Dear Mr. Webster:

On 11/3/79, members of the Communist Workers Party assembled in a residential area of southeast Greensboro for the purpose of holding a rally and protest march denouncing the Ku Klux Klan. Before the march got underway, several carloads of men arrived at the protest staging area. After an exchange of words the two groups began fighting with clubs and sticks. Some shots were fired. Evidence then shows that several men went to vehicles parked on the street and armed themselves with rifles, shotguns and pistols. News film clips show several shots being fired by these men in the direction of the group of protesters, with several protesters and at least one assailant being hit during the shooting. Subsequently, evidence was collected from nine shooting victims, including five homicides. Numerous additional items of evidence were collected in this case, some of which we are sending by personal courier.

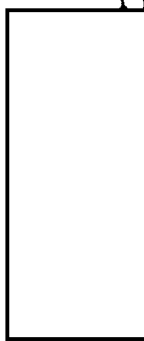

Please conduct a neutron activation analysis on the lead or copper in Items 47-66, 68, 70, 76-78, 82-85, and 94, to see if any are of the same lot as the lead or copper in the live ammunition of Items 42, 67, 90-92, 100, or 102-104. Examine all spent projectiles and lead or copper fragments to see if any were fired from either of Items 95-98. Examine Item 93 for the presence of blood. If any is found, compare it with Items 21-25 to see if it originated from either victim. Examine the blade track and housing in Item 99 and 101 for the presence of fiber or debris. If any is found, compare it with the debris from the pockets of Items 1-15 and 26-31.

