2. Was Ruth Paine's garage kept locked?
3. How often did Lee Harvey Oswald call you from his
rooming house? (Daily, twice? - 1 H 53)
4. What were Lee Harvey Oswald's habits after he left the
Reily Coffee Co.? Did he stay away during the day? (Yes)
Did he stay away at night? (NO)
5. Did Lee Harvey Oswald ever talk about what he was doing
during this period?
6. Did Lee Harvey Oswald have any FPCC literature while you
were living at Neely Street, before coming to New Orleans?
7. Did Lee Harvey Oswald speak Spanish? (He was learning it.
1 H 50)
8. Did Lee Harvey Oswald ever engage in rifle practice either
in New Orleans or Dallas? (See Meagher. AAF. p. 132)
9. Did you ever see ammunition in Lee Harvey Oswald's
possession?
("Oswald did not have any ammunition for the rifle to
her knowledge in either Dallas or New Orleans, and he
did not speak of buying ammunition. FBI Report CE 1403.
Later, Marina testified that she saw ammunition "in a
box", "in New Orleans and on Neely Street." 1 H 120)
10. Do you know where he might have obtained ammunition?

5. How much money did Oswald take with him to Mexico? (according to WR p. 745, he had 'cash on hand' of \$214.21 on September 24, 1963).
6. Did he give you any money when you returned to Dallas with Ruth Paine?
7. How did he expect to travel to Cuba, if he had been given a visa, considering he did not have enough money to get there?
8. Do you consider he really did intend to go to Cuba?
9. Did Oswald ever go to the Western Union in Dallas?
10. Did he have any source of income other than what he earned at his jobs?
11. On November 22, 1963, he left you \$170.00. Were you surprised he had been able to save so much?
12. Did he ever attempt to cash a check for \$189.00 at Hutchison Supermarket in Irving?

(C) BARBER

If she denies the Hutchison visit, it is corroborated by Clifton Shasteen, a barber, who testified (10H311) that as well as being his client, he had seen Oswald go to this Supermarket.

1. Where did Oswald get his hair cut?
2. How often did he get it cut?

(D) O. H. LEE "ALIAS" QUARREL

1. How could Oswald have expected you to call him at 1026 N. Beckley -- which he did, or else he wouldn't have given you his phone number -- if he was staying there under a false name?
2. Did, therefore, you know all along he was using that name? Or was he not using it at all?

3. Why did you get upset over the incident? You had "laughed at such foolishness" (LH64) when he used the name Hidell in New Orleans, and which deception you even collaborated in, by signing the name Hidell on a FPCC card.

(E) VISIT TO SEE OSWALD IN JAIL

1. Tell us what happened.
2. What did he say?
3. How did he react?
4. Was his behavior different from when he returned from his alleged attempt to shoot General Walker?

(F) WALKER SHOOTING (Shooting attempt occurred on the night of Wednesday, April 10, 1963)

1. Do you believe that Oswald took a shot at General Walker?
2. (If yes:) On what evidence?
3. Regarding the undated note: (CE1, attached) When did you first see it? Under what circumstances?
4. How did it fall into the hands of the Secret Service? (Mysteriously, it was in a book which Ruth Paine sent to Marina after the assassination. This book was intercepted by an unidentified Secret Service agent. SA Gopadze then showed it to Ruth Paine and asked her if she had written it. 9H393-4)
5. Testimony before the Warren Commission indicates that Marina's lawyer, Mr. McKenzie, advised her to testify that only one gun was used in the Walker shooting, namely Oswald's gun. (2H231, 232, 336-7: Mr. & Mrs. Declan Ford). Is this true?

(i.e., the suggestion is that Marina was urged to improvise the story that Oswald had shot at Walker.)

6. Did the DeMohrenschildts know about Oswald's alleged shot at Walker? (CE 1403 p.777). She told the FBI that DeMohrenschildt had said when he visited Oswald on Saturday, April 13, "How did you miss?", when he walked in the door. Mrs. DeMohrenschildt testified that he only said that after she had seen the rifle in the closet. However, according to Marina's statement to the FBI (CE 1403, p. 777) the rifle was still buried at that time. She said he brought it back the Sunday following the shooting attempt, (i.e., Easter Sunday, April 14).
7. Did you see the rifle when Oswald brought it back?
8. Did it have earth on it?
9. How did Oswald bring it back without it being seen?
10. Did he return by bus?
11. Did the rifle have a scope on it?

SUBJECT : Documents on Lee Harvey OSWALD Furnished
by the Soviet Government.

