There is being enclosed herewith one copy of an 82-page book entitled, "The Road is Rocky" by DON WEST.

[redacted] obtained this copy of the book from HARRY KOGER and his wife, GRACE KOGER, 110 West Cypress Street, San Antonio, Texas. It is noted that information furnished this office by Bureau letter dated September 29, 1950, reflected that

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It is further noted that FRED ESTES, Secretary of the Texas Communist Party District # 23 from Houston, Texas, stayed over-night at the home of Mr. and Mrs. KOGER on the evening of October 20, 1951, as observed by SAs JACK B. PEDEN and [redacted] ESTES was identified as State Secretary by [redacted]

DON WEST, the author of this book who presently resides near Atlanta, Georgia, and is subject of a Security Matter case of which the Atlanta office is origin, was known to be a Communist Party member in 1941 to 1949, according to information furnished by [redacted]

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[redacted] Atlanta, Georgia, who furnished information in a signed statement dated August 28, 1950, as indicated in the report of SA JOSEPH C. HOLMS, dated November 3, 1950 at Atlanta, in the case entitled "DONALD LEE WEST; SECURITY MATTER - C."

According to [redacted] HARRY KOGER has stated that 5,000 copies of the enclosed book were printed by the Carleton Printing Company, 111 North Street, San Antonio, Texas.

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[redacted] and [redacted] advised that at a meeting held on the evening of November 8, 1951 at the KOGER'S residence, all persons present assisted in mailing a leaflet to numerous people, soliciting orders for the above book. The leaflet reflected that order should be mailed to "GRACE KOGER, Secretary of 'The Road Is Rocky' Publishing Committee, 110 West Cypress Street, San Antonio, Texas." These informants related that a mailing list used by the KOGERS included one headed "N.G." which, according to informants, was believed to set out the names and addresses of all subscribers in the San Antonio area to the publication National Guardian which, according to the informants, is the official publication of the Progressive Party. KOGER also advised that a mailing list of about 2,000 teachers in the United States had been furnished them by DON WEST.

WEST is a S. I. Subject in this Division. [redacted] a PSI, advised Special Agents ALDEN F. MILLER and C. DALLAS MOBLEY on 4-11-52 that WEST has offered to arrange for some young men to attend the Elsinore School in Denmark, through a friend in New York City identified as "NEILSON".

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WEST indicated to [redacted] that "NEILSON" was a close friend of his and was apparently arranging to send a large group of American students to Elsinore in the fall. WEST himself is believed to have attended this school.

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The Bureau and New York are requested to check their indices in order to identify "NEILSON" and to furnish any security data concerning the Elsinore School in Denmark.

The requested photostatic copies of the "Daily Worker" are being forwarded to the Atlanta Office as enclosures to this letter.

It will be noted, however, that the issue of 11/1/34 contained only six pages and therefore does not contain page 37.

The indices of the NYO failed to reflect information concerning the "Elsinore School in Denmark."

The indices of the NYO reflected voluminous references to the name "NEILSON" and without more specific information identification of NEILSON as subject WEST'S friend will be impossible. Unless advised to the contrary, no further investigation will be conducted in this matter. RUC

The Atlanta Journal on August 13, 1952 carried an Associated Press story date-lined at Washington concerning the testimony of HARVEY M. MATUSOW, Dayton, Ohio, Agent for the Ohio Commission on UnAmerican activities, before the House Committee on UnAmerican Activities.

According to this news story, MATUSOW on March 5, 1952 had testified that DONALD LEE WEST had participated in a Communist Party scheme to infiltrate the Boy Scouts of America. He identified WEST as a Baptist Preacher and Communist Organizer who once lived in Bethel, Ohio. He claimed to have met WEST at a Communist Party meeting in 1951. This is believed to be a typographical error since WEST lived in Ohio in the early 1930s. In 1951 he was living on a farm near Douglasville, Georgia, his present residence.

The Washington Field Office is requested to obtain and forward to Atlanta a copy of MATUSOW's testimony concerning WEST.

Cincinnati, at Dayton, Ohio, is requested to interview MATUSOW concerning his knowledge of WEST. The Atlanta file contains no information concerning WEST's association with the Boy Scouts and very little is known of his activities in Ohio in the early 1930s.

For the Bureau's information, WEST was interviewed by CELESTIN SIBLEY, reporter for the Atlanta Journal. Her story in the August 14, 1952 issue, reflects that WEST denied the above allegations. He is quoted as saying, "Twenty years ago, I wrote a poem that appeared in the Daily Worker. I was a Communist then." He denied that he was now a Communist Party member.

WEST is carried as a Security Index Subject in this Division.

The House Committee on Un-American Activities files did not contain the above information.

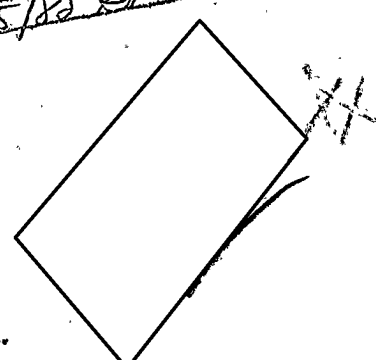

For the information of the New York Office, the Atlanta Office is the office of origin with regard to the subject, and he is carried as an SI subject in that division. By letter dated 9/11/52, addressed to the Bureau, the Atlanta Office advised that the "Atlanta Journal" on 8/13/52, had carried an Associated Press story concerning the testimony of HARVEY M. MATSOW who was indicated to be in the article an agent for the Ohio Commission on Un-American Activities. The article, however, concerned MATSOW'S testimony before the House Committee on Un-American Activities in Washington, D. C.

*OF KNOWN UNRELIABILITY, 3/3/55*

This news story reported that MATSOW, on 3/5/52, had testified that the subject had participated in a Communist Party scheme to infiltrate the Boy Scouts of America. It reported further that MATSOW had identified the subject as a Baptist preacher and Communist organizer who once lived in Bethel, Ohio. The story further reported that MATSOW claimed to have met WEST at a Communist Party meeting in 1951. The Atlanta Office pointed out that the date of 1951 is believed to be a typographical error, since WEST lived in Ohio in the early 1930's and as of 1951 was living on a farm near Douglasville, Georgia, his present address. The Atlanta Office requested that this office interview MATSOW concerning his knowledge of WEST, as the Atlanta Office has no information concerning WEST'S association with the Boy Scouts of America, and also, very little is known of his activities in Ohio in the early 1930's. An article in the "Atlanta Journal" of 8/14/52, reflects that WEST denied MATSOW'S allegations, but stated that he had been a Communist twenty years ago when he wrote a poem that appeared in the "Daily Worker."

The Washington Field Office in a letter dated 9/19/52, addressed to the Bureau in instant matter, advised that information had been received from the Judiciary Committee of the United States Senate that as of 9/17/52, HARVEY M. MATSOW'S address was 141 W. 10th Street, New York City, telephon Algonquin 5-9835.

There has been no indication received by this office that MATSOW has returned to this territory and it is presumed that he is still residing in New York City. The New York Office is therefore requested to interview him concerning the subject, as desired by Atlanta.

It is also noted that MATSOW has had no connection with the Ohio Un-American Activities Commission since a short time prior to his departure from Dayton, Ohio. RUC.

Reference is made to Washington Field letter of September 19, 1952 which enclosed a copy of a report on hearings held by the Committee on the Judiciary US Senate, 82nd Congress captioned "Communist Tactics in Controlling Youth Organizations."

Beginning on page 199 of this report is the testimony of HARVEY MATUSOV before this Committee on March 5, 1952. On page 217 of the report MATUSOV stated "Yes our line was changed drastically. I might cite the example of DON WEST, who is at present one of the Communist Organizers in the State of Georgia, the same DON WEST whose book of poetry was published, 'Klods of Southern Earth' in 1940. Mr. WEST was Bethel, Ohio, and a clergyman in the Baptist Church. I am taking this from the testimony of JOHN and MARTHA EDSTON, and they stated that Mr. WEST had seven churches under his jurisdiction, and a boy scout troop was organized in each of the churches, and his plan was to indoctrinate. I met him at a meeting of the Communist Party in 1951."

MATUSOV now resides at 141 West 10th Street, New York City, telephone Algonquin 5-9385.

The New York Office is requested to interview MATUSOV and forward details concerning his knowledge of the Communist Party activities of DON WEST. Facts should be developed concerning the Communist Party meeting in 1951 which MATUSOV in the above testimony indicates that WEST attended. For the information of the New York Division, WEST has resided on a farm in Douglas County, Georgia since 1951. There is no indication in the Atlanta files that he has been active in the Communist Party since 1950.

WEST was interviewed by the Atlanta Journal as a result of an AP Story based on the above testimony by MATUSOV. The Atlanta Journal for August 14, 1952, reflects that WEST denied the allegations of MATUSOV. He was quoted as saying twenty years ago, I wrote a poem that appeared in the Daily Worker, I was a Communist then. He denied that he was now a Communist Party member.

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SE [redacted] on November 24, 1952, found no record for MARTHA and JOHN EDSTON in the files of the House Committee on Un-American Activities.

[redacted] an employee of the Committee on the Judiciary, United States Senate, advised that JOHN and MARTHA EDSTON never testified before the Senate Judiciary Committee. He stated that the information regarding the EDSTON's which was given by Mr. HARVEY MATUSOW, was most likely received by Mr. MATUSOW, who is an investigator for the Ohio Un-American Activities Commission, Columbus, Ohio. [redacted] suggested that Mr. SIDNEY ISAACS, Legal Director and Counsel of the Ohio Un-American Activities Commission would be the person most likely that would be able to provide the testimony given by JOHN and MARTHA EDSTON, if such testimony had been given. He stated that Mr. ISAACS was a former Special Agent for the FBI and has always been most cooperative.

[redacted] stated that he was introduced to WEST by one ILYA BRESSLER at an informal gathering held in a private home in San Antonio. He commented that this gathering was not an official CP meeting but that all those persons in attendance were believed by [redacted] to be CP members.

[redacted] added that during the course of the evening he had a conversation with WEST in which they discussed Communism and the Korean War. However, he advised that he could not recall the details of the conversation.

[redacted] said that he could not recall in whose home the above mentioned meeting took place or the address of this home inasmuch as he was driven there by BRESSLER. He also said that he could not recall any of the others present except WEST and BRESSLER. He added that he did not know BRESSLER's official CP connections.

[redacted] advised that this was his only contact with WEST and that he could not recall any additional information regarding WEST to which he has not already testified. However, he did state that JOHN and MARTHA EDMISTON, party members from Waynesville, Ohio, had told him that WEST had attended CP meetings with them.

[Confidential Informant T-11, in August, 1938, advised] that WEST had been in charge of the Communist Party, Atlanta, Georgia, in 1934.

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The Atlanta Journal, a daily newspaper, on August 14, 1952, carried an article on an interview with WEST, by Mrs. CELESTINE SIBLEY, a reporter. Mrs. SIBLEY quoted WEST as saying, "Twenty years ago I wrote a poem that appeared in the "Daily Worker". I was a Communist then." According to this article WEST denied that he is now a member of the Communist Party. GA

[Confidential Informant T-12, on January 8, 1942, advised] that WEST admitted to him having been active in the defense of ANGELO HERNDON, historical Negro Communist Party member who was prosecuted by Fulton County, Atlanta, Georgia, authorities, in 1932. WEST stated to informant that he had helped investigate the HERNDON case for the Communist Party in 1942, and had later assisted HERNDON in the preparation of a book on HERNDON'S life.

[Confidential Informant T-13, on July 29, 1948, advised] that in 1945 WEST appeared at the office of the Daily Worker, in New York City, at which time he requested permission to check files. He was allowed access to "Daily Worker" files because he was a Communist Party member.

[Confidential Informant T-14, a prominent educator, advised] that WEST, in 1948, had admitted to him that he was once a member of the Communist Party. WEST claimed, however, that he had quit the Communist Party in 1936.

[Confidential Informant T-15 advised] that HOMER BATES CHASE, publicly admitted Organizer for District 31, Communist Party, USA, Atlanta, Georgia, had, in 1949, informed him that WEST was a Communist Party member, but had actually quit the Party.

[Confidential Informant T-16, on June 10, 1949, advised] that WEST was a member of the Communist Party, in Atlanta, Georgia, in 1948.

The following references to WEST appear in the "Daily Worker", the official East Coast publication of the Communist Party:

The Daily Worker for 11-1-45 and 6-22-37, identified WEST as Communist Party Organizer for the State of Kentucky.

The 7-20-36 issue of the "Daily Worker" identified WEST as a member of the National Campaign Committee of the Communist Party, from Louisville, Kentucky.

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The "Daily Worker" for 6-19-34 identified WEST as a Communist Party Organizer in the South, who was scheduled to speak in Boston, Massachusetts, at a protest meeting, on June 20, 1934.

The "Daily Worker" for June 11, 1934, in an article on page one, by EDWIN ROLFE, stated that WEST was in New York City, at the offices of the National Committee for the Defense of Political Prisoners, 156 Fifth Avenue. The article stated: "DON WEST is in New York following his escape from the Atlanta Police and Fascist gangs who have terrorized the Negro and white workers' neighborhoods in a frantic and bestial campaign to stop the wildfire spread of revolutionary struggle in the South".

EDWIN ROLFE, in this article, stated: "Less than a year ago there came to the "Daily Worker" a copy of a small booklet of poems, "Between the Plow Handles", by DON WEST. The poems were folk songs and hill chants, slight but meaningful lyrics of the southern hill country; rebellion smouldered in them. Here and there one felt the work of revolt, but revolution was far off. Today DON WEST, a Communist, is being sought on a charge of inciting insurrection under an old Southern slave law - - -".

Continuing, the above article stated that WEST had published three booklets. References to these booklets were as follows: "There followed, WEST said, a period during which he did organizational work for the Socialist Party, and continued to write poetry. During this period he published his three booklets of verse: 'Between the Plow Handles', 'Crab Grass' and 'Deep Living'. He refers to these poems today as folk poems, not really revolutionary, but he adds that a small volume of verse, this time revolutionary verse, is to be issued by a Virginia publisher within the next few months. It is to be called 'Southern Folks'".

Continuing, this article stated: "About ten months ago DON WEST began to feel that the Socialist Party was not doing the work he felt had to be done among the workers in the South. He didn't quite know what was wrong, but he decided to find out, and so he rode straddled an old motorcycle, rode all the way to New York, and presented himself, dusty and tired, to CLARENCE HATHAWAY, at the 'Daily Worker'. He wanted to see what the Communists had to offer. After a few days spent talking to HATHAWAY,

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reading literature and stocking up with more literature and further study, he returned to Atlanta a Communist."

The "Daily Worker" for October 5, 1936, page 5, identified WEST as State Organizer of the Workers Alliance of Kentucky, and a member of the National Unemployed Committee for EARL BROWDER and JAMES FORD, Communist Party candidates for President and Vice-President, respectively, in the 1936 election.

