Tonight's Game

Bears Have Speed, Power

Tonight's game brings together the Bears of Colorado State College, Greeley, Colorado and Fort Hays State's fighting Tigers.

Last year's game between these two schools ended in the Bears' favor 21-7. Colorado went on to post a 4-4-2 season record.

The Bears are supposed to be improved over last year with a number of top lettermen returning and an outstanding group of freshman prospects to back them up. Coach Bob Blasi, in his first year at the Bear helm, will operate out of the Wing-T formation, so Colorado's overall attack will be somewhat the same as last year with a few variations.

Colorado State comes into tonight's game with a 1-2-0 record. Their lone win was over the Indians of Southern Colorado State College, another team on the Tiger schedule this season. They have lost to South Dakota University and Fort Lewis College from Durango, Colorado.

The Bears are led in their attack by senior quarterback Jim Sanger, who leads the team in total offense with 196 yards. (This does not include the Southern Colorado game.) Outstanding linemen include: Mike Tomasini, 6-3, 250-pound junior tackle; Ron Klatt, 6-0, 200-pound sophomore center; and Don Cavarra, 5-9, 200-pound guard.

FHS, now 1-1-0 after defeating Kearney State last week, is beginning to show the ability that prevailed last year. With seven offensive and five defensive changes, the Tigers have progressed quite a bit since their encounter with Southwestern Oklahoma. Changes in the offensive unit include: End, Bob Blazer; guards, Ron Gustin and Jim Erickson; center, Charley Myers; tackle, Jim Powell; halfback, Ken Caywood; and fullback, Rich Dreiling. Defensive changes were: halfbacks, Steve Seirer and Lynn Lashbrook; end, Randy Randle; middle guard, Bud Estes; and safety, Bob Niles.

Still out with injuries are John Mastin, Salina sophomore; Larry Noffsinger, Phillipsburg senior; and Tom Foran, Wilson junior.




One Year Ago

One year ago tonight at Greeley, Colo., the Bears of Colorado State College dumped the previously unbeaten Fort Hays State Tigers 21-.7 The Tigers, unable to mount a serious offensive more than twice. failed to contain a crunching game exhibited by the Bears. When FHS failed to score in the opening minutes of the game (following a drive to the Bear four-yard line), the game changed complexion and the Colorado squad jumped to a 13-0 halftime lead. The Bears added another touchdown in the final quarter and the Tigers also got on the scoreboard in the final period. A 20-yard pass from Bob Johnson to Ron Morel scored the FHS touchdown and Max VanLaningham added the kick for extra point.

Next Week

Next Saturday, the fighting Tigers travel to Maryville, Mo., to renew an old rivalry with the Bearcats of Northwest Missouri State College. The last time the two squads met was in 1963 at Maryville. That game ended in a 7-7 tie. Going into tonight's game with William Jewell College at Maryville, the Bearcats are 1-1 on the season. They lost to Drake University in their opener, then defeated Peru (Neb.) State College last week. In the 14-game series between NWM and FHS, the Tigers have won 8, lost five and tied one. Pre-season press releases indicated the squad should be stronger than last year's—a team that posted a 6-3 mark.





Coach McConnell

Head football coach Wayne J. McConnell, in his third decade of coaching, is in his 11th season at Fort Hays State this fall.

Prior to coming to FHS, he coached for six years at College of Emporia, where his teams compiled a record of 39 victories, 12 losses and a single tie. His C of E teams were undefeated in regular season play in 1951, 1953, 1954 and 1955, and McConnell was named Little All-American Coach of the Year by the Rockne Foundation in 1953.

At FHS, his ten teams have compiled a record of 37 victories, 48 losses and four ties. His 1962 team was his most successful, charting a 6-2-1 mark. His 1957, 1958 and 1961 teams finished right on the .500 mark, the record in 1964 was 5-4 and last year's mark was 6-3.

Mac earned his bachelor's degree at Washburn University in 1934 and was a social welfare worker in Topeka until 1941, when he entered the Army for two years.

Following the service stint, he taught and coached in high schools at Effingham (three years), Gaylord (one year), Downs (two years) and Manhattan (one year) before moving to C of E. His coaching record after 23 seasons stands at 106 victories, 72 defeats and seven ties.

Wayne earned his master's at Emporia State in 1954 and is an associate professor of physical education on the FHS faculty.





Athletic Department Guided by Suran



Cade Suran

Cade Suran, basketball coach at Fort Hays State for 19 years, became athletic director in January 1965. He relinquished his coaching duties at the end of the 1964-65 basketball season.

Suran succeeded the late Paul "Busch" Gross, who served at athletic director for more than 34 years before his death in December, 1964.

Cade's early months in the new position were active ones, as evidenced by two major changes in the FHS athletic policy. The addition of baseball to the athletic program and the sale of season reserved seats in football.

As basketball coach, Suran guided his 19 Tiger teams to 264 victories and only 151 losses. That span included only four losing seasons, and one of those (1957-58) came when Suran was on leave due to ill health.

His teams won CIC championships in 1950, 1959, 1962 and 1963 and copped the NAIA District 10 titles in 1959, 1962 and 1963. They competed in the 42-team NAIA Tournament of Champions those same three years, earning fourth-place honors in 1959 and 1963.

Before coming to FHS in 1946, Suran coached in high schools at Harlan, Downs and Wellington. He spends part of his summers as an insurance adjuster and has farming interests in Central Kansas. He is also in demand is a banquet speak-

er and a square dance caller. Cade also served as golf coach last spring.



Basketball Outlook Is Encouraging



Coach Chuck Brehm

Head basketball coach Charles G. (Chuck) Brehm will begin his second season at Fort Hays State when basketball practice opens this fall. Brehm's 1965-66 cagers posted an 11-10 mark last year. They tied for third place in the CIC with Omaha University.

Brehm will welcome only five lettermen back from last year's team but he is noticeably happy with a fine group of freshmen. Nine outstanding cagers from Kansas and Colorado high schools have enrolled at FHS and have indicated they want to become a part of Tiger basketball tradition.

One of the nation's winningest "young" coaches, Brehm coached for five years at Dodge City Junior College before taking the reins from Cade Suran at FHS. At Dodge City, Brehm's Conquistadors won the national junior college basketball championship in 1964 and finished fifth in 1965.


A native of Topeka, Brehm received his bachelor's degree at Washburn University in 1954 after earning All-CIC basketball honors three times.



Coach Dave Winter


