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Oakland, California, telephone number, 415, 532-9205. At the bottom of the stationery was printed NATIONAL LABOR FEDERATION, 200 West 20th Street, New York, New York 10011.

In the letter, [redacted] invited [redacted] to come out to California and work with the CALIFORNIA HOMEMAKERS ASSOCIATION and also suggested if she wished, she may want to visit the EFWA (EASTERN FARM WORKERS ASSOCIATION), which would be in New York, New York, since this was closer. The letter was signed [redacted]

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On November 21, 1983, [redacted] received a telephone call from [redacted] telling her he wanted to see her and invited her to come to New York. She was told to bring her winter clothes since she might stay awhile.

[redacted] admitted that there may have been a possible romantic motivation on her part to visit [redacted] therefore, she agreed to travel by airplane to LaGuardia Airport, New York, New York, on November 24, 1983. She was met at the airport by [redacted] and a white female, introduced to her as [redacted] [redacted] was a white female. [redacted]

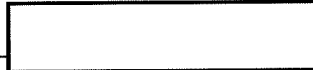
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[redacted] driving what she believed was a gray colored Chevette, drove she and [redacted] to an apartment building in a very run-down portion of Brooklyn, New York, which was referred to by [redacted] as Metro One.

They went to an apartment, which she believed was on the third floor, and she got the impression that this is where she was going to stay. She was told since it was such a run-down area, that if anybody asked who she was, just to say she was [redacted]. She got the impression, although they were occupying only one apartment, that the organization [redacted] [redacted] belonged to owned the whole building. [redacted] had said Time magazine had written an article about a year before regarding a shoot-out occurring in the apartment across the hall, which had a connection with the drug cocaine.

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At the apartment, they were the only ones occupying it at the time, but she was told six to eight people usually stayed in the small two-bedroom apartment.

They stayed at the apartment until early evening, baking cookies for what was described as Thanksgiving festivities, which [redacted] stated approximately 80 people would be attending. [redacted] was told it would be an all-night singing party. When they left to go to the Thanksgiving party, she was told to leave her clothing at the apartment, which gave her the impression she was going to return there.

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The three of them left the apartment and recalls they first drove to a newsstand, where [redacted] stopped to pick up some papers. They then drove to another apartment complex in a nice area and picked up a [redacted]



The complex was comprised of three buildings, approximately three to four stories, side-by-side, with the law firm being the center building. On the right side was described as a doctor's office and nothing was mentioned regarding the building on the left. The upper stories of the buildings appeared to be apartments. She understood this to be the headquarters for a group known as the NATIONAL LABOR FEDERATION.

The four of them went into the law office, which was done by going through the front door, then going to the left down a hallway to a room, estimated in size to be 24 feet by 24 feet. She observed in the law office a long table and desk. She met four or five people in the office, whose names she could not recall. She was introduced as [redacted] and was there for a visit. The people there were very friendly and she was made to feel very welcome.

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The law office was decorated impressively. She noted there were two telephones, what appeared to be a computer terminal and two or three two-way radios (handi-talkies) on the desk. She noticed from the conversations going on that the word organizing was used a lot.

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[REDACTED] was given a tour of a portion of the facility. She was taken up to the second floor, which consisted of going out to the front entrance hallway, going up a stairway to a door, which was buzzed open by someone sitting at a table on the other side. She recalls the second floor consisting basically of four main rooms. She recalls there being a kitchen in the rear, then going toward the front was a room known as the "meeting room," then a small room used as a bedroom, a bathroom, then a room that appeared to be some type of work room, which had files and tables and in the front room facing the street was the "watch room." In the watch room someone was stationed 24 hours a day looking out toward the street. She was told the watch was necessary because of the neighborhood in which they were located, which was very run-down. This room appeared generally off limits. She believed a radio was in the room and the person on the watch did some writing, perhaps keeping a log. She recalls all the rooms led into a central hallway.

In the room containing the tables and files, she saw oil paintings of what she thought were LENIN and STALIN. One of the men was with a woman, perhaps his wife. There also was a picture or painting of a man, what impressed her to be a Soviet Union military uniform.

[REDACTED] was being shown around the facility by a white female known as [REDACTED] (Last Name Unknown (LNU)), [REDACTED] referred to the area as the "labor training center."

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[REDACTED] observed a sign, believed to be in the upstairs hallway, which stated, "There are no opinions allowed in this organization," with the no opinions underlined in red.

During the time she was there, she was frequently told that she was needed there and was asked how she was doing. It appeared to her that there were more women present than men. When people spoke to her, it impressed her as always being a very close one-to-one type of encounter in which the person came very close physically and conversations always evolved around the word organizing.

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[REDACTED] was later shown the basement of the building by [REDACTED] who wanted to show her the food that the organization had "procured." The basement was entered by going down a stairway in the front hallway. In the basement was a path down the middle and she observed printing material and typewriters. There was a small room, which was very cluttered with clothing and contained cubbyholes, where, evidently individuals' clothing was stored. In the rear of the basement [REDACTED] showed her large coolers containing food, which he stated were obtained by donations by businessmen. The term used in obtaining the food was going on a "pro run." She was, in fact, asked by an unknown female at some point if she wanted to go on one, however, this never materialized.

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In regards to pro runs, when she first arrived at the building, a white male, known as [REDACTED] (LNU), drove up in a brown stepvan at the same time. She was told [REDACTED] drove the van on the pro-runs. [REDACTED] was described as a white male, [REDACTED]

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[REDACTED] She later noticed he also had a small red star pinned on his shirt.

Regarding the downstairs of the law office, [REDACTED] observed, in addition to the main office, toward the front of the building, through a doorway from the law office was a room which had some type of a sign regarding only authorized persons being allowed. She believed she saw through the open door radio equipment inside. To the rear of the law office were more meeting rooms and there was a kitchen in the rear.

[REDACTED] had mentioned to her access could be gained from the law office building to the doctor's office building through the basement, although she never saw this access. No mention was ever made of the building on the other side of the law office. It was her impression that this building was an apartment building. Above the second floor of the law office were other apartments. She was told [REDACTED] lived in one of the apartments and was being taken care of by the group. There may have been other apartments with tenants that were not associated with the group.

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In regards to the Thanksgiving festivities on the evening of November 24, 1983, food was prepared in the upstairs kitchen and served in the meeting room to what she believed to be approximately 80 people as [REDACTED] had said. It impressed her how well people were dressed and at the time she thought it was rather strange if the organization was just helping people, why they were dressed so well. It impressed her that many of the people that came did not reside at the building all the time.

After eating chairs were set up in the meeting room and a meeting/lecture was conducted by a person known as [REDACTED] (LNU) and an unknown black man. [REDACTED] was a white male, [REDACTED]

[REDACTED] was the person [REDACTED] referred to at Metro One as being the person she should say she knew if asked by anyone.

During the meeting, because of the terminology used, she could not understand anything the two men were saying. She estimated the meeting went on for approximately an hour. She observed what appeared to be two sets of parents during the meeting and they looked very perplexed as to what was going on. She emphasized the terms which could have been military in nature used by the men were completely unknown to her.

This organization impressed her as being very militarily structured. People did not do anything without a "vehicle," which was written instructions. She noticed people walked around in a very quick and stiff manner, which made her feel very uneasy.

After the meeting, there was singing of laborer type songs until 7:00-7:30 a.m. the next morning. Through the night there was quite a bit of drinking of alcohol, but no drugs were observed. The drinks were served, being prepared in some other room. She was not able to stay awake all night, so during the night she went to the small room, which had been identified as a bedroom, and was able to sleep part of the night.

During the evening, someone pointed out a white male, [Redacted] and was identified as [Redacted]

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[Redacted] was some type of leader in that, a white female, who was [Redacted] stated she would have to go to [Redacted] office and speak with him. This concerned her, however, the meeting never materialized and she never did know the location of [Redacted] office.

Early the next morning, when people finally went to bed, the men and women were segregated. [Redacted] stated he would be staying at the doctor's office, evidently with other men, and the women stayed on the second floor of the law office. Foam mattresses were rolled out on the floor of the meeting room.

By walking around the second floor, she was able to see her name and two other unknown persons names written on a blackboard as being visitors. She also saw a clipboard, which must have had a "vehicle" clipped to it, stating upon it "have all information on [Redacted] Seeing this made her very uneasy about what she had gotten into.

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While most of the people were still sleeping, she encountered [Redacted]

[Redacted] name unknown, also lived there.

[Redacted] stated people that came there usually stayed. When she asked why, ORA stated because "we're all Communists."

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At that time an unknown female had come into the kitchen and said it was not true regarding people having to stay there, stating people could come and go, but she stated "the Communist thing we will get into later, that is another thing."