The Workers Alliance was cited as follows: "Among the successes in its front movements, the Communists point to the Workers Alliance of America. It was created in 1936 and organized in practically every relief project in the country. It was apparently patterned after the unemployed councils of St. Petersburg, Russia, set up in 1906 as a part of the Communist front there, as the Council in Russia staged sit-down strikes, so also did the Alliance stage sit-down strikes in various State Legislatures and relief bureaus in our country. (HCUA report of 1-3-39, pages 72-74.)

The "Daily Worker" for 6-22-37, identified WEST as Communist Party Organizer for the State of Kentucky, who, on June 21, 1937, had attended a reception for MAUDE WHITE, the only Negro woman member of the Central Committee of the Communist Party. This reception was held at the home of REVA GILBERT, identified by the Daily Worker as Organizational Secretary of the lower Harlem Communist Party, 2 West 120th Street, New York City.

[Confidential Informant T-12, on January 20, 1942, advised] (S) that WEST had bragged to him about organizing a group of volunteers in Kentucky to serve in the Abraham Lincoln Brigade in the Spanish Civil War. WEST claimed to have recruited thirty members of the Abraham Lincoln Brigade, and to have recruited several hundred dollars for the organization.

The Communist Party was active in recruiting American boys for the so-called Abraham Lincoln Brigade, in behalf of Loyalist Spain. EARL BROWDER has boasted that sixty per cent of the Brigade was composed of Communist Party members. (HCUA report of 3-29-44, page 146.)

[Confidential Informant T-12, on January 8, 1942, advised] (S) that WEST had admitted to him that he was one of the organizational founders of the Highland School, at Monteagle, Tennessee.

 Confidential Informant T-17 has advised that between October 17, 1941 and March 10, 1942, the Highland Folk School received the sum of \$500.00 from the Robert Marshall Foundation. The Robert Marshall Foundation is cited as follows: "This fund of more than one million dollars, which originated with the rich man's son whose name it bears, has been one of the principal sources of the money with which to finance the Communist Party's fronts, generally, in recent years. (HCUA report of 3-29-44, page 50.)" MONTEAGLE, TENN

 Confidential Informant T-18 has identified WEST as a Communist Party member in the Ohio area in 1940.

### III. RECRUITING ACTIVITY

~~(S)~~  
 Confidential Informant T-12, on January 8, 1942, advised that in 1941 WEST asked him to become active in the labor movement, and indicated he hoped that informant would join the Communist Party. In January, 1941, WEST instructed informant in the operation of a printing press in order that informant would be able to operate this press if and when the Communist Party went underground.

According to informant, WEST sent him to New York City to attend a meeting of the American Peace Mobilization, on April 6 and 7, 1941. WEST also arranged for informant to attend the Highland Folk School for two weeks, in May, 1941.

On numerous occasions, in 1940 and 1941, WEST, in company with informant, visited the residence of HARDY LEE SCOTT, identified by informant as Secretary of the Communist Party of Georgia at that time. On several of these visits to SCOTT'S residence, WEST obtained Communist Party literature, which he turned over to informant.

The American Peace Mobilization was cited as "one of the most seditious organizations which ever operated in the United States, and an instrument of the Communist Party line prior to the Hitler attack on Russia." (HCUA report of 3-29-44, page 5)

### IV. POEMS BY SUBJECT SHOWING ADHERENCE TO PRINCIPALS OF MARXISM - LENINISM

The "Daily Worker" for March 13, 1934, on page 5, carried a poem by WEST, entitled "Listen, I Am a Communist". The "Atlanta Journal", on August 14, 1952, in story by CELESTINE

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~~CELESTINE~~ SIBLEY, quotes WEST as admitting that he had written this poem. This poem is set forth, verbatim, as follows:

LISTEN, I AM  
A COMMUNIST  
By DON WEST

I am a Communist  
A Red  
A Bolsheviki!  
Do you, toilers of the South,  
Know me,  
Do you understand?  
Do you believe the lies  
Capitalists say  
And print about me?  
You farmers,  
Share croppers,  
Renters,  
Factory Workers,  
Negroes, poor whites,  
Do you understand me,  
Do you see  
That I am you.  
That I, the Communist,  
Am you--?

I am DON WEST, too,  
The poet,  
The working man.  
But the poet  
Is a cry for justice  
The Communist is the tempered soul  
Of a hundred million toilers  
Marching to victory

A working man's world! . . .

I am the son  
Of my grandfather.  
His blood pounds thru  
My veins, and cries out  
For justice!  
I am the poet

I'm DON WEST  
Raised on a Georgia farm -  
The son of my mother

V. OTHER ACTIVITIES AND COMMUNIST PARTY CONTACTS

[Confidential Informant T-19, on January 4, 1946, advised] ~~(S)~~ that on this date WEST was in contact with EARL BROWDER, then Secretary General of the Communist Party. On this occasion WEST was known to have visited BROWDER'S office, Room 702, 55 West 42nd Street, New York City.

Confidential Informant T-20, who has furnished both reliable and unreliable information concerning Communist Party activities, on December 30, 1943, advised that on December 29, 1943, WEST had called a meeting of the Communist Party in Atlanta, Georgia, at which time WEST informed the Party that he had been instructed by ROBERT F. HALL, Communist Party Organizer, for District 17, Communist Party, USA, Birmingham, Alabama, to advise them that there was a spy in the Atlanta unit of the Party. At this meeting WEST stated that [redacted] was believed to be spying for the FBI, and was then being watched by the Communist Party. ~~(S)~~

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Confidential Informant T-20, on July 10, 1944, advised that as of this date WEST'S name appeared in the personal notebook of EUGENE GORDON, identified by informant as an assistant editor of the Daily Worker. ~~(S)~~

[Confidential Informant T-21, on May 22, 1945, advised] ~~(S)~~ that WEST'S name appeared in a pamphlet entitled "Equal Justice Under Law", which was published by the Committee of Equal Justice, for Mrs. RECY TAYLOR. According to informant, this committee was organized and sponsored by the Daily Worker. Mrs. RECY TAYLOR was identified as the Negro woman who had been raped by a white man, in Alabama.

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[~~(S)~~ Confidential Informant T-22, on December 9, 1941, advised] that on November 11, 1940, WEST spoke at the Ninth Street Baptist Church, Cincinnati, Ohio, at a meeting sponsored by the Cincinnati Youth Committee Against War. According to Informant, this speech followed the Communist Party line exclusively. Informant identified this organization as having been sponsored by the Communist Party of Cincinnati.

[~~(S)~~ Confidential Informant T-23, on February 5, 1951, advised] that on numerous occasions in 1950 and 1951, WEST was in contact with HARRY KOGER, of 110 W. Cypress Street, San Antonio, Texas. KOGER has been active in the sale and publication of WEST'S latest publication, "The Road is Rocky".

[~~(S)~~ Confidential Informant T-2] has identified KOGER as Communist Party Organizer in Memphis, Tennessee, in 1940.

Confidential Informant T-24, on June 9, 1948, advised that on this date IRVING GOFF was a guest in the WEST home on the Oglethorpe University campus, in Atlanta, Georgia. The "Daily Worker" has identified GOFF as District Organizer for the Communist Party in New Orleans, Louisiana, as of 1948.

Confidential Informant T-24, on December 1, 1947, advised that on this date WEST was in contact with LEM HARRIS, concerning a document captioned "Memo on Democratic Reconstruction of Southern Agriculture".

[~~(S)~~ T-16] has identified LEM HARRIS as the Secretary of the Farmers Commission, Communist Party, USA.

Confidential Informant T-24, on December 4, 1947, advised that on this date WEST was in contact with MARVIN SHAW. Confidential Informant T-25 identified SHAW as then National Student Secretary of the Communist Party.

Confidential Informant T-24, advised that WEST was in contact with WILLIAM STAFFORD, CIO, UPWA Organizer, on April 3, 5, 1947, and on April 26, 1947.

Confidential Informant T-25 has identified WILLIAM STAFFORD as a Communist Party member at that time, who was closely associated with HOMER BATES CHASE in the overall operation of the Communist Party of Georgia.

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[Confidential Informant T-26, on February 17, 1947, advised that on this date WEST was in contact with NATHAN and ANNA KATZ, at which time he presented to them a copy of his book, "Clods of Southern Earth".] ~~(S)~~ GA.

[Confidential Informant T-25] has identified NATHAN and ANNA KATZ as long-time Communist Party members in the Atlanta area. ~~(S)~~

[Confidential Informant T-26, on March 7, 1947, advised that on this date WEST was in contact with NAT ROSS, MARY SOUTHARD, and HOMER BATES CHASE. ~~(S)~~ GA.

[Confidential Informant T-25] has identified ROSS as a brother-in-law of WEST, and one-time District Organizer for District #17, Communist Party, Chattanooga, Tennessee. According to informant, ROSS, in 1948 and 1949, was Southern Organizer for the Communist Party. ~~(S)~~

[Confidential Informant T-27, on October 20, 1949, identified MARY SOUTHARD as the Daily Worker correspondent for Atlanta, Georgia and Birmingham, Alabama. ~~(S)~~

[Confidential Informant T-28, on February 4, 1947, advised that on this date WEST was in contact with MAX WEISS. ~~(S)~~ GA.

[Confidential Informant T-25] has identified WEISS as a one-time member of the National Committee of the Communist Party, and as an editor of "Political Affairs". ~~(S)~~

("Political Affairs" has been cited as an official Communist Party monthly theoretical "organ". HCUA report #1920, dated 5-11-48, pages 5 and 6.)

[Confidential Informant T-28, on February 6 and 7, 1947, advised that on these dates WEST was in contact with HOMER BATES CHASE and MAX WEISS. T-28, on February 14 and 15, 1947, advised that on these dates WEST was in contact with NAT ROSS. ~~(S)~~

Confidential Informant T-20, who has furnished both reliable and unreliable information concerning Communist Party activities, on March 11, 1947, advised that on February 28, 1947 WEST had attended a meeting at the Butler Street YMCA, called "Georgia Crisis", which was sponsored by the Southern Negro Youth Congress. WEST was one of the twelve white people present, and was the principal speaker. WEST, in his speech of February 28, 1947, before this group, attacked pending Georgia legislation known as the "White Primary Bill". Informant quoted WEST as stating on this occasion, "You are not facing a yankee, you are looking ~~(S)~~

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at a Georgia "Cracker", whose family has never owned a slave. I am from a poor family from the mountains and I am in favor of a decent South. Yes, a South where all men are equal. I am fighting for the masses of the people, and I will not stop until all have justice. ~~(S)~~

The Southern Negro Youth Congress has been cited as subversive and among the affiliates and committees of the Communist Party, USA, which seeks to alter the form of Government of the United States by un-Constitutional means. (Attorney General TOM CLARKE'S letter to Loyalty Review Board, released 12-4-47.) ~~(S)~~

Confidential Informant T-12, on January 8, 1942, advised that WEST, in September, 1941, had spoken at a picnic sponsored by the "Smash Hitler Committee", of Atlanta. This picnic, according to informant, was arranged by NATHAN and ANNA KATZ. ~~(S)~~

Confidential Informant T-25 ~~(S)~~ has identified NATHAN and ANNA KATZ as long-time Communist Party members in the Atlanta area.

Confidential Informant T-29, a minister, advised on August 31, 1942, that in 1940, during the Presidential campaign, exact date unknown, he and WEST had attended a Communist Party meeting together, in Cincinnati, Ohio. ~~(S)~~

Confidential Informant T-8 has advised that following WEST'S return to his farm, in Douglas County, in the Summer of 1951, he obtained the services of HARDY LEE SCOTT, as a tenant farmer. Informant related that SCOTT remained on the WEST farm for approximately one year, being closely associated with WEST in various farming enterprises. ~~(S)~~

Confidential Informant T-25 ~~(S)~~ has identified HARDY LEE SCOTT as one-time Secretary of the Communist Party of Georgia.

#### VI. CONNECTIONS WITH PEOPLES INSTITUTE OF APPLIED RELIGION

The Peoples Institute of Applied Religion has been cited as subversive and Communistic.

(Attorney General TOM CLARKE'S letter to Loyalty Review Board, released 6-1-48 and 9-21-48.)

Confidential Informant T-30, on October 12, 1948, advised that Post Office Box 1178, Atlanta, Georgia, was rented in the name of the Peoples Institute of Applied Religion. Informant advised ~~(S)~~

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that WEST paid the rent on this box.

RALPH MCGILL, Editor of the Atlanta Constitution, in his column of July 7, 1948, identified WEST as a Committee Member from Georgia, in this organization, as of 1947.

The Chicago Sun, a Chicago daily newspaper, on August 10, 1945, carried a story on a revival meeting sponsored by the Chicago Council of Applied Religion, at 176 West Adams Street. WEST was identified as the principal speaker, and as an evangelist for the Peoples Institute of Applied Religion. The article stated that at that time WEST was the Principal of the Lula High School, Lula, Georgia.

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On August 8, 1941, Detective Sergeant [redacted] of the Memphis Police Department, advised SA C. E. PIPER that CLAUDE C. WILLIAMS, Director of the Peoples Institute of Applied Religion, had, in his presence, on August 8, 1941, identified WEST as State Director of Georgia, for this organization.

#### VII. CONNECTIONS WITH THE SOUTHERN CONFERENCE FOR HUMAN WELFARE

This organization has been cited as a Communist front organization "which seeks to attract southern liberals on the basis of its seeming interest in the problems of the South, although its professed interest in human welfare is simply an expedient for larger aims serving the Soviet Union and its subservient Communist Party in the United States." (HCUA Report #592, of 6-12-47.)

Confidential Informant T-31, on November 4, 1942, advised that WEST was a delegate to the Southern Conference for Human Welfare conference which was held in Memphis, Tennessee, April 19-21, 1942. (S)

Confidential Informant T-24, on December 29, 1947, advised that the Southern Conference for Human Welfare had paid WEST'S expenses to Chicago, Illinois, where he attended a conference of the Progressive Party. (S)

#### VIII. CONNECTIONS WITH PROGRESSIVE PARTY OF GEORGIA

Confidential Informant T-25, on October 22, 1948, advised that the Progressive Party of Georgia was dominated and controlled by members of the Communist Party, and especially by WEST and HOMER BATES CHASE, known publicly as District Organizer, District 31, Communist Party, USA. (S)

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Informant advised that WEST was in close association with the Progressive Party of Georgia during the period 1947-48, and was known to have been in constant contact with the following individuals, all of whom have been identified by Confidential Informant T-25 as active Communist Party members during that period: ANNIE MAE LEATHERS, MINNIE RUDINE, LEAH YOUNG, JACK LORENZ, ERNIE LEWIS, WILLIAM STAFFORD, EUDICE TONTAK, NATHAN and ANNA KATZ, and HENRY WALD. ~~(S)~~

Confidential Informant T-25 further advised that during this GEORGIA period WEST served as Executive Vice-Chairman of the Progressive Party of Georgia, and would have been this party's candidate for Governor, or U. S. Senator, had it not been for derogatory publicity concerning WEST which appeared in RALPH MCGILL'S column in the Atlanta Constitution. ~~(S)~~

The Atlanta Constitution, a daily newspaper, on February 10, 1948, carried a story reflecting that WEST had addressed the National Progressive Voters League of the Progressive Party, at Miami, Florida, on February 15-18, 1948.

