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FHS Head Football Coach Tom Stromgren



With two full seasons of rebuilding under his belt, Tom Stromgren begins his third year as head mentor for the Tigers this fall. Stromgren came to FHS in 1969 and suffered through a dismal 0-9 first-year record before heavy recruiting and a re-vamped offense produced the Tigers' 5-5 mark in 1970. Stromgren and the rest of his staff are pointing towards

strongren and the rest of his start are pointing towards the 1971 season with 26 returning lettermen and a host of talented transfers and recruits forming the nucleus of the squad. The inexperience of a year ago promises to be the experience of 1971 as eight defensive and seven offensive starters return for the gridiron campaign.

Before coming to FHS, Stromgren served as head foot-

ball coach at Solomon, Herington and Emporia High Schools and guided the football fortunes at College of Emporia for two years. His combined high school coaching record stands at 42-15-2 and with his two seasons at C of E and FHS in the

college ranks he is 18-18-1.

Entering college at Baker University in 1954, Stromgren transferred to C of E where he was a letter winner at the quarterback position in football and also lettered in baseball. After receiving his A.B. in 1958 he joined the high school coaching ranks. He earned his M.S. at Kansas State Teachers College of Emporia in 1969 before coming to FHS.

Pride in Effort is the philosophy Stromgren brought with him to the FHS campus and he immediately put it into effect. While his first pride of Tigers ended the season 0-9, "No group of young men worked harder, and they were always able to hold their heads up in spite of defeat," comments


the fiery coach.

But, true pride comes with winning and that is the goal to which Stromgren has pointed his and the team's greatest efforts. Tireless recruiting and a grueling off-season weight and conditioning program enabled the Tiger grid boss to field a team in 1970 that was competitive in every contest they entered.

The 1970 Tigers won half their games but that didn't even slow Stromgren up an inch. More intensive recruiting and a second spring under the Pride in Effort philosophy has given him cause to look up with a secretive smile when asked if it could be possible to build an RMAC champion from an 0.9 club in two short years. The doubters tend to keep their opinions under their breath when they are within earshot of Tom Stromgren.

Only three things can wedge their way very deeply into Stromgren's life during a grid campaign. They are the three women in his life: his wife Sally and his two daughters, Kelli Sue, 11 and Rebecca Ann 10. Even his favorite hobbies of bridge, golf and hunting have to wait for the off-season.

Defensive Coach Jim Paramore



Jim Paramore was graduated from Baker University with a B.S. in Education in 1961. He earned his M.S. degree at Kansas State Teachers College, Emporia in 1963. As a four-year letterman at Baker, Paramore was twice named All-KCAC first team, twice named KCAC second team and was named to the Methodist College All-American second team.

A third year man at FHS, Paramore was head coach at Linn and Herington High Schools and at Dodge City Junior College where he compiled a combined record of 42-18-3.



Defensive Line Coach Ed McNeil

Ed McNeil earned his B.S. at Kansas State University in 1949 and his M.S. from the same institution in 1950. A four-year letterman at Kansas State, he was named Honorable Mention All-America as a tackle his senior year. McNeil earned his Ed.S. at Fort Hays State in 1967.

Coming to FHS in 1957 after stints as assistant coach at College of Emporia and the University of North Dakota, McNeil starts his 15th year as line coach and chief scout.

Offensive Line Coach Jack Ramey



Jack Ramey starts his first year on the Fort Hays State coaching staff. He received his bachelor's degree from Valley City State Teachers College in Valley City, N.D. and his master's from Kearney State College in Kearney, Neb.

He lettered four years in football and wrestling while in college. He was co-captain of the football team for two years, was named Most Valuable Lineman and received an award for being the Outstanding Athlete.

Ramey has previously coached at Lincoln East High School in Lincoln, Neb., Kearney High School and Kearney State College. During this time he compiled a high school record of 25-10 and college coaching mark of 17-3.