[redacted] described this individual as a white female, [redacted] and she stated she had been with the organization since [redacted] college in California. This person spoke as many of the members did of organizing boycotts and strikes. She spoke often of occurrences in the past, such as the great boycott in the 1960's and a potato boycott of the I.M. YOUNG COMPANY. The theme of this girl's statement and other persons statements were that labor was not being treated fairly.

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At approximately 1:00 p.m. on November 25, 1983, people that had been sleeping, started getting up. She heard talk about a couple of lawyers from the law office that had to go to court for some matter related to labor.

In the large meeting room, she observed a white female sitting at a table behind what appeared to be a radio console. She recalls at some point in time the female speaking into the radio. She was told on one occasion to take a portable two-way radio from the white female down to the law office, which she did.

In the afternoon, [redacted] and the black man who had had the meeting the night before, had another briefing in the meeting room, which lasted for approximately one hour. They spoke a lot about labor history, which she did not understand and got the feeling many others did not understand. She stated after the meeting, she was asked several times by different members how she was doing and told not to worry if she did not understand, she would catch on, and she was always told "We need you."

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[redacted] appeared to do much of the leading, making many of the announcements, using military jargon, such as the use of military time and referring to the cadre.

After the meeting, [Redacted] was invited along with two Chicano female guests to the law office. There they were lectured, primarily by an individual identified as [Redacted]. Also present were the lawyer, identified as [Redacted] and three other unknown lawyers. [Redacted] talked primarily on "organizing." He spoke about boycotts, labor history and spoke of targeting the state of Texas in the group's efforts at organizing. [Redacted] especially made appeals to the two Chicanos and [Redacted] felt they were from the state of Texas and were visiting a friend who was a member.

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[Redacted] during this time was working on financial/accounting type books and occasionally made a comment.

[Redacted] described [Redacted] as a white male, [Redacted] was described as a white male, [Redacted]

[Redacted] asked [Redacted] about the Communist involvement in the organization. [Redacted] did not deny the Communist aspect in the organization, but would not explain it. [Redacted] also mentioned a countdown which had been going on for two years and was currently somewhere in the 80 day area. The countdown was not further explained by [Redacted] however, she recalls on one occasion [Redacted] mentioning something about an "attack," however this was not elaborated on either.

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[Redacted] stated that evening she was introduced to a black female, name unknown, who was identified as the original founder of the CALIFORNIA HOME MAKERS ASSOCIATION.

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[Redacted] also heard conversations mentioning the purchase, supposedly by the organization, of a casino in Atlantic City, New Jersey, and she heard talk about racing two horses in Florida, which now belong to the organization and had originally belonged to an individual known as [Redacted]

A heavyset black male was pointed out to her and was identified as [redacted] and he was supposed to have been the original founder of the NATIONAL LABOR FEDERATION in Suffolk County, New York. b6
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[redacted] was told if she stayed with the organization, she would be assigned to [redacted] (LNU), working with the group called the "Coalition for Concerned Medical Profession." [redacted]

During the evening, she was assigned by a "field coordinator" by the name of [redacted] described as a white female, *N.Y.* [redacted] to work in the room with the files on the second floor with six or seven other people. She was assigned to work with an unknown white female organizing and filing material which had been brought up in boxes from the basement. The information filed pertained to such things as strikes, etc., and the files were organized by city and state. b6
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The particular files she recalls working with concerned New Brunswick, New Jersey.

The work continued until approximately 1:00 a.m. when [redacted] (LNU) announced it was cleanup time. This went on to approximately 2:00 a.m.

Due to the Thanksgiving festivities, the normal work schedule had not been followed on that day. [redacted] had told her the normal work day was about 18 hours, starting between 8:30 a.m. and 10:00 a.m. and going to approximately 3:00 a.m. It was the procedure at 1:00 a.m., members were given their "protocol," presumably from [redacted] (LNU). Protocol was instructions stating where members were to stay and what duties they would be doing the next day. It appeared to her after the receipt of their protocol, some members left and went to other unknown locations for the night. b6
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[redacted] stated on Saturday, November 25, 1983, when she woke up, she knew she did not want to be there any longer and since [redacted]

[redacted] In addition, a fireworks factory had exploded in an area known as Velpert and there was a great deal of confusion concerning helping people in the area with the explosion. She also got the impression that the organization's office in the area had also been damaged by the explosion. b6

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[Redacted] stated while visiting in New York, she never observed any weapons or overheard any statements regarding the use of violence to achieve the organization's goals.

After [Redacted] she was confused as to what had happened and thought perhaps she had overreacted to what she had been exposed to. She spoke to neighbors and relation regarding what she had done and she was urged, especially by [Redacted] a retired military person, to contact the FEDERAL BUREAU OF INVESTIGATION (FBI) regarding her observations and to attempt to determine whether her concerns regarding the group were valid.

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[Redacted] provided the letter she had received from [Redacted] CALIFORNIA HOMEMAKERS ASSOCIATION, Oakland, California, dated June 21, 1983; ten pieces of handout material regarding the CALIFORNIA HOMEMAKERS ASSOCIATION mailed to her by [Redacted] the card mailed to her by [Redacted] and a newsletter entitled "The Long Island Farmworker," dated February, 1983. She also provided for photocopy purposes the letter, which

Western Farm Workers Association is an ad hoc committee comprised of local seasonal workers, clergymen, students and concerned private citizens working together on a volunteer basis in the hope that a permanent solution to the problems involving the migrant and seasonal farmworker in the United States in general and the Western States in specific can be reached. The Association has no paid employees and exists only through the dedication and participation of its' membership. Outside the stated goal, no other aim or aspiration is being served.

Many who have joined the organizing committee came from the ranks of seasonal and migrant farmworkers, themselves. Others had experience in direct service organizations, or the civil rights movement. Persons in other communities with successful experience in farm labor problems were approached and some volunteered their services. When a volunteer membership reached a level considered to be representative of the community, a drive was launched to band local seasonal workers together collectively to consider their own problems.

Western Farm Workers Association currently endorses no pragmatic solution to the host of problems currently surrounding the farm labor situation. It is the current aim of the group to form from the ranks of local seasonal farm workers an organization, banded together to enjoy benefits currently denied to the worker. As the membership grows, more benefits will be added. These benefits will be suggested by the membership itself. A fee of approximately 62¢ per month will be charged to the participating member. As the organization continues to grow, we believe that farmworkers themselves will be placed in a better position to judge both their needs and the method by which these needs can be satisfied. It is hoped that for the first time, the heretofore unrepresented seasonal farmworker himself will form an organization in which he has a voice in deciding both his fate and his future.

CHA FIGHTS FOR THE RIGHTS OF WORKERS & RECIPIENTS

CHA benefits program volunteers, with the aid of the Coalition of Concerned Medical Professionals, won back pay for an attendant care (A/C) worker and increased hours of In-Home Care for a disabled member in two separate cases in March, as more of Alameda County's Unrecognized workers request CHA's aid.

One CHA member, an attendant care worker for Alameda County A/C program, finally won several months of back wages, after 6 months of continual advocacy with the local county administration. Another member, 91 years old and bedridden, was reevaluated as "ambulatory" by a county social worker. CHA's benefits case worker enlisted the assistance of CCMP doctors for evidence to the real degree of disability. As a result, her hours of In-Home Care were raised from 6 hours to 48 hours.

CHA began in California in 1973 when Attendant Care workers in Sacramento County mobilized in the face of a pay cut to \$1.65 per hour and demanded collective bargaining recognition from Sacramento County. Over the last 8 years, Alameda County CHA has been instrumental in

CHA HELPS ALTERNATIVE PRESS COMMITTEE BEGIN

On March 6 to 10, 1983, California Homemakers Association (CHA) and Bay Area Alternative Press Committee (BAAP) sponsored a seminar on newsletter production for over thirty volunteers from various organizing drives on the West Coast, including Bay Area CHA and the Coalition of Concerned Medical Professionals. This was the first in a series of special projects designed to provide alternative resources for organizing drives of unrecognized workers. BAAP Committee, currently operating out of CHA's office at 1666 7th St. in Oakland, is an all-volunteer organization that neither seeks nor solicits government or corporate funds. The Committee

advocating for the rights of Attendant Care workers and recipients. In 1978 CHA spoke at a series of meetings with the county Board of Supervisors, demanding to represent the over 5,000 workers in the county's In-Home Program. During those appearances, CHA pointed to the deplorable conditions of the workers and the county's mandate for the health and welfare of Attendant Care workers. While the county agreed about conditions Attendant workers faced, nothing resulted from the series of County Board meetings as county In-Home Social Services began to be cut nationwide.

