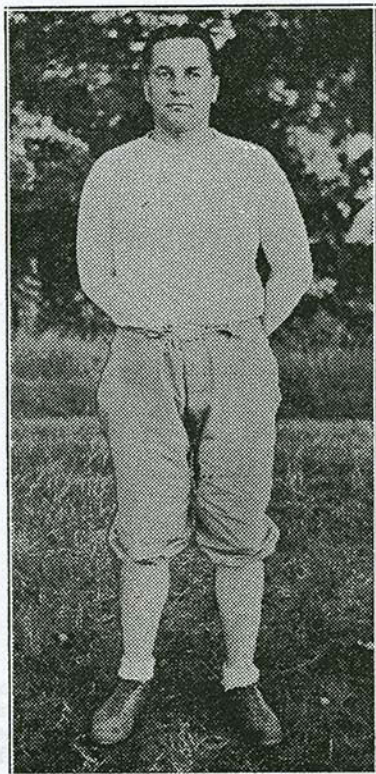
"Bill" is also supervisor of the intramural activities for men. These activities include all forms of recreational sports.

Behind the Fort Hays State gridiron machine, planning new methods of attack, spotting weaknesses, and working to overcome them is Coach Paul Waldorf. Starting his third year as mentor of the "Western Kansas University," Waldorf has no easy task set before him. Although he has nineteen lettermen, including some brilliant backfield men, he is confronted with the problem of developing a line comparable to his forward walls of the preceding years. Graduation took Waldorf's strongest linemen, such as C. Mitchell, Skubal, Randall, and Sampson. The Fort Hays State mentor is faced with the necessity of filling in those gaps.

Paul began his career at Baker University, where to this day a not too old "grad," will reminisce, "Remember when Paul Waldorf played halfback." Waldorf furthered his education at the University of Arizona where he received his master's degree. For the last two years Paul has attended the summer school at the University of Wisconsin.

During his coaching experience, Waldorf had two years at Wentworth Military Academy, in Missouri. He came to Fort Hays State campus from McKendree College, Lebanon, Illinois, where he coached for three years. During the seasons of 1933 and 1935 McKendree College was runner-up in the "Little Nineteen Conference."

DOCTOR RUDOLPH ANFINSON

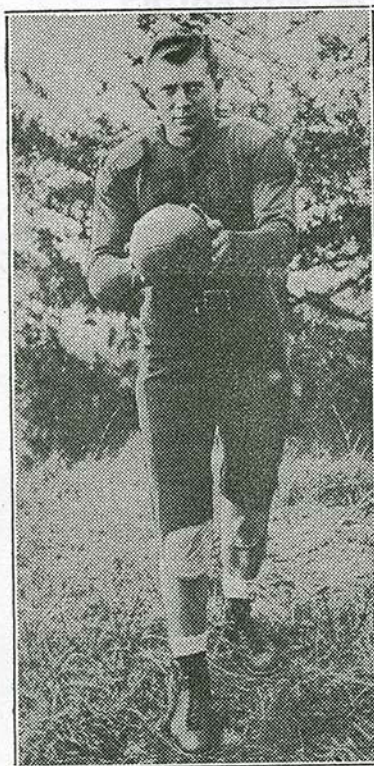
The director of the college band has a responsibility almost on a par with that of the coaches in promoting winning football teams. The eagerness and pep of the cheering sections depend a lot upon the efforts of the band director.

Stepping into that position this year is Dr. Rudolph D. Anfinson, who comes to Hays as head of the music department.

Dr. Anfinson has his Bachelor of Education, Master of Arts, and Doctor of Philosophy Degrees from the University of Minnesota. With private study of music at MacPhail School of Music and the University of Minnesota, Dr. Anfinson has received the training necessary for directing the band in a capable manner.

Dr. Anfinson has had ten years experience as a professional musician, doing dance, military band, and symphony orchestra work. Prior to his appearance on the Ft. Hays College faculty he was instructor of music at the University of Minnesota, beginning his work there in 1936. Last spring he was appointed head of the orchestra department.

