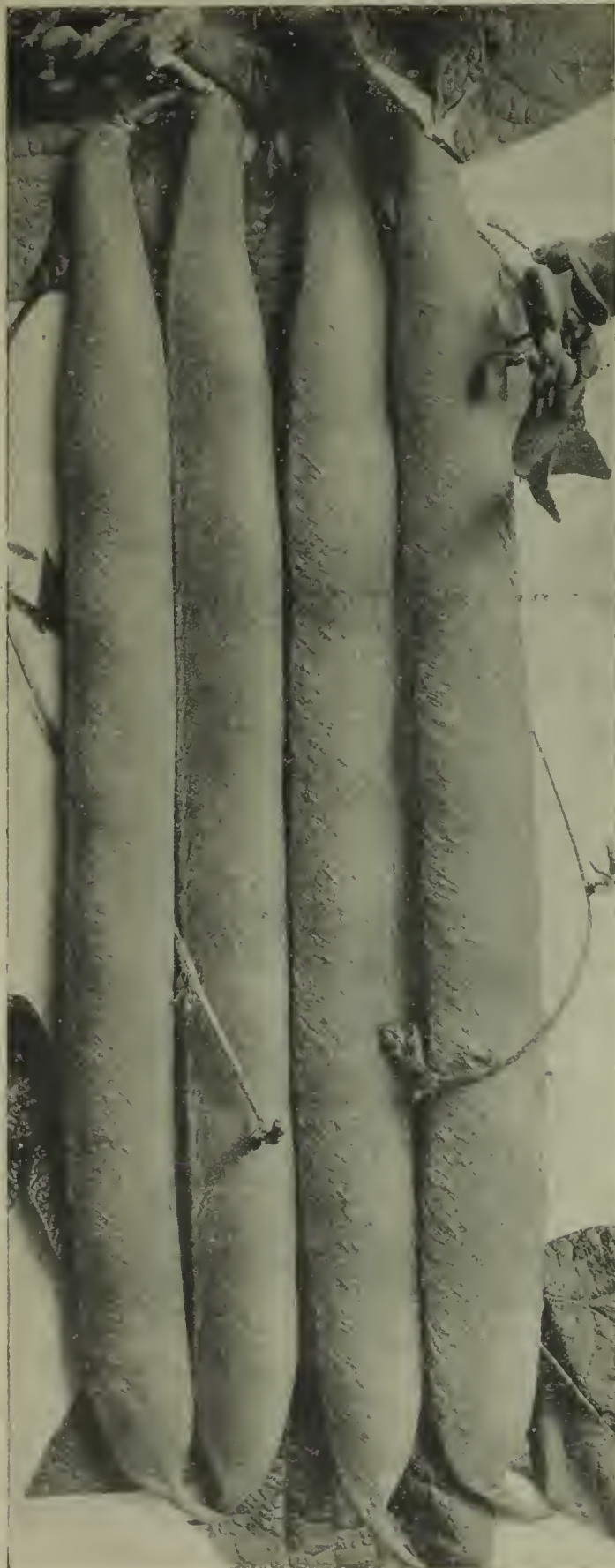

BEANS—Runner.

Cultivation.—Runner Beans form one of the most important and profitable of all garden crops grown for Summer and Autumn use, and yield a liberal supply of vegetables available for use after the Maincrop Peas are over.

They are easy of culture and may be grown as screens in small gardens, thus serving the double purpose of covering a trellis or wall and at the same time yielding a crop of delicious vegetables.

The ground should be prepared in the same manner as for other Beans, but Runners being somewhat tender the seed should not be sown until early in May.

Sow the seed in double rows 9 inches apart and, if possible, allow a space of 12 feet between each double row, cropping the intervening space with other vegetables.

For a succession make further sowings in June and July.

When the plants are about 9 inches high, draw the earth round them, and place tall, strong stakes to the rows, taking care to make them very firm and able to withstand the wind. A good mulching of rotted manure during the cropping season will lengthen the period of bearing and give quality to the beans.

Where it is impossible to procure tall stakes, it is the practice to take out the leading growths when the plants are about a foot high, thus encouraging a spreading habit and in this way good crops may be grown and space economised.

The best varieties both for exhibition and general purposes are Daniels' Giant White and Daniels' Giant Scarlet.

BEANS—Dwarf French.

Cultivation.—This useful vegetable can be grown by almost any one, as sufficient space for a row may be found in even the smallest garden. With attention to the preparation and manuring of the ground, there should be no difficulty in having a continuous supply of French Beans for a considerable portion of the Summer and Autumn.

The culture is of the simplest; the ground having been thoroughly dug and manured in early Spring, the Beans should be planted about the end of April; the rows should be 2½ feet apart and the Beans placed about 4 inches apart in the row, any gaps in the row may be filled up by transplanting the seedlings when just past the seed leaf.

The soil should be drawn round the plants to protect them from cold winds in Spring, and during the time of bearing occasional waterings with weak liquid manure will add much to the size of the produce and lengthen the period of bearing. Daniels' "Incomparable" can be highly recommended on account of its great prolificness and excellent quality.

Where greenhouses are available the earliest sowing may be made at the beginning of April, and the young plants transferred to the outside border when large enough to handle. A crop may also be grown in the early months of the year in heated frames or greenhouses, the seed being sown in 8-inch pots half filled with good rich soil, and the pots gradually filled up with soil as the plants grow. It is most important that French Beans should be gathered as soon as ready, otherwise the plants will gradually give up blooming and the crop be much reduced.

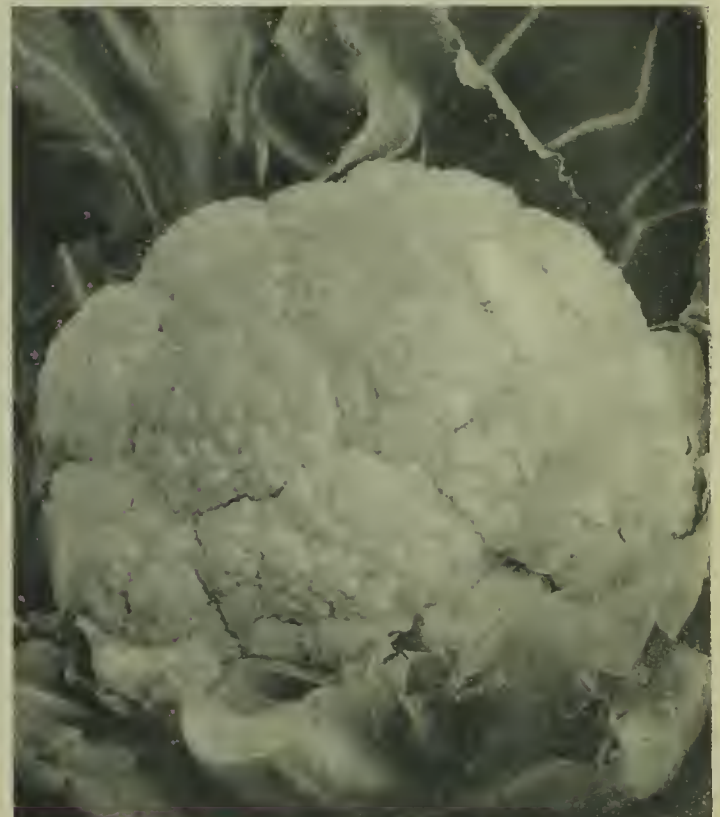

Cultivation.—This excellent vegetable is of the greatest value during the Winter and early Spring, when Cauliflowers are not obtainable and vegetables generally are scarce. They like a good rich firm soil, which has during the previous Autumn been thoroughly trenched and liberally manured. If possible, choose a piece of land on which Celery has been grown. The earliest sowing of seed should be made at the latter end of March, and the principal sowings during April, whilst May will be soon enough for the late varieties. Sow the seed either in a warm sheltered border or in a frame, in drills eight or nine inches apart and one inch deep. When the plants are large enough to handle, lose no time in pricking them out, as they quickly suffer if allowed to remain too long in the seed bed, becoming drawn and weak. The final plantings should be commenced in May, and followed on as opportunity occurs until the end of July, and as land becomes available. Choose the strongest plants first, as by this means a much better succession will be obtained.

The most important point in planting out Broccoli is to be quite sure that the ground is very firm; the harder it is the better it will be for the plants, as they will thereby be able to withstand the Winter, therefore if the land was trenched and manured during the past Winter, do not have it dug again just previous to planting out. Make the rows about 2½ feet apart and place the plants about two feet apart in the rows. Water the plants thoroughly after planting and keep the weeds down.

In severe Winters it is generally the practice to beel over the plants with their heads to the north, as soon as they are turning in, making the soil quite firm round the stem quite up to the neck, thus leaving only the head above the ground. In addition, a sprinkling of hay or bracken over each head will prevent any harm coming to them, and a very high percentage will be found to withstand the severest weather.

In the first division Michaelmas White and Self-protecting Autumn will be found most useful, followed by Daniels' Queen of Spring and New Year. For late crops Daniels' Norfolk Giant and Daniels' King are invaluable.

Cultivation.—To ensure a crop of good Beetroot, it is of the highest importance that the seed should be of the very best strain procurable such as offered by ourselves. Another very important point to observe is that the ground must not be specially manured for this crop, a good plan being to select a plot that has been cropped during the previous season with French Beans, Potatoes, or Celery. The soil should be a good light loam, where possible, and in an open part of the garden; the ground should be deeply trenched (the deeper the better) quite early in the season. Before sowing, the ground should be made firm and level.

Sow the seed any time from the middle of April to the end of May. For an early crop *New Red Globe* is one of the best. *Daniels' Crimson Perfection* and *Green Top* will be found the most useful for a general crop. The seed should be sown in drills one inch deep and about 18 inches from row to row. A liberal quantity of seed should be used to ensure a good plant, and when the seedlings are nicely up, they should be thinned out, leaving them about 9 inches apart. As a rule those sown at the end of May produce roots of better quality. Keep the beds regularly hoed and weeded so that the soil may be free about the plants.

When specimen roots are wanted for Exhibition, it is the usual practice to make boles about 2 feet deep in the bed with a crowbar, and fill them with fine soil. The seeds are sown in these and thinned out, one plant being left to each hole. In this way splendidly shaped roots are grown. The crop should be lifted in October and stored in dry sand in a shed or cellar for Winter use. Care should be taken that the roots are not injured in any way, or they will bleed and lose quality; also the leaves should not be cut but twisted off with the hand. In this way the roots may be kept until the following Summer.

BRUSSELS SPROUTS.

