Today's Game

Missourians to Try FHS Tigers

This evening's football contest brings together the Bearcats from Northwest Missouri State College and the Fort Hays State College Tigers.

NWMSC comes in looking for its first win in three outings. The Bearcats found the going tough against Arkansas A & M and William Jewell College and will attempt to find the secret to winning tonight when they face the Tigers.

FHS takes its 1-2 season mark into the fray and will fry to pick up its 10th win in the 16-game series. NWMSC has won five games from the Tigers and one contest ended in a tie. The last meeting between the two institutions came off in 1966 and the Tigers won it 29-7 at Maryville.

NWMSC lost some of its top "Cats" this season but returned a host of good, experienced football players. Some people to watch are ends Leon Muff and Barry Monaghan, and quarterback Steve Schottel.

Many Tiger and old CIC football fans will remember Bearcat Coach Ivan Schottel. He formerly coached the St. Benedict's Ravens to five CIC titles during a 10-year stay.

In Tigerland Coach Wayne McConnell and staff should have the Bengals ready for the Bearcat invasion. McConnell said his charges played their best game of the year though losing to a fine Colorado State College football team. Several lineup changes were evident in that contest and the results were encouraging. Some of the injuries that plagued FHS last week should be healed and hopefully the hosts will be able to go at "almost full strength."

Five games remain on the Tiger slate this fall including Washburn University, Oct. 12; Emporia State, Oct. 19; Southern Colorado State, Oct. 26; Pittsburg State, Nov. 2; and Omaha University, Nov. 9. Home games are with Washburn University and Pittsburg State.

Next Week . . .

Fort Hays State opens its final CIC campaign next week against muchimproved Washburn University in a 2 p.m. Homecoming contest.

The Tigers will be shooting for their fourth straight win over the visiting Ichabods from Topeka. FHS pounded Washburn 35-0 last season in a contest on the road.

However, Washburn leads the traditional rivalry between the two schools, 21 to nine, including three ties. The FHS-Washburn series opened in 1928 with a 6-6 tie.

Washburn opened this season with a surprising 26-20 victory over Kearney (Neb.) State College at Topeka. Kearney posted an unblemished 9-0 mark last season while the Ichabods clipped to an 0-9 record, including a 55-6 loss to Kearney.

The Ichabods have dropped their last two contests, 34-0 to a strong Central Missouri State squad and 10-7 to Southern Colorado State College last Saturday.

In last year's contest at Topeka, the Tigers ended a three-game losing skein as quarterback Leo Hayden tied a school record by tossing four touchdown passes. Dennis Spratt was on the receiving end of three of the scoring aerials while Ken Caywood was involved in the other scoring play.



A Look at the Newly Created RMAC

Next year Fort Hays State joins the new Rocky Mountain Athletic Conference with CIC members Omaha University, Emporia State and Pittsburg State. Only Washburn University has elected not to join the new conference.

The first athletic conference to be organized in Colorado was the Colorado Football Association in 1889.

Its members included two teams as well as feams representing colleges and universities. There were no eligibility rules and town men played on college teams and, in turn, college men played on the town teams whenever it become necessary to "spike up" one of the teams.

In order to tighten up eligibility requirements, the Colorado Intercollegiate Athletic Association was organized in 1893 with Colorado College, Colorado School of Mines, Colorado University, Colorado Agricultural College (now Colorado State University) and Denver University as members.

The athletic boards of the colleges at the time of the conference's organization were composed of students, and student-managers for each sport were responsible for the administrative and financial aspects of athletics. After 13 years of stormy existence filled with many controversies, the Colorado Intercollegiate Athletic Association folded in 1905.

Between 1905 and 1909 there was no athletic conference to guide the Colorado institutions, the athletic schedules were arranged between student team-managers representing the competing schools.

It became customary to write the eligibility rules governing the participants, as well as the financial arrangements, into each game contract. As a result, uniform eligibility rules were not always observed.

Some of the schools celebrated the absence of regulation by instituting well-organized recruiting and subsidization programs. Cries of professionalism, camps raiding and low eligibilty standards led the administrators of the Colorado schools to consider the formation of a new conference to be controlled by the faculties rather than the students. The idea behind faculty control was that the practice of recruiting and subsidization of athletics would be eliminated and standards of admission and eligibilty would be elevated.

