The complex was comprised of three buildings, approximately three to four stories, side-by-side, with the law firm being the center building. On the right side was described as a doctor's office and nothing was mentioned regarding the building on the left. The upper stories of the buildings appeared to be apartments. She understood this to be the headquarters for a group known as the NATIONAL LABOR FEDERATION.

The four of them went into the law office, which was done by going through the front door, then going to the left down a hallway to a room, estimated in size to be 24 feet by 24 feet. She observed in the law office a long table and desk. She met four or five people in the office, whose names she could not recall. She was introduced as and b6 was there for a visit. The people there were very friendly and b7C she was made to feel very welcome.

The law office was decorated impressively. She noted there were two telephones, what appeared to be a computer terminal and two or three two-way radios (handi-talkies) on the desk. She noticed from the conversations going on that the word organizing was used a lot.

She was taken up to the second floor, which consisted of going out to the front entrance hallway, going up a stairway to a door, which was buzzed open by someone sitting at a table on the other She recalls the second floor consisting basically of four main rooms. She recalls there being a kitchen in the rear, then going toward the front was a room known as the "meeting room," then a small room used as a bedroom, a bathroom, then a room that appeared to be some type of work room, which had files and tables and in the front room facing the street was the "watch room." In the watch room someone was stationed 24 hours a day looking out toward the street. She was told the watch was necessary because of the neighborhood in which they were located, which was very run-down. This room appeared generally off limits. She believed a radio was in the room and the person on the watch did some writing, perhaps keeping a log. She recalls all the rooms led into a central hallway.

In the room containing the tables and files, she saw oil paintings of what she thought were LENIN and STALIN. One of the men was with a woman, perhaps his wife. There also was a picture or painting of a man, what impressed her to be a Soviet Union military uniform.

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In regards to the Thanksgiving festivities on the evening of November 24, 1983, food was prepared in the upstairs kitchen and served in the meeting room to what she believed to be approximately 80 people as had said. It impressed her how well people were dressed and at the time she thought it was rather strange if the organization was just helping people, why they were dressed so well. It impressed her that many of the people that came did not reside at the building all the time.

After eating chairs were set up in the meeting room and a meeting/lecture was conducted by a person known as (LNU) and an unknown black man. was a white male,

Western Farm Workers Association is an ad hoc committee comprised of local seasonal workers, clergymen, students and concerned private citizens working together on a volunteer basis in the hope that a permanent solution to the problems involving the migrant and seasonal farmworker in the United States in general and the Western States in specific can be reached. The Association has no paid employees and exists only through the dedication and participation of its' membership. Outside the stated goal, no other aim or aspiration is being served.

Many who have joined the organizing committee came from the ranks of seasonal and migrant farmworkers, themselves. Others had experience in direct service organizations, or the civil rights movement. Persons in other communities with successful experience in farm labor problems were approached and some volunteered their services. When a volunteer membership reached a level considered to be representative of the community, a drive was launched to band local seasonal workers together collectively to consider their own problems.

Western Farm Workers Association currently endorses no pragmatic solution to the host of problems currently surrounding the farm labor situation. It is the current aim of the group to form from the ranks of local seasonal farm workers an organization, banded together to enjoy benefits currently denied to the worker. As the membership grows, more benefits will be added. These benefits will be suggested by the membership itself. A fee of approximately 62¢ per month will be charged to the participating member. As the organization continues to grow, we believe that farmworkers themselves will be placed in a better position to judge both their needs and the method by which these needs can be satisfied. It is hoped that for the first time, the here-tofore unrepresented seasonal farmworker himself will form an organization in which he has a voice in deciding both his fate and his future.

CHA FIGHTS FOR THE RIGHTS OF WORKERS & RECIPIENTS

CHA benefits program volunteers, with the aid of the Coalition of Concerned Medical Professionals, won back pay for an attendant care (A/C) worker and increased hours of In-Home Care for a disabled member in two separate cases in March, as more of Alameda County's Unrecognized workers request CHA's aid.

