"NATO called the 971 the Akula and the 941 the Typhoon, but the Russian called the 971 the Shchuka-B and the 945 the Akula. Anyway, the 971 boats can launch up to 12 cruise missiles and the 945 10 ICBMs."

"But the Russian navy is history," Clarence observed.

"As of the end of 2003, the Russians had 9 active 971's," Gary said. "I've never seen anything on the net about them retiring them either. They were going to lease some to India, but that fell through. The Akula (971) is the quietest submarine there is period. What do you think 9 dozen nuclear cruise missiles would do to this country?"

"Raise hell, that's for sure," Ron said. "But we have SOSUS and can track them, right?"

"Nope, SOSUS can't track the Akula FA boats and neither can the 688I class subs," Gary said, "Provided they stay at normal operating speeds. I guess that's why they've shut down all but 3 SOSUS listening stations."

So Russia stayed out of the UN debacle, did that mean that their hands were clean? While the UN wasted its assets in the US, Russia had a bit of an arms race of its own. North Korea was also building more of their long-range ICBMs. Japan complained in the reconstituted UN when the North Koreans flew a bird over Japan in yet another test flight. and Vietnam. There are also Burma, Thailand and Kuala Lumpur in the area as I recall. To the north of China lay Mongolia with its oil, coal, copper, molybdenum, tungsten, phosphates, tin, nickel, zinc, fluorspar, gold, silver, and iron.

According to the 2004 CIA Factbook, China was "involved in complex dispute with Malaysia, Philippines, Taiwan, Vietnam, and possibly Brunei over the Spratly Islands; the 2002 *Declaration on the Conduct of Parties in the South China Sea* has eased tensions but falls short of a legally binding *code of conduct* desired by several of the disputants; most of the rugged, militarized boundary with India is in dispute, but the two sides are committed to begin resolution with discussions on the least disputed Middle Sector; Kashmir remains the world's largest and highly militarized territorial dispute with portions under the de facto administration of China (Aksai Chin), India (Jammu and Kashmir) and Pakistan (Azad Kashmir and Northern Areas), but recent discussion and confidence-building measures among parties are beginning to defuse tensions, India does not recognize Pakistan's ceding lands to China in a 1964 boundary agreement."

In 2003 China together with Taiwan asserted their claims to the Japanese-administered Senkaku Islands (Diaoyu Tai) with increased media coverage and protest actions; China and Kazakhstan have resolved their border dispute and are working to demarcate their large open borders to control population migration, illegal activities, and trade; certain islands in Yalu and Tumen rivers are in an uncontested dispute with North Korea and a section of boundary around Mount Paektu is indefinite – China has been attempting to stem mass illegal migration of North Koreans escaping famine and oppression into northern China.

China continues to seek a mutually acceptable solution to the disputed alluvial islands with Russia at the confluence of the Amur and Ussuri rivers and a small island on the Argun river as part of the 2001 Treaty of Good Neighborliness, Friendship, and Cooperation; boundary delimitation agreements signed in 2002 with Tajikistan cedes 1,000 sq km of Pamir Mountain range to China in return for China's relinquishing claims to 28,000 sq km, but demarcation has not commenced; demarcation of land boundary with Vietnam continues but maritime boundary and joint fishing zone agreement remains unratified; China occupies Paracel Islands also claimed by Vietnam and Taiwan; groups in Burma and Thailand express concern over China's construction of 13 hydroelectric dams on the Salween River in Yunnan Province."

A treaty is just a piece of paper – always remember that. By 2013, Taiwan was a part of China and China had abrogated all of its Treaties and was moving south to secure food to feed its population, now roughly 1.4 billion. With its new isolationist policy, the US wasn't about to get involved in another *Vietnam*. Russia was watching for any sign of movement by the Chinese to the north, into Mongolia. China and North Korea had resolved their differences and were now fast friends with the illegal immigration policy solved. To paraphrase a line from *Top Gun*, *tensions were high*. Speaking of which, there is no such thing as a MiG-28.

Washington...

"The Chinese appear to be massing for an invasion of the countries to their south, Mr. President, what are your intentions?" the SecDef asked.

The report also states, 'Iran, Syria and Libya are among the countries that could be involved in immediate, potential or unexpected contingencies' that would require 'nuclear strike capabilities,' and it states that the United States could launch a nuclear assault to destroy stocks of weapons of mass destruction, such as biological and chemical arms.

So what if China and Russia ended up in a war? And, if North Korea got involved, who cared? The US absolutely, positively wasn't going to get involved, right? Right, we had planes to build, ships to commission and we were pouting at the way the rest of the world treated us and we weren't going to get involved in any world politics that didn't involve England, Australia or Israel, our good buddies and allies. That's what the President said, and Presidents never lie. The last honest politician to be President was Jimmy Carter who admitted to lusting after some woman in his heart. The term honest politician is an oxymoron, right?

