A Report To The Southeastern Division

As your Director for this past year, I have visited clubs over a large area of the Division. Although there are still some individual examples of "anti-ARRL-ism", I can say with considerable satisfaction that the great percentage of our Southeastern Division amateurs are beginning to have a better understanding of the League and its aims. I say "beginning" because many are still confused by the misinformation they have read, or heard over the air, during the past three years. Clubs which were broken up or disorganized by internal feuding are getting together again and building up their League membership to the "affiliation" minimum, and some are getting back to their old "Honor Roll" 100% figure.

One item troubles me, perhaps more than any other. This is the continued lack of interest in League elections. Many times I've heard that the reason an individual is "agin the League" is that it "isn't democratic". Yet, among hams in and out of the League, there is little interest in finding a leader who will truly represent them, in taking the trouble to get together a nominating petition, and finally, in casting a ballot. The League is probably more democratic than any other organization you can

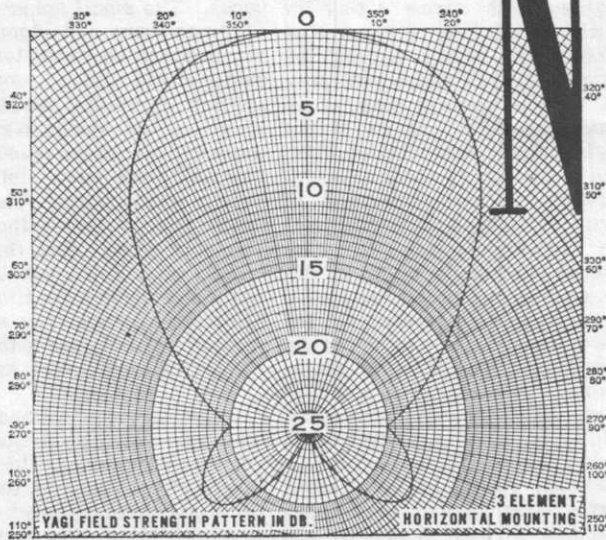

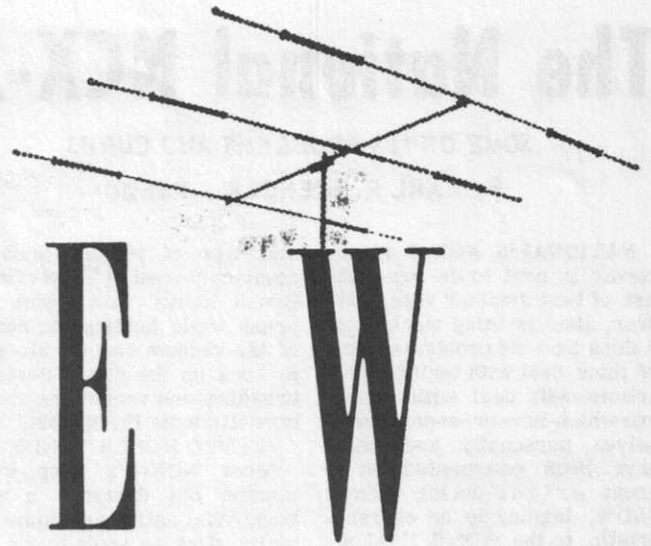

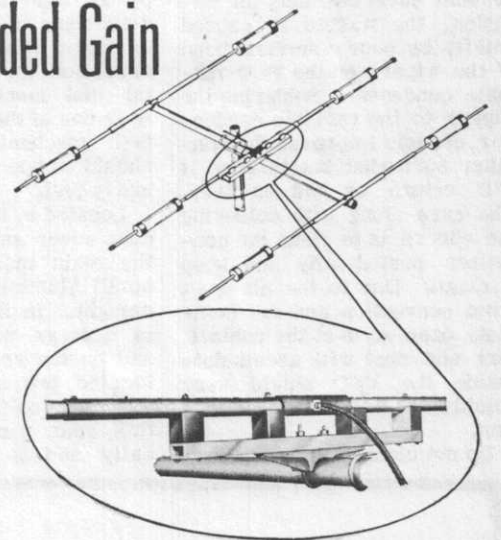

The National NCX-5

SOME OF ITS PROBLEMS AND CURES

NATIONAL'S NCX-5 receiver is next to the top of the list of best amateur rigs, however, like anything mechanical it does have its problems. Most of them deal with tuning. This article will deal with one or two which have presented themselves personally and which have been commented on to great extent during various QSO's, tending to be characteristic to the NCX-5. It is hoped that what follows will bring the NCX-5 back into the fold of happy owners.

