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



This investigation was predicated upon information received from the Bureau indicating that LARSEN had submitted photographs of Brazilian Army, Mavy, and Air Force subjects to the Black Star Publishing Company, Incorporated, 420 Lexington Avenue, New York Sity.

Messrs. Tolson, Glavin, Harbo, Hendon, Clegg, Ladd/ Nichols, McCabe and E. A. Tamm in attendance considered the question as to the disposition to be made by the Bureau of the Gregory Case. Mr. Tamm outlined the bac cound of the case and the possible courses of action suggested in Mr. memorandum to you of November 25th. After considering the possibilities, the conference was of the unanimous opinion that the case should be referred to the Attorney General by memorandum, with the request that he advise the Bureau promptly what, if any, further action was desired of the Bureau in this case. In donsidering this proposal, Mr. Tolson pointed out that because of the number of persons in official circles who know of the existence of this case, it is not improbable that direct inquiry will be made of the Bureau as to the disposition which has been made of this investigation.

Attached hereto is a memorandum to the Attorney General submitting the most recent summary in this case, requesting the Attorney General to advise the Bureau as promptly as possible what further action is desired and pointing out that such investigative reports as are necessary to clarify any points raised by the attached summary will be submitted to the Department upon request.

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

The last three lines in this same paragraph have been deleted since there does not appear to be any exact basis available in the Bureau's files to substantiate the statement that the Civil Service Commission files indicate that pressure was brought by the White House in securing the transfer for Silvermaster to the Treasury Department from the Farm Security Administration in December of 1944. Page 70, paragraph 1, line 8, the words "identified as a Soviet espionage agent" have been changed to "identified by the informant as a Soviet espionage agent." Page 207, paragraph 1, lines 2 and 3, the phrase "Harold Glasser who has been identified through this investigation as a Soviet espionage agent" has been changed to read "Harold Glasser who has been identified by the informant as a Soviet espionage agent." Page 247, paragraph 6, which read, "A reliable informant has also advised that during the latter part of 1934 Dr. Weinstein had been in contact with several individuals who have known Communist backgrounds, among these being Ted Allen Herman, a member of the Young Communist League in Canada and who at one time was an employee of the Office of War Information; Lucy Josephson, the wife of Leon Josephson, who is connected with Cafe Society, New York City, and who is known to have served as a Soviet agent; and Victoria Stone who is an intimate associate of Arthur Adams, a known Soviet agent who until recently was operating in the New York area." The attached lengthy memorandum, a copy of which is being sent to the Secretary of State, represents a summary of the Bureau's investigation of the so-called Gregory Case which, you will recall, is the Communist intelligence case involving the participation of a number of Government employees and officials. Copies of the summary are not being distributed at this time to other officials.

I think the time has arrived when we have to make a determination as to what we are going to do with this case. We have been investigating it for the past year. We have used as many as 100 men at a time on it although the current personnel approximates the full time of 25 men. A summary of the case was prepared last February and from a careful study of the attached summary I do not feel that we have obtained anything substantial that we did not have last February with the exception of knowledge concerning the participation of a few additional, minor, characters. The attached summary tends to corroborate the contacts between the various people whom we know to be or to have been participal ts in the case and the material represents fundamentally an accumulation of a repetition of the type of information which we had last Spring.

The case is not becoming any stronger from the viewpoint of a possibility of a Federal violation. As a matter of fact most of the principals are dormant in so far as actual transmittal of material at this time is concerned for our informant, through circumstances beyond the informant's control, has become virtually isolated from contact with the principals in the case. There does not appear to be any possibility of a re-establishment of the informant.

I do not believe that we have in this case the elements and the evidence for a successful prosecution in the Federal Courts. If there are instances where Federal Statutes have been violated they relate to situations which occurred prior to the Bureau's investigation of the case and the only proof which we would have would be the testimony of the informant which would appear to be valueless in so far as successful prosecution is concerned.

The first course of action which suggests itself is that the Bure the attached summary, together with any other investigative reports which appear pertinent, to the Department with the request that we be advised as to whether the facts constitute a violation of any Federal Statute and whether the Department will

authorize prosecution. It will take the Department at least six months to absorb this report and we will probably then spend the next three months exchanging memoranda of explanation, clarification and then another three months checking suggested leads emanating from the Department so that it would be a year before we would have any decision and I think ultimately the decision would be a negative

A second program which might be carried out would be to interview a number of the persons in this case preferably selecting some of the weaker characters in the hope that we would obtain admissions which might enable us to interview more prominent subjects in this case. Out of this program we might obtain signed statements or admissions that would be of value, if not for evidentiary purposes, at least for intelligence purposes. The number of interviews would, of course, depend upon the information obtained as a result of the interviews but obviously the conducting of interviews with even a few of the subjects would result in a general notification and alarm to all of the subjects who would become very careful in their future conduct at least for some time to come. This in itself would appear to be a worthwhile objective since we would probably cause the disruption and discontinuance of this ring. After the interviews we could submit the facts together with the admissions, if any, to the Department for their consideration advising them that the investigation is being discontinued pending the receipt of a decision from them as to whether prosecution will be undertaken. This would save considerable manpower. Through this program of interviews if we did obtain admissions from some of the subjects and prosecution was not undertaken the admissions might be used in causing the severance of the Government employment of some of these people.

A third program which should be considered is whether the investigating of the case should be continued for intelligence purposes i.e. whether the information developed from the case concerning Communistic activities justifies its indefinite continuance. I do not believe that it does. It seems to me that we have exhausted all investigative and intelligence possibilities in this case and that we should wind it up by some logical program which, as indicated above, if it does not result in the prosecution of the principals will at least result in:

- (1) the discontinuance of the operations of this clique and
- (2) the possible severance of some of the characters from Government employment.

A fourth procedure which to me appears to have considerable merit but which might be difficult to arrange would be to have a Congressional investigation of the facts in this case, preferably conducted by Committee hearings in Washington. I believe that in capable hands the Bureau's information, used as

a background for interrogation of subjects in this case would create a record of Communist activities in Government circles which would be so alarming as to impel Congress to some aggressive action. It would, however, require the full time attention of a very capable prosecutor to effect such a program and I frankly don't know of any existing Committee of Congress which could execute this with the care and precision that it justifies. The philosophy of the new Congress might be a very hopeful factor in harnessing the Bureau's information in this case to constructive good. I assume that if we could find the proper group in Congress to go into this case it would be possible to make some arrangement whereby they could ask the Attorney General for copies of the Bureau's reports or a summary of this investigation.



Please refer to letter from this office dated November 14, 1946, concerning the above-captioned Colonel THOMAS:

There is considerable information available in the files of the New York Field Division concerning JOSEPHINE TRUSLOW ADAYS and LOUIS LERVAN, both of whom appear to be contacts of Colonel THOMAS, but a careful review of such information fails to bring to light any person who might be identical with THOMAS. Both ADAMS and LERMAN, however, are extremely active and have a great many acquaintances of whom this office is cognizant. It may be noted that at no time have technical or physical surveillances been operated on either of these individuals.

A search has also been made through the files of this office against the name THOMAS, but none appears to be identical with the unknown subject originally described in the Washington Field Division letter to the Bureau dated October 4, 1946. It is of interest to note, however, that in the report of Special Agent R. N. Pranke dated March 9, 1942, at New York City, in the case entitled AMTORG TRADING CORPORATION; ESPIONAGE - R, formation is set out that an official of the Singer Sewing Machine Company, 149 Broadway, New York City, advised Special Agent D. F. McWhorter on January 22, 1942, that he know one THOMAS, who used to be a buyer at AMTORG.

In Special agent Pranke's report dated June 21, 1941, at New For City, in the same case information is set out that a Mr. VEENEVAN of Wiegers and Veeneman, body builders, Prospect Park, New Jersey, advised agents that on or about September 5, 1936, V. K. BOGDAN, First Vice President of the AMTORG TRADING CORPORATION, was making arrangements with that firm for equipping five Packard limousing with bullet proof glass and steel plate for shipment to Russia, and that VEENEMAN was asked by BOGDAN to ask for "Mr. THOMAS" when telephoning BOGDAN at the AMTORG officering for York.

In spite of the above two instances, however, agents of this office who are familiar with Communist and Russian espionage matters over a period of years state that they are unaware of any Soviet technique of employing the name THOMAS at random among their personnel. The possible identification of THOMAS through confidential sources available to this office in the past has so been discussed with agents in this office, but no information as to his identity has been obtained.

Confidential Informant GREGORY has again been asked whether she might suggest any person as identical with THOMAS, but has not been able to offer any assistance on this point. From a review of information made available by her as to the operating technique of Russian agents with whom she was in contact, it might be noted that at no time did she ever receive a written communication from any of them, nor did she ever know the address or even where she might reach any of them. These latter features were discussed with GREGORY, and it was her opinion that the practice followed by her Russian associates was always followed. This situation of course is contrary to that existing between the KEENEYS and THOMAS inasmuch as he is mentioned by name in letters from KEENEY to his wife.

