## My Visit To The W4QSL Bureau

Having received DX cards thru the bureau from time to time and being interested in DX and having not received any cards for about 8 months and about to go on vacation, I decided to spend at least one night in Chattanooga, Tennessee and try to visit the QSL Bureau and pick up what cards I might have in there, and also to try to bring back to Sarasota, as many cards as I could for the DX'ers here.

The XYL and I first went up to North Carolina mountains for the cool air and beautiful scenery. After having enjoyed ourselves for a few days we headed down out of the mountains for Chattanooga and warm weather again.

We arrived in Chattanooga about 4 pm, got settled in a motel and I called the Chamber of Commerce to find out where the bureau is located. They did not know but referred me to the Frey Institute. I called it and found out that it was located in the heart of the city. I went down and met Mr. Francis Bishop, who greeted me cordially and told me who to call, and let me use his phone.

I contacted Mr. Charlie Well-er, Jr., a very active ham who told me that the bureau was not normally open on Wednesday, but for me to call back at 7:30 pm and he would know if it would be open and if it was not he would come down and let me in anyway.

Shortly after 7:30 pm I met Charlie in front of the Frey

Institute and followed him over to the bureau about four blocks away from the institute. He showed me thru the bureau. I never saw so many QSL cards in all my life.

The following is an account of the bureau as I saw it: The bureau receives about 10,000 cards a week, and after the last DX contest received about 50,000 cards. The first thing after a batch of cards comes in is to separate them into three main piles of K4's, W4's and WA and WB4's. The K4's are then taken to the K4 pigeon holes where they are sorted out alphabetically according to the first letter after the 4, for example, K4A's K4B's K4C's etc. Of course the W4 and the WA and WB4 cards are taken to their respective places, and filed. From these locations the cards are moved to a large table where they are stacked ready to separate out the cards going to one station. When these

In Miami Joe Engressia, Sr. told himself this was "just the ticket" for Joe, Jr. WA4-JZT, who had been blind since childhood and had great difficulty tuning a transmitter. A considerable sum was spent for parts and several "experts" worked on it. Suffice it to say the unit never materialized so Joe, Jr. struggled along without it.

Even the dealers and manufacturers are a little leery of you after they take your money because they know you are not inoculated with blood and sweat and can not be depended upon to carry the ball. You fellows come and go. But first you clutter up the band and there is generally enough of you in the process of coming and going to make it miserable for the "dyed-in-the-wool Ham".

For the past two years the manufacturers have not been able to keep up with the demands for new equipment and as a result the dealers are back ordered many months behind schedule. Dealers today will tell you that only a maniac would go into the Ham Radio Merchandising Business. Will it get better? If it does you can bet a million dollars it will be SSB 100%. This means no one wants the old existing AM junk; try to trade some in and find out! Now I go for SSB I was double side band more than 10 years ago, went kit SSB over three years ago. I'm not condemning SSB as such. If all hams were gentlemen and operated their SSB with respect on the ham bands, knowing that they might clobber the AM boy, there would be no complaints. The general SSB opinion of AM is that it is ancient and no longer even belongs on the air. This is a rather "commercial" attitude for an amateur hobby. This attitude carried to excess will eventually catch up with our SSB operating techniques and most assuredly in the not too distant future, it will be dog eat dog and don't you forget it!

I know your proud that you operate SSB. I used to lord it over the spark boys when I went CW. Someday I hope they reward you with a special carving attesting "SSB" on your tomb stone, but in the meantime let us keep peace in the family till everyone can see the light.

At the present time, I doubt if more than a dozen new SSB stations are being shipped into Florida and of course they are being bought up as fast as they arrive. If war continues another ten years, don't expect this condition to improve. I hope kits will be made more available if that will improve our know-how. This will definitely not improve our local dealer-customer relations, though, as kits are merchandised at practically no profit to the dealer, and some can be purchased only from the manufacturer.

Now you see the barren picture as it really exists. Dealers and manufacturers can not afford to advertise what they can not deliver. The antenna and tower people can not sell their goods unless you really need them.

Whether you are in the market or not, I suggest you scout around and see what equipment is available to get some idea of "where we are headed." It would be foolish to suggest buying up used equipment to be operated AM just because it is still legal. Why not consider CW for a moment? Most of this used equipment (AM/CW) will work very well on CW. Probably never again will it be made available. Think for a moment, High Level modulated stages (AM for instance) make real nice High Level CW Transmitters. Linears work on CW (33% efficient) but why not a regular high powered PA final with real efficiency? This means, "Buckle Down" and learn the code.