RE: VFO

After prolonged use the VFO tends to develop a highly unstable state called a warble. For identification, it sounds like an SSB signal on an old AM receiver with a poor BFO and is very difficult if not almost impossible to zero on a signal. As per National's Addendum sheet covering the situation, the warble is caused chiefly by poor electrical bond of the wipers on the VFO variable condenser. Soldering the wipers to the variable condenser chassis improves the condition somewhat but in time it will return as bad as ever. The cure along with soldering the wipers is to clean the condenser periodically and keep it clean. Due to the air draft from convection and the complete open style of the cabinet, dirt and dust will accumulate inside the VFO shield very quickly and results in noisy action.

Do not clean with a commer-

cial type of cleaner such as commonly used by TV services. Brush lightly with a soft fine brush while holding the nozzle of the vacuum cleaner close by to suck up the dirt. Periodic brushing and vacuuming should now eliminate the warble.

RE: VFO ROUGH TUNING:

Most NCX-5's over three months old develop a very rough dial action and some actually stick in spots to the extent that undue pressure is required to release the knob. Needless to say this makes for very difficult SSB tuning. The fault is due in part to dirt again but mostly in a slight mis-alignment of the tuning mechanism. The following measures will result in a smooth tuning action, however, the characteristic heaviness of the action will remain. Tuning action on an NCX-5 can never be as light as with a direct drivestype of tuning due to the extensive gear required to operate both the VFO and the digital dial mechanism, however it is one of the best Anti-backlash mechanisms around and should compensate some for the heavy feel.

Located to the left of the VFO dust cover and directly behind the main tuning control is a small Aluminum panel standing upright. In front of this panel is a large double brass gear and on the rear of the panel is located two small gears with stop dogs on them. Notice that this gear panel stands vertically and is secured by two

small machine screws, one which passes between the shafts of the two gears and one located to the right of the gears. This panel was shimmed at the factory by means of small washers under the panel through which the machine bolts pass. Loosen both of these bolts slightly and try the tuning action. If the sticking has disappeared the problem is half solved. To cure the sticking, alternately tighten each screw a tiny bit until the sticking returns. Notice which screw causes the sticking and shim under the panel with Aluminum shim stock until the bolts can be drawn tight without any sticking when the Main tuning control is revolved. When this panel is properly aligned the tuning will be smooth and relatively free though still quite heavy to the touch. Heaviness is caused by friction and to release it the VFO mechanism must be thoroughly cleaned and lubricated. Stuff a small piece of cloth below the two gears so as to cover the transistor panel below them. Again effect a cleaning job of all associated parts using the same brush and vacuum cleaner method as before. (This is the time to perform the modification of extended coverage). Wipe away all oil and grease with a soft cloth. Take care not to allow threads to catch in the gears.

A good lubricant which is not adversely effected by heat is called PENN reel lube and can be purchased in any store handling fishing equipment. DO NOT OVER GREASE, however do make sure all parts are well coated. Place a small srop of PENN on gear and place tip of finger on drop holding it thus while rotating the Main tuning control until the gear has made a complete revolution. This will spread the lube with-

out bunching it up in spots. Don't forget the ball bearing races at the ends of the variable condenser. Lightly lubricate the digital dial system including the plastic fingers which operate the numbered dials. Lubricate the arm and collar shaft of the band selector at the left end of the digital dial shaft.

Remove the Main tuning control knob and lubricate the main shaft bearing behind the front panel. The small spinner knob becomes worn and sloppy with use and can be corrected quite easily at this time. Remove the spinner by pulling the ring retainer on the shaft. Wrap one turn of electricians plastic tape around the shaft, lubricate lightly and replace. This will tighten the spinner without it's becoming stiff. Spin the Main tuning control through its full run in all bands a few times and it should become very smooth and somewhat lighter to the feel.

EXTENDED COVERAGE:

MARS

Those who are inclined to operate the MARS frequencies which are located outside of the ham bands can do so without the aid of converters through a minor modification. The two small gears with stop dogs located on the rear of the small Aluminum panel which was referred to earlier, control the length of the bands and are set to stop just beyond the band edges. To extend the coverage of 80 meters to 4040 kc, simply file the end of the long stop bar on the left hand gear just enough so that it will pass by the dog and complete on more revolution. It will come to rest again at the stop but the coverage will be 4- kc higher. This extension will now cover both the top and bottom of the band.