One CHA member, an attendant care worker for Alameda County A/C program, finally won several months of back wages, after 6 months of continual advocacy with the local county administration. Another member, 91 years old and bedridden, was reevaluated as "ambulatory" by a county social worker. CHA's benefits case worker enlisted the assistance of CCMP doctors for evidence to the real degree of disability. As a result, her hours of In-Home Care were raised from 6 hours to 48 hours.

CHA began in California in 1973 when Attendant Care workers in Sacramento County mobilized in the face of a pay cut to \$1.65 per hour and demanded collective bargaining recognition from Sacramento County. Over the last 8 years, Alameda County CHA has been instrumental in



CHA HELPS ALTERNATIVE PRESS COMMITTEE BEGIN

On March 6 to 10, 1983, California Homemakers Association (CHA) and Bay Area Alternative Press Committee (BAAP) sponsored a seminar on newsletter production for over thirty volunteers from various organizing drives on the West Coast, including Bay Area CHA and the Coalition of Concerned Medical Professionals. This was the first in a series of special projects designed to provide alternative resources for organizing drives of unrecognized workers. BAAP Committee, currently operating out of CHA's office at 1666 7th St. in Oakland, is an all-volunteer organization that neither seeks nor solicits government or corporate funds. The Committee

advocating for the rights of Attendant Care workers and recipients. In 1978 CHA spoke at a series of meetings with the county Board of Supervisors, demanding to represent the over 5,000 workers in the county's In-Home Program. During those appearances, CHA pointed to the deplorable conditions of the workers and the county's mandate for the health and welfare of Attendant Care workers. While the county agreed about conditions Attendant workers faced, nothing resulted from the series of County Board meetings as county In-Home Social Services began to be cut nationwide.

Viola Mitchell, the President of CHA, having launched the organizing efforts in Sacramento, spoke in front of the State Industrial Wage Commission about the minimum wage, stating that "CHA cannot endorse the minimum wage because the minimum wage, whatever it is, is always the maximum for workers uncovered by the National Labor Relations Act and its dubious protections."

In the past year, the minimum number of hours of Attendant Care has dropped from 12 hours a

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CHA'S CANVASSES RETURN TO EAST & NORTH OAKLAND

Over the last month, CHA volunteer canvassers returned to North and East Oakland neighborhoods, doubling the number of members signed up on the canvasses. Volunteer canvassers brought back reports of 60% to 70% unemployed service workers in some areas while many others. held only part-time jobs.

In many of the North and East Oakland neighborhoods canvassed years ago, CHA has provided benefits for service workers often living on the same block as community residents who have supported the CHA benefits program with food, clothing and other resources. Three to four canvassers go out weekly to these neighborhoods at this time, and many longtime members have joined the canvasses to help sign up their neighbors, some of whom are now unemployed. At a recent house meeting, a newly signed member stated, "For all of these years, I have supported CHA's benefits program for lowincome workers, but I never thought that it would happen to me and so many others that I know. I have been out of work now for over 6 months."

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provides actual printing of literature free of charge or at minimum cost to independent organizing drives and others such as CHA through a volunteer staff. As such, it also provides training of other volunteers in some of the practical skills of the production of their newsletters on a "labor donated" basis.

BAAP Committee was formed in October 1982, through the efforts of CHA members and the Citizens for Service Workers, a loosely formed organization of community citizens who provide resources and volunteer labor for organizations of unrecognized workers in the Bay Area, such as CHA, after seeing years of attempts by government-funded organizations to provide printing for low-income workers which failed in the face of diminishing government support. The Bay Area Alternative Press Committee is constituted by the Alameda County Workers Benefits Council, which has temporarily loaned the use of its press and its office facilities.

BAAP Committee is modeled after a similar organization, the Long Island Alternative Press (LIAP), which grew out of the needs of the Eastern-Farmworkers Association, an organization of farmworkers formed in 1972. Guy Anderson, the Print Director and Organizing Committee member of BAAP Committee received extensive training from LIAP in the winter and spring of 1982. Prior to his training with LIAP, Guy Anderson was the Print Coordinator for Bay Area CHA. Guy's experience with this association and printers thoughout Northern California contributed to the formation of BAAP Committee.