Efforts are continuing in this office to identify THOMAS, and the results of such further investigation will be forwarded in the near future.

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





Fitzgerald) You may recall that Fitzgerald is an Assistant to the Secretary of Commerce and a prominent subject in this case. Through a technical source on Eitzgerald's residence, it was learned that at 7:30 PM, November 14, 1946, one Kabel, believed to be Mabel Wheaton, in a conversation with Ed Fitzgerald mentioned that she has some cousins coming to visit her on the night of November 14, one being with the FBI who came over with his mother. She said the cousin lives in Baltimore but "they are coming over tonight to stay with her." Various references have been made to Mabel Wheaton in the Silvermaster case as a contact of Pitzgerald. The only identifiable information is that she is a sister of Thomas Molfe, a well-known author. The above is being called to your attention with the thought that you ACTION: may desire to discreetly ascertain through the Baltimore Field Division the name of the Bureau employee who was in Washington, D. C. on the night of November 14 and who stayed with Mabel Wheaton. It is possible that this individual may be in a position to obtain some information concerning Fitzgerald. Borgenthau eught to state that President Trumen fired a man whose speech he endorsed because of the fact that he made the speech. He said that it almost leads to the conclusion that President Trumen should have fired himself. White inquired as to whether or not talkace would go to the GIO convention or whether he would stay away from it under present circumstances. Pressman advised that talkace was supposed to be there as a speaker. However, he was of the opinion that he was going to "lay lew." Pressman was of the opinion that the Talkace issue would be a burning issue throughout the country for some time.

Marry White was curious as to whether the issue touched the labor class very closely and in reply Pressuan pointed out that there was a lumber workers convention now in session in San Francisco, California, which is a fairly conservative union. He said that their immediate reaction to Wellace's resignation was a resolution condemning President Truman and endorsing Wallace

Subsequently on the same date Joel Fisher of the Commerce Department was in conference with Harry Enite, and they discussed the appointment of Averill Harriman as the new Secretary of Commerce. Harry White said he knew what Harriman stands for, and Fisher remarked that his appointment was to the extreme. Harry White stated that President Truman couldn't have done much worse under the circumstances. Fisher stated that he had hoped the President would have thought it necessary to have at least one man with leftist support in the cabinet. Harry White inquired if Wallace was going to use "that speech" and Fisher thought that he would not and suggested that Harry White incorporate it into the speech he was writing for Morgenthau. It was agreed that Fisher and White would get together on the following day and it was mentioned that Harry Magdoff also of the Commerce Department would meet with them.

On September 24, 1946, Edward Pitagerald of the Commerce Department conferred with Harry Magdoff, and Magdoff advised that the smil coming inte Wallace's effice is fantastic. He said that they have received about 8,000 letters which were even better than the first group received. He said the first group considted of letters which were 85% favorable and the second group had something like 97% favorable. These letters were from all parts of the sountry which did not represent organisations but were from individuals. They then discussed the possibilities of obtaining new places of employment since there is some possibility that they will be requested to resign from the Commerce Department because of their close association with Mr. Wallace. Harry Magdoff remarked that he may not be invited to leave by Mr. Marrison but on

the contrary a place may be found for him somewhere in the organisation. He remarked that Harriman is a "smoothy," who isn't the kind of a man who comes in with a "goon squad". He said that from the standpoint of simple logic Mr. Harriman would probably get rid of each and every one of them, and then there is the possibility that he might want a liberal front and want men who can write speeches and tell him about the need for expansion of small business, etc. Magdoff remarked that it would be easy to fire him out right because he does not have a Civil Service status and that he is a Mar Service appointee.

In somelusion Harry Magdoff remarked that he does not see any chance of obtaining another job such as he has for years to come. He said in his present position there is a basis for confidence and personal relation—ship at a high level and that "they" were really Mr. Wallace's personal staff. It is believed that he was referring to "itsgerald, V. Lewis Bassie, and himself.

On September 28, 1946, various discussions were had between Harry Magdoff, Phil Houser, a close associate of Mr. Mallace, Edward Fitzgerald, V. Lewis Bassic and Irving Kaplan. Kaplan is an employee of the Treasury Department and is likewise a subject under investigation as a suspected Russian espionage agent. These conferences were in connection with Houser's conference with Bernard Baruch relative to their controversy concerning the Atomic Energy Control Commission and the United States foreign policy in that respect.

As you were previously advised in my letter dated September 26, 1946, Harry Magdoff as well as the other individuals mentioned above have been instrumental in the preparation of letters and publications issued by Mr. Wallace during this controversy.

On September 30, 1946, Edward Pitagerald was in conference with Beadie Magdoff, wife of Harry Magdoff, and he indicated that he and V. Lewis Bassie wanted to inform her in the event she was in contact with her husband that he and Bassie had objected to the letter strenuously that Phil Houser had prepared for Wallace, and therefore Bassie decided that he would call Mr. Ballace. When Wallace was contacted Houser contacted Harold Young and Dick Mipplehauser, whereupon under Fitagerald's prodding Bassie invited himself along. Fitagerald stated that Bassie insisted on preparing a press release which Fitagerald did. Fitagerald read this release to Mrs. Magdoff which expressed Wallace's appreciation of the sincerity of Mr. Baruch and his associates but said the central issue at which Mr. Wallace's letter was directed remains the same, namely, whether the United States should centinue producing and stock piling atom bombs during the transition to international central which results in the lack of mutual trust and confidence between the United States and Russia.

Pitsgerald stated that Basie had suggested that Wallace tell Baruch and tell him that he could not support the discussion that Houser had with Mr. Baruch previously, and if Mr. Baruch feels that he must release his memorandum, Wallace would make a counter-release. Pitsgerald stated that Wallace agreed with this idea and called Baruch reading the release to him which Fitsgerald prepared whereupon Baruch told Wallace, "This is the parting of the ways. We are going to get you any way we can." Wallace replied that this was all right, just stop making bombs and that he, Wallace, will believe etherwise.

Fitzgerald and Mrs. Magdoff discussed Harold Young, and Fitzgerald stated that what Mr. Wallace meeded was Harry Magdoff, V. Lewis Bassis and himself to furnish the correct advice and to make the decisions. Mrs. Magdoff mentioned that Bassie suggested that he, Bassie, might even take annual leave from the Commerce Department to work for Sallace. They discussed "selling" mallace on Bassie and continuing with Marry Magdoff as a silent partner. Fitsgerald remarked that if Mr. Mallace holds his eards might they will have the Democratic Party.

In view of the nature of the above information and in view of the implication of the above individuals in the investigation of underground Soviet espionage organization in agencies of the United States Government, it is felt that the above information will be of considerable interest to the President and you.

Fitzgerald, a subject in this case, mentioned that she had some cousins visiting her that night, dne being with the FBI, who had come over from Baltimore with his mother, It was subsequently determined through the Baltimore Office that the cousin referred to by Mabel Wheaton was Special Agent Robert E. Penland presently assigned to the Seat of Government on the Impersonation Desk/ Supervisor Floyd Jones interviewed Penland on November 18th and the following information was developed. Penland advised that he is presently living in Baltimore and commutes to Washington daily and that on the morning of November 14th, he and his mother, Mrs. J. B. (Isabel) Renland, came to Washington from Baltimore and Mrs. Penland spent the day with Mrs. Mabel Wheaton, her second cousin, who resides at 3612 Macomb Street, N. W. Mabel Wheaton is the third cousin of Special Agent Penland. She is married to Ralph/Meaton, who is presently unemployed. Penland stated that Mabel Wheaton, whose maiden name was Mabel Wolfe, is the sister of Thomas Wolfe, the noted author who died in 1938 or 1939. She and her husband have been residing in Washington for approximately 10 years, having come here from Asheville, North Carolina. Before her marriage, she was a professional singer and was never employed otherwise. Penland stated that Mabel Wolfe is a very strong admirer of her brother, Thomas Wolfe, and as a result, spends a great deal of her time in expounding his works and is ever willing to answer any inquiries concerning his life and therefore has many visitors at her home who are admirers of Thomas Wolfe. result of her great interest in Wolfe and her desire to tell anyone interested in him about his past, it is possible that she may have met many individuals whose backgrounds she knows nothing about. Penland believes that in all probability, this is the manner in which she met Edward Fitzgerald and his wife, Rebecca. Rebecch Fitzgerald is a writer and is known to be interested in books. Therefore she and her husband may also be admirers of Thomas Wolfe. "Look Homeward Angel" is a novel written by Thomas Wolfe. The Fitzgeralds, however, declined to come to the Wheaton residence. It was at this point that Mabel related that she had some cousins who would be there, pointing out that one of them was with the FBI.