Confidential Informant T-24 advised that on July 24, 1948, WEST attended a Progressive Party convention in Philadelphia. Also, that WEST had attended a Progressive Party convention at Chicago, Illinois on December 29, 1947. According to informant, WEST'S expenses to the Chicago convention were paid by the Southern Conference for Human Welfare. ~~(S)~~

Confidential Informant T-24 advised that on May 20, 1948, WEST, who identified himself as Executive Vice-Chairman of the Peoples New Party of Georgia (Progressive Party of Georgia), spoke over Atlanta radio station WAGA. According to this informant, WILLIAM STAFFORD and EUDICE TONTAK, both of whom have been identified as active Communist Party members at that time by Confidential Informant T-25, had assisted in preparing the script for this speech. ~~(S)~~

WEST, in this speech, made the following statements: ~~(S)~~

"Our nation's policy in Palestine can only be laid to our support of the old futile Arab monarchy and laws in that region. - - - our country's birth-right through our joint giant oil corporation. - - - China the people are fighting for their independence from hated oppressors. They have put up a fight that the whole world admires. Are we supporting them as France and Russia and Spain supported us during our American Revolution? No. We are supporting the Dutch imperialist with American arms, and the French imperialist with American weapons and loans. In ~~(S)~~

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China we have been throwing billions of dollars down the drain to support one of the most corrupted dictatorships on the face of the earth. CHIANG KAI-SHEK Government is so corrupt that it is far from being able to defend its own interests and allows American arms to be sold to the Communist right off the Shanghai docks through the black market. Here we are being played for suckers which in no way makes our game any less dangerous for the American people. In Japan we have proceeded to bolster up the emperor and the nobility and to save from destruction Zi-bat-zu, the six wealthy families who own most of the Japanese industry. We make friends with the very people who caused Pearl Harbor. Is this the best memorial we can erect to thousands of Americans who died in the Pacific? These are not pleasant facts for Americans to face. We are proud of our country and like to think that it stands for truth and justice and democracy. It is time for the ordinary American people, the common people, to come to the rescue of America's honor while there is yet time. The people can demand that this drive to war be stopped. HENRY WALLACE in his open letter to Premier STALIN has advocated a peace conference between our two nations. Mr. WALLACE said the USA and the USSR must take immediate action to end the cold war. This involves taking definite decisive steps looking toward the following objectives: ~~(S)~~

"General reduction of armament. Outlawing all methods of mass destruction. Stopping the export of weapons by any nation to any other nation. The resumption of unrestricted trade except for goods related to war between the two countries. The free movement of citizens, students, and newspaper men between and within the two countries. The resumption of free exchange of scientific information and scientific materials between the two countries. The reestablishment of a reinvigorated United Nations or the Constitution of some other united nation agency for the distribution of international relief. Neither the USA nor the USSR should interfere in the internal affairs of other nations. Neither the USA nor the USSR should maintain military bases in other UN countries. Neither the USA nor the USSR should terrorize the citizens of the member states of the UN by matching land forces, establishing air bases, or making naval demonstrations. Neither the USA nor the USSR should use financial pressure, economic pressure or the pressure of secret agents to obtain political results in other countries. ~~(S)~~

"Both the USA and the USSR in the spirit of the United Nations Charter should collaborate to the limit in furthering the political, economic and cultural health of the world. To that end the USA and the USSR should join the various subsidiary ~~(S)~~

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agencies of the United Nations such as the World Health Organization, the Food and Agricultural Organization, and the United Nations Educational, Scientific, and Cultural Organization. We, the people of America, can demand that President Roosevelt and Secretary Marshall reversed our war policy and accept the offer to sit down at the conference table with Russia. We can urge our representatives in Congress to defeat the peace-time conscription measure. We must do this now for the time is running out. But there is today an alarmingly rapid drift in the direction of Fascism in our own country, and the closing down of democratic liberties in this country. In the House of Representatives an infinite bill called the Mundt-Nixon Bill has been introduced and was passed only yesterday. On the surface this is a bill to outlaw the Communist Party. In principal and even in wording it has been borrowed from the laws passed in Hitler-Germany passed in 1933. The purpose of the Mundt-Nixon Bill is to prevent any expression by the American people of their opposition to the war policies of the present administration. If you are a member of an organization which a Communist happens to join or which adopts a policy which happens to coincide more or less with some Communist policy as defined by the FBI, your name can be published as belonging to a Communist organization and you can be jailed for continuing such activities. If you are a union member and fight for a wage increase the FBI can say you are conspiring to disrupt trade in the United States with intent to further the objectives of the world Communist Movement and jail you and smash your union. If you believe in civil rights for all people you are guilty of inviting racial tension. It's all of this - the Attorney General is the final judge of what is to be considered Communist and he would have in his hand a weapon that HEINRICH HIMMLER could hardly have improved upon for killing off opposition to the administration. Because the American people are aware of the danger to our democratic system in this bill they have sent mass protests to the House of Representatives and to the Senate demanding that the measure be defeated. Such action has succeeded or did succeed in delaying the vote in the House, but we must still demand that our representatives vote against this bill. We must act now. Send a letter or telegram or telephone Senator RUSSELL or Senator GEORGE expressing your opposition to this intimate major which will destroy the freedom of all of us. Defeat the Mundt-Nixon Bill. ~~(S)~~

"The Mundt-Nixon Bill is one more step in the increasing tendency to fire men and women who have unpopular ideas or so-called dangerous thoughts. We have had here in Georgia recently a ~~(S)~~

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flagrant example of precisely this - Professor JAMES L. BARFOOT of the University of Georgia has been dismissed from his position at the University because he dared to have the courage to support Mr. WALLACE and to support actively the Peoples Progressive Party of Georgia. Mr. BARFOOT believes that the best provision he can make for his three children is to fight for a decent prosperous and peaceful world. For acting on his belief he was fired. This shameful act by the University of Georgia is a blot on the school and on the State. It is reminiscent of the purges conducted by EUGENE TALMADGE which action brought the entire University System close to being discredited. In Georgia TALMADGE and his backers are afraid of the people, when the white and Negro express unitedly their opinions at the polls. They will go to almost any length to prevent the citizens from exercising their Constitutional right to vote. A couple of weeks ago we saw the election board of Laurens County acting in entirely illegal conspiracy to deprive the majority of Negro voters in that county of their rights to vote. The white people of Georgia must realize that this is an attack on the rights of all of us. The corruptions of Georgia county elections is notorious and this is simply a county Jane trying to protect itself from being ousted by a righteous election. There will never be decent politics in this state until all the people can help make them. The big modern owned corporations that are breeding this state do so by keeping Georgians fighting other Georgians. The FBI is investigating this illegal action in Laurens County. Every citizen of Georgia who wants a clean and honest election system must demand that those Negro voters stricken from the registry be reinstated. We must demand that the Grand Jury of Laurens County and of any other county in which such purging occurs investigate and clean house. Fellow Georgians, these are some of the problems - - - - The formation of a new party in this state and in the country. We believe that there are no problems that this country faces that cannot be solved peaceably if we will only tackle them with energy and common sense that are so much a part of the American way of doing things. We ask all of you who believe in the tradition of American democracy, in Thomas Jefferson and Abraham Lincoln, and Franklin D. Roosevelt to support the Peoples Progressive Party. To give us your time and to send us your contribution so that we can carry on our fight to bring it through to the people. We urge you to send your contributions to the Atlanta Wallace-for-President Committee, 85 Alexander Street, NW. Tomorrow night - Tomorrow night Mr. Wallace, himself, will speak on how we can bring an end to the cold war itself. On Saturday night, May 22, at 10:30 PM, the Peoples Progressive Party of Georgia invites all men and women no matter what their creed or color to come together with us to fight to make the promise of America really come true and to be a blessing not only to ourselves and our children, but to the whole world as well. We thank you.

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IX. CONNECTIONS WITH AMERICAN  
PEACE MOBILIZATION

[Confidential Informant T-22] has identified WEST as being in attendance at a meeting of the American Peace Mobilization, at Chicago, Illinois, on September 1-2, 1940.

[Confidential Informant T-12, on January 8, 1942, advised] that WEST had sent him to New York City, where he attended a meeting of American Peace Mobilization on April 6-7, 1941.

The American Peace Mobilization was formed in the Summer of 1940, under the auspices of the Communist Party and the Young Communist League, as a front organization, designed to mould American opinion against participation in the war against Germany. The most conspicuous activity of the group was the picketing of the White House, which began in April, 1941, in protest against Lend Lease and the National Defense Program. The picketing was suddenly called off on June 21, 1941, by FREDERICK V. FIELD, National Secretary. (Attorney General FRANCIS BIDDLE, Congressional Record dated 9-24-42, page 7684.)

MISCELLANEOUS

[Confidential Informants T-25 and T-32,] who are generally familiar with Communist Party activities in the State of Georgia, and who are personally acquainted with WEST, have advised that there is no indication that WEST is presently active in Communist Party activities.

[Confidential Informant T-33, on July 22, 1950, advised] that JAMES BARFOOT, former Progressive Party candidate for Governor of Georgia, had, on July 18, 1950, received a letter from WEST requesting him to address a large number of envelopes for the mailing out of "peace tracts", advocating the end of "senseless war in Korea".

Records of the Superior Court of Hall County, Gainesville, Georgia, reflect that on December 2, 1947, one CHARLIE LEWALLEN, of Hall County, filed suit against WEST for damages, claiming liable as a result of a poem appearing in WEST'S book, "Clods of Southern Earth". This case was heard on January 22, 1948, and was dismissed under a plea to the jury. Suit was not reinstated.

Confidential Informant T-24, advised on February 11, 1948 that WEST had organized a local committee known as the Don West Defense Committee, Post Office Box 1178, Atlanta, Georgia.

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The purpose of this committee was to raise funds to defend the above law suit. [redacted] Atlanta school teacher, was [redacted] GA.

The "Daily Worker" for March 20, 1947, carried an article entitled, "Don West Benefit Performance Friday". The article reflected that a benefit performance was to be held on the following day, at the Solidarity Theater, 124 W. 124th Street, New York City, in order to raise money to help WEST defend a "trumped up liable" by reactionaries in the South.

The "Daily Worker" for March 17, 1947, contained an article captioned, "Writers Party to Aid Don West". According to this story, a party was to be held on March 28, 1947, at 110 W. 48th Street, by contemporary writers, and was described as the opening gun to defend DON WEST, "whose anti-Fascist activities in Georgia had brought down the wrath of Klansmen and other reactionaries".

The "Daily Worker", on May 18, 1947, carried a story captioned, "Committee Organized to Aid Fighting South". According to the article this committee was to raise funds to help striking tobacco workers in North Carolina, and to assist in the defense of DON WEST.

Confidential Informant T-27, on June 23, 1947, advised that the above committee was a paper front, organized and established by the Communist Party, for the purpose of raising funds to aid Communist Party work in the South.

Dr. [redacted] Martha Berry School, Rome, Georgia, on January 5, 1946, advised SA A. W. NEALE that WEST, while a student at this school, in 1926, had attempted to organize the students to strike. According to Dr. [redacted] this strike was based on the fact that the school was supported by what WEST termed "capitalists". (HENRY FORD money.)

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Confidential Informant T-8 has advised that WEST, since the summer of 1951, has received checks from AUBREY W. WILLIAMS, Head of the "Southern Farmer", a magazine published in Montgomery, Alabama. Informant reports that WEST has written numerous articles and columns for the "Southern Farmer", some of which had appeared under his true name. Informant related that WEST is in constant contact with AUBREY W. WILLIAMS.

Confidential Informant T-2 has advised that AUBREY WILLIAMS was at one time very active in the Southern Conference for Human Welfare. GA.

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[Confidential Informant T-12, on January 8, 1942, ~~TSX~~ produced a clipping of an article by WEST which appeared in the "Southern News Almanac" on June 6, 1941. In this story, entitled "Awakening Church", WEST stated that he was against war; that the present war was a war of capitalists and imperialistic nations. According to informant, the "Southern News Almanac" was edited and published by SAM HALL, of Birmingham, Alabama, and ceased to exist in 1941.

The "Daily Worker" for June 22, 1947, identified SAM HALL as a native southerner who was going forward as a Communist Party leader in the South. As of this date SAM HALL was identified as Chairman of the Carolina District of the Communist Party.

[Confidential Informant T-12 ~~TSX~~ also furnished a newspaper clipping from the Pike County Journal, Zebulon, Georgia, July 4, 1941 issue, which contained a story by WEST entitled, "Defend Democratic Ideals". This article reflects that WEST urged the American people to have no sympathy for HITLER, and advocated all-out aid for the allies.

[Confidential Informant T-34, on April 11, 1952, ~~TSX~~ made available a copy of WEST'S book of poems entitled "Toil and Hunger". This publication was by the Hagglund Press, of San Benito, Texas, in 1940. On page 11 of the Prologue, WEST, in writing of himself, states as follows: "My real education has been beaten into me by the everlasting toil and hunger I have seen; by the struggles I have seen in textile and coal centers, where my people were toled down from the hills by fair promises of a better life. It is this education of life, of prisons and jails for innocent men, that determined a resolve never to seek to rise upon the shoulders of others, to rise only when the great masses of plain people rise in one big united wave, and we're going to rise."

Informant also made available a small circular published by WEST, in 1944, at which time he was a candidate for the General Assembly from Hall County, in the State Primary of July 4, 1944. WEST, at the time, was Principal of the Lula Georgia High School. In this pamphlet he stated that at the outbreak of war he had volunteered for service with the Armed Forces, but was turned down because of two fingers missing on his left hand. He claimed that prior to that time he had served in the Merchant Marines, and also that he had completed major work necessary for a PhD Degree. In this pamphlet WEST pledged the following items:

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A greater unity for winning a complete, total and speedy victory over Fascism, and a just and everlasting peace.

WEST also pledged that if elected he would work for a liberal revision of the State Constitution, to meet everyday needs.

[Confidential Informant T-4 advised that as of March 29, 1952,] ~~(S)~~ WEST had in his possession a new .38 caliber revolver, and two 12-gauge shotguns, and in exhibiting these weapons to informant, WEST stated he was prepared for the Ku Klux Klan, or anyone attempting to violate his rights.

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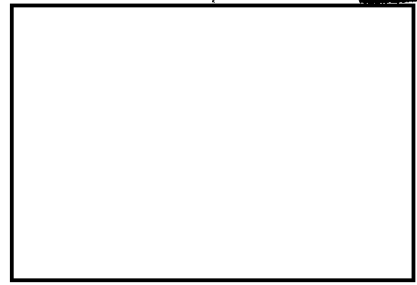

Reference is made to Atlanta letter of 10-27-53 captioned Communist Party, USA, Legislative Activity, Internal Security - C, (Georgia State Anti-Subversive Law), wherein authorization was requested to interview WEST prior to any testimony by WEST before the proposed State Legislative Internal Security Committee, which is expected to be set up at the November Session of the Georgia General Assembly.

