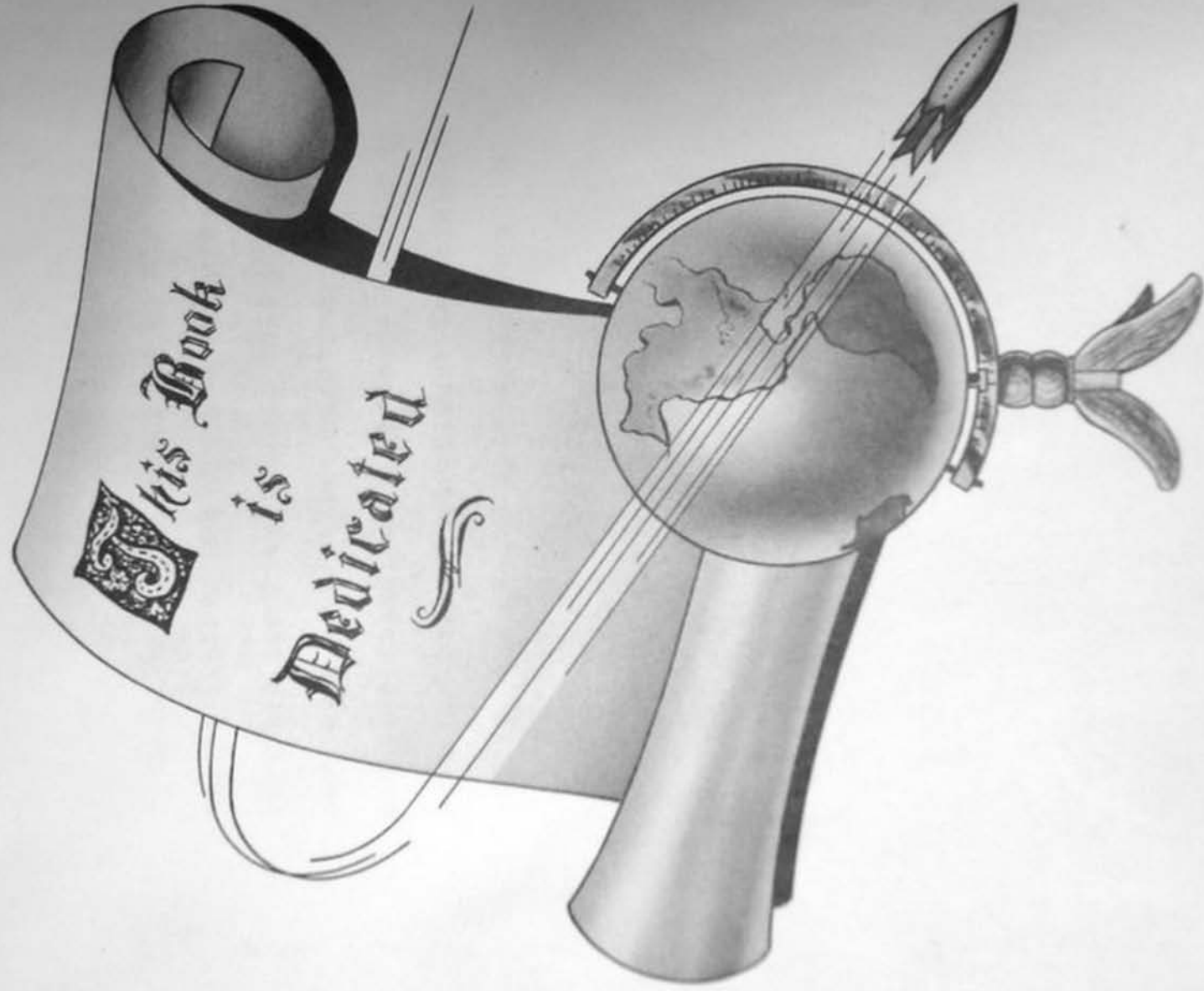

## SCHOOL HISTORY

In 1901 the town of Cass had its beginning with the erection of a sawmill and pulpmill by the West Virginia Pulp and Paper Company. Prior to that time there were but one or two homes in the local community with no school closer than Cold Run School which served the people of that section. Along with the erection of the mill, a number of houses for the employees and a building for the school were constructed. The school building was located on Main Street and is now used as a dwelling.

The first school opened in the Fall of 1901 with Miss Emma Burner as teacher, and an enrollment of about sixteen pupils. As the town grew in size, new accommodations had to be found for the increasing number of boys and girls in school attendance. A three-room building was constructed on Spruce Street in 1908, although but two rooms were used that year. The first principal was B. B. Williams of Marlinton, with C. F. Hull of Durbin, as the primary teacher.