Graduate Assistants

Small college football is not blessed with the financial ability to hire the number of full-time coaches that the larger schools can so Coach Stromgren and his counterparts around the country depend heavily upon the invaluable help they get from graduate assistants.

Stromgren has four such assistants this year including one who returns from last year and three newcomers.

LARRY ZIERLEIN starts his second season working with the Tiger linebackers and doing the lion's share of the scouting. Zierlein was himself a Tiger linebacker prior to his graduation.

DENNIS BROWN came to FHS last season to play out his last year of eligbility for the man who had been his high school coach at Herington and also coached him at College of Emporia. Brown is sticking around this season to work with the wide receivers.

MIKE KARL also played for Stromgren at C of E and came to Hays to take over as the Tigers' starting quarterback last year. A severe back injury cut his playing days short, but he is back this year to coach the Bengal quarterbacks.

JOHN GETZ is another returnee from the 1970 Tiger roster. Getz can draw on the experience he picked up as a prep star at Loudonville, O., East Texas State and as a member of the 2nd Marine All-Star team to help him in coaching the defensive backs.

Athletic Director Cade Suran



Cade Suran starts his seventh year as Athletic Director at FHS after spending 19 years as the Tiger head basketball coach. In those 19 seasons, Suran rolled up 264 wins against only 151 losses for a winning percentage of 63.6.

Suran's Tiger cage teams won CIC championships in 1950, 1959, 1962 and 1963. They also won the NAIA District 10 (All-Kansas) titles in 1959, 1962 and 1963. The 1959 and 1963 teams both made it as far as fourth place in the NAIA tournament of champions.

Suran earned his A.B. at Kansas Wesleyan University in 1934 and his M.S. at Fort Hays State in 1950. He coached high school basketball at Harlan, Downs and Wellington before coming to FHS in 1946.

Doug Sebold who is in his second year at Fort Hays, received his Bachelor's and Master's degrees from Long Beach (Calif.) State in 1967 and 1968. The Nebraska native has been athletic trainer at Southwest Missouri State and serves as head trainer at FHS.

Tiger Outlook for 1971

"If we can develop a rushing game to compliment our passing attack, 1971 could well be the year of the Tiger," remarked Head Coach Tom Stromgren when asked about Fort

Hays State's potential for the coming season.

The Tiger squad and coaching staff are optimistic concerning their chances in the RMAC race in 1971 with 26 lettermen returning including eight defensive and seven offensive starters from last year's 5-5 club. "We don't have nearly so many question marks at this time as we did last season,

says the Bengals' grid boss. Heading the list of returnees for the '71 campaign is the Tigers' record setting pass combination of Jonathan Douglas to John Woodworth. Douglas, the Waterbug, is only a sopho-more this season and already owns six of the school's passing records. Woodworth, whose long graceful strides and oblivion to the footsteps of the defensive secondary earned him the name of Easy Rider, owns five FHS receiving records and is still only a junior.

Stromaren believes the rest of the receivers on the squad combine to give FHS one of the best crews in small college football. Contests for the other two receiving spots should develop between sophomore Mike Hines and transfer Ken Ziegler at tight end and returnee Max Evans and transfers

Dannie and Donnie Gardner at flanker.

The Tigers will be missing their entire running tandem from last season with Tommy Evans graduated and Steve Crosby serving an Army Reserve obligation, and the 2,000-plus yards that they gained in 1970 will be sorely missed.

But, the Tiger running game is not without hope. Hard-hitting Charlie Krull was an able fill-in for Crosby last year, and had a good spring. Gary Dougherty, who was Evans' understudy a year ago, and transfer Reggie Ballew, who had an outstanding spring game, are the top candidates for the tailback job.

Last year Stromgren was uncertain about his young and inexperienced offensive line, but this season finds four returning starters and a highly experienced fifth man return-

ing to the "pit."

Mike Butler, an all-NAIA District 10 performer in 1970 anchors the line at the center spot flanked by Jim Bicknell and Joe Gresnick at the tackles, Gresnick moved ahead of 1970 starter Rick Doran in the spring, and a lively contest could develop for that position.