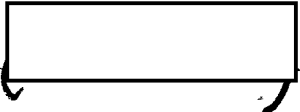

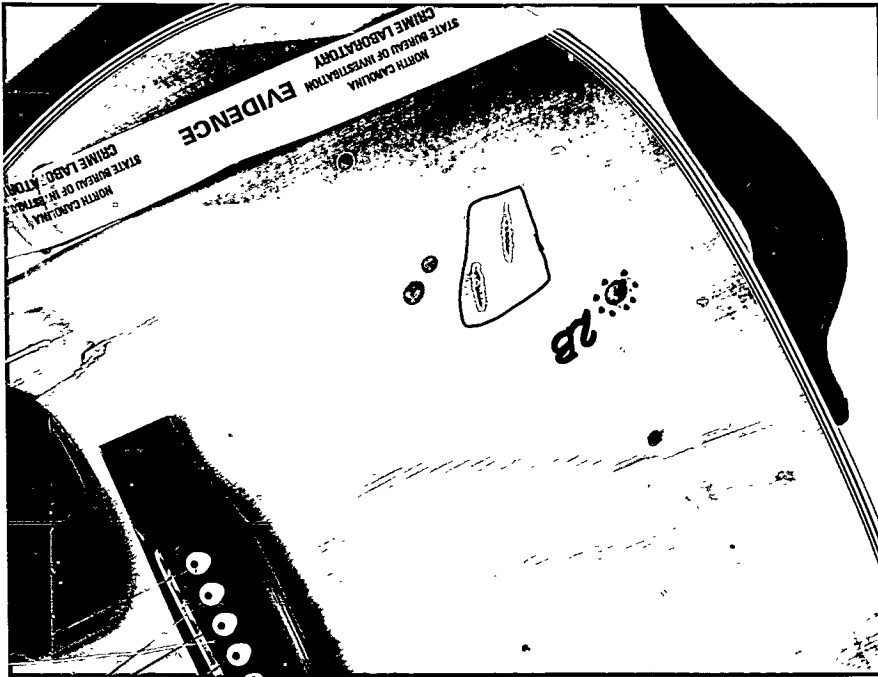

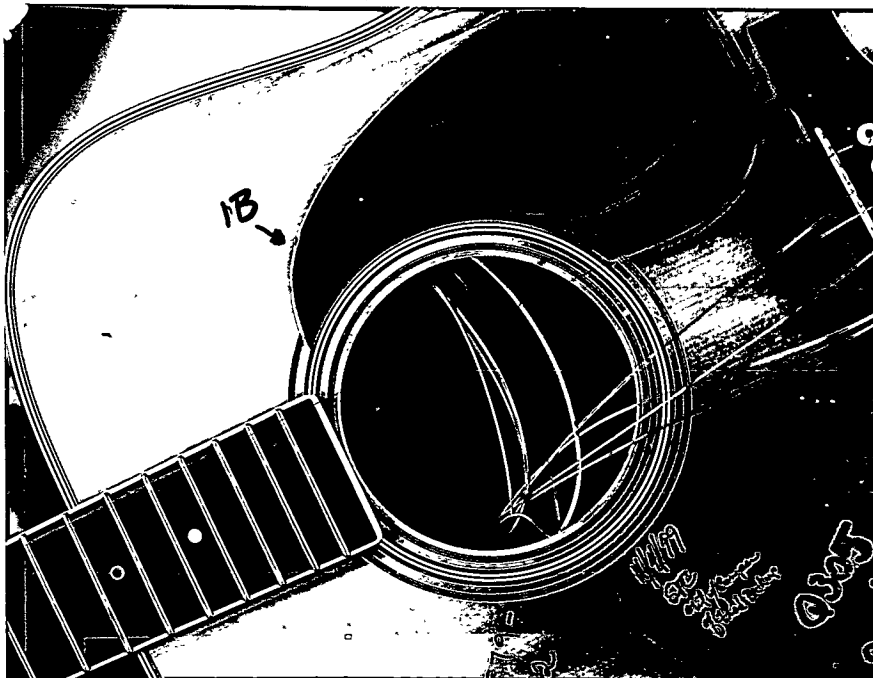

Numerous items of evidence submitted by Greensboro, N. C., Police to FBI Laboratory from 11/3/79 incident set forth with results of Laboratory examination. Laboratory identified shots fired as #4 buckshot, 00 buckshot, and #6 buckshot. The Laboratory identified some shotshell casings as having been fired from shotguns recovered at the scene. A Remington rifle believed fired by [REDACTED] was recovered near a quarry, Winston-Salem, N. C. Cartridge cases identified by the Laboratory as coming from this rifle. Tracing of weapons by Alcohol, Tobacco, and Firearms (ATF) indicates one of shotguns was purchased by subject [REDACTED] and the Remington rifle was purchased by subject [REDACTED]. A shotgun found on grass at the scene was purchased by [REDACTED] a CWP member. Victim CESAR CAUCE killed by single gunshot wound which passed through his body. Victim WILLIAM SAMPSON killed by shotgun blast. Victim SANDRA SMITH killed by one shot pellet in head. Victim MICHAEL NATHAN killed by shotgun blast to head. Victim JAMES WALLER shot with birdshot but killed with buckshot through vital organs. A summary of current information indicating who may have killed and wounded CWP members is set forth in details. Result of examination:

Five buttons are missing from the front of Q123. Specimens Q178 and Q179 are like the two buttons which are original buttons on the cuffs of Q123. Accordingly, Q178 and Q179 could have originated from Q123.

Specimen Q45 could not be associated with having originated from any of the clothing from the victims or the suspects.

Specimen Q237 is a piece of white woven fabric that is composed of cotton yarns, some having a red-brown secondary acetate tracer filament. Specimen Q237 could not be associated with any of the submitted items of clothing.

Each item of clothing was scraped individually and the debris containing foreign textile fibers and hairs was placed in pillboxes.

The debris from the pockets of the jackets and trousers were scraped separately and this debris was placed in pillboxes. The textile fibers from the pockets were subsequently mounted on glass microscope slides.

The textile fibers from Q323, Q324, Q326 and Q327 were also mounted on glass microscope slides. However, these fibers were too common for the Laboratory to associate these fibers with a particular pocket in the submitted jackets and trousers.

Specimen Q183 is a bullet jacket fragment which is too mutilated to determine its caliber or the general rifling characteristics of the weapon from which it was fired. Further, this fragment bears no microscopic marks of value for identification purposes.