With respect to this statement, Penland believes that this could have been brought about by the fact that Thomas Wolfen in his many writings wrote about his family and his relatives and referred to them as being lower class people than they really are and Mabel Wheaton, knowing this, probably was desirous of having some of Wolfe's admirers actually meet her relatives and also building up the fact that one of them was an Agent of the FBI.

Penland stated that he was not present when this telephone conversation transpired but that he was present later in the evening when the broadcast of the povel was heard by a group of Mabel Wheaton's friends.

It was explained to Penland that Mabel Theaton's contacts with the Fitzgeralds appeared to be purely social. He stated that he could wholeheartedly recommend her as to her true Americanism and having been advised of the background and past activities of Fitzgerald, who is a known Communist, he feels certain that Fitzgerald's background is not known to Mrs. Wheaton or she would not have anything to do with him. He stated, however, that he will not mention this matter to Mrs. Wheaton and that if he is in a position to discreetly determine how she originally met the Fitzgeralds, he will do so and advise the Internal Security Section.

Penland furnished the following description of Mabel Wheaton for future reference: Age - about 50; height - about 6 feet; weight - 180 pounds; hair - black, parted in middle; peculiarities - sloppy dresser, walks with a limp; appearance - homely; teeth - one lower front tooth missing; voice - deep.

65-56402-1583 Reference is made to cable from Buenos Aires dated September 5, 1946, wherein information was set forth regarding a warlike statement allegedly made by Ambassador MESSERSMITH at an American Legion meeting held in Buenos Aires. It will be recalled that considerable publicity was given to this alleged statement by the Communist press, and that Ambassador MESSERSMITH believed that the story had originated with BERNARD S. AREDMONT. It was also reported that the "Daily Worker" in New York City, in referring to the matter, quoted its source as the American Federated Press at Rio de Janeiro.

The results of the investigation at Rio de Janeiro, as set forth in the report of SIS752 dated October 10, 1946 at Rio de Janeiro, failed to reflect the existence of a news agency known as the American Federated Press. The Rio investigation disclosed that REDMONT was in contact with WILLIAM A. WIELAND, United States Press Attache at Rio de Janeiro, on September 5 1946. The story on MESSERSMITH's alleged statement appeared in the "Tribuna Popular" on September 7, 1946, and carried an Associated Press dateline of September 6 at New York City.

The writer was in contact with WILLIAM A. WIELAND on November 16, 1946, at which time WIELAND began volunteering his views on the international political situation. During the course of the conversation, reference was made to Ambassador MESSERSMITH and to the publicity given to his alleged statement.

INFORMATION CONTAINED

HANDLIND STOP UE Secret

WIELAND voluntarily declared that he had conferred with an American journalist who had attended the American Legion gathering in Buenos Aires and that this journalist had advised that MESSERSMITH categorically made the statement that war between the United States and Russia was inevitable. WIELAND then declared that such a statement coming from MESSERSMITH was not surprising since it fitted into the Ambassador's political line.

WIELAND recalled that the story on MESSERSMITH was credited as emanating from the American Federated Press at Rio de Janeiro. He stated that no such agency was in existence and that the writer of the story undoubtedly desired to cover his identity. He added that the employment of such a tactic was common among journalists who promoted the printing of questionable material.

Inasmuch as it is known that REDMONT was in contact with WIELAND soon after the subject attended the American Legion gathering in Buenos Aires, it is believed that REDMONT is the journalist to whom WIELAND had reference. It may be interesting to note that REDMONT apparently took WIELAND into his confidence on this matter, thus indicating the possible existence of a close relationship.

For the information of the Bureau and the office of origin, the conversation with WIELAND was conducted in a most discreet manner. The information set forth above was volunteered by him as a result of discussion of matters foreign to the instant case. It is requested that WIELAND's identity not be disclosed to Ambassador MESSERSMITH in the event it is deemed advisable to make the above information evailable to the Ambassador at Buenos Aires.




Reference is made to your memorandum me in the abovecaptioned matter dated December 5, 1946. With regard to the
problem of prosecution in this case and to your request for
recommendations concerning prosecution, I desire to point out
that many of the defendants in any possible prosecution in this
ease are or were Government employees occupying official positions
of great importance and the highest trust. In view of this, the
question of prosecution necessarily depends upon a high-level
determination of what policy should be followed by the United
States Government in this case or in similar cases.

I do not feel at this time that this Bureau is in a position to submit any recommendation whatever as to prosecution or as to the necessary determination of United States Government policy in this regard.

Pursuant to your request also, a copy of the summary memorandum in the above case dated October 21, 1946 has been furnished by separate memorandum to Mr. Veneck, who has been advised of your request in this connection and also of the highly confidential nature of this summary memorandum.

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In summation, it would appear that the problem of prosecution at the present time is dependent upon two primary questions: (1) Whether a substantial violation of Federal laws is reflected by the information developed in this case and summarized in the summary memorandum dated October 21, 1946, and (2) whether inclight of the present available probative and admissible evidence a successful prosecution of these subjects can be assured. If the above two questions are answered in the affirmative by the prosecutive branch of the Department of Justice, then I recommend prosecution.

Pursuant to your request also, a copy of the summary memorandum in the above case dated October 21, 1946, is being furnished by separate memorandum to Mr. Vanech, who is being advised of your request in this connection and also of the highly confidential nature of this summary memorandum.

Reference is made to a letter from the New York Field Division to the Bureau dated November 22, 1946, entitled "Jules Korchien, with aliases, Internal Security - C," copies of which were made available to the Washington Field Division.

Particular reference is made to information furnished by Confidential Informant Gregory in which the informant stated that on September 9, 1946, she had a lumcheon engagement the previous week with Louis Berdansky, the Proprietor of World Tourists, Incorporated, and that upon his invitation she accompanied him to 28 West 23rd Street, New York City, to look over the building at that address recently acquired by World Tourists, Incorporated. While at this lecation, Berdansky introduced her to Jules Korchien, the architect in charge of remodeling the building. Gregory observed that Korchien hore a resemblance to the engineer whom she knew as "Julius", a known contact of Jacob M. Golos in 1942 and 1943.

With further reference to Julius, it is recalled that Gregory in her eriginal contact with the Bureau advised that in the early summer of 1942 she became aware of a group comprised of several engineers located in New York City. Gregory stated on one occasion while driving through the lower east side of New York City with Golos he stopped the ear and advised that he had to meet someome; that she remained in the ear and observed Goles meeting an individual on a street corner whom she managed to get only a fleeting glimpse of, and she recalls that he was tall and thin and were horn-rismed eyeglasses. Golos advised Gregory that this individual was one of a group of engineers and that he had given this person Gregory's telephone number so that this individual would be able to reach Goles if ever he desired. Gregory advised that Goles did not elaborate on the activities of this person and his associates nor did he ever identify any of them except this one man to whom he gave Gregory's telephone and to whom he referred to as "Julius". Gregory advised she does mot believe that this was his true name. She stated that she received two er three telephone calls from Julius, telling her that he wanted to see Geles, and she relayed the messages to Goles.

Later, probably in 1943, "Julius" and the others in the group prodesired to Morfolk, Virginia, where they secured employment of some kind. Gragory recalls that as one somesion Goles travelled to Morfolk to see them. Approxi-

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mately gix months before Golos died (November 27, 1943) he teld Gregory that he, Golos, was turning ever "Julius" and that group to seme other Russian when he did not identify. Gregory advised that her last contact with "Julius" came shortly before Golos' death, after Golos had turned the group ever to semeone class. On this occasion, "Julius" telephoned Gregory very early in the morning and said he wanted to see Golos. Golos advised Gregory later that the reason "Julius" desired to see him was that he had lost his Russian contact and wanted to enlist Golos's aid in getting reestablished.

Gregory further advised that she had no further knewledge of the identity nor of the activities of this group, except that as far as she knew or had reason to believe, Golos never received mail from them at any time, neither while they were in New York nor while they were in Norfolk. Gregory stated that during a conversation she had with her unknown principal, "Jack", in the fall of 1944, when they were discussing desirable types of information to be sought, "Jack" remarked that they are interested primarily in political matters and that he was always glad to receive information "like that group of engineers down in Norfolk might secure.— If they should learn something about a submarine, I would like to get it."

Reference letter from the New York Field Division advised that, according to Gregory, her observation of "Julius" in 1942 was casual and she cannot state definitely that Jules Kerchien is identical with "Julius." However, she stated that if it could be established that Korchien either was a naval architect or engineer and that he had lived in Knickerbocker Village, New York City, during 1942 or 1943, she felt that he might well be the unknown "Julius."

On the basis of the above information and in view of the possibility that Jules Korchien may be identical with "Julius", the New York Field Division should survey all possibilities of this identification and should carefully review Korchien's background to determine if he resided in Knickerbooker Village or any other place in that vicinity during 1942 or 1943 and should determine, if possible, discreetly if Korchien was a moval architect or engineer, working on any naval projects in 1942 and, further, if it is known that he was employed on any of these projects in Norfolk, Virginia.