RE: CORRODED KNOBS

After some use the Aluminum

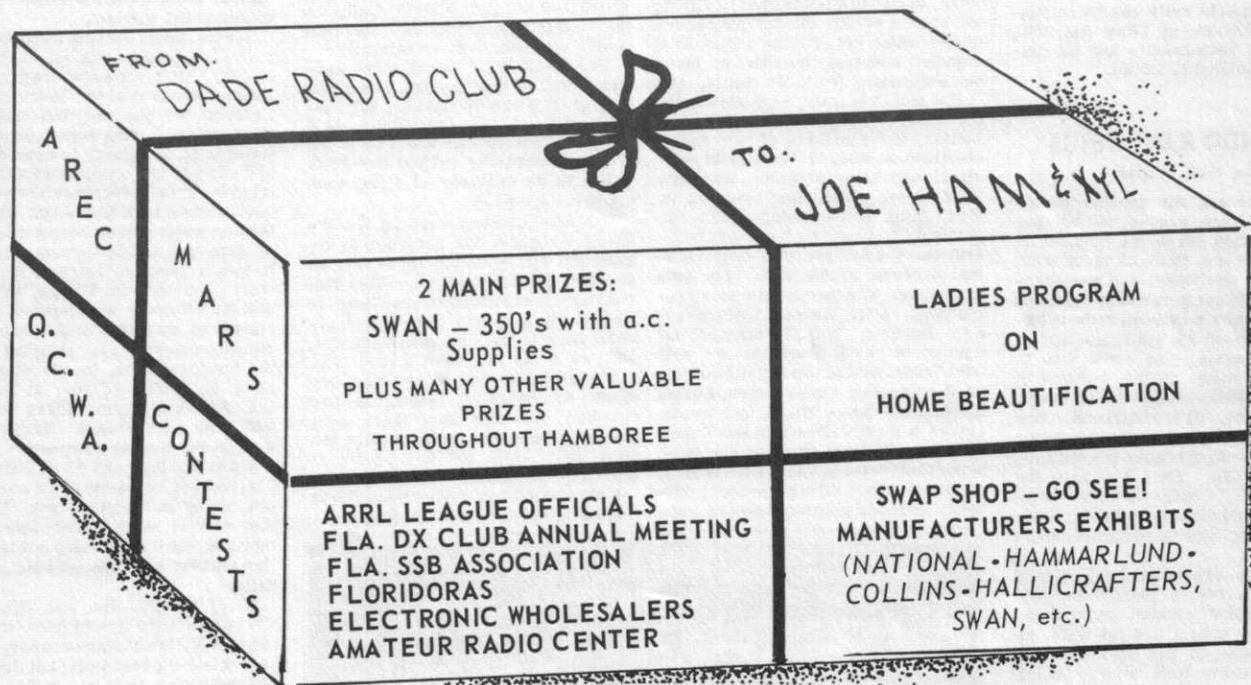

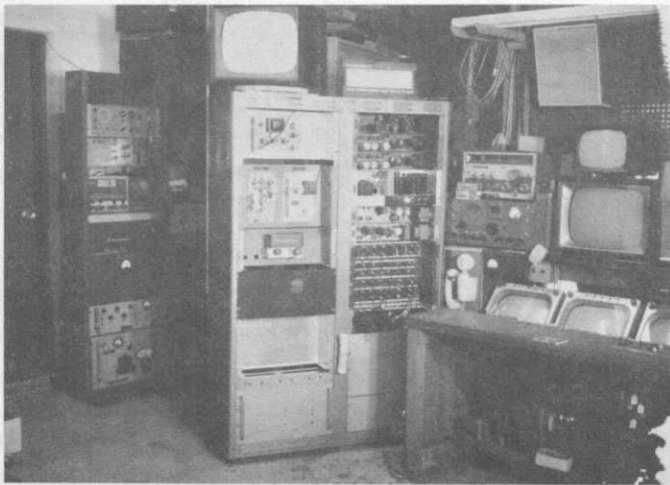

Incapacitated Hams

The enthusiastic interest which ham radio holds for the amateur operator equals, if not, transcends that of any other hobby. Unlike some avocational pursuits there is no pecuniary motive for the radio amateur; he functions solely for his own entertainment and enlightenment. His ardor has built up an exemplary fraternal spirit which has contributed much to the advancement of ham radio over the years.

So it is not unusual that such a hobby would attract many incapacitated would be hams; the halt, the blind, the deaf etc. Therefore, there was nothing singular that a Brooklyn youth was among the many who, more than a quarter of a century ago applied to FCC for an amateur license. But remarkable was the fact that this particular applicant was not only blind but also a deaf mute! Stranger still was the fact that he qualified. Despite his triple handicap he took the written examination; to 10 pages of and problems he submitted 30 pages of answers written by himself on a braille typewriter. In the code test the candidate demonstrated that he could "hear"

radio telegraph signals through vibrations produced by special devices. The result was that the aspiring 21-year old man became the first blinded deaf mute ever to hold an amateur radio license.

