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Art Class

Figure drawing classes are a highlight of the art program at P. C. H. S. Members of each class take turns modeling as the other art students sketch their "gesture poses." They study all forms in nature to develop an awareness of the principles and elements of design.

They explore and develop skills found in every student through the techniques of all possible media: pencils, crayon, charcoal, water color, pastel, and finally oil and acrylic painting. The unit of additive sculpture with wood scraps probably appealed to the male students most because it is a unit on three dimensional construction.

In art appreciation they study compositions of the old masters and trace the development of art styles through various periods. They link American art and literature to our present day, for an understanding of our regional heritage.

Self expression is encouraged so that emotional release may awaken a love of the beauties and wonders of the natural world.

Music Listening

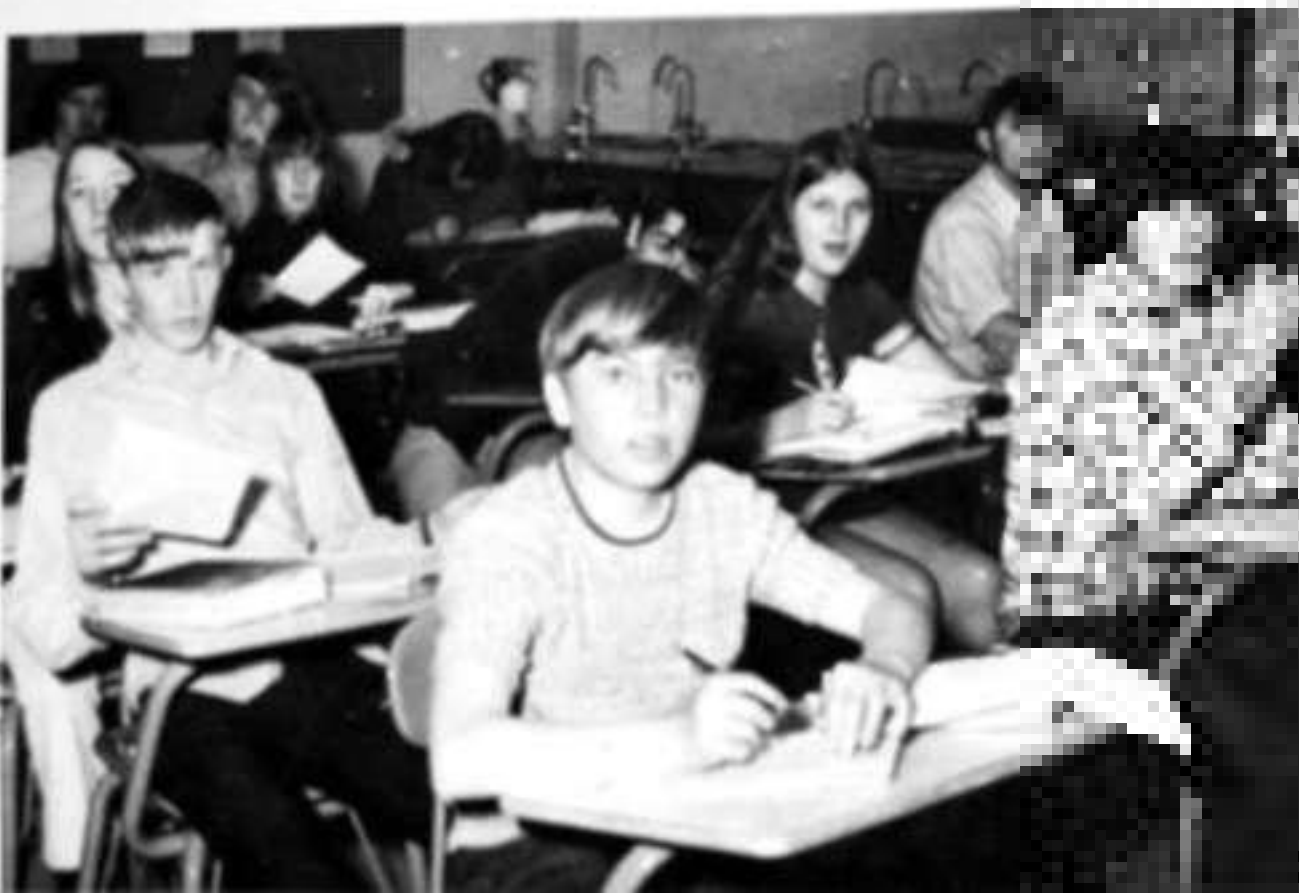
In music listening the students study vast kinds of music and their composers. They learn why music is written and how it reflects the time period in which it was written. The modern compositions of JESUS CHRIST SUPERSTAR and WOODSTOCK, plus Broadway musicals such as HAIR and WEST SIDE STORY were studied this year. The class also deals with country, rock, and classical music.







Biology



Biology, the study of plant and animal life, is a required course for sophomores. Mrs. Sharpes leads students in the investigations of structure and physiology of animals, plants and protists, genetics, evolution, and history of life. Students do experiments with dissections of animals, plants, and individual projects.

Chemistry



Chemistry students, under the supervision of Mr. Harold Crust, learn the structure and composition of materials and changes that occur with them. They learn through experimentation and sometimes--their mistakes.

Physics and physical science are also offered by the department.

Physical Education



In physical education the girls play many different games which include volleyball, basketball, soccer, badminton, hockey, and archery. And would you believe they learn karate to learn to defend themselves!



erball is just one of several activities emphasized in physical education for boys. Others include crab soccer, ping-pong, square dancing, volleyball, softball, track-olympics, and tumbling. New activities this year included judo, wrestling, physical fitness (weight machine), obstacle course, and knee football. In order to raise money to pay for our new ensolite mat, the P. E. classes sponsored "Activity Nites" at the gym, as well as a Donkey Basketball game.

Math

The math department offers General Math, Business Math, Algebra I, Algebra II, Geometry, and Algebra III/Trigonometry. The purpose for teaching mathematics in high school is to develop logical reasoning and abstract thought processes.



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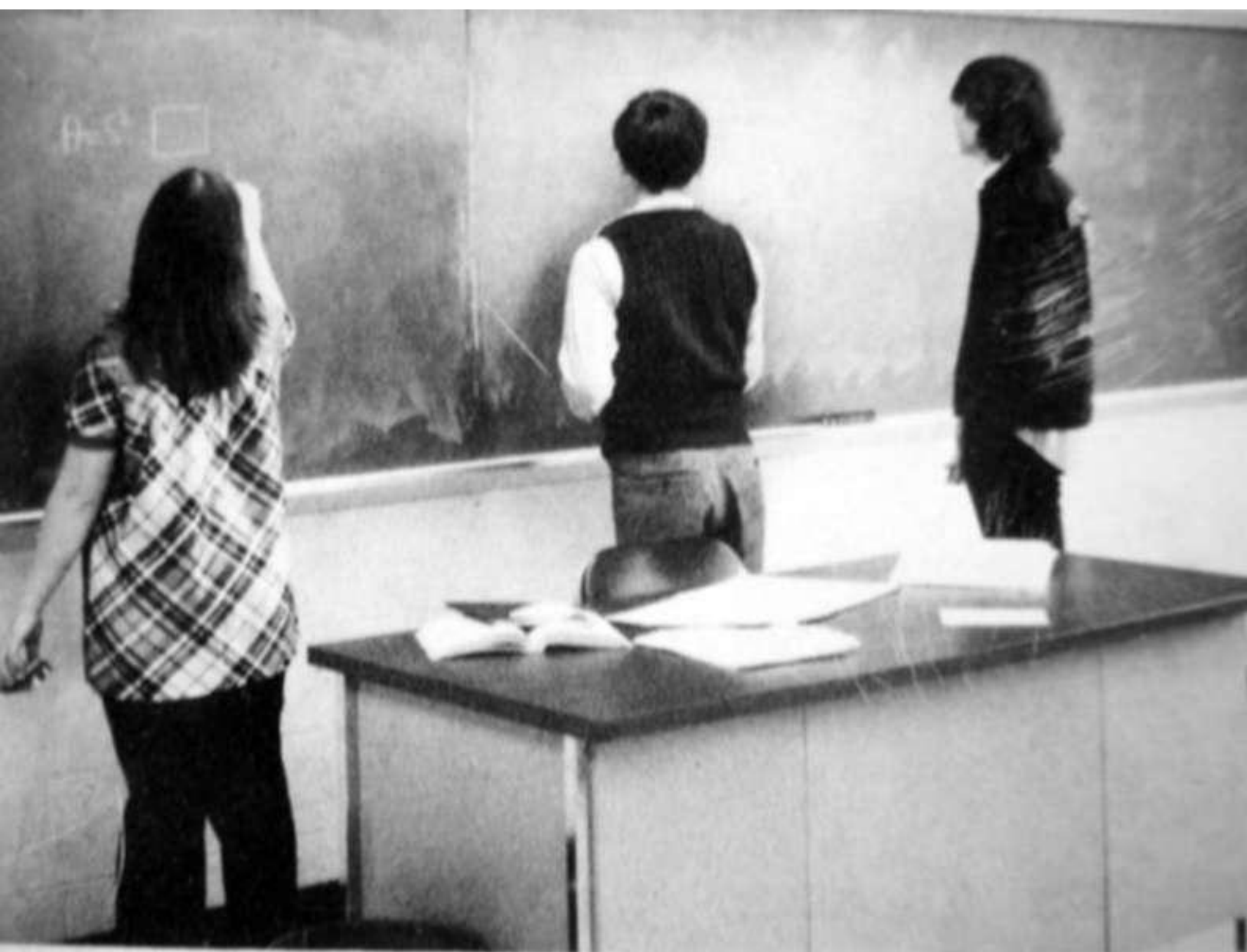
English D

Commercial Sewing

Commercial Sewing is a two hour block class. The girls learn to make clothes, seat covers, and curtains. They have field trips to sewing factories and to learn how to buy fabrics.

The class also presented a Spring Fashion Show where girls modeled clothing they had made.



In the electricity classroom students cover complete house wiring including electric heat. They also cover motors and generators. Although commercial wiring is part of the goal, their main goal is for each individual student to be able to do a complete house wiring in accordance with National Electric Code.

In electronics the boys learn to repair televisions, radios, clocks, and small motors. The class is for ninth and tenth graders; it's also a three hour block class.

The Typing I students are taught the fundamentals of typing; with emphasis on how to type business letters, invoices, etc.

In History class students discuss the problems of History in comparison to problems of today. The classes give the students a chance to express their opinions, makes them more aware of our problems and shows them how they can help.

Poetry is taught at P.C.H.S.



Norman Weinstein, Poet in Residence for Pocahontas and Randolph County Schools, worked with four English classes this year in the instruction of poetry. Weinstein, a native of New York and a well-known poet, was sponsored by the Artists in Schools Program. His objectives were to get students to like and write poetry. A book of West Virginia student's writings is to be published next year.



Foreign language

In Pocahontas County High School French is taught on two levels. The objectives of the teaching of the language are to acquaint the student with the culture of the country under study, to train the student to understand French when it is spoken and to speak it himself.



Latin I, II are also taught. The purpose of teaching Latin is for the student who is college-bound. Most schools require two years of foreign language. It helps to increase the student's vocabulary.

Mathematics



The Mathematics Department attempts to develop in all students a complete confidence in mathematical concepts and skills and to extend this knowledge into more abstract thinking. The courses offered are Basic Math, General Math, Algebra I and II, Geometry, and Algebra III - Trigonometry.

This year students participated in the Twenty-Fifth Annual High School Mathematics Examination on March 12, 1974. Mike Smith, a senior, and Debbie Oliver, a junior, tied for first place, and David Turner, a junior, placed third.

Science

The science department includes grade level 9-12. The classes are: Physical Science, BSCS Biology, General Biology, Chemistry, and Physics.

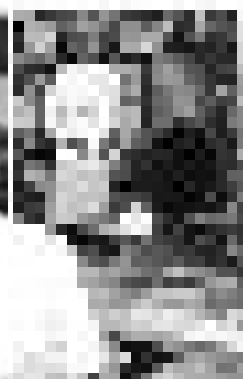


Weaving included in art

Music department



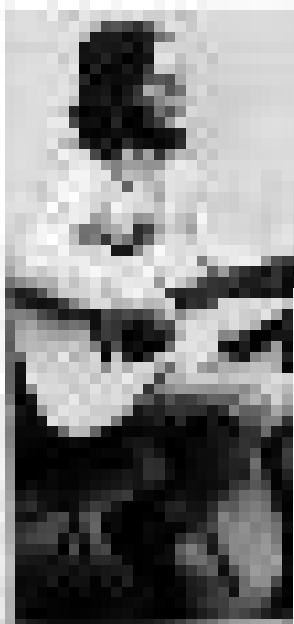
The music department includes four basic classes.

The electronics department is divided into two specific courses; Introduction to Electronics and Electronics Technology (two years).

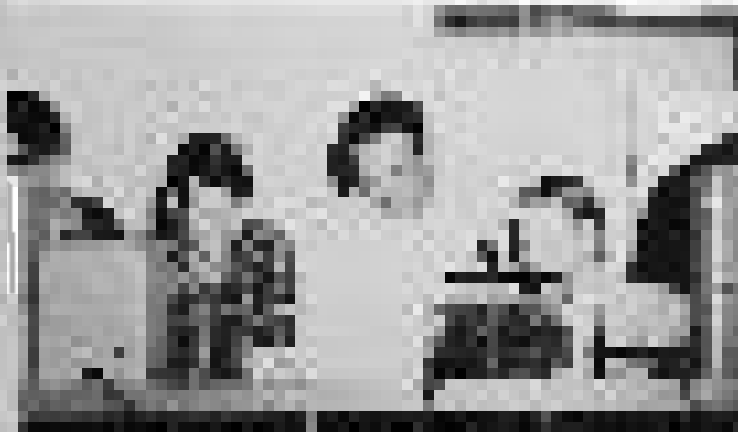
The introductory course is to familiarize the student with various electronics components (identification and basic AC and DC theory). This class includes freshmen and sophomores.

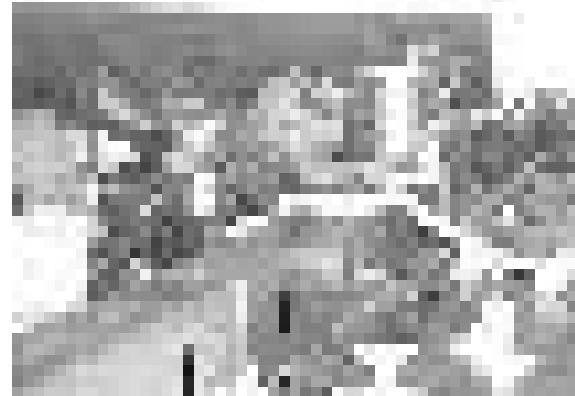
Students For Careers

After the program is completed, field trips are taken to various restaurants to observe types of service and facilities available.

Biology students at PCHS were able to observe a team of veterinarians and wildlife biologists from the University of Georgia conduct a parasite study on two native game birds, grouse and woodcock. The study, which lasted a week, was conducted in the biology lab in the high school. Students observed and participated in necropsies of the birds in which both endo and ecto parasites were studied. Blood samples were also taken and studied. In observing the study, students could learn some of the practical applications of their biology studies. Also students became familiar with several career opportunities in biology.

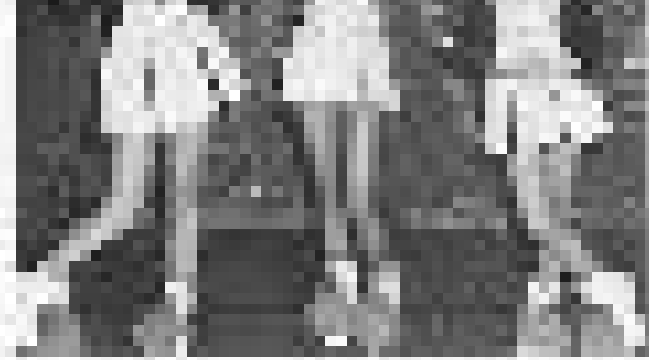

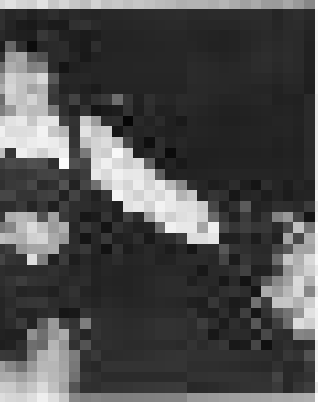

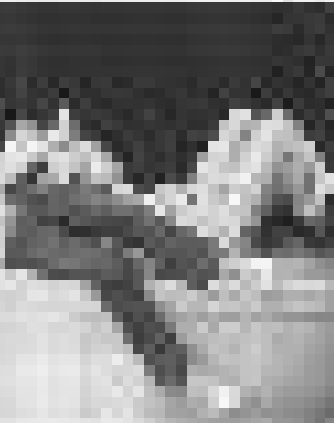

Curriculum

VOCATIONAL CLASSES



Boys Home Economics is being taught at P.C.H.S. for the first time. They learn how to prepare foods, sew, and other things that they need to know when they leave school. Commercial Foods, Commercial Sewing, and Home Economics I and II are taught also. Girls take these classes but in the years to come maybe some boys will take them also.





Typing is a very popular subject at PCHS. Students of all grades may take this class. Secretarial Block, Clerical Block, and Bookkeeping, are also taught for students who are interested in later secretarial jobs.



Electricity and Electronics are each three hour block classes. Electricity helps the student to wire a complete house under the National Electric Code when they finish the class. In electronics the boys repair radios, televisions, clocks, and small motors so that they may be able to fix things around their own home some day instead of having to depend on someone else and the class is also for a job in their future.



Building and Maintenance is a three hour block class. The boys make different articles from doghouses to houses for people. This is the second year building and maintenance has been taught at this school and seems to be a favorite of many boys.



Another vocational class at P.C.H.S is agricultural science. This class studies the plants and animals. It is made up of boys and girls who are interested in farming or animals. They also make equipment for farming such as hay wagons and feeding boxes.

Welding is a very worthwhile class to be involved in. The boys can earn a welding certification certificate then when they are ready to leave school they can get a good paying job.

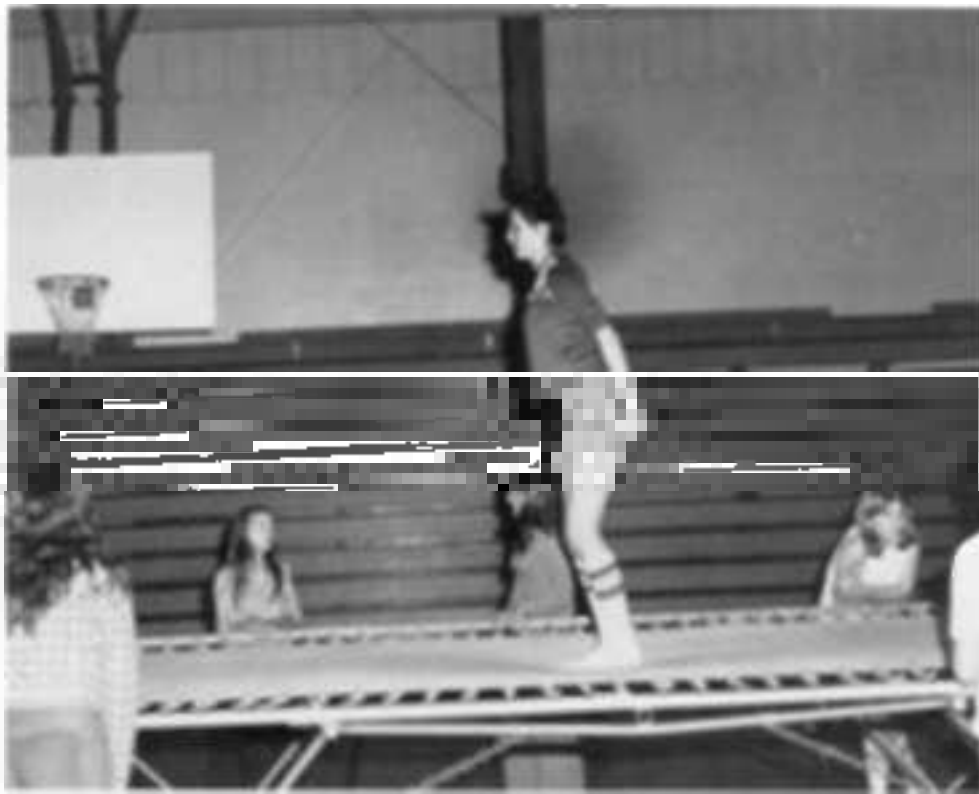


ACADEMIC



Biology, the study of plant and animal life, is a required subject for sophomores. Students do different experiments with the plants and animals.

Chemistry, **Physics**, and **Physical Science** are also science classes which are taught at P.C.H.S. College bound students are required to take at least two different types of science classes and should try to take more if they can.



Physical Education is a requirement of all freshmen but other students take the subject so they can stay in good shape and for the enjoyment. *"Stand Your Ground . . .
If They Mean to Have a War,

1/ Capt. John Parker uttered those words as the colonial militia under his command prepared to meet the British troops at Lexington. These words and the painting—*Spirit of '76*—embody the dedication and determination of the American patriots in their fight for independence. The colonists had organized to express their grievances in an effort to resolve the differences within the framework of the Empire. Several of the colonial legislatures had instructed their delegates to the Continental Congress in Philadelphia to oppose any move toward independence. The movement for independence was gaining strength and following the publication of Thomas Paine's *Common Sense*, which argued for colonial sovereignty, a resolution was adopted and a committee of five appointed to draft a declaration of independence. 2/ General Washington, who had been appointed commander-in-chief of American forces by the Second Continental Congress, was a brilliant military strategist. It was his decision to take his Continentals across the Delaware River on Christmas night which resulted in the first major colonial victory. That victory at Trenton in 1776 renewed vigor. Supported chiefly through the printing of Continental currency, the colonial army also went through the personal fortunes of many American patriots among them Washington, Jefferson, Richard Henry Lee and John Adams. These fortunes were donated to the cause of liberty—a cause supported by about one-third of the American population which was near 2,000,000. Another one-third remained loyal to the English crown and the remainder were apathetic. Despite many defeats, the colonists managed to keep an army in the field as a symbol of American resolve, to guarantee a negotiated rather than dictated peace.

