





In Movember 21, 1946, edition of the "Rambler", local weekly publication in the Lanhan, Maryland, area, there was an article reflecting that hiss LODA MAE DAVIS and her mother were occupying Unite Pines during the absence of HARRI COLLIES. It was stated that Miss DAVIS is an economist with UMRRA and that she had recently returned from Europe where she attended the UMRRA council meeting at Geneva. It was said she also made trips to Prague and Vienna. Miss DAVIS was reported at present to be in charge of the Amstrian desk in the Supply Division, UMRRA Readquarters, Washington, D. C.

The mail cover placed on subject's residence was not productive during the above period.

LIGS, Moute 3, Fox 429, Vienna, Virginia, and on the same date a communication from 10, 2627 Connecticut Avenue, mashington. Inquiry was made at 2627 Connecticut Avenue and it was ascertained that this is the address of radio station 10, 10 in which the subject has purchased stock and appears to have an active interest along with several other members in instant case.

Reference is made to the report of instant case dated October 17, 1946 wherein during the physical surveillance on September 19, 1946 it was observed that the subject and his wife were riding an automobile driven by the subject with New York license plates Sub-20-746.

In a letter dated November 0, 1946 the Albany Field division advised that the above New York license plate was issued to FLORA S. STATUS, West Street, Harris, New York. It was noted FLORA D. 




(R)Lit is noted that one letter listed above was sent by I. STELLIAN. 847 East 172nd Street, Bronx 60, New York. A review of past reports in this investigation reflects that the GOLDS have been in touch with ISAAC STELLIAN at this same address upon several past occasions. The New York Field Division is being requested to furnish any information which they may have concerning this individual in an effort to determine his relationship with the GCLDS.

In reports of Special Agent LAMBERT G. ZAMBER dated November 5 and December 6, 1946, in this case, it will be noted that in the sections dealing vith

special Agent M.ALBERT STELLAR, Jr., dated April 10, 1946, at Meshington, D. C., reflects that 305ALIE MAYER, whose address had previously been established as 1150 Grand Concourse, Bronx, Hew York, was believed to be the mother of SOLHA GOLD. This same report sets forth identifying and background date concerning Professor ROBERT S. LLID. Sociology Department, Columbia University.

Under date of November 8, 1945, the Boston Field Division furnished the information set forth below concerning the RUD'S activities while spending the summer at Moredith Center, New Eampshire. This information was obtained through a confidential informent of the Boston Field Division.





Moredith Center, New Hampshire, on September 15, 1946, traveling by automobile to New York City. The GCIDS had no visitors after August 1, 1946. BELLA SCID appeared to devote all his time in writing a book which is tentatively titled "How to Feed the Morld." In connection with this enterprise, GCID exhibited to zone of the persons at the camp several volumes on agricultural and economic subjects, many of which were abandoned when the camp was vacated.

The only activity which appeared to be of any interest in this case occurred when the GOLDS left the camp on two occasions to "climb nountains" and were gone overnight on each occasion. On these occasions, ABBIE WALTE, nurse to the GOLD baby, spent the night at a hotel in view of the fact that she was afraid to stay alone in the camp.

Subsequently, on August 1, 1946, 2010 received no telegrens and had no visitors at the camp.





#### MARY JANE and PHILIP OLIN KEENEY

The following investigation was conducted by Special Agent COURTIAND
J. JONES.

On November 15, 1946, Special Agents JEROME M. GARLAND and COURTIAND J. JONES obtained from a highly confidential source letters which PHILIP KEENEY, commonly referred to as "ANGUS". had written to his wife, MARY JANI, from the period January 1, 1946 to may 9, 1946. During this me ANGUS was in Japan and MARY JANI was in surope with the Allied Committee on Reparations. These letters have been reviewed and the excerpts of interest are being set forth below.

On January 8, 1946, PHILIP wrote the following:

"I had quite a gab fest with MARTER (BENETT) who says he is enroute for Germany just as soon as the F. .. A.C. appears in Tokyo. He thinks this group is pretty well exploded since moscow. hen he and Chille (L. TTI TRE) reached here, they were told that Japan was flat on her back industrially but he found out by examination and otherwise that she was two and one-half times better off than immediately before the war. He has made certain recommendations to wipe out industry and these recommendations have been accepted in the highest U. S. echelon and been referred to S. .I.N.K. In a word, he believes his coming to Japan has been profitable. He has written A. twice but received no answer and heard but once from AL. He mentioned your letters. 'e are going to get together soon. O N (LATTRICRE) intends to return as BLEATOR L. is not coming out. I am afraid BO BM (Shith) will find excuses to stay in U.S.

"There seems to be about five parties fighting for political power, with several splinter groups on the extreme wing. The Socialists refuse to join forces with the Communists which is the usual tendency everywhere. I am sure my heart strings till be played upon many times in the next few months.

MMARGARET SIGN. (fellow employee of AUGUS (SONTY) read a selection of your letters and got a tremendous amount of enjoyment from them. She hopes that none was opened.

By letter of January 9, 1946, PHILIP had the following to say to

his spouse:



WEARTIN (BENJETT) called to say he had your letter of the Eth and one from AL. He read both and the one from AL implies he is cutting a swath with DR P R, et al.

DRAPER and CLAY are out to part ANGELL on the point of a pin and AL has recommended that CLAY send for ARTIS

to handle the whole situation."

\*\*\*\*

"MARTIN just left and wants you to know that he hopes to see you in Berlin, come hell or high water. If he can't come in his earlier capacity, he thinks he knows another way and if it is utterly impossible, he will find a way to bring you back." (To the U.S.A.)"

In his letter of January 10, 1946, KENNEY had the following to say to MARY Jane:

"The Allies must stay here (Japan) at least a decade if we are to wipe out any feudalistic traits. The liberal elements are now failing to display initiative because they are afraid the bellicose forces will take over after we leave. The J.C.P. (Japanese Communist Larty) is the one utterly fearless group, as usual. They have nothing to lose but their chains.

"The J.C.P. (Japanese Communist Party) is more interested in land reforms at this time and we know farming conditions are very bad.

"MARTIN (REMIETT) told me today that plans were now made for him to leave on January 15. This is supposed to be a super-duper secret. He also said that he had been called on by the Baroness MATIN (Birth Controller) and had given ARGARST STOUT's and my name to her. She wants to set up a newspaper to stimulate women politically. I am not hurrying to make any contacts outside our group and we have been warned to say nothing to members of the Fourth Estate."

On January 11, 1946, NGUS wrote ARY JAME that ALFRED ROW, husband of PHYLLIS PROW, had recently visited him in Tokyo. EROW was working with the american Red Cross over-seas and was stationed at Okinawa.

The next letter of any interest is dated January 17, 1946 and is a copy of a letter which was directed by ANGUS to HARRIET EDDY of San Francisco, California. In the end of this letter K MAN Wrote that he was making a study of Japanese library needs and requested that HARRIET EDDY

JANE:

send him material on libraries that she had used on her trip to Russia.

By letter of January 20, 1946, ANGUS wrote the following to MARY

me have several Soviet officials staying in our hotel but I have made no effort to meet any one of them. Several are very attractive looking and all seem cuite young."

On January 21, 1946, KEENEY wrote that he had learned that POTENT SMITH would not be able to come to Japan due to personal business in the United States. KEENEY also said that he had not had any word concerning JACK MARSAIKA and that he was afraid MARSAIKA had been frozen out.

One item of interest appearing in ANGUS! letter of January 22, 1946, is as follows:

"People in general have been more than mildly enthusiastic about the return of SANZO MOZAMA (Head of the Japanese Communist Party). It begins to look as if he would successfully unite a large element of the Social Democratic Party with the J.C.P. (Japanese Communist Party), to form a popular front. His interviews have been widely quoted and they make sense."