Viola Mitchell, the President of CHA, having launched the organizing efforts in Sacramento, spoke in front of the State Industrial Wage Commission about the minimum wage, stating that "CHA cannot endorse the minimum wage because the minimum wage, whatever it is, is always the maximum for workers uncovered by the National Labor Relations Act and its dubious protections."

In the past year, the minimum number of hours of Attendant Care has dropped from 12 hours a

CHA'S CANVASSES RETURN TO EAST & NORTH OAKLAND

Over the last month, CHA volunteer canvassers returned to North and East Oakland neighborhoods, doubling the number of members signed up on the canvasses. Volunteer canvassers brought back reports of 60% to 70% unemployed service workers in some areas while many others held only part-time jobs.

In many of the North and East Oakland neighborhoods canvassed years ago, CHA has provided benefits for service workers often living on the same block as community residents who have supported the CHA benefits program with food, clothing and other resources. Three to four canvassers go out weekly to these neighborhoods at this time, and many longtime members have joined the canvasses to help sign up their neighbors, some of whom are now unemployed. At a recent house meeting, a newly signed member stated, "For all of these years, I have supported CHA's benefits program for low-income workers, but I never thought that it would happen to me and so many others that I know. I have been out of work now for over 6 months."

provides actual printing of literature free of charge or at minimum cost to independent organizing drives and others such as CHA through a volunteer staff. As such, it also provides training of other volunteers in some of the practical skills of the production of their newsletters on a "labor donated" basis.

BAAP Committee was formed in October 1982, through the efforts of CHA members and the Citizens for Service Workers, a loosely formed organization of community citizens who provide resources and volunteer labor for organizations of unrecognized workers in the Bay Area, such as CHA, after seeing years of attempts by government-funded organizations to provide printing for low-income workers which failed in the face of diminishing government support. The Bay Area Alternative Press Committee is constituted by the Alameda County Workers Benefits Council, which has temporarily loaned the use of its press and its office facilities.

BAAP Committee is modeled after a similar organization, the Long Island Alternative Press (LIAP), which grew out of the needs of the Eastern Farmworkers Association, an organization of farmworkers formed in 1972. Guy Anderson, the Print Director and Organizing Committee member of BAAP Committee received extensive training from LIAP in the winter and spring of 1982. Prior to his training with LIAP, Guy Anderson was the Print Coordinator for Bay Area CHA. Guy's experience with this association and printers throughout Northern California contributed to the formation of BAAP Committee.

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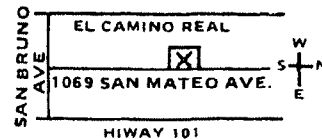

week to 4. The county has recently installed a computerized system called the "Prueger Equity Scale" which has resulted in the determination of minimum hours and services eligibility. The equity scale was inspired and invented by Prueger, a UCB professor of Social Welfare, who used UCB students as researchers and as a control group to deal with the state defined problem of inequity in Social Work decisions. "Equity or lack of equity has been the problem," stated Carol Haddad, CHA's operations manager. "There have been dozens of studies on the conditions of Domestic, A/C Workers and recipients. The conditions, however, remain deplorable for Domestic workers, the second largest and one of the lowest paid workforces in the United States, whose average life span has declined from 52 years to 49 years in the last 10 years."

Last year another 1/2 million dollars was cut from Alameda County's 10 million dollar budget and as a result, 10% more of the recipients are expected to be cut from the program.

Benefits staff volunteer, Lilia Garcia, explained, "We began organizing 8 years ago on behalf of Alameda County's Attendant Care and other Unrecognized workers because we knew that the government funded programs wouldn't hold up and meet the needs of our membership. Our Benefits Program has been able to grow and expand over the years because it depends solely on the support of the community and voluntary help. More volunteers are needed now to expand our benefits program of Information & Referral, non-emergency Dental care, medical and legal advice, job related legal advice, and the California Service Worker monthly newsletter as the government cuts in IHSS and many other government programs affect our membership. 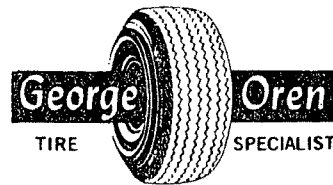

Canvassing is the original method that CHA used to organize our members. Volunteers led by a canvass captain go in teams door to door, to sign up members, take benefits requests and offer participation in the Alameda County Workers Benefits Council. Over 40 WBC delegates meet weekly to set policies and to oversee CHA's Benefits Program. At a recent meeting, a member who has been working for the same employer for the last 14 years, reported that his work hours had been reduced from 5 days to 1 day a week. Others reported similar problems of lay-offs and reduced hours with new jobs far and few between.

Susan Hunter, CHA's Membership Coordinator, explains, "There are now 6 people on CHA's Canvass Captain Training Program, a program that enables volunteer organizers to receive on-the-job-training to coordinate and captain canvasses. More volunteers are needed to canvass neighborhoods in the Oakland area so that we can reach more families who can join CHA." The canvasses go out on Tuesdays and Thursdays at 3:00 p.m. and Saturdays at 11:30 a.m. We need you to join dozens of us on our canvasses, provide transportation for the canvassers or money for the gas expenses. 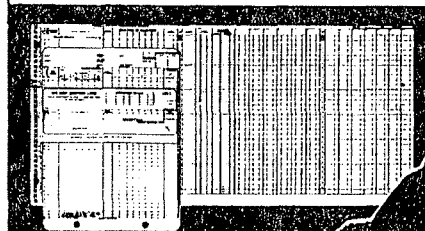

According to Anderson, the seminar represents a major step forward for the Committee, citing the fact that publicity is a primary means of CHA and other organizing drives for their efforts on behalf of unrecognized workers. 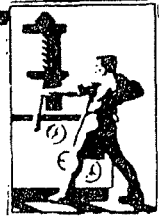

INFORMATION FOR FULL-TIME ORGANIZERS

Requirements There are only two qualifications for working with CHA, a commitment to the interests of domestic and service workers, and respect for the decisions and policies of the organization. Training is provided in any skills the organization requires. If you already have skills and experience in areas such as organizing, languages, mechanics, the arts, law, and medicine, there is probably a place where this can be put to use.

Kinds of Work Organizational functions are arranged into an interrelated structure: Systems. Although pretty much unique in the present day U.S., this plan is similar to those used in many of the old union organizing drives. Organizers take on specialized work in one or more Systems after a period of training and orientation. In addition, all full-time workers (we use the term "cadre") share all the basic day-to-day jobs: benefits program delivery, public speaking, canvasses of neighborhoods, newsletter production, and office work.

Living conditions There are no salaries paid by CHA. This is done not only to cut expenses, but to avoid creating a vested self-interest which might conflict with the interests of service workers. We have seen many organizers turned into poverty pimps and labor bureaucrats by this process. We take care of our people and arrangements can be made to cover any genuine need.

Working Conditions Although our organizers are unpaid, they are considered to be professionals in the highest sense of the word. Whether canvassing a neighborhood or analysing a complex tactical maneuver we approach our work with applied experience, dedication and skill. The hours are long, and cadre are on call twenty-four hours a day, seven days a week. There are other kinds of discipline - for a number of reasons, we can't allow drinking in CHA offices while on organizational business.

How to get here: If you're interested in the Bay Area organizing drive, the best way to find out more is to come out for a visit. We'll show you around, give you some work, and provide food and housing. By plane, get a flight either into Oakland or San Francisco Airport. If we know when you're arriving, we'll be able to meet you. By car: if coming from San Francisco or from the north, Take Route 88 to route 17 south and get off at the 14th street exit. Turn right on Cypress street at the end of the exit, proceed to 7th street and turn right again. Our office is located directly across from the Main Post Office. From the South, take Route 17 North to the 8th Street Exit. Turn left on 8th Street and proceed to Campbell Street, turn left to 7th Street, take a right on 7th Street and park. From the East, take Route 24 West toward Downtown Oakland. Exit at the end of the freeway and proceed down Brush Street to 7th Street. Turn right on 7th Street and our office is about (10 blocks) straight ahead. The train station is about 1/2 mile from the office and the bus (either Greyhound or Continental) station is about 1/2 mile from the office. Just call and we'll pick you up, or let us know you are arriving and we'll arrange to meet you.

Dear

It took me 30 seconds to remember who you are -- but mentioned you several times, and in fact your letter was the best news I've had all week. You could arrange for a visit anytime--the sooner the better. I find myself thinking of all kinds of literature we are about to send to the printer that isn't ready yet. I'll forward that later, but in the meantime I've enclosed some of our old standards.

The first thing I can tell you about organizing is that it won't be anything like you imagine it now--it never is for anyone. Its a lot of long hours and meticulous work, but it adds up to the only effective labor movement in the United States today.