By letter dated November 10, 1953, the Bureau authorized the interview of WEST. This will be done in accordance with existing Bureau instructions and the results will be reported in the immediate future. This file is in a pending status in the Atlanta Division.

The individual at Columbus, Georgia identified by PAUL CROUCH is [redacted] who in 1940 broke with the Communist Party, and was the author of a series of newspaper articles in Atlanta, Georgia concerning Communist Party activity. [redacted] was interviewed and furnished a signed statement on October 7, 1949. Information from [redacted] has been furnished the Bureau, by report of SA GEORGE C. BURTON, dated February 1, 1940, at Atlanta, and captioned "COMMUNIST PARTY IN COLUMBUS, GEORGIA AND PHENIX CITY, ALABAMA". The file reference is #100-3-33.

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LAMAR SIZEMORE, Assistant Attorney General, State of Georgia, and GEORGE DILLARD, former FBI Agent who is employed by the State of Georgia, on October 25, 1953, furnished SA C. DALLAS MOBLEY, of this office, a copy of their report to the Governor, which is dated October 23, 1953. SIZEMORE'S report was delivered to the Governor on the night of October 25, 1953 and, according to SIZEMORE, Governor TALMADGE may, at an early date, make a press release concerning this report. Atlanta Airtel of October 24, 1953, captioned as above, informed the Bureau of this action by SIZEMORE. Attached, for the Bureau's information, is one copy of SIZEMORE'S report, which contains an

A review of the SIZEMORE report clearly indicates that SIZEMORE and DILLARD are prepared to take over and operate a legislative investigating committee, which will be created under a pending resolution at the next session of the Georgia Legislature, which is scheduled for November 16, 1953. A review of the SIZEMORE report would indicate they are laying the groundwork to call before the Committee certain professors in the State University System, as hereinafter mentioned, and local Communist Party members or sympathizers who are connected with Atlanta's only peace group, the Atlanta Peace Council.

Pursuant to Bureau instructions, this office has endeavored to maintain liaison with SIZEMORE, in conformity with Bureau letter of May 19, 1953.

GEORGE DILLARD, on October 26, 1953, was asked to identify individuals that will be called before the above mentioned legislative committee. DILLARD states that all plans in this respect are tentative, and that as soon as definite conclusions are reached, this office will be fully advised. According to DILLARD, they now contemplate calling the following individuals:

(1) PAUL CROUCH - Washington, D. C.

SIZEMORE and DILLARD have conferred with CROUCH, and will use this individual in the event he is available in November. Should he be engaged elsewhere, they may use his deposition.

(2) LOUIS F. BUDENZ

In the event CROUCH is not available, and a live expert or witness is desired, BUDENZ may be asked to appear and testify. It is not known whether SIZEMORE or DILLARD have discussed this with BUDENZ, but it is believed they have corresponded with him.

(3) [redacted] - (Atlanta File #100-4067 -- Bufile 100-354570)

[redacted] an Atlanta Negro, has been interviewed by this office. While he did not actually admit Communist Party membership, he admitted association with HOMER BATES CHASE, former C.P. organizer, and his attendance at a Communist Party school at Camp Beacon, New York, in 1946 or 1947. [redacted] has claimed that he participated under the belief that this activity was part

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of UNAVA. The Atlanta file on [redacted] is closed. GEORGE DILLARD has advised that they have interviewed [redacted] and he has furnished some information as above, but has denied actual Communist Party membership. DILLARD states that [redacted] testimony would be used as predication for calling Dr. [redacted] Atlanta [redacted]

(4) DR. [redacted] - (Atlanta File 100-4038 - Bufile 100-311873)

[redacted] is presently the subject of a pending security case, and has not been interviewed by the FBI. He has been identified as a one-time Communist Party member, and was a close associate of HOMER BATES CHASE, former C.P. Organizer, from about 1947 until August, 1950. We have developed no information reflecting C.P. activity by [redacted] since August, 1950. He is currently [redacted] a [redacted] known as the "One Hundred Dollar a Month Pension Club", and is known to have disseminated propoganda paralleling the Communist Party line in the past.

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(5) NATHAN KATZ - (Atlanta File 100-4010 - Bufile 100-46430)

KATZ has not been interviewed by the FBI, and no active investigation concerning him has been conducted since 1950. KATZ was, according to the records of Homer Bates Chase, former C.P. Organizer, a member as late as 1949. He has a long Communist Party history, going back to 1945. LAMAR SIZEMORE advises that they have interviewed KATZ, who denies current Communist Party membership, but who admitted membership in the past. SIZEMORE claims KATZ has refused to identify individuals associated with him. They have also interviewed ANNA KATZ, wife of NATHAN KATZ, who has a long Communist Party history.

(6) HENRY WALD - (Atlanta File 100-3841 - Bufile 100-280571)

WALD, a Security Index Subject of the Atlanta Division, has been interviewed. He has denied Communist Party membership, but has admitted participation in the Progressive Party Movement in Georgia, in 1948-49. The Bureau file will reflect that WALD is carried as a C.P. Member, by CHASE, as late as 1949.

GEORGE DILLARD states that they plan, through WALD'S testimony, to show a picture of the Progressive Party of Georgia in 1947-48, and possibly IWO activity in the State of Georgia during the same period, and prior thereto.

(7) ENOS WICHER - (Atlanta File 65-1409 - Bufile 100-135901)

WICHER is a Security Index subject of the Atlanta Division, and is employed as a Physics Professor by the University of Georgia,

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Atlanta Division. WICHER was interviewed in connection with the Bureau's investigation of FLORA DON WOVSCHIN; who was identified by Bureau sources as a Russian agent. WICHER has admitted to an Army Security Board past Communist Party history. He and his wife, MARIA WOVSCHIN WICHER, have both been identified as one-time Russian agents by a Bureau source.

(8) DON WEST - (Atlanta File 100-559 - Bufile 100-20396)

WEST is a Security Index subject of the Atlanta Division, and has not been interviewed by the FBI. He has a long Communist Party history, and is known generally to the public in the State of Georgia, as a one-time Communist Party member. He has a long Communist Party history, and his Party membership can be documented to the Daily Worker. He was active in the Progressive Party of Georgia in 1948-49, and was an associate of HOMER BATES CHASE, former Communist Party Organizer. We have developed no current Communist Party activity on his part since 1950.

GEORGE DILLARD has advised that the State has not interviewed DON WEST, however they are considering such action. Since he is known publicly in Georgia as a one-time Communist Party member, he will more than likely be called. Further, that CROUCH will no doubt identify WEST in his testimony.

(9) ANNIE MAE LEATHERS - (Atlanta File #100-401)

This individual is a Security Index subject of the Atlanta Division. She has not been interviewed by the FBI, and is one of three LEATHERS sisters who are known to be currently loyal to the Communist Party. ANNIE MAE LEATHERS has a long Communist Party history, and is presently active in the operation of the Atlanta Peace Council, an affiliate of the American Peace Crusade. The three LEATHERS sisters, together with [redacted] who is married to LEAH LEATHERS YOUNG, were the originators of this Atlanta group, and completely control their activities. ANNIE MAE LEATHERS is generally known to the Atlanta public as a Communist Party member, and her activities are covered through Atlanta informant [redacted] a [redacted] (X)

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(10) [redacted] - (Atlanta File 100-430)

[redacted] is the husband of LEAH YOUNG, one of the three LEATHERS sisters. He has been identified in the past as a Communist sympathizer, and a Socialist. His first wife, [redacted] was a one-time Communist Party Elector in the State of Georgia, in the early thirties. [redacted] is a current subscriber to the

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"Daily Worker", and is the Chairman of the Atlanta Peace Council, as above mentioned. [redacted] has never been interviewed by the FBI. b6 b7C

(11) DR. LAWRENCE REDDICK - (Atlanta File 100-4426)

REDDICK, a Negro, is the Librarian at the Atlanta University, a Negro institution. He has never been interviewed by the FBI. REDDICK was once discharged as a librarian by the City of New York, for Communist Party activity. The Atlanta Office has never been able to prove Communist Party activity in Georgia by this individual. The State has not interviewed REDDICK.

(12) Professor G. MURRAY BRANCH - (Atlanta File 100-5190 -)

This individual is a Negro, and a professor at Morehouse College. He has never been interviewed by the FBI, and has not been the subject of a security investigation by this office. The Atlanta indices reflect that BRANCH was active in the Progressive Party of Georgia, during 1947-48. His name is frequently mentioned in the "Daily Worker" as a sponsor or signer of various peace petitions. The "Daily Worker", on October 1, 1953, listed BRANCH as one of 99 individuals who sponsored a national conference to repeal the Walter McCarran Law, as announced by the American Committee for Protection of Foreign Born. The "Daily Worker" for July 8, 1953, also identified BRANCH as an endorser of the statement by officers of the American Committee for Protection of Foreign Born, condemning the Justice Department's move with respect to registration with the Subversive Activities Control Board by this organization.

BRANCH was once affiliated with the Southern Negro Youth Conference, which has been cited.

The "Daily Worker", on April 7, 1950, carried an article on the Mid-Century Conference for Peace, at Chicago, May 29, 1950. Chicago informant [redacted] identified BRANCH as a sponsor of this peace group. BRANCH was also identified by New York informant ND 425 as appearing on the list of prominent Americans endorsing the World Peace Appeal, this list being released by the Peace Information Center, New York City, under date of August 14, 1950. BRANCH, according to information from CIC, Third Army, was a sponsor of the American Peace Crusade, and also protested the North Atlantic Pact. The "Daily Worker" for March 21, 1952, identified 39 more notables who urged negotiations in Germany. MURRAY BRANCH was included in this group. The Atlanta files contain no information indicating current or past Communist Party membership in Georgia for BRANCH. The State has not interviewed BRANCH. b2 b7D

(13) [redacted] - Columbus, Georgia

[redacted] was identified as the individual who exposed the Communist Party at Columbus, Georgia in newspaper articles in 1940, as identified by PAUL CROUCH. [redacted] has not been interviewed by the FBI since 1949. GEORGE DILLARD indicates that they may use [redacted] as a witness, and may interview him at an early date.

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(14) Professor [redacted]

This individual is employed by the University of Georgia, at Athens, Georgia. He is referred to in Atlanta letter of July 27, 1953, captioned "INDIVIDUALS CONNECTED WITH THE UNIVERSITY OF GEORGIA ALLEGED TO BE COMMUNISTICALLY INCLINED; MRS. JULIUS TALMADGE, INFORMANT"; Atlanta File 100-5128, Bufile 100-356380. [redacted] according to Atlanta file, has never been interviewed by the FBI. He was the subject of a Loyalty of Government Employees investigation in 1948, while employed by the Veterans Administration, Memphis, Tennessee. The principal information developed on [redacted] was that he had taught at the Abraham Lincoln School, in Chicago, in 1945. [redacted] has never been investigated by the Atlanta Division, and the outcome of the above loyalty investigation is unknown. This individual has not been interviewed by State authorities.

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(15) RUBIN GOTESKY - (Atlanta 100-5128; Bufile unknown)

GOTESKY is a Professor at the University of Georgia, Athens, Georgia. He has never been interviewed as a subject by the Atlanta Office. He has been interviewed as a reference or associate in a loyalty case, but has never been questioned concerning his past Communist Party activity. The Atlanta Office has never conducted a security investigation on GOTESKY.

According to information furnished by the Bureau, in letter dated July 3, 1953, concerning individuals at the University of Georgia, Bureau file 100-356380, GOTESKY was once a Communist Party member, who was active in the Socialist Workers Party, but who broke with these groups and testified before the Rapp-Coudert Committee.

Both GEORGE DILLARD and LAMAR SIZEMORE, on October 25, 1953, stated that they would notify the Atlanta Office in advance of calling any witness before the proposed legislative committee.

Pursuant to Bureau instructions in referenced letter of October 22, 1953, the Atlanta Office will immediately interview [redacted] at Columbus, Georgia, who was identified by

CROUCH as having exposed the Communist Party in 1940.

In view of the proposed action by the State of Georgia, with reference to testimony from the above listed individuals, it is recommended that the Bureau authorize the Atlanta Office to immediately interview the following individuals, none of whom have been recently interviewed:

2. DON WEST
3. LAWRENCE REDDICK
4. [REDACTED]
5. RUBIN GOTESKY
6. MURRAY BRANCH
7. DR. [REDACTED]

It is not recommended that we interview, at this time, ANNIE MAE LEATHERS and [REDACTED] unless the Bureau otherwise instructs. These two individuals are presently active in operating the Atlanta Peace Council. Information concerning the Atlanta Peace Council, an affiliate of the American Peace Crusade, is set forth in the report of SA C. DALLAS MOBLEY, 7-31-53, at Atlanta, captioned "AMERICAN PEACE CRUSADE", Bureau file 100-377391.

Atlanta Security Informant [REDACTED] of known reliability, a [REDACTED] of ANNIE MAE LEATHERS, has advised that ANNIE MAE LEATHERS and [REDACTED] would both be hostile toward an interview with the FBI, and would not admit Communist Party activity. ~~(S)~~

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This recommendation is further based on the fact that this office has coverage on ANNIE MAE LEATHERS, [REDACTED] and the Atlanta Peace Council through the above mentioned Security Informant, and one Potential Security Informant, [REDACTED]. The activities of the Atlanta Peace Council to date consist of:

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- (1) Attending the Peace Lobby in Washington, D. C., in June, 1953.
- (2) Selling subscriptions to the "Peace Reporter", a publication of the American Peace Crusade.
- (3) Holding small meetings, on a weekly basis, in one of the slum areas of the City of Atlanta, where the LEATHERS family resides.
- (4) The membership is estimated at approximately ten or twelve people, all of whom are known to this office.

They have sold an estimated 100 subscriptions to the above paper, and are reported to have approximately \$30.00 in their treasury. ~~(S)~~

- (5) They are attempting to raise money in the above manner in order to attend an American Peace Crusade meeting in New York City, in November, 1953.
- ~~(S)~~ (6) This group has failed to even receive newspaper publicity in Atlanta. They have made no known efforts to recruit anyone into the Communist Party. ~~(S)~~
- (7) The Communist influence on this group is known to be confined to its organizers, and officers, who are ANNIE MAE LEATHERS, [redacted] LEAH YOUNG, the three LEATHERS sisters; and [redacted] above identified. b6 b7C

GEORGE DILLARD advises that in the event ANNIE MAE LEATHERS and [redacted] are subpoenaed and appear, they expect a small demonstration by this group, for publicity reasons. b6 b7C

The Washington Field Office is requested to reinterview PAUL CROUCH, and to determine from him what testimony he will give in the event he appears as above mentioned.