On January 23, 1946, KEENEY wrote:

"Tokyo presents a strong anti-Soviet attitude. I have not met a single person who supports the Kremlin in any way. Stories circulate to the effect that the Japanese are very much afraid of the U.S.S.R. They feel that the Reds will come in if we leave and the mere thought of such a possibility gives the Japanese cold shivers. Another Japanese element expects another war with China, Britain, United States and U.S.S.R. all embroiled."

On January 31, 1946, KEENEY wrote:

"It is also reported that 60 officials from the U.S.S.R. are expected any day to set up shop here as the result of the Moscow Conference. Much depends upon the actions we take with these and those in Cairo. The murmurs I have heard around the hospital indicate that the U.S.S.R. is feared and accused of being stubborn and envious."

By letter of February 11, 19h6, ANGUS wrote TARY JANE that HOZAKA had set up the following axioms for the Japanese Communist Party:



- 1: Provide work, food and adquate housing for everyone.
- 2: Substantially raise wages and salaries.
- 3: Give land to farmers.
- 4: Afford freedom and equality to women.
- 5: Remove bureaucratic and monopolistic controls of small and medium industries and business.
- 6: Determine guilt of war criminals.
- 7: Create a democratic constitution. Establish a parliamentary system.
- 8: Overthrow the Shidehara cabinet.
- 9: Form a united, democratic front.
- 10: Overthrow the (illegible) system."

Continuing, KEENEY wrote:

"It is really quite surprizing to see the write-ups, generally favorable, that the J.C.P. (Japanese Communist Party) is getting in the Japanese press. NOZAKA's return received much attention. Though it is reported that the J.C.P. only has a few thousand members, they wield a growing influence. Probably only a few will be elected to the new diet but many votes will be thrown to the Social Democrats."

By letter of February 11, 1946, ANGUS wrote:

"I find myself on the horns of a mighty dilemma. Big gobs of history are in the making and I am caught in the middle, unable to do a damn thing about it. To have a single person to talk over immediate ends and outs, would be most helpful but alas, such is not the case. To lump it is not easy but unless something suddenly turns up there is nothing to be done. The J.C.P. (Japanes Communist Party) is about to be caught unawares and this is unfortunate, though not too deadly due to many circumstances that may develop before 1947. GREG'S (NATION GREGORY SILVER ASTER) advice about relaxation may be ordinarily correct but at the moment it is hard to follow."

On February 15, 1946, ANGUE wrote to KRY JANE as follows:

"You may have seen that two editors of STARS AND STRIPES,
PETTUS and SUBIN, were fired and their records scrutinized
for subversive activities. I predicted that HUCH (Delacty)
would pick up cudgels and today's press reports that HUCH
COFFEE and SABAT! have demanded that FATTERSON investigate. PETTUS is from ashington and RUBIN fought in Spain."

on February 19, 1946, KEENTY had the following to write:

"The press reports E. B.'s (E.R.D. BRO DER) expulsion. This is unfortunate, even if there was no other way out."

\*\*\*\*

"The arrests in Canada (CORBY Case) re A-bomb, may have loud repercussions."

Again, on February 22, 1946, KEINEY mentioned the CORBY Case and had the following to say:

"There is quite a bit of talk going 'round about the Canadian story. I was glad to see JOE DAVIES' statement. There is a decided group here that is very anti-U.S.S.R. and it is now applying pressure wherever possible. The Major, who was my boss in the Government Section, told one of the girls that he knew about the Canadian business weeks ago. You can imagine how glad I am to be clear of him."

By letter of February 2h, 1946, KEENEY wrote:

"I had a letter from LARRY and DOROTHY (TCDD) with a bunch of clippings. You get a carbon of LARRY's. It was indeed good to hear from them."

The next item of any interest was written on March 3, 1946, at which time ANGUS wrote:

WHE NIPPON TIMES reports today that BO ENIS (STIM) pal, Major General HITDRING, has just been appointed Assistant Secretary of State for both Germany and Japan. That power and authority he will have are not mentioned. It would seem as if he would be looking around for a few good people. So long as you are attached to the State Department, this might be an opportunity you could stemach if you so desired."

By letter of March 9, 1946, AMGUS wrote:

"Last night I was invited to play bridge by a Lajor of GEORES, SPALDING and two Lieutenant Colonels are lately arrived and all from the Eastern Theatre of operations. In the course of play, which was good, SPALDING asked one of the Colonels if he knew GEORGE TAXON. Then he got "no" for an answer, I picked up with an II do".

SPALDING thinks GEORGE is a wonderful guy but not for our reasons."

ur reasons."

\*\*\*\*

"This morning's NE S brings another burst against the U.S.S.R.. A man at my table this morning thought it was wonderful news and hoped the United States meant business this time. I answered nothing. It was reported from Moscow that the C's (Communists) supported the J.C.P. (Japanese Communist Party)."

Continuing in the same vein, on March 11, 1946, ANGUS wrote:

"The U.S.S.R. comes in for its morning digs. The situation certainly does not improve and one begins to get a bit fed up with this double talk. I heard a Hajor say at noon that it might be well for us to use up a few of our atom bombs on anchuria or elsewhere."

In his letter of march 20, 1 h6, ANGUS wrote TARY JAME that he was very glad that she had met LUD 10 ULLTAN in Paris and that he was sorry that MARY JAME could not have accended all of the meetings that she desired. He then wrote:

"Your visit to the P.N. must have been very exciting. You made contacts with many who are V.I.P. (very important people-?) in our estimation. I have not been fortunate here but it may be possible to do more along the lines we understand when I really begin my project."

On March 29, 1946, KEEMEY wrote:

"Today's NEWS is full of dangerous elements. At breakfast with three officers, says the Lieutenant Colonel:
'Men, you had better not throw away your uniforms.';
says another: 'Russia is just bluffing.'; says the first officer: 'Then it is time we called them.'. This U.N.O. business is going to stir up a lot of grief unless the situation is clarified very soon. This F.B.I. arrest in Portland (PEDIN) is fast adding fuel to the fire. It is very strange how many of these things happen in pairs."



Of interest also is a letter ANGUS wrote to his wife on March 31, 1946, in which he had the following to say:

"Last night I happened to sit at a table with Commander SOPE, who is in the Government Section. He also served in Congress and was once Governor of Puerto Rico. Te happened upon the coming election which he hopes would be a success. e talked about the bating of the U.S.S.R. which he thought very harmful and much to my amazement he defended our alliest attitude regarding the border states, saying 'Our own attitude was very similar.' He was really delighted with the general point of view which was so different from what I have been hearing lately. He in turn seemed to be glad to talk with one who understood his position. This noon, it was a different story. I sat down with a man who jumped right at the U.S.S.R. and said Soviet old was being used to make Japan Communist. He opposed the F.E.C. and all its vorks and said it was out to gum up McARTHUR, et al."

On April 1, 1946, KEENEY wrote:

"A weekly summary of censored mail comes to our office and it is generally interesting. e also get censored education letters. The Principal of one high school has joined the J.C.P. (Japanese Communist Party) and is out camp-arguing. The newly elected President of one of the Imperial universities is a Socialist and says that whether a man is Socialist or Communist, he should be a University President if selected. He can see certain elements in Tokyo taking a tail spin if these bets came to them.

"I think I am going to have something important to report before very long. I have been so worried about your health due to no mail that I took the bull by the horns to make a contact of sorts. I am doing nothing that ill stir up any noise and you can be sure I am most careful with the world as it is and upset as I am, I had to reach out for someone who could understand my point of view. Three months of watchful waiting is a long time and I am getting a bit fed up on gentlemanly bridge.

On April 11, 1946, ANGUS wrote MARY JAME and apparently made comments to some items of interest that MARY JAME had recently written. Of interest is the following:

FIXE

"DAVE (MAHL) told me about MOORE's fate before he left but I could shed no tears. As for ODRO (PORAH), he is caught in a similar predicament and is unable to make any change. I am glad to hear about ERIC (PEECROWT) and hope he continues to push forth things worth while."