We use a lot of methods that have gone out of style in favor of flashier media tactics--methods like door to door canvassing. We have found that an arm's length approach is more effective. In fact we spend about 80% of our time on the phone, because an organizer's job, first and foremost, is to find people with the time and skills necessary to do the work of the organizing drive.

You'll find in some of the literature the concept of "unrecognized workers" who are the primary grouping of our membership. We are excluded from the dubious benefits of the National Labor Relations Act. For many of our members, the minimum wage is the maximum wage. Our goals lie not in any charitable concept of aid to the poor, but in a strategy to put the labor movement back on the offensive, beginning with the lowest paid workers who are often used to undermine the wage scale of others. We do have a benefits program, described in the enclosed leaflets. Many workers have come to expect such benefits from their job. Ours have never had them. In the past year, 16 million workers across the country have lost medical benefits alone.

I would certainly invite you to come and work with us for a week, or a month, or whatever time you have, and see what you think. The revolutionary implications of building organization that can represent the common interests of temporary workers, domestic workers, farm workers, independent contractors--number in all well over 50 million--are enormous. Basically what we'll do is put together a very full schedule for you to participate in the whole range of activities we run, including classes on labor history and organizational method. We can arrange housing and similar necessities for full time organizers. As has told you, we have no paid staff, only volunteers.

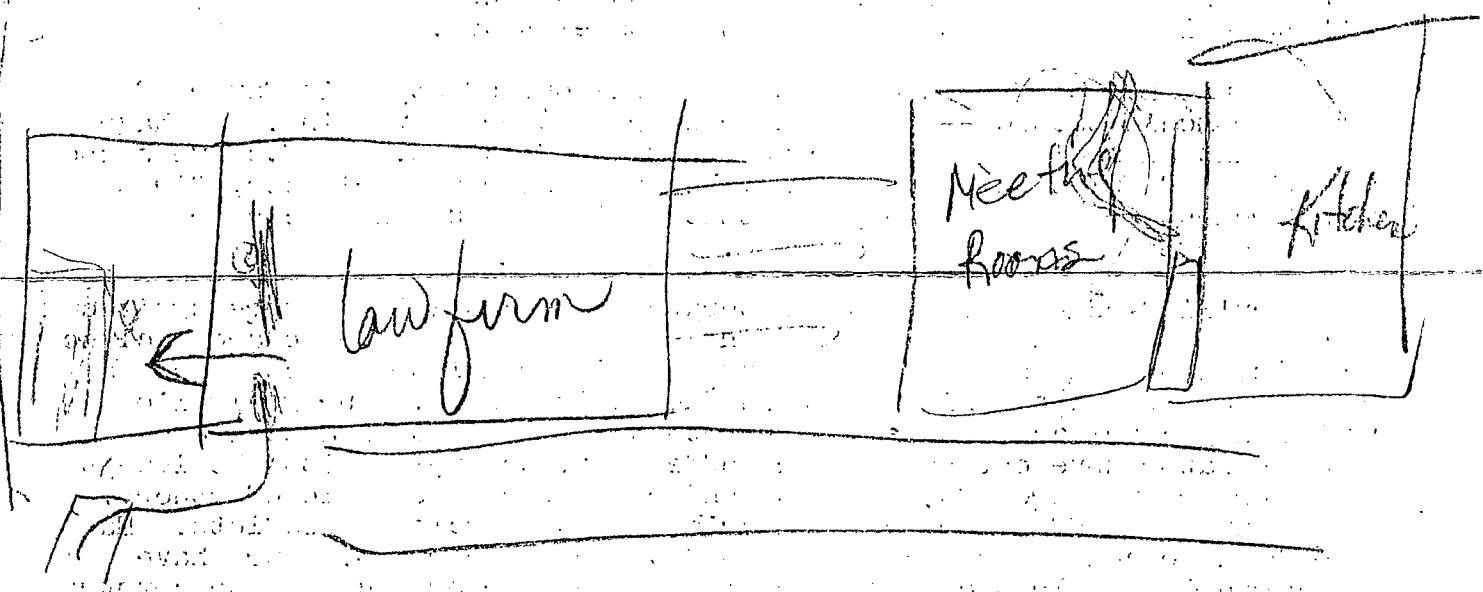
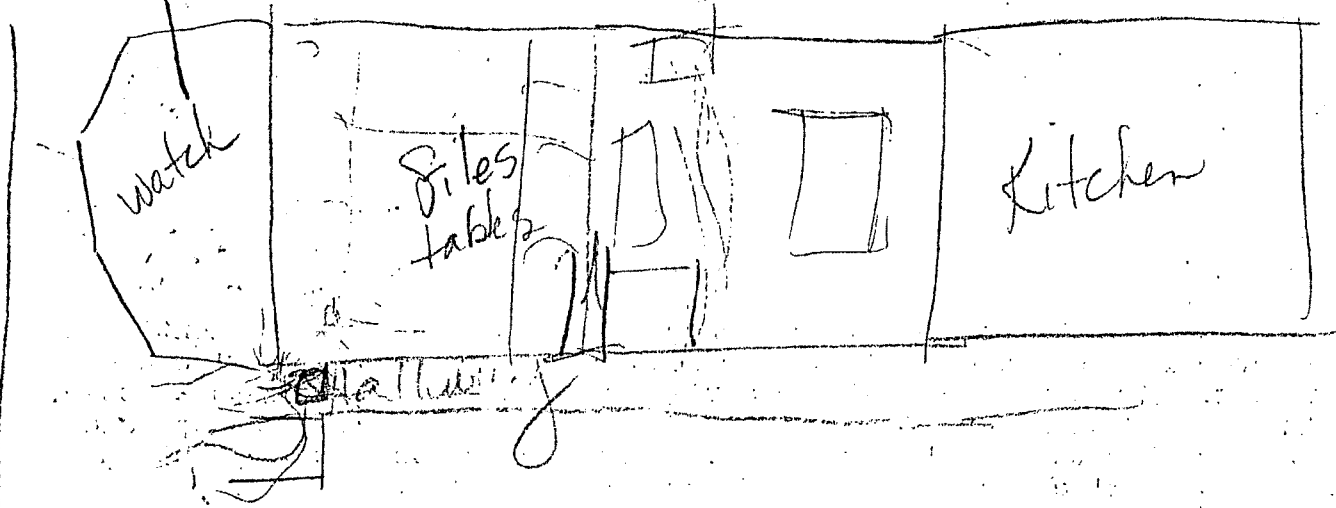

Dear genetic antecedents,

Rastus Harris, better known as Pop, died October 27th at the age of 70. We had just celebrated his birthday in the hospital 2 1/2 weeks previous. He outlived Joe Coleman, I.M. Young & Co. Manager, and Jack Alford, notorious Long Island poverty pimp who used to cure 12 migrants of alcoholism for a \$100,000 federal grant and then turn them loose on the labor camps again. He also outlived the U.S. Dept. of Labor statistics for agricultural labor life expectancy by 21 years.

Rev. Arthur Elcombe did an excellent job at the memorial service, which was the first for any deceased member or cadre that we planned from beginning to end. Burial will be on Long Island, where Pop is extremely well known in the farmworker community, as well as in several areas of New Jersey. (There was some discussion of Arlington National Cemetery, but if this was worked out I haven't heard confirmation).

A special committee will be preparing what in a sense will serve as the equivalent of a Collected Works. Literary expression was not Pop's main skill, but the history, knowledge, example, education, and dedication he provided all of us with need to be perpetuated. Copy of the memorial program will be enclosed before I mail this.

I had the unwelcome privilege of making the announcement to most of the regional staff about an hour after he died. As you know, crying for the dead is not a characteristic trait in our family, which has its uses, and this was no exception. However, I have never been less sure of my ability to complete a sentence without my voice breaking. IT didn't.

Pop's last week or so is inextricably tangled with a lot of other news. I spent a few nights with him at the hospital watching new body counts from Lebanon on TV. I heard he was in intensive care

the same morning I heard the marines had invaded Grenada. It was quite a contrast, watching Pop die^{is} after ten years utterly devoted to a cause he knew, grasped, and propagated, and watching marines who didn't have any idea why they were there dying for nothing in particular, while their families tried to make the best of it. When your son, husband, or brother dies in a war zone, you can't shrug it off "Oh, it was a complete waste"--you have to find something to be proud of. But except insofar as it contributes to the ultimate demise of those who sent the marines in in the first place, it is a waste. There is absolutely no political position in Lebanon worth fighting for, let alone dying for.