The Washington Field Division should determine, if possible, through the Many Department if Jules Korchien had done any architectural or engineering work for the Many Department or its contractors in or about Morfolk, Virginia, during the pertinent period, and, if so, all information concerning his employment and the individuals associated with him should be fully developed.

The Norfelk Pield Division should attempt to determine through any of its contacts at the Norfelk Navy Tard or any other Naval establishment in or about Norfelk, Virginia, if Jules Korchien was employed by the Navy on any of its engineering or architectural jobs at any of these establishments

during 1942 or 1943. The Morfolk Office should also, through its confidential informants and through an appropriate file review, ascertain if there was in existence during 1942-1943 a possible espionage parallel of engineers in Norfolk, Virginia, who in all likelihood were supplying confidential and technical data of an espionage nature to a principal in New York City.

For the further assistance of the Morfolk Field Division, Jacob M. Golos was a known Soviet espionage agent who was acting as an important link in an espionage parallel on behalf of the Soviets in New York City from 1940 to the fall of 1943. The Bureau's informant, Gregory, acted in the capacity of a courier for Golos and has furnished the names of numerous individuals including unknown Russian contacts known only to the informant by their nicknames. "Julius" is one of the contacts of Gregory and Golos who are believed to have been involved in the espionage operation. As noted above, "Julius" was known to Gregory only by that first name and has never been further identified. "Jack", who is mentioned above, has also never been identified, it being noted that "Jack" was a Soviet agent, apparently of considerable importance, who was Gregory's superior for some time.

It is expected that this matter will be afforded immediate attention and that the Bureau will be advised of any pertinent developments as soon as possible.


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



Reference is made to your m emorandum in the above eaptioned matter dated December 2, 1946. 3042*PUT-*3AR

With regard to your comment that you assume that no prosecutive action is in order in this case since I made no recommendations cencerning prosecution. I desire to point out that it is not, of course, the province of the PBI to make prosecutive recommendations and the summary memorandum in the above case was transmitted to you for such recommendations as you see fit to make in connection with this case.

For your confidential information, Gregory is a woman. She is in her late 50's and was born in New England of American origin and descent. She was well educated in both the United States and abroad and is a person of considerable intelligence. As is pointed out in the summary memorandum furnished you in the above case, her information has not in any material instance been refuted and it appears that her reports are authentic and accurate.

With regard to your request for the names of any persons employed in the Department of Justice involved in this case together with a summary of their activities in connection with the statement on page 5 of the summary memorandum in this case that "Soviet Intelligence Service was successful in securing material from" the Department of Justice, your attention is directed to the section of this summary memorandum beginning on page 45 concerning Norman Chandler Bursler, who was employed by the Department of Justice from August 5, 1938 to March 1, 1946. You will also note from the summary memorandum in this case that both Irving Kaplan and John J. Abt were formerly employed by the Department of Justice. However, none of the subjects in this case are so far as is known, presently employed by the Department of Justice.

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

White apt. At the time this conversation was held Magdoff had just returned from a trip to New York City. Magdoff mentioned that he had seen Ed, probably Edward Fitzgerald of the Commerce Department who is also a subject in this case, and learned that a meeting was held and that it was decided that those in attendance would continue to get together, enlarging the group continuously and that attempts would be made to develop a device for setting up a political team or organization. Kaplan said that he didn't think it was quite that as yet. Magdoff agreed stating that it was more in terms of a perspective. Kaplan explained that the upshot of their plans is as follows: Kaplan said that the kind of things that were thought of before he, meaning former Secretary of Commerce Henry A. Wallace, went over to the New Republic do not appear tobe adequate because there is always a question. Kaplan stated that there are two considerations. One is obviously that no matter what you think of Wallace he is the guy who has the biggest appeal of anybody and though it sounds amazing, it is true. Second, in spite of what he has Wallace is not going to beat anyone very long unless he has outside interests. Magdoff agreed. Kaplan said that during the meeting they got away from the idea of doing anything exclusively to boost him. He said the real point was to boost the program and to have Wallace's sponsorship on the program and the organization. Kaplan said the way it should be sold to Wallace is in terms of the program and the fact that he is in it because it's his program, his sponsorship and that it has the appearance of not being openly a matter boosting him. Kaplan stated that the thing that Magdoff is tying to Wallace for is that Mardoff needs Wallace because Wallace is the man of the hour and because Magdoff and his crowd can make money on that basis. Magdoff mentioned that he had been discussing the situation with some of his contacts in New York, and they agreed that a lot of money could be raised. He said that Harold Koung also talked along


In further mentioning what went on at the meeting in Magdoff's absence, Kaplan said that a suggestion was made that Wallace would be just invited to meetings in order to exert influence over him. He said that in a sense that is what it came to in order to keep him straight. However, Kaplan said he thought this idea was inadequate. He said that everyone agreed that if this plan ran Wallace into trouble with the people that he is already tied to and since he is not an aggressive man on these things, it would be necessary to pull him along in order to continue their plans. Kaplan said then they discussed the business of actually building an organization – a political organization. He said it sounded all right but that he raised the question as to whether or not their program would conflict with the Political Action Committee or the Democratic Party. He said that Harry White's idea was that it didn's have to conflict if it was worked out correctly.

Kaplan said at the conclusion of the neeting it was decided that they would get together again although nothing definite was said as to the time and place. Kaplan advised that Harry White is going to have Leon/Pressman (General Secretary, CIO) at the next meeting. Kaplan said that he had also suggested Pressman before White mentioned Pressman's name. He said that Harry White also proposed the names of Joel Fisher and Carr (phonetic) possibly David Karr. Kaplan said that he was against the aforementioned group, after which Harry White discarded them for the next meeting White then proposed his "Treasury crowd", namely, Randy Feltus, Joe DuBois and Lieutenant Colonel Bernard Bernstein. Kaplan described Joel Fisher as one whom Harry White looks upon as a hanger-on of the boys that he used to work with at Treasur Magdoff described Fisher as one who would shine Harry White's shoes for him. Kaplan and Magdoff then decided that they would get together later that day in order to hold a further discussion concerning their political plans.

ACTION: The foregoing is submitted for your information and should any subsequent information be received to more clarify the above program or organization it will, of course, be called to your attention. The technical log covering this conversation is attached hereto.

Kaplan said that a suggestion was made at the meeting that place would be just invited to subsequent meetings in order to exert influence over him. At the conclusion of the meeting, according to Kaplan, it was decided that the group would meet again, although mothing definits was said as to the time and place. Harry White is planning on inviting Leon Pressman, General Counsel of the CIO, to the next meeting. White also proposed the names of Joel Fisher and Carr (phonetic), possibly David Karr. Kaplan stated that he was against this group, whereafter Harry White discarded them for the next meeting and later proposed the names of his "Treasury crowd," namely, Randolph Feltus, Joseph DuBois and Lieutenant Colonel Bernard Bernstein.

Subsequently on October 24 and 26, Edward Fitsgerald contacted Mrs. Harry Magdoff at which time she stated that Harry had been in New York again and this time he had discussed the idea of establishing an institute, probably referring to the above mentioned political program. Fitsgerald was of the epinion that the proposition involved two or three hundred thousand dollars and that it would be necessary for them to get together with Harry White. Mention was made of \$10,000 salaries for five or six individuals, making reference to Harry White and Henry Wallace as probable associates.

During the above discussion, Fitzgerald indicated that Harry Magdoff was depressed following their first real meeting with their new boss, meaning Secretary of Commerce Harrison, and Mrs. Magdoff semmented that she feared that because of this meeting Magdoff would be prone to accept anything. It appeared that Secretary Harrison's remarks at this meeting reflected his attitude or policy which was not pleasing to Magdoff and Fitzgerald.

To date it is not entirely slear what these individuals have in mind, and you may be assured that if any further information is received concerning their program, it will immediately be brought to your attention.

Pannoh had turned the case down with a notation that Semsarian was not an expert in International Organisation and was not qualified for the work. "Sandy" advised that this was not true. He further stated that he thinks the situation in regard to Panuch is quite serious.

Sandifer said that they have another important case pending in the Security Investigations Department, that being one concerning Jack Kates (phonetic), who was scheduled to replace Helam Mosts (phonetic), who has been working on transportation and communications. Kates is now in the Maritime Commission and is a young lawyer who was a special assistant to the Admiral at the Maritime Commission and since has been a special assistant to the Admiral's successor.

Sandifer stated that he has had other indications that Panuch has an "unsympathetic" and "unhealthy" attitude. He thinks that Panuch's decision is unjuitified concerning Semsarian. Sandifer stated that he would like to have Alger Hiss talk to Cal (phonetic) about it after which Cal could talk to Anderson and Tomelson (phonetic) about it and give Alger Hiss enough information to talk to Russell about it.