\*\*\*\*

"I am glad about HER AN (KABOT-?). He was one you could always count on. His and SARAM's trip to California ought to be a big thing in their lives. His sudden rise proves the rule for our side."

By the middle of April, 1916, WRY JANE KEENEY had returned from Europe and was again living in Cashington, D. C. In a letter dated April 13, 1946, ANGUS had the following to say:

"Your tamale pie dinner was sure to be a great success.

I am sorry not to have been present. I can see LUD

(ULL AN) getting a belly full, along with HUCH (DeLACEY).

I imagine my name was mentioned once in a while. The

American situation is very precarious. HUCH is never
downhearted. Hence, he may have cheered HULEN (SILVER ASTER)

up a little. GREC (NATHAN GREGORY SILVER ASTER) is probably having a tough time. It would seem as if he could
find another "slot" where he could do something profitable."

On April 15, 1946, ANGUS wrote to MARY JAME and said the

following:

"The meetings you just attended sound very exciting and you saw a wealth of friends. It almost makes me yearn to be back in the midst of things. There are so many important things on the tapes and our HUGHes need plenty of help, including financial. I hope you make a liberal donation to HUGH. He will need it.

"I am interested to see your Paris finery and I can understand how it would intrigue MNA (ROSEMBERG). I am glad about your encounter with the AMDERSONS. Despite their collective peculiarities, I have always had a warm spot for them. I think REBA and ROSER have possibilities.

when you finally get to New York City, I hope you will see DOXEY (VILKERSON) and wife. I am sure you have many

. "Lales which would give him delight. I tried to on him down when I was there last but missed the boat."

.... 200 April 24, 1946, KEENEY wrote:

HUCHER. Everything in this atomic stage is in a state of ditter, except in the U.S.S.R. where the course is clearly marked out, but there, every penny used for protection means a loss to the general well-being of the millions. I think MAHN hit the nail on the head in his cansaer to the question re the Nazi-Soviet fact.

It all ands up to what we have long said; i.e., the final battle has not been fought but there may be no necessity for it. Many things to be settled around the conference table. Hen BYRNES takes VANDEMBERS and COMNOLLY to Paris, the situation presents other difficulties. The threat that we will make an unilateral Italian peace also sounds ominous. I agree in the main with JOE's (BERNETAM) long range view, but the present pot is boiling. To prevent the boiling over is the main task and the U.S. is long on fuel and short on fire preventitives at this time.

On April 26, 1916, AMGUS wrote:

"I had a letter from ITES W. (MAIGLES) who seems to be in high spirits now that he is out of the Government. He thinks there is work in the United States to be done by such as us. That is true but there is plenty to be done anywhere."

The next letter of interest was written on April 29, 1946 and in it ANGUS wrote the following:

"You can rest easy as to all of my actions out here. I was told to take it easy on your account when in Germany but my experience at home when we were active, taught me many things. I am not as prone as the old PHIL (KEENEY) to go into a tail-spin when the wind blows up a storm but the weather lately has indicated quakes and cyclones, hence my particular pains to watch ered with penalties a la McLEISH, the e WY and wait. other stormy ashington period. I presume it is safer for you to entertain than to go to certain places too frequently; but I should not be inclined to trouble trouble at this moment. The foreign situation on the U.S. part stinks on ice but we must wait and see. is no reason for it to give us a cold sweat now. you and I, are better prepared to face immediate eventualities than at any other time in our careers, hence we don't need to worry too much now. Any letters I write to persons mentioned in your safehand delivery will go to you, addressed only to you and you can deliver as opportunity arises."

On May 1, 1946, KEENEY wrote:

"Japan is celebrating her first May Day in many years. It is expected that several hundred thousand demonstrators will take part. Many marchers have gone by our windows including many young men and women. Japanese trucks are loaded with humanity. The marchers have been generally joyful and not grim. I presume to many it is a lark. The subject of food will play a vital part before the day is over. It is expected that clashes may occur. ere there a bona fide Cabinet, demonstrators would surround the Prime Minister's premises. That part of the big parade led by the J.C.P. (Japanese Communist Party) will be well disciplined."

\*\*\*

The parade today was a wonderful and stimulating spectacle. It lasted for about two and one-half hours, i.e., going by our windows. It was very well conducted and the J.C.P.s(Japanese Communist Party) were eplendid. It was rather a dismal day but it did not dampen the enthusiasm of the marchers who carried banners galore of all kinds and descriptions. I heard various persons in our shop make all kinds of nasty remarks as various marchers went by; but I was secretly delighted with the whole display. I

"wanted to be in it, carrying a barner. I was pleased by the many women taking part and by the youthful look of so many. They were showered with torn paper."

On May 4, 1946, ANGUS wrote that he saw recently that

"E. B. (EARL BRO DER) was on the loose in Sweden but seemed to be without a proper visa. It was reported that he was on his way to the U.S.S.R. to look into the political situation. "hat this means is quite incomprehensible to me in far off Tokyo. Conditions alter cases and if the U.S.C.F. (United States Communist Party) has swung full circle, it is hard to answer many questions that are arising in all parts of the world."

Of interest also are certain letters directed by PHILIP KEENEY to WARY JANE, as made available by-Confidential Informant Excerpts of interest are being set forth as follows:

In his letter of September 16, 1946, ANGUS wrote:

"I was sure you would knock them for a loop and I am sorry there wasn't a better response."

This comment apparently refers to a speech that TARY JAME KETNEY gave in New York City at a meeting of the Congress of American Lomen held at the apartment of MACH TINKELSTEIN.

"If they don't donate to such a worthy cause, they wont. I am glad GIBEL will supply FRETA (AUCHOUF) with a watch. I am sorry I could not have watched BROWLY but I am glad I did not hear her line. It was swell to see DONEY (LIKERSON) and to have a date with him when I get back. You sound like the busy bee and you have been sipping and supping from and with our choicest flowers. I am glad you saw JOI (BERNSTEIN) and I hope he makes out without too much difficulty. It will probably take a little time to get going."

On October 2, 1946, APOUS wrote MARY JAME that the MIPPON THES newspaper printed a news story concerning a trip that he, KEENEY, had made, visiting various libraries in Japan. The editorial was reportedly published in the NE YORK TIMES. The MIPPON THES misspelled KEENEY's surname and he is referred to in the article as MILLIP O. KING. This article generally indicates the official work that MIREY was doing in Japan and for that reason is being set forth as follows:

Tokyo, Sunday, September 29, 1946

#### "STREA LINING LIBRARY SYSTEM

"The extension of libraries will make invaluable contributions to the public welfare during the period freconstruction and beyond." - From the U.S. Education Mission to Japan.

Japan has 4,600 public libraries exclusive of university and other school libraries. This is by no means sufficient to cater to the 70,000,000 people of this country. Neither is the size of these libraries large enough, many of them being small institutions possesing less than 3,000 books each. It may also be noted that these libraries are not being as fully utilized as they should be.

"True, the National Library at Uyeno, the only institution of the kind in this country, has approximately 1,000,000 volumes. But this is hardly reassuring if compared with the public libraries of the city of Chicago, which have a total of a little over 2,000,000 volumes. Seven other larger cities in the United States have public libraries possessing more than 1,000,000 volumes each.

. "University libraries in Japan also compare decidedly unfavorably with such american school libraries as Harvard University Library with its more than 4,700,000 volumes and pamphlets. By far the most outstanding is the Library of Congress in ashington, D. C., which contains some 22,639,716 pieces of materials including more than 7,300,000 volumes and pamphlets. This is the largest library in the world and is kept open to the public. It affords an object lesson for those interested in organization and management of libraries.