Ward Riegel, 155 pound halfback from Ford, is easily accredited the outstanding ground gainer of the Tiger's cog-clicking football machine. Riegel, a Senior this year, was chosen as an All-Conference Halfback in '36, and third All-State Halfback in '36.

Since Riegel matriculated at Hays he has earned his "K" in both football and track. Riegel is noted for flashy running, and is said to be one of the toughest backs in the conference to tackle. His generalship of the team has been evidenced in previous games throughout his career, and his loyal fans slate him for All-Conference recognition again this year.

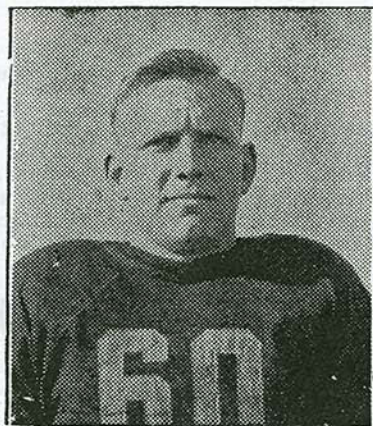

GOLD AND BLACK or RED AND WHITE

Tonight, the first of two successive Saturday nights at home, the Fort Hays Tigers meet the College of Emporia Presbys in a gridiron battle here at Lewis Field.

With the red and white of C. of E. and the gold and black of Fort Hays making a sharp contrast under the floodlights of the field, two old rivals of the gridiron tonight resume a rivalry, which has long been bitter and has usually been hard fought.

Last year the gold and black was victorious as a stalwart Tiger line held the Presbys away from the Fort Hays goal and yielded up but three points, those hard earned through a place kick, while a last-quarter Tiger touchdown brought victory.

Fort Hays, with probably the best backfield in the Central conference and a smooth working line that makes up in teamwork, fight and precision what it lacks in weight and power, is the favorite to win tonight. But last year the Presbys, beaten easily by Southwestern, were "doped" to take a bad licking from the Tigers and they made it a battle.

Tonight's game is the first home appearance for the Tigers since their glorious victory over Flagstaff and their close defeat at the hands of St. Benedict's. The last time the Tigers played here they were victorious over Chadron Teachers. Tonight the supporters of the gold and black hope the same will be true again.

Hopes, tinged with doubt at the mention of the power at Wichita and Emporia, are beginning to stir in Tiger hearts for a conference title. Another victory tonight would bolster those hopes to a new high.

Tiger Tilts

"Go You Hays Tigers" is the battle cry more than ever now! After completing three games of a nine game schedule, the Tigers have a record of two victories and one defeat—an auspicious start to a successful season.

The season was officially opened September 28, when the Chadron Teachers invaded Tiger territory and left on the short end of a 21 to 0 score. In this game, Coach Waldorf's proteges showed a sample of the power they have for the 1938 grid season. For three quarters of play, while the starting lineup was in the game, Chadron failed to make a single first down. Only in the fourth quarter, after the reserve squad had been substituted for the regulars, did Chadron threaten to score.

The Tiger defense mainstays were Co-captains Elder and Stehwein, Darnell, Pivonka, Mosier, Boyer and Pfortmiller. Riegel and Ernie Staab sparkled brilliantly in the Hays backfield. Riegel carried the ball over for the three touchdowns, the final counter being a beautiful 85 yard sprint in a return of a punt. Perfect blocking made this outstanding play of the game.

The Tigers next journeyed to Atchison where they met the strong St. Benedict aggregation. Getting away to a slow start, the Tigers were unable to overcome a 19 point lead the Ravens had built up by completing a series of long passes.