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

week to 4. The county has recently installed a computerized system called the "Prueger Equity Scale" which has resulted in the determination of minimum hours and services eligibility. The equity scale was inspired and invented by Prueger, a UCB professor of Social Welfare, who used UCB students as researchers and as a control group to deal with the state defined problem of inequity in Social Work decisions. "Equity or lack of equity has been the problem," stated Carol Haddad, CHA's operations manager. "There have been dozens of studies on the conditions of Domestic, A/C Workers and recipients. The conditions, however, remain deplorable for Domestic workers, the second largest and one of the lowest paid workforces in the United States, whose average life span has declined from 52 years to 49 years in the last 10 years."

Last year another ½ million dollars was cut from Alameda County's 10 million dollar budget and as a result, 10% more of the recipients are expected to be cut from the program.

Benefits staff volunteer, Lilia Garcia, explained, "We began organizing 8 years ago on behalf of Alameda County's Attendant Care and other Unrecognized workers because we knew that the government funded programs wouldn't hold up and meet the needs of our membership. Our Benefits Program has been able to grow and expand over the years because it depends solely on the support of the community and voluntary help. More volunteers are needed now to expand our benefits program of Information & Referral, non-emergency Dental care, medical and legal advice, job related legal advice, and the California Service Worker monthly newsletter as the government cuts in IHSS and many other government programs affect our membership. Canvassing is the original method that CHA used to organize our members. Volunteers led by a canvass captain go in teams door to door, to sign up members, take benefits requests and offer participation in the Alameda County. Workers Benefits Council. Over 40 WBC delegates meet weekly to set policies and to oversee CHA's Benefits Program. At a recent meeting, a member who has been working for the same employer for the last 14 years, reported that his work hours had been reduced from 5 days to 1 day a week. Others reported similar problems of lay-offs and reduced hours with new jobs far and few between.

Susan Hunter, CHA's Membership Coordinator, explains, "There are now 6 people on CHA's Canvass Captain Training Program, a program that enables volunteer organizers to receive onthe-job-training to coordinate and captain canvasses. More volunteers are needed to canvass neighborhoods in the Oakland area so that we can reach more families who can join CHA." The canvasses go out on Tuesdays and Thursdays at 3:00 p.m. and Saturdays at 11:30 a.m. We need you to join-dozens of us on our canvasses, provide transportation for the canvassers or money for the gas expenses. INFORMATION FOR FULL-TIME ORGANIZERS

Requirements There are only two qualifications for working with CHA, a commitment to the interests of domestic and service workers, and respect for the decisions and policies of the organization. Training is provided in any skills the organization requires. If you already have skills and experience in areas such as organizing, languages, mechanics, the arts, law, and medicine, there is probably a place where this can be put to use.

Kinds of Work Organizational functions are arranged into an interrelated structure: Systems. Although pretty much unique in the present day U.S., this plan is similar to those used in many of the old union organizing drives. Organizers take on specialized work in one or more Systems after a period of training and orientation. In addition, all full-time workers (we use the term "cadre") share all the basic day-to-day jobs: benefits program delivery, public speaking, canvasses of neighborhoods, newsletter production, and office work.

Living conditions There are no salaries paid by CIA. This is done not only to cut expenses, but to avoid creating a vested self-interest which might conflict with the interests of service workers. We have seen many organizers turned into poverty pimps and labor bureaucrats by this process. We take care of our people and arrangements can be made to cover any genuine need.

Working Conditions Althought our organizers are unpaid, they are considered to be professionals in the highest sense of the word. Whether canvassing a neighborhood or analysing a complex tactical maneuver we approach our work with applied experience, dedication and skill. The hours are long, and cadre are or call twenty-four hours a day, seven days a week. There are other kinds discipline - for a number of reason, we can't allow drinking in CHA offices will while on organizational business.