Sandifer stated that Panuch's attitude concerning Dasbit was unjustified. He mentioned that Panuch had talked to Dasbit and later Dasbit told Sandifer that Panuch had taken a negative attitude toward "O.A." and said that he would place Dasbit in some other department. They also discussed the cases of several other individuals whose applications were being held up in the Security Investigations Department.

Alger Hiss said that these matters necessarily should be settled if at all possible. Sandifer mentioned that Waynehouse (phonetic) had talked with Panuch having known Panuch over at the War Department. Waynehouse has told Sandifer all about Panuch mentioning that Waynehouse has Panuch's "number". MEMORANDUM FOR THE DIRECTOR FEDERAL BURRAU OF INVESTIGATION

With reference to your memorandum "Underground Soviet Espionage Organization in Agencies of the United States Government" received in this office on November 29th I note that you wish my reactions at the earliest convenience.

While I have not completed the report as yet I do have some preliminary reactions.

- (1) I assume that no prosecutive action is in order since you make no recommendations of this type.
 - (2) In accordance with our conversations concerning the previous reports, particularly on Silvermaster and White, you have previously furnished to each agency or department of the government a summary concerning those persons employed by such agency or department who are involved in this investigation.

 I would suggest that each of the agencies be brought up to date and by such additional summary as the investigation requires.
 - (3) I would like to have more information concerning your informant "Gregory". As I remember you advised me orally that your informant was a woman. While this report makes no reference to sex, in one or two places it refers to Gregory as "he". While this may not be important, I would like to know the sex of the informant as well as the informant's age, place of birth and such additional background as you may have.
 - (h) On page 5 you point out that "Soviet Intelligence Service was successful in securing material from" and you name several departments and agencies of the Government, including the Department of Justice. Please furnish me the names of

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
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

You will recall that Robert Talbott Miller, III, is presently employed at the State Department and is a subject in this case.

I thought you would be interested in the following information which was obtained from a technical source on the residence of Nathan Gregory Silvermaster on November 26. 1946.

Mrs. Silvermaster and Mrs. Willia McAvoy, one of her close associates in the liberal field, were discussing a party which the Silvermasters had on the previous night and the guests that attended. In discussing Robert Miller and his wife, Jennie Mrs. Silvermaster stated, "Do you know what happened yesterday too - yesterday was Monday. Bob@Miller) went to work and was asked to leave because it might be embarrassing.

In further discussing his dismissal, Krs. McAvoy mentioned that that sort of thing is an example of what this winter is going to produce, probably referring to the incoming Republican Congress. They both thought that it was amazing. It was indicated that Killer was to be given thirty days in order to think it over.

Mrs. Silvermaster stated that she mentioned to her husband Greg that it was a good thing that he, Greg, had gotten out before he was told to leave in such a manner. You may recall that Nathan Gregory Silvermaster has resigned from the War Assets Administration, effective December 1, 1946.

This is the first indication that has come to the Bureau's attention that Miller is contemplating to leave or has been asked to leave his employment at the State Department.

In connection with the investigation of captioned matter, a technical surveillance on the telephone of the United States Service and Shipping Corporation, 212 Fifth Avenue, New York City, has been maintained. This installation covers telephone number MUrrayhill 3-9778, which is an unlisted telephone in the office of this firm where informant GREGORY is employed.

Inasmich as there has been no indication that any successor has ever assumed the duties of A. B. GROMOV, former first Secretary of the Jussian Embassy in Washington, at least with respect to the activities of informant GREGORY, and under further consideration that an analysis of the voluminous amount of information made available by this informant has never indicated the slightest doubt as to her reliability or veracity, it is felt that continuation of this technical surveillance is not worth while. It is the definite opinion of agents who have been handling this informant that in the event she should receive a telephone call from any representatives of Russian intelligence, this office would be immediately advised and it is also felt that there is no longer any need to check on her personal movements, which latter consideration was partially responsible for the institution of this surveillance.

In view of the above considerations, the technical surveillance on the above-mentioned telephone, which installation is designated as and operated by Sutec, will be discontinued on December 37, 1946, unless this office is advised to the contrary.

Reference is made to the letter from the Bureau to the Washington Field Office dated December 6, 1946, copies of which were directed to the Norfolk and New York Field Divisions. In this referenced letter the Bureau instructed that attempts be made to determine if JULES KORCHIEN was either a naval architect or engineer and whether or not he lived in Knickerbocker Village, New York City, at any time during the period 1942-1943. The Bureau instructed the Washington Field Office determine if possible through the Navy Department if KORCHIEN had done any architectural or engineering work for the Navy Department or its contractors in or about Norfolk, Virginia, during the pertinent period.

In an effort to supply the Navy Department with all possible information to facilitate their check and render it thorough, the records of the Identification Division of the Bureau were searched and disclosed three applicant fingerprint cards under the name JULES KORCHIEN, all of which are apparently identical with subject.

The first applicant card dated November 13, 1940, is a Civil Service print indicating that KORCHIEN was fingerprinted for the "emergency replacement list" at which time he gave his address as 310 West 97th Street, (undoubtedly New York City).



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



On November 19, 1946 during the time that PHILIP and MARY JANE KEENEY were under surveillance in New York City, a highly confidential source made available certain data which PHILIP KEENEY had in his possession. - 2. A copy of a letter dated August 27, 1946 and directed to Dr. P. KINEY, signed by R. SHIINA. This letter expresses the thanks of R. SHIINA to KINEY for his efforts in behalf of the Japanese people by his organisation of the libraries in Japan.
- 3. An outline of the Library School of the Imperial Library with a list of names of the instructors and a brief note of their carriers.
- 4. A letter directed to Mr. P. O. KERNKY, Washington, D. C. and dated November 4, 1946 in Tokyo, and signed by FUJIO MANIYA. This letter pertains to the proposed assertance by FUJIO MANIYA. pertains to the proposed organization of the libraries in Japan along the line of democratic tendencies. 

The Conference on China and the Far East held in San Francisco on Cetaber 18th to 20th, took far-reaching decisions for putting an end to the present American Far Eastern policy of imperialist domination. The Conference was called by Brigadier General Evans F. Carlson and several hundred distinguished individuals. Two organizations, the National Committee to Win the Peace and the Committee for a Democratic Far Eastern Policy, were in charge of the arrangements. These two organizations were instructed by the delegates to carry out the decisions of the Conference.

The Conference was attended by 605 representatives of 198 organizations. Among these were 48 CIO and 26 AFL locals, 7 CIO Councils, veterans' organizations, youth groups, YWCA's and Churches, and citizens' associations such as PAC, NOPAC and ICCASP.

The principal decisions of the Conference fellow:

ON CHINA:

Immediate withdrawal of all American military forces; cossation of all loans, predits, military supplies, and lend-loase to the Kucmintangs, support and insistence upon the carrying out of President Truman's statement of December 15, 1945, which calls for unity and a coalition government in China and prohibits U.S. aid to the Chinose government until progress has been made toward those ends; and, following the withdrawal of U.S. troops and the stoppage of credits and supplies, an American approach to the USSR for a mutual non-intervention agreement respecting China and an offer of joint mediation.

In addition to the general action program noted below, the delegates deeided to address a message of good-will to the people of China pledging our aid in onling American imperialist intervention; to communicate the decisions of the Conference to the leaders of all Chinese political groups; to organize a citizens' delegation to survey the situation in China and report back to the American people; and, to urgo Church and missionary groups in particular, because of their special role in America's relations with China, to help carry out the Conference decisions.

ON Japan:

Termination of america's unilateral occupation of Japan in favor of the multilateral centrol of Japan through the Far Eastern Commission and Allied Council for Japan set up at the Second Messey Conference of Poccuber 1945; and the terming over of this multilateral administration to the Japanese people as seen

as the latter establish a democratic people's government. In order to achieve these objectives, the delegates demanded the repeal of all ordinances and articles written by the MacArthur regime which repress civil and trade union. Thereties, and new elections to be held under the supervision of the Four-iower Allied Council for Japan. They also voted to ask the CIC to take up with the LFTU the question of appropriate international action to guarantee freedom of trade union development.

CN KCREA:

Abandonment of AMG rule through former purpets and collaborators of the Japanese and landlord-feudal elements in favor of the establishment of a democratic people's government.

As steps toward reaching that objective, the delegates called upon the American occupation authorities for the immediate resumption of meetings of the Soviet-American Joint Commission for Korea to implement the Moseow agreement of December 1945; the establishment of a Korean Provisional Government based on the political parties representing the majority of the Korean people; repeal of ordinances and articles promulgated by the military government repressing civil liberties; and release of Korean democratic leaders from Jail.

ON THE PHILIPPINES:

Genuine oconomic, political and military independence for the Philippines; the withdrawal of U.S. troops, bases and arms from the Philippines; repeal of the Philippine Trade Act; and the adoption of a program of genuine rehabilitation and industrialization.