Situation Room, White House, Washington, DC...

Mr. President, Ladies and Gentlemen, the Chairman said. At 1400zulu, an Australian ANZAC class frigate made contact with submerged contact. They eventually forced the contact to surface and it turned out to be a Chinese type 93 class nuclear submarine. It was approximately 40 miles off the Australian coast. Australia has gone on full alert. Approximately 4 hours earlier, elements of the People's Liberation Army invaded Burma, Laos and Vietnam. It is estimated that the Type 93 SSN is equipped with wire- and wave-homing torpedoes, submarine-launched anti-ship cruise missiles and mines. It is also be capable of firing anti-submarine warfare (ASW) missiles and land-attack cruise missiles (LACMs). The displacement of the boat is estimated to be between 6,500 and 7,000 tons, with a pressured water nuclear reactor and a single asymmetrical seven-blade skewed propeller.

As a result of those actions, the governments of India and Pakistan put their militaries on full alert. Russia and the Russia went to a heightened alert status, too. We raised our alert status to DEFCON 4 and the DHS Threat Level to yellow.

"So much for a posture of isolationism," the President observed, "What is the Navy doing?"

"The Armed Forces have cancelled all leaves and ordered everyone to report to their duty stations, Mr. President," the Chairman explained. "We are provisioning our carrier strike groups and making ready to set sail if ordered to do so. Our greatest concern is the type 94 Chinese boats. Each of the Type 94 SSBNs mounts 16 JL-2 submarine-launched ballistic missiles (SLBMs) with a maximum range of 8,000kms. When deployed, this missile will allow Chinese SSBNs to target portions of the United States for the first time from operating areas located near the Chinese coast. Equipped with the JL-2 missiles, the Type 94 SSBNs would only have to patrol just to the northeast of the Kuril Islands to hold about three-fourths of the United States within its missile's range."

"You'd better sortie all of our attack boats and get all of the Ohio class SSBN's and SSGN's out of port and on station," the President ordered. "Sortie the first 4 carrier task groups that are ready to sail to Australia. We might as well try and get ahead of the

UK's inevitable request. Be prepared to change our military posture to DEFCON 3. I'll get on the horn to the Russian Premier and inform him that all of our actions are in response to the Chinese activities. The State Department will contact all of the countries involved and inform them of our actions."

"What about the Chinese boats?" the Chairman asked.

"If your skippers hear any of the type 94's preparing to launch, sink them," the President ordered. "If any of the type 93 boats take a provocative action, sink them too. I want the Air Force to retarget our ICBM's for complete coverage of China. Do the same with the Ohio class boats. At the first sign of launch of any weapons against this country, you will reduce China to ashes."

"We'd better go ahead with DEFCON 3 immediately, Mr. President," the Chairman urged.

"Do it," the President ordered. "I've got the hard part here. I have to go on TV and notify the American public. I don't expect they'll be too happy being we're still digging out from the UN invasion."

Negotiations between the US and the UK on an amendment to extend the 1958 US-UK Mutual Defense Agreement are now complete. The amendment would renew this Cold War nuclear cooperation pact, and is being pushed through in haste, despite increasing controversy concerning the legality of this Agreement.

The Amendment was approved, authorized for execution, and transmitted to Congress by President Bush on June 14, 2004. The text of the Amendment itself is not publicly available at time of writing, but in his 'Message to Congress', President Bush stated that it, "extends for 10 years (until December 31, 2014) provisions that permit the transfer of nonnuclear parts, source, byproduct, special nuclear materials, and other material and technology for nuclear weapons and military reactors, and revises text, principally in the Security Annex, to be consistent with current policies and practices relating to personnel and physical security."

I guess you can see why the US was so rapid to react to that Chinese boat in Australian waters. Once the most powerful Navy in the world, the UK was reduced to a paltry fleet. They couldn't really do all that much to protect Australia and had invoked the Treaty immediately. The President was caught between the proverbial rock and hard place. Little wonder he reacted the way he did in the Situation room briefing. The British Prime Minister called before the briefing was over and the President reassured him that the US was taking immediate action.

My Fellow Americans, the President began.

The United States has observed with growing concern the state of affairs in China. As many of you may know from news broadcasts, the Chinese people are nearing a starvation level. Apparently the Chinese government has decided to take what it needs, rather than ask. We have tried to keep a tight lid on the situation in Southeast Asia, but no doubt some of you already know that the People's Liberation Army invaded Burma, Laos and Vietnam about 18 hours ago.