3/ Following the victory at Yorktown, Washington refused the offer of his troops to become king and returned to Philadelphia to aid with the establishment of a permanent government for the new republic—a loose alliance of sovereign states held together by the Articles of Confederation. An envoy composed of Benjamin Franklin, John Adams and John Jay was sent to negotiate with the British. It was not until 1783 that the peace agreement, known as the Treaty of Paris, was signed, guaranteeing the sovereignty of the United States of America. The Articles of Confederation, despite many weaknesses, served to unify the states until 1787 when a special convention was held at Independence Hall in Philadelphia to revise them. The meeting was attended by fifty-five of the most prominent men of the day. Twenty-nine of the delegates representing a majority of the states met on May 25 and decided to draft an entirely new constitution rather than amend the Articles of Confederation. The meeting then became known as the Constitutional Convention.

4/ The men who assembled for the Constitutional Convention were an illustrious group with nearly every delegate a person of prominence in his home state. A large majority favored a strong central government. After four months of debate, on September 17, 1787, the new constitution was completed. In a little more than four months, six states had ratified the new constitution. Despite the good beginning, the fight for ratification was bitter and it was not until September 13, 1788, that the necessary two-thirds majority of the states had approved the document and Congress could call for states to choose their electors and congressmen. Several of the states had ratified the constitution with the provision that it would be amended. Thus, as one of its first official acts under the new constitution, the Congress added the first ten amendments known as the Bill of Rights. Washington was unanimously elected President and a new nation was launched on a course of democracy.

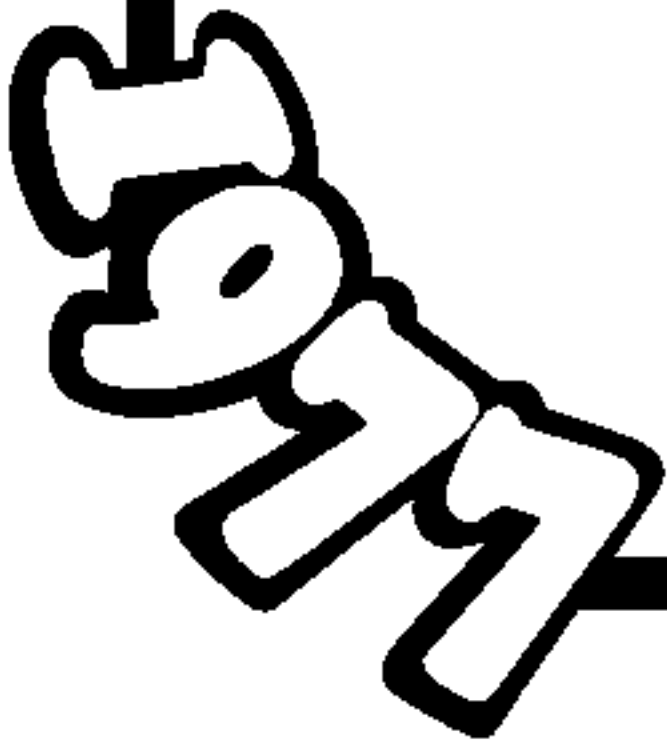

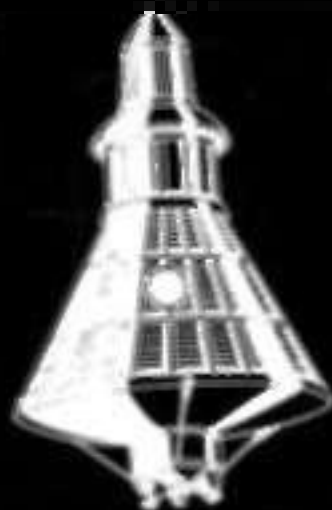

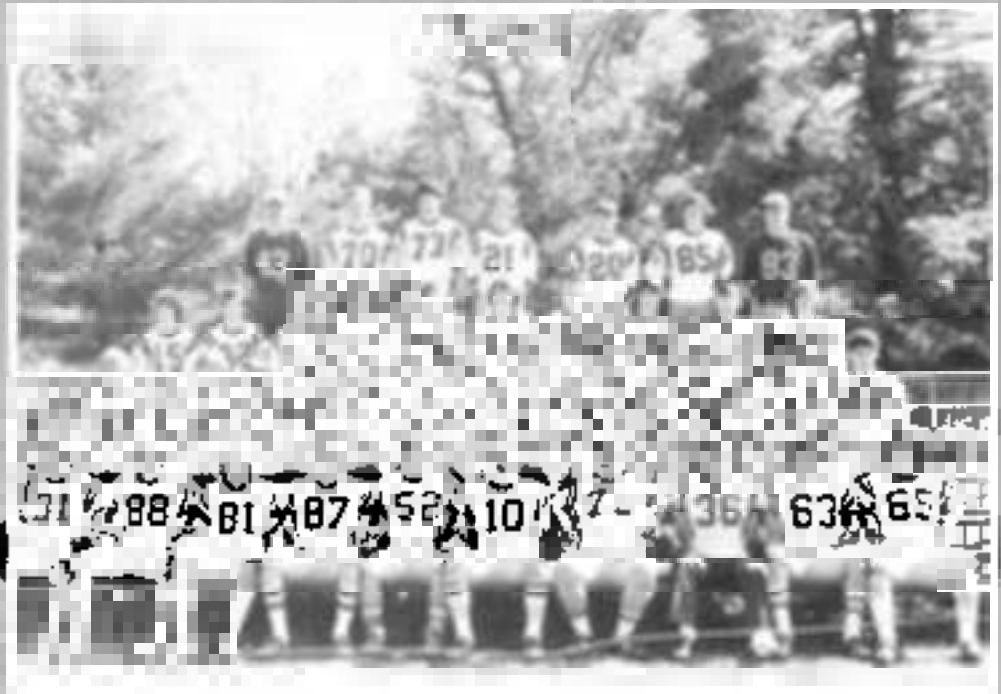
VARSITY FOOTBALL

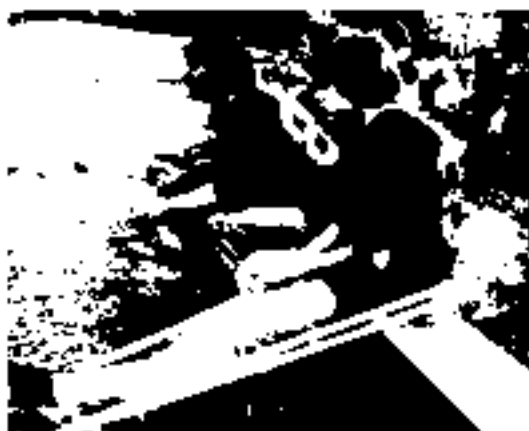

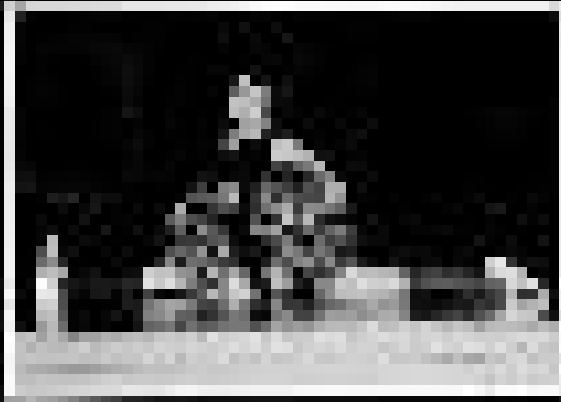
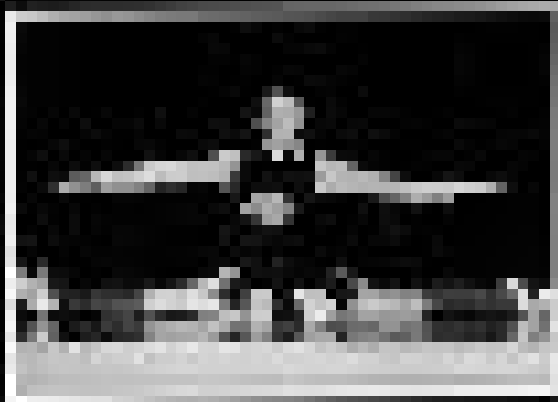

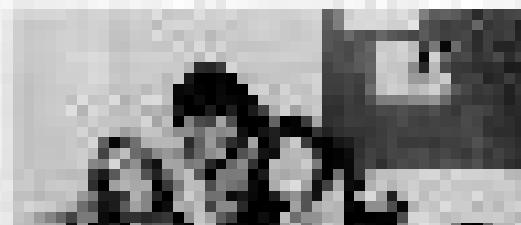


CANDIDS

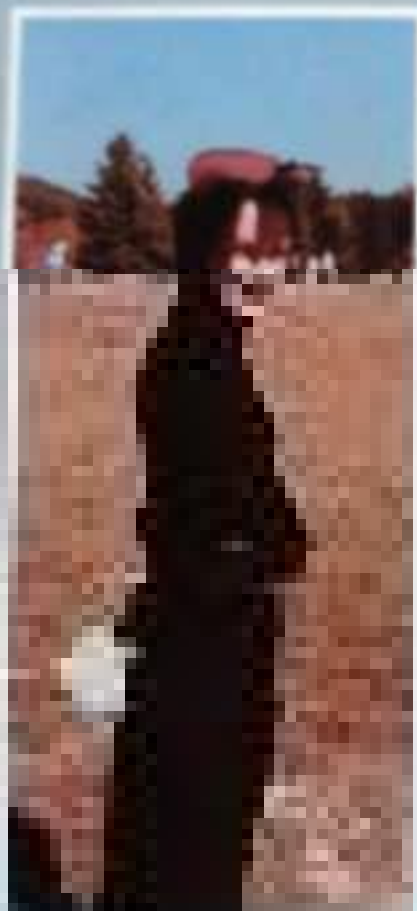

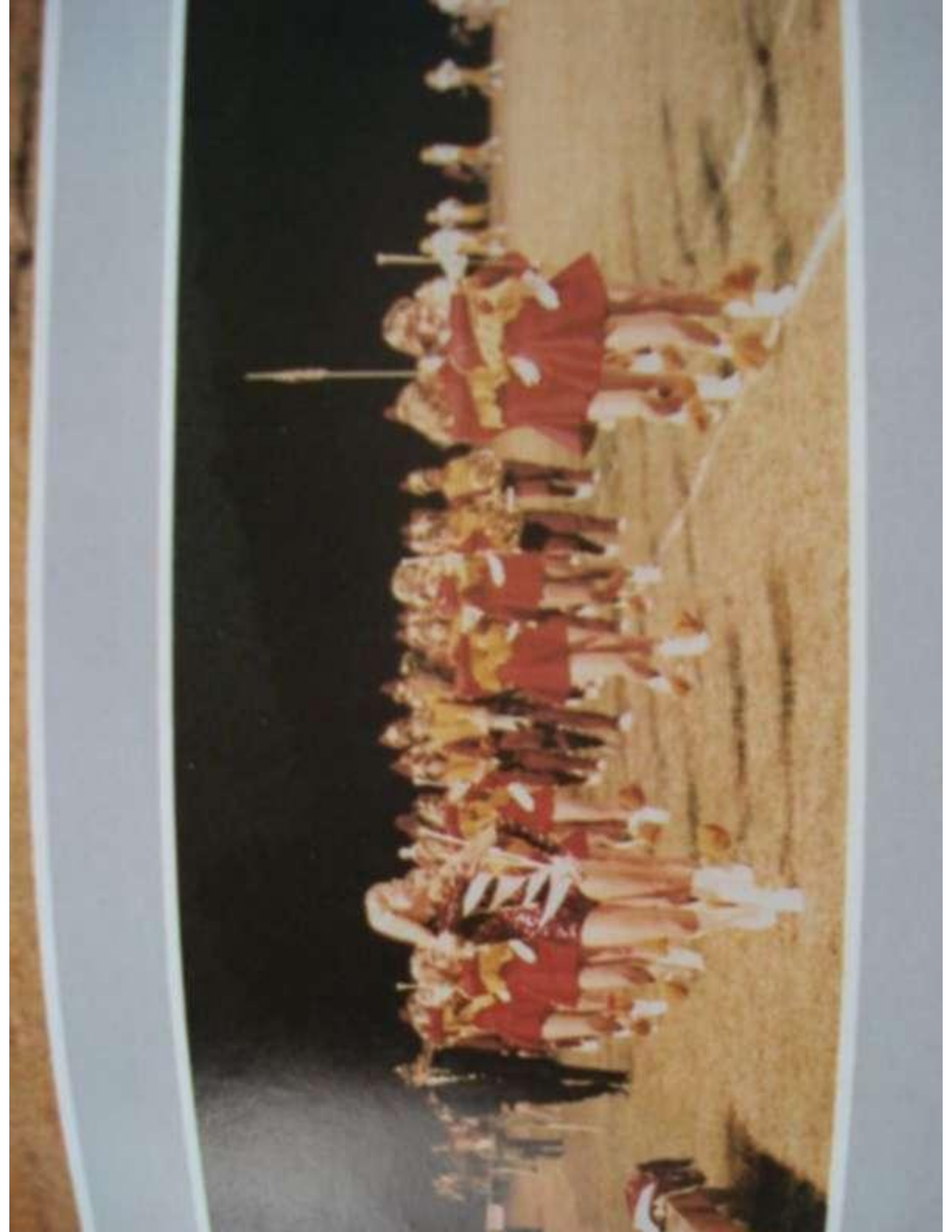

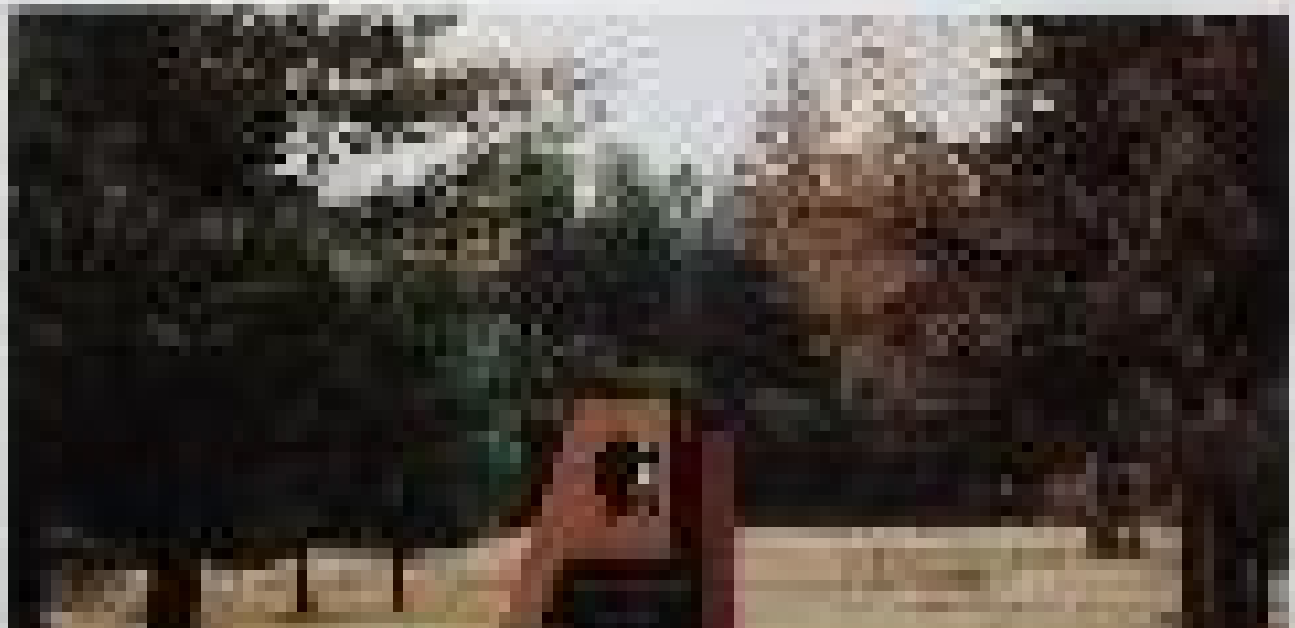
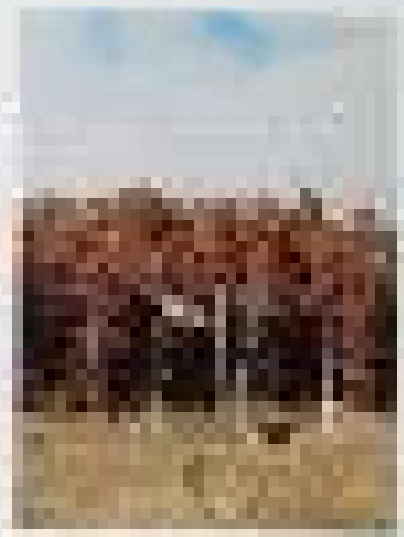


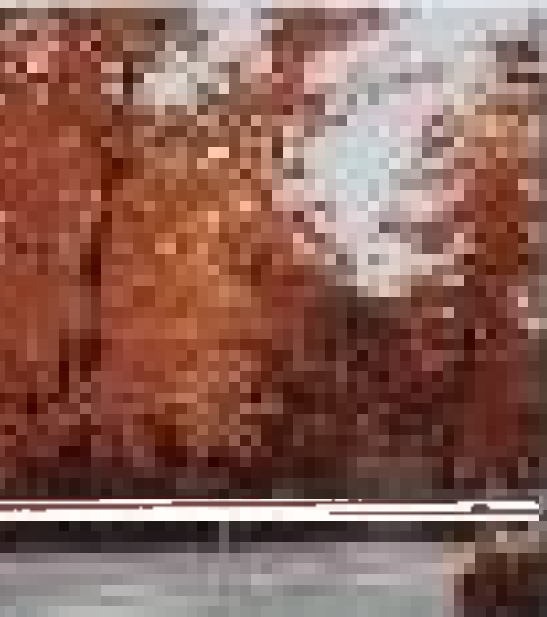
Beauty Is Pocahontas' Ultimate Touch Of Class

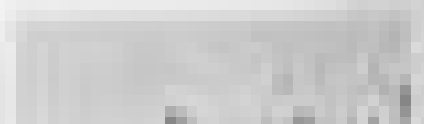
Advanced Program Offers

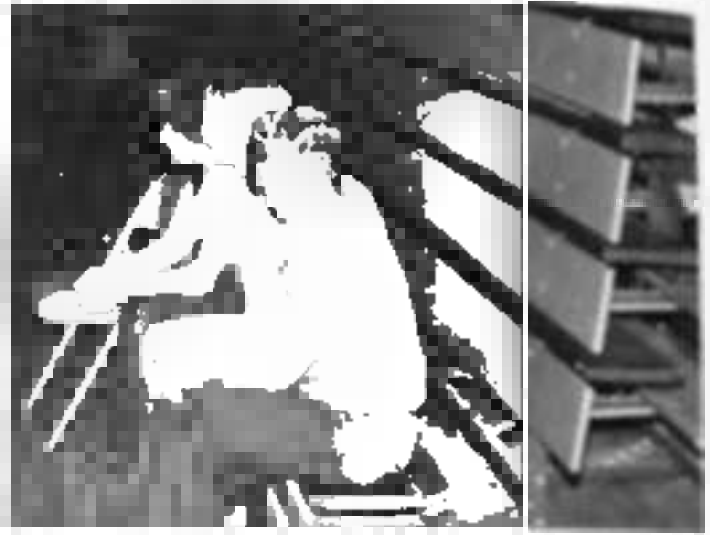

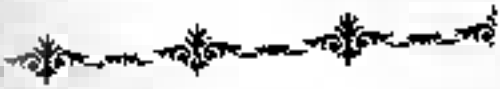

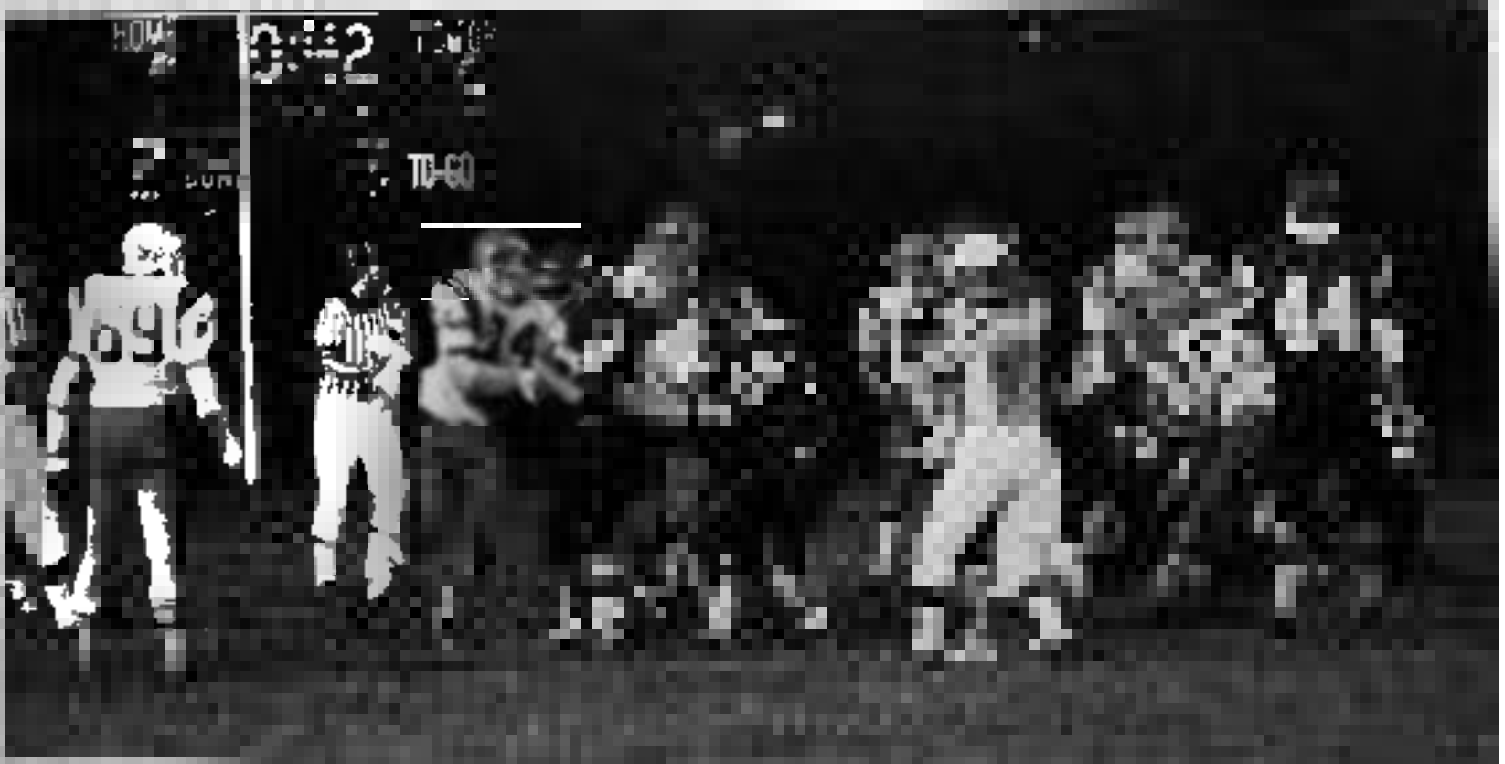

The first few seconds of the Pocon (last year's state champ) game proved to be exciting, but the game gave the Warrior's a second loss.

