CRAZY CAPERS. A famous eccentric squire of Halston, England, during the 1820's, astounded the people of his home town with his many extravagances and pranks bordering on the brink of insanity. One of his pet stunts consisted of riding through the streets while mounted upon a large, black bear, a feat which caused the villagers to rush to their homes and bolt their doors for safety. On another occasion the eccentric gave a party at his home, an affair to which all the dignitaries of Halston had been invited. After the guests had assembled.

the host entered the large drawing room dressed in hunting clothes riding astride the bear. Old woodcuts which have been preserved to the present day, bear record to his strange antics.

SHARK SPORT. Natives of the Bahama Islands engage in what is probably the world's deadliest sport, one which requires the courage of a madman, split-second precision timing, and a superhuman strength. The fearless Bahamas seamen cruise the shallow waters of the island until they sight what appears to be a shark. Since these creatures cannot hear and have very little vision, it is quite easy to slip up on them from behind. The daredevil sportsmen then leap into the sea, grab the shark's back, clamp on the fins with legs locked around the belly, and begin to roll for their lives. Although the struggle is a short, hectic one, the experienced natives usually emerge victorious from the death-defying encounter of riding the shark's back.

CAMERA BUGS

In the South Seas two men as a team go octopus hunting. One leaps onto the octopus and wrestles with it, keeping it occupied, while the other does the movie photography.

The following instances prove that wild animals can be adapted by mankind for the purpose of helping with ordinary, everyday chores. For example: An animal trainer and farmer in Chatsworth, California, harnassed a tiger to his plow to help him with his spring farming. The tiger proved to be a satisfactory replacement for a horse. During World War II, a British regiment on the Burma front succeeded in training wild bulls to carry packs of troop supplies and equipment on their backs: In Bechuanaland, South Africa, the mails are carried on the backs of oxen: In 1903 a troop of New York State police broke in an elk and trained it to pull a wagon.



RIDING HIGH. In 1943 the two-year-old daughter of a fisherman was crawling along the beach at Stanley Harbor in the Falkland Islands, when a big wave lifted her off the sand and swept her into the surf. Everyone, including her parents, had given her up for lost, that is, until some fifteen hours later when the captain of a Coast Guard cutter put in at the harbor. When he walked down the gangplank, he carried the missing baby wrapped up in a seaman's peajacket and very much alive. The captain explained that he had sighted the baby in the mist six miles off-



shore. It seemed to be floating on the sea and moving faster than the current could carry it. Closer examination by men in a rowboat which had pulled alongside, disclosed that the child was being carried on the streamlined head of a dolphin. Even after the baby had been rescued, the dolphin continued to follow the boat for at least five miles. This miraculous rescue of a human being by a sea fish is one of the few cases of its kind on record in the archives of marine history.

PIG PLAY. Pig knifing in Hawaii offers a maximum of thrills to sportsmen who like adventure well spiced with danger. The quarry is the more than 400-pound wild Polynesian boar, an animal considered to be one of the most ferocious in existence. Two or three pig hunters with from five to thirteen dogs comprise the entire group. The dogs pick up the scent of the pig and trail their prey until he is at bay. While the dogs are engaged in battle, the hunter quickly leaps onto the back of the boar and rides with the fiercely plunging beast, until he is able to plunge his knife into the soft part of the throat or heart. Not until the boar gives its last vicious kick does the hunter dare let go, for one quick toss of the boar's scimitar-like tusks can mean only death for the brave rider.

RULER OF THE KING BEAST. After eighteen months of intensive study, a young West coast female nightclub singer has mastered the dangerous hobby of training wild animals to respond to her spoken commands. A chance acquaintance with a ferocious lion cub started her on the unique pursuit. She raised the cub, whose mother refused to feed it, and from then on there was no stopping her. Besides leading a iioness on a leash through the streets of her native city, the young trainer has often been seen riding astride the back of her favorite animal.

For fifteen years a thirty-two-year old Viennese scientist has been engaged in photographing at close range the most fearsome creatures to be found in the waters of the Mediterranean and Red Seas. His equipment consists of oversized foot-fins, a respirator, mask and weighted belt. His only weapons — a short spear and a camera. While exploring the undersea world, the daring scientist on a number of occasions had ridden on the backs of whale sharks, measuring seventy feet in length.