1. The Soviet documents forwarded to this Agency under your letter of 20 May 1964 provide some additional detail on OSWALD. The information in these documents parallels that already available from other sources, and does not contradict our previous information. The documents do clarify somewhat OSWALD's alleged occupation at the Minsk radio plant by giving the original Russian terms used in describing his job. It is referred to several times as "slesar" ("assembler") or "regulirovshchik" ("regulator"). The former term applies to someone who works with metal and may indicate that OSWALD had something to do with the fabricating of metal prototypes or models in the experimental shop. The functions of a "regulator" in an experimental shop are not clear, but may involve the physical regulation or adjustment of certain mechanical components. Neither type of work is believed to require much skill or training.

2. The following points relating to the documents are worth noting:

a. A significant omission from the materials provided is the letter OSWALD allegedly wrote to the Supreme Soviet requesting Soviet citizenship. None of the subject documents refers to a request by OSWALD for citizenship.

b. OSWALD signed a receipt in 1960 for his Identity Document for Stateless Persons, and a second receipt in 1962 for his Identity Document for Foreigners. The similarity of wording of the receipts

regarding his understanding of Soviet residence and travel regulations further supports our belief that such regulations are identical or nearly identical for bearers of either type of identity document. This means that OSWALD should have obtained permission in July 1961 to travel to Moscow, but, as we know from other cases, failure to obtain travel permission is not uncommon and not a serious offense.

c. The inclusion of Marina's exit visa "application" is singular in view of the fact that the Commission had not requested information on Marina. Moreover, the document purporting to be an application for an exit visa hardly qualifies as such. We know from the cases of other Soviet citizens that have sought to obtain exit visas for permanent residence outside the USSR that such persons are required to provide considerably more information than was reflected in Marina's "application." Moreover, in interviews conducted in this country Marina referred to having filled out the necessary "forms" and OSWALD noted in his "diary" that about twenty documents were necessary to obtain an exit visa.

d. The Soviet translators for OSWALD's early documents are believed to be identical with persons already referred to in OSWALD's "diary." R. SHIROKOVA (not SHIRONOVA as shown on the English translation of his 1959 application for an identity document) is doubtless Rima SHIROKOVA, whom OSWALD mentioned in his "diary." R. F. DEDKOV, who translated OSWALD's "application" for employment on 11 January 1960, is doubtless the same Roman DETKOV who also appeared in OSWALD's "diary."

3. The format and wording of subject documents appear to be consistent with Soviet practice.

Marina Oswald Issued Subpoena By Garrison

NEW ORLEANS (AP) — The widow of Lee Harvey Oswald was subpoenaed for grand jury

testimony today by Dist. Atty. Jim Garrison, who doubts Warren Commission findings that Oswald alone assassinated President John F. Kennedy.

Garrison's office issued the subpoena for Marina Oswald Porter, now of Richardson, Tex., a Dallas suburb, to appear here Feb. 8-9 as part of Garrison's controversial probe into the assassination.

Asst. Dist. Atty. James L. Alcock said investigators want to ask her what she knew about Oswald's activities in New Orleans during the summer of 1963.

Kennedy was killed Nov. 22, 1963, in Dallas, Tex. Oswald was shot to death during a jail transfer two days later by Jack Ruby, who has since died from cancer.

Mrs. Porter, who later married Kenneth Porter, lived here with Oswald during the summer preceding the assassination. It was during this summer, Garrison maintains, that Oswald and others conspired to murder Kennedy.

Garrison contends the plot led to the murder by a team of anti-Castro guerrilla fighters.

The district attorney has charged New Orleans businessman Clay L. Shaw and a Los Angeles broadcasting salesman Edgar Eugene Bradley with conspiring to murder the President.

Garrison has subpoenaed nearly a dozen persons as material witnesses in his probe, but has had little success thus far getting them into Louisiana to testify.

Alcock said a copy would be mailed to Dallas County Dist. Atty. Henry Wade. Then, he explained, a hearing would be held on whether she be ordered to return if she does not do so voluntarily.

"I don't see how any court would say her testimony was not material in this case," Alcock said.

The subpoena said that "Marina Oswald Porter, being the wife of Lee Harvey Oswald

Subpoenaed Marina Oswald Fearful Of Garrison Power

NEW ORLEANS (UPI)—Mrs. Marina Oswald Porter, the widow of presidential assassin Lee Harvey Oswald, said she doubted she could help — after being subpoenaed Wednesday by Dist. Atty. Jim Garrison in his probe of the Kennedy assassination.