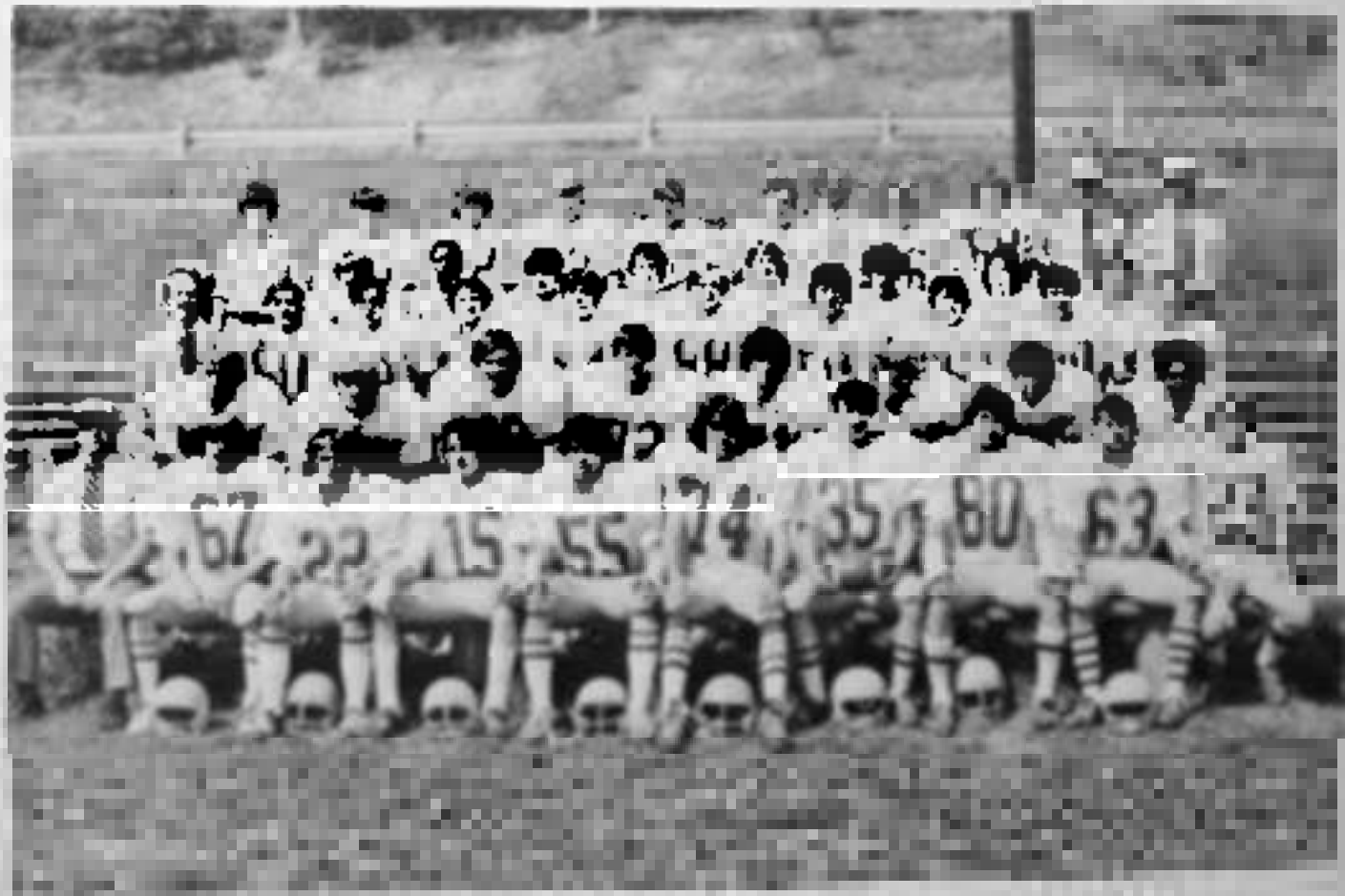
The game with Man (the second-ranked in the state) was the third loss, although statistically the game belonged to the Warriors.

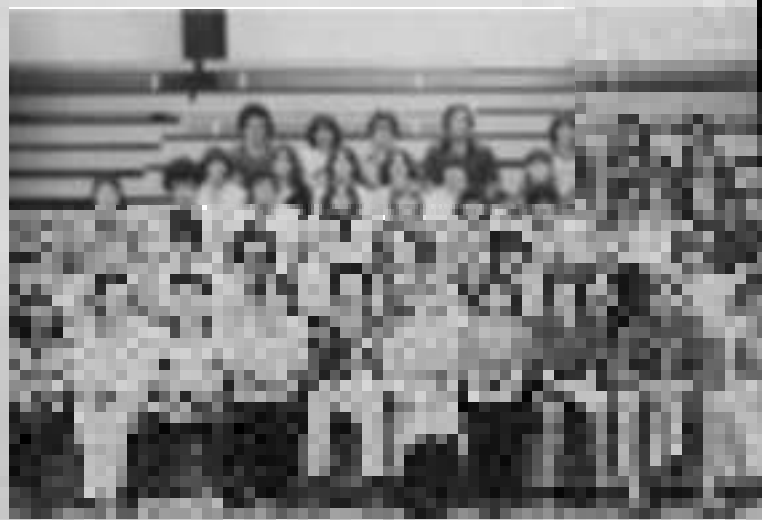

Starting To Move

• In a little over ten years a piece of land near Dunmore has gone from part of a farm to the only site of secondary education in Pocahontas County.

These rural surroundings give the school ample room for expansion and a vast natural study area that has the potential to offer a wide variation of places and subjects to study. In order to take advantage of the natural surroundings and the study opportunities they offer, a nature trail and an outdoor classroom have been constructed.

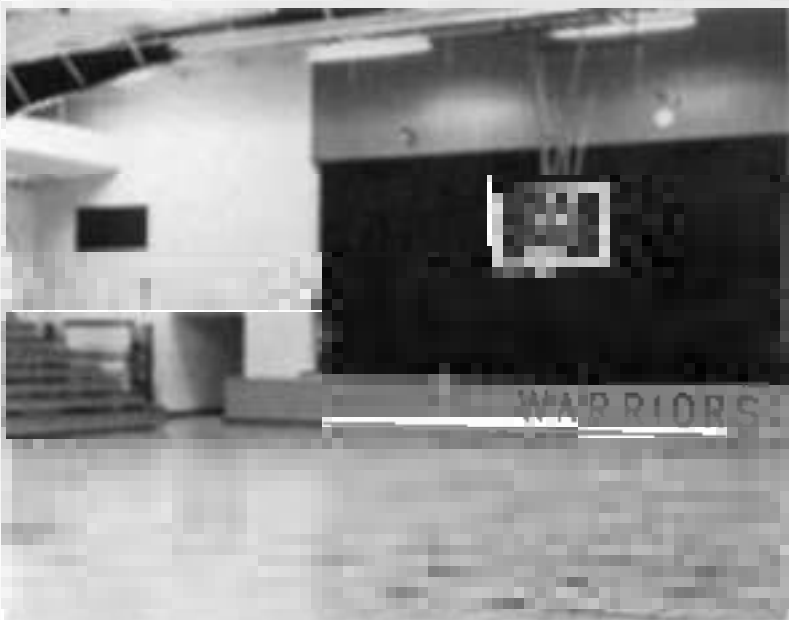
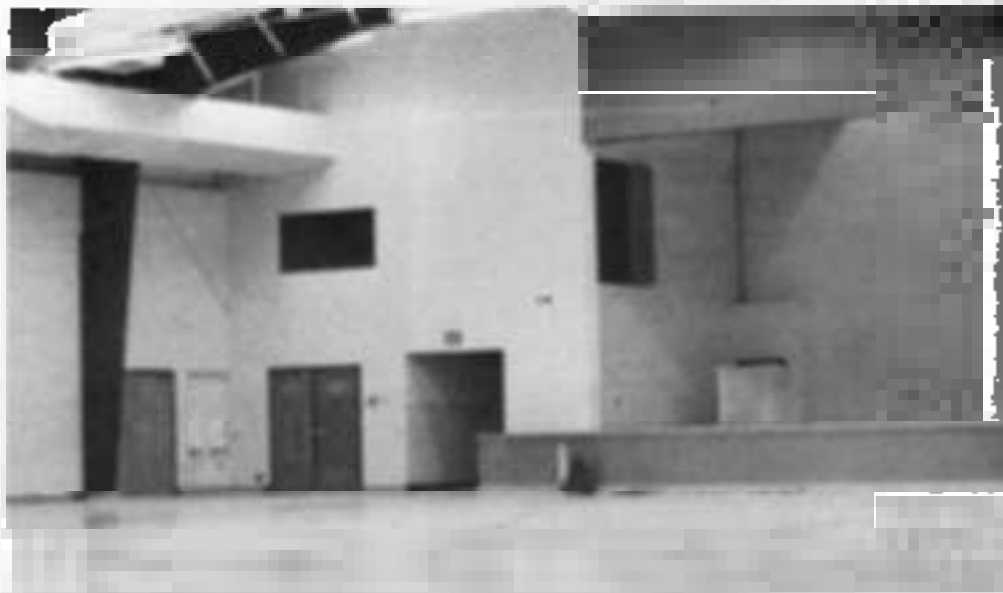
During the years of the school's existence additions have been made to, or along side of, the original buildings. A building that now houses the forestry, carpentry, and distributive education classes was started in 1974 and completed in 1980 by students in vocational classes. In 1977 a new wing was added to the vocational building. This wing now houses the nurse's aid and drafting classes.

Increased job opportunities in the surrounding area have caused an expanded student enrollment. Rooms that were once adequate are being filled. The additional students may mean that further expansion will be seen at PCHS in the decade ahead.

The addition of bleachers, basketball goals, the curtain, the clock, the flag, and WARRIORS printed across the stage give the gym the "lived-in" appearance that has become so familiar.

The gym is pictured as it looked just after the consolidated high school was finished. It still lacks coaches. In fact, basketball practice would have been rather difficult with no goals.

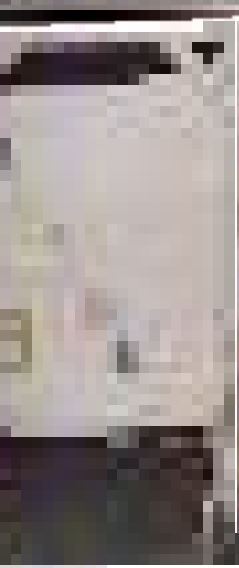

When three local high schools consolidated into PCHS ten years ago, one concern of the public was if past rivalries could be forgotten and members of a newly formed student body would be able to pull together and act as one. The school also saw the impeachment of its Student Council president, the removal of the smoking area and then the resultant expulsion of many students for smoking illegally on school grounds.

which brings about new concepts and ultimate change. At a time when issues should have been worked out, students faced the new decade with uncertainty and found themselves covering lost ground. But wisdom is learned much more from failure than from success. Through the wisdom gained during the past year, Warriors will keep moving on.

Fashions, slang, social attitudes and numerous other aspects of school life have altered drastically — even in the ten short years that our school has been in existence.

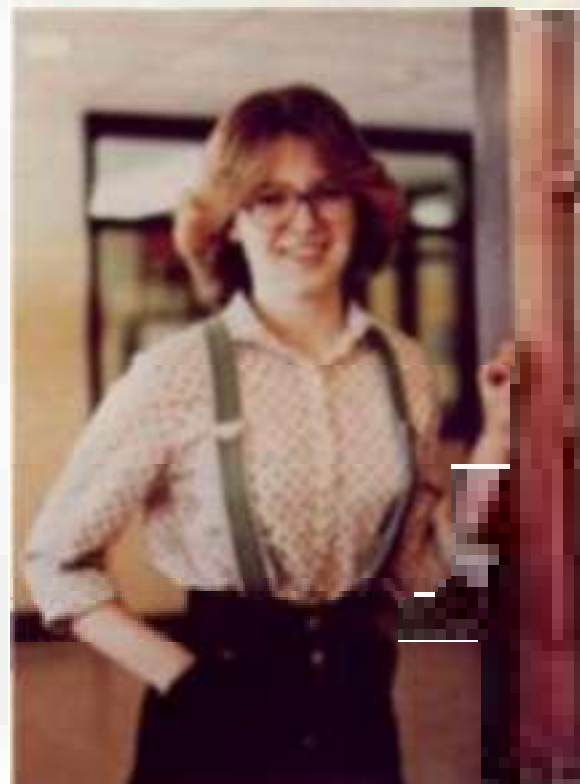
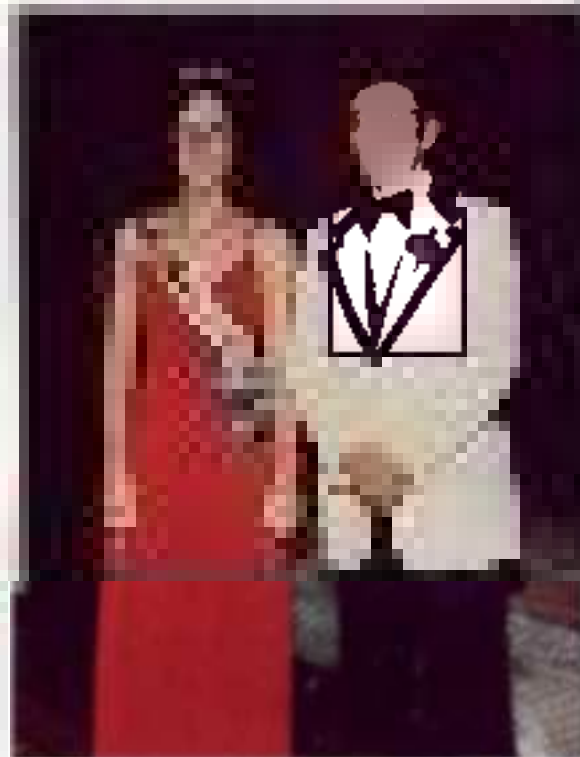

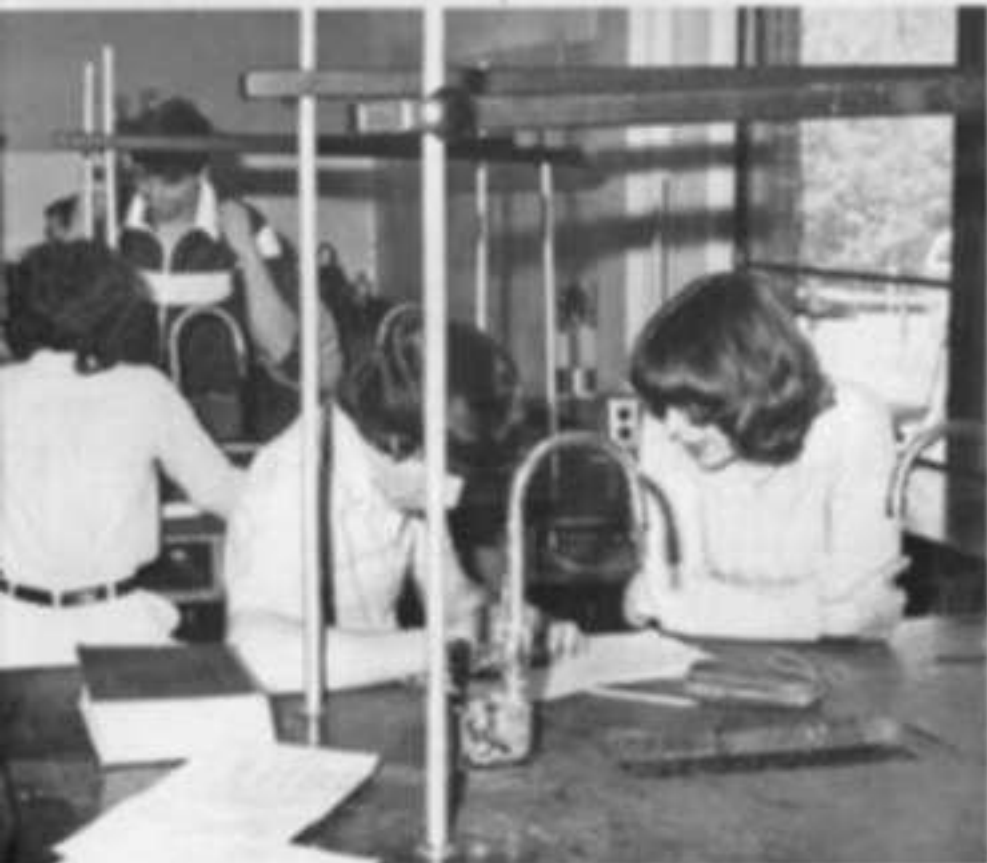

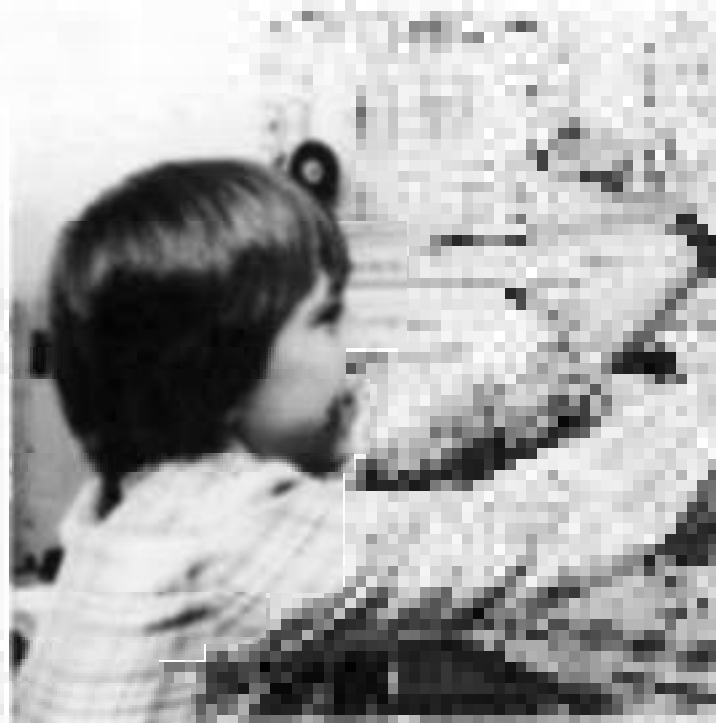

They started off with a loss against Nicholas County High School but came right back with a win against Tucker County High School.