"Of Japan's public libraries nearly 30 in medium and minor cities were burnt or damaged under aerial attacks during the war. Many other school and private libraries have not recovered from war damages. Library service in this





"country has thus grown from bad to worse. This has certainly proved a serious setback to the proposed inauguration of liberal society and development of free Japanese citizens, which will depend to no small extent on adult education as well as on social education. It is for no other reason than this that the two Houses of the Diet have recently passed a resolution calling for improvement of libraries.

"How the his library service to be improved in this country? The United States Education Mission to Japan in its report in March last recommended that central public libraries, with branches, be established in the larger cities and that appropriate arrangements be made for library service in prefectures. Meanwhile, PHILIP O. KING of C.I.E. is now visiting public libraries in various parts of the country with a view to coordinating all library facilities into a unified system.

"Unification and systematization of libraries will undoubtedly go a long way in democratizing education. Public libraries in this country belong to the State, while practically all of the 46 prefectures have prefectural libraries in their respective centers, these institutions being subsidized by the local autonomous bodies concerned.

"However, no co-ordination has yet been effected among these prefectural libraries. Nor has any attempt been made to compile a common catalog or to exchange inter-library service, which is certain to benefit the public who are seriously deploring the present scarcity of books. The situation is indeed such that many bookstores are concurrently running circulating libraries with inordinately high rates charged to subscribers. The sole concern of those who are engaged in this type of business is profit-seeking and naturally little care is taken to make its management scientific or rational.

"During the war many booklovers in cities removed their libraries into the country to avoid war damage. Some others have donated their libraries to the villages where they chose to live during the war years. Although these individuals may be said to have done creditable





wservices for the cause of culture in this country, systematic co-ordination and organization should be made to characterize future efforts in fostering further culture for the nation. Indeed all libraries should be so co-ordinated as to afford all people, both men and women, young and old, in all urban and rural areas an easy access to books.

"There also is an imperative need to inaugurate a school for the purpose of training librarians and thereby improving library services. On the part of the public, they will have to re-educate themselves so as to become able to take full advantage of library facilities which are thus to be improved. Library service in this country has hitherto failed to make satisfactory progress largely because the public were not enthusiastic enough to stir up public opinion and urge the government to that end. True, poverty now prevails in national life in this country and the people have little time to spare for reading. But man cannot live by bread alone, and they may vell aspire to the highest plane of intelligence while subsisting on the lowest living standard."

Also, in his letter of October 2, 1946, KWENTY had the following to say of interest:


"I am very glad you and JOE (BERNSTEIN) had a happy confabulation. He is a pretty good guy to fall back on in a time like this. The situation is generally tough. It is a pretty sure bet that the Republicans will return to power in 1948 if they do not win the Lower House this year."

It has been lobserved that HILIP OLIN KERNEY generally wrote to his spouse every day and on occasions is even known to have written her twice a day. In another letter dated October 2, 1946, he had the following to write:

"I have read all of your letters carefully and I am gladder than ever that you had JOE (BERNSTERN) to talk with."

#### \*\*\*\*

"Your story about your N.Y.C. trip and visits with MAICLES (MIKE M IGLES), HENRIETIC (BUCKMASTER) and SYBILLE, sounded both exciting and rest ul. I suppose there are many reasons for the downcast feelings of many people. As you say, the energy is preparing us for a third war, despite the

speeding it up. It looks as if HARRY was ready to call out his en. This will mean more coals neaped on the fire. I saw the notice about VERN's removal from P... (PEOPLE'S VORLE, Communist newspaper on the lest Coast) and was slightly shocked. If the church (Communist Party) does not stick together in the present crisis, it will be just too unfortunate. Defenses should be buried now forever. Our feelings were very similar on the night we heard of WALLACE's firing. His book was fresh in my mind, though I know he is quite quixotic and surrounded by a poor assortment of advisors. I think FRFER has shown a very stalwart attitude during the last menths. 'e are, however, in no shape to float a Third Party.

"HARRY F's letter was very sweet. He is one of us and as plenty of guts. I suppose his chances to beat ALA are very slim. The people of Butte (Acntana) should go for HARRY in a big way but even that is doubtful.

"I had a letter from TIKE (PAIGLES of Greenberg) after your visit. He thought you were in fine fettle and he takes great pride in you and knows nothing is too much for you to tackle.

"I am glad that SILVEN ASTERs are feeling generally better. HELEN has had a tough season but with ATATOL'S well again, H LEN will be right side up with care."

On October 3, 1946, among other things 1. GUS wrote the following to LARY JANE:

"The Nurenberg Judges presented the Fascists with a prize trio. I never thought SCIACOT would hang but I expected VON PAPEN to get the noose. I don't know much about FRETZOCI but if he engineered propaganda he deserved a jail sentence. I certainly do not blame the U.A.S.R. for being upset over the whole business. It goes to show that the fight is only beginning and what can be expected from Anglo-American justice.

"I had quite a time last night reading many of the clippings. That will result from the ALLACE contretemps (?) was summed up by a P. . . line to the effect

HARRIET commented that HELEN HEFFER AN cooperates with the American-Russian Institute educational projects and allows her name to be used as a member of the Board of Directors.

HARRIET EDDY also wrote that General YAKHONTOFF had been in San Francisco on a lecture tour, having just returned from several months "over there".

### COLONEL THOMAS

On July 11, 1946, and November 15, 1946, Special Agents
C. J. JONES and JERDIE M. CARLAND obtained from a highly confidential source certain correspondence directed to LARY JANE KEENEY and the diaries that si has maintained for the years 1938 through 1945. At the present time a study is being made of these diaries and items of interest will be reported at a future date. Numerous references have been noted relative to a Col. THOMAS which indicated that the KEENEYS are engaged in espicinage activity at the direction of THOMAS. The identity of THOMAS is unknown at the present time and every effort is being made to identify him.

There is being set forth below the information concerning him and his cohorts as obtained from diaries and letters in the possession of LARY JAHE KELMEY.

The first reference appears in the diary on the date of July 17, 1944, at which time the following was written:

u (GEORGE and JANET) FAXORS and Col. THOMAS for dinner. Discovered he came to see us."

The next reference appears in the dary on the date of July 18, 1944, at which time the following was written:

"Col. THOMAS takes us to dinner and then discovers he came on a wild goose chase."

(The identity and background of GEORGE FAXON will be dealt with later in this report.)

In November of 1945, LARY JAME KEEMEY was in Europe with the Allied Committee on Reparations and PHILIP KEEMEY or ANGUS as he is commonly referred to was in Washington, D. C. ANGUS was preparing to go to Japan where he was to work with the War Department in a study of Japanese Libraries. In a letter dated November 22, 1945, ANGUST wrote the following to LARY JANE:





wI have been in a very strange frame of mind during this whole business. I have never been greatly excited about the trip (to Japan) because it always seemed to be yours by right or knowledged and understanding. However, our friends, including THOLAS, have made it clear that there is a job to do and it falls to my lot to do it. On this basis there is nothing for me to do but to do it and I am game to deliver according to my best judgment. We have some good people along ') he trip to Japan) even if no one is strictly 'Kosher', not even M. S. (MARGARET STONE). I shall caution care and mind my 'P's and Cist."

Several days later, that is on November 24, 1945, ANGUS wrote to MARY JANE and among other things had the following to say:


"Tuesday, more shots, then probably to N.Y.C. on Wednesday. I want to see Col. THOLAS and JCE (BERMSTEIN) among others. URSULA (WASSERIAN) has turned her apartment over to me for as long as I can stay."

In a letter dated November 29, 1945, ANGUS had the following to write, it being noted that he was in New York City at that time.