A Chinese type 93 nuclear submarine was forced to surface in Australian waters a few hours after the invasion. The United States has a Mutual Defense Pact with the UK dating from 1958 and renewed by President George W. Bush in 2004. The UK has asked for our help and we have responded by canceling all military leaves, activating the Guard and Reserves and preparing our Navy to take action in support of Australia.

There exists the possibility, however remote, that this conflict could escalate into a full blown World War. We have raised the Threat Level to yellow and raised the military readiness condition to DEFCON 3. I spoke personally with the Premier of Russia and the State Department has been in consultation with India and Pakistan. Both of those nations have gone to the highest alert status and as everyone knows, each is a nuclear power.

I do not know how this conflict is going to turn out, but I am addressing you tonight to suggest that all of you make such preparations as you deem advisable. While we do not perceive a threat of invasion, there exists the possibility of a nuclear confrontation. Coming on the heels of the UN invasion, such an event would have catastrophic results for this nation.

My advisors have persuaded me that there exists a Clear and Present Danger to the United States. I have called for a Joint Session of Congress tomorrow morning to present such evidence as the Executive Branch has to the Congress. I will not, at that time, call for a declaration of war under the War Powers act. I will however ask Congress for

an appropriation necessary to carry out this countries obligations under the various treaties we have with our allies.

In accordance with the provision of the Constitution, the Writ of Habeas Corpus will not be suspended. However, in view of the Clear and Present Danger to this country, the Solicitor General will approach the Supreme Court for an immediate ruling about your government's ability to temporarily limit the freedoms of the press contained in the 1st Amendment. We cannot, in my view, permit the press to become an instrument of the People Republic of China.

The Three Amigos In Iowa – Chapter 6 – War Footing

Needless to say, the Congress wasn't too happy with the President the next day when he made his speech before the Joint session. They had approved a trillion dollars a year for the next 8 years to build up the military and weren't taking kindly to a request for another \$100 billion to prosecute a possible war with China. However, impressed with the urgency of the situation, both houses approved the additional \$100 billion later that day. In a totally unprecedented move, the Supreme Court ruled, on the spot, that a Clear and Present Danger existed and that the government could limit for a period of 90 days, and subject to review, the freedom of the press. The Court went on to order that an independent panel of reporters be appointed to monitor the actions of the government and that the panel report any abuses directly to the Court.

Essentially, the War Powers Act limited the President to waging war for a period of no more than 90-days without the approval of Congress, as I understand it. However, in appropriating money to fund an action in support of our allies, one could argue that the Congress had implicitly approved of a war. There is no subtle distinction between a war and a national emergency according to the Supreme Court. But, in this day and age, that is probably a moot point. A war could be all but over in an hour.

"How well are the Australians prepared for a possible war?" Clarence asked.

"Bloody well, mate," Gary chuckled, "Those blokes are ready that's for sure. I'd say about the same as the United States, but I've never been to Australia, so I wouldn't know for sure."

It could be argued that the elections of 2000 had been the beginning of the end for the American Republic. Gore had won the popular vote, but Bush had won the Electoral College. The election had ended up being decided by the US Supreme Court. 2004 was worse. Gary had voted early on October 29, 2004 and did what he always did. When he was in doubt, he always voted Republican, not that it made much difference in California. Hadn't kept Barbara Boxer out of the Senate that was certain. In the elections of 1824, 1876, 1888, and 2000 the loser of the popular vote became President. In 1976, if Gerald Ford had won 5,500 more votes in Ohio he would have been reelected, despite having over a million fewer votes than Carter. In many recent American presidential elections (1948, 1960, 1968, 1992, 1996, and 2000), no single candidate achieved an absolute majority of the popular vote. The election of 2004 had been a nasty affair, perhaps because the US was in the middle of the Iraqi war and the Democrat ticket had a 'war hero' candidate.

The Democrats had packed the House and Senate in 2008 and had ended up screwing the pooch and getting kicked out. The interim government was mostly Republican and mostly non-politicians and in 2012, the Republicans once again took control of the White House and Senate, just to remind you of where we are in this story. The President, the former House Minority Leader, was in favor of isolationism and a strong mili-

tary buildup, à la Ronald Reagan. The US was making every effort to build a 600-ship Navy and the Air Force had been funded for an extraordinary number of the latest generation aircraft, the F-22, F-35 and additional B-2 bombers. That little price tag was a trillion a year for 8 years.

The Congress and the President had also done something unprecedented on the domestic front. They had eliminated a lot of welfare programs and had instituted a national healthcare program, to the chagrin of people like Hillary Clinton and Teddy Kennedy and like-minded people. In the process, they had eliminated MediCare, but with good national health insurance coverage, nobody really minded. However, this latest national emergency had the Democrats sharpening their swords. Were it not for the decision of the Supreme Court, you can bet the media would have been in the thick of things, too.