Grenada was a somewhat different matter. The U.S. seems to have come off with enough of a bloody nose that it will be careful about taking on something larger, like Nicaragua. Yes, inevitably they won. But when it takes 18,000 troops, naval, marine, army, and air force, equipped with tanks, planes, 21 ships, and heavy artillery and helicopters, to subdue an island of 110,000 with a lightly armed army of 800 aided by 600 Cuban engineers with militia training, it doesn't speak well for the U.S. future options. The rangers did their job efficiently and professionally, which is to their credit in a sense. One couldn't help looking for the largest possible American casualties however. A military force is subject to be treated as such, and the higher a price the U.S. military pays for this the better.

2 I will never be able to separate this from my last recollections of Pop, because Pop fought for himself and those economically situated similar to himself, and among other things he fought for a world in which soldiers would at the least be able to fight for a cause they had a conscious stake in, not for someone else's power or investments, until we could eliminate organized military violence altogether.

This would be a very depressing time not to be an organizer. What does one do about Lebanon, or Grenada? Sing protest songs? Write letters to the editor? Propagandize tearful friends and relatives that its all pointless? Take an oppositionalist view to those who with some sense suggest that "we should fight for our interests" by saying "no we shouldn't?" Of course we should--who is we and what interests are at stake? But how is that syllogism re-set? I have plenty to do about it--and an approach I am confident of. Valing patriotism, burying one's head in the sand, vicarious enjoyment of melancholy over the evils of the world, drugs or other distractions, seem the only available alternatives. And frankly blind patriotism makes more sense than any of the others. I'm just glad I have another choice. I just hope we can work fast enough to let others know what it is.

You have always wondered whether this isn't a bit of an eccentric way to spend my life, and I have always considered it the best and the only option available to me. Of course, as H.L. Mencken used to say to his critics "Dear sir, you may be right." But I'm not pursuing much that you didn't teach me, regardless that I have adopted and studied dialectical materialism as method. The U.S. has great economic potential that is being used inefficiently, even wastefully, and indulging in military adventures abroad it has no business in. More and better education and nutrition should be higher priorities. Regular visits to a dentist are more important than 5 new video games and a backyard barbecue in every garage. On a nationwide and ~~world~~ world-wide scale, how much closer are any of these things today than in 1960? What substantive changes have been achieved and held consistently via electoral recourse. How many new Caryl Chessman's are on the horizon today? Are you sure the Hyde Amendment won't pass in a couple more years? After all the trouble over Vietnam, will we be in El Salvador soon?

Well, what's to stop any of these things going the wrong way? Power exists, and imperatives of how power is organized and perpetuates itself exist. You have always favored maximum dispersal of power, and I suppose I still would too if it weren't for the fact that some don't disperse and they tend to rule those who do. There are only two things to be in this world, in power or subject to those who are, and if you're harmless they might leave you alone, but they're still in power and you're not.

So we are rebuilding the labor movement in North America. We are rebuilding it with the knowledge that either labor or capital wins, but they do not co-exist. Not as equals, not as partners, not with common interests. There is nothing evil about capitalists; they just happen to respond to imperatives I am unwilling to live with. Labor responds to imperatives that tend to be somewhat more egalitarian, somewhat more cooperative and less competitive, somewhat less ~~##~~ destructive of human life and potential than what we live under now. And the labor movement is based on the most reliable of all assurances that principles set forth will be adhered to: greed. Pure and simple self-interest, individually and collectively.

Don't confuse this with George Meaney's empire. Meaney paid the full price of collaboration with capital. Business unionism has many flaws, from the viewpoint of a union (or non-union and excluded) worker, and also from the viewpoint of the disinterested middle-class moralist. In one case you can spell it out in cold hard cash, in the other in terms of corruption, political conservatism (reactionary applies better than conservative as mom aptly ~~##~~ points out), etc. Don't confuse this with 60's radicalism either: this is a meat and potatoes revolution. Its for milk to be available at a lower price than Cocs-Cola, not for Freddy Freudian to be less frustrated about his sex life.

There are a lot of abstract concepts that I have laid aside over the past few years, because they have so many meanings and emotional connotations they cease to mean anything. There are people who extol "freedom" and "individuality" as the highest principles. They forget that complete freedom would include the unrestricted freedom of the big and powerful to bully the small and weak. There are others who praise "cooperation" and "collective welfare", and forget that any cooperative enterprise requires a certain degree of authority and a certain abandonment of individual preference to group benefit.

I work within an organizing drive that has developed an efficient and successful method to fight for the class it purports to represent, as measured by the continued and expanding participation of its membership and potential membership. By your reserved standards my last letter undoubtedly sounded boastful, but it had every right to. All ~~of~~ over the country, well-established unions and locals are coming to us for assistance because they lack the capacity to continue to maintain themselves in their old ways. We are the best labor organizers in the U.S. and the sole surviving practitioners of many of the labor movement's best traditions. I wish ~~that~~ Aunt Daisy were still around to see it.

3 We have taken the material reality that there are ~~that~~ leaders and followers in any group effort, and developed a framework in which everyone is generally both, and neither are based on personal indispensability or glorification, but simply on work that needs to be done and that anyone can learn with enough practice. I believe this method eminently deserves to be the means by which the United States is governed. I believe all alternatives spell disaster. I also believe in a conservative approach (yes mom, I got that from you) to any of the above. [Extreme methods may from time to time be necessary, but the criteria is results--the greatest good for the greatest number and whatever sacrifice it takes to achieve that.]

The spontaneous militance of the 1960's failed in every one of its objectives. ~~W~~ ~~h~~ ~~o~~ ~~l~~ ~~e~~ ~~l~~ ~~i~~ ~~m~~ ~~i~~ ~~t~~ ~~a~~ ~~t~~ ~~i~~ ~~o~~ ~~n~~ in the 1980's will fare no better. We prefer to gain in substance what we give up in posture and appearance. We have preferred to spend ten years rebuilding the sense of community everywhere we have worked that was utterly destroyed by twenty years of federal poverty programs. Pop represented, among other things, the re-emergence of organic leadership from ^{our} ~~the~~ ~~low-income~~ communities which had seen its brightest leaders ripped into an unstable middle class existence and taken out of their peer grouping by federal programs. There are plenty of younger leaders ^{who} ~~are~~ inspired to the same understanding.] Where do I fit in? Well, I could look back to my great-grandfather who was an organizer for the UMWA... or I could merely point out that my economic, social, and cultural options (in that order of course) were a lot less than the window of prosperity in which you both built your adulthood. ~~The more I recontact old~~ friends the more I realize what dead ends most of them are in. I can help break those dead ends--~~the only way to~~ organizing is the only way to do that--but I'm really glad to be where I am.

So, in closing, Happy Birthday man--I'm looking for a book for you at an eclectic little bookshop I sometimes pass by but it won't arrive in time. I missed pumpkin carving this year too--I think next year will be a great year for pumpkin carving.

COUNTY DSS VOUCHERS DECLARED TO BE PAPER

Eastern Farm Workers Association volunteers immediately launched into action on relocation aid on January 4, 1983, as one of Suffolk County's few emergency housing facilities, known locally to residents as "Crossroads", at 1035 Montauk Highway, closed its doors to about 40 residents, many of whom were EFWA members. Crossroads owner, Joseph Coppola, said he could no longer afford to keep the facility open because he has been forced to pay for over \$10,000 worth of fuel and food for emergency housing recipients, without payment on vouchers issued by the Suffolk County Department of Social Services.

As many of the 40 people who were at Crossroads are EFWA members and volunteers, Office Central in Bellport was inundated with calls for immediate housing. EFWA Benefits Volunteers found housing for some of the members from among EFWA supporters, and through constant calls to the Department of Social Services, were able to ensure at least temporary relocation for the rest.

Joseph Coppola stated that he told a representative of the Department of Social Services: "Look, I'm going to have to throw a little old lady and all her possessions out onto the street. Don't you have a place for her to stay?" "Put her things into the street" was the reply.

According to EFWA Operations Manager


Dear Brothers and Sisters,

LIEJA ANNOUNCES RE- BUTTAL TO DEPARTMENT OF HEALTH RULING ON CCMP

Volunteers, organizers and attorneys with Long Island Equal Justice Association have launched a campaign of community education as part of LIEJA's rebuttal to New York State Department of Health attack on Coalition of Concerned Medical Professionals (CCMP).

William Blatner, LIEJA Operations Manager, stated that the campaign will include distribution of a publication currently being written entitled "Appeal to Reason --- The Constitution or Administrative Law" that is being sponsored by National Equal Justice Association to detail the facts of the events leading up to Department of Health ruling that CCMP is noncompliant with DOH regulation 600.8, and is subject to DOH jurisdiction.