"I am now ensconced at URSUIA's .....my present schedule is as follows. Lunch today with URSUIA who has as many plans as ED (RCSSKAE).used to have. She wants the Korganthau Fund to finance a study of cartels with me as Director. Tomorrow dine with the LERIANS (the Jefferson School of Social Science) and a long session after dinner with Col. T. ...... I spent several hours with Col. THOMAS which is a pass word to use in the higher circles. He thinks that any mail out of Berlin may be given the once over; hence, some care should be used in wording et cetera. He thinks my projected trip is of great importance and he cannot understand how you left and how I would leave without some comment. He is going to survey the landscape o'er and hopes to find something before I leave. I won't see JOE (BERNSTEIN) because he is in Cleveland for two weeks arranging a dinner for a committee of which he is the executive secretary."

On the following day, November 30, 1945, PHILIP KEENEY was still in New York City and he wrote the following to MARY JAME:

of confusion. I had a long talk with JOSIE (JOSIE TRUELS) and her position today is as of yore. She has had one or ore talks with THOLAS and says he is a most confused man. She said Moscow

asked for a visit from E. B. (EARL ERCEDER) and the State Department agreed to let him go via England and Sweden but not to France and the Party were certain he would be read out of the Party if he went and he has not gone yet. The whole thing adds up to nothing yet and I will check further before I go home. JOSIE has been close to HULL and HOPKINS and they are greatly distribed by the State Department's attitude regarding China and Argentina. It seems that EARSHALL has confabulated with STILMEL and agrees with China's position; hence, his choice to go to China is a good selection. She said further that there is a great debate on in various circles as to whether this is the apropos moment to swell the revolutionary effort everywhere or to let this effort die down. She also thinks that the present Party attitude here is too drastic and that it is calling black black when it is only gray and it is leaving no loophole for the Administration to crawl out of."

On the following day, December 1, 1945, ANGUS wrote to MARY JAME:

"I am at 10 Downey Street.....(residence of URSULA WASSERIAN). .....Last night I had a long session with Col. THOLAS and I left with a terrible sense of responsibility. He is a wonderful person and his remarks about you pleased me no end. He loves both of us and knows we are doing and going to do things; hence, this sense of urgency hangs over me. Everyone here has impressed the same thing on me. In a word I feel as you did when you went away. It all adds up to how badly I need you at this very moment. So long as that is ruled out, I am ready to carry on because I know what I have to do under the circumstances. I am hoping, of course, to get your green light before I take off. Everyone says the KEENEYS are carrying out tremendous assignments but we need to caution care in every way in order to store up and build up what we learn. What I can store up may add meaning for you and vice versa. The world has reached . that boiling point where anything may slop over. Incidents can be cooked up in several spots and we know what an incident means in a time of crisis."

The next reference to Col. THOLAS appears in a letter that PHILIP KEENEY directed to his wife on December 20, 1945. On this date FHILIP KEENEY was in Washington, D. C., and getting ready to go to Japan. The reference to Col. THOMAS is as follows:

"...... The enclosure from THOLAS is a saga in its self. It is wonderful for him that he is returning. It makes me green with envy."

The above-referred to enclosure from THOLAS is a type written note which is undated. The signature was affixed by pen. A photographic copy of this note has been examined by the F. B. I. Laboratory without making an identification.

The note is as follows:

"My dear Angus,

"I wish you a very pleasant and fruitful journey. Send my love and admiration to Li. J. (LARY JAME) and a kiss to MARTY (the KEENEY's dog.)

"The big news is that I have a hegira of my own. On or about January 10, I will be heading for home. Thus no letter will reach me after that date.

\*A Herry Christmas to you, old man, and best wishes from your

"Devoted friend.

/s/ THOLAS"

The next reference to Col. THOLAS appears in ALGUS! letter to LARY JANE dated December 24, 1945. In it he had the following to say:

\*\*......The SILVERLASTERS were as pleased as we are at the news about THOLAS. They were also green with envy and DAVE (WAHL) was delighted. It has taken years for him to return to his home and he has done wonders while away. When our chance comes, we will have a real friend at court.\*\*

In his letter of December 25, 1945, FHILIP KEENEY wrote the following to LARY JANE:

THOLAS and am keeping a couple. It is not quite as good as ED's but very good. LUD did not like it but the SILVERLASTERS did.

"DAVE (WAHL) tells me that many are returning from Europe faster than expected due to frustrations and other discomforts. Anyone that goes and tries to find fault with the way things are run like PLAUT, finds them and gets no where in curing them. PLAUT is returning.

"This leads me to think you may be back sooner than I anticipated, though in Berlin you may find yourself in a spot where you can do some good. I hope before you return you won't feel as if as far as work is concerned that your trip has been a complete fizzle. There is always the chance after you reach Berlin that you may hear from THOLAS."

On or about January 1, 1946, PHILIP OLIN KEENEY proceeded by air to Tokyo, Japan.

The next reference to Col. TIDIAS appears in KEEHEY's letter directed to MARY JAME under date of January 25, 1946. In it he had the following to say:

"Captain WILLIALS (with whom KEENEY shared an office in Tokyo) finds IQUIS FISHER a very eminent authority. I have kept myself clear of any discussions with one and all. I have found myself with a mouthful of crow on several occasions, but there is nothing to be gained in my present environment by leading with your chin. One learns more by listening. The general USSR attitude gets me down from time to time. I presume Col. THOLAS knew what I would find."

On February 2, 1946, FHILIP HEELEY was still in Japan and HARY JANE was in Europe. In his daily letter to HARY JANE, PHILIP wrote:


both in due course. I am certain that we will be reached when something turns up for us to do. I have the feeling, at any rate, that we are both on call now which is more than I have felt for months past. If no call comes, so what, because our whereabouts is on the map and we are ready. We have done everything in our power and that is all we can do."

The next letter of interest is dated April 13, 1946. FHILIP O. KEENEY was still in Japan but his wife, LARY JANE, had returned from Europe and was working in Washington, D. C., for the Foreign Economic Administration. The item of interest in this letter is as follows:

is any hint to the effect that your forces and my forces might break due to contingencies we fail to control. Probably, I might not have come to Japan, had it not been for my serious confabs with Col. THOMAS. Now that I am here it seems as if I were repeating the long dry spell that twice occurred while we were part of JOE B'S (JOE BERNSTEIN'S) plans. I should have followed GREG'S (NATHAN GREGORY SILVERNASTER) advice and relaxed. This is not so simple when you sit in an earthquake area and suddenly find yourself absorbed in another problem, libraries, but not on top of it as may be the case now.\*

The New York Field Division was advised concerning Colonel THOMAS and was requested to attempt to identify him if possible. By letter dated Hovember 14, 1946, the New York field Office advised the following.

"It will be noted in the referenced letter that several references are made to one Colonel THOMAS by the KEENEYS, and it would appear from the correspondence that the name Colonel THOMAS is a code name and that there was some reason for protecting his identity. It will be noted in addition that in one of the letters made available to the Washington Field Division by a highly confidential source, Colonel THOMAS informed PHILIP KEENEY that he was 'heading for home' and that no letters would reach him after January 10th (1946). It is believed that the term 'heading for home' refers to Colonel THOMAS' leaving the United States. Efforts are continuing in this division to effect an identification of Colonel THOMAS through a review of information available concerning his apparent acquaintances and the results of such investigation will be forwarded to the Bureau in the near future.

There is considerable information evallable in the files of the New York Field Division concerning JOSEPHIE TRUSION DAYS and IDUIS LEMAN, both of whom appear to be contacts of foldier in CASS, but a pareful review of such information falls to bring to light any person who might be identical with IEOLAS. Both ADLIS and IERMAN however, are extremely active and have a great many acquaintances of whom this office is cognizant. It may be noted that at no time have technical or physical surveillances been operated on either of these individuals.