The following specimens were determined to be lead shot pellets: Q180, Q181, Q184, Q190, Q191 and Q262. However, due to mutilation, the original size(s) of these specimens could not be determined.

The following specimens are metal fragments which may have originated from lead shot pellets or lead bullets: Q182, Q185, Q188, Q192 through Q196, Q202, Q218, Q228 through Q236, Q239, Q263, Q271 through Q275, Q277 through Q281 and Q313 through Q319. Due to extensive mutilation, the specific origin of each of these specimens could not be determined.

Specimens Q186, Q187, Q189 and Q215 through Q217 were determined to be No. 4 Buck shot pellets.

Specimens Q203 through Q209, Q270 and Q320 through Q322 were determined to be 00 Buck shot pellets.

Specimens Q197 through Q201, Q210 through Q214 and Q306 through Q312 were determined to be No. 6 lead shot pellets.

One No. 4 Buck shot pellet was removed from the Q266 fence post portion. Seven 00 Buck shot pellets were removed from specimen Q267. Two shot pellets which were too mutilated to determine their original sizes were removed from specimen Q268.

One 00 Buck shot pellet was removed from the Q240 night stick.

It is noted that lead shot cannot be identified as having been loaded into a particular shotshell.

The Q226 shotshell casing was identified as having been fired in the K14 shotgun. The printing on the Q226 shotshell casing indicates that it was originally loaded with No. 6 shot.

The Q238 shotshell casing bears microscopic marks suitable for identification purposes. However, microscopic comparisons between Q238 and test specimens from the submitted 12-gauge shotguns revealed nothing to indicate that Q238 was fired in any of those weapons. The printing on the Q238 shotshell casing indicates that it was originally loaded with 00 Buck shot pellets.

The Q241, Q251 and Q255 shotshell casings were identified as having been fired in the K7 shotgun. The printing on the Q241, Q251 and Q255 shotshell casings indicates that they were originally loaded with 00 Buck shot pellets.

The Q252, Q253, Q254, Q257 and Q258 shotshell casings were identified as having been fired in the K8 shotgun. The printing on the Q252 shotshell casing is not sufficiently distinguishable to determine the size of shot which was commercially loaded into it. The printing on the Q253 and Q254 shotshell casings indicates that they were originally loaded with No. 4 Buck shot pellets. The printing on the Q257 and Q258 shotshell casings indicates that they were originally loaded with 00 Buck shot pellets.

The firing pin impression and the breechface marks present in the Q256 shotshell casing are of the same general size and configuration as those produced by the K12 shotgun. However, there are not sufficient microscopic characteristics present in these marks for identification purposes. However, based on mechanism marks, specimen Q256 was identified as having been loaded into, extracted and ejected from K12. The Q259 and Q260 shotshell casings were identified as having been fired in specimen K12. The printing on the Q256, Q259 and Q260 shotshell casings indicates that they were originally loaded with No. 6 shot.

Specimens Q227 and Q269 are 12-gauge wadding components. No characteristics were present in these specimens which would identify their particular manufacturer(s) or the weapon(s) from which they were fired.

Specimens Q242 through Q250 are .223 Remington caliber cartridge cases which were identified as having been fired in a single weapon. The microscopic marks present in these cartridge cases are of value for identification with the weapon in which they were fired. It was determined that specimens Q242 through Q250 were not fired in the K15 rifle. The mechanism marks present in specimens Q242 through Q250 are not sufficiently characteristic to determine the particular make or model of the weapon in which they were fired.

The Q261 bullet was identified as having been fired from the K11 revolver.

Specimens Q264 and Q265 are 12-gauge wadding components which are consistent with wadding components commercially loaded into Federal shotshells.

Specimen Q276 is a lead bullet fragment which appears to be the core portion of a .38 caliber jacketed or semi-jacketed bullet. This bullet fragment bears no microscopic marks of value for identification purposes.