No recommendation is being made by the Atlanta Division for an interview with Mr. BUDENZ, as a proposed witness before this committee, inasmuch as his official status and position with respect to furnishing information is not known to the Atlanta Office. An interview with Mr. BUDENZ in this respect should be considered by the Bureau.

ADDENDUM:

Enclosed are newspaper clippings from the Atlanta Constitution, of October 27, 1953, concerning Governor TALMADGE'S press release. The former Communist fellow travelers and Communist sympathizers, who are alleged by TALMADGE to be holding high positions of authority in Georgia, are the above mentioned professors employed by the University System.

Confidential Source [redacted] advised on October 27, 1953, that both Atlanta newspapers would oppose the creation of the above mentioned legislative committee. b6 b7C b7D

Subject interviewed by Special Agents ALDEN F. MILLER and [redacted] on subject's farm located twelve miles from Douglasville, Ga. WEST lives alone on this farm at the present time, and apparently is actively engaged in productive farm activity.

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WEST alleged that he was "being persecuted" for his "honest beliefs", and described himself as a "principled man, and an ordained minister of Jesus Christ". He stated he had never participated in any group or individual activity, nor ever wrote or said anything in which he did not sincerely believe at the time he so spoke or acted.

WEST observed that he is a "principled man" who strove only to "accomplish good" for his fellow man, and in so doing, worked with any individual or groups who had the same objectives as he did. In this regard, he said he has not actually belonged to the Communist Party since the time (1935-36) that he was employed as a District Organizer for the Communist Party in the State of Kentucky. He said, however, that he had continued associations with persons whom he "believed to be Communists", and in this regard referred to HOMER BATES CHASE (subject of Internal Security Matter - C, Smith Act of 1940 case, Bufile 100-349078). He reiterated, however, that these associations occurred as a result of his mutual objective of "accomplishing good" for his fellow man, mentioning that so far as his relations with CHASE were concerned they solely resulted from the mutual interest in the organization of the Progressive Party of Georgia, and the Presidential candidacy of HENRY A. WALLACE in 1948.

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WEST stated he was a strong admirer of WALLACE, and believed in the original objectives of the Progressive Party of Georgia. However, he claimed that "HOMER BATES CHASE, EUDICE TONTAK, [redacted] and outsiders from New York and other places" by their domineering attitude, ruined all chances of success of this "liberal" party. He pointed out that he had constantly differed with CHASE during the organization and forming of the Progressive Party of Georgia, and stated "Do you think that if I were in the Communist Party at that time that I would be at liberty to differ with CHASE". WEST expressed extreme distaste for CHASE, TONTAK, and [redacted] all of whom have been identified with Communist Party activity in Georgia in the past.

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WEST observed that he was extremely resentful of the treatment he had received "in the hands of the McCARRAN Sub-Committee" (apparently referring to U. S. Senate Sub-Committee hearings held about 8/13/52). WEST pointed out that a "paid informer", HARVEY M. MATUSOW, had, (apparently on 3/5/52) given sworn testimony that WEST was (1) a Baptist preacher; (2) a Boy Scout Troop Leader; and (3) that he had allegedly met WEST at a Communist Party meeting in 1951.

WEST stated that he considered that it would be a relatively easy matter to prove perjury against MATUSOW since WEST was (1) not a Baptist, but an ordained minister of the Congregational Faith; (2) that he had never participated in the Boy Scout movement; and (3) that he was sure that the FBI had information available or could get information which would prove that WEST had not belonged to the Communist Party for many years.

WEST said that for the above reasons he granted an interview to "Atlanta Journal" newspaper reporter, CELESTINE SIBLEY, and that the article written by CELESTINE SIBLEY appearing in the "Atlanta Journal" on 8/14/52, accurately expressed his views concerning the "false testimony" made against WEST in the McCARRAN Committee Hearings.

Summary of Observations as a Result of Interview:

- (1) WEST did not appear to be very cooperative in that

he declined to go into any detail or be specific.

(2) WEST contradicted allegations of membership in the Communist Party since 1936, but did admit associations with known Communists as indicated in Summary Report of SA C. DALLAS MOBLEY, at Atlanta, dated 4/21/53.

(3) It is not believed that WEST would be available as a witness, nor that he would make a satisfactory witness due to his highly nervous temperament, and tendency to insist on making generalized statements.

(4) WEST does not appear to be available as a source of information or an informant.

(5) No further contacts with WEST are contemplated UACB.

SYNOPSIS OF FACTS:

Subject continues to farm and reside at RFD #4, Douglasville, Ga. Informant advised that on 11-25-53, [Redacted] Durham, N.C., delivered 2,000 copies of a book, authored by WEST, entitled "The Road is Rocky", to subject at Douglasville, Ga. [Redacted] allegedly delivered these books from the Abernethy Book Store, Chapel Hill, N.C., and WEST reportedly paid him \$800 upon delivery. Abernethy Book Shop, Chapel Hill, N.C., operated by MILTON AVANT ABERNETHY and his wife, MINNA ABERNETHY. ABERNETHYS called before Senate Internal Security Committee in spring, 1953, and declined to answer most questions on grounds of Fifth Amendment. MINNA ABERNETHY identified by informant as member of CP. WEST interviewed 3-2-54. WEST said he had not actually belonged to CP since about 1935-36 when he was District Organizer of CP in Kentucky. He admitted subsequent associations with persons he "believed to be Communists". He explained such associations based on his support of same causes as those in which CP interested at time, such as Progressive Party of Georgia during 1948. However, denies such support by him was result of his affiliation with or support of CP as such but only incidental to WEST's support of same objectives as CP. [Subject did not appear cooperative.]

All informants hereinafter identified are of known reliability unless otherwise indicated.

Atlanta Informants T-1 and T-2 advised that DONALD IRE WEST continues to farm and reside at RFD #4, Douglasville, Georgia.

Atlanta Informant T-3 advised that he has had an opportunity to observe subject and that subject is apparently making an insidious effort to operate a successful farm at RFD #4, Douglasville, Georgia, and claim to be doing some writing. Otherwise, informant stated that the subject was not observed by the informant to have engaged in any other activities.

Atlanta Informant T-2 advised SA ALLEN F. MILLER on January 18, 1954, that he has learned that one [redacted] Durham, North Carolina, has contacted WEST on November 20, 1953. COULAKIS was driving a [redacted] bearing 1953 North Carolina license 603-328, and at the time of the contact delivered to WEST 2,000 copies of the book entitled, "The Road is Rocky", which was written by WEST. Informant advised that his information indicates that these books had been delivered to WEST and were from the Abernathy Book Store, Chapel Hill, North Carolina. Informant further advised that he has received information that DONALD WEST paid \$800 to [redacted] upon delivery of the books.

Captain FRED SEAGROVE, Durham Police Department, Durham, North Carolina, advised that his records reflected that 1953 North Carolina license 603-328 was issued to [redacted] the property of [redacted] Durham, North Carolina.

[redacted] Duke University, Durham, North Carolina, advised that the records of that office reflected that [redacted] was a member of the Junior Class at Duke University. The records reflected that he was born [redacted] at [redacted] North Carolina, the son of JAMES COULAKIS, deceased, and ANGELINE VOHRER, [redacted] Asheville, North Carolina.

The records of Duke University further reflected that [redacted] graduated from Lee Elementary School, Asheville, North Carolina, and attended Asheville-Biltmore College from 1948 to 1950. He entered Duke

University on January 9, 1952. His home address was listed as in care of Mrs. ANGELINE VOUTER, 4 Sawyer Street, Asheville, North Carolina. His address at Duke University was listed as Dormitory Room 702, in which he roomed with [redacted] and [redacted].

[redacted] Defense Informant T-4, another Government agency, advised that the records of that agency reflected that [redacted] listed his mother as Mrs. ANGELINE COULANIS, 4 Sawyer Street, Asheville, North Carolina, and his birth date as [redacted] at [redacted] North Carolina. The informant further advised that this individual was reportedly classified 4-F in October, 1951, under the provisions of Selective Service Act.

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[redacted] Atlanta Informant T-5 advised that he had known [redacted] for three or four years. Informant advised that [redacted] was a brother of [redacted]. Informant stated that [redacted] was not known by the informant to be engaged in any subversive activity in the vicinity of Asheville, North Carolina, and that he had never known [redacted] to have attended any meetings of any organization which might be engaged in subversive activities.

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[redacted] Informant T-7 advised that MILTON A. ABERNETHY and his wife, MRS. ABERNETHY, formerly operated the Intimate Book Shop and presently operate Abernethy's Store in Chapel Hill, North Carolina.

[redacted] Weaverville, North Carolina, on July 13, 1950, was advised that [redacted] membership in the Communist Party at Chapel Hill from 1935 to 1937, advised that the "Southern Worker", a subsidiary of the "Daily Worker", an East Coast Communist daily newspaper, was published in the rear of the Intimate Book Shop operated by the ABERNETHYS at Chapel Hill, North Carolina.

PAUL CROUCH, an admitted Communist Party functionary from 1945 to 1942, described both Mr. and Mrs. ABERNETHY, on August 4, 1950, as persons who were known to him to be Communist Party sympathizers.

[redacted] on March 21, 1949, identified MRS. ABERNETHY as a member of the Communist Party and indicated that MILTON A. ABERNETHY tolerated this Communist Party membership and allowed his place of business to be used as a meeting place for Communist Party members.

Atlanta Informant T-7 advised ~~(S)~~ that Mr. and Mrs. ABERNETHY were called before the Senate Internal Security Committee during the spring of 1953, at which time both declined to answer most questions put to them on the grounds of the Fifth Amendment.

Atlanta Informant T-1 advised on January 19, 1954, that DON L. WEST had contacted ANNIE MAE LEATHERS, LEAH YOUNG WASHBURN, and  on January 18, 1954. Informant identified ANNIE MAE LEATHERS, LEAH YOUNG WASHBURN, and  as having been members of the Communist Party for over twenty years. According to the informant, WEST asked these three sisters to make an effort to obtain subscriptions to the "Farm and Home Magazine", which is published at Montgomery, Alabama, by AUDREY WILLIAMS. WEST allegedly offered these persons a proposition by which they were to sell five year subscriptions to this magazine at the rate of \$1 for the entire period and they in turn could retain \$1 as their commission for each five one-year subscriptions sold. WEST further advised them that this publication was formerly known as the "Southern Farmer". ~~(S)~~

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INTERVIEW OF SUBJECT

DONALD LEE WEST was interviewed on March 2, 1954, at his farm, which is located twelve miles from Douglasville, Georgia.

WEST advised that he felt that he was "being persecuted" for his "honest beliefs" and described himself as a

"principled man and an ordained minister of Jesus Christ". WEST stated to the agents that he had never participated in any group or individual activity nor had ever written or said anything in which he did not sincerely believe at the time he so spoke or acted. WEST observed that as a "principled man" he strove only to "accomplish good for all men" and in so doing worked with any individual or groups whom he felt had the same objectives as he did.

In this regard, he said that he at one time believed that the Communist Party was seeking the same objectives in which he believed and was sincerely interested in bettering the lot of his fellow man. WEST, although inclining to advise the agents as to the exact period of his membership in the Communist Party, advised the agents that he had now belonged to the Communist Party since about 1935 or 1936, at which time he represented the Communist Party as a District Organizer in the State of Kentucky. WEST said that subsequently, "through the years", he had continued periodic associations with persons whom he "believed to be Communists".

When asked to name some of these persons, he stated that "it is no secret" that he associated with HOMER BATES CHASE, self-admitted District Organizer for District 31, Communist Party, USA, Atlanta, Georgia, from 1940 to 1948. WEST said that he personally had no use for CHASE and that they were in frequent disagreement. He said, however, that his association with CHASE centered around their mutual interest in the organization of the Progressive Party of Georgia and the presidential candidacy of HENRY A. WALLACE in 1948. WEST stated that he personally had a strong and continuing admiration for Mr. WALLACE. WEST observed that the objectives of the Progressive Party of Georgia and support for the presidential candidacy of HENRY A. WALLACE in 1948 could have been successful except, "that HOMER BATES CHASE, JUDICE TORRE, [redacted] and other outsiders from New York and other places" by their "demagogic attitude" ruined "all chances of success for this liberal party". WEST stated to the agents, "I do not think that if I were in the Communist Party at that time that I would be so liberty to differ with CHASE."

Atlanta Informant T-1 advised in 1948, that JUDICE TORRE had been an active Communist Party member at that time.

WEST stated that at United States Senate Sub-Committee on Internal Security had had hearings about August 13, 1952, in which HARVEY M. MILBORN had given testimony that he knew WEST as a Baptist preacher, a boy scout troop leader, and a person that he met at a Communist Party meeting in 1931.

WEST advised that as far as he, WEST, was concerned, MATUSOW was a perjurer and that these statements by MATUSOW were false. He said as a result of those hearings he had granted an interview to Mrs. CELESTINE SIBLEY of the Atlanta Journal, daily newspaper, Atlanta, Georgia, which appeared in the Atlanta Journal on August 14, 1952. WEST advised that the report by Mrs. SIBLEY "accurately expressed my views concerning this false testimony" and that he, WEST, had nothing further to add to the information which he had furnished Mrs. SIBLEY.

The Atlanta Journal, a daily newspaper printed in Atlanta, Georgia, dated August 14, 1952, carries the results of an interview by Mrs. CELESTINE SIBLEY of DON WEST. Mrs. SIBLEY reported that WEST "angrily denied Wednesday that he is a member of the Communist Party or that he participated in any effort to infiltrate the Boy Scout movement with Red propaganda".

Mrs. SIBLEY reported that WEST was interviewed in connection with the publication of a Senate subcommittee report previous Wednesday in Washington, D.C. She quotes WEST as stating "Well, Senator McCarran ----- He sees Communists under every bed! The truth is not in him. As for this Matusow report, I am not a Baptist clergyman, I have never been a Baptist clergyman and I've never had anything to do with the Boy Scouts! I have the greatest admiration for the Boy Scout organization, as much as I know about it. Our two daughters attend Girl Scout camp - but I don't see that has anything to do with this".

Mrs. SIBLEY's report continues, "WEST said he had been ordained in the Congregational Church and had preached several years ago, 'But I'm not doing anything now except trying to make a living out here'". The article continues "they won't let me alone, (WEST SAYS), 'Twenty years ago I wrote a poem which appeared in the Daily Worker. I was a Communist then. Any young person who is not a rebel is not worth his salt. I am not a Communist now. I am a Georgia farmer. When I worked for the Peoples Progressive Party the Communists fought, opposed and attacked me as much as RALPH MCGILL has," (RALPH MCGILL is the editor of the Atlanta Constitution, an Atlanta daily newspaper.)

"I don't think it does any good to deny or claim. I believe in the teachings of Jesus. I believe if there is one thing you can live by it's His saying that 'By their fruits ye shall know them'. I'll be content to be known by my fruits".