This ruling followed a protracted investigation and administrative hearing process of three years in which multiple violations of due process are documented, according to NEJA attorney, Kit Conally Decious, who stated: "This is another way in which the

WORKERS BENEFITS COUNCIL ISSUES CALL TO ECONOMIC ACTION

The Suffolk County Workers Benefits Council has endorsed a National Labor Federation plan which calls upon area residents, merchants, and workers to join together in actions that can result in a turnaround in our local economy, and which will expose the lie of Federal Health and Welfare Budgeting Guidelines.

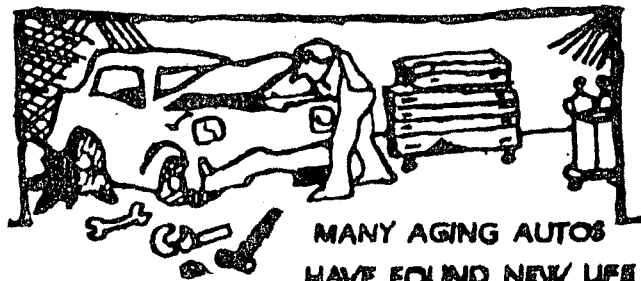
According to Robert T. Burns, President of the WBC, the new program entitled "BENEFITS PLAN II", goes beyond the scope of EFWA's 5-point Benefits Program, in which individual services such as medical care, dental care, legal advice, clothing and food are provided free of charge to EFWA members in good standing. While our primary Benefits Program will continue to provide services to those most in need, Benefits Plan II is geared to increase the working family's ability to purchase necessities. The new plan adopts a comprehensive, long-term approach, dealing directly with the source of the problems EFWA members face, our need of funds. This new program is seen by many as "the only alternative," in the words of one WBC delegate, "to outright community destruction."

By government guidelines, the average working family should not spend more than 30% of their income on rent, a recent 5% increase over the decade-long standing figure of 25% made by eliminating union dues among other expenses from the average working family recommended budget; no more than 9% on clothing. By National Labor Federation's statistics, based on membership data obtained by community canvassing, to adhere to these figures with current average housing, clothing and other costs would put the average working family in a position of economic disaster; in most cases, housing for many working families could have to

shift from private homes to ghetto apartments. Families who used to spend 9% of their income on clothes in 1970 would now be unable to pay rent, utilities or other expenses if they were to continue to pay this amount for clothes.

Plan II's Prognosticated Clothing Plan is an example of cost-saving programs that can provide more money in the pockets of workers, not only to pay for other necessities, but also to feed back into our local economies. Clothing received through donations of individuals, merchants and gift certificates are ordered in advance by the participating, eligible member/client and distributed at predetermined times of the year, such as winter holidays and back-to-school time, as part of an overall budget plan of action utilizing any and all sources of aid available to Plan II, determined by the requesting member himself in cooperation with a Plan II volunteer caseworker. Medical plans, dental plans and plans that provide credit and loans are also being established through this new program. CHILD OF EFWA MEMBER DIES—INVESTIGATION LAUNCHED

A seven year old boy, son of an Eastern Farm Workers Association member, died of an apparent case of pneumonia on December 23, 1982, according to EFWA Benefits Coordinator, Phyllis Garrett, who states that his death occurred just one week after being sent home from Brookhaven Memorial Hospital emergency room.

The boy had been rushed to the emergency room by his family, where he was sent home with prescribed antibiotics. The family had no medicaid card or medical insurance coverage; however, Brookhaven Memorial Hospital receives Hill-Burton funding to assist the hospital in providing services to the indigent and uninsured.

When the boy's condition worsened, he was again rushed by the family to Brookhaven Memorial Hospital emergency room; from there, he was taken by ambulance to University Hospital, where he died two days later.

The family has requested the aid of Long Island Equal Justice Association in investigating the circumstances of death, and why he was not initially admitted to Brookhaven Memorial Hospital. LIEJA volunteers contacted University Hospital to find out why an autopsy report would take up to two to three months to prepare, and the hospital agreed to complete the report within two to three weeks.

In another recent case, a prominent eastern Long Island minister died of a ruptured appendix in the emergency room of Central Suffolk Hospital while awaiting treatment.

Coalition of Concerned Medical Professionals is compiling data on these and similar

cases, and investigating potential legal action on behalf of EFWA members.

Phyllis Sonabend, investigation by EFWA volunteers, members and organizers established that nonpayment of vouchers was not only affecting landlords, but also the local fuel companies, funeral homes, and some realtors have had to wait as long as five months for payment of vouchers." "Many farm workers and others have expressed fear of possible fuel cutoffs and inability to obtain housing and funeral services as a result of the County's nonpayment" says Sonabend, "and many others are forced to search far and wide to find businesses that will accept County vouchers. It's become common knowledge that they are worth only the paper they're printed on until the County makes good on its debts."

Many fuel company owners contacted by EFWA stated that they left the County program due to the continual late payments, with one small company in Centereach reporting that they were owed \$3,000, and upon presentation of vouchers, were told by a County spokesman that they would be reimbursed for one voucher per week, regardless of the amount of deliveries made.

Ms. Sonabend contacted Long Island Equal Justice Association attorneys and volunteers, who are joining EFWA's investigation and are considering a multi class action suit against the County's late and nonpayment policies and practices that jeopardize the welfare of those entitled by law to these programs.

Department of Health serves as an enforcement agency to further its own future, rather than the health care of citizens. They are trying to use this to shut CCMP down, because volunteer doctors exposed a tuberculosis epidemic the County refused to deal with, or even acknowledge.

LIEJA, as a charter member of National Equal Justice Association which endorses the CCMP fight against DOH, is currently contacting attorneys and doctors throughout Long Island to formulate a defense committee for CCMP's position in conjunction with CCMP's suit charging the Department of Health with unconstitutional action.

According to Dr. Pablo Martinez, CCMP volunteer doctor, "CCMP has for over a decade, provided the sole source of health care to many farm workers and other low income people in Suffolk. It was after we reported our findings to the Commission of Disease Control, and when our doctors attempted to gain admission to the jail where inmates were on a hunger strike demanding legally mandated medical treatment, that DOH illegally raided the CCMP office at the Riverhead Community Service Center." Michael Douglass, CCMP Operations Manager, says, "CCMP has already accrued legal expenses of over \$150,000. The attack is an attempt to close down CCMP because we speak the truth on a situation the County desperately wants to cover up. Most organizations would be broken by court expenses alone." According to LIEJA Operations Manager William Blatner, "That's part of the reason why poor people aren't getting health care and why an organization like LIEJA must participate in this fight."

The campaign involves daily house meetings as well as speaking engagements and public interest meetings sponsored by CCMP and LIEJA volunteers and supporters. For further information, LIEJA and CCMP supporters are asked to contact Bill Blatner at (516) 727-9749.

Their announcement said the ad hoc New Jersey Labor Defense Committee has been initiated to fight for the rights of individuals or groups of labor and labor interest who may have suffered unfair or illegal treatment in labor matters at the hands of employers, courts, law enforcement agencies, administrative bodies, or state legal processes. The Committee is now accepting written requests for assistance to its Screening Committee.

Mike Grele, Operations Manager of ~~Temporary Workers Organizing Committee in~~ New Brunswick, said volunteer lawyers have already begun taking on cases and recruiting other lawyers. Grele, who is also a member of the organizing committee for the newly chartered organization, pointed out that the Committee's first concern, as well as the original impetus for its formation, is that numerous individuals and organizations throughout the state have been affected by the attack against unions begun in Atlantic City. continued page 6

"Success in Atlantic City particularly in defense of its Hispanic and black workers, a Committee statement says, "can help to lay the groundwork for a turnaround in the entire arena of labor, locally, regionally, and nationally; organized and unorganized; recognized and unrecognized."

Sue King, Operations Manager of Eastern Service Workers Association in Atlantic City, says this attack has resulted in many victimizations of workers and labor organizations. According to Ms. King, casino workers attempting to organize have been blacklisted as well as fired, and union members have been denied medical coverage and many other benefits because of actions taken by the New Jersey Attorney General's Office and the Casino Control Commission, an independent state administrative body whose jurisdiction in this field is a total violation of the U.S. Constitution.

