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
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The FBI's counterintelligence analytical program attempts to take a proactive stance in identifying potential analytical studies, not being driven necessarily by requests from operational units. We insist on complete analytical access and, given the very close working relationship with operational entities, we provide analytical input to the



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most sensitive ongoing investigations. The results of those studies cannot, of course, be routinely disseminated as it would violate the investigative integrity of sensitive operations.



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

	The developmental assignment for was designed to orient her to the FBI's mission in countering terrorism in the United States. In addition to an overview of the FBI's investigative and analytical programs in counterterrorism, was assigned to a specific counterterrorism program, Special Events Management, in order to learn more about the FBI's jurisdiction in this area. The Special Event of World Cup Soccer 1994, scheduled to take place at nine locations in the United States over a four-week period in June-July, 1994, was selected as her primary area of concentration.					
	what specific duties did the Women's Executive Leadership Program participant accomplish? was assigned to the Terrorist Research and Analytical Center (TRAC), Analysis, Training and Budget Section, National Security Division. TRAC is composed of intelligence analysts in the job description "Intelligence Research Specialist," or IRS. The major duties of IRSs include the production of analytical reports and studies in support of the FBI's counterintelligence and counterterrorism missions. IRSs generally have four critical elements: research; analysis; written and oral communication; and liaison. Based on the research proposal coordinated with at the beginning of the developmental assignment, performed duties syconsistent with these critical elements in the preparation of two analytical reports.

Was the Women's Executive Leadership Program participant given any special projects? If so, please discuss.

Yes. As mentioned, submitted a research proposal for the preparation of a threat assessment on the World Cup Soccer 1994 tournament. The threat assessment focused on the potential for terrorism at this Special Event in the United States and will be widely disseminated to both U.S. intelligence and law enforcement agencies. Due to her earnest approach to this developmental assignment, not only completed the original assignment but expanded on the topic to include an "antipathy" report, which delineated the cultural differences between the 24 countries participating in the tournament.

Were the objectives of the developmental assignment achieved?

Completely. The objectives were two-fold:

1) to obtain a better understanding of the FBI, its operations and interaction with other law enforcement and intelligence agencies; and 2) to work on a project which allows further development of the participant's analytical skills, while producing a substantive, quality product.

In objective number one, received a complete overview of the FBI's criminal and Intelligence programs, including a tour of FBIHQ and the FBI National Academy at Quantico. She also attended a major "in-service" at Quantico, our term for FBI sponsored law enforcement training. The inservice focused upon the challenges presented to law enforcement by World Cup Soccer 1994 and was attended by more than 160 U.S. and foreign law enforcement professionals.

In objective number two, and despite an accelerated introduction to the subject matter, authored two exceptional analytical reports.

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Did you notice any professional growth in the Women's Executive Leadership Program participant upon completion of the developmental assignment? Please explain.

In the case of the understanding of the FBI's law enforcement role and the development of her personal analytical skills. As noted, performed the duties of the IRS position, which is part of the U.S. Government's professional intelligence analysis job series. Under the guidance of the mentor assigned to her, learned the classic intelligence cycle of a desk level intelligence analyst-requirements, collection, analysis, production, and





dissemination. In practice, she applied the critical elements of the IRS position (research; analysis; written and oral communication; and liaison) to the research proposal of the developmental assignment. In doing so, she learned the component steps of the methodical, but essential research process, as well as the logic of analysis and the necessary terms of reference approach in this discipline.

Based on your observations, does the Women's Executive Leadership Program participant have the potential for movement into a supervisory/managerial position? Please explain.

The consensus of the FBI managers and executives exposed to during her developmental assignment was that she has the potential to not only be a supervisor or manager, but more importantly a leader. She quickly assimilated herself into the assignment and the FBI "culture," making friends with those she worked with and impressing everyone with her dedication, initiative, and strong willingness to learn. Perhaps her openness to learning is her greatest asset, along with her interpersonal "people" skills. In a quiet, reserved, but efficient manner, she sought the information she needed for her projects, worked independently, and impressed everyone with her dedication and the level of expertise she had acquired on the subject of counterterrorism during her short time here. Her contribution was invaluable and will be long remembered, as will she.