### Get On Frequency

With the advent of transceivers we have picked up a group of loudmouths who are forever shouting, "GET ON FREQUENCY." Most of these noisy individuals overlook the fact that what sounds good to their tin ear might not agree with someone else's tuning or a separate VFO is no reason for them to tell the rest of the world they are off frequency. # Der Pippensqueaker

(PART III)

## POWER SUPPLY

A single transformer furnishes B plus for all stages and a small filament transformer "turned around backwards" supplies bias. The B plus supply is somewhat unconventional.

It uses strings of silicon diodes in a standard full-wave bridge circuit to give 800v (key down) for the 807, but this is too much for the other stages. They are supplied from the transformer center tap, which is independently filtered and furnishes about 450v (key down). The unused 5 v. winding on the transformer is hooked up to "buck" the primary voltage in this position, otherwise the key-

up voltages would have exceeded the ratings of the h.v. filter capacitors (1000 v.) A second position of SW-2 ungrounds one leg of the bridge, ground the center tap instead and transfers the low voltage filter network to parallel the high voltage filter. The supply then furnishes about 450 v. d.c. (key down) to all stages, including the final. When the final is run at 25 watts input, this is the setting normally used.

The voltage regulator tube furnishes regulated 150 volts to the v.f.o., isolation amplifier and T/R switch. Only the v.f.o. needs the regulation but the other two require plate voltages in the order of 150 volts and this was a convenient source.

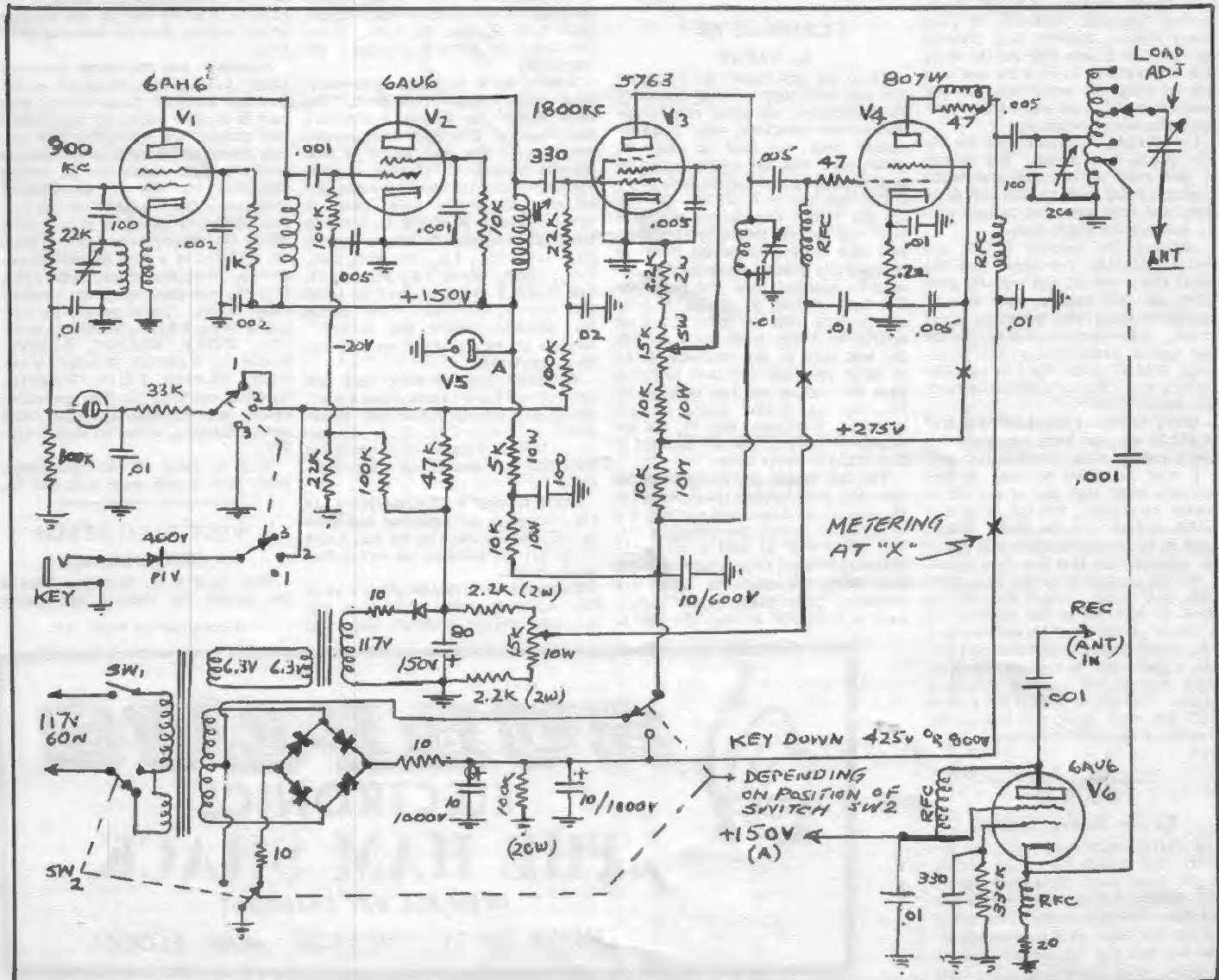
Only capacity filtering is used. There are no filters inductors. This resulted in some reports of slight ripple when the rig was first put into service. The ripple was completely eliminated by the use of a 100 mf/450v. electrolytic in the screen voltage divider where the final screen and driver screen have a common source. This was done because the key up voltage (520 v.) exceeds the ratings of readily available electrolytics and no further room was available for 600 v. pyralon capacitors on the chassis. Another 100 mf electrolytic was added in the VR tube dropping resistor string for the same reason. Dynamic regulation is greatly improved thereby. The filter could not