Cultivation.—To grow Brussels Sprouts successfully the seed should be sown at the latter end of February or early in March on a sheltered border or in a frame. Prick out the seedlings about four inches apart into seed beds as soon as they have made the first leaves, and directly the weather allows plant out permanently into well prepared ground, such as is used for general garden crops. For a later crop, a sowing should be made at the end of March, or early in April, and the seedlings planted as soon as possible; they cannot very well be planted out too early. Brussels Sprouts require plenty of room to develop, and therefore they should never be planted thickly. About 2½ feet apart in the row and 3 feet between the rows would be a suitable distance. Give a good supply of water when they are first planted, and keep the ground loose by frequent use of the hoe.

Brussels Sprouts thrive much better by themselves than when planted amongst other crops. In dry weather liberal supplies of liquid manure will be found of great advantage. BORECOLE or KALE.

Cultivation.—Borecole is of great value for providing a supply of tender green heads from Christmas onwards, during the very severe weather when Cabbages and Broccoli are not available. Many varieties of Borecole are also quite ornamental and present most attractive objects in the kitchen garden. Sow the seed in April in seed beds, and when the plants are large enough transplant them into their permanent quarters about three feet apart. As an alternative they may be planted between Potato rows.

Borecole likes good soil, but does not require liberal treatment with liquid manure, etc., as many plants of the same family do. Give a thorough watering at the time of planting out. If there is any tendency to "clubbing" noticed in the garden, a dressing of lime applied in the Spring previous to planting will be found of great advantage. 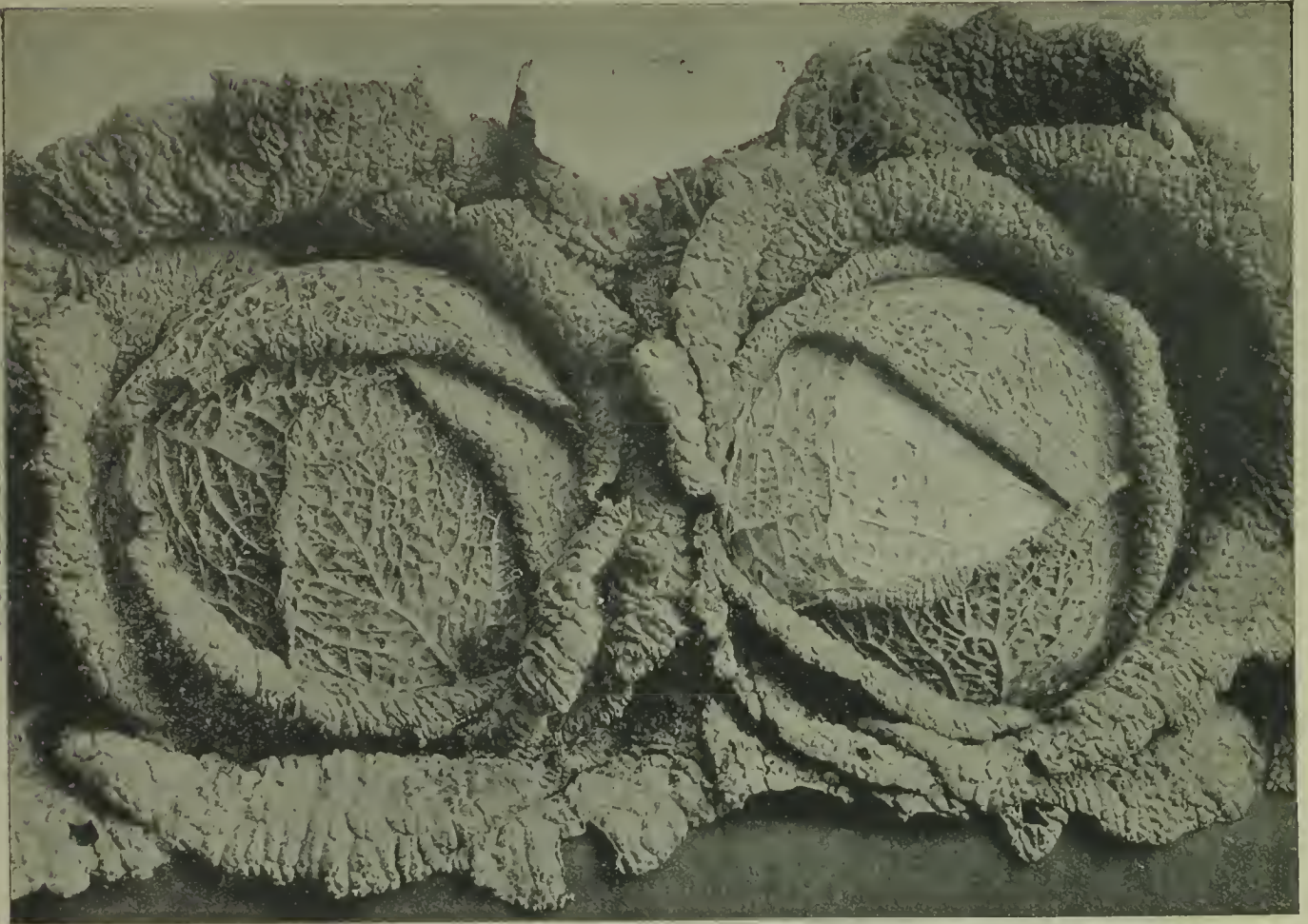

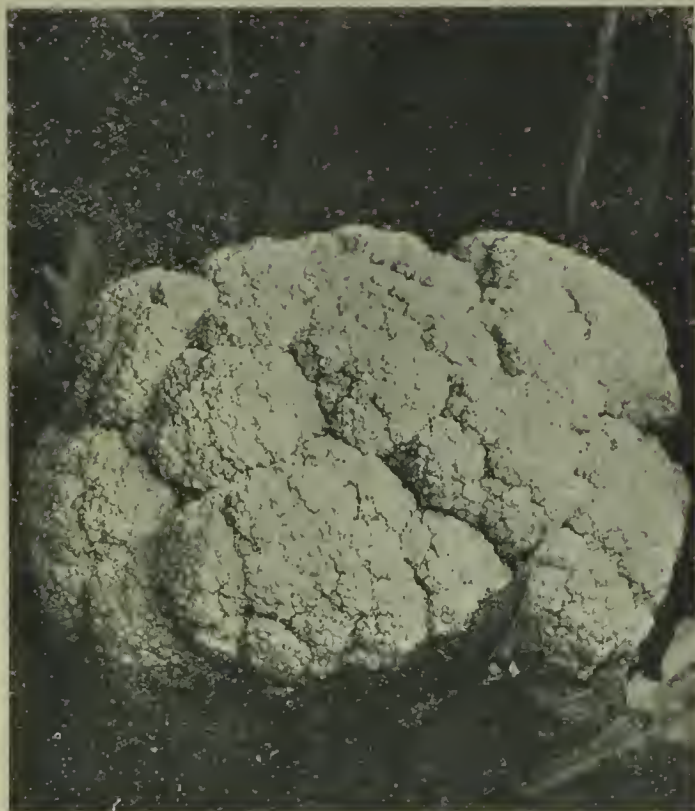

Cultivation.—Excellent Cabbages can be grown, without much outlay, by every one possessing a garden. They prefer a good rich loamy soil, a liberal supply of manure, and as open a position as possible. The hoe should be kept going every week on the beds, and an occasional application of Nitrate of Soda or Sulphate of Ammonia (at the rate of one ounce to the square yard) is recommended before the hearts form, when good succulent Cabbages are assured. For Summer and Autumn use, sow the seed in March, and a succession in April and May if required, and when the plants are large enough, prick out into seed beds, and finally plant out in rows two feet apart for the stronger growing varieties, such as **Daniels' Defiance** and **Enfield Market**, with two feet between each plant. For the smaller varieties, such as **Little Queen**, **Ellam's Early**, **Nonpareil**, &c., rows 18 inches apart, and 15 inches from plant to plant fulfil requirements. Cabbages are highly appreciated in early Spring. For this crop the seed should be sown in the Northern districts in July, and in the Midland and Southern districts during August.

RED CABBAGES.—Seed may be sown either in Spring or Autumn; if sown in the middle of August and planted out later, splendid heads will be produced the following Autumn.

Cultivation.—The Cauliflower is one of the choicest of our vegetables, and requires much care and very liberal treatment. Cauliflowers are very liable to bolt if any check occurs in their growth, and therefore every care should be taken that they grow on from start to finish without a break. It does not much matter whether the soil on which Cauliflowers are grown is light or heavy, so long as it is thoroughly trenched, and a very liberal quantity of farm-yard manure applied. To get the earliest Cauliflowers, the seed should be sown in September in the open, and transferred when big enough to cold frames for the Winter months. Early in March select a warm border and plant them out when a very early crop will be secured.

The earliest Spring sowing should be made in February in boxes on a hot bed, and the plants moved to frames and gradually hardened so as to be ready to plant out in May. A succession of sowings should be made in March in frames and in the open during April, May, and June, so as to secure an unbroken supply. Cauliflowers are most highly prized in Autumn when the Summer crops are over, and it is as well to have more than one hatch. When planting and also during dry weather, great care should be given to watering. Frequent applications of liquid manure will give size to the heads for exhibition purposes.

Cauliflowers are particularly subject to white fly which causes the plant to become blind, and any suspicion of this should be met with a dressing of soot upon the leaves in the early morning. The beds should be regularly gone over to ensure the heads being cut before they get too old as they soon get past their best. For early work, Daniels' King is undoubtedly the best, followed by Dwarf Mammoth and Autumn Queen. For general crop, Autumn Giant will be found the most useful.

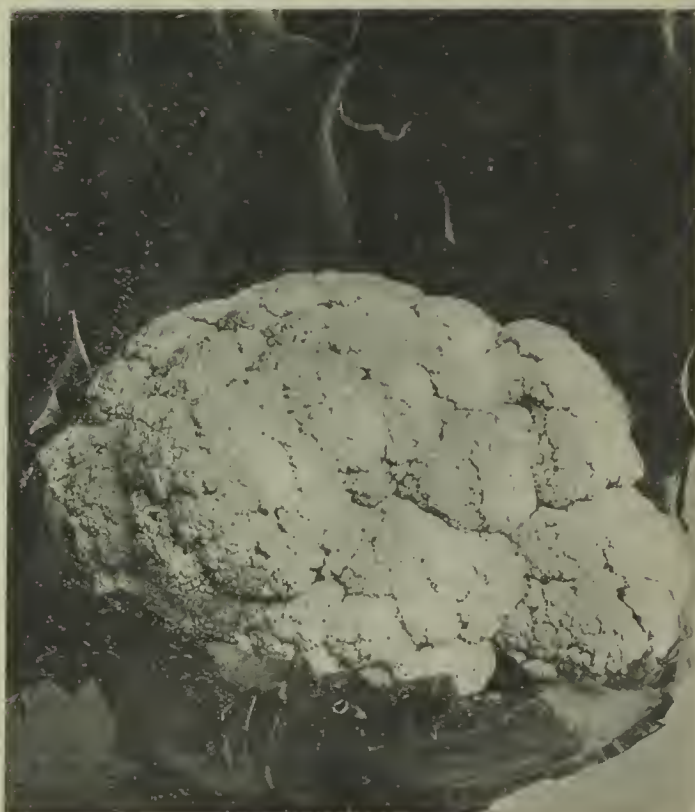

Cultivation.—By attention to a few points of importance, splendid clean straight Carrots can be cultivated without great outlay. It is not necessary to manure the land for a Carrot crop, in fact, freshly manured land is a drawback; the soil should be (where possible) of a deep light nature, and the land should, the Autumn previously, be deeply trenched two to three feet, and a quite light dressing of manure given at the same time; land which has been recently used for Celery is excellent, and will not need specially manuring.