But Mrs. Porter, now a suburban Dallas housewife, said she was not anxious to go to New Orleans to testify before a grand jury Feb. 8.

"I will go to New Orleans if I have to," Mrs. Porter said. "I will go if I'm forced to."

She reiterated her earlier beliefs that her first husband murdered President Kennedy.

"Up to now I agree with the Warren Commission report," said Mrs. Porter. "If Garrison can bring some more facts then maybe I'll change my mind. I haven't changed my mind yet."

She said she has not received any papers as yet, and said she was "very surprised" to hear of Garrison's action.

"I never knew the people Garrison has indicated," Mrs. Porter said, referring to other figures in the district attorney's investigation. "I never heard Lee speaking about them."

"I don't know if I could prove my innocence to him," Mrs. Porter said at her home in

The subpoena said the Russian-born Mrs. Porter "would have knowledge of Lee Harvey Oswald's activities and asso-

Witness Won't Be Returned

BAKERSFIELD (AP)—Kernville bartender Loran Hall learned Wednesday he will not

have to return to New Orleans to testify in a probe of the Kennedy assassination but said he

now fears he will be charged with conspiracy.

Hall, his skin yellowed by jaundice, heard Kern County Superior Court Judge J. R. Borton reject New Orleans Dist. Atty. Jim Garrison's request that he be ordered to appear before a New Orleans grand jury.

In his ruling, Judge Borton said Hall's categorical denial that he knew any of the alleged conspirators showed that he was either not a material witness in Garrison's investigations or that he committed perjury.

Garrison had issued a subpoena for Hall stating the Kernville man was in a "unique position" to observe events surrounding the assassination but Hal has denied that connection.

DA Calls Marina Oswald

The district attorney's office today issued a subpoena for Mrs. Marina Oswald, Hutenslohn widow of accused presidential assassin Lee Harvey Oswald.

District Attorney Jim Garrison wants Mrs. Oswald, now Mrs. Kenneth Jess Porter of Richardson, Tex., to testify before the Orleans Parish Grand Jury Feb. 4 and 9 in his probe of the assassination of President John F. Kennedy.

ASSISTANT DA JAMES L. Alcock said investigators want to ask the woman about the activities and associates of Oswald while he was living in New Orleans during the summer of 1963. Garrison contends the assassination was plotted here during that period.

The official Warren Commission report concluded that Oswald shot Kennedy to death in Dallas on Nov. 22, 1963.

Contacted by telephone, Mrs. Porter said: "It is a surprise to me."

Asked if she could contribute anything to Garrison's investigation, she replied:

"No, I don't believe so."

Asked whether she planned to come to New Orleans, she said:

"No, but I may have to."

hate to go down there because Mr. Garrison is so powerful. I don't know if I could prove my innocence to him."

Mrs. Porter said she talked last year with attorneys for Clay Shaw, whom Garrison has charged with conspiracy in the Kennedy slaying, and "I told them I would testify in his trial."

But she added her willingness to testify in Shaw's trial does not indicate she knows anything about him.

"I just want to do the right thing if he is an innocent man," she said. "But I don't think I could help in Mr. Garrison's work."

Alcock said a copy of the subpoena would be sent to Dallas DA Henry Wade. Richardson is a suburb of Dallas.

The procedure then is for Wade to file a rule to have the woman brought into court there, where a hearing will be held on her return if she does not do so voluntarily.

The court must then decide if her testimony is material or if it would create a hardship for her to come to New Orleans.

"I DON'T see how any court would say her testimony was not material in this case," said Alcock.

Oswald married Marina, now 26, while he was living in Russia as a U.S. defector. She remarried in 1965, about a year and a half after Oswald was shot to death in the Dallas jail by Jack Ruby two days after Kennedy was killed.

She has two children by Oswald and one by her new husband.

Marina has said she believes her late husband killed the President. She cooperated with the Warren Commission in its investigation. She has denied knowing any of the principals Garrison contends plotted the assassination with Oswald in New Orleans.

Alcock said today "we have some very interesting questions to ask Mrs. Oswald."

HER SUBPENA is for the same day as one issued to Kerry Thornick, an associate of Oswald in the Marine Corps, who Garrison claims also knew him in New Orleans.

It grants her immunity from prosecution while in the state.

The subpoena was signed by Criminal District Judge Matthew S. Braniff, and a check for \$120 for her travel expenses was ordered drawn from the fund and fees fund.

New Orleans Grand Jurors Hear Marina's Tale, Others

NEW ORLEANS (UPI) — A somber Marina Oswald Porter and two other witnesses were hustled in and out of the Orleans Parish (County) Grand Jury chambers Thursday to tell what they know of Lee Harvey Oswald's life in New Orleans.