Phil Stramel returns to his starting guard position and Butch Davis who was the number-one reliever in the line in

1970 should start there this time around. Rick Lacey and Ed Turner return to the defensive line wars joined by 6-6, 250-pound transfer Bruce Bruce, Jr., and veteran Charlie Schirmer. Defensive Coach Jim Paramore hopes that this crew can improve on the pass rush which it lacked a year ago.

Tom Spicer, Dannis Kress, Jake Heck and Bob Givens are the top prospects for the linebacking chores. Givens moves over from a backup role to Butler at center last year. Givens received the most defensive points for a linebacker in the

spring game.

The defensive secondary caused the Tigers some problems in 1970, but all-conference cornerback Lionell Jenkins should be even better this year after a good spring and Rick Hahn and Bruce Hawley each has another year's experience under his belt.

After an 0-9 record in the "Dark Days of '69" and a 5-5 record in '70, it would appear indeed that in 1971 the Fort Hays State Tigers are intent on "CLAWING THEIR WAY TO THE TOP!"

A returning starter from the 1970 club - all-state gridder as a prep at Marysville — good student of the game — a year's maturation should show tremendous improvement - pre-med major.

Bruce Bruce, DE, 6-5, 245, 24, Jr.-

An Army veteran playing his first season for FHS after having played for Stromgren at College of Emporia - was voted all-KCAC while at C of E - has the size and quickness to bulk up a defensive line that was the smallest in the RMAC last year - physical education major.

Mike Butler, C, 5-10, 210, 21, Sr.—
Offensive captain — fourth year as a Tiger — all-state as a prep — fourth in state in wrestling as a prep — aggressive blocker who gets up and goes after another man after he's knocked one down — excellent downfield blocker — physical education major.

Dave Creech, DB-QB, 5-10, 180, 19, Fr.-

Knee injury knocked Dave out of action prior to last seasonhad a good spring in the defensive backfield — unanimous all-district selection in both baseball and football as a prep at Angleton H.S. in Texas - National Honor Society student - should help to shore up a defensive backfield that was not always as effective as the coach would have liked last season - mechanical engineering major.

Got a slow start a year ago when he had to shave off some weight - had a good spring and should start the season on the first unit — good blocker and moves downfield well for the convoy blocking of the veer offense - physical education major.

Was a starter as a sophomore but lost his job in the spring—aggressive enough to get it back with effort in the fall—all-conference and all-Southwest lowa as a prep—fourth in state wrestling as a prep - wrestles for FHS varsity - physical education major.


Gary Dougherty, TB, 5-9, 170, 22, Sr.-



Jonathan Douglas, QB, 5-8, 160, 19, So .-

The heart of the Tiger offense — threw the ball 169 times for 1,325 yds. as a freshman who started seven games for the varsity — already holds most of the school passing records and should collect a couple career records this year as a sophomore — called the "Waterbug" by his coaches due to the quickness of his moves — throws well on the run and handles the triple option with exceptional ease — data process major.

Britt Feltner, QB, 5-10, 170, 18, Fr .-

Another first-year man — lettered three years as quarterback at Manhattan High School — also lettered three years in track and one in basketball while in high school — undecided major.

Dannie Gardner, QB-FL, 5-9, 165, 18, So .-

A transfer from Ranger Junior College in Texas — lettered four years in football, two in basketball and one in track at Amarillo, Tex. High School — named all-district, all-city and most valuable player while in high school — physical education major.

Donnie Gardner, DB-FL, 5-10, 170, 18, So .-

Dannie's twin brother — also transferred from Ranger Junior College and graduated from Amarillo High School — lettered two years in football and track while attending high school — industrial arts major.

Bob Givens, LB, 5-11, 180, 20, Sr.-

Transfer from Cowley County Juco — switched from offensive center to linebacker in the spring and won a starting job by piling up the most points for a linebacker in the spring game — physical education major.