* * * *

WHO'S WHO

Donald C. Layman, K4QAY, 6869 SW 22nd St., West Hollywood. Don is a native of Florida, born in WPB on April 2, 1918. He first became interested in radio from listening to Ship to Shore MCW transmissions from WOE via the family's battery operated neotrodyne TRF BC receiver about 1929. He learned the code and was licensed while in knee pants. With his brother, Don operated W4AGP (Brother Ed is now K4REX) in WPB, 1930-37.

His first commercial radio job was copying Transradio press 35 wpm for WJNO West Palm Beach 1936-37. Don dropped out of Ham radio from 1937 to 1957.

In the interim 20 years, he spent 15 in airline radio and communications. This included 5 years of active duty as a USNR Radioman and Chief Radioman during WW2. Another 4 years with ARINC was spent in Miami in the consolidated airline radio station.

Don has spent the past 11 years as a transmitter engineer for WTVJ Channel 4, Miami.

Since 1957 K4QAY has been active mainly on 75SSB or AM and 80 CW. He enjoys the technical end of radio as much as the operating, and enjoys solving problems. He likes a good snappy traffic session on fone or CW, and is active on nets as often as his rotating work Sked will permit.

Don presently holds the Amateur extra class and Radiotelephone first class licenses. The Radiotelephone commercial license has long since expired due to present occupation, not due to a lapse of code ability. He still prefers CW traffic circuits for reliability, accuracy, and speed; sporadically active in the Florida Sidebanders Association, FAST net, Gator net, QFN, TPTN, and FMTN. You can always find Don around 3.6 mc. CW keeping a weekly Schedule with his brother, Ed.

Don says he uses a polyglot mess of homebrew and converted war surplus equipment, including a modified BC348 RX, a DX 100; a homebrew SSB exciter; a break in keying system; and a pair of 813s G/G ss amplifier for SSB and CW.

He is a long time member of ARRL and a firm believer in most ARRL policies, including incentive licensing.

Well, don't want to hog all the

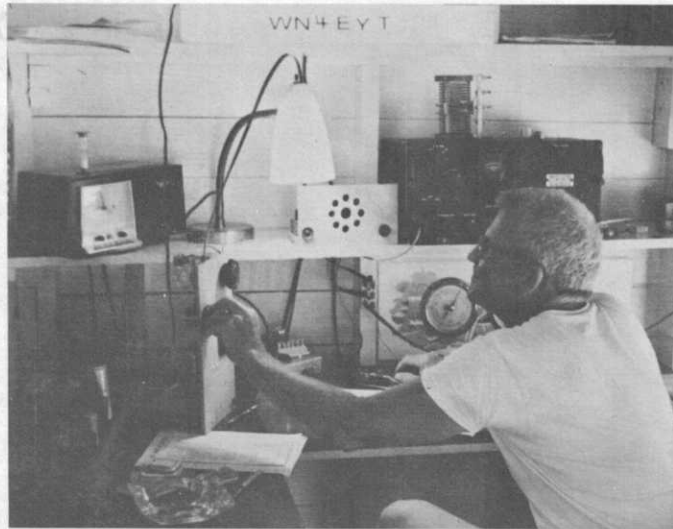

SCM's CORNER E/F

Armchair Delivery Of Amateur Radiograms

After some extensive listening on the bands both to rag-chew and net operation which has been my want for several years in this job as SCM I have come to a rather disturbing conclusion. This was particularly brought to mind on the eve of the coming SCM elections.

From the many remarks heard I can only conclude that the vast majority of those commenting have very little idea of what the duties of the SCM are - or of the Director for that matter. How in the world anyone can cast an intelligent vote without knowing these things is beyond me. How is it possible to judge a candidate's qualifications without knowing what he is charged with doing.

To put it briefly the SCM is concerned only with implement-

ing present policy. He has NOTHING to do with formulating policy or of affecting its' formulation other than that which is available to any other Ham. Policy making is a function of the Director in conjunction with all of the other Directors of ARRL.

It would be pointless and a waste of space for me to attempt to outline the detailed duties of the SCM and the Director here since there are publications available cost free that do an excellent authoritative job on this.

By addressing a mailed request to Hq ARRL you can obtain a copy of the latest Articles and By-Laws of ARRL and by radiogram, postcard or carrier pigeon this SCM will be glad to forward a free copy of the ARRL booklet "Operating an Amateur Radio Station." This booklet contains a wealth of information useful to the Ham and should be on every operating table.

Although over 90% of the messages I receive requiring delivery have the proper names addresses and the city, every now and then a "squeaker" comes along.