Toward these ends, the delegates voted to send a good-will message to the people of the Philippines informing them of the Conference's decisions and to contact the American-Filipine communities in this country, to urge their erganizations to integrate the Conference program with their own. The delegates also domanded the immediate publication of reports, like the Hutchison report, which the American government is withholding.

ON INDONES La:

Recognition of the sovereignty of the Indonesia Republic by the American government; stoppage of lend-lease, surplus property, shipping and all other forms of American aid to the Dutch and British invasion; support by the American delegate on the United Nations Security Council of any proposals looking to the independence of Indonesia.

The Conforence called upon the American people to give full support to the campaign on behalf of the 217 Indonesian scamen who face deportation for their refusal to man Dutch ships which are being used to bring the arms and troops to destroy their own families and nation. The Conforence also sent greetings to the people of Indonesia.

ON THE COLO. LAL QUESTION:

* Rigid and immediate adherence to the provisions of the Atlantic Charter guaranteeing to all subject people the right of self-determination.

PROGRAM OF ACTION

A large part of the San Francisco Conference was devoted to working out a program of action in this country for the realization of all these political objectives. Of special importance in the action program is the following resolution which was initiated by the trade union delegates and adopted by the whole Conference:

"The policy of the United States Government in the Far East is one which affects the economic conditions and the standard of living of every American worker. Such a policy, unless radically changed, takes money out of our pockets, increases our taxes, puts us in competition with 'slave' wages, and makes us soldiers in World War III.

"Me remind the American people that the scrap iron which Pacific Coast longshoremen many times refused to lead for Japan ended up in the bodies of American soldiers who fought in the Facific area in the war just concluded.

"We therefore believe that this Conference must do its utmest, through the rallying of public opinion, to exert influence and pressure on our government to express the will of the people through a genuinely democratic Far Eastern policy.

"Should our government continue to liston to minority, reactionary groups, whose interests this policy serves, instead of to the people - then we pledge that, in consultation with the organizations supporting the program of this Conference, the trade unions will give the most serious consideration to how, and when, and what action should be taken to halt the production and shipment of military equipment and supplies destined for the Far East."

Delegates to the Conference, other than those from trado unions, recognized that such action on the part of the trado unions could attain success only if heartily supported by the American people. This support the delegates pledged themselves to get so that if forced to take this action, they could depend on public support.

Dear Sir:

It is my great pleasure in informing you that my propositions for the re-establishment of the Japanese libraries in developing along the line of democratic tendencies on which I have talked with you roughly at your office the other day.

Meantime, I think you returned safely to Washington and welcomed by your family for you were extending so longer trip from your country.

Library, of course I never failed to convey your kind regards to him, and he showed me your cordial letter addressed him on Oct. 15th, he was much gratified with both that your letter and my visit at this time and he declared me that he is expecting much to the result of your so far in consideration of the reorganization of the Japanese libraries in order to give more efficient facilities in very near future.

I extended my trip with my wife from Osaka to Tottori to see my friend who was in charge of my wooden cabinets manufacturing department, where library furnitures were chiefly made, when I was carrying my business on in Osaka by the end of war. He was very glad to have us and invited to the Izumo Shrine, God of matrimony enshrined, to offer our thanks to the God for our happy married life for 30 years; the day it was very fine and warm weather and we bathed in very much fortune which shall be sternal.

I am expecting to come back to my Hokkaido home through Tokyo within a few days. I shall ask to send this letter to yourgoodselves through the courtesy of Major McGrail.

My wiew points of resetting of the Japanese libraries should follow the democratic idea and to form up more usable one just as doing in the United States on which I have conversed with you, but a part of descriptions was remained, so I take liberty to describe you further details in this letter and hope that this will render you something worth to solve the problem.

Firstly, the modern Japanese library movement began almost the same time in your country, that is to say, I think the year of 1876 should draw a big line which separated New and Old sense in library facilities. In our country also the 5th to 9th year of the Meiji era (1872-77) was the epoch making age and in that period it changed the system from mere book collecting to the modern library work.



But, I know of the fact that your new library work started by very able men, consequently their efforts brought fruitful recultive. I can recollect the name of such men, Messrs. Williams, Cutter, Dewey, Bowker and others of which I have learned by the work of Mr. Forbes "Five men of 176" and others. On the contray the men touched our new library movement in dawn of the day were the people never before trained as a librarian and majority of them were ex-school teachers or the village officials and therefore they knew nothing specially on library work.

From the above view, the works were formed up in the different style by those people in their individual idea, and there were no interchangeable system through out. I mean, fours realized the standardized the size of Catalog Cards, "A.L.A. Catalog Eules" for general usage. Practical classification schemes, such as "D.C.," general usage. Hr. Keeney, if you are intending to reverse all system end facilities of our library methods to meet the requirement in democratic idea, I think you will touch first the above mentioned preparation ther you will start to introduce the inside work and practice.

Any of the test house cannot stand on without concrete foundation, so a building should be built up on the hardest foundation, and you shall guess what I want to say, this would be the law of nature, don't you think so?

In case this my idea in establishing newly a library supply house is difficult, I wish to recommend you to suggest Messrs. Gaylord Bros., Democo or Library Bureau to innaugulate their Branch Office in our country and in such case I shall, if necessary, help them with my best.

Rather longer descriptions will cause you tiresome, but I hope you will kindly read over and catch my idea and render any guidance to your consideration for which I shall be much appreciated by.

I am expecting to meet you in the nearest future in our country and to have the pleasure to talk about the reconstruction of the Japanese libraries.

MEMORANDUM TO: Mr. Orr

SUBJECT : Shikoku Library Conference

- l. The following education officers, Major Culbertson of Tokushima prefecture, Captain Andrist in charge of education on Shikoku Island, Captain Rudolph of Thime prefecture and . Winn of Kagawa prefecture, reported that the Ryoto conference was a real success. "Captain Andrist said that it was by far the finest Army conference he had ever attended. Major Culbertson stated that he had been appointed education officer three days before the conference opened and it helped him enormously as an orientation course. Captain Rudolph also said he had received a great deal of help at Kyoto and thought the discussion periods most beneficial.
 - a. Captain Andrist, Captain Rudolph-and Major Culbertson-have had educational experience in U.S. and seem to be very competent gentlemen. The latter two are recent arrivals in Japan, but they are tackling their work with real gusto. Captain Rudolph has been here just two months and has already visited many of the rural schools in his prefecture.
 - b. In Tokushima prefecture two woman school inspectors are already at work and the prefectural aducational authorities in Thime prefecture are engaging two women inspectors at once. The undersigned met the Tokushima women inspectors who seemed intelligent and very much interested in libraries. One of them had lived 15 years in Seattle, Washington.
 - c. Centein Andrist was in Matsuyama laying the ground work for 4 Japanese social workers in Ehime prefecture when the undersigned reached Takamatsu. However, it was the good fortune of the undersigned to spend a couple of hours with Centain Andrist on 13 October 1946. Captain Andrist has been in Shikoku since January 1946 and has appeared before all kinds of Japanese groups on the Island. He is particularly interested in the youth and women's movements which have sprung up all over Shikoku during the last nine months.

- d. Major Culbertson, Captain Rudolph and Lt. Vinn attended all of the library meetings held in their prefectures. Though the three admitted they learned much about libraries that they had not previously known, the undersigned is invebted to them for their interest and enthusiasm in the promotion of all work connected with libraries.
- There is no school of university status on Shikoku. All of the prefectural educational officials and MG aducational officers together with many influential people on the island are interested in seaing a university established on the island at "first possible moment." Over a 1,000,000 year have been raised to promote the foundation of the university. "Members of the lower House of the Diet and the House of Peers from Shikoku are actively at work on the university plans in Tokyo.
- 2. The prefectural libraries in Kagawa, Tokushims and Kochi prefectures were totally destroyed during the bombings and nearly 80 percent of the resources of the libraries were burned. The situations in Thime prefecture is very different. The library building was erected by a wealthy railroad man, eleven years ago, and given outright to the prefetture. It is one of the best library buildings seen by the undersigned anywhere in Japan. This building as it is intact was taken over by the 24th Division in Nov. 1945 and the first and second floors are now used by the MG. The book resources of 100,000 Volumes are Stored in a warehouse and are completely useless so fer as the public is concerned. During part of last spring the top floor of the library was returned to the library authorities to be used as a public reading room. Major Healton, MGCO, decided in June when he arrived that, for security reasons, no Japanese readers should be permitted in the building and the reading room was closed to the public.
 - a. The librarian showed the undersigned a letter he had sant to General McArthur asking that the library be returned to the people of Ehime prefecture at the first possible moment. The people of the city and prefecture are very badly in need of Ehlibrary. This situation is particularly true in the case of young readers. The undersigned, there is, recommends that the proper authorities thoroughly investigate the facts connected with the MG occupancy of the library building.