Members of the newly expanded Rocky Mountain Athletic Conference will include Emporia State, Omaha University, Pittsburg State, Southern Colorado, Colorado State College and FHS in the Plains Division. Mountain Division members wll include Fort Lewis at Durango, Colorado School of Mines at Golden, Adams State at Alamosa, Western Colorado at Gunnison, Regis College at Denver, College of Southern Utah at Cedar City, Westminister College at Salt Lake City, New Mexico Highlands University at Las Vegas and Western New Mexico University at Silver City.





Coach McConnell's Information Sheet

Head football coach Wayne J. McConnell is starting his 13th year at Fort Hays State this fall.

At FHS, his teams have logged a record of 47 wins, 58 losses and four ties. Last year's Tigers were 3-5 on the campaign. His 1957, 1958 and 1961 teams finished right on the .500 mark, the record in 1962 was 6-2-1, in 1964 was 5-4, in 1965—6-3 and in 1966, a highly successful 7-2.

Prior to coming to FHS, he coached six years at College of Emporia where his 1951, 1953, 1954 and 1955 teams were undefeated in regular season action. In 1953, McConnell was named Little All-American Coach of the Year by the Rockne Foundation.

He also coached high school at Effingham (three years), Gaylord (one year), Downs (two years) and Manhattan (one year) after his service stint. His 24-year record stands at 113 victories, 74 losses and seven ties.

Mac earned a bachelor's degree at Washburn University in 1934 and was a social welfare worker in Topeka until he joined the Army in 1941.

Wayne earned his Master's at Emporia State in 1954 and is an associate professor of physical education on the FHS faculty.

Little Known Facts About the Fort Hays State Tigers

Fort Hays State's football squad is comprised of more than 50 gridders, consequently there are more than 50 story possibilities in the Tiger camp. The following anecedotes were gleaned from information sheets filled out by the Tigers.

Eleven Tigers are married. Included are tackles Jim Powell and Dick Barta; end Terry Enright; halfbacks Carl Helm, Steve Seirer and Roger Faulkender; guard Ken Burkhart; linebacker Paul Simmons; fullback Rich Dreiling; and quarterbacks Kurt Siemers and Jack Georgeson.

Barta and Scotty Black are service veterans just now beginning their collegiate football careers. Barta, however, played service football.

Dreiling and Leonard Prosser are members of Army Reserve units.

Jim Jones, fullback and defensive end, was a twotime Junior College All-American while a gridder at Cowley County JuCo.

Erick Erickson and Dreiling both had brothers (Jim Erickson and Ken Dreiling) who were outstanding Tiger gridders.

Linebacker Tim Dierberger's brother Stan is a gymnast at FHS.

Tackle Ron Walker and tight end Larry McCants are both former state wrestling champs.

Steve Billinger's dad, Al and brother Alan were both outstanding athletes at FHS. Dad was an all-around per-

former (football, basketball and track) and Alan specialized in basketball where he lettered three times.

Enright's dad, Harry, played for the Tigers in the late 1930's and Terry's cousin, Bernie Blevins was an All-conference and honorable mention NAIA All-American tackle at FHS just a few years ago.

Raph Arias is a native of Colombia, South America. He lives with the Clyde Benefiels and attended Hays High School. He said he picked up his soccer-style kicking from his native land.

Defensive end Jon Mastin played his high school football at Campus High in Wichita. During his junior and senior years the Colts lost 16 consecutive football games. Maybe that's why Jon hits people so hard.

The average age of a Tiger football player is almost 20. Jones commands the most respect since he is 24 years young. Several Bengals are 17.

This group of Tiger footballers earned nearly 175 high school football letters. More than half of them won all-league honors at least once, some two or three times. A dozen Tiger gridders won All-State honors from honorable-mention to first- and second-team nominations.

And to top it all off the Tiger coaching staff, Wayne McConnell, Ed McNeil and Art Ridgway (the head coaches) have a combined total of 48 years of football coaching experience.

Pressbox Anecdotes...

Have you ever wondered what goes on in the two FHS press boxes? The east box is a four-area affair for the statistics crews, public address system, clock and scoreboard crew, radio stations and the President's box.

On the west side the wooden box is used by FHS filming crews, visiting scouts, Tiger football coaches, and often KFHS campus radio groups.

There is space enough in the east box for three or four radio stations and there are usually about 20 persons doing one job or another during the course of a Tiger football game.

The FHS statistics crew provides a play-by-play and complete game statistics for visiting press, the radio stations, the public address, the Tiger coaching staff and the visiting coaching staff.

The view from the press box is probably the best in the stadium but usually those working there are so busily engaged in their respective jobs that the view can hardly be appreciated.




