GEORGE W. CALLISON

George W. Callison died at his home in Dayton, Virginia, in the early morning of August 27th, 1923. He was the son of the late Josiah and Nancy Hill Callison and was born near Hillsboro Feb. 18, 1853. The remains were brought to Hillsboro on Tuesday for burial.

On Wednesday morning the funeral services were conducted from the Wesley Chapel Methodist Episcopal Church, South, Hillsboro, by the pastor Rev. W. Clark Early assisted by Rev. J. C. Johnson of the Presbyterian Church. A large number of friends were present in testimony of the high regard in which Mr. Callison was held by the community and county. He was laid to rest in the McNeel cemetery. The pallbearers were D. M., E. B. George S. and Orion Callison and T. P. and Henry McNeel.

On November 21st 1877 he was married to Maude McNeel who preceded him to the grave only a little more than four months ago. To this happy union eight children were born, all of them surviving except one daughter Nettle Callison Beard who died eight years ago. The children living are

Mr. Callison was prominently
active in the life of the community
and county and was widely known as
a man of dependable business judg-
ment, a faithful citizen and a loyal
churchman. In the early nineties he
served an unexpired term as Deputy
Sheriff under Major Arbogast and in
1900 was elected to the same office.
He was diligent in the performance
of this trust and served the full term.
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When the Bank of Hillsboro was
organized Mr. Callison was made its
first President and served until after
he moved to Virginia.

For many years and until change
of residence to Virginia in 1919 Mr.
Callison was a Steward in the church
and was a Trustee of both the Wesley
Chapel and Sharon Methodist
churches.

For several years his health had
been impaired and for twelve months
previous to his death he was confined
to his bed, yet to all those who visit-
ed him he was an example of remark-
able patience and manifested a
sincere and trustful spirit.