For the earliest crop, make a sowing on the hotbed in frames between the rows of early Potatoes, and pull the Carrots quite small. The first sowing of the outdoor crop should be made early in April on a warm border, Daniels' "Harbinger" or "Forcing Horn" being excellent kinds; make other sowings in succession through the Summer until August, when the best kind to sow is "Scarlet Horn." For maincrop, "Daniels' Scarlet Perfection" and "Telegraph" can be highly recommended.

Carrot seed should be sown on borders of finely worked soil, in drills about a foot apart. When the plants are nicely up, thin out gradually, leaving the smaller growing kinds, such as "Forcing Horn" to be pulled as required, and the larger kinds seven to nine inches apart. Keep the hoe going between the rows to ensure cleanliness, and nothing more is needed until the end of October, when the crop should be lifted, the tops carefully twisted off, and the roots stored in dry sand in a cellar, for use as needed during the Winter.

When specimen roots are wanted for exhibition, it is the practice to make holes with a crowbar and fill with fine soil, sowing the seeds on the top and thinning out to one plant in each hole, as advised for Parsnips.

Cultivation.—This very important vegetable is one that fully repays a liberal outlay both of labour and manure. Being a moisture loving plant and a gross feeder, it should, if possible, be raised in soil where, during the growing period, copious supplies of water can be applied. For the earliest crop sow the seed about the middle of February, giving some heat, and when the plants have made their seed leaves, have them pricked off into boxes or frames, giving if possible a gentle bottom heat to keep them growing. Make a further sowing in March in a similar way, and, if necessary, another in April in an open border; these later sowings will give some useful Celery for cooking. It is an excellent plan to get the Celery trenches ready quite early in the season, so that advantage may be taken of the first favourable showery day to put out the plants when large enough.



In making the trenches throw out the soil 12 or 14 inches deep and 18 inches wide, and be careful to retain the top soil so that it may be placed in the bottom of the trench; mix with it a good dressing of farm-yard manure and in this mixture the young plants should be placed; the rest of the soil taken out of the trench should be piled up on the sides and used, when the time comes, for earthing up the Celery; allow a space of three or four feet between the trenches.

In planting out the Celery in the trenches, place the seedlings about nine inches apart, in a single row for the earliest crop; for the main crop they are often planted in double rows. In dry weather give liberal supplies of water or liquid manure to keep the plants growing, as if they get a check they are liable to bolt.



It is a good plan to give a sprinkling of soot over the foliage, while damp with the early morning dew, in order to keep away the Celery fly and snails.

The greatest care should be taken in earthing up Celery. As soon as the plants are about nine inches high, go over them and thoroughly clean off all side shoots, and tie the growth loosely with Raffia. Choose a fine day, and gradually work down some of the finest soil round the bases of the plants, being most careful not to allow any of the soil to get between the leaves; do not make the soil too hard, or it will stop the growth. Continue to earth up as the plants grow. The final earthing should form a ridge as a protection. In very severe weather it will be found an advantage to give a slight covering of straw or bracken over the top of the row.

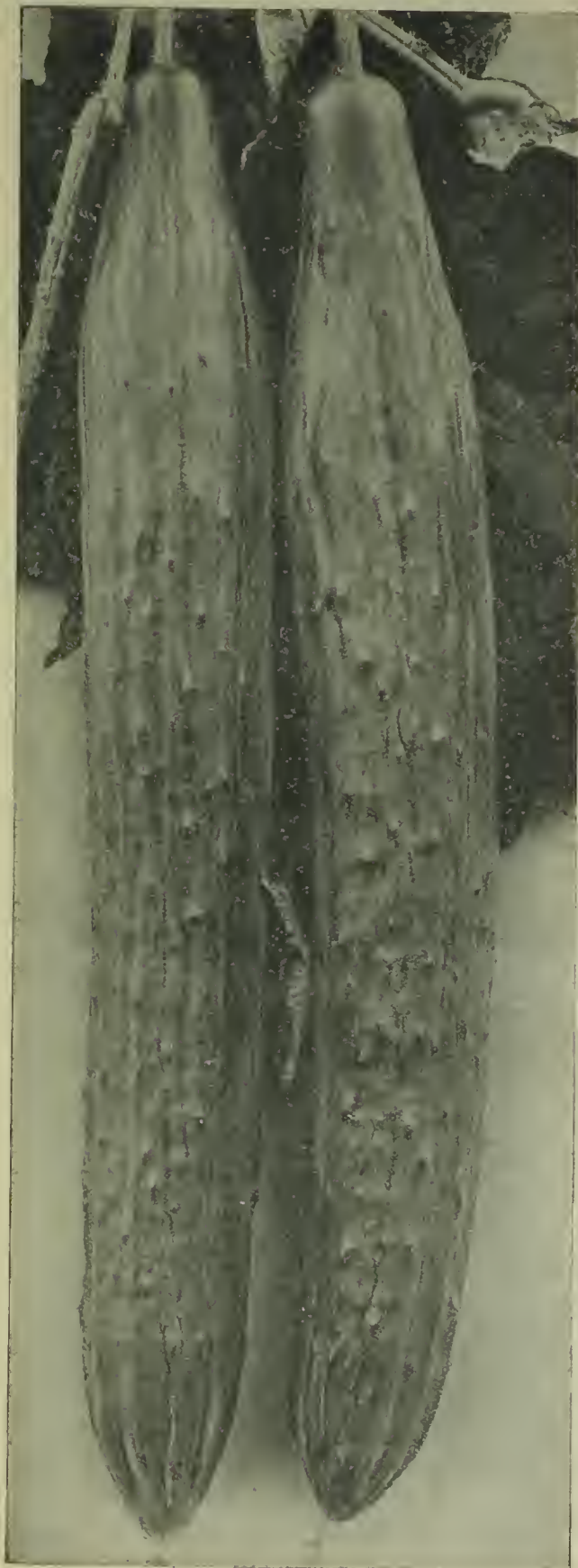

Cultivation.—Cress is one of the most useful salads grown, and it is quite easy to keep up a continual supply, as no expensive appliances are needed. If a greenhouse is available, fill boxes with good soil to within about half inch of the top, pressing the soil firmly, then sow the seeds thickly and evenly but do not cover them with soil. Put the boxes in a dark place and give a good watering; in about a fortnight the cress will be ready to cut. By repeating this process a succession can be maintained throughout the early Spring.

During Summer a shady border should be selected, and the soil raked fine and pressed firm. Sow the seeds and press down with a board, giving good waterings and protection with mats until the seed has germinated. To keep up a constant supply a sowing should be made every week.

American or Land Cress is most useful for mixed salads, and is quite thin out to allow about four inches between each plant, using the outside leaves only.

Water-cress can be grown in ordinary garden soil provided a shady border is chosen and copious waterings given. The seed should be sown in April, and the plants thinned out, leaving about six inches between each. Keep the plants pinched to prevent them from flowering. In Autumn fill pans half full of soil and place some of the plants therein. Put them in a greenhouse and keep thoroughly watered, and a supply of good tender Water-cress will be available all the Winter.

Endive should always be blanched before using; this may be done in Summer by tying the plants round with Raffia, or by placing an inverted flower-pot over each plant, but it is well only to bleach a few at a time. About ten days is the time taken in blanching.

When it is necessary to have a Winter supply, the latest crop should be lifted from the open ground and stored in cold frames.

Cultivation.—Endive is one of the most useful salads for Autumn and Winter use, and it is quite easy to grow in any garden. For Summer use a sowing should be made in April, in rows on a south border and the plants thinned to about twelve inches apart; a plentiful supply of water will ensure good heads.

For Autumn and Winter use, a sowing should be made in July and August. Choose a border at the foot of a south wall, if possible, sow the seed in drills one inch deep and twelve inches apart, and thin out the

Cultivation.—Many of the Gourds, while being most nutritious (when cooked in the same way as Vegetable Marrows) are at the same time very ornamental for covering trellis work, unsightly walls, &c., and they can be utilised to good purpose in this manner.

The Seed should be sown in heat in April, and the plants gradually hardened and transferred to their growing position during May. Give a little protection with handlight or branches of fir for a while, and also liberal supplies of liquid manure, while the plants are growing. For the larger growing kinds, allow a space of eight or ten feet between each plant; the smaller sorts may be planted closer.

When the fruits are developed go over the plants, where necessary removing a few leaves in order to ensure the sun shining directly upon the fruit so as to thoroughly ripen them. The fruits are also most useful for soups and stews, and if gathered before the frost comes and stored in a dry warm room will keep for a long period.

LEEKS.

Cultivation.—The Leek is one of the most nutritious vegetables cultivated, and although to produce exhibition specimens much care and attention is needed, still a thoroughly good crop for cooking purposes can be grown quite easily. Leeks are gross feeders and therefore require well tilled and liberally manured ground; the best plan is to give the land a thorough dressing of well-decayed manure in Autumn and trench it deeply, allowing it to remain rough for the Winter. The seed should be sown in drills in March for the main crop, and care must be taken to keep the ground thoroughly clean from the outset in order to give the seedlings a good start.

The easiest mode of culture is to dibble the young plants when about six inches high into holes made about twelve inches deep, giving occasional dressings of liquid manure. In September draw the earth round the plants. It is best to defer using Leeks till as late as possible in the Autumn, as the flavour improves.

When it is desired to grow Leeks for exhibition, a good plan is to grow them in trenches in the same way as Celery, allowing two feet between the trenches; for this purpose the seed should be sown on a gentle hoed in February, and the seedlings pricked off into boxes when big enough; it is important that the young plants be thoroughly hardened, as they will not stand eodding, but cold draughts should be avoided. When the plants have made about six inches of growth, plant them into the trenches, allowing about 15 inches between each plant; lift the plants out of the box with a trowel, to ensure getting a good lot of roots. As the plants grow, the soil must be carefully and firmly worked round the roots and this process continued all the Summer at intervals, giving frequent waterings of liquid manure. Some growers place collars of brown paper round the stems before commencing to earth up the plants as this excludes all light and is a great aid to blanching.