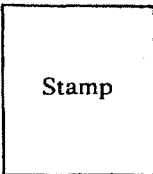

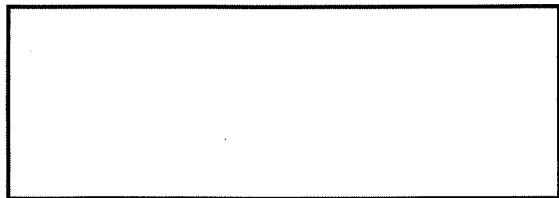

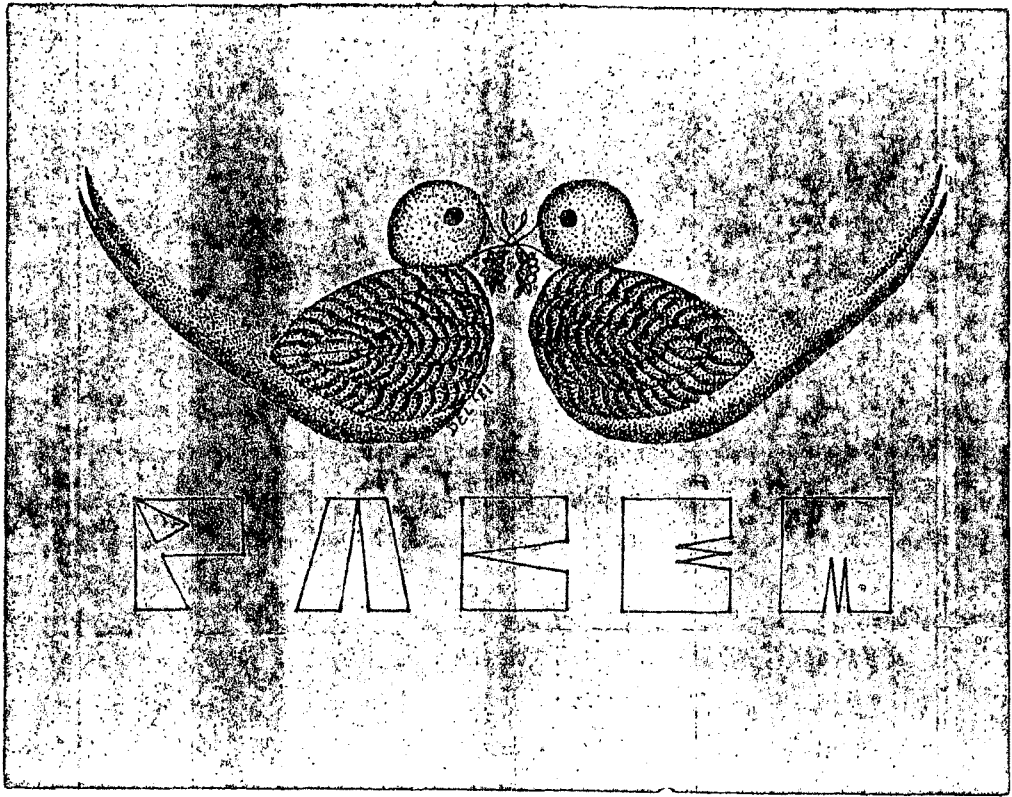

[redacted] Also, [redacted] wanted to discuss the possibility of a march to Austin to dramatize the Texas Farm Worker's support for laws favorable to the Farm Workers and not only to the Farm Workers, but the Labor Movement in general. Thirdly, [redacted] wanted to discuss strategy and method of work for the Texas Farm Workers Support Committees around Texas.

After the meeting, [redacted] again asked [redacted] [redacted] if he would meet with the members of the Communist Labor Party in private. After some hesitation, he agreed.

His statements reflected the position taken by the State Committee of the Communist Labor Party in their meeting in San Antonio. This position basically supports all legitimate efforts to organize the Farm Workers in Texas. Also, the Communist Labor Party in their efforts to help organize the Texas Farm Workers either through the UAW or the TFW, the CLP reserves the right to organize Farm Workers into the Communist Labor Party, if the Party and the Farm Workers believe that it is to their mutual help.

The meeting lasted for about 30 minutes in the [redacted]

[redacted] After the meeting the members got together to discuss what, if anything, had been accomplished during their talks with [redacted] At a restaurant in Weslaco, Texas, the consensus was that more could have been done with [redacted]

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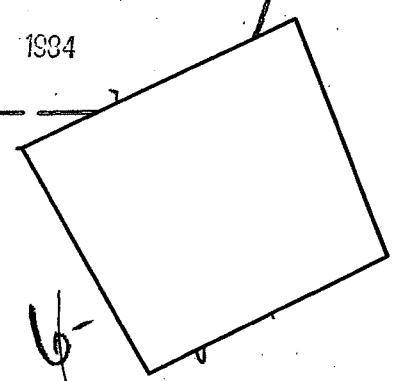

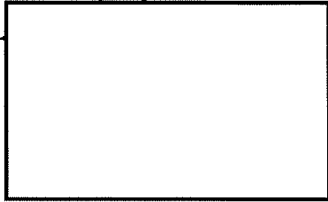

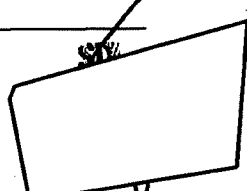

On January 29 and 30, 1984, [redacted] provided the following information:

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Source was told by [redacted] that [redacted] has been assigned to hold a press conference on February 18, 1984, at the Hyatt Regency Hotel, New Brunswick, New Jersey. Source heard that [redacted] may be present. The press conference will announce a strike for "pay parity" of temporary workers, ranging from Boston to Baltimore.

During the press conference, a shot will be fired at an object in the room, i.e. pictures on the wall, in order to expand press coverage.

Additional plans exist for an unknown "sniper" to fire on a tractor/trailer, on a highway near New Brunswick, New Jersey. Source was told this event would be connected in some way with the press conference. This would also be for media attention and for psychological effect.

Source has no other details regarding the above at this time, but suspects the sniper incident will occur on U.S. Route 1, between Route 18 and Georges Road. Source believes the sniper will be [redacted] and that it will approximately coincide with the press conference.

In a conversation with another member of the Provisional Party of Communists (PPC), who is in a more advanced position, source learned that [redacted] telephoned the New Brunswick location on the night of February 9-10, 1984, on three occasions. Instructions were relayed to that location in an "open code" in these calls. The only instruction known to asset is that "pictures" should be purchased to be "shot off of the wall", during the press conference.

Source learned that the PPC plans to initiate a series of near simultaneous strikes by various labor unions. These will include temporary workers, as will supposedly be announced in above press conference, oil and sugar beet workers' unions in Louisiana, Local 31 of a union [redacted] in California, farm workers in Texas and a "group of teamsters" in the midwest.

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The press conference planned for New Brunswick, New Jersey, will announce the formation of a new union, called the TEMPORARY WORKERS UNION OF NEW JERSEY (TWUNJ), which will announce an immediate "general strike", between Boston and Baltimore. Shots will be fired in the press conference in order to increase press speculation as to the nature of the group.

A "sniper" will fire a rifle or shotgun at a tractor/trailer, moving on a New Jersey highway, in some way as to appear associated with the strike and press conference.

Source was also told that the above described unidentified group of teamsters in the midwest will back the series of nationwide strikes.

When source questioned the nature of the "violence" and "bloodshed", he was told "that is a function of the closed section". Source noted that the cadre supplying this information is not a member of the "MILITARY FRACTION"

and would probably not know that information. Source speculated that violence, such as the above described "sniper" incident will occur in additional locations, in an effort to spread the wildcat strikes.

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Source stated plans exist for [redacted] of the TEXAS FARM WORKERS UNION (TFWU) to emerge as mediator, first of the strikes in Louisiana, then other places. He will produce a "new form of arbitration" and miraculously settle the strikes. The PPC believes this will thrust him suddenly into the national spotlight a "labor saviour" and national leader.

Source has no knowledge how the PPC plans to move from the above to a national revolution. Source only knows that a collapse of the national economy must come first. The series of spreading violent strikes is believed, by the PPC, to accomplish this collapse.

Source could offer no additional information regarding the above elements called "PROSCENIUM I", except to add that he has heard the organization has "heavy labor contacts" in St. Louis.

SOURCE STATED THERE ARE NO ARMS IN LOCAL HEADQUARTERS, BUT THE EXISTENCE OF ARMS IS ADMITTED. SOURCE SAID THAT THESE ARMS ARE NOT BE LOCATED IN THE LOCAL OFFICES.

THE CAPTIONED GROUP EXPECTS THE NEIGHBORHOOD THEMSELVES TO RISE ALSO AS PART OF THEIR STRATEGY, HENCE GROUP AGITATION.

CALIFORNIA HOMEMAKERS ASSOCIATION (CHA) HAS INSTALLED A NEW PHONE IN THE OFFICE, WHICH IS RED IN COLOR, AND THE NUMBER IS UNKNOWN TO ALL BUT [REDACTED] AND POSSIBLY [REDACTED] THE REASON GIVEN IS THAT THEY WANT TO USE IT ONLY FOR OUTGOING CALLS AND DO NOT WANT IT TIED UP. SOURCE BELIEVES THAT IT IS A SPECIAL PHONE INSTALLED TO CONTACT REGIONAL HEADQUARTERS, AND OTHER IMPORTANT CALLS. SOURCE BELIEVES THAT REGIONAL, ALSO KNOWN AS COSHAD, AND NATIONAL, NOC, ALSO KNOW THE NUMBER.