- 3. The first library meeting was held in Takamatsu on the mornin of 10 August 1946. The vice-governor, Mr. Nagase, read an address prepared by the governor who was but of town. Mr. Nagase attended both morning and afternoon meetings as did Lt. Winn.
 - a. About fifty towns and rural librarians were present at the morning meeting where the undersigned gave a brief survey of libraries in the United States bringing out the differences in librarianship in Japan and United States. Several interesting questions were asked relating to library finance, children's work, private libraries, library training in the United States, and bookmobiles.
 - b. This was followed by a discussion led by Mr. Shiina, Kagawa prefectural librarian, on the necessity of new library legislation in Japan and the steps already taken to prepare the new legislation.
 - In the afternoon, educational and library officials from the other three prefectures were in attendance. The undersigned was asked to speak about American library administration and the part that American libraries play in the Adult Education program. During the question period many topics were touched on relating to the extension and improvement of Jepanese libraries. The undersigned pointed out the importance of the American Library Association and the role it has played in establishing standards for American library schools. This led un to a discussion of the reorganization of the Japanese Library Association and the problems it must solve including a single cataloguing and classification system for all of Japan. All of the persons present were fully aware of the importance of the free public library in any adult education movement.
 - d. Mr. Shiina, reported on 13 October to Captain—Andrist, Lt. Vinn and the undersigned that the conference on 10 October was already getting results. He had already been assured by prefectural authorities of more money for new books and money to pay transportation costs of collections of books delivered to various library stations throughout the prefecture. Mr. Shiina is very much interested in distributing books to youth groups which are rapidly springing up in many parts of the prefecture.

- 4. The undersigned reached Tokushima at noon on 11 October 1946 and was taken by Major Culbertson to meet Mr. Shibatu the vice-governor. A meeting was called for 1330 that included librarians, School principals, prefectural educational officials, the vice-governor, and Major Culbertson.
 - a. All phases of the library situation in the prefecture were thoroughly examined. At the conclusion of the meeting, the vice-governor promised to increase the library budget at the coming session of the prefectural Diet. The librarian, Mr. Okajima, told the undersigned that he felt the free discussion of this meeting had helped him more than any previous conference.
 - b. The undersigned spent the morning of 12 October 1946 with Mr. Okajima and the two women school inspectors. The immediate problems of the library were discussed. The main problem related to the distribution of books to eight very small branches scattered over the prefecture. Before taking the train to Matsuyama, the librarian, school inspectors, chief of prefectural education, and the undersigned called on the vices governor who again promised a substantial increase in the library budget.
 - c. Mr. Okajima is preparing a report on his library for the undersigned and will keep him informed of all developments.
 - d. Major Culbertson will also keep his eye on the library situation and mention the library's importance as he meets groups throughout the prefecture.
- 5. The undersigned reached Matsuyama at 2200 on 12 October 1946 where he was met at the station by Captain Rudolph and Mr. Kan, the prefectural librarian. Captain Rudolph announced that Gov. Acks who took office that day was awaiting us a's hotel where we would discuss the library. The conference turned out to be a dinner where Major Halton, MG CO, and severel prefectural educational and library officials were present. Gov. Acks said, however, that one of his first duties in his new office would be the improvement of the financial condition of the library.
 - a. On the morning of 12 October 1940 the undersigned attended a large meeting of persons including school principals and prefectural officials who were interested in all phases of librarianship. Obstain Endolph was also present and said that he fest the meeting was one of the most successful public

gathering he had attended in Japan. The undersigned answered questions for nearly an hour and a half on points touching on the differences in American and Japanese library methods. The fact that libraries in the United States are free was emphasised. Then importance to education was also brought out and then role in the life of children from 4-10 years of age.

- b. In the afternoon, Captain Rudolph and the undersigned were entertained by Mr. Kan at his home. Captain Rudolph had never attended a formal tea ceremony and we were given the works by Mr. Kan. At its conclusion, Mr. Kan and his secretary discussed with us the urgent need for the return of the library to the people of the prefecture. We were shown his letter to the General MacArthur which seemed particularly cogent and included several valuable reasons for the return of the library at the first possible moment.
- c. Captain Rudolph said that citizens of the prefecture had been coming to him two weeks prior to the library conference asking questions about it. He felt that the results of the conference were very successful and said further that he now had information about the value of libraries to bring to the paople when he met them in various parts of the prefecture.
- of the undersigned conferred with Mr. Okuma, Okayama prefectural librarian, on the return to Tokyo on 13 October 1946. Mr. Okuma had attended the meetings in Takamatsu on 10 October 1946. Mr. Okuma felt that such conferences were very important, now, when there is an active movement on foot in Japan to formulate new library legislation and reorganize the Japanese Library Association.
 - a. The undersigned saw the ruins of the Okayama prefectural library and was told that only a few thousand books were saved.
 - b. Mr. Okuma hoped that the undersigned would return to Okayama in February 1947 to talk with the newly elected prefectural officials. The present library prospects are very bleak, but Mr. Okuma considers a talk with prefectural officials would get positive results.





7. The undersigned was particularly gratified by the attitude taken by the MG education officers on Shikoku. All were most attentive and encouraging to all of the problems present in the expansion of Japanese libraries. Their help, at this time, will be most valuable.

8. The presence of leading prefectural officials at all of the meetings was of greatest importance as it afforded them the opportunity to hear the needs of libraries discussed by their own library officials.



In this particular instance, the attention of the New York Field Division was again directed to these instructions in view of the fact that this particular matter could only have been properly handled by teletype or telephone. Inasmuch as the S/Inasmuch as the information was furnished by a report from New York, the matter wasaclosed issue in so far as taking any action on the information. The Supervisor who is handling this case has been confined to bed with influenza for the past few days, but I feel that this matter was handled as quickly as possible under the circumstances. The report received from New York setting forth this information was 92 pages in length, was dated October 17, 1946, and was received by the Bureau on Friday, October 25, 1946. The Supervisor handling this case had just completed a detailed summary on this whole case, which of necessity due to the tremendous amount of work involved in preparing this summary caused his routine work to become somewhat delinquent. Furthermore, during the period of time this report was in the Bureau, it was necessary for me to use the services of this Supervisor for two full days in connection with our special at the inception of the present coal strike. In addition, the Supervisor made file Which necessitated a considerable checks on amount of file checking. 

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

Confidential Informant T-1 states that WILLIAM APPLEBAUM is employed by the Economy Grocery Store Corporation, Boston, as market research expert. According to T-1, APPLEBAUM has a key position in the Economy Grocery Store Corporation in view of the fact that his advice regarding market problems is given great weight by this corporation. T-1 said that the Economy Grocery Store Corporation is operated by the RABINOVITZ Family. Some of the Economy Grocery Stores are known as the Rabinovitz Stores. T-1 stated that he had no information regarding subversive tendencies on the part of APPLEBAUM.

There is no information available in the Boston Office indicating subversive activity on the part of WILLIAM APPLEBAUM.

Re: IRVING RUBIN

A check of the records at the Merchants Credit Bureau, 52 Chauncy Street, Boston, revealed that IRVING RUBIN resides at 257 Beverly Road, Brookline, Mass. The only reference to him was a statement to the effect that a petition was filed at the Norfolk Probate Court, Norfolk County, Mass., to change the name ISRAEL to IRVING RUBIN May 10, 1941.

Inquiry by the writer at the Chestnut Hill, Boston, sub-postal station revealed that RUBIN is still residing at 257 Beverly Road as indicated in the referenced report in this case. RUBIN enjoys a good reputation in his community, and his wife is active in Jewish women's groups.

The records of Dun and Bradstreet, Paine Furniture Building, Boston, Mass., revealed that IRVING RUBIN is the proprietor of the Boston Metal Products Company, 80 Boylston Street, Boston, Mass. Records of Dun and Bradstreet revealed that, according to RUBIN, this company averaged for





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the first six months of 1946 approximately \$30,000 in sales. Dun and Bradstreet records did not indicate the exact nature of the metal products handled by RUBIN's concern.

There is no information available in the Boston Office indicating subversive activity on the part of IRVING RUBIN.

