



























Plan of Survey of 22000 acres

The Summons of George and wife from Richard
the Hudson and Elizabeth his wife to James Land
was presented in the Clerk's office aforesaid and being

This Indenture made this 18th day of August
in the year of our Lord one thousand eight
hundred and twenty six between John Bradshaw
of the County of Pocahontas and State of Virginia
of the one part and George McElvee of the
County of Bath and State aforesaid of the other
part witnesseth that the said John Bradshaw
William hath this day for and in consideration of the sum
of fifty dollars to him in hand paid by the said
George McElvee the receipt whereof he hereby
acknowledges hath bargained sold and conveyed
to the said George McElvee one certain tract or
parcel of land lying and being in the said County
of Pocahontas and in the Town of Hamlinville
lying on the South West side of Fayette street
containing one quarter of an acre two and a
fourth poles square and designated by S' 30 in
the plot of said Town. Together with all there appurtenances to have and to hold the said tract
or parcel of Land to the only proper use and benefit
of him the said George McElvee his heirs Executors
and administrators forever with all and singular
the appurtenances thereto belonging or in any
wise appertaining. The said John Bradshaw for
himself his heirs Executors and administrators
doth covenant to and with the said George McElvee
his heirs and assigns that the said John
Bradshaw his heirs Executors and administrators
the right and title of the said tract or parcel
and against the claim or claims of whom so ever
John Bradshaw his heirs Executors and admis-
trators doth against the aforesaid or claims for
and every other person or persons whatever
having claim thereto will forever defend

The Indenture of Bargain and Sale from John Bradshaw to George McElvee was presented in the afternoon and acknowledged by Isaac John Bradshaw and admitted to record.

This Indenture made the 3rd day of September 1825
between James Crawford and Margaret ~~Crawford~~
his wife of the County of Augusta and State of
Virginia of the one part and George Poage of Poca-
hontas County and State aforesaid of the other
part Witnesseth that whereas James Crawford
late of King County being seized in fee of a tract
of land containing two hundred and Ninety six
acres lying within the limits of the present County of
Pocahontas by his last will and Testament devised
the same to his children, namely, William, James,
John, Sarah, Elizabeth, and Polly; and whereas the
said George deceased this life during his minority inter-
taketh no man to witness his leaving as his legal
representatives, his aforesaid brothers and sisters, and
therefore the said William after the death of the said
George deceased this life, after having made his
last will and testament in which among other things
he devolved his interest in said land to his four
surviving brothers and sisters, and whereas the said
John Crawford has reported this life was by his last
will and testament being thus seized in fee of an
undivided part in said land devised the same to
the said John Crawford his son, who has

This instrument contains with certain lands the





Very Preliminary Survey of 22 acre pieces of shaded land