How to get here: If you're interested in the Bay Area organizing drive, the best way to find out more is to come out for a visit. We'll show you around, give you some work, and provide food and housing. By plane, get a Hight either into the Oakland or San Francisco Airport. If we know when you're arriving, thall be able to meet you. By car: if coming from San Francisco or from the north, Take Route to route 17 south and get off at the 14th street exit. Turn right on Cyprass : ... at the end of the exit, proceed to 7th street and turn right again. Our offic is located directly across from the Main Post Office. From the South, take Post 17 North to the 8th Street Exit. Turn left on 8th Street and proceed to Campba. Street, turn left to 7th Street, take a right on 7th Street and park, From the East, take Route 24 West toward Downtown Cakland. Exit at the end of the freeway and proceed down Brush Street to 7th Street. Turn right on 7th Simuch and our office is about (IO blocks) straight ahead. The train station is about mile from the office and the bus (either Greyhound or Continental) station is about I mile from the office. Just call and we'll pick you up, or let us know you are arriving and we'll arrange to meet you.

It took me 30 seconds to remember who you are -- but ______mentioned you several times, and in fact your letter was the best news I've had all week. You could arrange for a visit anytime--the sooner the better. I find myself thinking of all kinds of literature we are about to send to the printer that isn't ready yet. I'll forward that later, but in the meantime I've enclosed some of our old standards.

The first thing I can tell you about organizing is that it won't be anything like you imagine it now--it never is for anyone. Its a lot of long hours and meticulous work, but it adds up to the only effective labor movement in the United States today.

We use a lot of methods that have gone out of style in favor of flashier media tactics--methods like door to door canvassing. We have found that an arm's length approach is more effective. In fact we spend about 80% of our time on the phone, because an organizer's job, first and foremost, is to find people with the time and kkills necessary to do the work of the organizing drive.

You'll find in some of the literature the concept of "unrecognized workers" who are the primary grouping of our membership. We are excluded from the dubious benefits of the National Labor Relations Act. For many of our members, the minimum wage is the maximum wage. Our goals lie not in any charitable concept of aid to the poor, but in a strategy to put the labor movement back on the offensive, beginning with the lowest paid workers who are often used to undermine the wage scale of others. We do have a benefits program, described in the enclosed leaflets. Many workers have come to expect such benefits from their job. Ours have never had them. In the past year, 16 million workers across the country have lost medical benefits alone.

I would certainly invite you to come and work with us for a week, or a month, or whatever time you have, and see what you think. The revolutionary implications of building organization that can represent the common interests of temporary workers, domestic workers, farm workers, independent contractors—number in all well over 50 million—are enormous. Basically what we'll do is put together a very full schedule for you to participate in the whole range of activities we run, including classes on labor history and organizational method. We can arrange housing and similar necessities for full time organizers. As has told you, we be have no paid starr, only volunteers.

EFWA is closer to you, so you may want to try visiting there first. Its the first organizing drive of our type in the country. But you are welcome to visit out here as well. In fact, the sooner the better. We always need more people.

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Dear genetic antecendents,

Rastus Harris, better known as Pop, died October 27th at the age of 70. We had just celebrated his birthday in the hospital 2 1/2 weeks previous. He outlived Joe Coleman, I.M. Young & Co. Manager, and Jack Alford, notorious Long Island poverty pimp who used to cure 12 migrants of alcoholism for a \$100,000 federal grant and then turn them loose on the labor camps again. He also outlived the U.S. Dept. of Labor statistics for agricultural labor life expectancy by 21 years.

Rev. Arbbur Elcombe did an excellent job at the memorial service, which was the first for any deceased member or cadre that we planned from beginning to end. Eurial will be on Long Island, where Pop is extremely well known in the farmworker community, as well as in several areas of New Jersey. (There was some discussion of Arlington National Cematery, but if this was worked out I haven't heard confirmation).

A special committee will be preparing what is a sense will serve as the equivalent of a Collected Works. Literary expression was not Pop's main skill, but the history, knowledge, example, education, and dedication he provided all of us with need to be perpetuated. Copy of the memorial program will be enclosed before I mail this.