Specimen Q347 is a .38 caliber semi-jacketed bullet which has been fired from a barrel rifled with five lands and grooves, right twist. This bullet bears microscopic marks of value for identification with the weapon from which it was fired. However, microscopic comparisons between specimen Q347 and test specimens from the submitted .38 caliber revolvers revealed nothing to indicate that the Q347 bullet was fired from any of those weapons. Among the weapons producing rifling impressions like those present in specimen Q347 are .38 Special and .357 Magnum caliber revolvers manufactured by Smith and Wesson, Ruger and I. N. A. as well as numerous Spanish-made revolvers.

The Q282 through Q287 and Q293 through Q296 cartridge cases were identified as having been fired in the K11 revolver.

Specimens Q288 through Q290 are .38 Special caliber cartridge cases which were identified as having been fired in a single weapon. However, it was determined that the Q288 through Q290 cartridge cases were not fired in any of the submitted .38 caliber revolvers in those weapons' present conditions.

The Q354 cartridge case was identified as having been fired in the K21 revolver.

The Q348 through Q353 cartridge cases were identified as having been fired in the K19 revolver.

Based on processing, the obliterated serial number on the K30 revolver was concluded to be most likely "2482/4".

The obliterated serial number on the K34 rifle is not restorable.

The obliterated serial number on the K35 shotgun was determined to be "1142876V".

Based on processing, the obliterated serial number on the K37 shotgun was concluded to be "114184-V". The dash represents restored fragments of a digit concluded to be most likely a "0".

Test specimens from the K6 through K43 weapons are being retained in the FBI Laboratory for any future comparisons.

The remaining requested examinations are continuing and you will be subsequently advised of the results and as to the disposition of the submitted items.

On December 20, 1979, Captain [redacted] Greensboro Police Department, advised that a Model AR-180, Remington rifle believed to have been used by [redacted] on November 3, 1979, was recovered from the area of a quarry near Winston-Salem, North Carolina. This weapon had been delivered to the FBI Laboratory.

This examination has been made with the understanding that the evidence is connected with an official investigation of a criminal matter and that the Laboratory report will be used for official purposes only, related to the investigation or a subsequent criminal prosecution. Authorization cannot be granted for the use of the Laboratory report in connection with a civil proceeding.

Result of examination:

This report supplements the FBI Laboratory report relating to this case dated December 19, 1979. For a detailed listing of specimens Q3 through Q405 and K1 through K43, please refer to that report.

The Q114 through Q177 garments were examined microscopically and processed chemically for the presence of gunpowder residues, but none were found. The absence of such residues precludes the possibility of making any muzzle-to-garment distance determinations.

It is noted that one No. 4 Buck shot pellet was removed from the collar of the Q134 coat.

It was determined that the K6 through K43, K45 and K46 weapons had been fired since last cleaned when received in the FBI Laboratory. It would not be possible to determine the amount of time which had elapsed since those weapons were last fired. It was also determined that the K44 weapon had not been fired since it was last cleaned.

The Q242 through Q250 cartridge cases were identified as having been fired in the K46 rifle.

Microscopic comparisons between the Q347 bullet and test specimens from the K45 revolver revealed nothing to indicate that Q347 was fired from K45.

The K44 pistol exhibits general rifling characteristics of six lands and grooves, right twist. As previously reported, the Q347 bullet was fired from a barrel rifled with five lands and grooves, right twist. Based upon differences in general rifling characteristics, the Q347 bullet could not have been fired from the barrel of K44.

No gun oil was identified on specimens Q3 through Q103 and Q114 through Q177.

The remaining requested examinations are continuing and you will be subsequently advised of the results and as to the disposition of the submitted items.

On January 18, 1980, Patrolman [redacted] Greensboro Police Department, advised that additional items recovered by the police during the investigation of the November 3, 1979, incident were being delivered to the FBI Laboratory. This included approximately 20 items not previously examined. The evidence included items of clothing, some live ammunition for shotguns and handguns, plus wood pieces which had been damaged by shots.