be added in parallel with the OB-2 of the probability of a relaxation-type oscillation.

The silicon rectifier units are standard 600 piv, 750 ma units, connected in series strings. Each unit is paralleled with a .01 capacitor and a 330-k half-watt resistor to reduce back-voltage differentials and swamp out transient spikes. The rectifier is assembled on a piece of vector board, with 10 ohm 1/2 watt resistors in series with each leg. The switch (SW-2) is ceramic. No secondary winding is used either to buck or augment the primary of the transformer when SW-2 is set for low-voltage operation.

## METERING

The meter is a conventional 1-Ma. unit (internal resistance 40 ohms). Shunts were wound by calculating the length of wire required to produce the proper resistance. Meters with diff-





erent resistance or sensitivity would require different shunt valves.

The volt-meter (0-1000) uses a 1% one-meg resistor for a multiplier.

The grid current meter has a range of 0-10 Ma.

The screen current meter also has a range of 0-10 Ma.

Plate current has a range of 0-100 Ma. this meter is not a cathode circuit because at these low power input levels, grid and screen currents are a big enough proportion of the total to make cathode current readings grossly inaccurate.

A cathode current position is provided (0-200 Ma.) however, for use, if desired, at higher power levels when the operating plate current may be 100 Ma.

The r.f. voltmeter is intended to provide only a relative reading of output voltage. It can be used mostly to see whether maximum output occurs somewhere near minimum plate current.

A neon lamp on the panel is capacity coupled to the final tank and thus gives a positive indication of r.f. output voltage from the tube. The "filament" indicator lamp is a neon bulb connected through a high value dropping resistor to the high voltage supply, which comes on as soon as the transformer primary is powered. It thus gives a positive indication that the power supplies are all working. (Bias voltage failure might occur independently, of course, while the h.v. remains on, but this would result in r.f. output from the final, with key up, as well as positive indications on the meter at all settings of the meter switch.)

#### TUNE-UP

Tune up and operation are simple. A 40 or 100 watt lamp bulb may be used for a dummy load. With SW-2 in the "low voltage" position, the key is depressed and the final tank is quickly resonated, if possible, using the r.f. voltmeter and tuning for maximum meter deflection.

When this has been done, again depress the key and tune "driver tuning" for maximum grid current on the 807. Adjust the drive with the pot ("Adjust Drive") to give a static grid current reading of 3 to 4 ma.

Recheck final plate current, adjusting "Final Amp Tuning" for minimum plate current. This minimum should never exceed 100 Ma. If it does, ad-

just "Antenna Coupling" and/or "Load Adjustment" to reduce the current below 100 Ma. and re-dip the plate current, with the "final amp tuning."

The light bulb should glow from dim to brilliantly depending on the rating of the bulb and the loading of the transmitter.

Now transfer the rig to an antenna and readjust the coupling and load adjustment to give the proper loading, always re-dipping the plate current with "final amp tuning" after each load adjustment.

For higher power operation (as in the daytime), TURN OFF THE POWER. Switch SW-2 to "high voltage" position after the filter capacitors have discharged, and turn power back on. Changing SW-2 with the power on results in severe arcing and possible damage to the switch and other components.