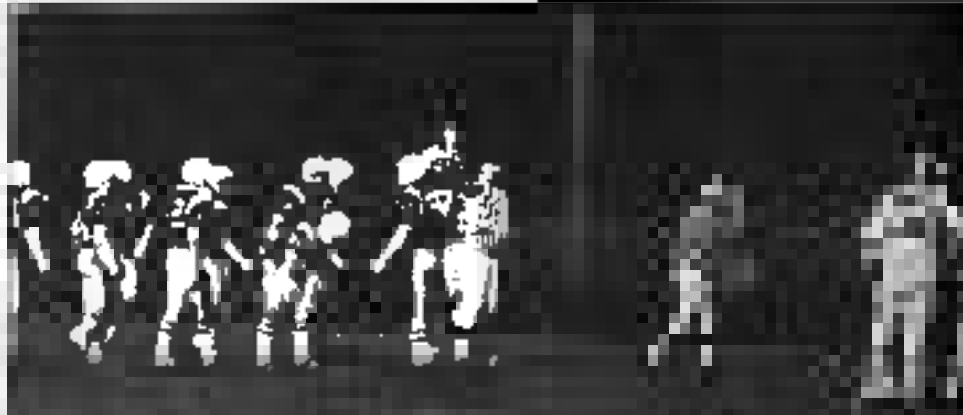
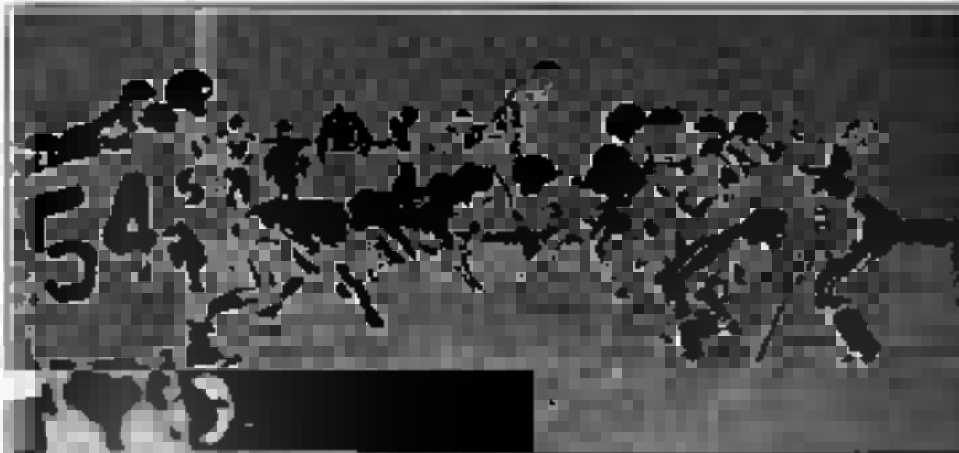
For the first time in years the Warriors beat Greenbrier West High School with a score of 7-14.



Association Of Gymnasts Present Shows

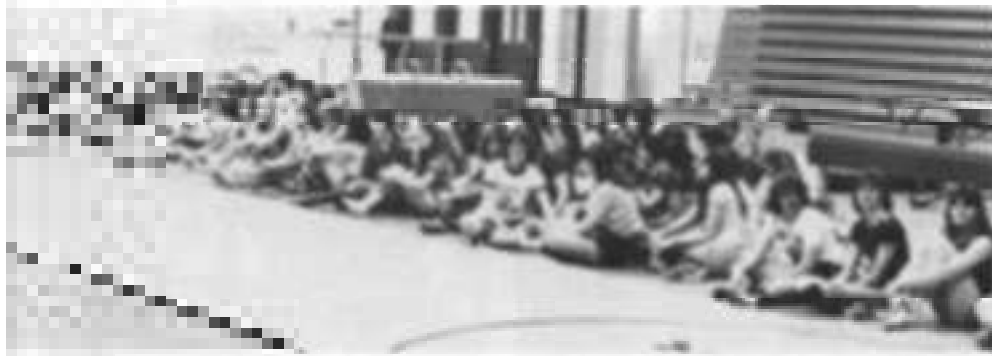
The Gymnastics Club is a group of 21 students organized for the purpose of doing gymnastic stunts for the personal experiences it provides, as well as the entertainment of others.

The group planned to present shows to the local grade schools and middle schools, but they were not assembled in time to make all the appearances, as previously planned.

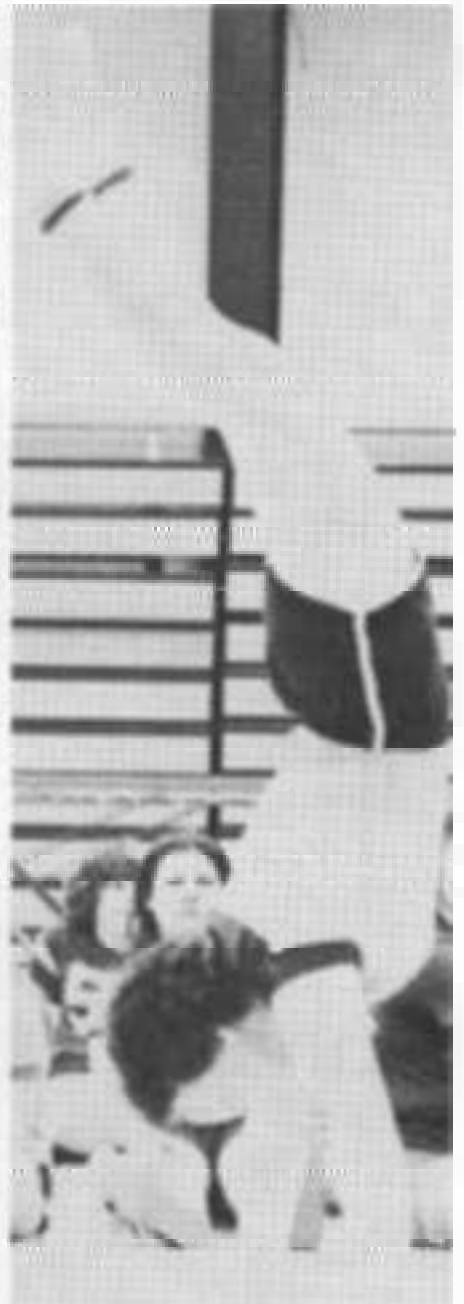

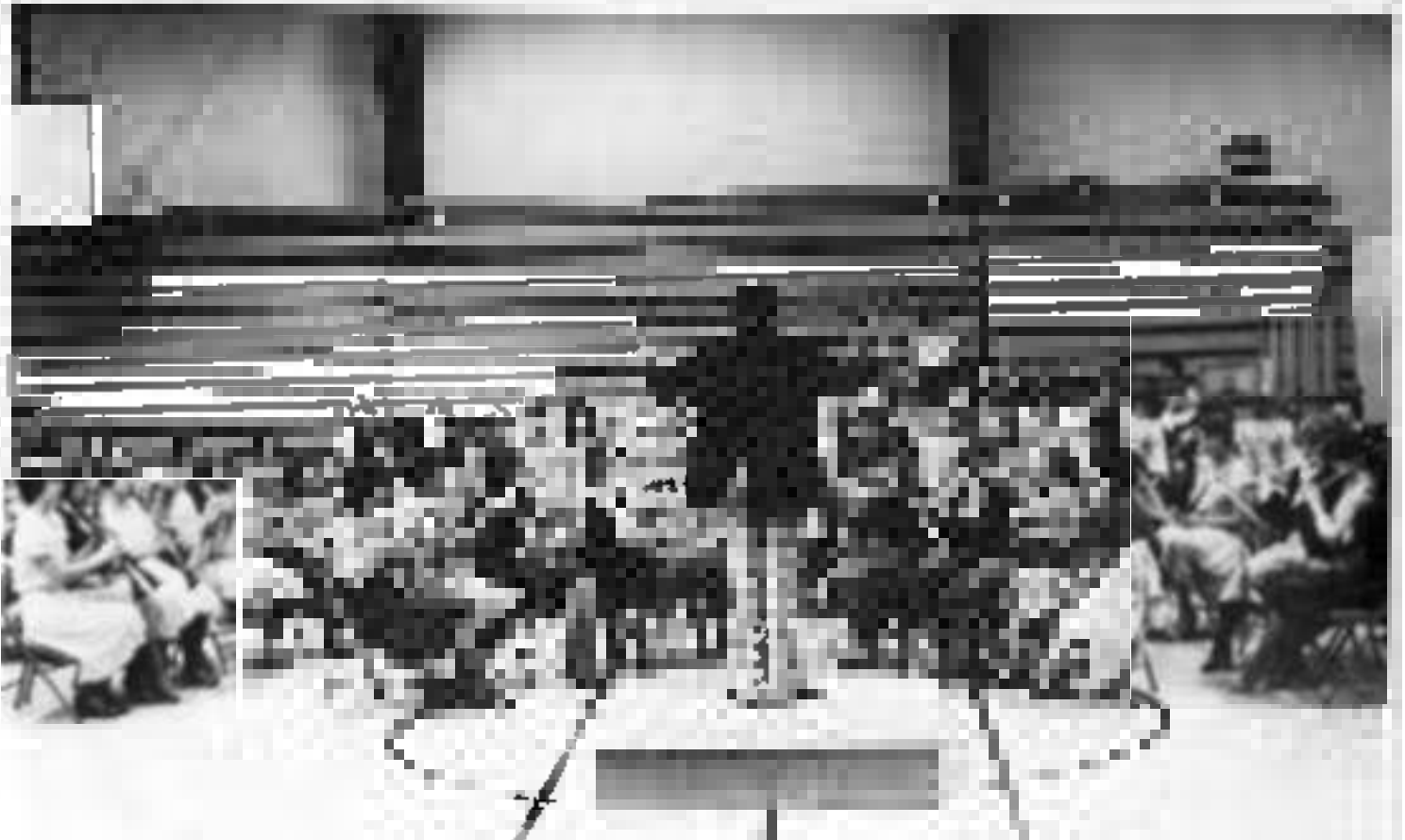

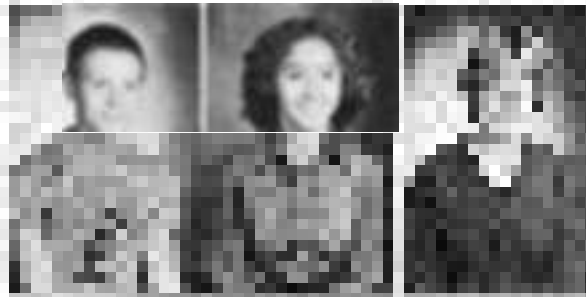

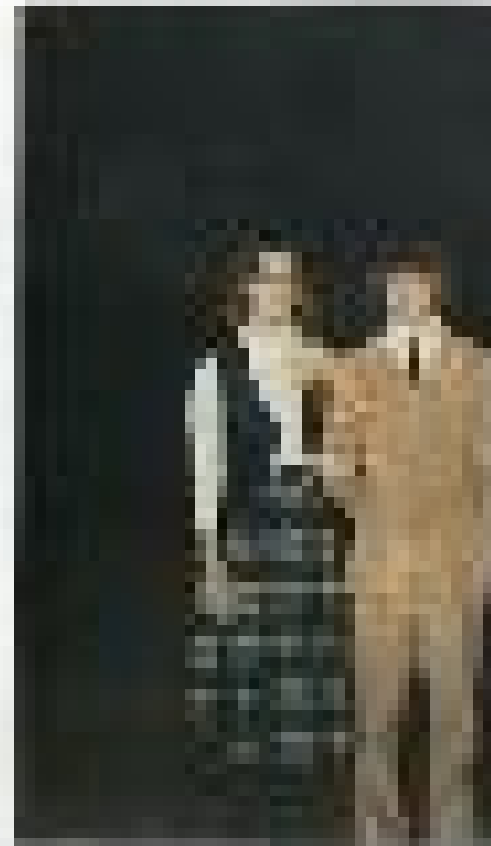
Going to West Virginia University is one thing the majorettes and marching band do during the fall. They attend Bluejays where other bands come to compete against them.

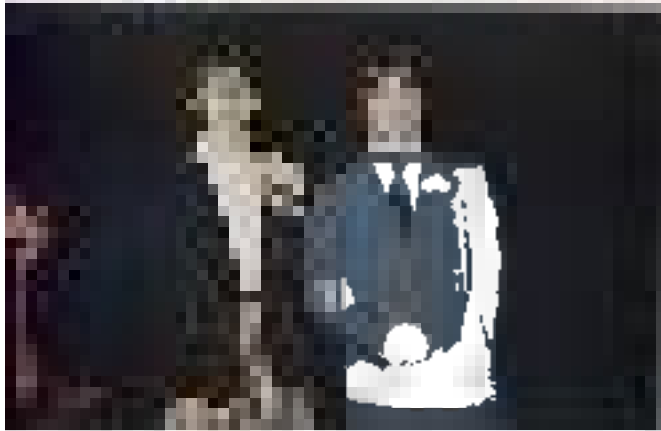

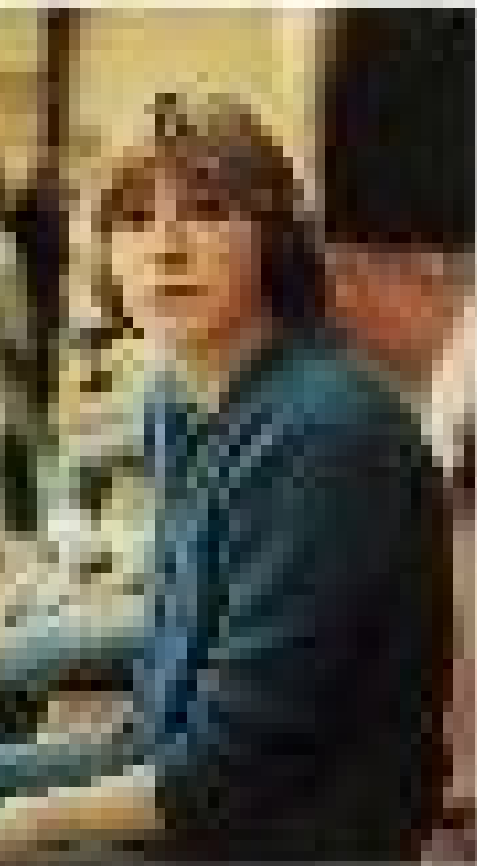

An October fire in the H and P store in Marlinton precluded a big sale and some community disagreement.

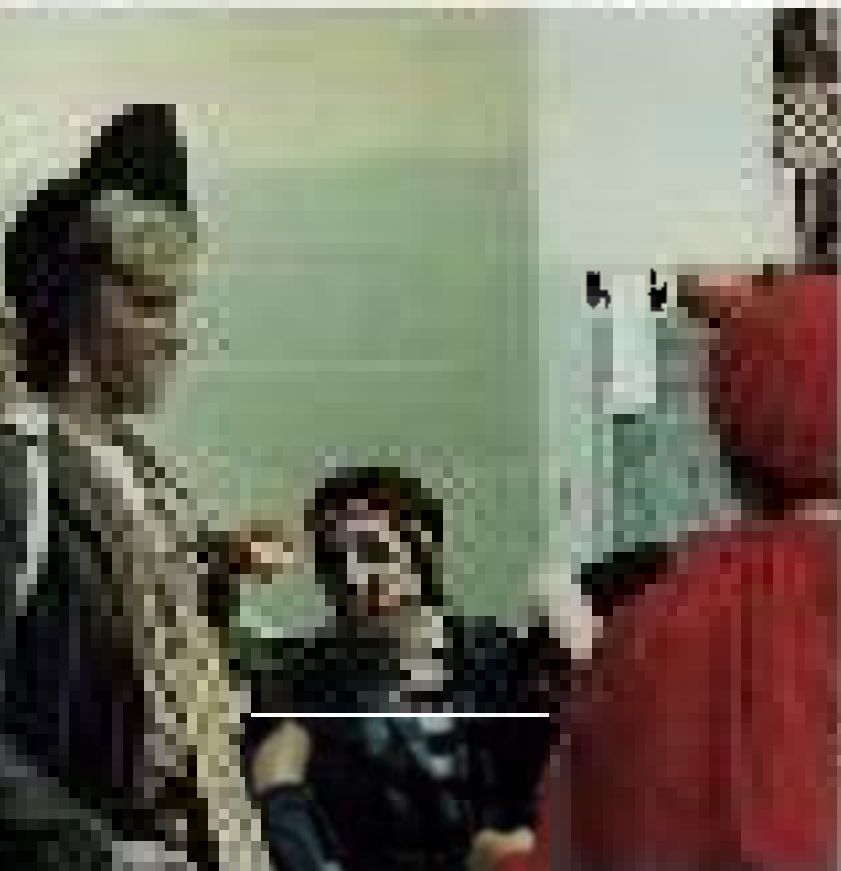


ONE STEP FARTHER

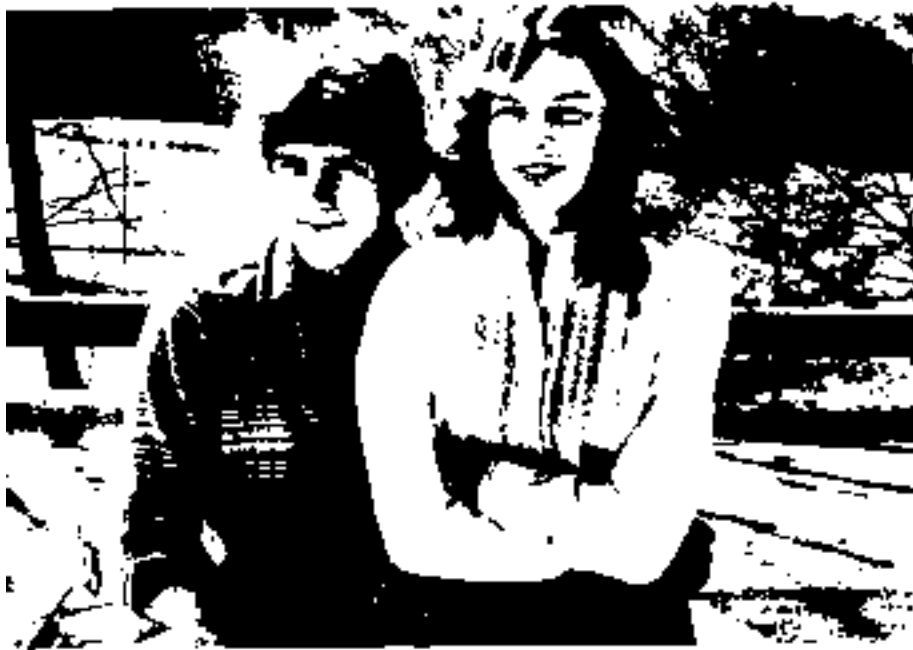

The social studies department has also pioneered a new program in future studies. Another innovation is the new drafting and mechanical drawing class that has been added to the vocational curriculum in recent years.

The academic area of the school is, by no means, through growing. Next year, an additional class period will be added which will enable students to take a larger range of classes and the school to offer a greater variety of study areas.

These papers show research which began in the library. Since books are hard to locate, David Mackay and John Brummett are successful.