Re: DELPHIN GEORGE MCFARLAND

According to information available in the Boston Field Office, DELPHIN GEORGE McFARLAND was interviewed in the Boston Office for the position of translator on February 26, 1942. In connection with an investigation instituted with respect to McFARLAND's application for a position with the Bureau, it was ascertained that McFARLAND was born on June 22, 1907, at Woburn, Mass. Records at Boston University, Boston, Mass., reflected that applicant attended the College of Business Administration September, 1924, to June, 1929, when he received a BBA Degree. Mc FARLAND subsequently attended Graduate School at Boston University, receiving an MA Degree. He subsequently attended Harvard University from 1937 to June, 1941, when he was awarded an MA Degree from this institution as a Spanish major. The applicant investigation on McFARLAND disclosed that he taught Spanish at Boston University from 1928 to 1942, where he had a very good record. His wife's maiden name was given by applicant as LINDA LAETSCH. As relatives he lists ANNA HUTHER MCFARIAND, mother; Mrs. JOSEPH FRENI, sister; CHARLES F. and ELLEN MURRAY LAETSCH, father-in-law and mother-in-law; CHARLES and HAROLD TAETSCH, brothers-in-law; Mrs. WARREN RICH, sister-in-law. All these persons, according to the applicant investigation regarding McFARLAND, enjoy excellent reputations, although it was noted that

ROOSEVELT, Campobello, New Brunswick, Canada, a copy of which was transmitted by the Bureau to the Boston Field Office, SELIGMAN identified himself as the author of "Race Against Man," published 1939 by Putnam's; "The Negro Faces America," 1920, Harper's; and other books. In June, 1938, he predicted Axis attack on this country in an article featured by the NEW REPUBLIC. In his letter to Mrs. ROOSEVELT, SELIGMAN points out that as a summer resident at Addison, Maine, he had been greatly concerned about what he alleged was lack of wartime security measures along exposed positions of the Maine Coast.


Re: ETHEL MACHANIC ALPER

This individual has been the subject of a past Security Matter investigation in the Boston Office. She has been identified as a U. S. citizen born 9/23/08 at Burlington, Vermont. In April, 1945, she resided at 102 Sargent Street, Newton, Mass. As ETHER MACHANIC, she is known professionally as an artist. She was previously employed as Executive Secretary of the Massachusetts Council of American-Soviet Friendship, Inc., and she has been succeeded in this office by an individual by the name of NAN HALPERIN, sister-in-law of one of the subjects in this case, MAURICE HALPERIN.

ETHEL MACHANIC has been a member of Communist front organizations in the Boston Field Division territory and was a member of the Communist Political Association according to informants of this office. A Washington, D. C., informant has alleged that ETHEL MACHANIC ALPER and her husband, U. S. Army Captain BENEDICT S. ALPER, were members of the Communist Party.

Information furnished by the Washington Field Division reveals that a passport was issued to ETHEL M. ALPER in 1932 for travel to England, France, Holland, Belgium and Germany; and in 1939, for travel to England.

Under date of October 15, 1945, in the case entitled "NATIONAL COUNCIL OF AMERICAN-SOVIET FRIENDSHIP, INC., INTERNAL SECURITY - C," the New York Field Division made available information which revealed the fact that ETHEL MACHANIC had been in communication by letter with NAN GOLDEN, Executive Secretary for the National Council of American-Soviet Friendship.



Re: BENEDICT S. ALPER

BENEDICT SOLOMON ALPER, aka Ben Alper, was in 1945 the subject of a Security investigation in the Boston Field Division. He is a U. S. citizen born in Revere, Mass., 6/29/05. He is believed to have served as



a Captain, Army of the United States, Special Service Forces overseas.

ALPER is professionally a criminologist, specializing in juvenile delinquency, and has varied experience in this field. Prior to his entrance into the Army, he was an Assistant Examiner, U. S. Board of Parole, Bureau of Prisons, U. S. Department of Justice. ALPER's Army Serial Number was 0/519276.

The Washington Field Division Office has advised that BEN ALPER was formerly a member of the Communist Party in the Distr of Columbia. BENEDICT ALPER is a brother of MARCUS MORDECAT ALPER, a veteran of the Abraham Lincoln Brigade and a Communist Party member prior to his induction into the Army of the United States.

ALPER was married to ETHEL MACHANIC June 14, 1935.

The following investigation was conducted by Special Agent LAWRENCE G. HEALEY:

Referenced letter reported that ABRAHAM BROTHMAN, 114 East 32nd Street, New York City, had been corresponding with a Mr. POWELL, Ro .05 the Park Square Building, Boston, Mass. The Park Square Building is a prominent office building. It was ascertained that Room 405 is occupied by the firm of FLAGG BRACKETT and DURGIN, manufacturers' agents.

Dun and Bradstreet, in an investigation conducted in July, 1946, submitted the following report. The above firm is a partnership formed on January 1, 1944, to act as sales engineers and manufacturers' agents in New England. The partnership represents concerns on a commission basis, principally selling to construction companies engaged in light manufacturing and specializing in power plant and oil refinery equipment.

The firm represents, among others, the following corporations:
American Chemical Corporation, New York; Beaumont Birch Company, Philadelphia;
Clark Brothers Company, Inc., Leon, New York; the Pacific Pump Works,
Huntington Park, California; the Phillips Cooling Tower Company, New York
City; the Schaub Engineering Company, Chicago, Illinois; the Skinner
Engine Company, Erie, Pa.; the American Marsh Pump Company, Battle Creek,
Michigan.

The company employes nine people and has a sales office at 250 West 59th Street, New York City. The company is also in partnership with two others in the International Industrial Machinery Company, Exporters and Importers, of Boston. The partners in the firm consist of WALTER E. FLAGG, 49 years of age, married, native born, a graduate of Babson Institute of Wellesley, Mass., with a degree in electrical engineering at Northeastern University. He is also the senior partner in the firm of FLAGG and SPEAR and is also vice president of the Dymonhard Corporation of America.

Another partner is WILLIAM H. BRACKETT, 55 years of age, married, native born of English descent, a graduate in 1915 of MIT, formerly employed in the Engineering Department of the Lockwood Grain Company and Stone and Webster Corporation. In 1927 on his own account he was a manufacturers agent specializing in electric power equipment.

The third partner, ARTHUR D. DURGIN, is 56 years of age, married, native born of English descent, a graduate of Brown University, a salesman and manufacturers' agent since 1917.

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The indices of the Boston Office are negative with reference to the above. Concerning the POWELL referred to in referenced letter, no inquiry was made of the above firm in view of the widespread nature no inquiry was made of the firm's business.





The files of the Seattle Credit Bureau show that MARCID M. REELER resided in Seattle, Washington, for several years until 1930s. Prior to 1929, he was a salesman for the Idgett and Myers Tobacco Company and for approximately a year during 1929 was a Collector for the Stores Collection Bureau where he was rated a satisfactory employee. The files indicate that after leaving Seattle in 1930, he was for a short time employed by the Linds Air Products Corporation in Portland, Oregon, and then began his sum collection bureau. There was no derogatory information and no court record reported in the credit files. Regarding DORIS RAK KEKIER, wife of the above, the credit records indicate that she was a graduate of the University of Washington Isw School in 1927 and on June 2, 1932, was reported to be employed in a Portland, Oregon, law office. There was no further information regarding her in the Credit Bureau files.

The University of Washington Registran's Office resords were negative regarding any University attendance by MERCHD W. REFIER.

Regarding DORIS HAR (HELIR), it was indicated that this individuel was graduated as a Bachelor of lest on June 13, 1927, after leving entered the University of Mashington on October 9, 1925.

The record indicated that she was born on June 18, 1903, at Des Moines, Ione; that her nationality was American; her church affiliation Presbyterian; and her father, J. J. RAE, was, at the time of her entrance, Superintendent of Schools at Caldwell, Idaho. She entered the University of Washington with advanced eredits from the College of Idaho at Caldwell, Idaho, and the University of Iowa at Iowa City, Iowa. She had attended high school at both Burley and Caldwell, Idaho. Her residence while at the University of Washington was 3737 University Way, Seattle, Washington.

The Seattle files are negative regarding any subversive activity on the part of any JAMES FIETCHER who might be identical with the JAMES/FIETCHER who was, according to referenced Machington Field Office letter, a former professor of English at Machington State College, Pallman, Machington, A number of references in the Seattle files reflect that one JAMES FIETCHER was employed during the war years at Seattle, Machington, as a Postal Consor and he, on a number of occasions, reported possible subversive activities (German and Japanese) to Special Agents of the Seattle Field Division as a result of his duties as Postal Consor. On one occasion in this connection, this Postal Consor stated that his name was JAMES VERTICHER; that he was born at Mankato, Minnesota, and, at the present time, would be about 38 years eld. He stated that he had attended the University of Machington and that he had been an Associate Professor of English at the University of Alaska from the fall of 1935 until May, 1942, at which time he came to Seattle and obtained employment with the Postal Censor. He stated that he resided at 1623 - 45th Avenue Southwest, Seattle, Washington, and was married to MARGARET CARTANO FIETCHER, who was born in Spokane, Washington,

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MARGEURITE LUND, employee of the I.W.C.A. 5th and Seneca Streets, Scattle, Washington, and former employee of the Postal Consorship Office, Seattle, Washington, advised TANYA NIKONISHIM, Seattle Field Division translator and herself a former Postal Gensor employee, in approximately September, 1946, that JAMES VERTMER FIETCHER was at that time employed as a secretary to or assistant of HENRY WALLACE in the United States Department of Commerce in Washington, D.C.