"i search has also been made through the files of this office against the name THOMAS, but none appears to be identical with the unknown subject originally described in the Mashington Field Division letter to the Bureau dated October 4, 1946. It is of interest to note, however, that in the report of Special Agent R. N. PRANKE, dated March 9, 1942, at New York City

"In Special Agent PRANKE's report dated June 21, 1941, at New York City, in the same case, information is set out that a ir. VENEIAN of Miegers and Veeneman, body builders, Prospect Park, New Jersey, advised agents that on or about September 5, 1936, V. K. BOCDAN, First Vice-President of the ALTORG TRADING CORPORATION, was making arrangements with that firm for equipping five Packard limousines with bullet proof glass and steel plate for shipment to Russia, and that VEENELAN was asked by BOCDAN to ask for "ir, THOLAS" when telephoning BOCDAN at the ALTORG office in New York.

In spite of the above two instances, however, agents of this office who are familiar with Communist and Russian espionage matter over a period of years state that they are unaware of any Soviet

This situation of course is contrary to that existing between the KEENEYS and THOLAS inamuch as he is mentioned by name in letters from KEENEY to his wife.

#### JOSEPH BERNSTEIN

Col. The AS and PHILIP OLIN KEENEY also attempted to see him in New York City prior to his going overseas to Japan. It is also to be recalled that LARY WANE KEENEY contacted JOE BERNSTEIN immediately after her return to the inited States from Europe.

The information which appears in the diaries of LARY JANE KERNEY relative to JOE BERNSTEIN is of interest. It is noted that BERNSTEIN: traveled to Washington, D. C., very often in 1943 and 1944; that his trips were usually on Tuesdays and Thursdays. It is to be recalled that Informant GREGORY advised that the unidentified "JACK" proceeded from New York to Washington, D. C., on Tuesdays and Thursdays, approximately every two weeks. It is also to be recalled that JOSEPH BERNSTEIN was a suspect in the Amarasia Case and further, that his description generally fits that of "JACK".

The information relative to JCE BERNSTEIN as appearing in the diaries of LARY JANE is being set forth as follows, the date being indicated:

The report of Special Agent LALBERT G. ZANDER on instant case dated October 1, 1946, reflects that PHILIP OLIN KEENEY in a letter dated December 23, 1945, furnished numerous addresses to LARY JANE KEENEY. LARY JANE at this time was in Europe and had lost her address book. Among the addresses furnished was \*FAXON, 130 Center Street, Jamaica Plain. Lassachusetts." Also, it is noted that the telephone number of GEORGE FAXON, namely, Hobart 7525, was found to be among those in the possession of MARY JAME KEENEY as obtained by the Washington Field Office from a highly confidential source on July 11, 1946.









The conversation with IDIS CARLISLE then turned and !ARY JANE said that she had been attempting to locate a girl who recently returned from Germany (BEATRICE BRAUDE) who is in the Department of State in the section known as the State Research Intelligence. IARY JANE said that she wanted to contact this girl because the girl had a message for !ARY JANE from an anti-Fascist in Berlin. LOIS CANTISE remarked that the Information Desk at the Department of State would scon have the telephone listing of this girl if she had recently returned from overseas.

On the same date DAN LEVIN contacted MARY JANE and they agreed to have dinner with KATHLEEN LEVIN at Aldo's Restaurant, 1143 New Hampshire Avenue, N. W.

On November 3 1016 only one contact was made according to Confidential Informant and that was between LARCUS GOLDMAN and MARY JANE KEENEY. It is to be recalled that LARCUS GOLDMAN is an old friend of LARY JANE KEENEY, whom she associated with when she was active in the Lashington Cooperative Bookshop. LARCUS advised LARY JANE that he had received a bright idea that it would be good for the Letropolitan Broadcasting Company to broadcast the concerts which are held in the Library of Congress. LARY JANE agreed that it was an excellent idea but commented that the Letropolitan Broadcasting Company would only broadcast from sunup until sundown and that for that reason it would not be practical.

On November 4, 1946, BOTEN SHITH contacted MARY JAME KEENEY and suggested that when ANGUS KEENEY returned to Mashington that they should have a gathering inasmuch as OTEN and ELEANOR LATTIFICED were anxious to see ANGUS. BOTEN then asked if LARY JAME had had any recent contact with DAN LEVIN. LARY JAME replied that LEVIN had been in town over the past weekend and that he is in New York working for United Nations but actually is under the Department of State. She continued that when LEVIN first went up to the United Nations meeting that he thought he might be broadcasting in Russian to the Soviet Union but that the more LEVIN thought





about it, the less he liked the idea, "for obvious reasons": ARY JANE said that then LEVIN received an opportunity to do straight reporting for the U. N. O. and that is what he is doing now. BCWEN and LARY JANE agreed that the broadcasting idea would be rather treacherous at this time. BOWEN commented that "under ideal circumstances, it would have been perfect but not under the existing circumstances". LARY JANE commented that the LEVINS have already moved to New York.

The conversation between LARY JANE and EGTEN then turned and he asked her if she is acquainted with CARL GREEN'S friend JCE BERGER (PH) to which LARY JANE andwered in the negative. DOWNER explained that BERGER is a friend of CHARLIE-BLATO (PH) and that BERGER, his wife and twelve-year old child are going to Loscow for a year or two.

The conversation then turned

On November 4, 1946, Dr. HERIAN CABOT contacted LARY JANE and asked about her health. LARY JANE went into great details discussing the arthritis that she has in her elbows and shoulders and also commented that she expected ANGUS KEENEY to arrive in Washington the following day. HERIAN expressed a desire to see ALGUS while he was in Washington.

Also on November 1, 1946, according to ANNA BEREISON of the U. A. W., C. I. O., contacted IARI JAME. ANNA said that she had been attempting to reach LUCY and GROFF CONKLIN but that she received no answer. ANNA commented that she had recently arrived in Washington and asked IARY JAME how she liked THOLAS's speech on the radio (R. J. THOLAS). LARY JAME commented that she believed that THOLAS has a lot of conviction to which ANNA replied that she, ANNA, was with THOLAS and was writing notes to him telling him to do this and say this and that. ANNA also commented that Senator LYERS had liked the speech very much and had asked for a transcript. (This conversation apparently is in reference to the meeting of the C. I. O. which was held in Atlantic City and at which the expulsion of Communists was a main issue of debate).

LARY JANE asked if she had seen JULES (KCRCHEIN?) in New York to which ANNA replied in the negative.

ANNA then said that she may have a good job for MARY JAME and asked if MARY JAME would like to go to the Mid-Mest for an exciting job in consumer education and organizing housing cooperatives. MARY JAME said that she was making no decision until she had conferred with AMGUS KEEMEY.

ANNA went on to explain that the position that she had in mind for HARY JANE KEENEY would be in Columbus, Ohio, and that the General Homes Company is interested in setting up a consumer group and has a U. A. J. Union in it. The head of the company is liberal and expects to sell houses for approximately \$6000. The C. I. O. expects to purchase some of these homes which are prefabricated. The houses will be sold to members of the U. A. W., C. I. O. on a non-profit basis but the C. I. O. will need a staff of individuals to make analyses of various communities; that is, the availability of land, the cost of land, the income of the workers and so forth. ANNA said that her pain this scheme is to actually go out and talk with the tenants and organize them into tenant groups. LARY JANE commented that she thought it was a wonderful idea and that she would get in touch with ANNA.

On November 5, 1946, IARY JAME received a wire from ANGUS KEENEY that he would arrive in Washington, D. C., about 3:00 P. II., that date, Late on November 5, 1946, ANGUS KEENEY conversed with LILLIAN DUNAMAY and told her that he had arrived in Washington about 6:00 P. M., and would come over to her home about 9:30. LILLIAN commented that DAVE WAHL would be there and suggested that ANGUS bring HARRIET SHEONS (PH) with him when he and LARY JAME came over to her home.

On November 6, 1946, according to ANGUS KEENEY contacted the Civil Affairs Division of the War Department attempting to locate Mr. LARK-ORR who was ANGUS's superior in Tokyo. ANGUS was unsuccessful in his attempt to locate ORR.