Some weeks ago a message came through from Vietnam/MARS with the following errors.

1. The telephone number given was incorrect (belonged to soft drink company).
2. Checked with the telephone company who had no record showing previous customer with telephone number given in MSG.
3. Telephone company had no record of addressee name having telephone at any address.
4. Checked city directory (personal copy) found name of addressee but different address given in msg. checked address and found house vacant.
5. City directory gave the type of business addressee was engaged in, of which there were eleven individuals in the same business. On the theory that

one of these persons might know the addressee, telephone calls were started and after the fourth call, obtained information on the addressee. Was advised of addressee's new address and telephone number which was listed in his paternal mother's name (father is stepfather). This accounted for the problem of finding the addressee in the first place. Made telephone call to correct telephone number and spoke with mother of the service man, finally delivering the message. She advised that they had moved after son had gone to Vietnam, and he did not know the new telephone number or address, and did not know that telephone was changed and non-listed. The son will be advised of new telephone number and address. For use in future mail or radio messages, particularly from Vietnam or any other theatre of war.

It required about one hour to make a delivery on this message. This was by no means an armchair type of delivery. It would have been very simple to service this message back to Vietnam, have heard many being sent back for much less. It's a long way back to Vietnam and everything should be done to deliver all messages, especially from service men.

Had one for our fair city of Lakeland some time back, and after much hopping around rerouted to the proper city -- Maitland. "Howse your phonetics".

Received one for Winter Haven, Florida on the South Atlantic Net from Ohio, usually make all Winter Haven delivery by phone to avoid delivery delay. After much investigation found msg. belong to Deltona, which was near Winter Garden. Some fun huh?

G.I. Hams In World War II

Although most of the war stories involving ham operators have been told, George W. Grey Jr., W2LOC of New Jersey, came up with a yard during a recent QSO that described Army radio net activities on the Burma Road. Grey, staff sergeant in Signal Corps, was in charge of a fixed radio station during his 12-month stint in China and was instrumental in handling thousands of messages in theater of war.

Shortly before Japan's capitulation, when optimism key-noted traffic handling between GHQ and far-flung radio outposts, net operators were sometimes lax in operating procedures. So it was not unusual one night when an operator sent three messages before requesting official confirmation, a necessity before exchange of radio traffic.

When coded confirmation did not come the operator realized his greatest fear -- a Jap radio operator had been sitting in on the net.

Unmasked, the Nip telegrapher then carried on a typical ham QSO with Army operators; asking questions GI rations, latest baseball scores from the states, progress of the war and other soldier gossip.

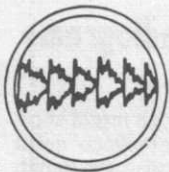

knobs will become corroded and very dirty looking which spoils the appearance of the front panel. Renewing these knobs is quite easy. Remove all knobs and place them on a 1/4" shaft that has been inserted in an electric drill. Polish the face of the knobs until they are bright by placing face down on a small pad of extra fine steel wool. When bright, coat with clear industrial lacquer and allow to dry. Before replacing the knobs, clean the panel with a mild solution of warm water and household detergent. This will remove all the dirty smudges around the controls created by the fingers. Now polish lightly with Pledge and replace control knobs and the NCX-5 will not only perform better but will look presentable again.

The NCX-5 is a fine piece of equipment but like all precision equipment needs care and attention periodically. Keep it clean and free of dust and especially those tiny light bugs and it will perform as expected.

name. Any ten League members can place a candidate's name on the ballot for any League elective office, and that includes the office of Director. Qualifications are just about as liberal as they can be and still assure no commercial interest, a reasonable period as a League member, and the same as a licensed ham. The elected officials "run" the League, regardless of any story you may have heard to the contrary. If it isn't run to your satisfaction, then find the man you think will do the job, nominate him, and elect him. It's as simple as that! For the ham who says "I'm not a member because the League doesn't follow a policy I approve of" -- I have little sympathy. The Directors MUST represent the League members' majority in their Divisions. (Or get out and let someone else do it!). The place to change policy is from within -- as a member -- not from outside!

NEW MTX CODED TEXT

Effective November 1, thirteen fixed message texts became available for regular amateur use in handling traffic of a military morale nature. These texts carry the designation MTX and have been agreed on jointly by the three MARS chiefs and ARRL.

Copies of the list are available from the ARRL Communications Department free upon request. The texts are used exactly as ARL texts except the designation MTX is substituted for ARL.

As soon as they can be included in ARRL literature they will be added to our regular ARL list and may then be transmitted as ARL fixed text messages. (ARRLOB85)