Follow the same tune-up procedure as before. Plate current should not exceed 100 ma after dipping it at maximum load. Preliminary tune up is best done using the cathode current position, because of its higher range. Off-resonance adjustments often result in plate currents which would pin the 100-ma meter.

Fully loaded, the 807 will draw 100 mills of plate current at 750 to 800 volts on the plate -- or 75 to 80 watts input. Grid current should always be between 3 and 4 ma.

#### T/R SWITCH

The T/R switch is built into the transmitter to supply a signal to the receiver when the key is up, if desired. Or, of course, a separate receiving antenna may be used.

Key up, the 6J6 or 6C4 (V-6) operates as a grounded-grid class-A amplifier, feeding small received signals to the receiver. Key down, the grids draw current, developing a high self-bias through the grid resistor, cutting off plate current flow and protecting the receiver from r.f. damage.

## MEMBER OF THE MONTH

Biography of Chester E. Watkins, AA4KKZ, the Ole Man Onna Mountain;

Chet was born in Ashland, Ky., in December 1893 and attended high school there briefly. In 1910 he became interested in radio and later in color photography. In 1912 he came to the Ft. Pierce area with his parents who bought a citrus grove.

In 1916 a Capt. Willoughby installed in his yacht radio telephone equipment built by Lee DeForrest. When Willoughby's son donated this equipment to the House of Refuge in 1956, it was none other than Chet who overhauled the equipment and put it in working order.

In 1959 the Ole Man Onna Mountain furnished OA4CS, Chief Pilot of Fawcett Airlines in Peru, with its first amateur radio teletype equipment. In that same year he received an Award of Merit from the Florida RTTY Society for being chiefly instrumental in rushing much-needed medicine to a 12-year old unconscious boy in Peru who, as a result of this prompt action, regained consciousness three days later and fully recovered in another 15 days. In 1958 Chet was also instrumental in delivering medicine to the Commandant of the Peruvian Air Force for use by an air-force pilot who had cracked up.

On April 2, 1960, Chet came to the assistance of two sailors stranded in Nicaragua after they were robbed and left penniless. His prompt action caused a friend to cable \$60 so that the lads could return to their base in Green Cove Springs, Florida.

A month later cartoonist Zack Mosley featured K4KKZ in his colored comic strip "Smiling Jack." In 1965 Chet assisted at the time of the Good Friday Alaska earthquake.

Among his many awards we list: Life Membership, Peruvian Radio Club; charter member, Knights of Kilocycles (no connection with the Knights of the Mystic Sea of bygone years!); several certs. of merit from Dept. of Defense; and American National Red Cross for services during Hurricane Cleo.

His present specialty is AR-10 FLORIDA SKIP, November 1966



Very active in the Gainesville area is George Putnam WA4UJX, better known as "Doc." Dr. Putnam works the traffic nets and is always ready to help out when needed. He is Diplomate American Board urology - F.A.C.S., M.S. University of Chicago (1934) B.S. Howard College, B Law 1929. Look for Doc on 75 SSB.

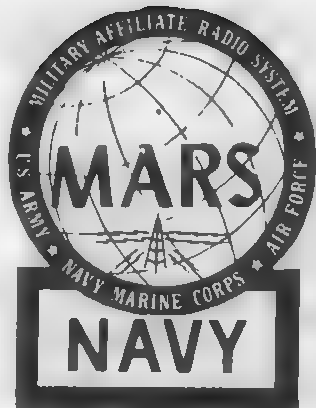

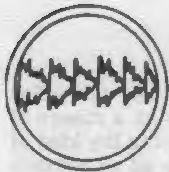

### Hints and Kinks

By K4UGC

If you have a good ohm meter and two decade boxes, that will switch in steps of one ohm, to a million -- you have a DIGITAL ADDING MACHINE, on your work bench. You can write in and read out totals as fast as you can switch the decade knobs, and read ohmmeter. It has built in automatic carry, and is accurate as the resistors and meter.

Two decades can add any length, column of numbers, in pairs of numbers, up to the total of the ohmmeter scale, such as a thousand megohm.

Subtracting can be done also by setting decade (a) to 9,999 then write in decade (b) the number to be subtracted 666. Decades (a) and (b) will be in series with the ohmmeter. The meter reads 10,665 move meter needle back to first number 9,999 with zero now, then short out decade (b). The answer will be on the meter 9,333. A digital type ohmmeter will add to your shop equipment skill.

This is one way to do sums and get a lot of practice with the ohmmeter at the same time. 73 Dick Fredrick, K4UGC, Miami.