The next contact was made between AMGUS and HELEN SILVERIASTER and AMGUS asked that she, her husband and ULLIAN come over that evering at 7:00 P. M.. The invitation was accepted but HELEN said that they would have to leave early because they had been out late every evening that week.

ALIX FLUTHER and MARY JANE had a conversation on November 6, 1946, according to at which time they discussed the election returns. IARY JANE commented that it gave her a very wry feeling and ALIX commented that the worst aspect concerning the elections was the "political immaturity of the people who would vote that way." ALIX then turned the conversation and stated that there was an article in PL that had a story about a new radio station which had applied for a FM license with the F. C. C. ALIX said that NORMAN CORMAN (PM) and some good progressive people were backing this station. The station would have no commercials and would be for the people entirely.

Informant advised that on November 6, 1946, ANGUS KEENEY conversed with H. BOMEN SKITH. BOMEN expressed his eagerness to see ANGUS in order that he might hear some of ANGUS's experiences. ANGUS replied

"Mum is the word, but I'll talk", and BOTEN volunteered to limit the company. It was decided that BOTEN SITTH would get in touch with the OTEN LATTE CRES and arrange a meeting.

Following this conversation ALICE McLEAN JONES, an old friend of the KEENEYS, contacted ANGUS KEENEY and introduced her husband TONES. ALICE said that her husband's full name is CATESBY THOMAS JONES and that he is very anxious to meet ANGUS. The asked if ANGUS had seen much of LARCARET STOME overseas and he replied that LARCARET returned about the first of December. ALICE then asked if ANGUS had seen GERTRUDE to which he replied a little.

On November 7, 1946, DOROTHY TODD contacted LARY JAME and ANGUS KEENEY and advised that she has some clothing for LARY JAME to send overseas. DOROTHY also remarked that her husband, LARRY TODD, was in New York City residing at the Taft Hotel.

IARY JARE next unsuccessfully attempted to reach DAN D. IEVIN at Executive 0930 and was advised that the number had been disconnected.

PHILIP OLIN KEENEY then contacted LARK T ORR on Extension 71680, War Department, and invited ORR and his wife for dinner on November 8, 1946. ORR advised that he was stopping at the Hotel Statler, Room 525. The invitation was accepted and ANGUS agreed to pick them up at 7:00 P. M.

Informant has advised that the KEENEYS were active on November 7, 1946, and that they next contacted BOB-SCHMARTZ at which time they had a general conversation concerning their respective families and made indefinite plans to get together later.

CARL GREEN then contacted ANGUS KEENEY at which time they decided that they would see each other that evening and have a talk together.

LARY JANE KEENEY next conversed with ETHEL IECHANIC ALPER and invited ETHEL and BEN for dinner either Saturday or Sunday evening and it was decided that they would come on Saturday, November 9.

On November 8, 1946, LUCY CUMILIN contacted MARY JAME KELLEY and LUCY stated that she had contacted TEARL concerning the position and that PEARL declined MARY JAME's offer until after New Year's. LUCY also said that her husband, GROFF, had not seen WALTER SISSAIAN (who is employed by the U. M. W., C. I. O. in the Chicago-Detroit area.) However, GROFF had seen LUCY\_SASSAIAN who advised that WALTER liked the work fine and

that he was "building from within very carefully". LUCY SASSAIAN told GROFF COLKLIN that the only thing of any importance that WALTER was doing was that he had an appointment to see WALTER REUTHER's brother. LUCY also advised that her brother-in-law, BILL-CONKLIN, was in Washington and that he was coming to her home for dinner that evening. LUCY said that she had not seen him for three or four years and WARY JAME remarked that she knew BILL CONKLIN but that she was never attracted to him.

The next information as made available by Confidential Informant preared on November 12, 1946, at which time DOROTHY TODD contacted ANGUS KELIEY and advised that LARRY TODD had just returned to Mashington and would remain in Mashington until November 17, 1946.

HARY JANE then contacted a Hiss CHRISTENSON and advised that ANGUS KEENEY would be glad to speak to the Institute of Pacific Relations on the librarian situation in Japan. HARY JANE asked if SHIRLEY JENKIES were in and after receiving a negative answer, requested that SHIRLEY call her at her convenience.

The next contact with individuals was made by iARY JANE KEENEY with BEATRICE BRAUDE, on Extension 2403 of Executive 6101. BEATRICE advised that she had a message for IARY JANE from HEIEN SCOTH. IARY JANE and BEATRICE made an appointment to have lunch at the 400 Club at 12:15 on November 13, 1946. BEATRICE described herself as being small with brown hair and said that she would be wearing either a bright green or a bright orange coat. LARY JANE said that she would be wearing a blue suit or a black coat. (Background information relative to BEATRICE BEAUDE and HELEN BOOTH will be set forth later on in this report.)

On November 12, 1946, PARY JANE next contacted SYLVIA SCHILLEL and they discussed the recent Republican victory and PARY JANE requested SYLVIA have JANE ROBINSON arrange one of his Chinese dinners. Sylvia said that she thought that it was a fine idea and that she would arrange it some time after Thanksgiving.

LUCY answered in the negative and LARY JAME sa that she desired that LUCY and CROFF pay them a visit and see some of the items that ANGUS had brought back to the States with him from Japan. IARY JAME then told LUCY that she and ANGUS were leaving on Friday, November 15, for New York City and that they would stay with friends in Brooklyn, New York.

LARY JANE next contacted BEATRICE SCHWARTZ and stated that she and ANGUS would pay them a visit at approximately 8:30 P. II., if BOB SCHWARTZ would be home. BEATRICE advised that BOB would be there and expressed her delight at having the KEENETS want to visit.

ANGUS KEENEY then contacted Libry TODD of Tass News Agency and advised him that they were going to New York on Friday but would like to see the TODDS before leaving. They decided that Thursday night would probably be the best but no definite arrangements were made. LARRY said that he had been at the U.N.O. meeting and shook hards with MCIOTOV, VISHINSKY and friends on the night of November 11, 1946. TODD said that he felt that KOLOTOV's and the other's positions were assured. LARRY said further that he had heard comments from a number of French writers and that it is too bad that they are unable to see that the chasm is widening between Washington and Europe. ANGUS then commented that NOVER (PH) had commented in his column that the French election is a swing to the right, meaning that the Socialist Party is in the middle of the road and has been going down hill for the past few months. IARRY interjected his. comment and said that NOVER's article is a lot of nonsense to which ANGUS agreed. The conversation then turned to the French loan and TODD expressed the opinion that the Republican Farty and the Southern Democrats would probably try to cut off loans and relief abroad to French people and other Europeans, and not merely to those countries who were Leftists but to all starving people of Europe.

IARRY TODD then commented that he had heard a rumor that Prime Minister BEVIN's Labor Farty is insisting that BEVIN yield and make a kind of catch-all proposal to the U. S. S. R. which would be tantamount to putting the British back in the middle-man position between the U. S. A. and the U. S. R. TODD said that he did not know if the rumor were true

but if it were true, he believed that the elections in France and Italy were responsible for the decision of the British Labor Party. In terminating the conversation, TODD commented that he believed that "we are having a lot of economic stupidity".

On November 13, 1946, according to Confidential Informant IARY JANE KEENEY contacted IESTER KLEPPER at Republic 7500 on Extension 72025. KLEPPER stated that he had tried to reach IARY JANE unsuccessfully to advise her that his brother-in-law, BCB, was in Washington and that he, IESTER, would be unable to visit IARY JANE. IARY JANE commented that she and ANGUS were going to New York and KLEPPER requested that if MARY JANE saw URSULA WASSERIAN that she advise URSULA that he had been unable to get to New York but would do so as soon as possible. KLEPPER asked that IARY JANE tell URSULA that he had contacted his family about giving "the stuff" to URSULA but that the family had refused to take the responsibility for sorting it. LARY JANE commented that URSULA was working for the United Nations Organization on a three-month appointment, the extension of which was subject to the will of either party.