In the third quarter Riegel, E. Staab and Hunley, behind a smooth-working forward wall, successfully completed a 70 yard drive for the first score. Then again cashed in on another drive from their thirty-nine yard line. Hunley went over on a nineteen yard sprint. Keith Elder converted both points after touchdowns to run his record to 5 points in as many tries.

The following week took the Tigers on their longest trip of the year to Flagstaff, Arizona. Here, October 8, they met the Arizona State team and emerged the winner in a game full of spectacular plays both offensively and defensively.

This game was the first ever played between the two schools and a fine start was made toward creating a friendly rivalry for future seasons. From the spectator's point of view, this was a real treat. Again, the Tigers got away to a slow start and were trailing 19 to 7 at the end of the third quarter. Then the Tiger offense began to click. A touchdown pass from E. Staab to Stenger brought the first score of this period. And then with characteristic Tiger spirit, Fort Hays pushed across a third counter and made the extra point to clinch the game.

Outstanding work in this fray was done by the line stalwarts, K. Elder, Pivonka, Mosier, Stehwein, Darnell and Pfortmiller. In the backfield Riegel, E. Staab, Paronto, Hunley and Stenger carried the brunt of the battle.

So far this season, the Tiger team has been fortunate in avoiding serious injuries. The Arizona State battle was hard fought from the opening gun to the final whistle but the Tigers came through it with only minor injuries.

This week the College of Emporia "Presbys" come to Hays to

do battle with the Tigers. Thus far the Emporia team has lost 2 and won 1 which compares favorably with the Fort Hays Tiger's record.

The two teams are very evenly matched and this promises to be another outstanding non-conference game. College of Emporia comes to Hays determined to avenge their last years 7 to 3 defeat at the hands of the Tigers, and Fort Hays is just as determined to add another victory to its string. So, with rivalry running high, fans await this annual C. of E.—Fort Hays battle.

Go you Hays Tigers! And may the better team win.

SUMMARY OF PENALTIES

LOSS OF A DOWN

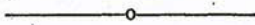
- Forward pass from less than 5 yards back or second forward pass during same play.
- Incomplete forward pass.
- Intentionally grounded pass also 15 yards.)
- Interference by passing team with player eligible for catch.

LOSS OF FIVE YARDS

- Request for time out more than three times during a half.
- Illegal delay of a game by either team.
- Failure of substitute to report.
- Violation of kick-off formation.
- Position of players in a scrimmage.
- Encroachment on neutral zone.
- Center, guard or tackle may not drop back.
- Player in motion less than 5 yards back.
- Player out of bounds when scrimmage begins.
- Ball not put in play by scrimmage when so specified.
- Illegal attempt by snapper-back to put ball in play.
- Attempts to draw opponents off-side.
- Interference with opponents before ball is put in play.
- Lineman running with, passing or kicking ball.
- Player taking more than two steps after fair catch.
- Player of kicking team ahead of restraining line.
- Player of receiving team ahead of restraining line.
- Illegal use of hands and arms by players of defensive team.
- Using flying block or flying tackle.
- Running into the kicker.
- Crawling by the runner.

LOSS OF HALF DISTANCE TO GOAL

- Striking, kneeling, etc. (also disqualification. Foul within one-yard line. Foul by defensive team behind goal line.



OFFICIALS CODE SIGNALS

- Pushing movement of hands to front with arms hanging vertical:
 - Crawling, pushing or helping runner.
 - Hands on hips - - - - - Off-side and violation of kick-off
 - Military salute - - - - - Unnecessary roughness
- Pushing hands forward from shoulders with hands vertical:
 - Interference with forward pass which touches ineligible player.
 - Shifting of players in horizontal plane - - - Penalty refused
 - Horizontal Arc of either hand - - - Player illegally in motion.
 - Waving arms behind back - - - - - Illegal forward pass
 - Folded arms - - - - - Delay of game or extra time-outs
 - Both arms extended above head - - - a score, bringing palms of hands together after first signal indicates safety.
 - Time out - - - - - Sifting of hands in vertical plane above head