Oswald's blue-eyed, Russian-born widow appeared briefly as she rushed down the criminal courthouse corridor flanked by her husband, Kenneth Porter of Richardson, Tex., and an aide to Dist. Atty. Jim Garrison.

She was bundled up in a gold overcoat and flushed from 38-degree weather outside.

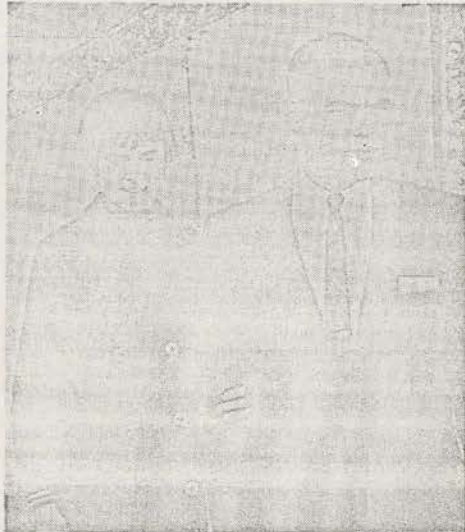
"All I want to do is go inside," she whispered, brushing off reporters.

Kerry Thornley of Tampa, Fla. and Thomas Beckham of Omaha, Neb., also appeared before the jury, but were taken in and out of the building on a private elevator.

However, after his appearance before the grand jury Thornley told newsmen that he had never seen Oswald in New Orleans.

"The last time I saw Oswald was in June of 1959," Thornley said. "I told the Warren Commission everything I know."

The part-time author indicated he did not think Oswald was a confirmed Communist during the time the two knew each

other in the Marine Corps. Following her testimony, Mrs. Porter was taken out of the building by a back entrance.

The appearance of both Thornley, a Marine Corps acquaintance of Oswald who testified before the Warren Commission, and Beckham came as somewhat of a surprise.

Thornley indicated earlier he would fight Garrison's subpoena. Beckham had been ordered by a Omaha court to appear, but received a two-week continuance last Thursday.

Garrison said Thornley lived

in New Orleans at the same time the Oswalds did in the summer of 1963. Thornley, who has written two unpublished books about the presidential assassin, admitted he lived here, but said he did not know Oswald at the time.

The district attorney identified Beckham as a one-time associate of the late David Ferrie, a New Orleans ex-airline pilot.

Garrison has charged Oswald, Ferrie, Clay Shaw and Jack Ruby hatched the conspiracy to assassinate President Kennedy in New Orleans in 1963.

BRADLEY GIVEN HEARING STAY

Calif. Man Charged in Kennedy Case

LOS ANGELES (AP)—Edgar Eugene Bradley, charged with criminal conspiracy to commit murder in the 1963 assassination of President John F. Kennedy, was granted a 60-day continuance of his Municipal Court hearing Monday.

Judge Joan Dempsey Klein ordered Bradley to return to court March 29 for further proceedings.

Meantime extradition papers issued in New Orleans, La., arrived in Sacramento, Calif., where they were to be assessed by the state attorney general's office, New Orleans Dist. Atty. Jim Garrison seeks to have Bradley sent to New Orleans to testify in Garrison's assassination probe.

Bradley, 49, of North Hollywood, has denied any special knowledge of the assassination. When he surrendered to the sheriff in December his attorney said he would fight extradition "tooth and nail."

Earlier this month judges refused to extradite two other Californians wanted by Garrison for testimony in New Orleans.

Loran E. Hall, 33, of Kernville and Lawrence J. Howard Jr., 33, of El Monte, were named by Garrison as witnesses needed in his assassination probe.

DALLAS, Tex. (AP)—Marjina Oswald Porter was honored a subpoena Monday to appear before a New Orleans grand jury investigating claims that the assassination of President John F. Kennedy was a conspiracy.

Mrs. Porter is the widow of Lee Harvey Oswald, named by the Warren Commission as the assassin.

New Orleans Dist. Atty. Jim Garrison has charged that a conspiracy to kill the late president existed.

The widow later married Kenneth Jess Porter and they live in Richardson, a Dallas suburb.

SERVED AT HOME

The subpoena was served by Dallas County deputy sheriffs at her home. She was directed to appear before State Dist. Court Judge John Mead Feb. 1 for a hearing on the subpoena which calls for her to be in New Orleans Feb. 8 and 9.