KLEPFER then said that he had been in touch with A. P. C, but it refused to talk about hiring anyone until its absorption into the Department of Justice. KLEPFER continued that the branch of A. P. C. that he thought UNSUIA would be most interested in working under is not interested in hiring individuals who are not lawyers. LARY JANE promised to relay the messages to URSUIA and reminded KLEPFER that URSUIA's address is 110 Christopher Street, New York City.

MARY JANE next contacted PHILIP DUNAMAY and said that she desired to discuss the Metropolitan Broadcasting Company with him. MARY JANE said that she had seen ED BRECKER and had had a serious talk with him and that she feels badly because a split has arisen among the people for whom she has great respect. LARY JANE commented that there are always difficulties with certain groups but in your own group, betrayals are very difficult. LARY JANE said that she was interested in the radio station and that she would like to discuss the matter with PHIL personally and would probably go out to see him on November 14.

DUNAWAY commented that he and his wife were making plans to return to New York but that he had not received any definite offer yet.

On November 14, 1946, according to LARY JAIE KELNEY contacted HURRAY LATTHER and advised him that she and AHGUS were going to New York for a eight or ten-day stay.

He contacted him at National 9086 and advised him that he would like to attend the meeting of the American Library Association at Chicago, Illinois, in December. ORR expressed his approval. On November 15, 1946, Western Union contacted ANGUS KEENEY and furnished the following message: "Sailing. Sorry very sick. Happy you're home. Love to both. Signed PHYLLIS." The message was sent from New York City and it is believed to be from PHYLLIS ERGAN, wife of ALFRED BROWN, who is with the American Red Cross.

On the same date, LUCILLE EZEKIEL contacted LARY JANE and invited the KEENEYS to a party on Sunday, November 24, 1946. LARY JANE stated that she was going to New York and that if she returned in time she and ANGUS would attend.

GERTRUDE EVANS next contacted MARY JAME KEENEY and asked if she would accept the chairmanship of the Win the Peace Conference" on November 16, 1946. MARY JAME declined the honor and stated that she was leaving for New York City soon.

Her present position with the Department of State is that of a research analyst, salary 13648 per annum. She received a Bachelor Degree from Hunter College in 1933 and was formerly employed by the Office of Strategic Services in September 1943. Her father, LAX-TRAUDE, resides at 220 West 107th Street, New York City, is a native of Lithuania and was naturalized in 1912.

HEIEN II. BOOTH is the wife of ALFRED HAIL BOOTH, who has entered into instant investigation previously. HEIEN BOOTH's father, JAMES LAYERS, and her mother, ROSA HEMERCHIEZ WIERS, were both born in Russia, entered the United States in 1838 and tecame citizens in 1894.

In 1928, HELEN BCOTH was employed by the Consumers' League of East Pennsylvania, Philadelphia, Pennsylvania. In 1929 she was employed by The Inquiry", New York City. At the entrance to the apartment one man detached himself from the group and walked to a Ford automobile parked near Cathedral Avenue, which he entered and drove away. This car bore D. C. License 119-348, which is registered to ELWARD M. BERNSTEIN. The other four men entered HARRY MAGDOFF'S car. This car was surveilled to the Statler Hotel by Agents, where two men entered while MAGDOFF and one companion circled the block. Agent ZANDER observed one man go to the check room, accompanied by a small elderly hunchbacked man who had left the car with him. They secured a brown suitcase and walked to the Street entrance of the Statler where the hunchbacked man said goodby and the other man entered MAGDOFF'S car.

The hunchbacked man was identified by Agent ZANDER as Dr. OFTO NATHAN, 55 East 10th Street, New York City, who registered at the hotel on November 13, 1946, and planned to depart November 15, 1946. Prior investigation had revealed that subject had been in correspondence with ENRIAN ALISLEE, of Washington, D. C. The files of the Washington Field Office reflect that MARIAN ALISLEE is an official of the American Committee for Spanish Freedom, and that she is known to several Commists around town, including BILL TAYLOR, ELIZABETH-STARLE, MARK STALCUP, and possibly others.

Information has been received that subject formerly had an account at the Hamilton National Bank in Washington, however, Special Agent J. BERNARD COOK contacted this bank and was advised that there was no record of an account under the name of INES IUNOZ

In a report dated Earch 27, 1944, of the Petropolitan Police Tevartment at Washington, T. C., at the request of this office, the following unformation was not forth concerning ISABUL OLDER and her husband, APPEND H. At the time of that investigation the OLDERs resided at 2807 Connecticut Avenue, N. V., Apartment 305.

A credit report describes her as in her early 201s with one child, 17 months of age. The date of this report was Webruary 2, 1944. ISARU GLER formerly lived at 520 Third Street, Apartment 3, which she shared with her sister-in-law, hiss JULIA CLER. She came to Washington from #16 Evergreen Avenue, Partford, Connecticut, and at one time lived at Testbrook, Connecticut.

A credit report lated Fairmary 2, 1944, reflects that ANDER. H. OLDER was employed by the Padio Daily, New York City. He did photographic work and free-lance writing. He claimed an income of 90 a week at that time. He was incomely employed as a clerk by OLI, appointed October 1, 1942; resigned Tecamber 1, 1942. Hrs. OLDER was employed by the Civil Service Commission at an appeal reviewer at a salary of 2,000 per annum. The was appointed Fetruary 2, 1942, and was transferred to the war Tepartment on April 25, 1943.

There was no criminal record on either of these persons at the etropolitan Police evaruent.






MANOTHY A. LANTIT, Secretary to CongressmankOFFLalain, was interviewed during this investigation. She advised she had known JILIA CLIER since childhood and had attended college with her. She stated she seldom talks with her in regard to politics because she knows they do not agree politically. She stated she doesn't think hiss OLIER is a member of the Communist Party or that she would be harmful to the United States. She stated she recalls his ollier had followed the Communist Party line in that she was originally for the "United Front" and then changed her mind at the time of the Russo-German Fact to one of isolationist and again at the time of the invasion of Russia she changed her attitude to all-out aid to Russia.

Miss OLTER was interviewed by an Agent of this Bureau and a statement under eath was taken during the Hatch Act investigation in which she denied being a member of the Communist Party or of any organization advocating the overthrow of the United States by force of arms.

The New York City report reflects that J'LIA OLER was dismissed from OSS by Colonel ROMOVAN because she asked for a confidential file on a Ukrainian leader named delGORIV under the pretext that it was wanted in connection with official business by British Intelligence. It appears that ORIGORIEV was an anti-Communist who had a civil suit bending at that time against ALEET E. LAHN, Editor of "The Hour", who had called GOGCHEV a Nazi Agent. It was the belief that JULIA OLER wanted to reveal the contents of this file to ALEET E. KAHN so that he could prepare a defense in this suit.

Mr. RICHARD ROBIAN, former of OSS, now with the Amalgamated Trade Union, New York City, stated that it is his opinion that JULIER was working for ALPERT KARN and was a member of the Communist Party or that she was very close to it.

Mrs. CECILLE L. MARIN, CSS, stated that she knew only that JULIA CLUER asked permission to take certain files out of the office of OSS to turn them over to a Russian News Agency.

Investigation reflects forther that her employment with CCI was terminated on June 26, 1942. It was subsequently ascertained during this investigation from the files of this office that MULTA OLDER discussed her Civil Service appeal with <u>ACTROBINSON</u> of OCI and Dr. MATHAN HELFOOTT. It was also determined that she probably furnished the story of her dismissal to the Hi newspaper for publicity purposes.

#### A. GEORGE SILVERIAN

The following investigation was conducted by Special Igent J. (Anavan during the period from November 16, 1906 through November 30, 1906. The mail cover placed on this individual during the above period met with negative results.

Confidential Informant wirmshed the following information concerning SILVINIAN'S activities, from November 16 through November 30, 1946.