CHA HAS ALSO BEEN ORGANIZING IN THE PRISONS AS "FRIENDS AND RELATIVES OF PRISONERS".

SOURCE SAYS THAT LATELY THE PRESSURE IS REALLY BAD AT LOCAL HEADQUARTERS, WITH ONLY THE MOST ESSENTIAL SYSTEMS STILL LEFT, SUCH AS THOSE DEALING WITH VOLUNTEERS, MEMBERSHIP, AND POLITICS. CADRE ARE ACTUALLY TAKING POWER AND ORDERING PEOPLE AROUND.

SOURCE ADVISED THAT A RADIO SHOW IS TO BE DONE BEFORE FEBRUARY 18, AT THE COST OF \$8,000 FOR ONE HOUR ON A MAJOR RADIO STATION. CHA IS CURRENTLY USING FUND RAISERS TO PAY FOR THIS RADIO SHOW. ONE SUCH FUND RAISER IS TO BE A DANCE HELD IN ORANGEVALE, CALIFORNIA, ON FEBRUARY 11, 1984. CHA HAS ASKED SOURCE TO PARTICIPATE IN THE RADIO SHOW.

SOURCE LEARNED OF A RECENT INCIDENT WHERE [REDACTED] DESCRIBED ABOVE [REDACTED] HAS ACCUSED ONE OF THE MEMBERS OF BEING A SPY, AND SOURCE DOES NOT KNOW REASON ON WHICH [REDACTED] BASED HIS QUESTIONING.

SOURCE PROVIDED OTHER BASIC INFORMATION WHICH WAS TOPIC OF CADRE CLASSES WHICH INCLUDED THE FOLLOWING:

ALL SOCIALISTS ARE BANDED TOGETHER. ALL SOCIALISTS GOVERNMENT ARE OBLIGATED TO SUPPORT A REVOLUTION IN AN IMPERIALIST COUNTRY.

CANNOT BUILD A SUCCESSFUL REVOLUTION INTERNATIONALLY WITHOUT TAKING THE UNITED STATES.

THE WHOLE PROCESS OF SOCIALISM WILL TAKE MANY YEARS. THERE WILL BE REPRESSION AFTER REVOLUTION. THE GOVERNMENT ONLY MANAGES PROPERTY, BUT DOES NOT OWN IT AS THE PEOPLE DO.

THE REVOLUTION TAKES PLACE ON THE NATIONAL LEVEL, AND THEN THE INTERNATIONAL LEVEL. THAT IS WHY RUSSIA HAS AN OBLIGATION TO SUPPORT CUBA.

SOURCE STATED THAT CHA IS AFFILIATED WITH LOCAL 31 UNION, THAT THEIR ATTORNEYS HAVE ASSISTED THIS UNION, AS WELL AS THE TEXAS FARM WORKERS UNION.

SOURCE SAID THAT THE SACRAMENTO ENTITY IS DOING THE FIRST NATIONAL RADIO BROADCAST. THIS WAS MENTIONED ABOVE.

(SC SERIAL NUMBER 13) A COMMUNICATION FROM LARGO, SUPRA, IN WHICH IT IS NOTED A STATE OF REVOLUTION SHALL BEGAN AS OF MARCH 15, 1970. (SACRAMENTO NOTES A SIMILARITY WITH THIS, AND CURRENT CAPTIONED CASE).

(SC SERIAL 17) THIS SERIAL SHOWS THAT [REDACTED]

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(SC SERIAL 29) SOURCE WAS INTRODUCED TO TWO YOUNG MALES, WHO HE WAS ADVISED, WOULD KIDNAP THE "HEAD OF THE BERKELEY CITY COUNCIL", WHO WOULD BE HELD FOR A LOW RANSOM OF \$2.50 AS AN INSULT TO THE ESTABLISHMENT.

WHEN SOURCE AND [REDACTED] RETURNED TO SAN FRANCISCO AND VISITED THE RESIDENCE OF [REDACTED] SOURCE WAS SHOWN A 50 MILIMETER MORTAR WHICH HE OBSERVED TO BE VERY OLD, HOWEVER, IN WORKABLE CONDITION. SOURCE WAS TOLD THAT ON OCTOBER 2, 1970 A PERSON WOULD FIRE SEVERAL FLARES OR

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GRENADES BY SHOTGUN LAUNCHER AT THE HALL OF JUSTICE, SAN FRANCISCO, CA. AND THIS WOULD BE DONE TO PANIC THE ESTABLISHMENT AND NOT ESPECIALLY FOR DAMAGING EFFECT.

THIS SERIAL ALSO MENTIONED THAT EXPLOSIVES COULD BE PLANTED NEAR A BANK OF AMERICA BRANCH IN SAN FRANCISCO, CA. OR NEAR THE MARK HOPKINS HOTEL, AND A PUBLIC ANNOUNCEMENT COULD BE MADE TO ADVISE THE REVOLUTION IS UNDERWAY. THIS PART APPEARED TO BE DISCUSSION, AND NO PARTICULAR PLANS.

(SC SERIAL 36) ON DECEMBER 19, 1970, LARGO MEMBERS HAD A MEETING AT WHICH THEY DISCUSSED PLANS FOR REVOLUTIONARY ACTIVITY, WHICH WERE COLOR CODED.

[REDACTED] CLAIMED HE HAD SMALL ORGANIZED GROUPS IN NORTHERN CALIFORNIA, TOTALLY 30 ARMED ACTIVISTS WHO WERE READY TO GO. HE CLAIMED THE FIRST STEP WOULD BE TO KIDNAP ALAMEDA COUNTY SHERIFF FRANK MADIGAN AND SOME UNNAMED BERKELEY CITY OFFICIALS. AT THE SAME TIME, A LARGE EXPLOSIVE CHARGE WAS TO BE PLACED IN A NEW SAN FRANCISCO BANK OF AMERICA BUILDING. [REDACTED] STATED HE COULD USE POTASSIUM NITRATE AS THE EXPLOSIVE AND CLAIMED THIS COULD BE EASILY DONE BY USING THE FREIGHT ELEVATORS IN THE

BUILDING, AS HE HAS OBSERVED THE AREA AND KNOWS THEY ARE NOT CLOSELY WATCHED.

ONCE THE HOSTAGES ARE TAKEN AND THE EXPLOSIVES PLACED IN THE BANK OF AMERICA BUILDING, POLICE OFFICIALS WILL BE ADVISED OF THE SITUATION AND WARNED NOT TO REACT TO OTHER EPISODES WHICH WILL BE COMPLETED WITHIN A 24-HOUR PERIOD. IMMEDIATELY AFTER OFFICIALS HAVE BEEN WARNED, THE SAN FRANCISCO HALL OF JUSTICE WILL BE ATTACKED BY MORTAR FIRE, AND THE UNIVERSITY OF CALIFORNIA RADIOLOGICAL LABORATORY AND ATOMIC REACTOR WILL BE EITHER BURNED OR DESTROYED BY EXPLOSIVES.

RADIO STATION KOVR IN SACRAMENTO IS TO BE TAKEN, AND A PRE-RECORDED TAPE WILL BE SET INTO THE BROADCASTING EQUIPMENT TO BROADCAST THE REVOLUTION HAS BEGUN. KOVR PERSONNEL ON DUTY WILL BE

TIED UP AND LEFT AT THE SCENE.

[REDACTED] STATED THAT PREPARATIONS FOR THESE STRIKES ARE BEING FINALIZED BY COMPLETING MAPS SHOWING ACCESS AND ESCAPE ROUTES TO AND FROM EVERY "HIT" LOCATIONS, AND FLOOR PLANS WILL BE FURNISHED FOR EACH INSTALLATION ATTACKED. IF EVERYTHING GOES AS PLANNED, A 30-DAY MORATORIUM ON KILLING POLICE WILL BE PROCLAIMED SO THOSE IN POLICE DEPARTMENTS NOT WANTING TO FIGHT CAN GET OUT OF UNIFORM.

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ALL OF THIS INFORMATION WAS PROVIDED BY [REDACTED] HE STATED THAT NO EXACT DATE WAS SET FOR THE ABOVE DESCRIBED ACTIVITIES, ALTHOUGH [REDACTED] HINTED THAT IT WOULD BE SOMETIME DURING THE LAST TWO WEEKS IN JANUARY 1971.