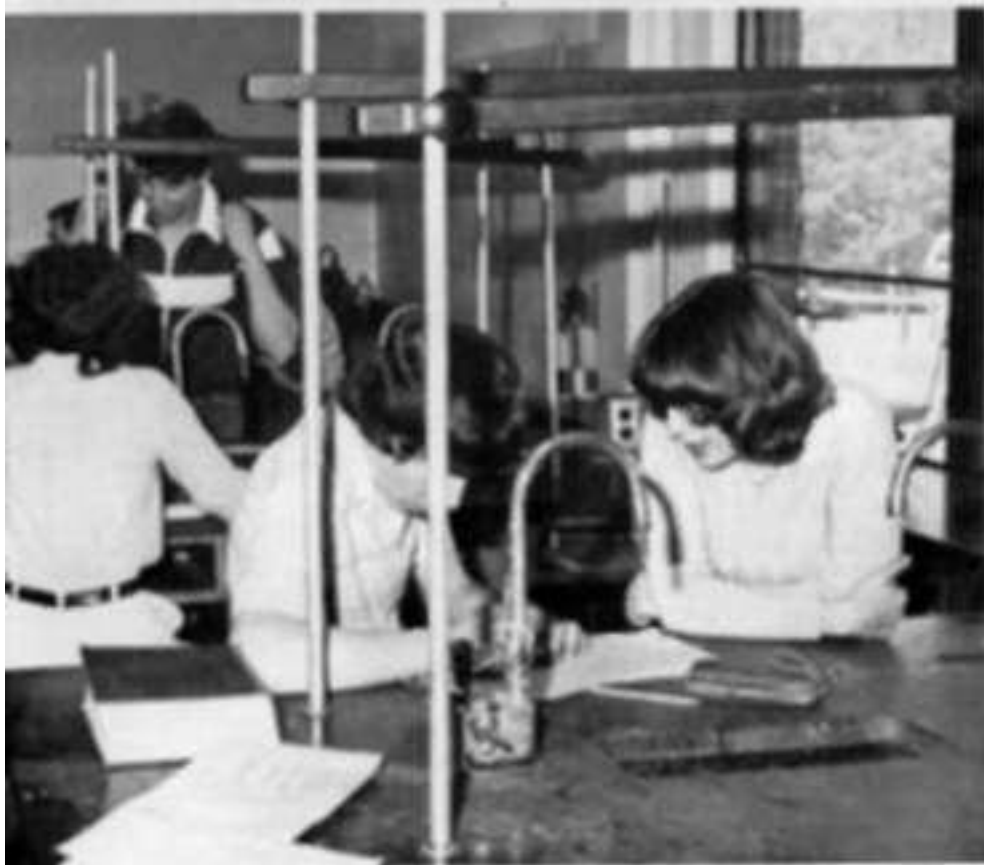

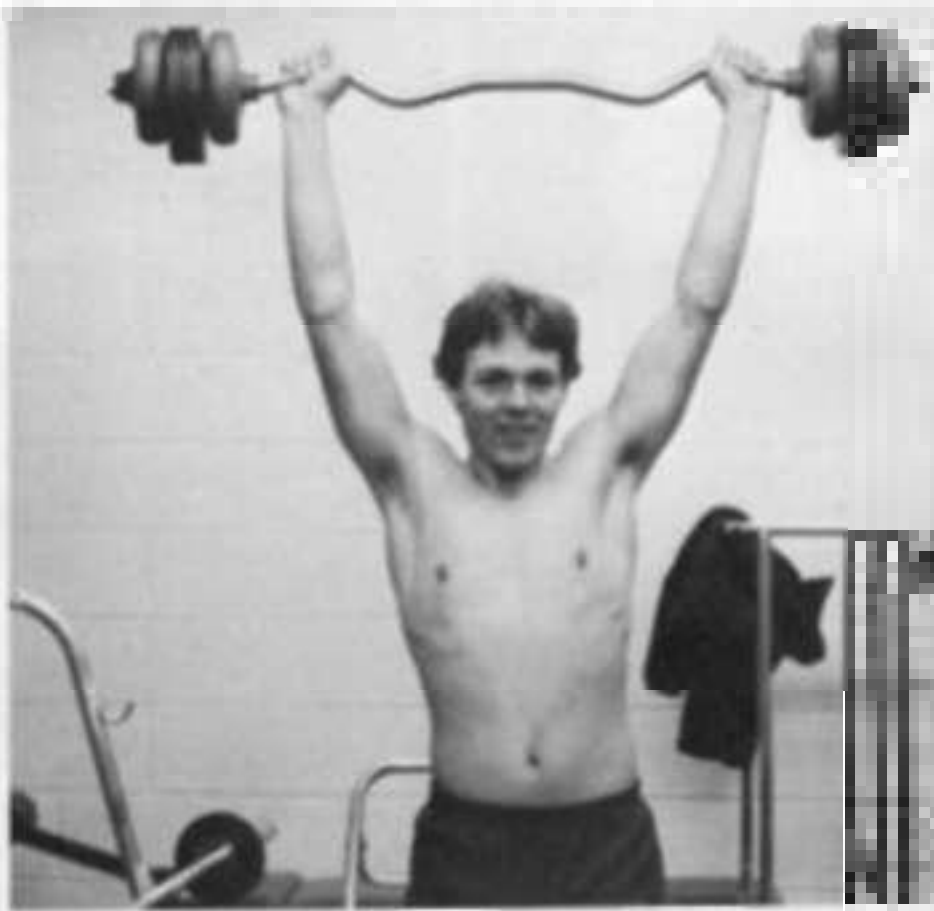

Talents, Skills

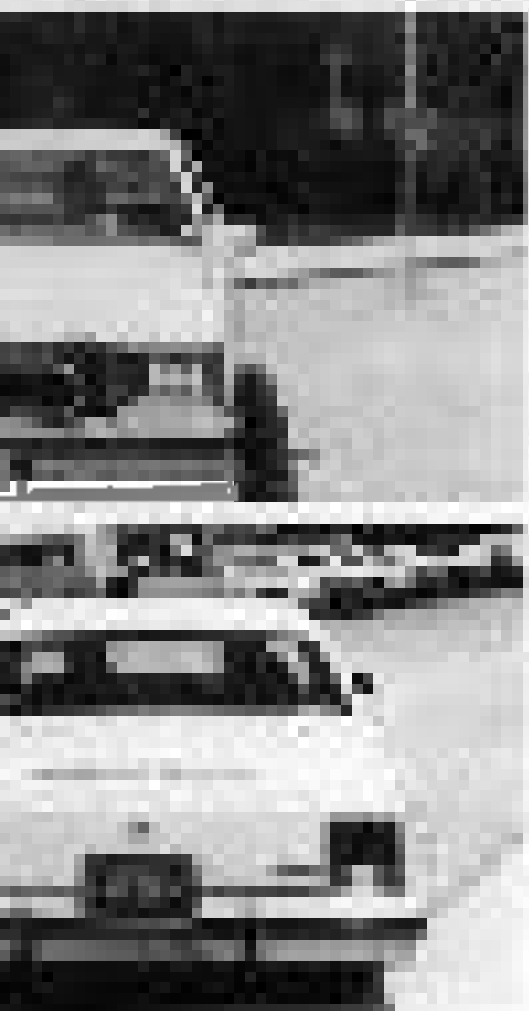

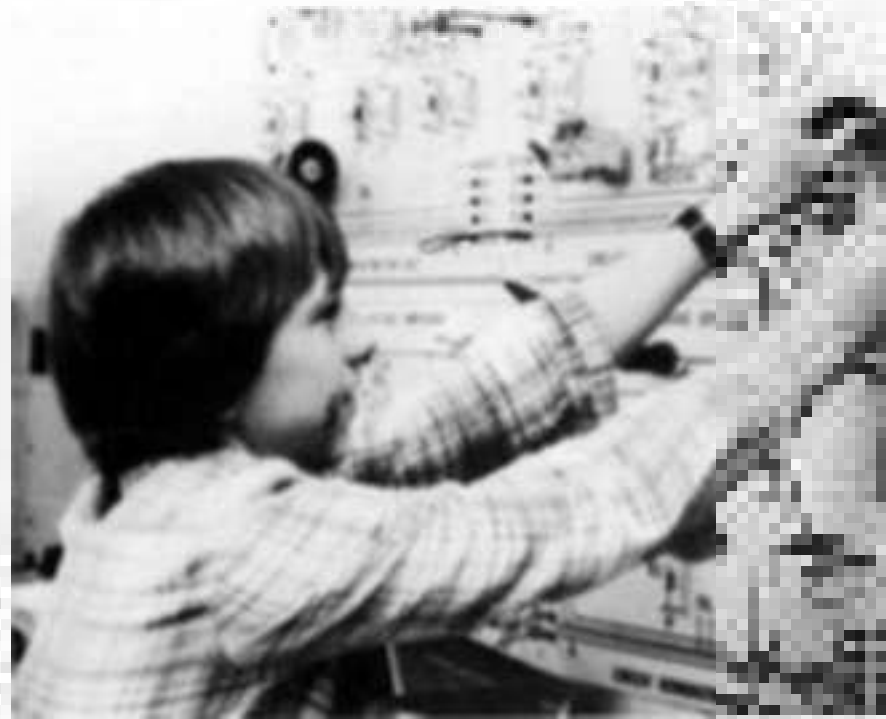

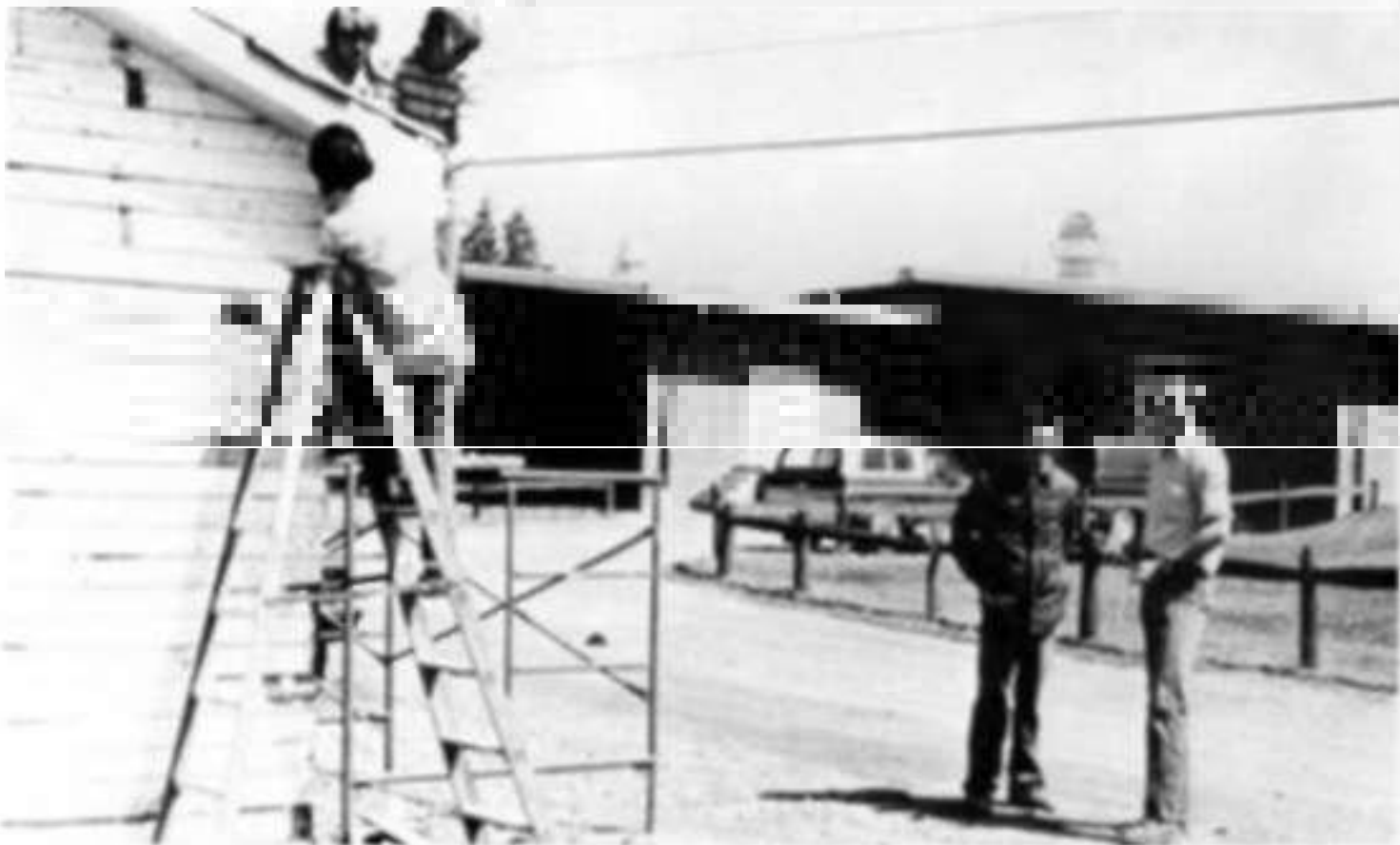

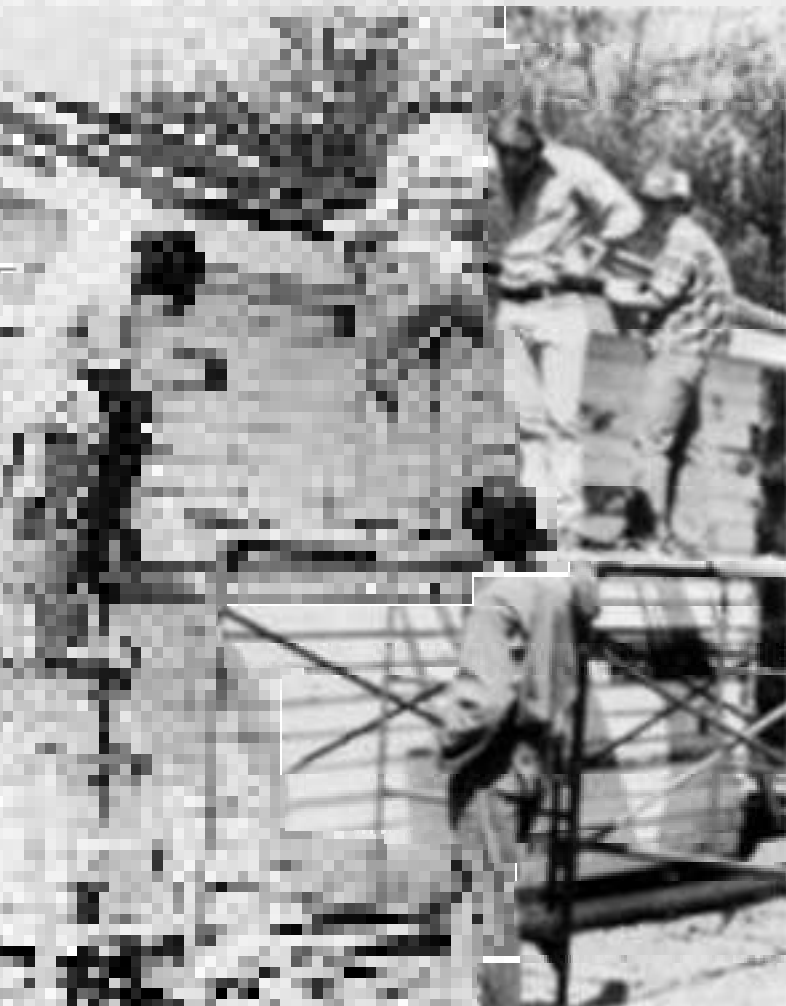

Neither rain nor snow nor sleet nor hail will keep the mailman from his route or the Warriors off the football field. It was a tough but fine season for the team.

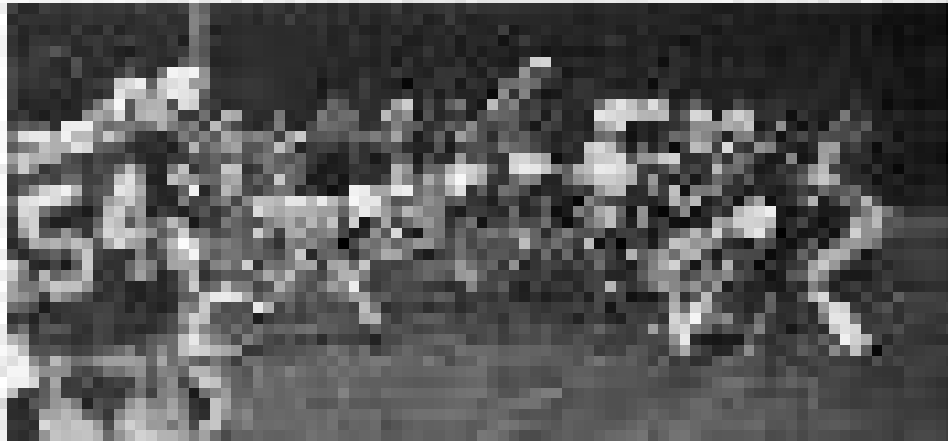
They started off with a loss against Nicholas County High School but came right back with a win against Tucker County High School.

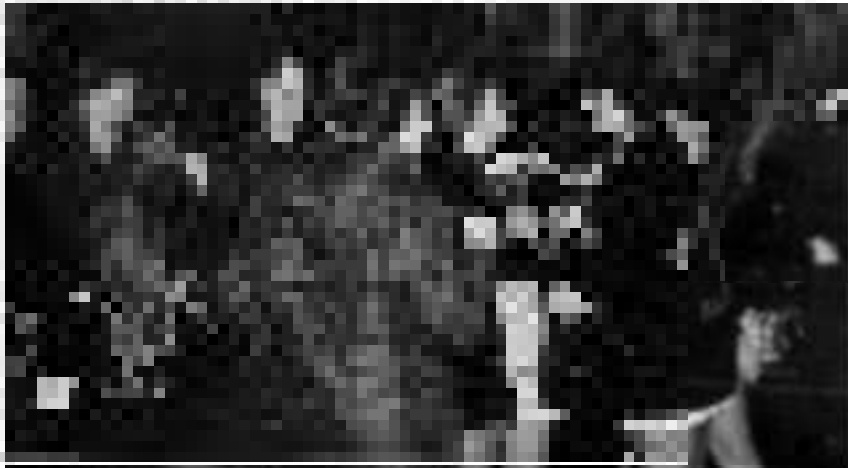

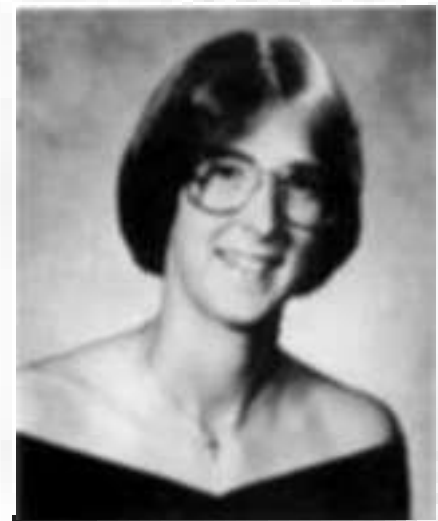
The measure of life is similar to that of time. Stopping to enjoy the wonders of nature and living by instinct instead of rule proves more

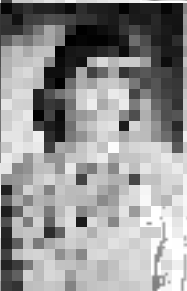

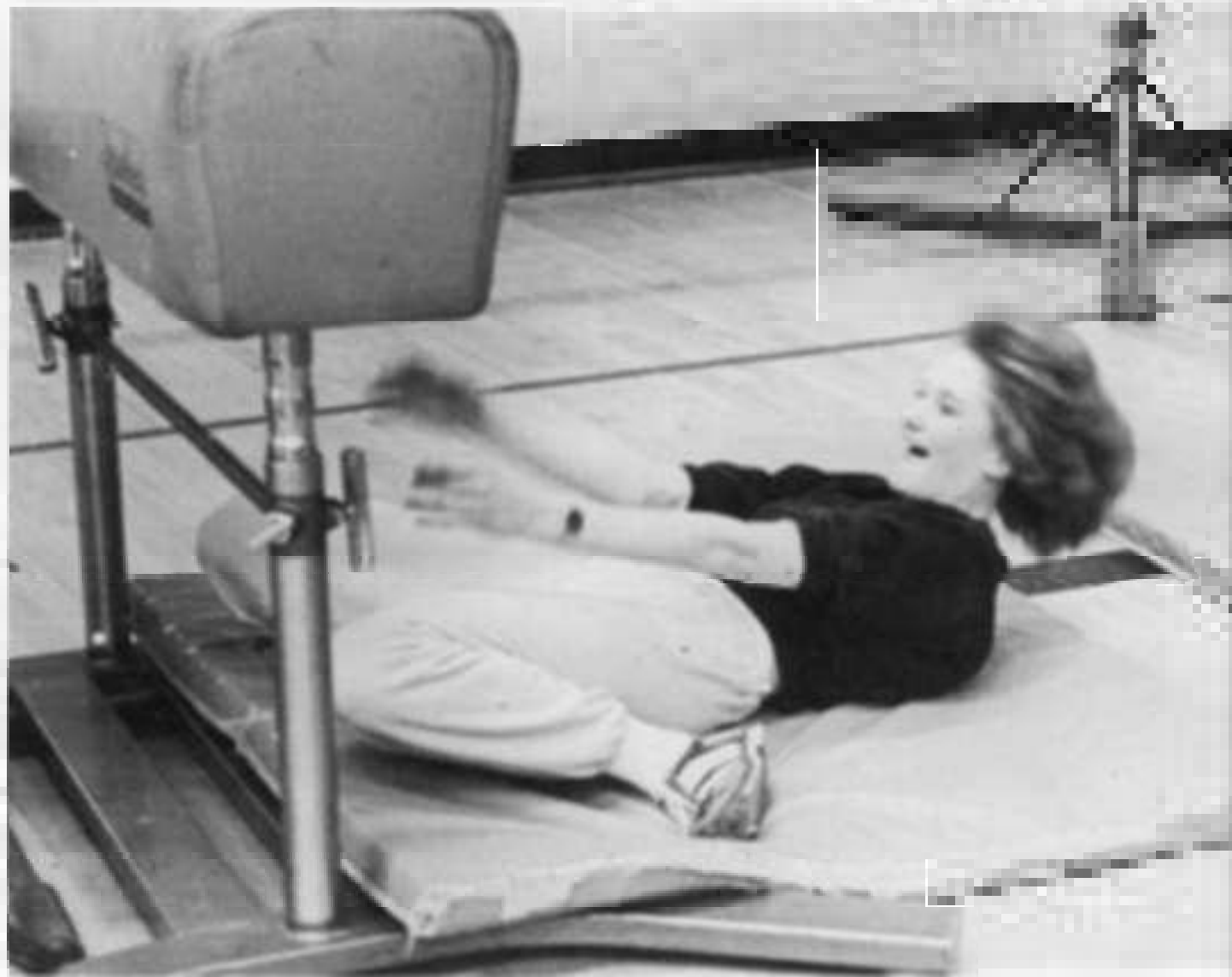

Trade Preparation Offered

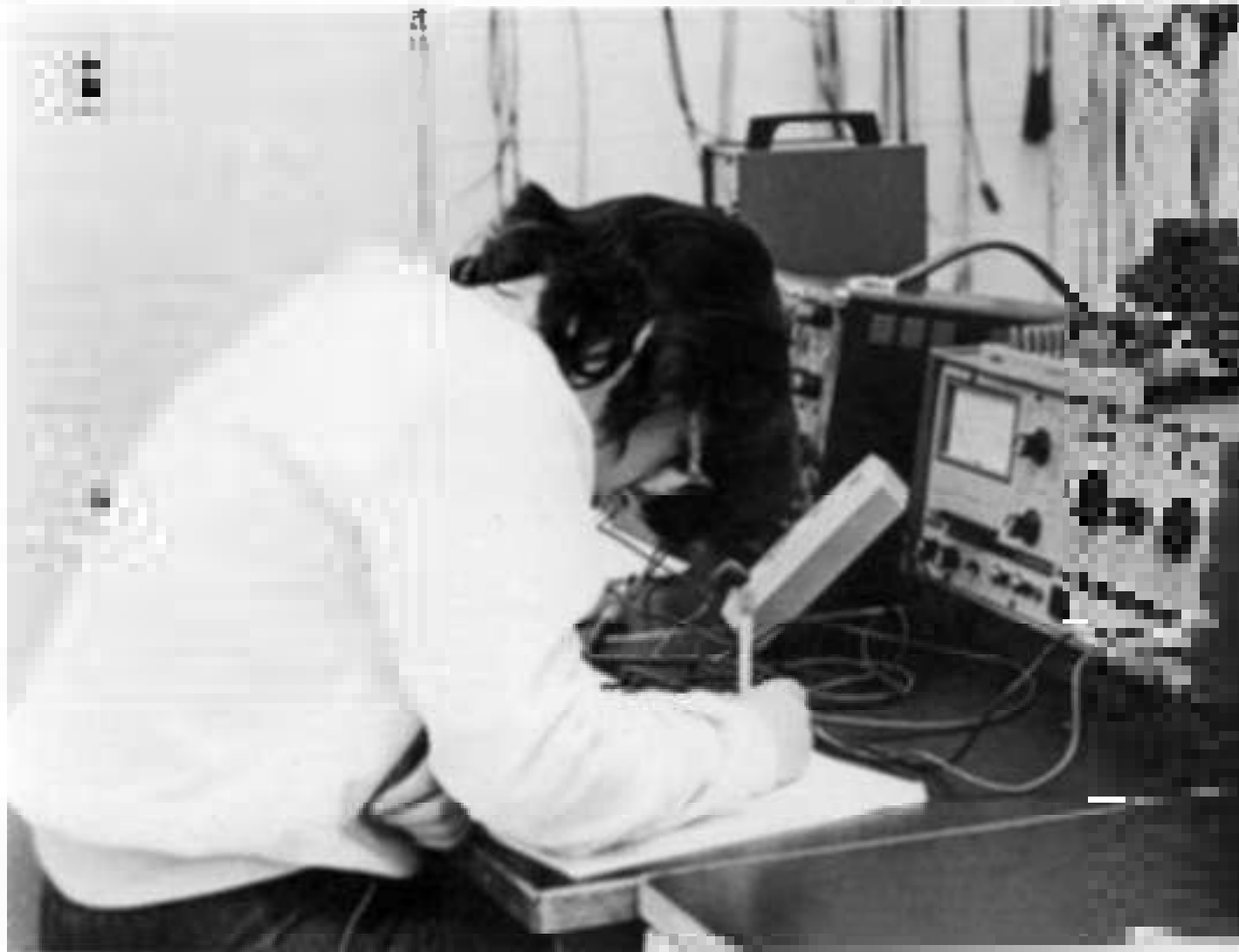
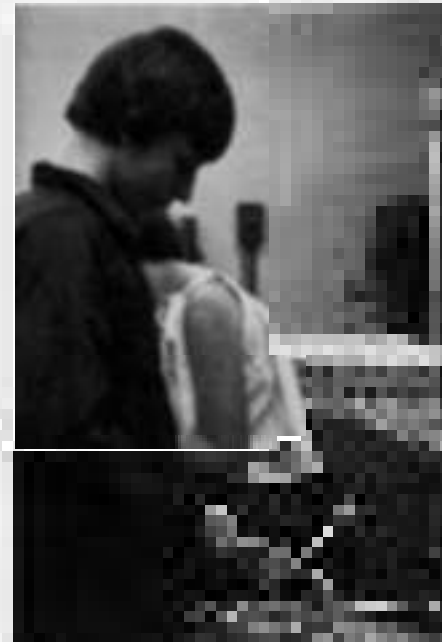
There are many trades to be studied in the high school vocational program. Each classroom may appear to be a small industry at work. Students work with big equipment and a variety of tools as they learn to weld, saw, lay bricks and install electricity in houses.