Joe Gresnick, T, 6-2, 225, 23, Sr .-

Won a starting job in the spring — basketball and football star in high school — played two years of basketball at FHS — physical education major.

Bill Griffith, T, 6-4, 205, 18, Fr .-

Graduated from Liberal High School last year — was a high school letterman in football (two years) and track (one year)—was named to the second team all-area his senior year—physical education major.

Rick Hahn, DB, 6-1, 180, 20, Jr .-

Third year as a Tiger — all-WCKL on offense and defense and all-state on offense as a senior at Dodge City High — saw action both at safety and cornerback last season — has good speed and is a sure tackler — pre-dentistry major.

Bruce Hawley, QB-DB, 6-3, 170, 19, So .-

A left-handed quarterback who started most of the last half of last season in the defensive backfield before an ankle injury knocked him out of the last couple of games — all-league in both football and basketball as a prep — has good speed as was shown in a 1:57 880 in high school — a fierce tackler with good height for pass defense — undecided major.

Jake Heck, LB, 6-0, 200, 22, Sr.-

Transfer from Fort Scott Juco — all-state as a prep — started as strong side backer all season in 1970 and should be back in the same spot this year — did all the Tiger punting last season with mixed success — has good speed and reads the play well — physical education major.

Mike Hines, TE, 6-0, 200, 19, So .-

Alternated as the starter at tight end as a freshman and will have to contend with Ziegler if he wants it full time this season — had a knee operation in the spring but seems to be in good shape for the fall — lettered four years in football as a prep — physical education major.

Mike Hufstetler, DB, 5-10, 175, 20, So.—

Worked his way to the starting defensive backfield as a freshman then cracked a bone in his neck in the Emporia State game — also served as back-up man to Douglas prior to his injury — hits a lot harder than his size might indicate — was MVP on his high school team in Vidor, Tex. — physical education major.

Lionell Jenkins, DB, 6-1, 195, 21, Sr.-

One of the Tigers' tri-captains — attended Dodge City Juco — all-RMAC in 1970 — called the "Hammer" by his teammates — has excellent speed — a real striker when he hits — a good pro prospect with his speed and hitting ability—three sport letterman at Lincoln H.S. in Port Arthur, Tex. — physical education major.

Lewis Kasselman, DT, 6-0, 210, 18, So.-

Entering his first year as a Tiger footballer after attending Butler County Junior College and Kansas State University — graduated from Ellinwood High School — lettered three years in football and basketball and one year in track — physical education major.

Dennis Kress, LB, 5-9, 195, 21, Sr.-

A tri-captain — saw a lot of action last year although he didn't start much — should be one of about six Tigers looking for a starting job this time around — transfer from Fort Scott Juco where he was all-conference in 1969 — agriculture major.

Charlie Krull, FB, 6-0, 195, 21, Sr.-

With Steve Crosby, who gained 891 yds. on the ground last season, gone to the service, Krull will have to be the Tigers' answer at fullback — an excellent ball carrier whose blocking improved a great deal in the spring — transfer from Fort Scott Juco — business major.

Rick Lacey, DT, 6-3, 235, 20, Sr .-

Started as a defensive end last season but will be tried inside this season — has good speed for his size and loves to hit—transfer from Cowley County Juco — physical education major.

Gary Marvine, DL, 5-10, 190, 20, Jr .-

A red shirt last season from Fort Scott Juco — has excellent speed but could use a little more size — a good striker — could push the starters in the defensive line for a job — business major.

Jim Riedel, LB, 5-10, 205, 19, So.-

All-league as a prep — saw limited action as a freshman but had some bright moments in the spring — solid and compact, stings when he hits — undecided major.

Mike Scheufler, LB, 5-8, 210, 20, Jr.-


A transfer from Barton County Junior College where he lettered in football and track — also attended Butler County Juco for one semester — graduate of Ellinwood High School — lettered two years in football, track and golf during high school — was selected as an all-stater in football and track—physical education major.