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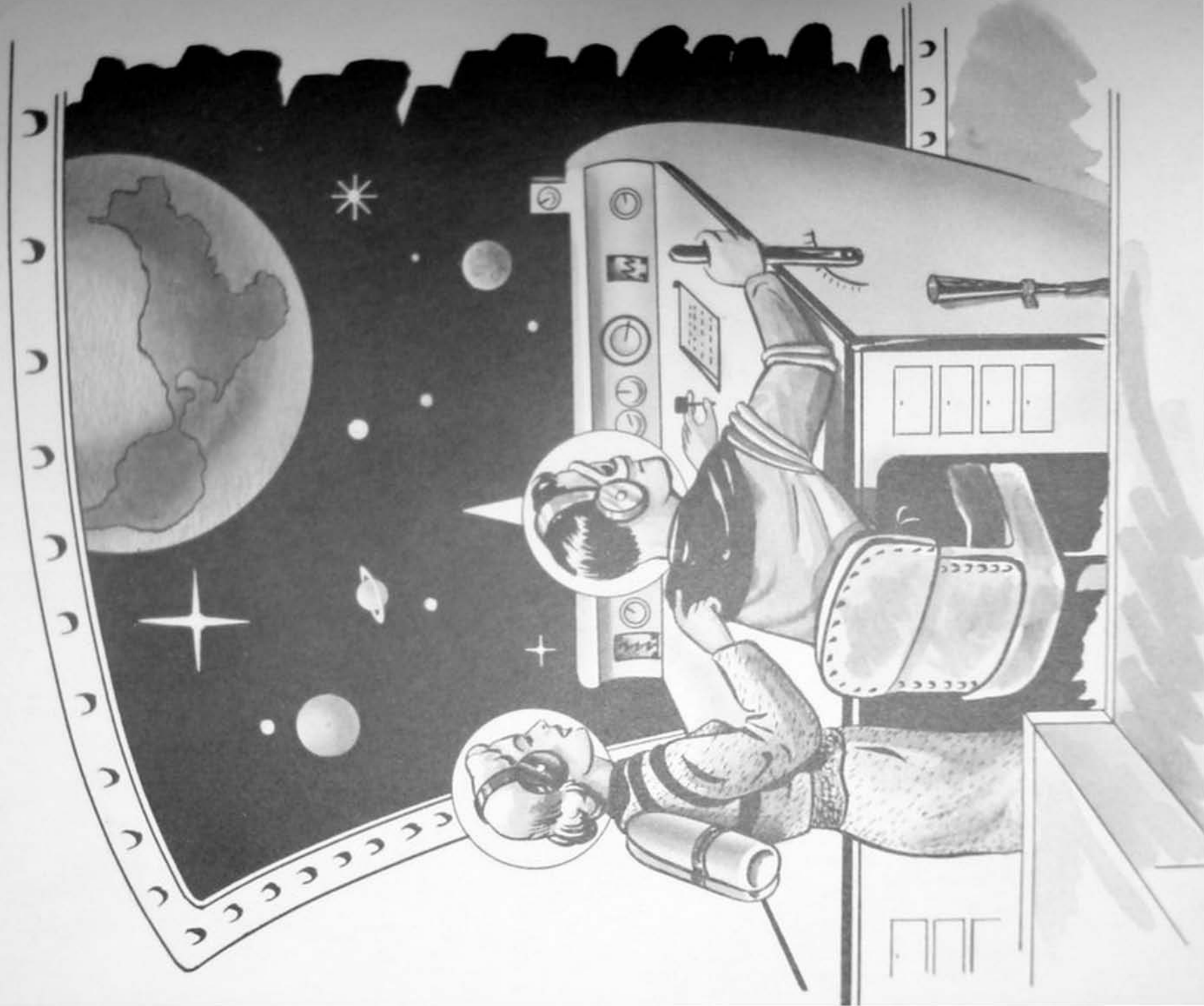
quickly outgrew its quarters. In 1916 the North wing of the building was added. In the 1920's the school became a Junior High further increasing the enrollment, and making it necessary to seek additional classrooms elsewhere in town. The school continued as a Junior High until 1932 when better roads and school busses made it more advisable to transport all high school students to Green Bank. The last addition to the present building was a gymnasium erected in 1949.

From 1908 to the present time, ten men and one woman have served as principals of this school. This list includes: B. B. Williams (1908-12); J. C. Bond (1912-13); John Sydenstricker (1913-15); Graham LaRue (1915-17); John Ralston (1917-19); Edith Pitt (1919-21); Denver Brown (1921-23); K. J. Hamrich (1923-24); T. A. Reed (1924-28); Mack H. Brooks (1928-37); J. K. Arbogast (1937-—).

In 1911 the school had its first graduation with the following persons as members of the Class: Miss Lena Anderson, Mrs. Maude Jackson Arbogast, Mrs. Esty Sharp Carter, Mrs. Bess Oliver Ervin, Mrs. Alice Blackhurst Fall, Albert Harriff, and Allen Blackhurst. The Class of 1954 is shown on one of the following pages.

During the fifty-three years of its existence hundreds of boys and girls have passed through the halls of this school to the various walks of life.