Vocational classes are mainly three period block classes to provide time for instruction as well as practical experience.

Electricity class installed the electrical wiring of the Pocahontas County Radio Station. Welding students built wood stoves to sell.

The basic purpose of all vocational classes is to prepare students to enter the job market and give them the opportunity to explore different areas which may lead to possible careers in these areas.

100 Hours Experience Required

Nursing is a three hour block class taken by 16 girls. They have class at school and work at Pocahontas Memorial and Denmar State Hospitals, spending one semester at each hospital. The state requirement is 100 hours of clinical experience to become a Nurse's Assistant.

Nursing students practice procedures learned by using life-like mannequins or each

other. At the hospitals they observe and help do nursing chores such as giving bed baths, brushing teeth and making beds.

The students who have Home Economics have a semester of sewing and a semester of cooking. In sewing students are required to make something with sleeves, a zipper and buttons. The cooking class learns the basics of cookery.

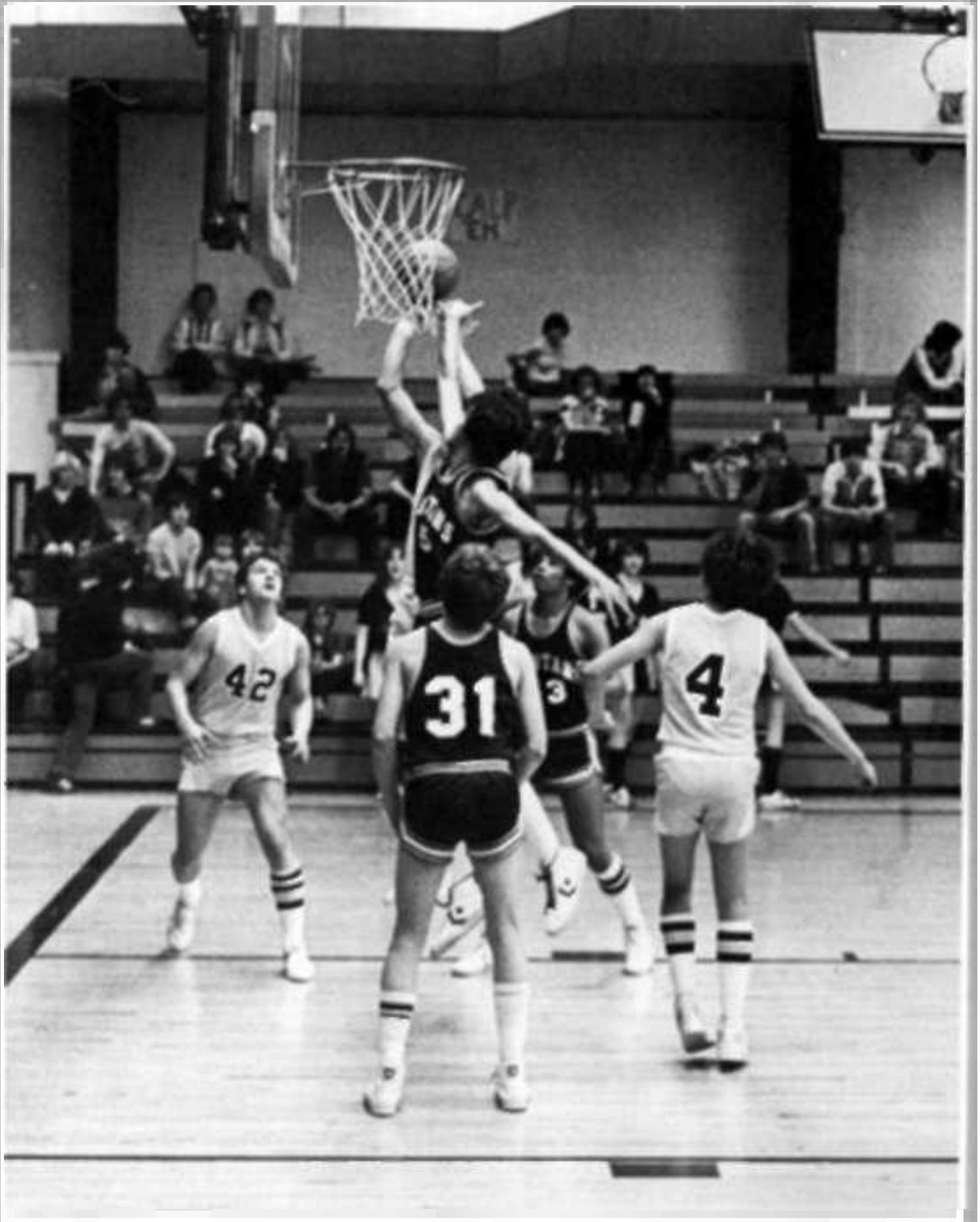

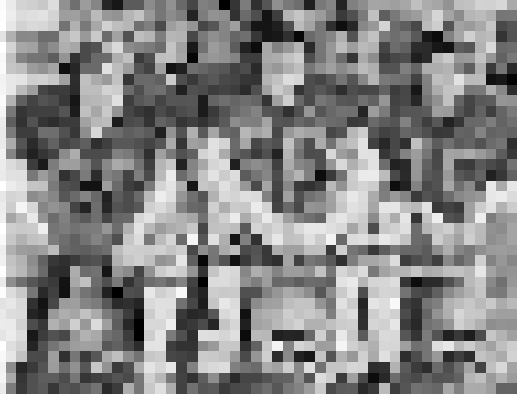

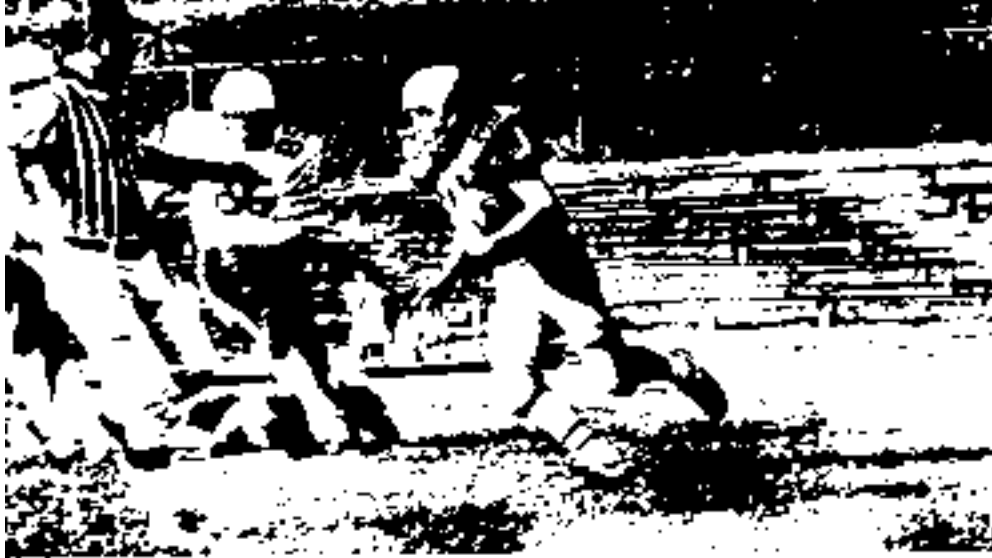

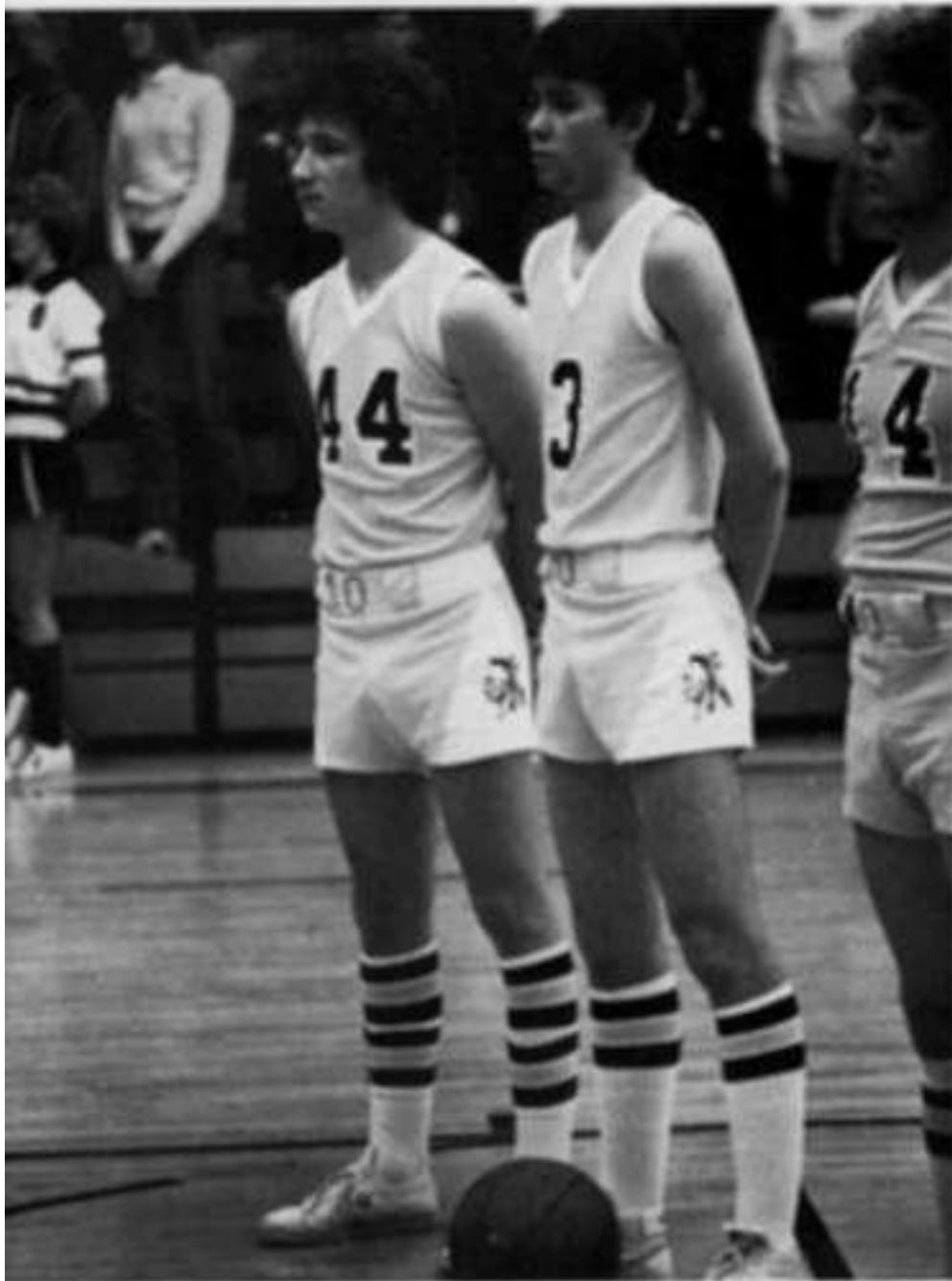

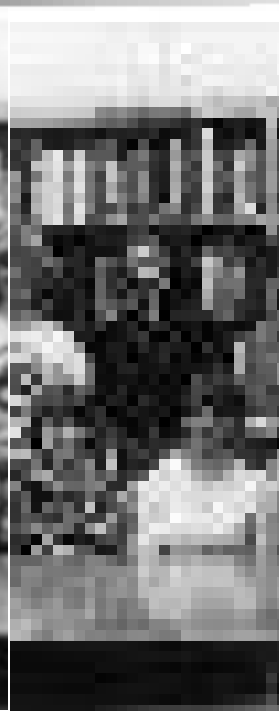

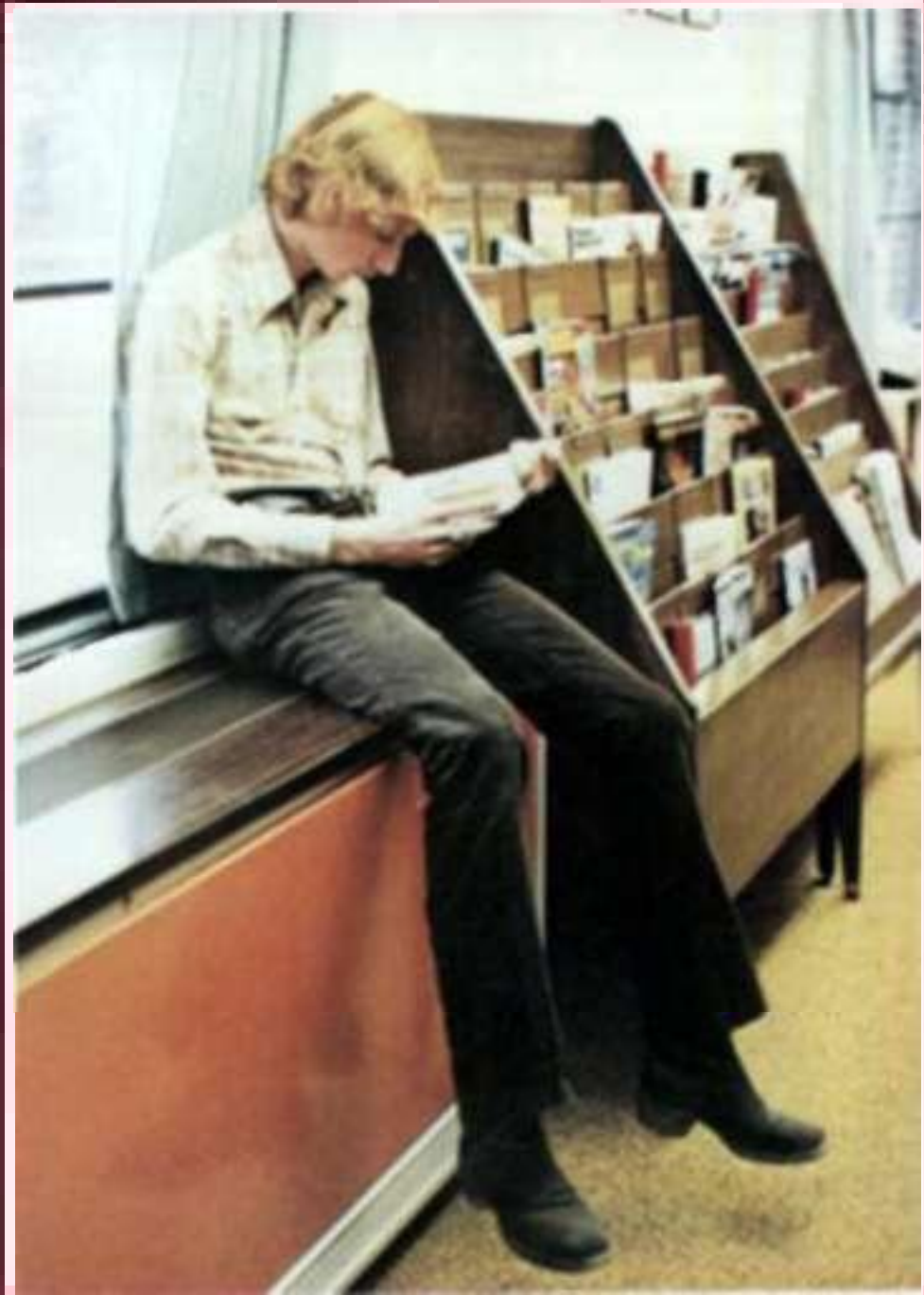

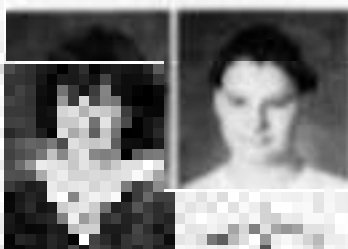

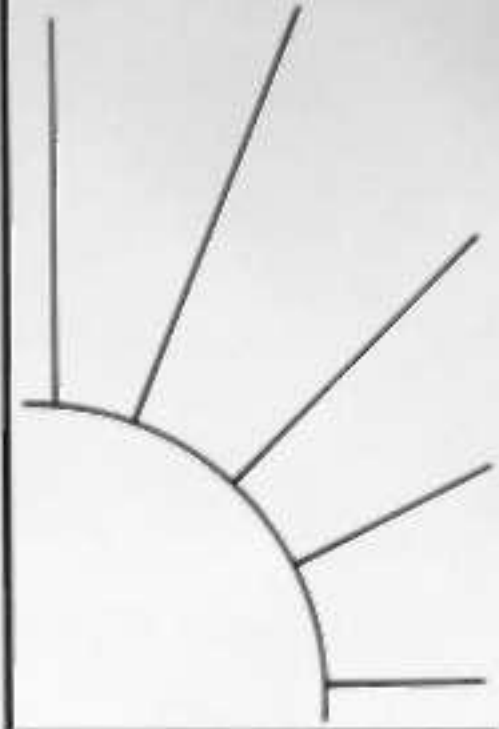

Does It All Add Up?

The math department offers eleven classes: Algebra I, I, and II, Trig., Geometry, General Math I and II, Tech Math I and II, Shepherd College Trig., and Precalculus. The department's teachers are Mrs. McGee (department head), Mr. Tupper, and Mr. Lambert. Dr. Leary teaches the college credit classes.

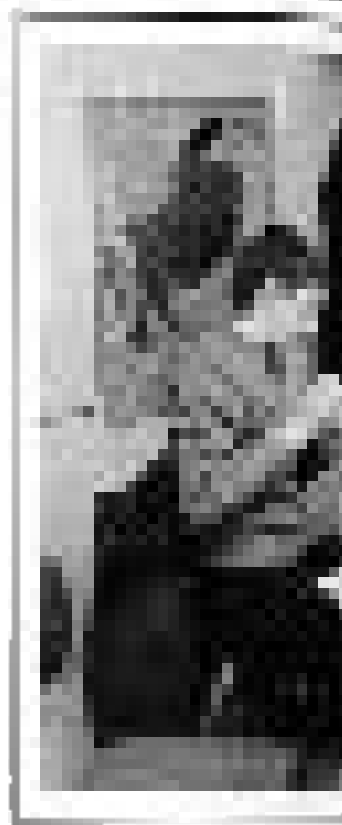
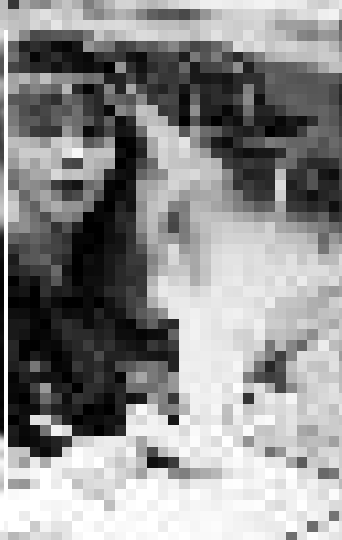

Artistic and Articulate

Special Education is a class for students who have learning disabilities in specific subjects of schoolwork. This class furthers the students' skills in these areas so they will be better prepared for the future. Development of these skills helps the students to find jobs they are interested in and that they will enjoy doing.

For example, a student may test out of a class by scoring high enough on a prepared test. If the student scores at a preset level, he does not have to take that required course.

Overall, the program consists of more individualized classes. All activities that are included are planned so that there is some valuable educational experience.

Two fine knives of our vocational department at PCHS are Electricity and Electronics.