There is every encouragement to grow Leeks to a large size, as the flavour of the finest specimens is superior to the smaller ones. This is not so in most vegetables, but is certainly the case with Leeks.

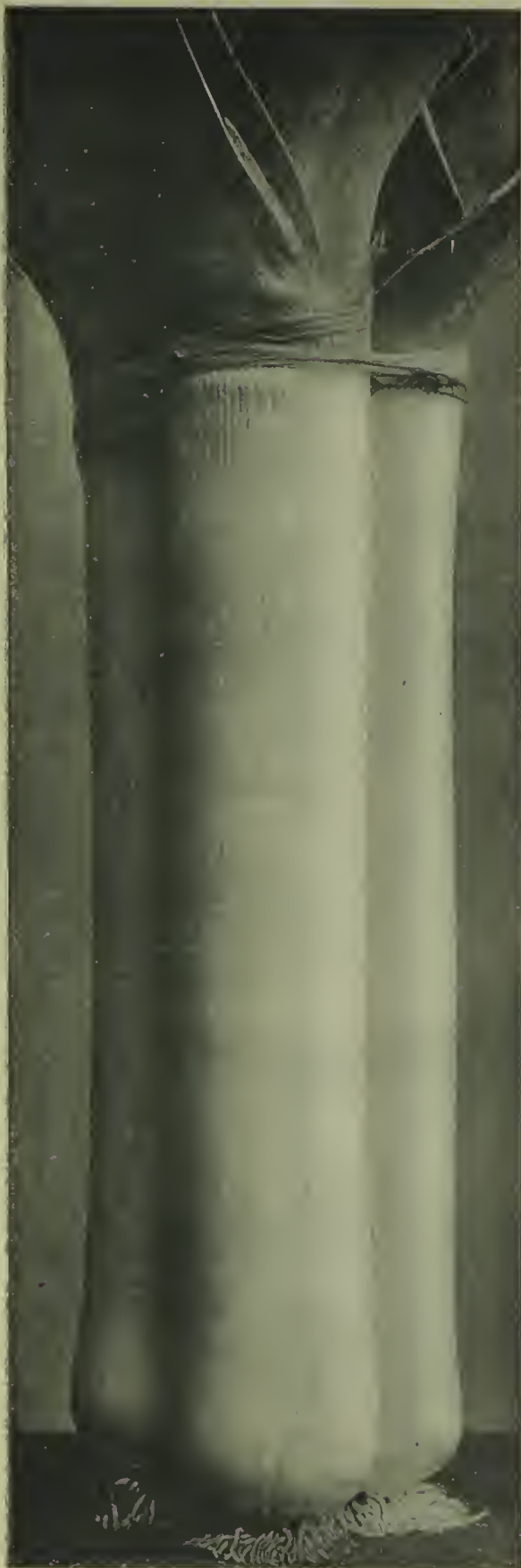

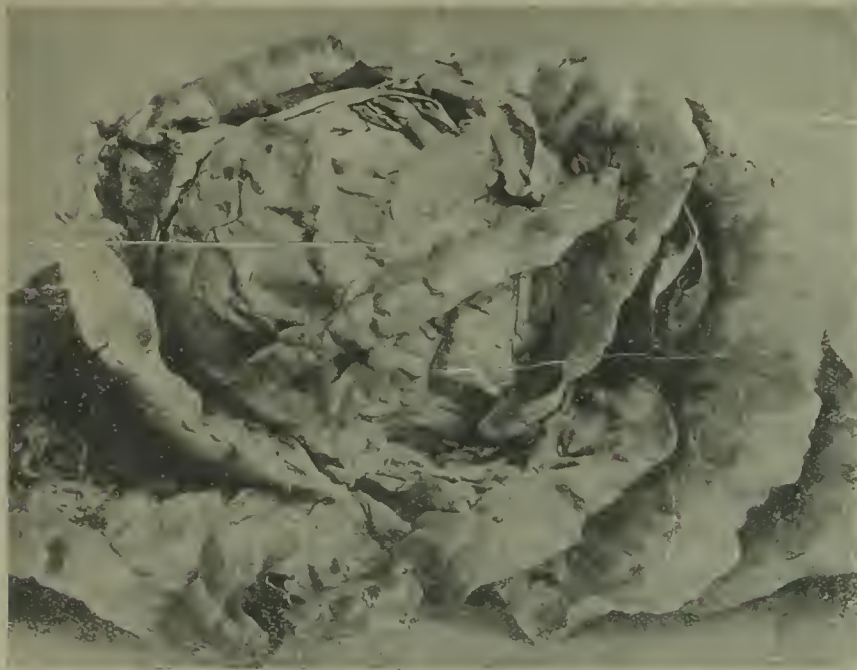

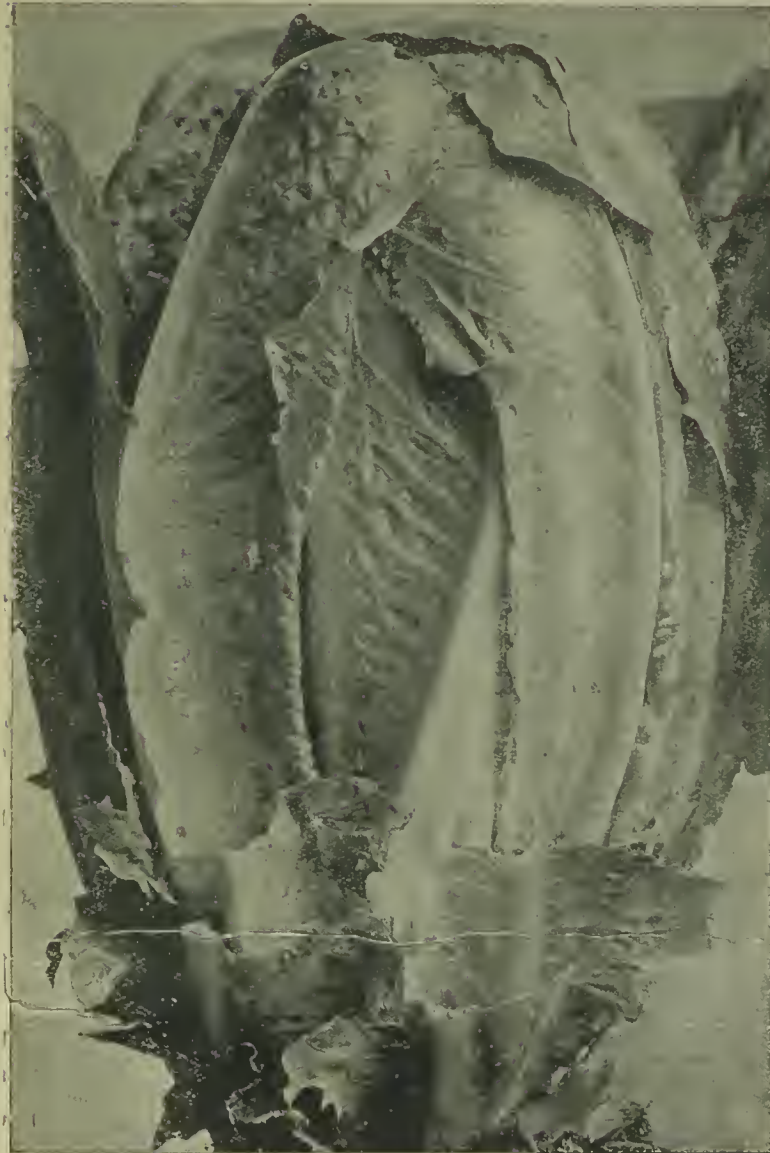

DANIELS' LITTLE GEM.

Cultivation.—It is often necessary that a practically continuous supply of Lettuces should be maintained throughout the year, and by a succession of sowings this may be done. For the earliest crop the seed should be sown in boxes under glass during January, and when big enough to handle prick out the plants about three inches apart into frames, there to be hardened off ready for planting out in a south border when the weather permits. Early in March a sowing may be made out of doors, preferably on a south border. Sow the seeds in drills, cover lightly with soil and protect from the birds if possible; when the plants are big enough prick them out six inches apart. By cutting some of the plants early, space will be left which will allow the remainder to develop.

A succession of sowings may be made until the beginning of September, and the plants which are to stand the Winter should be finally pricked out in October, the most sheltered position in the garden being chosen. In a severe Winter it will be found necessary to give some protection to these plants; a slight covering of straw or bracken being suitable. To secure crispness and succulence in Lettuces, liberal supplies of water should be given, and the hoe kept going regularly between the rows. For Spring and Summer use we recommend in the Cos varieties, "Daniels' Giant White" and "Daniels' All Heart"; in the Cabbage varieties, "Daniels' Queen of Summer" and "Daniels' Continuity," the latter is a kind which very rarely runs to seed even in the hottest weather. For Autumn and Winter work "Daniels' Solid Brown" and "Daniels' Black-seeded Bath," both very hardy Cos Lettuces, and "All the Year Round" and "Large White Winter," and "Daniels' Mammoth Green" in Cabbage Lettuces are to our mind the pick of the list.

Cultivation.—This delicious fruit is widely cultivated by all who can command sufficient heat. Melons are raised from seed in a similar way to Cucumbers, and their general treatment is much the same in the early stages of their growth.

Sow the seeds singly in a pot of fine loam and leaf mould, and place on a hot-bed; as soon as the plants are in the rough leaf, pot on into six inch pots; keep at an even temperature to avoid checking the plants, meanwhile have the beds prepared by forming a mound of good rich turfy loam and well-decayed manure on the border of the greenhouse stage, or in the frame. When planting make the soil quite firm round the stem, and give liberal waterings of clear water.

When the fruits are set, they should be thinned out to about two or three fruits on each plant, and occasional waterings of weak liquid manure given. As they ripen keep the bed a little drier; the temperature for Melon growing should be about 75° to 80° in the day, and 65° to 70° at night.

Cultivation.—Parsley being a deep-rooting plant pays well for liberal cultivation; it likes a good rich soil in a cool but not too shady position. Parsley is often grown as an edging to other kitchen garden crops and has a pleasing effect when thus used, and as it is in demand the whole year round it is an excellent plan to make a succession of sowings during the year to ensure a continuous supply. Make the first sowing in a box in February and when the plants have been gradually hardened off they should be planted out during April in the permanent border, allowing about twelve inches between each plant. Another sowing at the end of March will be of value for a succession.