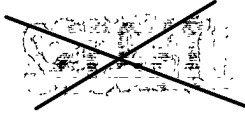

## SUCCINCT RESUME OF CASE

The Daily Worker, June 19, 1934, refers to WEST as the Communist Party organizer in the South, stating that he was to speak at the International Labor Defense in behalf of ANGELO HERNDON. The Daily Worker of November 1, 1935, refers to WEST as Communist organizer. The Daily Worker of June 22, 1937, refers to WEST as the Georgia born organizer of the Communist Party, Kentucky. The Daily Worker, June 22, 1937, refers to WEST as State Organizer, Workers Alliance of Kentucky, and a member of the National Unemployed Committee for BROWDER and FORD. WEST wrote a poem appearing in the Daily Worker of March 13, 1934, entitled, "Listen, I Am A Communist". WEST was described by PAUL CROUCH as a Communist Party member in 1934, when doing labor organizing in North Carolina and later in Kentucky. The subject was a close contact of HOMER BATES CHASE, former District Organizer, District 31, Communist Party, United States of America, until 1950. WEST has been a close associate of NAT ROSS, former member of the Communist Party National Committee. Subject held Communist Party card number 96336 in 1947, according to a highly confidential source. WEST active in Progressive Party Campaign in 1948, and was co-chairman of the Communist Party in Georgia, according to informants. WEST was active with the Home Missions Council of North America in 1950 and with the Institute of Applied Religion. [redacted] in 1955, described WEST as a comrade who comes to Communist Party New York City Headquarters infrequently on Party business, and was looked on as a comrade who had the facility to "straighten out" difficult Party problems. He stated that he had not seen WEST since 1950. WEST was interviewed on March 2, 1954, and admitted Communist Party membership in 1935-36, association with known Communist Party members, and

"The Daily Worker" issues for November 1, 1935 and June 22, 1937, July 20 and October 5, 1936, and June 19, 1934, all make mention of DONALD LEE WEST as a Communist Party organizer for the State of Kentucky and/or "Communist Party Organizer in the South." "The Daily Worker" of March 13, 1934, Page 5, carried a poem written by DON WEST entitled "Listen, I Am A Communist."

The files of the Atlanta Office reflect that Dr. ALVA TAYLOR listed as a contributing editor to "The Southerner", has been the subject of a Security Matter - C case in which Memphis was the office of origin (Memphis File 100-2312).

The files of the Atlanta Office reflect that TOM LUDWIG, Farmer's Union, Andalusia, Alabama (possibly identical with THOMAS D. LUDWIG), purported CP member and formerly on staff of Highlander Folk School, Monteagle, Tennessee (Atlanta File 100-4135-1 Page 23).

The files of the Atlanta Office reflect that AUBREY WILLIS WILLIAMS, listed as a contributing editor, is the subject of a Security Matter - C case, (Mobile 00 (Mobile File 100-824)).

Files of the Atlanta Office failed to reflect any identifiable information concerning [redacted] Washington, D.C.

The Atlanta Office by letter dated June 10, 1955, has recommended subject be retained in the Security Index. This letter submitted in accordance with procedure outlined in SAC Letter 55-30 concerning Security Index review. Review of file indicates that as early as 1934 subject was Communist Party organizer in the south. Frequent references during subsequent years in the "Daily Worker" refer to him as a Communist organizer. Subject was a close contact of Homer Bates Chase, former district organizer of the Communist Party until 1950. West has been a close associate of Nat Ross, former member of the Communist Party National Committee. [It is known that subject held a Communist Party membership card in 1947] and was active in Progressive Party campaign in 1948. There has been no indication of Communist Party activities on the part of subject since 1950. Subject was interviewed on March 2, 1954, and admitted Communist Party membership in 1935 and 1936. He continues to maintain periodic contact with known Communist Party members including above-mentioned Nat Ross.

RECOMMENDATION:

It is recommended the captioned subject be removed from the Security Index in view of the fact that there have been no Communist Party activities within the past five years and subject, therefore, does not meet the criteria for inclusion in the Security Index. Attached for your approval is a suggested letter to the Atlanta Office.

Dear Mr. Hoover,

On past occasions I have received very nice letters from you relative to editorials, etc., we have written on criminal matters.

We are currently engaged in quite a campaign against Don West, who came here last winter and began a little monthly newspaper. We obtained from the House Committee on Un-American Activities his Communist background. West, co-publisher of the paper with S.T. Pratt, has as his two leading contributing editors, Aubrey Williams and Alva W. Taylor. Their records from the Un-American Activities file are as bad as Don West's.

Georgia has a law now which makes it unlawful for a person residing within the state to be a member of the Communist Party, or a Communist, etc. We have stirred up a large amount of interest about the Communist backgrounds of these three men and the county grand jury, when it convenes Oct. 3, is going to look into the matter. What we need is any additional and late information about Don West and his Communist activities which might assist us in proving he has been a party member since the first of 1953, retroactive date of the Georgia law.

Of course I know you could not give me anything direct, but I was wondering if perhaps pertinent data could be made available to our solicitor-general, to Lt. Poole, of GBI, or Mr. Mumford, FBI agent in Atlanta? The GBI is making available its files on West to Erwin Mitchell, our solicitor-general, but I understand the FBI does not maintain such practices.

Having had the admiration and respect of you and the FBI for years, I cannot conceive that the organization would not cooperate in such a matter as vital as this.

Don West, Aubrey Williams and Alva Taylor, through their slanted writings, could make lots of friends in this area of Georgia for the Communist party.

(Don L. West now lives in Dalton. He is editor of The Southerner of which he is also co-publisher with C. T. Pratt. The following is exact information from the files of the Committee on Un-American Activities and was copied in Washington for Cong. Henderson Lanham, of the Georgia Seventh District.)

DATE: May 3, 1955

FOR: Honorable Henderson Lanham, M. C.

SUBJECT: Donald L. West

The public records, files and publications of this Committee contain the following information concerning the subject individual. This report should not be construed as representing the results of an investigation by or findings of this Committee. It should be noted that the individual is not necessarily a Communist, a Communist sympathizer, or a fellow-traveler unless otherwise indicated.

In testimony of Mr. John P. Frey, President, Metal Trades Department, American Federation of Labor, before the Special Committee on Un-American Activities in August 1938, the following information was submitted for the record:

"Don West, Louisville, Ky. This man, formerly in charge of Atlanta, Ga., for Communist Party, is a preacher and a graduate of Vanderbilt University. He sneaked out of Atlanta on a truck, under a load of gunny sacks, when Assistant Solicitor General Hutson swore out warrants for his arrest. After a short period in New York City, he was sent to Kentucky and there made organizer. It had been reported on numerous occasions that he was a part-time employee of the Textile Workers Union, a C. I. O. affiliate, and at the same time was district organizer of District No. 123, Communist Party. (Public Hearings, Special Committee, Volume 1, page 128.)"

In a list of leading State officials of the Communist Party, U. S. A., submitted for the record in connection with testimony of Mr. Walter S. Steele before the Special Committee in August

1936, he was identified as a (Communist) Party organizer in the South, scheduled to speak at a mass meeting in Boston, Mass. The Daily Worker of May 14, 1947 (page 11) reported that Don West was "a Baptist minister" and "formerly superintendent of a school at Tula, (sic) Georgia," now on the faculty of Oglethorpe University. Samuel Sillen wrote in his article entitled "Behind the Ivy Curtain," which was published in Masses & Mainstream for March 1949 (page 7) that Don West of Oglethorpe was dismissed "for Wallace activity."

In 1936, Don West of Louisville, Kentucky, was State Organizer for the Workers Alliance of Kentucky, as shown in the Daily Worker of October 5, 1936 (page 3, column 3), and September 14, 1936 (page 3). The Special Committee cited the Workers Alliance as "among the successes in front movements (of) the Communist" (Report of January 3, 1939, also cited in reports of January 3, 1940, June 25, 1942 and March 29, 1944). The Attorney General cited it as "Communist penetrated organization" and as subversive and Communist (Congressional Record, September 24, 1942, page 7684, and press releases of December 4, 1947 and September 21, 1948) also included in consolidated list released April 1, 1954.

According to the Daily Worker of October 5, 1936 (page 3), Don West endorsed Earl Browder, (General Secretary of the Communist Party) for President of the United States on the Communist Party ticket.

On July 11, 1942, an Open Letter was addressed to the President of the United States by the National Federation for Constitutional Liberties, urging reconsideration of Attorney General Biddle's order to deport Harry Bridges; the letter also stated that "It is equally essential that the Attorney General's ill-advised

in Georgia, where Don West's recent book of verse, "Clods of Southern Earth," is under fire. The forms of persecution may be different, but the purpose is the same. It is to outlaw progressive literature in America. Don West's excellent volume of verse attacks the white supremacists and speaks up for the workingman. Don West is a Baptist minister who was formerly superintendent of schools at Tula, (sic) Georgia, and is at present on the faculty of Oglethorpe University. A people's poet of stature, West has fought vigorously against the Talmadge forces in his state. In his poetry he movingly expresses the striving of the poor people of the South, Negro and White, for democracy and decency. He is a genuine force. Liberal-minded ministers, teachers and editors of the state are rallying to his defense. A committee has been formed and funds are being raised. The defense of Don West requires our utmost support." Another article in defense of Don West's "Clods of Southern Earth" appeared in the Daily Worker on May 14, 1947 (page 11) written by John Hudson Jones.

On the back cover of Political Affairs (a monthly magazine devoted to the theory and practice of Marxism-Leninism) for November 1946, announcement was made of a new Marxist literary quarterly that will provide a forum for the most significant American writing today, to be known as "Mainstream." Information is furnished to the effect that Samuel Sillen will edit the publication and that "Don West" is the other leader in the field of the literary arts. (Comprise the Editorial Board.)

On May 6, 1949, Paul Crouch testified before the Committee on Un-American Activities that "I first met Don West in North Carolina in July or August 1934 when he was sent by the central committee to act as central director. He acted in that capacity one year, using the name of Jim Weaver. During this time he headed the Burlington Defense Committee. He was released from

## AUBREY WILLIAMS

The Communist publication, the Daily Worker of May 20, 1947 (page 5), named Aubrey Williams as one of those who signed a statement of the Southern Conference for Human Welfare; he was identified as publisher of the Southern Farmer, Montgomery, Alabama. According to the Worker (Sunday edition of the Daily Worker) for October 19, 1947 (page 3), Mr. Williams was Chairman of the Alabama Chapter of the Southern Conference for Human Welfare; he also participated in the Second Southern Conference for Human Welfare which was held at Chattanooga, Tennessee, April 14-16, 1940 (see the Call to a Second Southern Conference . . .). He contributed to the Southern Patriot, official organ of the Southern Conference . . . as shown by the issue of that publication for September 1947 (page 5).

The Southern Conference for Human Welfare has been cited as a Communist-front organization which received money from the Robert Marshall Foundation, one of the principal sources of funds by which many Communist fronts operate; and it "seeks to attract Southern liberals on the basis of its seeming interest in the problems of the South." (Report 1311 of the Special Committee on Un-American Activities dated March 29, 1944; and Report No. 592 of the Committee on Un-American Activities dated June 12, 1947, respectively.)

Mr. Williams was one of the sponsors of the National Conference of the American Committee for Protection of Foreign Born, held in Cleveland, Ohio, October 25 and 26, 1947, as shown on the printed program and the Call to the Conference. The American Committee for . . . has been cited as "one of the oldest auxiliaries of the Communist Party in the United States" (report of the special Committee . . . dated March 29, 1944; also report dated June 25, 1942); the Attorney General of the United States cited the organization as subversive and Communist (letters to the Loyalty Review Board, released to the press June 1 and September 21, 1948; it was redesignated by Attorney General Brownell April 27, 1953, pursuant to Executive Order No. 10450, consolidated list compiled by the Attorney General April 1, 1954).

In the Daily Worker of September 12, 1947 (pages 2 and 12), we find that "Aubrey Williams, former head of the National Youth Administration, recalled the steady efforts . . ."

## ALVA TAYLOR

The following reference to Alva W. Taylor is from testimony of Benjamin Gitlow in public hearings of the Committee July 7, 1953 (pp. 2132-33):

"The April 1946 issue of the bulletin (Social Questions Bulletin) of the official publication of the Methodist Federation for Social Action is also revealing in other respects. The lead article, 'The Utopia of Jesus,' was written by Alva W. Taylor, who has a long Communist-front record. He signed the letter of the American Council on Soviet Relations, a Communist front, calling upon the President to declare war on Finland, as demanded by the Soviet Union and the Communist Party. He signed a Communist appeal in 1943 calling for the dissolution of the Dies Committee. He was an editorial adviser of the Protestant, notorious Communist magazine serving as an instrument for the Communist infiltration of religion. He was a sponsor of the Communist People's Institute of Applied Religion, together with many well-known Communist leaders and with such Methodist Federation stalwarts as Charles C. Webber, Jack McMichael, and Dr. Harry F. West. Prof. Alva W. Taylor also signed an appeal to Governor Dewey, calling upon him to grant a pardon to a Communist professor, who was convicted of perjury and sent to prison. In addition, Taylor, a professor of Christian social ethics at Vanderbilt University, served as the secretary-treasurer of the Communist-dominated Southern Conference for Human Welfare.

"In his article in the bulletin, Professor Taylor advocates changing the church into an instrument primarily organized to promote social reform. He insists that the church be more than a school for Christian living by converting it into 'the advance guard of new and untried ideas. The Communists, too, consider themselves the advance guard of revolution of new and untried ideas. Professor Taylor advocates turning the church into a political organization, which would make politics a means of . . ."

"A letterhead of the American Committee for Protection of Foreign Born named Alva W. Taylor as a sponsor of the group. (Letterhead, December 11 and 12, 1948.) He signed a statement against denaturalization as shown by the 'Daily Worker' of August 10, 1950 (p. 5). He signed a statement in behalf of deportees as shown by the 'Daily Worker,' December 25, 1950 (p. 1). A leaflet, 'Clergymen, Condemn Deportations'

The Committee on Un-American Activities, in its report on the organization, December 7, 1950, cited the National Committee to Defeat the Mundt Bill as "a registered lobbying organization which has carried out the objectives of the Communist Party in its fight against anti-subversive legislation."

"A pamphlet, 'How to End the Cold War and Build the Peace' (page 9) gave the name of Alva W. Taylor, Tennessee, as a signer of the statement in praise of Wallace's open letter to Stalin, May 1948, which was sponsored by the National Council of American Soviet Friendship. Citation of the National Council of American Soviet Friendship is found in a report of the Special Committee, dated March 29, 1944, as follows: 'In recent months, the Communist Party's principal front for all things Russian has been known as the National Council. . . . The Attorney General cited the National Council as subversive and Communist' (press releases of December 4, 1947, and September 21, 1948; also included on consolidated list released April 1, 1954).