I had the unwelcome privelege of making the announcement to most of the regional staff about an hour after he died. As you know, crying for the dead is not a characteristic trait in our family, which has its uses, and this was no exception. However, I have never been less sure of my ability to complete a sentence without my voice breaking. IT didn't.

other news. I spent a few nights with him at the hospital watching new body counts from Lebanon on '". I heard he was in intensive care

the same morning I heard the marines had invaded Grenada. It was quite a contrast, watching Pop die after ten years utterly devoted to a cause he knew, grasped, and propagated, and watching marines who didn't have any idea why they were there dying for nothing in particular, while their families tried to make the best of it. When your son, husband, or brother dies in a war zone, you can't shrug it off "Oh, it was a complete waste"--you have to find senething to be proud of. But except insofar as it contributes to the ultimate decade of those who sent the marines in in the first place, it is a waste. There is absolutely no political position in Bebanon worth fighting for, let alone dying for.

Grenada was a somewhat different matter. The U.S. seems to have come off with enough of a bloody nose that it will be careful about taking on something larger, like Nicaragua. Yes, inevitably they won. But when it takes 18,000 troops, naval, marine, army, and air force, equipped with tanks, planes, 21 ships, and heavy artillery and helicopters, to subdue an island of 110,000 with a lightly armed army of 800 aided by 600 Cuban engineers with militia training, it doesn't speak well for the U.S. future options. The rangers did their job efficiently and professionally, which is to their credit in a sense. One couldn't help looking for the largest possible American casualties however. A military force is it subject to be treated as such, and the higher a price the U.S. military pays for this the better.

I will never be able to separate this from my last recollections of Pop, because Pop fought for himself and those economically nituated similar to himself, and among other things he fought for a world in which soldiers would at the least be able to fight for a cause they had a conclous stake in, not for someone else's power or investments, until we could eliminate organized military violence altogether.

This would be a very depressing time not to be an organizer.
What does one do about Lebanon, or Orenada? Sing protest songs?
Write letters to the editor? Propagandize tearful frineds and relatives that its all pointless? Take an oppositionalist view to those who with some sense suggest that "we should fight for our interests" by saying "no we shouldn't?" Of course we should—who is we and what interests are at stake? But how is that syllogism re-set? I have plenty to do about it—and an approach I am confident of. Waling patriotism, burying one's head in the sand, vicarious enjoyment of melancholy over the evils of the world, drugs or other distractions, seem the only available alternatives. And frankly blind patriotism makes more sense than any of the others. I'm just glad I have another choice. I just hope we can work fast enough to let others know what it is.

You have always wondered whather this isn't a bit of an accentric way to spend my life, and I have always considered it the best and the only option available to me. Of course, as H.L. Mensken used to say to his critics "Dear sir, you may be right." But I'm not pursuing much that you didn't teach me, regardless that I have adopted and studied (dialectical materialism) as method. The U.S. has great economic potential that is being used inefficiently, even wastefully, and indulging in military adventures abroad it has no business in. More and better education and nutrition should be higher priorities. Regular visits to a dentist# are more important than 5 new video games and a backyard barbecue in every garage. On a nationwide and will world-wide scale, how much closer are any of these things today than in 1960? What substentive changes have been acheived and held consistently via electoral recourse. How many new Caryl Checaman's are on the horizon today? Are you sure the Hyde Amendment won't pass in a couple more years? After all the trouble over Vietnam, will we be in El Salvador soon?

Well, what's to stop any of these things going the wrong way?

Power exists, and imperatives of how power is organized and perpetuates itself exist. You have always favored maximum dispersal of power, and I suppose I still would too if it weren't for the fact that some don't disperse and they tend to rule those who do. There are only two things to be in this world, in power or subject to those who are, and if you're harmless they might leave you alone, but they're still in power and you're not.

So we are rebuilding the labor movement in North America. We are rebuilding it with the knowledge that either labor or capital wins, but they do not co-exist. Not as equals, not as partners, not with common interests. There is nothing evil about capitalists; they just happen to respond to imperatives I am unwilling to live with. Labor responds to imperatives that tend to be somewhat more egalitarian, somewhat more cooperative and less competitive, somewhat less ## destructive of human life and potential than what we live under now. And the labor movement is based on the most reliable of all assurances that principles set forth will be adhered to; greed. Pure and simple self-interest, individually and collectively.