For a Winter supply, a sowing should be made in June or July, choosing a sunny aspect on a south border. The plants should be thinned out to prevent over-crowding; those taken out may be potted up and placed in a cold frame or greenhouse and will yield an excellent supply of leaves for Winter garnishing. In the event of severe weather it will be found advisable to cover the outside beds with mats or an old frame, and a sprinkling of soot in the early morning during the growing season will be found to have an excellent effect.

Cultivation.—There are few vegetable crops upon which so much care is expended as the Onion, and during recent years its culture has received much more attention than was formerly the case. When the seed can be raised in January in heat (thereby obtaining an early start) it is possible to grow bulbs of equal size to those grown from seed sown the previous Autumn; about the last week in January is the time for the earliest sowing.

Sow the seed in boxes or pots in fine soil, a good mixture being two parts of good loam to one part of decomposed manure, or leaf soil. When the young plants are about three inches high prick them off into boxes, and give all the light possible, gradually admitting air, and hardening as the days lengthen, until the time arrives for planting out in the beds about the middle of April. The earliest sowing out of doors should be made in February, and the main sowing of all kinds in March.

The greatest care should be taken in preparing the Onion bed, the ground being thoroughly raked over, all the stones cleared off, and a perfectly fine surface obtained and the soil made quite firm. Sow the seed very evenly in shallow drills about eighteen inches apart and carefully cover the seed by putting the soil from the side of the drills with the feet. The whole bed should then be well trodden down both down the bed and across as well, after this, again rake the soil level and little further work is necessary beyond keeping the hoe going and thinning out the plants when the time arrives. Unless specially fine hulbs are required it is not advisable to thin too much. To prevent an attack of Onion Maggot in a dry season, a good watering with lime water will be found to be of much service.

Great care is necessary in harvesting the Onion crop. It is a good plan to bend over the tops of the plants in August by going over the plants individually, this will assist the ripening of the bulbs. Onions require to be thoroughly ripened before being taken off the ground and should, therefore, be pulled about the middle of September and turned over on the ground every two or three days for a fortnight, when they should be gathered into an airy shed in readiness for roping together, this being the best method of storing them for Winter use.

The Autumn sowing of these, which offers many advantages to the cultivator, has very much grown in favour of late years. When sown in Autumn, Onions grow to a much larger size, and are milder in flavour than those sown in Spring, especially when transplanted, and being much less liable to attack from fly, are rarely destroyed by maggot. They are besides exceedingly valuable for the supply of fresh green Onions in early Spring which can always be relied on.

Cultivation.—For securing specially fine Onions there is no doubt that it is much better to sow the seed in the Autumn. The ground should be prepared as for the Spring crop, except that the drills should be made a little deeper. Sow the seed any time from the middle of July to the end of August and treat in the same manner as advised for Spring sowing. Keep the ground clear of weeds, and give good soakings of water, if the Autumn is a dry one. If cooking size only is needed it will merely be found necessary to thin out the Onions and a good crop will be obtained, but if exhibition bulbs are required, the strongest must be selected in Spring, lifted carefully with a trowel, and transplanted nine inches apart on to a specially prepared bed of rich soil. Water thoroughly, at the same time making the soil firm round the bulbs. Keep the hoe going and excellent Show specimens should be produced without further trouble.

Potato Onions are a very useful crop and produce a heavy yield of underground bulbs; they are grown from bulbs (see page 55) and should be planted out in February in rows about 1½ feet apart, allowing ten inches between each bulb in the row. Draw the earth round them as for Potatoes and gather the crop in June.

Cultivation.—Parsnips are amongst the most nutritious of vegetables, and are quite easy to grow; a good loamy soil free from stones being the most suitable. Have the ground deeply trenched (at least two feet deep) in the Autumn, and give a good dressing of farm-yard manure, leaving it rough for the Winter. Early in February the bed should be levelled, forked down, and the seeds sown in drills about 1½ feet apart; thin the young plants out to about 12 inches apart as soon as it is possible to handle them, and be sure to keep the ground thoroughly clean between the rows by frequent hoeing.

When specimen roots are being grown for exhibition, holes should be bored three or four feet deep with a crowbar, and filled with specially mixed soil, leaf mould, and wood ashes; sow four or five seeds in each hole and thin out the plants, leaving one to each; weed the ground carefully and apply a sprinkling of soot to keep away pests.

Parsnips are always better when allowed to remain in the ground and lifted when required for use, but when it is necessary to lift and store them, they should be placed in dry sand in a dark shed or cellar.

Cultivation.—All kinds like a good rich soil; for the Summer Spinach select a warm border and sow the seeds in rows, where a little shade can be given; it is often grown between the rows of Peas and Beans. It is important that the plants should be thinned out so as to allow plenty of room for each to develop, and that the crop should be kept well gathered while young.

Winter Spinach should be sown in July or August in drills one inch deep, and twelve inches apart in a well-drained border, care being taken to thin out well, otherwise the leaves will decay, as they will also if grown on heavy waterlogged soil. New Zealand Spinach is a useful vegetable for the Summer, but will not stand the frost. Sow it on a warm border in April, and thin out the plants to about two feet apart.

Cultivation.—The Radish is one of the most popular of all salads, and to be crisp and mild in flavour should be quickly grown. It requires a good rich soil and liberal supplies of water during hot dry weather. Care should be taken in making the sowings to ensure a continuous succession rather than a great quantity at one time. The earliest sowing (for which our new variety "Best of All," is most suitable) should be made between the rows of early Potatoes or other vegetables grown in frames on the hotbed. Be sure to admit plenty of air as they will not bear excessive heat.

From February onwards sowings may be made about every fortnight in a warm sheltered bed out of doors, making provision for covering the beds with mats or straw on cold nights. This covering must always be removed in the day-time. It is most important, however, that protection from birds be made in the day-time, and fish netting is generally used for this purpose. In the middle of Summer a north-east border will be found a most suitable position for Radishes. Sow the seed broadcast and evenly, so that they are not too crowded. For Winter work the varieties "Chinese Rose" and "Black Spanish" are the best; they should be sown in August and the plants thinned out about four inches apart.

Cultivation.—One of the chief things which has contributed to the great popularity of the Tomato is the fact that it is so very easily grown. It is now generally recognised that Tomatoes can be quite successfully cultivated without such heavy dressings of manure as were used at one time, although there are certain periods when good liberal dressings of manure are necessary; but when the plants are young they do not need it.

For the earliest Spring crop the seed should be sown in January or early in February in pots or pans of light rich soil, and these should be placed on a shelf in the greenhouse; the vessel should be covered over with a sheet of glass to hold the moisture and kept at an even temperature until the seed has germinated. As soon as the plants have formed the seed leaf, have them potted off singly into three-inch pots and grow them on in a warm house, potting on into six-inch pots later, in which size they should remain until permanently planted out in the borders, or potted into the fruiting pots.

Many people prefer to grow their early crops in pots ten inches to twelve inches in diameter, claiming (we believe rightly) that they are better able to attend to the careful watering of the plants and thus avoid any injury to the roots. The treatment of young Tomato plants is pretty much the same as would be given to early Cucumbers, they should have a temperature of 60° during the day, and not less than 50°—55° at night. For a main crop sow the seed in February or March, then transfer into pots as before advised; it is of great importance that the plants be kept sturdy and therefore air should be given on all favourable occasions. The drainage of both the pots in which the young plants are grown on and the borders or boxes in which they are to fruit should be very carefully looked to, so as to allow of their receiving copious supplies of water, especially during the fruiting period. When planted out in the greenhouse border, the plants should be placed about 18 inches apart and supported either by means of a stake or tied up with soft string to the roof, all side growths should be cleared off as they appear, and only the main stem allowed to grow away, this being stopped when it reaches the glass, or when three or four trusses of fruit have been set.

The best soil for Tomatoes is a good rich loam to which has been added a light dressing of farm-yard manure, say one-fifth of the bulk; many growers do not put any manure in the soil at the time of planting, leaving the feeding until the first truss of fruit has set, when they apply regular dressings of artificial manure, or give a mulching of well-decayed manure and water the same thoroughly in. In no case must the manure used be taken from a heap that is heated or the result will be disastrous. Most growers cut off nearly all the foliage after the fruit is well set to allow the sun to have access to it: this is a good plan, but must not in any case be done too early or the effect will be very harmful to the crop.

Cultivation.—Vegetable Marrows are easy to grow, and it is possible in every garden to find a corner in which to grow two or three plants; they are often planted on old heaps of refuse, etc. It is not, however, essential that they should be planted on manure heaps, as they will grow quite well in the open garden in a hole which has been well manured, and in fact, they continue to fruit longer when so grown.

Copious supplies of water are necessary for Vegetable Marrows, and the fruits should be cut when young, as otherwise they become tough, and the plants cease bearing sooner. Sow the seeds singly in small pots, and plant out when about a foot high, giving protection for the first few nights. Another plan is to sow the seeds in the mound, where they are to grow, and to cover the plants with a hand-light, or some similar covering until frost has disappeared. Frequent waterings with liquid manure at the time of fruiting will add much vigour to the plants and size to the fruits.

Cultivation.—This most wholesome vegetable is a lover of moisture, and to be crisp and juicy (as it should be) must be grown quickly and not checked in its growth. Choose good rich soil which has been dug over some time previously, and if possible, in a slightly shady position, as during the Summer months Turnips become stringy and hard if exposed to the hot sun.

For the first crop sow Daniels' "Snowball" on a very warm border early in March, and a succession of varieties onwards until July. Thin out the plants when in the seed leaf, leaving the single roots twelve inches apart. Give occasional dustings with wood ash and soot in the early morning to ward off the deadly Turnip fly.

For Autumn and Winter use sow in August and September either broadcast or in rows. Keep the hoe going and all weeds cleared off to hasten the growth and ensure crisp tender roots.

Cultivation.—Salsafy is a vegetable which deserves to be more grown, as it has quite a rich and distinct flavour. Being a deep rooting plant, it must have well-worked land. The seed should be sown early in May in drills about fifteen inches apart, and the plants thinned out to about nine inches in the row. If specimen roots are desired for exhibition, they may be grown in holes made by a crowbar and filled with fine soil as recommended for Parsnips and Beetroot; a liberal supply of water should be given in dry weather and the soil kept loose between the rows by hoeing during the Summer. Salsafy should be lifted and stored in dry sand in a collar for Winter use.

Scorzoneria is a vegetable resembling Salsafy, being purple in colour. It requires similar treatment, but is somewhat hardier and requires a little more space in the drill.

HINTS ON POTATO CULTURE, &c.

Cultivation.—The varieties quoted in our list are the best in cultivation. It is most important that frequent changes of seed should be made, as Potatoes deteriorate if repeatedly saved from the same soil and district. For those growing for exhibition it is necessary to select varieties which are not only handsome in appearance, but also of known good quality for cooking purposes, such as "Royal Norfolk," "Duchess of Norfolk," and "Sensation." For early work, "Duke of York," the well-known variety introduced by ourselves is still pre-eminant, and the increasing demand for this kind proves its superiority over all others as a first early.