"Alva W. Taylor signed an Open Letter of the National Federation for Constitutional Liberties, addressed to the President of the United States, dated July 11, 1942, urging him to reconsider the order of Attorney General Biddle for deportation of Harry Bridges; the letter also stated that 'It is equally essential that the Attorney General's ill-advised, arbitrary, and unwarranted findings relative to the Communist Party be rescinded.' The Open Letter was published by the National Federation . . . September 11, 1942, in pamphlet form, under the title '600 Prominent Americans Ask President to Rescind Biddle Decision.' The names of those who signed the Open Letter were also included in the pamphlet, 'Alva W. Taylor being identified as Secretary-Treasurer, Southern Conference for Human Welfare, Nashville, Tennessee.' (See page 30 of the pamphlet.) The information also appeared in the Daily Worker of July 19, 1942. He signed the National Federation's January 1943 message to the U. S. House of Representatives, as shown on a leaflet attached to an undated letterhead of the group. The Daily Worker of March 18, 1945 (page 3) and an undated leaflet entitled ' . . . the only sound policy FOR A DEMOCRACY . . . ' showed that he signed a statement sponsored by the National Federation . . . halting the War Department's order on commissions for Communists.

The Attorney General cited the National Federation for Constitutional Liberties as an organization by which "Communists attempt to



# Don West Joins Dalton's Brother Pratt As Preacher, Editor, Right-Hand Man

DALTON — Don West, the Georgia poet, professor and preacher whose name has often been linked on official records with Communist activities, is a publisher and editor these days.

He is living in Dalton, editing a monthly paper called The Southerner. He is associated in the enterprise with the Rev. C. T. Pratt, who was cochairman of the Wallace-for-President movement in Georgia in 1948.

Last October, according to Brother Pratt, he received a letter from Brother West asking about the possibility of being accepted as a preacher in the Pratt denomination, which is known as the Church of God of the Union Assembly.

## OWNS BUILDING

So Don West is a preacher in the Pratt denomination now. He lives in rooms in the dining hall of the church. The printing shop of The Southerner is a concrete block annex to a big new grocery store on the Chatsworth road. The Pratt denomination owns the whole building and leases the store part.

Brother Pratt has an air-conditioned office in a little red brick building close by. His residence, also air-conditioned, is in the same neighborhood. It is easy to find because he has a neon

sign in the front yard that says "C. T. Pratt's Home."

I went out to see Mr. West and Mr. Pratt a few days after the Dalton News had published a full page of information about Mr. West from the files of the House Un-American Activities Committee. The dates mentioned go back as far as 20 years, when The Daily Worker named Don West as a member of the Communist Party and an organizer for the party in Kentucky.

We went into Brother Pratt's air-conditioned office, and it was very apparent that the 76-year-old preacher was going to do most of the talking. What he said most often was: "I'm not a Communist. I'm not a Catholic. I'm a full-blooded American."

Brother West's credo was a little differently stated. He said: "I am not a Communist. I'm a Christian, a humble follower of Jesus Christ."

I asked Mr. West if he intended to stay in Dalton, and before he could answer, Brother Pratt had scooted his swivel chair over close to the divan where I was sitting.

## SWISH OF AIR

Before I could even look around, I felt a swish of air close to my face and heard the

pop of Mr. Pratt's hands as he slapped them together. "Of course he's gonna stay," the preacher shouted. He repeated the gesture three or four times and the shout also.

When Brother Pratt had calmed down a little, he said he thought Brother West had made mistakes in the past, but hadn't everybody. He said he'd even made some.

Mr. Pratt said he has been in Dalton 30 years. He said he is concerned about the poor people. The Southerner said in its June issue that it is "devoted to the cause of the poor and common people."

I asked Mr. West what effect the Dalton paper's publication of the record on him had seemed to have. "I was at the church service that night," he said, "and it seemed to me that we had more unity than ever before."

Brother Pratt said he would do business with anybody, including infidels and Jews. He didn't care if they were infidels. He said he preaches destruction of the world by fire and brimstone, but as well as I could gather, members of the Church of God of the Union Assembly will escape.

Mr. Pratt is a big operator, and Don West evidently has become his right-hand man.

The Director received the attached letter from Pace with which he enclosed clippings from his newspapers concerning Donald Lee West, Alva W. Taylor and Aubrey W. Williams. He advised that he was "currently engaged in quite a campaign against Don West, who came here last winter and began a little monthly newspaper. We obtained from the House Committee on Un-American Activities his Communist background." He stated he wanted information on West, Taylor and Williams and specifically information showing West was a Communist Party member since 1953. The 1953 date is pertinent in regard to West inasmuch as a Georgia law makes it unlawful for a person residing in that state to be a member of the CP.

We have had limited cordial correspondence with Pace concerning articles and editorials which have appeared in his paper. (94-42940)

Bufile 100-20396 reflects that Donald Lee West has a long history of CP and related activities. The Party membership can be documented from the "Daily Worker", an East Coast Communist newspaper. He was removed from the Security Index, Atlanta in June, 1955, and there has been no indication of CP activities on his part since 1950. There is no public source information showing CP or related activities on the part of West subsequent to 1950. The "Daily Worker" contained numerous references to West in the past including:

The March 13, 1934, issue, which issue contained a poem by West in which he admitted CP membership. (Pace has the entire poem and published it in the September 8, 1955, issue of his paper.) The November 1, 1935, and June 22, 1937, issues of the "Daily Worker" reflected West to be a CP organizer for the State of Kentucky. The July 20, 1936, issue reflected West to be a member of the 1936 National Campaign Committee, CP, for the State of Kentucky. (Pace also has this information).

Pace enclosed an entire sheet from the August 21, 1955, issue of his paper which he stated contained information from the files of the HCUA. This information includes much public source data and actually contains the testimony of individuals naming West as a former CP official.

Bufiles reflect that Ralph McGill, Editor, "Atlanta Constitution," in his column dated July 7, 1948, identified West as a committee member from Georgia to the People's Institute of Applied Religion for 1947. This organization has been cited by the Attorney General.

Bufile 100-403941 reflects that Alva Wilmont Taylor is the subject of a closed Security Matter - C investigation, Office of origin, Memphis, and is not on the Security Index. The December 10, 1952, issue of the "Daily Worker" contains an article captioned "280 National Leaders Ask Truman Amnesty Jailed Communists." Taylor's name, among others, is listed in this article as a signer of the appeal requesting the President to grant amnesty to the leaders of the CP who were convicted under the Smith Act. (100-3-A) The April 29, 1953, issue of the "Daily Worker" lists Taylor as a sponsor for 1953 of the American Committee for Protection of Foreign Born, which has been cited by the Attorney General.

Pace enclosed a clipping from his newspaper which contained considerable information from the HCUA regarding Taylor. This information reflects Taylor was affiliated <sup>with</sup> and a member of many front organizations.

Bufile 100-52504 on Aubrey Willis Williams reflects that he is the subject of a Security Matter - C investigation, Mobile Office of Origin, and not on the Security Index. Williams testified before the U. S. Senate Internal Security Subcommittee on March 19, 1954, at New Orleans. He identified himself as President of the Southern Conference Educational Fund, Incorporated. This organization succeeded the Southern Conference for Human Welfare which was cited by the HCUA as a Communist front. Williams denied CP membership but did admit he was formerly affiliated with the Civil Rights Congress, cited by the Attorney General. Paul Crouch, a former Communist and who was at that time a consultant for the Immigration and Naturalization Service, testified before the above committee that he had been told that Williams was a secret member of the CP although he, Crouch, had no such knowledge of this membership.

Pace enclosed a clipping from his paper dated September 18, 1955, which contained much information concerning Williams and his affiliation with front groups. This included public source information.

As pointed out above, Pace specifically requested information showing West as a CP member subsequent to 1953. We do not have this information. We have no information showing West as affiliated with the CP or front groups subsequent to 1950. He was removed from the Security Index in Atlanta, June, 1955, due to inactivity on his part.

Be sure Pace understands that while we would like to be of further assistance to him, we are just unable to do so.

Subject, with whom we have had limited cordial correspondence, requested by the attached letter dated September 21, 1955, information concerning Donald Lee West, Alva W. Taylor and Aubrey W. Williams. He stated there is being conducted a campaign against these individuals and particularly West, who came to Georgia last winter to begin a monthly newspaper in his county. He advises this campaign concerns the alleged Communist backgrounds of the three afore-mentioned men. Pace requests information regarding CP and related activities of these individuals and states he has received information from the HCUA regarding the CP background of West and the others (who do not reside in his state.) He remarks that his county's grand jury is going to inquire into their backgrounds when it convenes on October 3.

Bufiles reflect past CP activities of West up to 1950, some of which can be documented from public source material such as the "Daily Worker." Bufiles reflect CP front activities by Taylor, some of which also may be documented by public source data. Williams, who testified before the Senate Internal Security Subcommittee on March 19, 1954, at New Orleans, is alleged to be a former Communist.

The attached memorandum sets out the details of our information regarding these individuals.

Pace specifically requests information showing West to be a CP member since 1953, which information is not contained in our files.

The enclosed article obtained from "The Atlanta Constitution" of 10/4/55 captioned "Jury in Dalton to Investigate Red Activity", is submitted for the Bureau's information as it obviously pertains to the subject. The Bureau has previously been informed that subject has been in Dalton, Ga. publishing "The Southerner" since March, 1955. There has been some controversy and articles appearing in "The Dalton News" and "The Dalton Citizen", bi-weekly newspapers in the Dalton area, concerning the past activities and background information of WEST. This controversy was highlighted in the publication in "The Dalton News" edition of Sunday, 8/21/55, Page 12, an article captioned "Information From the Files of the Committee on Un-American Activities U. S. House of Representatives". Immediately under this heading appears the following: "(DON L. WEST now lives in Dalton. He is editor of 'The Southerner' of which he is also co-publisher with C. T. # Jury in Dalton To Investigate Red Activity

DALTON, Oct. 3—Judge J. H. Paschall Monday charged a Whitfield County grand jury to investigate reports of subversive activities and violence in Dalton.

In a terse statement to the jury, the Cherokee Circuit judge also touched on:

1. Dynamiting last week of the front yard of Bob Ewell, a plant manager. The blast followed an alleged demonstration against a salesman at the General Latex Corp. Workers at the plant have been on strike three weeks.

2. A jailbreak Sunday by three desperadoes who left policeman Tom Crowe critically stabbed.

Judge Paschall told the jury, "You are free agents to investigate anything you wish. From reports in the press, there are some things that ought to be investigated."

He referred to the Georgia Subversives Control Act as he continued, "The papers say there may be subversive organizations or members in Dalton."

The Georgia law makes it unlawful to belong to an organization that advocates violent overthrow of the U.S. government or to aid in such a plan.

Mark Pace, editor of the Dalton Citizen and Dalton News, was called before the grand jury for an hour Monday afternoon. Although he took no records into the jury room, he confirmed that discussions were about the papers' stories on communism.

"You are free agents to investigate anything at anytime in the county, and from recent reports there are some things that need investigating here in Dalton," Paschall said.

Judge Paschall called to the attention of the jurors a law passed by the General Assembly in 1953 which outlaws any political party or faction that advocates the overthrow by violence of the government.

The judge mentioned the Sunday jail break in which a veteran law enforcement officer was badly stabbed and the Friday morning blast of dynamite which was set off on a lawn in a residential section of Dalton.

"Things like these are bad and it is your duty to investigate such matters," Judge Paschall said.

It was not known Wednesday noon just when the grand jury would adjourn, nor how far it had gone into its investigation about the matters mentioned above.

A tourist who has made an extensive study of Communism and the Communist pattern of infiltration, paid Whitfield County grand jury a surprise visit Tuesday.

He was Edgar C. Bundy, of Wheaton, Ill., who has held leading positions with the Illinois American Legion's Americanism Committee and its Anti-Subversive Commission. He was in the grand jury room for more than an hour.

After he left the room, Bundy talked freely with newsmen about his visit and why he went by the courthouse to tell the grand jury his story.

He said he also told the jurors two close friends of his, who joined the Communist Party in Ohio as undercover agents for the FBI several years ago, had told him about several Communists, including Don West, whom he said was an active member of the party, and whom was labeled as a "dangerous man."

Bundy also declared that under existing laws it is extremely difficult for any person to be found guilty of being a Communist. He pointed out that the best protection for America is an informed people who would recognize the names of Communist-associated individuals and who know what Communism is and its method of infiltration.

"For every known Communist there are 10 fellow travelers who are not known nor identified. They are equally dangerous," Bundy warned.

Bundy told a newsman that he and his wife were enroute from Wheaton to Miami to attend the national convention of the American Legion.

...ean Legion. While eating breakfast Tuesday morning in a restaurant in Jasper, Tenn., he was reading the Chattanooga Times when he saw the front page story about the grand jury charge by Judge James H. Paschall to investigate alleged Communist patterns in Dalton.

The grand jury recessed Friday until Tues., Oct. 18, at which time it will again go into the West situation.

A development happened this week in which I think you will be interested. West has scheduled Aubrey Williams (Southern Conference for Human Welfare, former head of National Youth Administration, worker American Youth Congress, etc., with long lists in cumulative index, Home Committee on Un-American Activities) to speak before a mass gathering of church folk from about 10 or 12 states at Dalton, Oct. 14, 7:30 p.m.

The meeting is in conjunction with annual fall assembly of Church of God of Union Assembly of which C.T. Pratt, Dalton, is moderator. He has ordained West as one of his ministers, and he and West are co-publishers of a radical, hate-provoking monthly propaganda sheet, The Southerner. Aubrey Williams and Dr. Alva W. Taylor are listed in the newspaper masthead as "contributing editors." GA

I thought perhaps this bit of additional information might be of interest, and certainly it should help to draw a clearer picture of the Communist pattern operations in our community.

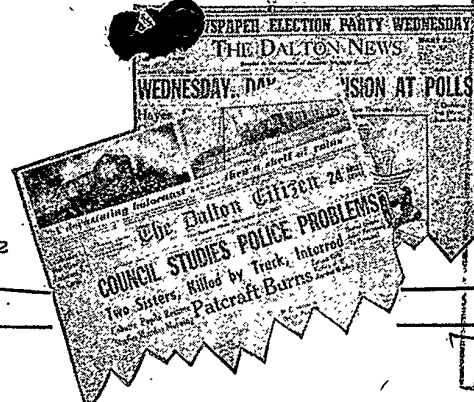

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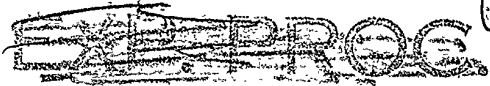

# West is Challenged to Deny Charges Before Committee

## Bundy Gives Talk Outlining Means of Red Infiltration

In a forceful conclusion to an hour-long address on the infiltration operation of Communism, Edgar C. Bundy, high-ranking American Legion official, challenged Don West to voluntarily appear before the Committee on Un-American Activities and deny, under oath, the record against him.

"The people of Dalton and Whitfield County should be aware and alert to any man with such a record that comes into the community. He should not be received as a citizen in the county or the state unless he has appeared before the committee to deny the charges and clear his name," Bundy told his listeners in American Legion hall, and to the radio audience.