Don't confuse this with George Meaney's empire. Meaney paid the full price of collaboration with capital. Business unionism has many flaws, from the viewpoint of a union (or non-union and excluded) worker, and also from the viewpoint of the disinterested middle-class moralist. In one case you can spell it out in cold hard cash, in the other in terms of corruption, political conservatism (reactionary applies better than conservative as mom aptly ## points out), etc. Don't confuse this with 60's radicalism either: this is a meat and potatoes revolution. Its for milk to be available at a lower price than Cocs-Cola, not for Freddy Freudian to be less frustrated about his sex life.

There are a lot of abstract concepts that I have laid aside over the past few years, because they have so many meanings and emotional connotations they cease to mean anything. There are people who extol "freedom" and "individuality" as the highest principles. They forget that complete freedom would include the unrestricted freedom of the bigh and powerful to bully the small and weak. There are others who praise "cooperation" and "collective welfere", and forget that any cooperative enterprise requires a certain degree of authority and a certain abandonment of individual preference to group benefit.

I work within an organizing drive that has developed an efficient and successful method to fight for the class it purports to represent, as measured by the continued and expanding participation of its membership and potential membership. By your reserved standards my last letter undoubtedly sounded boastful, but it had every right to. All so over the country, well-established unions and locals are coming to us for assistance because they lack the capacity to continue to maintain themselves in their old ways. We are the best labor organizers in the U.S. and the sole surviving practitioners of many of the labor movement best traditions. I wish **** Aunt Daisy were still around to see it.

We have taken the material reality that there are **** leaders and followers in any group effort, and developed a framework in which everyone is generally both, and neither are based on personal indispensibility or glorification, but simply on work that needs to be done and that anyons can learn with enough practice. I believe this method emminently deserves to be the means by which the United States is governed. I believe all alternatives spell disaster. I also believe in a conservative approach (yes mom, I get that from you) to any of the above. Extreme methods may from time to time be necessary, but the criteria is results—the greatest good for the greatest number and whatever sacrifice it takes it acheive that.

The spontaneous militance of the 1960's failed in every one of its objectives. Whele initation in the 1980's will fare no better. We prefer to gain in substance what we give up in posture and appearance We have preferred to spend ten years rebuilding the sense of community everywhere we have worked that was utterly destroyed by twenty years of federal poverty programs. Pop represented, among other things, the re-emergence of organic leadership from the low-income communityS which hadbeen its brightest leaders ripped into an unstable middle class existence and taken out of their peer grouping by federal There are plenty of younger leaders 12 inspired to the S same understanding. Where do I fit in? Well, I could look back to my great-grandfather who was an organizer for the UMWA... or I could merely point out that my economic, social, and cultural options (in that order of course) were a lot less than the window of prosperity in which you both built your adulthood. The more I recontact old friends the more I realize what dead ends most of them are in. I can help break those dead ends--- # the organizing is the only way to do that -- but I'm really glad to be where I am.







COUNTY DSS VOUCHERS DECLARED TO BE PAPER

Eastern Farm Workers Association volunteers immediately launched into action on relocation aid on January 4, 1983, as one of Suffolk County's few emergency housing facilities, known locally to residents as "Crossroads", at 1035 Montauk Highway, closed its doors to about 40 residents, many of whom-were EFWA members. Crossroads owner, Joseph Coppola, said he could no longer afford to keep the facility open because he has been forced to pay for over \$10,000 worth of fuel and food for emergency housing recipients, without payment on vouchers issued by the Suffolk County Department of Social Services.



As many of the 40 people who were at Crossroads are EFWA members and volunteers, Office Central in Bellport was inundated with calls for immediate housing. EFWA Benefits Volunteers found housing for some of the members from among EFWA supporters, and through constant calls to the Department of Social Services; were able to ensure at least temporary relocation for the rest.

Joseph Coppola stated that he told a representative of the Department of Social Services: "Look, I'm going to have to throw a little old lady and all her possessions out onto the street. Don't you have a place for her to stay?" "Put her things into the street" was the reply.