Much depends upon the selection and treatment of the "sets," it is therefore necessary to secure good moderate sized Potatoes which should be set up on end in shallow boxes or trays, and allowed to sprout before being planted, as when this is done much advantage is gained both in the development of the plants and in the weight of the crops. Potatoes like a good open position in the garden and the most suitable soil is a medium to light soil in a well-drained position, the ground should be deeply dug and manured in the Autumn. Where stable manure is available a good dressing should be given at the time of planting, placing a layer on the bottom of the trenches; well-decayed leaf-mould, or the remains of an old mushroom bed are also excellent for this purpose.

When planting it is important that an abundance of room be left between the rows and the sets in the row; allow a distance of two feet between rows for the early, and three feet for the late strong-growing sorts, and twelve to eighteen inches between the sets in the rows. Where the land is naturally low and wet it is a capital plan to elevate the rows by forming ridges and so planting the sets on about a level with the natural soil; it is also good to keep the surface soil constantly stirred with the hoe until the earthing up commences.

When the young growths begin to push through the soil care must be taken to protect them from the frost by continually earthing up the soil round them. (Neglect of this has often resulted in the loss of a complete crop of Early Potatoes.) and when it is desired to grow exhibition specimens only, one haulm should be left to a plant, all the weakest ones being drawn out as they appear. Slight dressings of soot or of "Norwich Fertilizer" during the growing season will be of much advantage. Immediately the growth is completed, the crop should be lifted; choose fine-weather for the work and store them after having had a few hours' sun on them.

Where small quantities only are grown it is much better to store Potatoes in a cool dry place where they can be easily got at, as they are not so liable to disease as when stored in a pit or trench.

IMPORTANT NOTICE.—Seed Potatoes procured during the Winter and early Spring, when not required for immediate planting should be taken out of the bag or package in which they are received and laid out in a dry, airy place protected from frost, or they will begin to sprout and a weakly growth will be the result.

Place several crowns a few inches apart in large pots, and stand them in a temperature of about 45 degrees, with an inverted pot placed over each to exclude light and insure blanching; a mushroom house, pit or cellar, will do well for this purpose. Sea Kale may also be easily forced in the open ground by covering it over with large specially made pots, and applying fermenting material. The heads should be cut when in about the condition shown in illustration, and taken off in the same way.

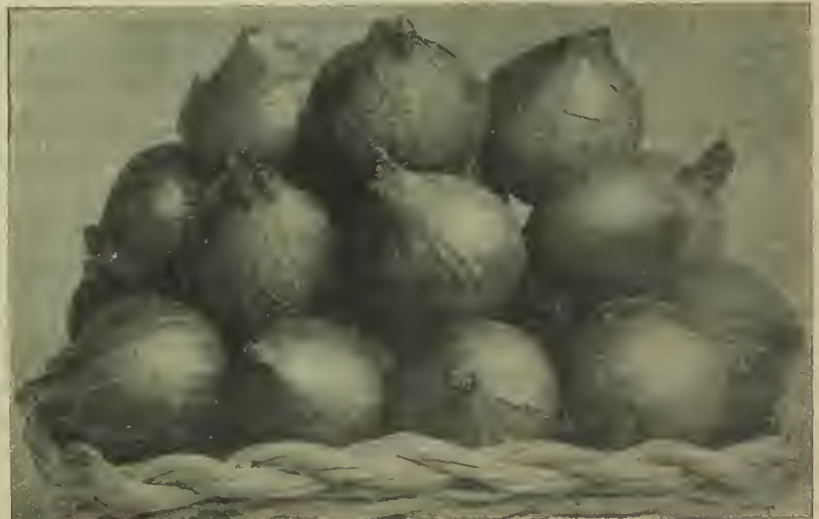

Hints on Lawns.—There is no part of a garden which requires such careful and regular attention as the lawn, and certainly there is nothing more delightful than a well-kept lawn in proximity to a residence. It is quite possible for even the smallest cottage to have its plot of grass, providing sufficient care is taken at the outset in forming it. The following hints will be found of help to those about to form or renovate a lawn.

Choose an open space as level as possible, and naturally well drained; if the ground is at all uneven it must be levelled by removing the higher to the lower parts. The whole of the ground should be well dug and pulverized to a depth of eighteen inches, giving a good dressing of manure at the same time, after digging rake the surface level and very carefully remove all stones, rolling it quite firm all over. Care must be taken not to allow any carting or wheeling upon the ground after being dug unless boards are laid down for the purpose.

The best time for sowing Grass Seeds is the Spring, during March and April, although satisfactory results are often obtained when sown in September. To ensure the securing of a good thick even turf, it is imperative that the seed be sown very thickly, in fact it is much better

to sow a liberal quantity at first than to have to renovate at the end of the season. Four or six bushels per acre is not too much, generally speaking about one lb. to a rod of ground is a good dressing.

Remove all weeds as they appear and as soon as the grass is three or four inches high it should be mown with a scythe and well rolled. Frequent rolling and cutting must be done if a really fine turf is desired and an occasional dressing of Daniels' Lawn "Manure," applying about two to three ounces to the square yard, will be found to promote a healthy growth of the young sward.

The renovating and improving of old lawns is most important work and may be done either in March or September. The seed should be sown evenly over all bare places and in all holes, using the finest lawn mixture; cover the seeds with a slight sprinkling of finely sifted soil and roll the whole surface down evenly and firmly. The sowing of Lawn Seeds should always be done in calm fine weather when there is no fear of either the seed being blown about or of the soil adhering to the roller. Small birds are very fond of grass seeds, and it is therefore most advisable to give some protection (when convenient) until the young grass gets hold.

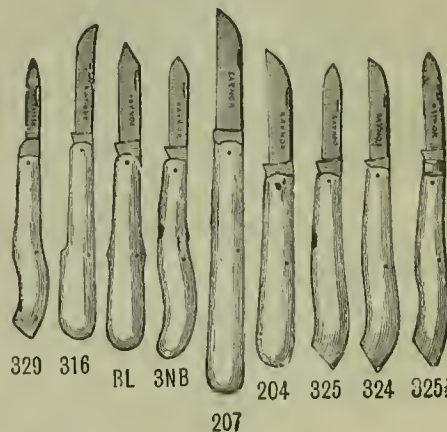

CULTIVATION OF ASTERS.

Cultivation.—Asters form one of the chief attractions in all gardens in which annuals are grown. They are procurable in every colour from white to deep crimson, are very easy to raise from seed, and give a glorious display of bloom in Autumn after many other plants have ceased to flower.

Asters are alike useful for borders and as cut flowers; the single kinds being of especial value for the latter purpose. The seed should be sown in March or April in boxes of good rich soil, and treated in the same manner as other half-hardy annuals; give plenty of room between the plants, and place the boxes in a sunny position under glass, allowing abundance of air and water; after about three weeks remove the boxes to a frame where the lights can be lifted off during the day, and so gradually harden the plants in readiness for their removal to the borders. The greatest care should be exercised in transplanting from the boxes, so as to ensure the seedlings getting a good start. For a succession of flowers seed may be sown at the latter end of April in the open border where they are to bloom. Good sturdy plants may be raised by this method, and will give a supply of late flowers, until the frost cuts them off.

Asters respond readily to liberal treatment although they will thrive in any good garden soil. An excellent position for them is on beds or borders which have been well trenched and liberally manured early in the season. Occasional waterings with weak manure water will be found of great benefit when the plants are developing their blooms. Such treatment gives substance to the flowers and extends the period of blooming. Where the space is available, it is an excellent plan to grow beds in the kitchen garden of separate colours of Asters specially for cutting purposes. Such varieties as Giant Ostrich Plume, Improved Comet, and the Single Sinensis will be found admirable for this purpose, and a supply for the house will be at hand without spoiling the effect of the beds. When only one kind can be grown we should strongly recommend our customers to try our **Giant Ostrich Plume** as being in our opinion the most delightful of all the doubles. The flowers which are very large, are borne on tall graceful stems often 18 inches long, and the colours are most distinct and varied. Ostrich Plume are quite as easily grown as the ordinary sorts.

Our **Large-Flowered Comet**, while not growing quite so tall as the former, gives large, beautiful flowers, and is of great value both for bedding and cutting purposes. The perfect type of Dwarf Bedding Aster is found in our **Dwarf Perfection**, which forms an ideal edging to a bed of taller kinds, or is equally effective in a bed by itself.

Cultivation of Stocks.—These deliciously-scented half-hardy annuals are amongst the most popular of all Summer bedding plants and they are deservedly given a place in both large and small gardens.

Ten-Week Stocks are easily raised from seed, but require careful treatment when in the seedling stage, as they are liable to damp off if over-watered and kept close, but if they are given an abundance of air and kept moderately moist, nothing need be feared and sturdy plants are assured.

During recent years much care has been devoted to the improvement of Stocks, both with regard to increasing the size of the individual flowers as well as the spike, and to the introduction of much clearer colours. It is now possible to grow them in every shade of colour from pure white to deep crimson and purple.

When planted in clumps of distinct colours on borders or in separate beds, Ten-Week Stocks form most attractive subjects, and the perfume is so delicious that after a shower of rain a bed in full bloom will fill the garden with its delightful odour.

The seed may be sown at any time from February to June, according to the time the plants are required to bloom, they are best raised in a frame or greenhouse. Either shallow wooden seed boxes or pans may be used and the seed can be sown either in drills lengthwise down the boxes or (in the case of pans) sprinkled lightly over the surface, the seed being spread as evenly as possible.

The soil used should be rich potting mould finely sifted, and after sowing, the seed should be thinly covered with the same, keep the frame close and shaded until the seeds have germinated, when a little air should be given and the amount gradually increased as the plants gain strength.

When the plants are large enough to handle with safety they should be transplanted into boxes, allowing nine inches between each plant.

They can then be gradually hardened off, but should be at first carefully protected at night from the frost.

Give abundance of air during the daytime, and after about three weeks or a month they should be ready for planting out in the positions in which they are to bloom in the border or beds.

When a succession of flowers is desired, a sowing of Stocks should be made in the open border when strong sturdy plants will be raised; these will follow on in succession after those raised inside.

Always be careful that the borders are thoroughly trenched and given a liberal supply of decomposed manure before the Stocks are planted.

If possible, select showery weather for planting out, and be sure that the plants are thoroughly watered into the ground and kept shaded during the middle of the day for the first few days.

In planting out seedling Ten-Week Stocks, with a view to securing the largest number of double flowers, preference should always be given to those with a good share of *fine fibrous* roots, even if the plants are somewhat weaker; we have found from long experience that those having coarse forked roots invariably produce the largest percentage of single blooms.