Oswald was killed two days after the Nov. 22, 1963 slaying of Kennedy. His slayer was Jack Ruby, Dallas night club operator who died of complications of cancer.

Sheriff Bill Decker said his deputies advised Mrs. Porter that she had a right to counsel at the hearing before Judge Mead and could protest the subpoena.

Earlier, Mrs. Porter said she did not want to go to New Orleans but would do so if required.

KNEW NONE IN PROBE

She has steadfastly said since the beginning of Garrison's investigation some months ago that she knew none of the figures named by Garrison in his probe.

In Omaha, Neb., meanwhile, a district court hearing for Thomas Edward Beckham, 27, of Omaha, sought as a material witness in the New Orleans investigation into the alleged plot to assassinate Kennedy, was postponed indefinitely Monday.

Beckham, hurt in an auto accident Saturday night, was to have appeared to show cause why he should not return to New Orleans to testify in Garrison's inquiry. Beckham suffered a broken right arm in the accident.

NIXON SHOOTING

(The Commission did not believe Marina's story that Oswald planned to shoot Nixon. Nor did they consider that it raised any questions as to Marina's credibility as a witness.)

1. Marina first mentioned this incident to the WC on June 11th. She had previously mentioned it to her manager, Mr James Martin, ~~to~~ who told the WC about it (IH 482-490), adding that he thought it "far fetched."
2. Marina said it happened a week before Oswald left for New Orleans, "and after the Walker business, I think." (5H387)
3. According to her testimony, Oswald got dressed and took a pistol with him morning she asked him what he was doing and he said: "Nixon is coming. I want to go and have a look."
4. She said she locked him in the bathroom (an improbability as the lock was on the inside) "We actually struggled for several minutes and then he quieted down." (5H388)
5. Nixon did not visit Dallas ~~at this~~ during this period, nor had he planned to. However LBJ did visit Dallas the day before Oswald left for New Orleans. (The DTH carried headlines, on April 24, 1963: 'KENNEDY DALLAS VISIT SEEN.' LBJ broke the news that JFK would visit Dallas — a point omitted from the Warren Report.)

Here are some additional questions for MARINA, supplementing my memo of January 31, 1968 (attached).

(A) IN RUSSIA

1. Oswald apparently "disappeared" for 6 weeks shortly after arriving in Russia, between mid-November 1959 and the end of December 1959. The Commission says Oswald "probably" did not leave Moscow for Minsk until January 4, 1960, (WR p. 750). Do you have any knowledge of his whereabouts or activity during this period?

2. A CIA report (attached) states: "The document purporting to be an application for an exit visa hardly qualifies as such..." etc. The implication is that there may have been some faking with regard to Marina's visa application. How many forms did you have to fill out to apply for the visa?

3. Were you a member of Komsomol? (Yes, she was, 5H608-9, but she denied it when she applied for admittance to the U.S.).

(In general, it is the State Department which needs to be interrogated in this area, especially regarding its agreement to waive sanctions on behalf of Marina, and on other matters concerning the way the Oswalds' departure from Russia was expedited.)

(B) OSWALD'S FINANCES

2. Did Oswald ever have a bank account to your knowledge?

3. Where did he keep his savings?

4. Did Oswald ever take a taxi?

11. Could you drive a car in 1963?
12. How was the gun returned from New Orleans to Dallas?
(Wrapped in blanket in Ruth Paine's car.)
13. How many meetings, to your knowledge, did Lee Harvey Oswald attend in Dallas with Michael Paine?
(She mentions one (ACLU) 1 H 55)
14. Did the FBI attempt any coercion when they interviewed you after the assassination?
15. Did they try to obtain desired answers from you?
16. Have you been contacted by Federal agents since the Warren Report was published?
17. Did you ever go anywhere by car with Lee Harvey Oswald in New Orleans, driven either by him or anyone else?
18. Do you have any reason to believe that at any stage Ruth Paine misrepresented the facts to the Warren Commission?
19. How did Lee Harvey Oswald meet GEORGE DEMOHRENSCHILDT?

(DeMohrenschildt and Col. Orlov drove to Fort Worth to see them one day. It is not explained how they knew of the Oswald's existence.)
20. Who is Colonel ORLOV?
21. Did Lee Harvey Oswald say anything to you about his leaving for Mexico City, before you left for Dallas with Ruth Paine? (See Meagher, AAF p. 239)
22. Did you ever see Lee Harvey Oswald cleaning his rifle?
(Yes. 1 H.14)
23. What did he use to clean it with?
(No rifle cleaning equipment was ever found.)