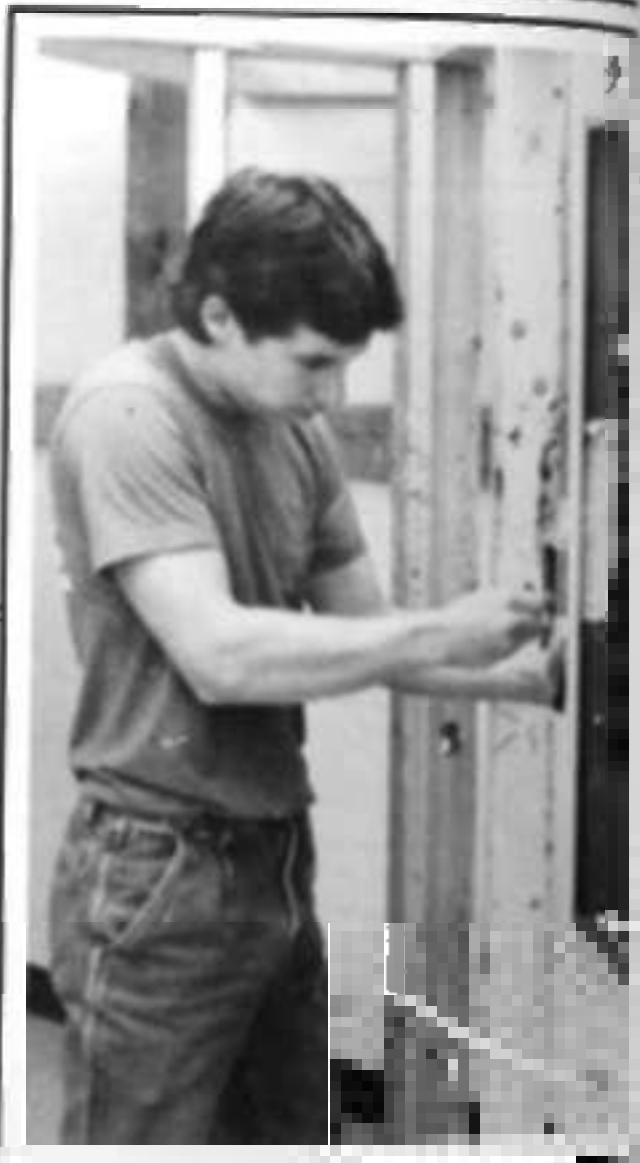

Driver Education teaches students basic vehicle safety. It is taught by Mrs. Wiley. The class lasts one semester, during which time the

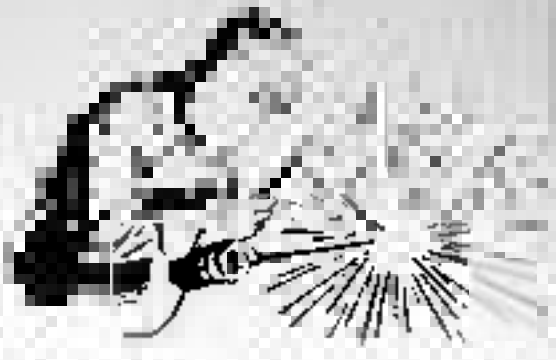
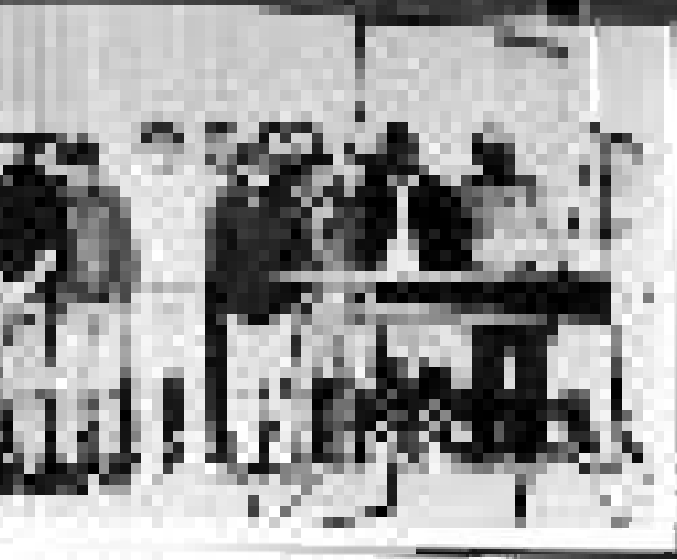

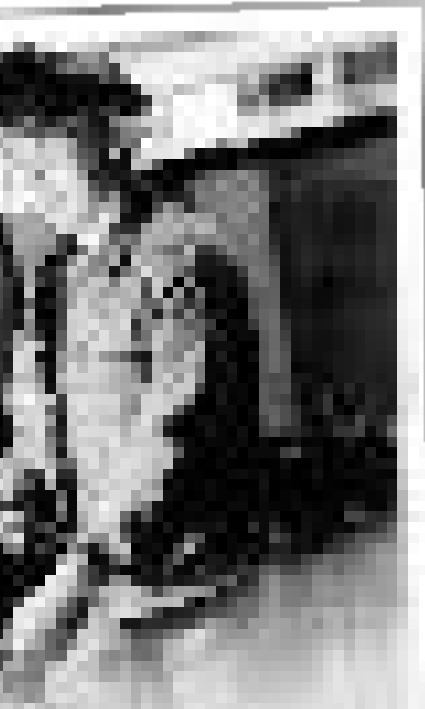

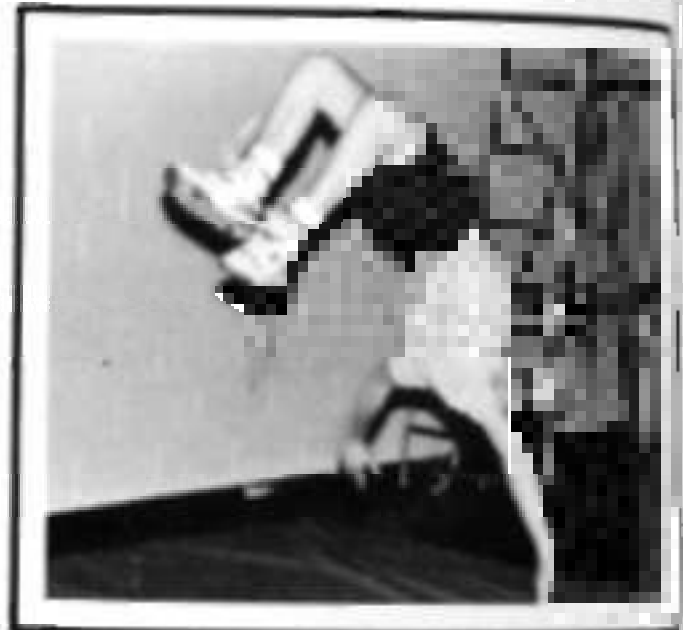
Another important event included in P.E. is gymnastics. Students try to show their abilities by attempting backward and forward flips, tumbling, and other stunts.

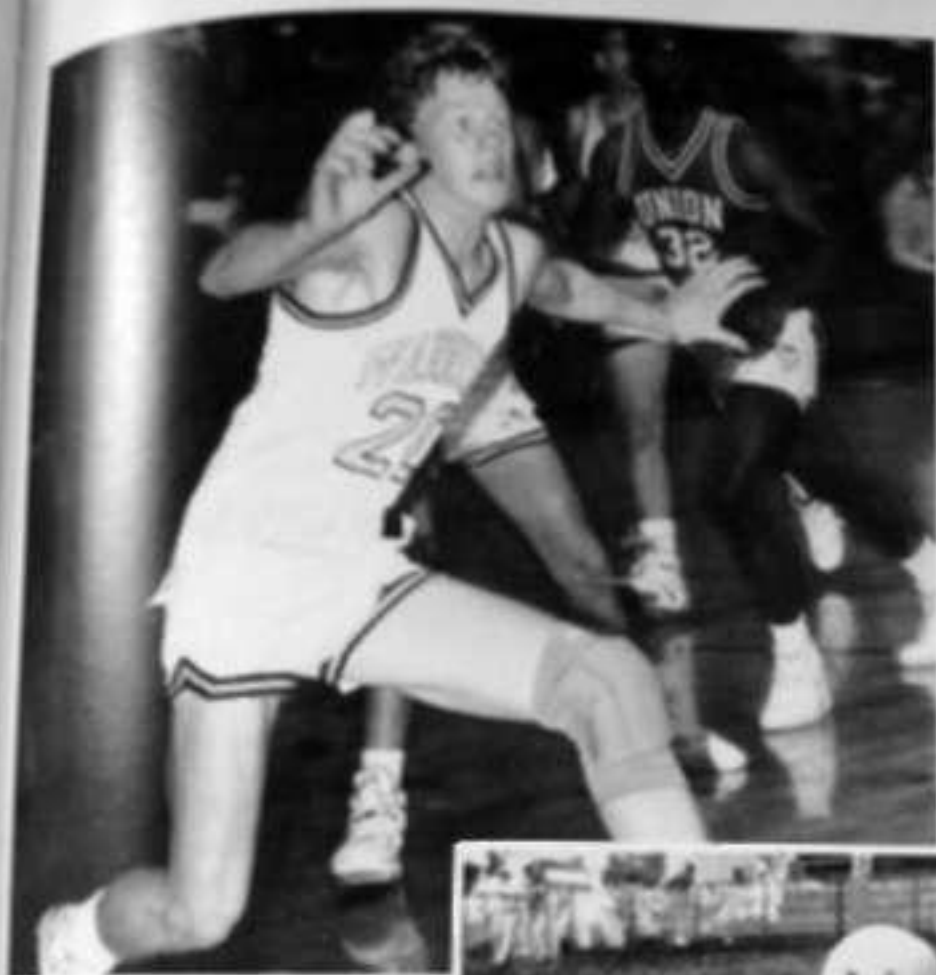

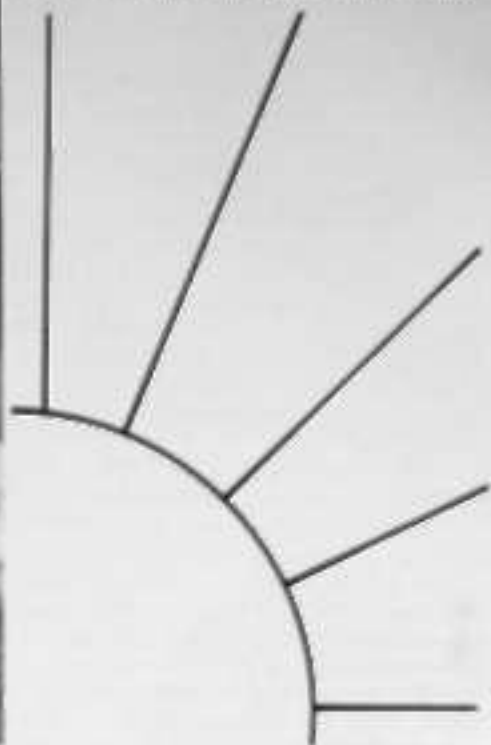

The season, from December to February, was filled with excitement and evocation from the very first game. Under the direction of Coach Bob Sheets and assistant coach Chuck Workman, the two teams ran and practiced plays and drills and learned how to operate as a unit instead of as individuals.

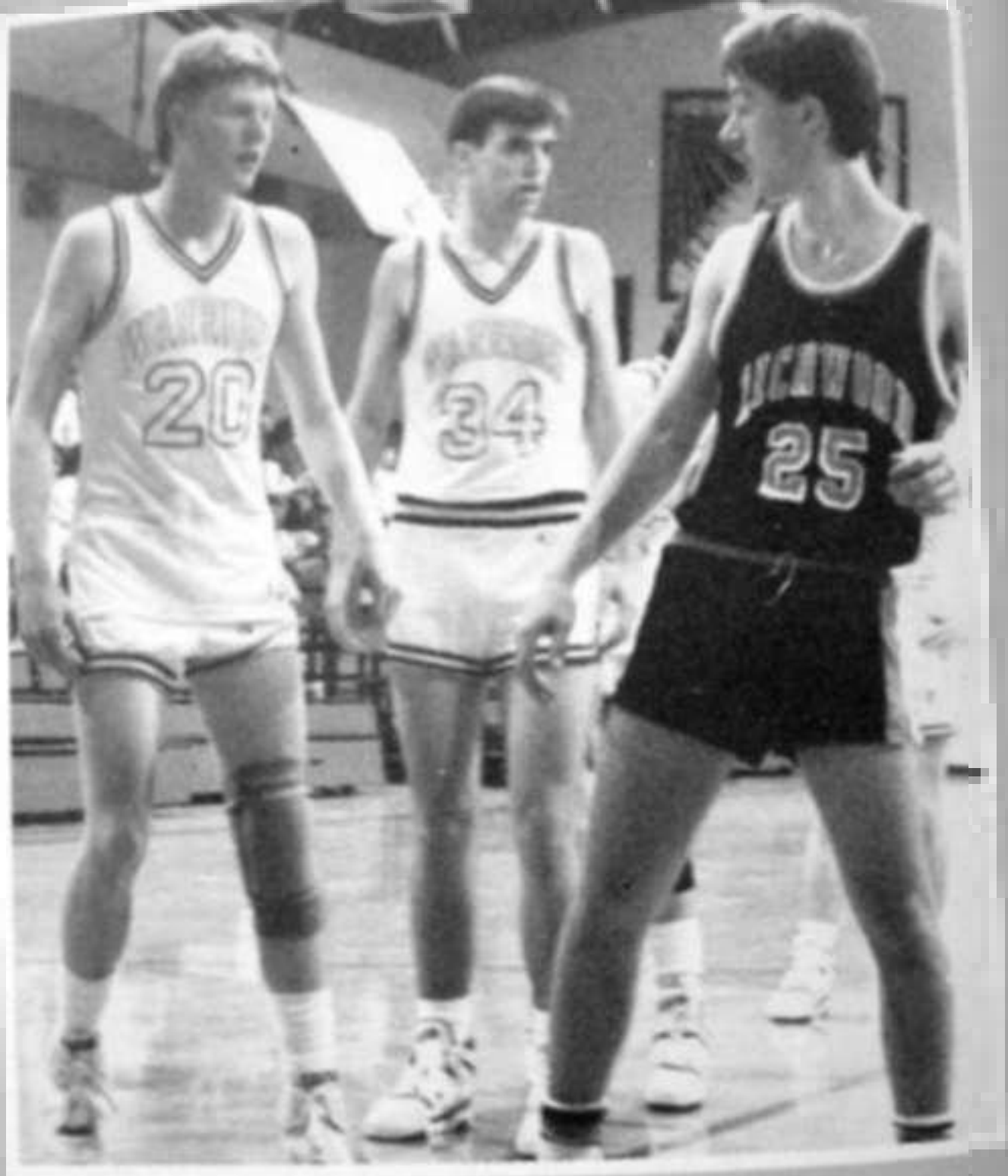

Teachers Not Much Better Off Now!

On Thursday and Friday, March 14 and 15, all West Virginia schools were closed. Why? A "cooling-off period" was called by State Superintendent Moratche after teachers from 46 of the 55 counties had gone out on strike. Strike? This was definitely a "first" for the state of West Virginia!

Although Pocahontas County was one of the nine counties remaining in their classrooms, our teachers were very concerned about many of the same issues as the striking counties. The future of education in West Virginia was beginning to look very dim, and the teachers

became very determined to do what they could about it.

Among the statewide concerns were continued funding for the retirement and insurance systems and a five percent pay raise, since WV teachers rank 49th out of the 50 states in salary.

The strike ended when all teachers returned to their classrooms on March 19, after missing as many as 11 days, with the promise from top legislators to call a special legislative session to address educational issues. Governor Gaston Caperton had refused to grant that request.