By sowing the seed in July and potting the seedlings in single pots and growing on in a frame, a good display of bloom may be had in the greenhouse during the Winter months.

WINTER-FLOWERING AND INTERMEDIATE STOCKS.—This is a very useful class for Winter blooming. The seed should be sown in July and the plants potted on into 5 inch pots, placing 3 plants in each pot; no artificial heat is needed but the plants may be grown on, and placed in a greenhouse or conservatory, where they will provide a splendid show of bloom in the early part of the year.

BROMPTON STOCKS.—Sow the seed in May in boxes and plant out the seedlings in a sheltered border, where they may grow on all Summer, and in August and September transfer to their blooming quarters. It is sometimes the practice to move the seedlings straight from the seed bed to the positions they are to permanently occupy. Brompton Stocks are most excellent for furnishing a show of flowers in the gardens in Spring.

The Campanulas form a splendid group of plants for the garden, and are well worthy of cultivation. They are easily grown, and when in bloom are very charming. They will succeed almost anywhere, but generally speaking thrive best in a light rich sandy soil. The seeds may be sown at any time from April to the end of June.

The "Marguerite" Section is a special favourite with amateurs, as the plants when raised from seed early in the Spring, produce an abundance of flowers during the Summer, if sown in June, carefully lifted in Autumn and potted up, they will continue to bloom right into the Winter. Carnation seed may be sown from March to May in well-drained pans of good rich soil, and these should be kept shaded until the seeds have germinated, when the plants should be gradually hardened off by admitting air and light. Prick off the seedlings about nine inches apart in boxes or prepared borders, and let them stay there until the Autumn, when they may be permanently planted in the positions they are to occupy.

Cultivation.—When required for a general display in early Spring, the seed should be sown in July or early in August, and when for Winter blooming, a few should be sown in March or April. Where the quantity of glass available is somewhat limited, the July sown will, however, be found the most useful. Sow in well-drained pots or pans of light rich soil, giving the seeds but a very slight covering, and place in a cool frame or under a hand-light in a shady spot, pot off singly into small pots as soon as the young plants are large enough, and shift as required. Good Cinerarias may also be easily raised by sowing in July or August in a moist, shady situation in the open air, taking care to pot up in September. Cinerarias will bear a great amount of cold, but should never be exposed to frost. Green fly, damp, excessive waterings, and extreme dryness should also be carefully guarded against.

CYCLAMEN—SALMON KING.

The best time for sowing the seeds is in October or November, and again in January, February, or March, for a succession. When sowing, use a light rich soil, press down firmly into the seed pots or pans, placing the seeds about half an inch apart on the surface, and covering them about a quarter of an inch deep with soil; water carefully and place in a gentle heat. As the young plants become large enough to handle they should be carefully lifted and potted off singly into small pots, shifting them into larger as these fill with roots, and finishing with the forty-eight size, which will be large enough for blooming. The best soil to use for potting Cyclamens is composed of about equal parts of fibrous loam and leaf-mould, with a portion of well-decayed cow dung and sufficient silver sand to keep the soil porous. The essential conditions of successful cultivation of Cyclamens are a moist and even temperature—sudden changes are especially to be avoided—a free circulation of air, an abundance of light and water, and the plants should be kept free of insects.

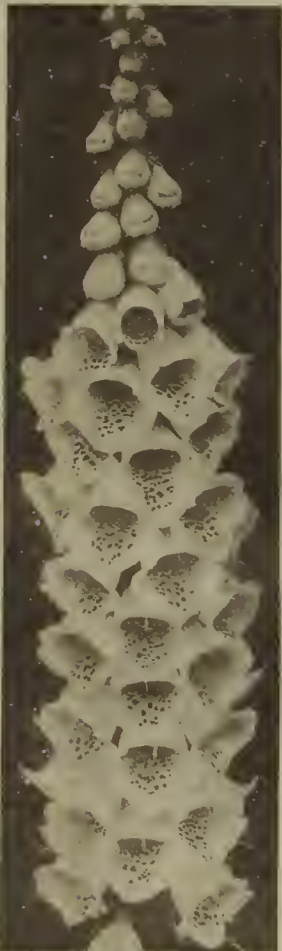

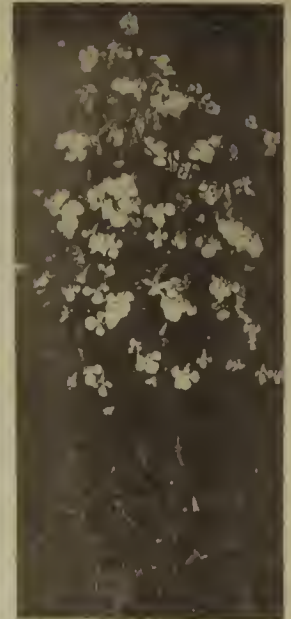

To secure fine plants for bedding out the following May, some prefer to sow the seed in Autumn, but February or March is good time for sowing if the plants have careful attention and are grown on freely. Sow the seeds thinly in pans or pots of sandy loam, cover very lightly, and place in a heat of about sixty degrees, keep moist, and soon as the young plants can be handled, pot off singly into small pots of light rich soil, keep near the glass in a gentle heat, and give plenty of air on fine days. Carefully picking off all the flower-buds will greatly assist their growth, and they should on no account be allowed to suffer from want of moisture. Other excellent methods are to prick the young plants five or six in a five-inch pot, or, better still, to plant them thinly in shallow trays of rich soil, keeping in gentle heat, giving air, &c., as recommended. These will generally form compactly grown, sturdy plants, that will quickly produce a beautiful effect when planted out. Lobelias intended for pots or window-boxes succeed best when planted out thinly in good soil in an open situation, and carefully lifted when they have formed nice tufty plants; these will at once commence blooming, and produce an effect that could not be otherwise obtained. For bedding out, we strongly recommend Daniels' Dark Blue and Daniels' White Bedding as most compact in growth and reliable in colour. Royal Purple, Barnard's Perpetual are also very fine, whilst for pot culture, hanging baskets, and greenhouse decoration, the beautiful tenuior and the varieties of ramosa are by far the best.

LOBELIA CARDINALIS VICTORIA.

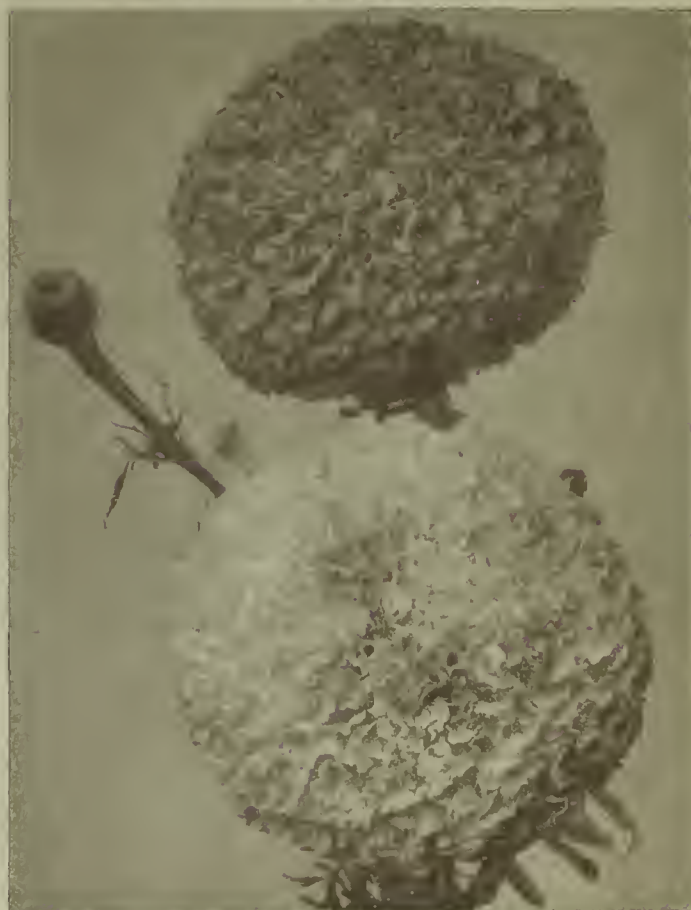

Petunias in their many beautiful varieties form a highly interesting and desirable class of free-flowering plants for pot or garden culture; those of the Grandiflora section, both single and double-flowered, being especially valuable. The blooms of these are of immense size, beautifully formed, and of the most charming and delicate colours; some of the flowers are exquisitely veined or pencilled, others blotched or striped. The new "Fringed" varieties, both double and single, produce some charming flowers, the edges of the petals being elegantly cut or fringed, whilst the colours are most varied and beautiful. The seed we offer has been carefully saved from fecundated flowers of the finest varieties; but as Petunias raised from seed have a tendency to "sport," we cannot guarantee more than sixty or seventy per cent. of flowers true to description. All will, however, be found well worth growing, and occasionally some fine novelties may be secured. Petunias for indoor cultivation may be sown in January or early in February, but those intended for bedding out do not require to be sown before March. A soil composed of two parts leaf-mould and one part loam, with the addition of a little sharp sand, forms an excellent compost for these, but the seeds being very small require special care in sowing. Fill your pots or seed-pans to near the rim and press the soil down firmly and evenly, sow thinly, and cover the seeds very slightly with fine soil, sprinkle gently with a fine rose water-pot, and place in a gentle heat of sixty or sixty-five degrees, not higher, and keep nicely moist. As soon as the young plants can be handled, prick them out about one inch apart in pots to strengthen, and when sufficiently advanced in growth pot off singly into small pots, gradually harden off when established, and plant out about the middle of May, or shift into large pots as required. In planting Petunias out of doors, ground should be selected that has not been freshly manured, otherwise a superabundant foliage will retard the flowering.

DANIELS' SUPERB FRINGED PRIMULAS

It is with very much pleasure that we offer the grand strains of Primulas named below, all of which have been specially grown for our retail trade, and will give the highest satisfaction. The flowers will be found of great size and perfect form, combined with the most brilliant and charming colours, and a habit of plant which leaves nothing to be desired.

The beautiful varieties of *Primula sinensis* may be sown in March, April, May, and June. The earlier sown are, however, to be preferred for making fine strong plants with an abundance of bloom. Great care must be taken to have a well-drained pot or seed-pan filled to within half an inch of the top with sifted leaf-mould; leave the surface rather rough, and sprinkle the seeds thinly upon it. The most successful raisers do not cover with soil but after sowing the seed press down the surface tolerably firm, and place a square of glass over the pot. Place in a good strong heat, shaded from strong light, and water very gently when the soil becomes dry. The seeds will germinate in two or three weeks, after which remove the glass and keep in a shady position. Pot off into small pots when the young plants are about half an inch above ground, and place near the glass in the frame or greenhouse. In their after culture Primulas should be kept as near as convenient to the glass, have plenty of fresh air, and never be kept for a long period in a high temperature or in a dry heated atmosphere.