LIEJA ANNOUNCES RE-BUTTAL TO DEPARTMENT OF HEALTH RULING ON CCMP

Volunteers, organizers and attorneys with Long Island Equal Justice Association have launched a campaign of community education as part of LIEJA's rebuttal to New York State Department of Health attack on Coalition of Concerned Medical Professionals (CCMP).

William Blatner, LIEJA Operations Manager, stated that the campaign will include distribution of a publication currently being written entitled "Appeal to Reason --- The Constitution or Administrative Law" that is being sponsored by National Equal Justice Association to detail the facts of the events leading up to Department of Health ruling that CCMP is noncompliant with DOH regulation 600.8, and is subject to DOH jurisdiction.

This ruling followed a protracted investigation and administrative hearing process of three years in which multiple violations of due process are documented, according to NEJA attorney, Kit Conally Decious, who stated: "This is another way in which the

WORKERS BENEFITS COUNCIL ISSUES CALL TO ECONOMIC ACTION


The Suffolk County Workers Benefits Council has endorsed a National Labor Federation plan which calls upon area residents, merchants, and workers to join together in actions that can result in a turnaround in our local economy, and which will expose the lie of Federal Health and Welfare Budgeting Guidelines.

According to Robert T. Burns, President of the WBC, the new program entitled "BENEFITS PLAN II", goes beyond the scope of EFWA's 5-point Benefits Program, in which individual services such as medical care, dental care, legal advice, clothing and food are provided free of charge to EFWA members in good standing. While our primary Benefits Program will continue to provide services to those most in need, Benefits Plan II is geared to increase the working family's ability to purchase necessities. The new plan adopts a comprehensive, long-term approach, dealing directly with the source of the problems EFWA members face, our need of funds. This new program is seen by many as "the only alternative," in the words of one WBC delegate, "to outright community destruction."

By government guidelines, the average working family should not spend more than 30% of their income on rent, a recent 5% increase over the decade-long standing figure of 25% made by eliminating union dues among other expenses from the average working family recommended budget; no more than 9% on clothing. By National Labor Federation's statistics, based on membership data obtained by community canvassing, to adhere to these figures with current average housing, clothing and other costs would put the average working family in a position of economic disaster; in most cases, housing for many working families ould have to

shift from private homes to ghetto apartments. Families who used to spend 9% of their income on clothes in 1970 would now be unable to pay rent, utilities or other expenses if they were to continue to pay this amount for clothes.

Plan II's Prognosticated Clothing Plan is an example of cost-saving programs that can provide more money in the pockets of workers, not only to pay for other necessities, but also to feed back into our local economies. Clothing received through donations of individuals, merchants and gift certificates are ordered in advance by the participating, eligible member/client and distributed at predetermined times of the year, such as winter holidays and back-toschool time, as part of an overall budget plan of action utilizing any and all sources of aid available to Plan II, determined by the requesting member himself in cooperation with a Plan II volunteer caseworker. Medical plans, dental plans and plans that provide credit and loans are also being established through this new program. CHILD OF EFWA MEMBER DIES-INVESTIGATION LAUNCHED

A seven year old boy, son of an Eastern Farm Workers Association member, died of an apparent case of pneumonia on December 23, 1982, according to EFWA Benefits Coordinator, Phyllis Garrett, who states that his death occurred just one week after being sent home from Brookhaven Memorial Hospital emergency room.

The boy had been rushed to the emergency room by his family, where he was sent home with prescribed antibiotics. The family had no medicaid card or medical insurance coverage; however, Brookhaven Memorial Hospital receives Hill-Burton funding to assist the hospital in providing services to the indigent and uninsured.

When the boy's condition worsened, he was again rushed by the family to Brook haven Memorial Hospital emergency room; from there, he was taken by ambulance to University Hospital, where he died two days later.

The family has requested the aid of Long Island Equal Justice Association in investigating the circumstances of death, and why he was not initially admitted to Brookhaven Memorial Hospital. LIEJA volunteers contacted University Hospital to find out why an autopsy report would take up to two to three months to prepare, and the hospital agreed to complete the report within two to three weeks.

In another recent case, a prominent eastern Long Island minister died of a ruptured appendix in the emergency room of Central Suffolk Hospital while awaiting treatment.