"Sir I have a Chinese 94-class submarine taking up a launch position," the sonar mate reported.

"Battle Stations, torpedo," the Skipper said, "Sonar, I'll be right there."

"What do we have here Chief?" the Skipper asked the COB.

"Sir, it looks like a class 94 boat taking up a position to launch its JL-2's," the COB reported.

"How sure are we of this information?" the Skipper asked.

"I've got multiple hatch openings," the sonar mate reported.

"Con, Sonar," the Skipper said, "This is the skipper, get me a firing solution on that Chinese sub."

"Already laid in Skipper," the XO reported.

"Fire tubes 1 and 3," the Skipper ordered. "And take evasive action."

Is it really that simple or does that only happen in a movie? It had better be that simple or our submarines aren't worth the powder it would take to blow them straight to hell. Two Mark-48 ADCAP torpedoes sped toward the Chinese boomer. The Chinese sonar operator reported the launch of the torpedoes and the Chinese Skipper launched two shots in return, just before the Mark-48's hit. The Seawolf was already engaged in evasive maneuvers and managed to avoid being hit by the two snapshots. The die was cast, however. The Chinese Skipper had managed to get off a burst transmission just before he lost his vessel.

The Chinese sonar man hadn't had time to identify the signature of the torpedoes and the Chinese Skipper didn't know if an Akula or one of the American boats was attacking him. Perhaps it was a moot point because he was dead. Beijing wasn't sure whom to attack, so they did what any irrational person would do in similar circumstances, attack everyone and let God sort them out. What followed wasn't pretty. It depends upon who is involved and how many missiles they have. In this case, it was China against the US and the Russia and it was a very short war. The consequences, of that war were yet to be realized.

The US describes it nuclear force as a triad. It consists of land-based missiles and aircraft coupled with submarine launched missiles. The fastest reacting element of the triad is the land-based ICBM's. These missiles are solid fueled rockets that can be launched as fast as the right switches can be activated. The bombers take time to load and time to launch. The submarines have to be reached by ELF transmissions, they must surface and receive a burst transmission and they must prepare to launch. The beauty of the system is the redundancy. Should it happen that the US is unable to launch its bombers and its land-based ICBMs; there are enough Trident D's to take out any country. There is the old triad and the new triad. MAD or the balance of terror?

To meet the nation's defense goals in the 21st century, the first leg of the New Triad, the offensive strike leg, will go beyond the Cold War triad of intercontinental ballistic missiles (ICBMs), submarine-launched ballistic missiles (SLBMs), and long-range nuclear-armed bombers. ICBMs, SLBMs, bombers and nuclear weapons will, of course, continue to play a vital role. However, they will be just part of the first leg of the New Triad, integrated with new non-nuclear strategic capabilities that strengthen the credibility of our offensive deterrence.

The second leg of the New Triad requires development and deployment of both active and passive defenses – a recognition that offensive capabilities alone may not deter aggression in the new security environment of the 21st century. The events of September 11, 2001 underscore this reality. Active and passive defenses will not be perfect. However, by denying or reducing the effectiveness of limited attacks, defenses can discourage attacks, provide new capabilities for managing crises, and provide insurance against the failure of traditional deterrence.

The third leg of the New Triad is a responsive defense infrastructure. Since the end of the Cold War, the U.S. defense infrastructure has contracted and our nuclear infrastructure has atrophied. New approaches to development and procurement of new capabilities are being designed so that it will not take 20 years or more to field new generations of weapon systems. With respect to the nuclear infrastructure, it needs to be repaired to increase confidence in the deployed forces, eliminate unneeded weapons, and mitigate the risks of technological surprise. Maintaining our ability to respond to large strategic changes can permit us to reduce our nuclear arsenal and, at the same time, dissuade adversaries from starting a competition in nuclear armaments.

But, how is the new triad new? Old triad, new triad, you'd end up just as dead. Ask the

Chinese; they now have first-hand experience. Oh, that's right, they are mostly all dead, never mind. How can a war be over before the first nuclear weapon explodes? Well, think about it for a minute. When they stop launching weapons, it is over. All that is left to do is the dying.

"Jeezus H.," Ron said, "We'd better head to the cave."

"What's the rush Ron," Gary asked, "I doubt the Chinese would target northern lowa."

"Yeah well, the prevailing winds are from the west and we have to be concerned about fallout if they attack our Minuteman silos," Ron said, "Shake a leg."

"I figure that I have time to run into Floyd and pick up some more cigarettes," Gary replied. "You go ahead. Do you want me to get any smokes for you?"