ZINNIA.

These splendid half-hardy annuals are of great value as bedding and border plants, and should always be grown for their brilliant and beautiful colours. The middle of March is quite soon enough to sow the first hatch of Zinnias under glass. Successive sowings may be made till the latter part of April. Sow the seeds in pans or pots of light, rich, finely made soil, and place in a moderate heat. Soon as the young plants are large enough to handle, they should be potted off singly into small pots or pricked out into larger pots or pans to strengthen. To prevent the plants drawing up too much, keep as close as convenient to the glass, give plenty of air on fine warm days, and if the leading flower buds are pinched out as they make their appearance, a more hushy and vigorous growth will follow. Planting out should not take place till all danger from May frosts is over. An open sunny position with fairly rich soil should be chosen and the plants should not be less than a foot apart. Weak liquid manure given once or twice a week before the plants come into flower, will assist in the development of some fine blooms. The flowers of Zinnias have a tendency to sport, and although the seeds of these have been carefully saved we cannot guarantee that the flowers will be absolutely true to the colours mentioned.

LILIES (Lilium) for Spring Planting.

For growing Lilies in pots a compost of about equal parts of sandy loam, leaf mould, and peat, is, perhaps, the best. Fine Lilies may however, be grown in almost any good light and rich soil, especially those of the Auratum type. For single specimens use pots of about six inches diameter. These will be found very useful for house decoration; but pots of eight or ten inches diameter, with five or six bulbs in each, form grand objects for the conservatory when in bloom. Pot firmly, any time during Spring, with the bulbs about two inches below the surface, and plunge the pots with their rims about six inches deep in some light material, such as ashes or cocoa-nut fibre, in some sheltered position out of doors. When the stems have pushed their way well through the plunging material, they may be lifted and removed to a cool pit or frame till the flower-buds are developed, when they may be removed to the greenhouse or conservatory.

All the sorts mentioned in the following list are suitable for Spring planting out of doors. For pot culture, however, we strongly recommend the beautiful varieties of Auratum and Speciosum, with the addition of the fine longiflorum giganteum as the most suitable.

GLADIOLI, HYBRIDS OF GANDAVENSIS.

These beautiful flowers succeed well in almost any soil or situation, and planted in association with Dwarf or Standard Roses, with hardy herbaceous plants, or on the shubbery border, they have a very fine appearance. They also do well as pot plants, and are capably suited for growing in outside window boxes.

Plant the corns or roots firmly, three or four inches deep and eight or nine inches apart, in clumps of three, five, or more as required, and put a neat stake to each when the flower buds make their appearance. March is the best month to plant for blooming in July and August, and by a few successive plantings in April and the early part of May, a succession of handsome flowers may be had to the end of September.

Gladioli are of especial value as out flowers for decorative purposes. If the flower spikes are cut and placed in water just as the blooms are beginning to expand, they will all open in succession to the topmost bud, and will retain their beauty for a longer time than if remaining on the plant.

TUBEROSES.

These deliciously fragrant and exceedingly useful flowers are much more easily grown than is generally supposed, and will well repay the little trouble that is necessary to have them in perfection. For early forcing pot singly into five or six inch pots, as early in the season as the bulbs can be obtained, and plunge in a good moist heat, withholding water till the foliage make its appearance, when water may be given abundantly till the flower-buds are formed, when they may be removed to the greenhouse or conservatory and less water given. For Autumn blooming, pot singly into five or six-inch pots in March or April, using a light rich compost, and plunge the pots about six inches above their rims in cocoa-nut fibre, coal ashes, or any light material, under the stage of a greenhouse or in a cool pit or frame; when the foliage of these makes its appearance they should be removed and plunged under a south wall, removing them to the greenhouse or indoors as the flower buds are formed. Dry roots may also be planted in sheltered places in the open ground, from the middle of April to the latter part of May, and will produce beautiful flowers in Autumn if taken up and potted when coming into flower, and will furnish a supply of beautiful bloom in the greenhouse almost up to Christmas.

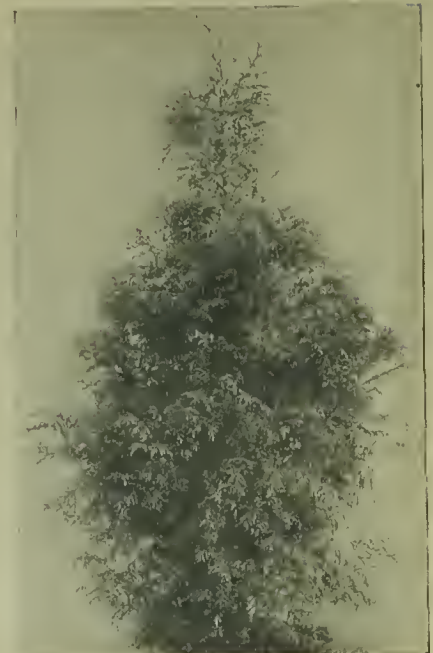

This has undoubtedly proved itself to be the very best Fencing Plant ever grown. For rapidity of growth it is unrivalled, and, under fair conditions, will make a capital fence in three or four years from planting. It also grows vigorously in the poorest soils, and is first-class for planting in exposed situations or by the sea coast. It is quite hardy and will stand the severest frosts without injury.

Planting may be done in open weather at any time during the Winter months, but in fairly moist weather successful plantings may be made as late as the middle or end of April. In planting, plant firmly, placing the sets from six to nine inches apart according to size. When growth commences, they should be cut down to eight or ten inches in height. It will bear almost any extent of clipping, and should be cut at least twice a year—about the end of July and in Winter or Spring whilst in a dormant state, and should be fairly trimmed the first year or two after planting to ensure a good bottom for a strong and thick fence, but it may be clipped in to form a fence no thicker than an ordinary garden wall, which will be found quite impenetrable. As the plants advance in age the branches become armed with long, sharp spines, which make the fence impenetrable to cattle, &c. This beautiful class commence to bloom about the end of August or early in September, and continue till killed by the frost. They are easily grown and not only produce a fine display in the garden, but are exceedingly useful for cut flowers. For growing fine plants, plant out in May 18 inches or 2 feet apart on well-dug fairly rich soil, and place a good stick to each plant. Stop the shoots once or twice to induce a bushy growth, but do not stop them after the end of June. Water should be given freely in very dry weather.

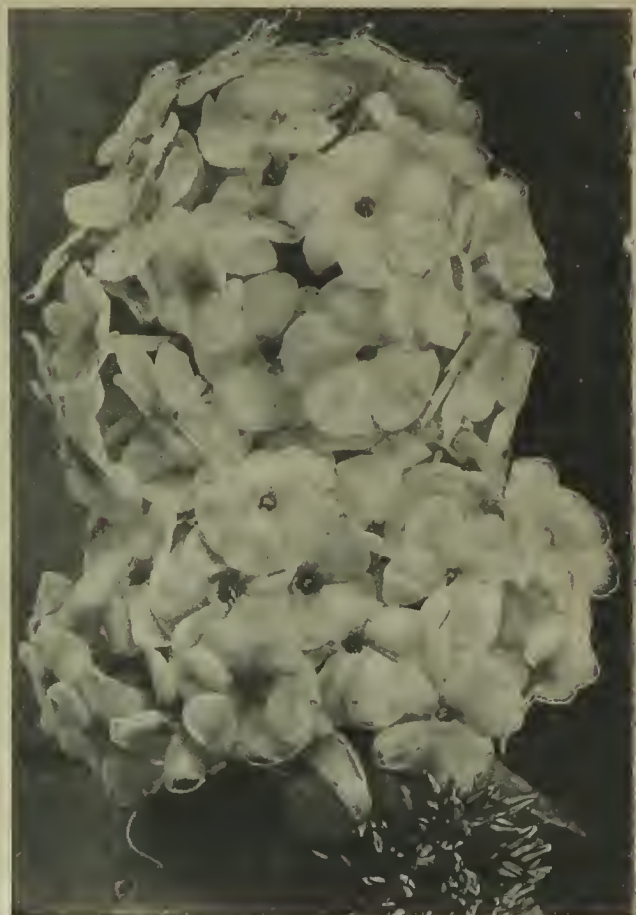

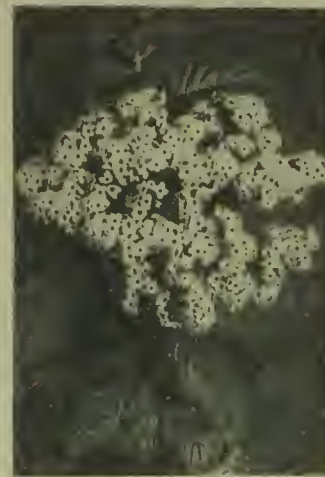

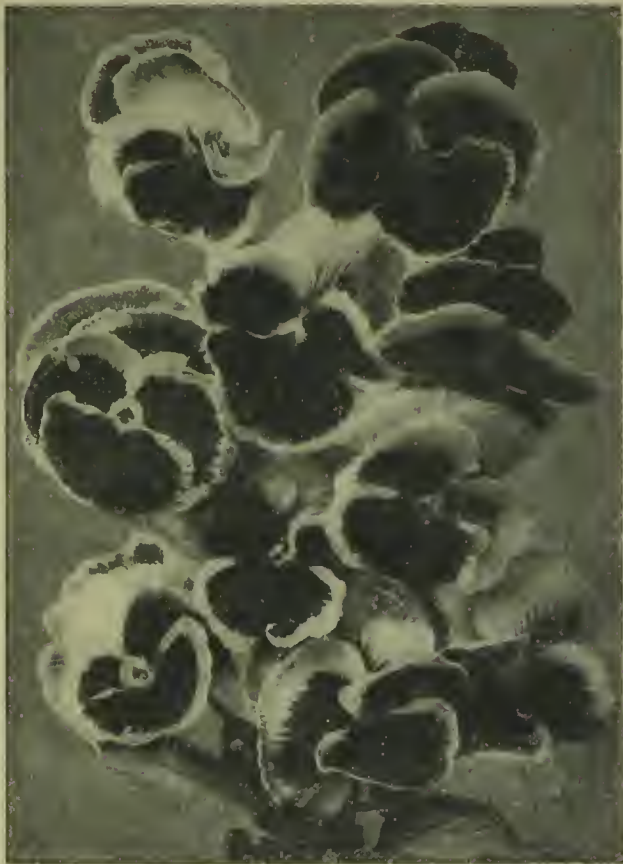