Coalition of Concerned Medical Professionals is compiling data on these and similar

cases, and investigating potential legal action on behalf of EFWA members.

Phyllis Sonabend, investigation by EFWA volunteers, members and organizers established that nonpayment of vouchers was not only affecting landlords, but also the local fuel companies, funeral homes, and some realtors have had to wait as long as five months for payment of vouchers.""Many farm workers and others have expressed fear of possible fuel cutoffs and inability to obtain housing and funeral services as a result of the County's nonpayment" says Sonabend, "and many others are forced to search far and wide to find businesses that will accept County vouchers. It's become common knowledge that they are worth only the paper they're printed on until the County makes good on its debts."

Many fuel company owners contacted by EFWA stated that they left the County program due to the continual late payments, with one small company in Centereach reporting that they were owed \$3,000, and upon presentation of vouchers, were told by a County spokesman that they would be reimbursed for one voucher per week, regardless of the amount of deliveries made.

Ms. Sonabend contacted Long Island Equal Justice Association attorneys and volunteers, who are joining EFWA's investigation and are considering a multi class action suit against the County's late and nonpayment policies and practices that jeopardize the welfare of those entitled by law to these programs.

Department of Health serves as an enforcement agency to further its own future, rather than the health care of citizens. They are trying to use this to shut CCMP down, because volunteer doctors exposed a tuberculosis epidemic the County refused to deal with, or even acknowledge.

LIEJA, as a charter member of National Equal Justice Association which endorses the CCMP fight against DOH, is currently contacting attorneys and doctors throughout Long Island to formulate a defense committee for CCMP's position in conjunction with CCMP's suit charging the Department of Health with unconstitutional action.

According to Dr. Pablo Martinez, CCMP volunteer doctor, "CCMP has for over a decade, provided the sole source of health care to many farm workers and other low income people in Suffolk. It was after we reported our findings to the Commissionof Disease Control, and when our doctors attempted to gain admission to the jail where inmates were on a hunger strike demanding legally mandated medical treatment, that DOII illegally raided the CCMP office at the Riverhead Community Service Center." Michael Douglis, CCMP Operations Manager, says, "CCMP has already accrued legal expenses of over \$150,000. The attack is an attempt to close down CCMP because we speak the truth on a situation the County desperately wants to cover up. Most organizations would be broken by court expenses alone." According to LIEJA Operations Manager William Blatner, "That's part of the reason why poor people aren't getting health care and why an organization like LIEJA must participate in this fight."

The campaign involves daily house meetings as well as speaking engagements and public interest meetings sponsored by CCMP and LIEJA volunteers and supporters. further information, LIEJA and CCMP supporters are asked to contact Bill Blatner at (516) 727-9749.



Their standancement said the ad hoc New Jersey Labor Defense Committee has been initiated to fight for the rights of individuals or groups of labor and labor interest who may have suffered unfair or illegal treatment. in labor matters at the hands of employers. courts, law enforcement agencies, administrative bodies, or state legal processes. The Committee is now accepting written requests for assistance to its Screening Committee.

Mike Grele, Operations Manager of Temporary-Workers-Organizing-Committee-in-New Brunswick, said volunteer lawyers have already begun taking on cases and recruiting other lawyers. Grele, who is also a member of the organizing committee for the newly chartered organization, pointed out that the Committee's first concern, as well as the original impetus for its formation, is that numerous individuals and organizations throughout the state have been affected by the attack against unions begun in Atlantic continued page 6

"Success in Atlantic City particularly in defense of its Hisparic and black workers, a Committee statement says, "can help to lay the groundwork for a turnaround in the entire arena of labor, locally, regionally, and nationally; organized and unorganized; recognized and unrecognized."

Sue King, Operations Manager of Eastern Service Workers Association in Atlantic City, says this attack has resulted in many victimizations of workers and labor organizations. According to Ms. King, casino workers attempting to organize have been blacklisted as well as fired, and union members have been denied medical coverage and many other benefits because of actions taken by the New Jersey Attorney General's Office and the Casino Control Commission, an independent state administrative body whose jurisdiction in this field is a total violation of the U.S. Constitution.