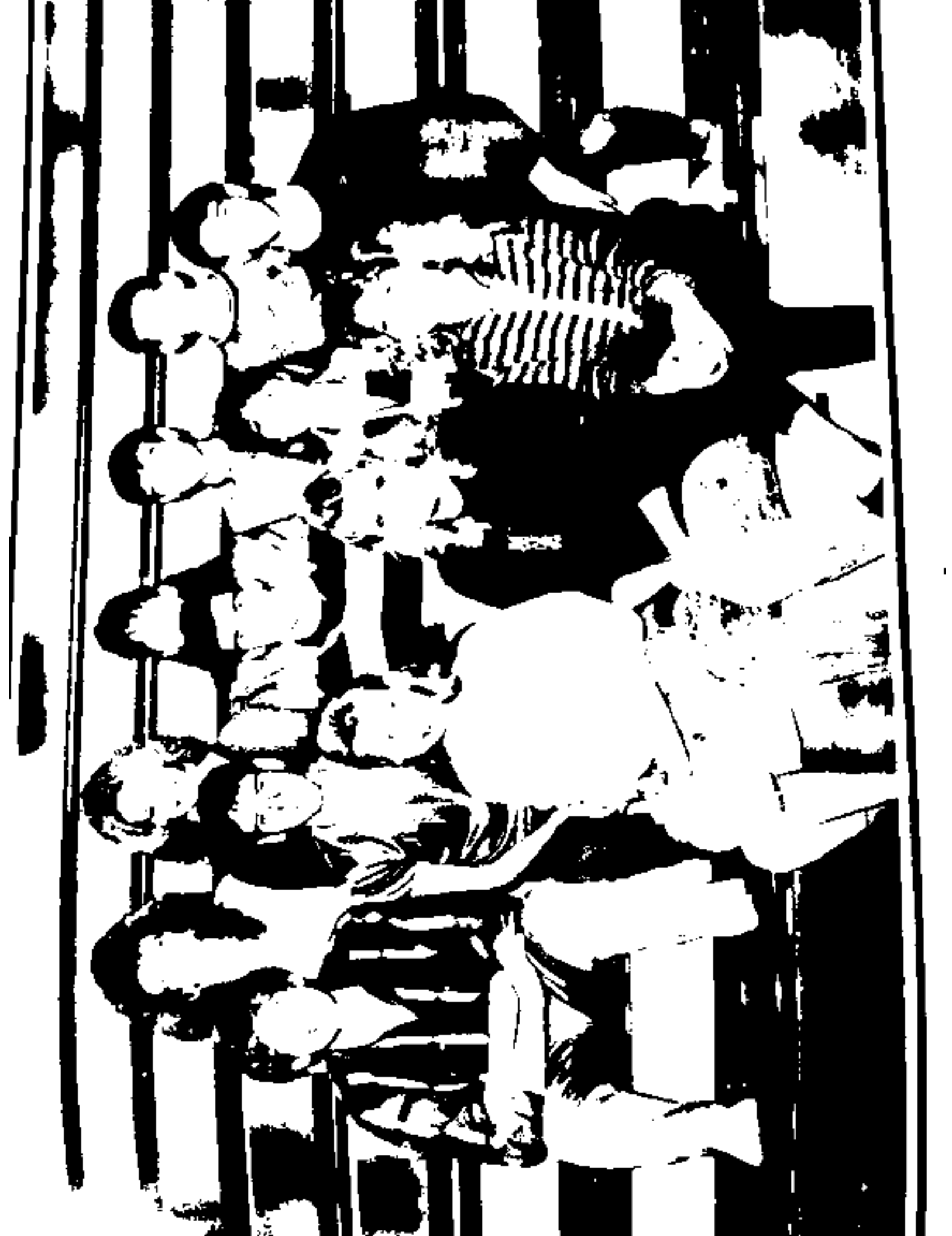

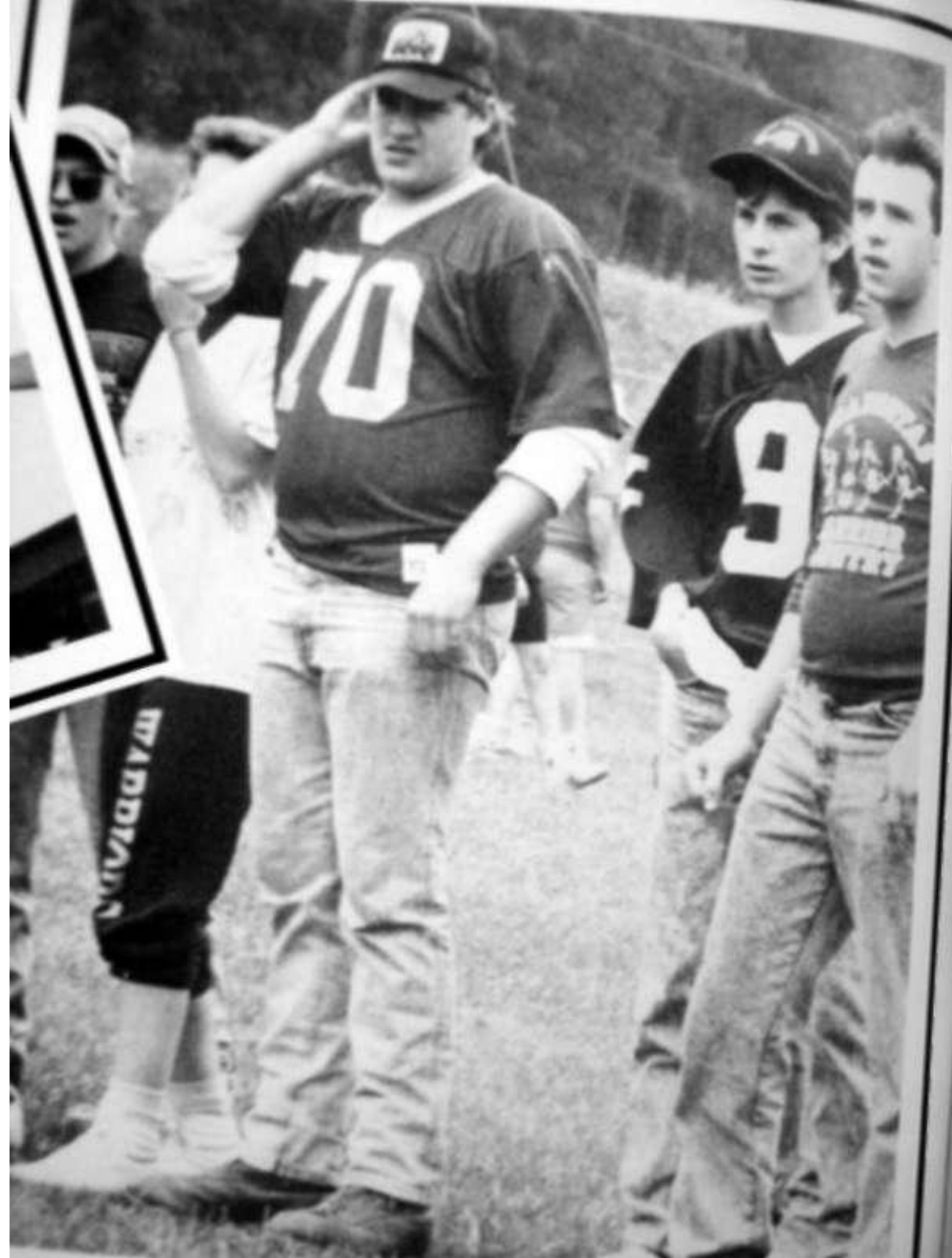

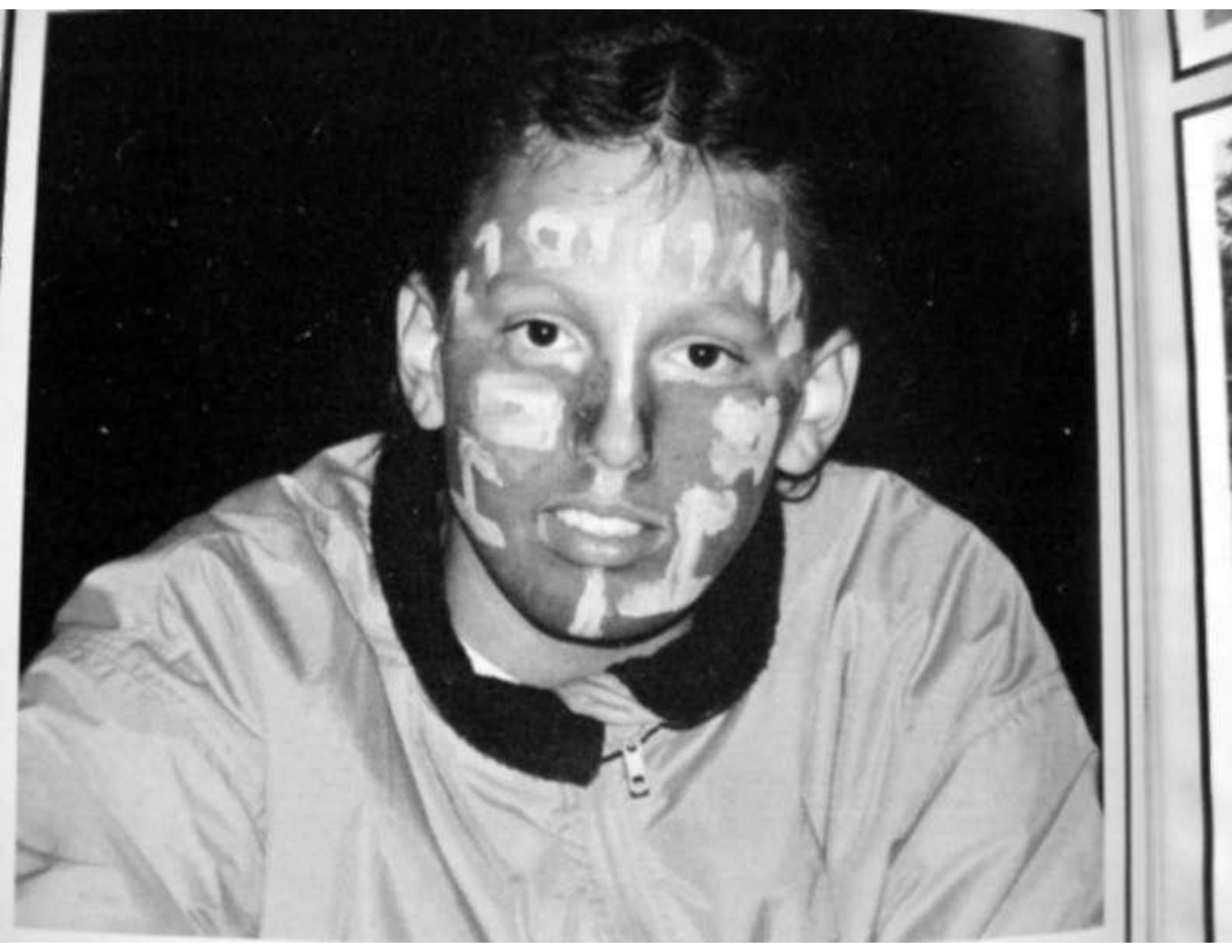

Senior Survey

This year a survey was taken of the senior class. Of the surveys received, 57% were from female students and 43% were from male students. 57% of the seniors surveyed planned to attend college or some other type of educational facility, 33% did not plan to further their education, and 10%, believe it or not, still did not know what the future would hold for them. 57% of those planning to attend college were going in-state, while the remaining 43% wished to obtain their education from an out-of-state facility. 64% of those seniors attending college planned to go to college for 4

years or more, and 36% planned to receive their particular degree in a 2-year period.

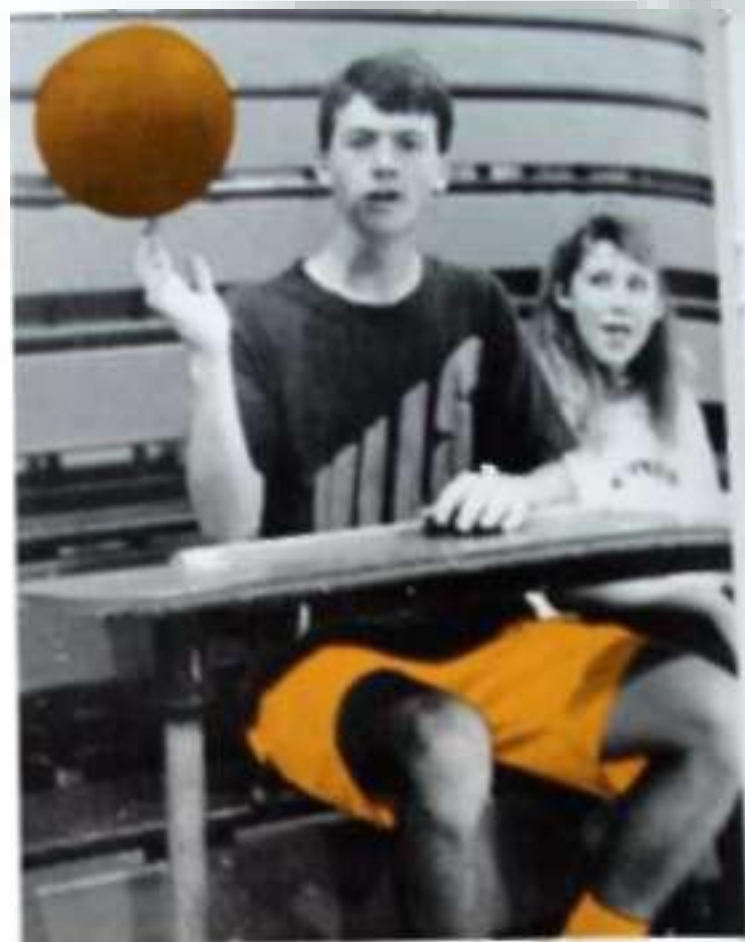

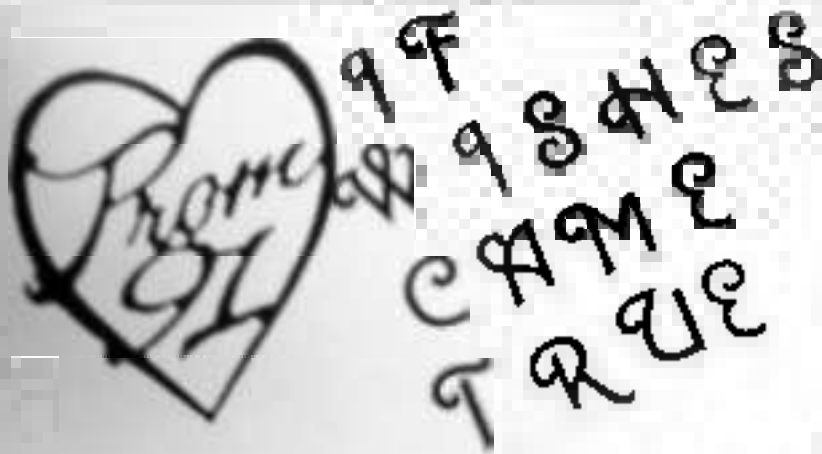

Help! The Instructional Resource Center offers supportive services to students who require extra help in vocational and academically related work. Mrs. Linda Beverage, Instructional Resource Center Coordinator, has been teaching at PCHS for 14 years. She also teaches adult courses.

Services offered through the learning center include diagnoses of reading and math levels, which could lead to planning and administering a remedial program to suit the individual's need. The learning center also assists vocational and classroom instructors when modification of instructional materials or tests is needed. It offers tutoring for individuals and small groups when needed upon advisement from the classroom teacher.

The Instructional Center also provides pre- and post-testing, materials, and instruction for those students who wish to work on a GED.

The center and its materials are available to the students and teachers throughout the school day.

Mrs. Sue Shupe teaches Alternative Learning. This was developed to help students who have dropped out of school and returned and for those who aren't doing well in regular classes. Mrs. Shupe teaches employee ability skills and required classes for graduation.

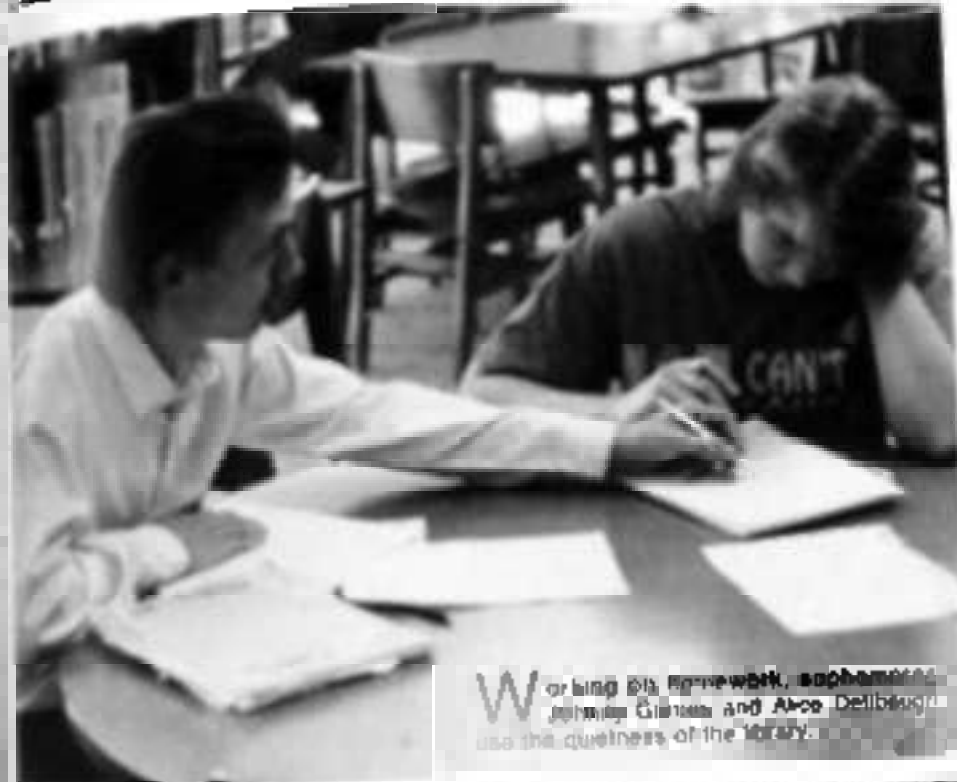
Learning! When you're in a course like Social Studies, you learn! You learn about what's happened in the past and what's happening now in the world.

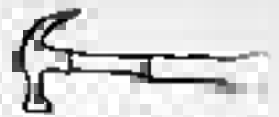

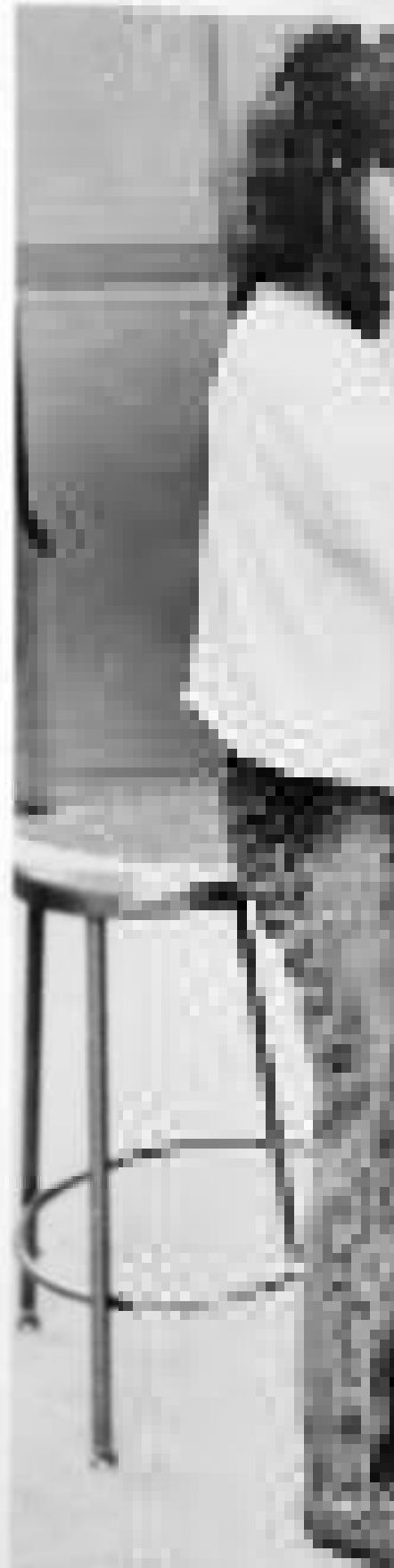

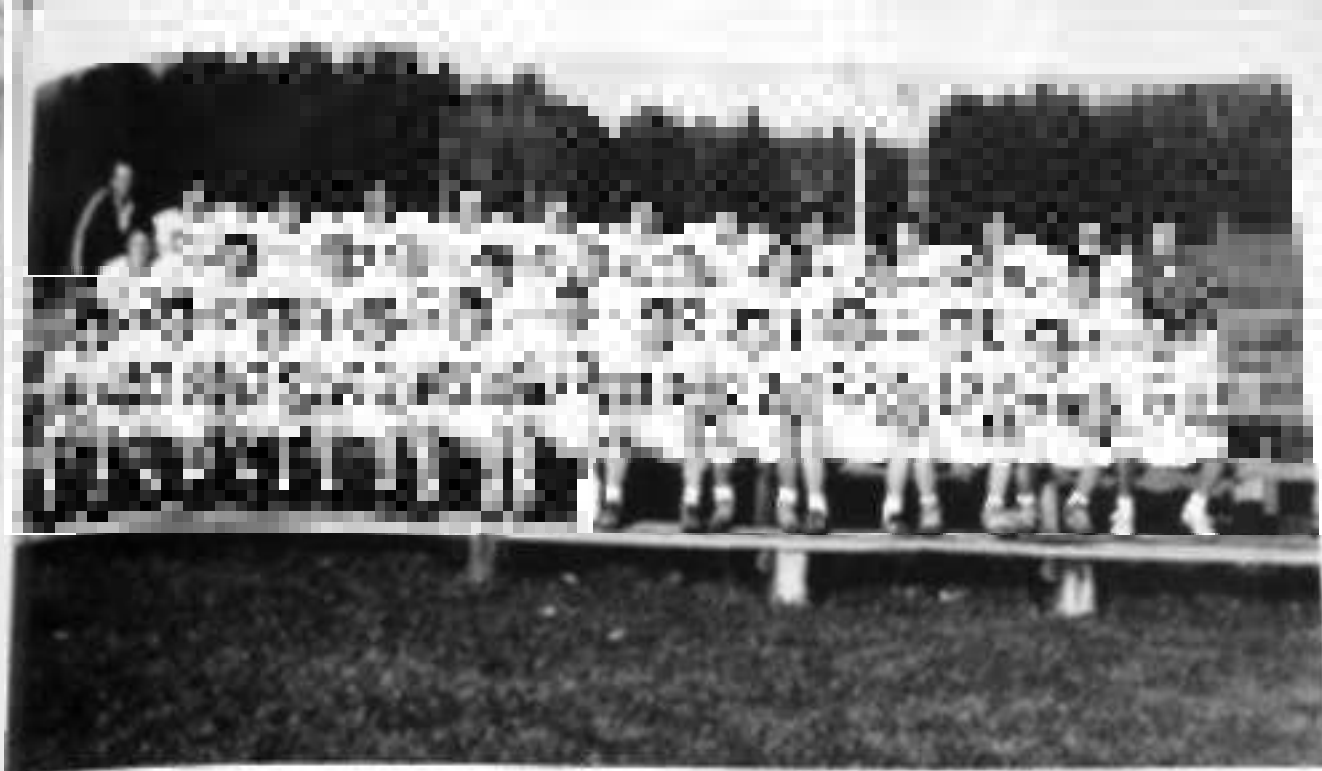

The Warriors won their first game against Nicholas Co. 79-

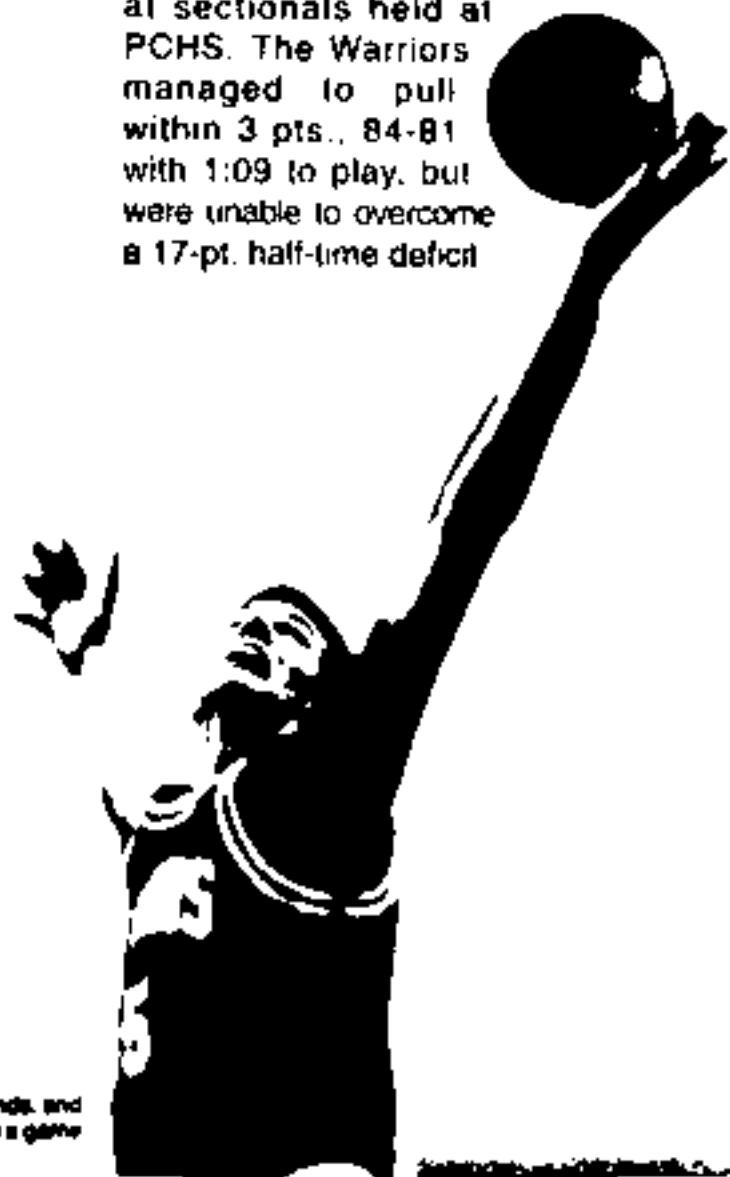
89 and continued to do a wonderful job by winning the Dick Gunnoe Tournament at Greenbrier East.

The band performed at home and a few away

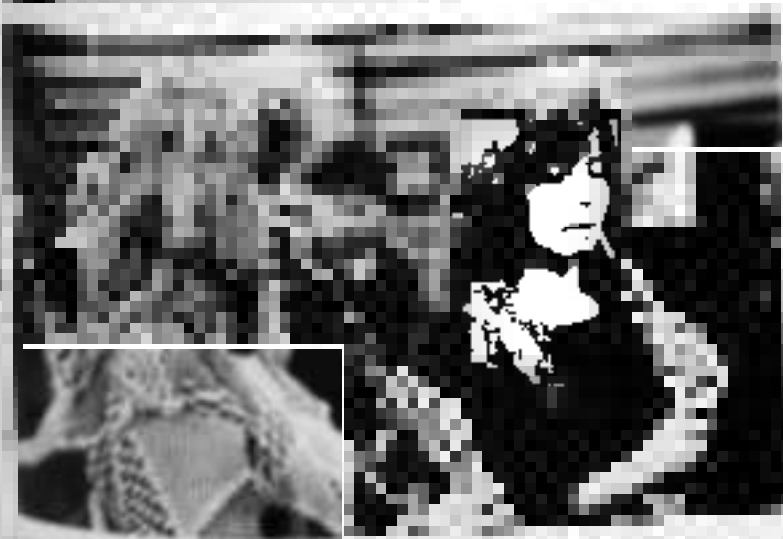