Attended Kansas State for the past few years — graduated from Holton High School after lettering in football two years, basketball one year and track one season — named to the all-state honorable mention football team — agriculture major.

Jerry Smith, DB, 5-7, 180, 19, So .-

A newcomer to the Tiger squad — graduate of Burdett High School where he lettered four years in football, basketball and track — named most valuable athlete in high school — physical education major.

Tom Spicer, LB, 5-9, 185, 21, Sr.-

Transfer from Hutchinson Juco where he was a starter on the Sterling Silver Bowl winner in 1969 — all-conference at Hays High — saw action both as defensive back and linebacker last season — hits hard enough to make up for lack of size — industrial arts major.

Phil Stramel, G, 6-1, 200, 20, Jr .-

A starter all season in 1970 — speed, power and intelligence make up for lack of size — third year on FHS varsity—should use experience gained last year to be an outstanding lineman this time around — math major.

Ed Turner, DL, 5-11, 210, 21, Jr.-

Transfer from Fort Scott Juco — all-area, all-conference and honorable mention all-state at Overbrook H.S. — Coach Paramore rated him most improved defensive lineman in spring practice — should have a starting job this fall — physical education major.

Dave Wassenberg, DB-TB, 5-8, 197, 22, Sr.-

Transfer from University of Northern Illinois — outstanding gridder as a prep in Marysville — coaches want to use him on defense but he can carry the ball if Ballew or Dougherty come up short at the tailback spot — physical eductaion major.

Transfer from Cowley County Juco — all-conference football and basketball in juco — broke five school pass receiving records as a sophomore — great hands and hears no footsteps — grace in patterns and calmness in a crowd earned nickname "Easy Rider" — named to first team spot in NAIA all-District 10 and second team in the Denver Post all-RMAC picks — should be the best receiver in the league this season and still only a junior — liberal arts major.

Ken Zeigler, TE, 6-0, 190, 20, Jr .-

Transfer from Garden City Juco — all-Jayhawk Conference and team co-captain in juco — all-conference in basketball and all-conference and all-state in football as a prep at Natoma—tight end spot up for grabs between him and Hines—physical education major.

Lineman of the Year at Shawnee Mission East H.S. in Overland Park as a prep — didn't see a lot of action as a freshman, but his aggressive play in scrimmage drew coaches' attention enough to expect to see him in some games in 1971 — undecided major.

RMAC History

The reorganized Rocky Mountain Athletic Conference began league competition in all sports for the first time in 1969. Football and cross-country were excluded from RMAC championship play until 1970 due to previous committments in the old CIC.

Fifteen colleges and universities compose the new loop and cover five states. The conference is divided into two divisions — Mountain and Plains Divisions. On June 19, 1967, Harry B. (Doc) Kinseley, former information bureau director of the Western Athletic Conference, was named the league's first commissioner. RMAC headquarters are located at 1423 South Garfield, Denver, Colorado 80210. (Phone: 303-756-6311).

Members of the new conference include four members from the old Rocky Mountain Faculty Athletic Conference, four schools that competed in the now disbanded Central Intercollegiate Conference and seven independent in-

stitutions.

The league is governed by the commissioner who works jointly with the school's presidents. A grant-in-aid system has been set up to insure equal competition in all sports.

The RMFAC, upon which the new league was formed, is one of the nation's oldest athletic conferences, dating back to 1899 when the Colo-

rado Football Association was formed.



Fort Hays Kansas State College marked its 69th birthday in June. The institution is a tax-supported liberal and applied arts college, established and maintained by the state.

The college opened June 23, 1902, with 34 students, two faculty members and 19 courses. For two years the college held its sessions in two old Fort Hays buildings on the fort grounds.

The institution has grown steadily to its present enrollment of an estimated 5,400 students, with more than 800 courses and about 250 faculty members.

The campus is located immediately to the southwest of the city limits of Hays, on Big Creek, which wanders through the campus. The campus proper consists of about 80 acres, while all of the college land totals 4,160 acres.