He recalled that several years ago two friends of his, Martha and John Edminston, who joined the Ohio Communist Party as FBI undercover agents, told him of a number of members of the party. One of those, he said, was Don West, and when he read in a newspaper of the Don West exposure here, the name "rang a bell with me."

The report of the FBI undercover agents is a matter of public record. "Let Don West go before the Committee and call the FBI agents liars, if he dare!" Bundy declared.

At the time the FBI reported West as a party worker, he was minister of a church in Bethel, Ohio, Bundy said.

Bundy, a captain in the Air Force Reserve where he served for seven years as an intelligence officer, was guest speaker at the meeting sponsored by the Legion in cooperation with the VFW. He has served on the Legion's Department of Illinois Americanism Committee and its Anti-Subversive Commission. He has devoted several years of study and research to Communism and the Karl Marx theory and is appearing on programs throughout the United States in an effort to tell the people something about Communism and how it is dangerously infiltrating this country.

He declared that a man does not have to be a card-carrying Communist nor a member of the Communist Party in order to teach the Communist doctrine. He pointed out that there is no such thing in the United States today as a card-carrying member of the party.

Infiltration is made through Communist "front" organizations, and the Reds are cunningly infiltrating through government agencies, educational systems, religious organizations, labor unions, fields of communications and the fields of entertainment.

"In many instances church and Sunday school literature contain Communist and not spiritual material."

Declaring "It's time our American people awaken to what's happening," Bundy likened the infiltration method to termites that slip in undetected and eat away at a structure, which "is only as strong as the foundation on which it rests."

"Many Americans don't know of infiltration. They are too busy with their own personal activities and making money. Under the guise of religion, education and labor unions, the infiltrators are trying to obtain their goal."

He warned the people that the Communist theory of conspiracy is so vast that people cannot understand it.

"People can go around denying membership in the Communist Party. That doesn't mean a thing. They don't have to be a member to do party work."

Referring to the only Federal legal protection against such activities, the Smith Act, which makes it unlawful to advocate the overthrow by violence or force of the government, Bundy declared that overthrow by infiltration and not violence is the theory under the Karl Marx plan.

"You cannot indict them (under the Smith Act), but you can use

public exposure against them and that is what they dislike."

He referred to the local situation and to The Dalton News and The Dalton Citizen which exposed West's background. "It is scandalous for someone to hide behind the cloak of religion, or to charge that the newspapers smeared them when those newspapers are sticking to the public record."

Citing the first Communist theory as a front that they are for the working people and are working for that class people, Bundy asserted:

"Beware of those people who claim to be for the working people."

"How do they make their living? Where do they get their money?" he asked, referring that those people get their money off the laboring class people and make their living off them.

Bundy cited testimony of FBI Chief J. Edgar Hoover in which he declared that there are more Communist workers, fellow-travelers and sympathizers in the United States today than there were in Russia in 1917 when Lenin and his infiltration forces undermined and overthrew the Russian government and established the present Union of Soviet Socialist Republics.

Hoover estimated there are 25,000 "hard-core" Communists in the United States now, and that for each one of them there are 10 fellow-travelers and sympathizers now active in every phase of American life who are working as conspirators.

Hoover cited three classifications of people who are used in the country today by the Communists to obtain their objectives: 1) Communist Party members, 2) fellow-travelers and sympathizers, and 3) the duped organizations that become Communist fronts and aid in the conspiracy.

Pointing out that "infiltration" is a key word in the Communist system, Bundy asked, "What about those people who do not advocate violent overthrow, but infiltrate into every phase of society and teach the Marx plan?"

Bundy and his wife appeared here enroute to their home in Wheaton, Ill., from Miami where they had attended the national convention of the American

Legion.

In introducing Bundy prior to the address, Tom Minor, commander of local Post 112, recalled that after Bundy returned to this country from the Far East he predicted a year in advance the invasion of South Korea by the Communist North Korean forces and the downfall of a free China to the Chinese Reds.

Mr. PACE appeared to fully understand and appreciate our position.

For the Bureau's confidential information, it appears that Mr. PACE has been carrying on a campaign to get Mr. WEST out of Dalton by exposing him and that this campaign has been quite successful in bringing up the circulation in Mr. PACE's papers and in arousing the local citizenry. It is the impression of the two Agents to whom Mr. PACE has talked, however, that Mr. PACE is now fearful that he has pressed this matter to a point of a grand jury investigation which has no hope of resulting in successful prosecution and that the entire matter may, therefore, backfire on him to his discredit in the community. We will accordingly, be extremely circumspect in our contacts with him in connection with our coverage of DON WEST and any other security matter investigations.

# Dalton Jury Urges U.S. Probe West

DALTON, Dec. 30. (AP)—A federal investigation of the activities of Don West, Georgia poet, professor and preacher, was suggested today by the Whitfield County grand jury.

West in the past has been accused in official records of Communist activity—a connection that he has repeatedly denied. He is now listed as a minister here of the Church of God of the Union Assembly and is editor of The Southerner, a monthly publication.

## JURY STAND

The grand jury in a special report sharply criticized West for what it said was failure to cooperate with the jury when called in an investigation ordered by Judge J. H. Paschall of Calhoun in his October charge to the jurors.

Its report said:

"The grand jury did not go further into this matter, feeling that such an investigation should be referred to federal authorities. However, the grand jury does want the public to be aware of the fact that Communist activities may be going on in our own home community and all of us who love America and our way of life should ever be watchful that communism does not infiltrate and spread into our community.

## ELLIJAY MAN

"By direction of the grand jury, the foreman and two other members will appear before the January 1956 grand jury to urge that they continue the investigation of Communist activities in our community."

West, 47, a native of Ellijay, could not be reached at once for

comment. But last August he declared to a reporter: "I'm not a Communist. I'm a Christian, a humble follower of Jesus Christ."

The Daily Worker at times has referred to him as a Communist Party member and organizer. In Washington in 1952, a witness before a Senate subcommittee accused him of trying to infiltrate the Boy Scouts with communism.

West, then farming in Douglas County, called this testimony "lousy lies." He said that 20 years earlier he wrote a poem for the Daily Worker, Communist organ, and had been "a Communist then," but was not a Communist any longer.

## SCHOOL CHIEF

West taught English briefly in 1946-48 at Oglethorpe University, Atlanta, and was at one time superintendent of schools at Lula, Ga. He was active in the Henry Wallace for President campaign in 1948.

He is author of a book of poems, "Clods of Southern Earth," which had a big sale several years ago.

The grand jury report said West invoked the Fifth Amendment in refusing to answer questions put to him to determine "whether there was activity in our county which would be detrimental to all our people."

## REPORT CONTINUES

The report went on:

"We wish to state that this body recognizes the right of any person, including the editor of The Southerner, to invoke the aid of the Fifth Amendment to the Constitution of the United States whenever any answer to a question asked by this group might tend to incriminate such person. We wish to point out that this grand jury is a legally constituted agency of our government with a duty to represent and protect the rights of all citizens in our county, including the editor of The Southerner. This being the case, we feel we have the right to expect the full co-operation of all law-abiding citizens who are interested in the welfare of our community when called before us as witnesses. We did not receive this cooperation from Don West, editor of The Southerner."

The jury also commended Mark Pace, editor of the Dalton News and the Dalton Citizen, who called upon the jury to investigate West.

Judge Paschall is scheduled to convene court here Jan. 16. He was in court today at Cartersville.

and Whitfield County receive enough unfavorable publicity without efforts made to show the grand jury being bought off or intimidated.

Don West charged that in publishing his record from the files of the Committee on Un-American Activities, the newspapers were smearing him. That's the way they all squawk when the committee record against them is published.

To substantiate our findings, we asked in an editorial that the grand jury look into the records we had published, and to let that group of men decide for themselves whether we were sticking to records and facts or whether we were pulling nightmares out of the air and making false news articles out of them.

We have all the respect in the world in the work and in the findings of the grand jury. While we do not know all of the men, personally, we do have faith in their character and integrity. Certainly, that group of men would have no part in stooping to a frame-up operation against Don West. Insofar as his committee record is concerned, it speaks for itself.

The caliber of men on the grand jury, Don West, is much too high to stoop down to frame-up actions. We dare say, however, you would want your party or friends in New York and elsewhere to think otherwise.

The captioned individual is a self-styled lecturer on Communism. He is prominent in the American Legion in the State of Illinois; however, he has been accused by fellow Legionnaires on many occasions of letting his enthusiasm run away with itself. He deliberately misled us on one occasion when he requested DeLoach, in my office, to appear before the Illinois Department of the American Legion and speak concerning the jurisdiction of the FBI. We found out in sufficient time that actually Bundy had planned for the speech to be given before the Abraham Lincoln Club in Chicago which is a Republican political organization. His invitation was rejected.

DeLoach has received a personal call from [redacted] Commander of the Department of Georgia, The American Legion. Bundy has offered to lecture in Georgia and has indicated he will expose an individual by the name of Donald Lee West, and individual who is attempting to get started in the newspaper profession in the State of Georgia. Several sources of information have indicated to us that West was active in Communist affairs in Ohio in 1940. One source testified before the House Committee on Un-American Activities that West was a Communist Party member in Ohio in 1940. We have received previous information indicating that Bundy has remarked to acquaintances that two former FBI informants in Ohio have advised him that West is a Communist.

# Church Puts Out Dalton's Don West

DALTON, Jan. 13 — Don West, Dalton minister and editor, Friday night was expelled from his church by the church membership.

The action came after the Rev. C. T. Pratt, founder and national moderator of the Church of God of the Union Assembly, Friday afternoon ordered West to testify before a grand jury investigating communism or "get out of my church."

A Dalton spokesman said the church membership Friday night voted "100 per cent" to expel the pastor. The spokesman also said West turned in his keys to the church Friday afternoon.

## HANDED ULTIMATUM

The Rev. Mr. Pratt issued his ultimatum at a quarterly session here attended by some 100 ministers of the church from 12 states.

After the expulsion vote was taken, Pratt said he had not heard from West since the day meeting. Pratt said West turned in his church keys shortly after the day meeting. The moderator quoted members of West's congregation as saying they saw the minister pack his belongings and leave Dalton.

The Rev. Mr. Pratt, who in the past has defended West against public charges of Communist affiliations, Friday had an oath disavowing communism administered to all church ministers except West.

## LEADER'S DECISION

The church moderator said he decided on the oath after waking up about 2 a.m. Tuesday and finding "the Lord talking about communism."

West, 47-year-old native of nearby Ellijay, was summoned to testify before a Whitfield grand jury investigating communism last October. He invoked the 5th Amendment in refusing to answer questions.

Whitfield Sol. Erwin Mitchell attended Friday's session to administer the oath. He was accompanied by Mark Pace, editor of The Dalton News and Citizen, who has campaigned in his news-

paper for an investigation of West.

Before administering the oath, Mitchell asked if any of the ministers had invoked the 5th Amendment in refusing to testify before a grand jury or the House Committee on Un-American Activities.

"Yes, I have," spoke up West from the back of the speakers' rostrum.

Mitchell then turned to the Rev. Mr. Pratt and said: "I will be glad to administer the oath to everyone except Don West."

The Rev. Mr. Pratt declared: "If any of my ministers won't swear before a grand jury or any other jury that he is not a Communist, I don't want him in this church. We want to know if any of you are Communists."

The moderator then ordered West either to appear before the grand jury and testify whether he had been a Communist since joining the Church of God in 1952, or get out of my church."

Mitchell told the Rev. Mr. Pratt there were questions concerning West's activities before 1952 that should be answered.

The solicitor promised that West would be the first witness to appear before the Whitfield grand jury Monday morning.

In addition to serving as a Church of God minister, West is editor of a monthly known as The Southerner. He was an English teacher at Oglethorpe University, Atlanta, in 1946-48, and at one time was superintendent of schools at Lula.

In 1952 a witness before the Senate Internal Security subcommittee cited West as an example of the Communist plan to infiltrate the Boy Scouts. At the time West called the testimony "lousy lies."

# Face Grand Jury, or Quit Church, Don West Told

DALTON, Ga., Jan. 14 (AP)—Don West, Dalton minister and editor, Friday was ordered by the head of his church to testify before a grand jury on whether he has been a Communist "or get out of my church."

The ultimatum to West came from the Rev. C. T. Pratt of Dalton, founder and national moderator of the Church of God of the Union Assembly. Pratt delivered the ultimatum at a quarterly session attended by 90 ministers from throughout the South.

PRATT, WHO in the past has defended West against public charges of Communist affiliations, had an oath disavowing communism administered to all church ministers except West Friday.

WHITFIELD Sol. Gen. Erwin Mitchell attended the meeting to administer the oath. Before reading the oath, Mitchell asked if any of the ministers had invoked the Fifth Amendment in refusing to testify before a grand jury or the House Committee on un-American Activities.

"Yes, I have," West said. Mitchell then told Pratt he would be glad to administer the oath to "everyone except Don West."

Pratt replied: "If any of my ministers won't swear before a grand jury or any other jury that he is not a Communist, I don't want him in this church. We want to know if any of you are Communists."

Pratt then ordered West to either appear before the grand

jury and testify whether he had been a Communist since joining the church in 1952 "or get out of my church."

WEST, 47, did not say whether he would appear before the grand jury. The solicitor general said, however, that West would be the first witness before the Whitfield County grand jury Monday.

In 1952 a witness before a Senate Internal Security Subcommittee cited West as an example of the Communist plan to infiltrate the Boy Scouts. At that time West called the testimony "lousy lies."

West, in addition to serving in the ministry, is publisher of the Southerner, a monthly publication.

# West, Expelled From Church, Leaves Dalton

DALTON, Jan. 14 (AP)—Don West, former minister and editor who invoked the Fifth Amendment when a grand jury sought to question him about communism, Saturday had left town, apparently free from any further local inquiry.

West packed his belongings and left late Friday after the Rev. C. T. Pratt, moderator of the Church of God of the Union Assembly, publicly called on him to testify before the grand jury or "get out of my church." Then, said a spokesman, the church's quarterly conference attended by some 100 ministers from 12 states unanimously voted Friday night to expel West.

Pratt said that West turned in the keys not only to a church he served here, but also to the printing plant of the Southerner, a publication controlled by Pratt and edited by West.

SOL. GEN. Erwin Mitchell said that although West was called before a Whitfield County grand jury investigating communism last October, he was under no subpoena to appear before a new grand jury convening Monday. Hence, explained the prosecutor, he was not in contempt in leaving the county.

West, poet, former school teacher and superintendent and college professor, has in recent years vigorously denied any Communist leanings or ties. In 1952, he branded as "lousy lies" a charge of a former Communist before a U.S. Senate subcommittee that he had once attempted to infiltrate the Boy Scouts with communism.

Then farming in Douglas County, he said that 20 years earlier he had written a poem for the Daily Worker, Communist organ, was "a Communist then," but since had severed all ties with the party.

WEST IS a 47-year-old native of the nearby mountain town of Ellijay. No announcement of his destination was made upon his departure from Dalton.