B. TRACING OF FIREARMS

On January 14, 1980, Patrolman [redacted] Greensboro Police Department, advised that the weapons sent to the FBI Laboratory, which were recovered from various individuals on November 11, 1979, during the state of emergency in Greensboro, included four weapons with the serial numbers removed. The FBI Laboratory report of December 19, 1979, indicated success in raising the numbers from three of the four weapons. None of the weapons were used or coincide with missing weapons from the November 3, 1979, incident. The individuals who possessed these weapons have been convicted in court in Greensboro, and the judge ordered the weapons confiscated permanently. A check of the National Crime Information Center (NCIC) failed to produce any information relating to the raised serial numbers. These weapons were described as K-30, K-35, and K-37 in the Laboratory report.

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On January 14, 1980, SA [redacted] Alcohol, Tobacco, and Firearms (ATF), advised that ATF intended to open investigations on the individuals having possession of the above firearms with removed serial numbers to determine if they had violated Federal law.

On January 14, 1980, SA [redacted] supra, made available the following summary information concerning weapons confiscated by the Greensboro Police which are related to the November 3, 1979, incident:

Items found in the Ford van stopped by the police with occupants arrested:

Item 1: One .357 revolver, Serial N299492, traced to [redacted] Florida. Mr. [redacted] advised that an agent is attempting to contact Mr. [redacted] reference this gun and that he may have further to report at a later date.

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Item 2: One .12-gauge single-barrel shotgun - Firearm Import/Export, Miami, Florida. Serial 380505, sold to [redacted]

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Item 5: One .12-gauge pump Smith and Wesson, Model 916A, Serial 5B6964, was purchased 8/31/79 by [redacted]. [redacted] father [redacted] has been interviewed and hasn't seen [redacted] since the shooting. The father further stated that [redacted] is subpoenaed to Greensboro on 1/21/80 for court.

Item 6: One .22-caliber revolver, H&R Model 929, Serial AM15914, sold to [redacted]. [redacted] bought 12/5/75, [redacted].

Item 7: One .32-caliber revolver, Smith and Wesson, Serial 45453. Agent [redacted] stated this weapon could not be traced at this time and can only be traced after obtaining a model number and they are working on it. He further stated it is a German factory and it may be required of them to contact the factory in Germany to trace this weapon.

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Items found on the ground at the scene:

Item 1: One .38-caliber Derringer Serial 73118, purchased in 1963, by [redacted] apparently. He further stated they are checking on this subject and will be back in touch when further information is known.

Item 4: Two .23-caliber rifles, Ruger Mini 14, Serial 18127138, purchased by [redacted] (identified by Mr. [redacted] as Nazi). Mr. [redacted] traded this gun and a Smith and Wesson pistol, Serial A8021, to [redacted] for an AR15. This trade allegedly took place at [redacted] residence in Winston-Salem. The entrance is located in the right clavicular area approximately 10 inches down from the top of the head and 3 inches to the right of midline. The wound is rounded approximately 7/16 inch in diameter. No soot or stippling is noted about the wound. Examination of the clothing present with the body reveals a corresponding defect in the blue sweatshirt. No holes are present in the jacket or the other shirt.

Internally the wound tract passes downwards, backwards and to the left, enters the chest cavity through the 1st rib fragmenting it. It does not strike the clavicle. There is some injury to the subclavian vein. It passes through the right upper lobe of the lung into the mediastinum, strikes the trachea at the carina causing considerable injury to that, lacerates a pulmonary vein, passes through the aorta just distal to the arch. It then enters the left chest cavity and passes through the left lower lobe, passes through the diaphragm, lacerates the spleen and passes back again through the diaphragm into the chest cavity. It exits the chest cavity between the 11th and 12th ribs posteriorly and exits the body through a slightly irregular but rounded exit 23 inches down from the top of the head a 4 inches to the left of midline. No metal fragments are recovered. *Appropriate exit holes are present in the clothing.*

Summary. This is a through and through gunshot wound that travels from front to back, right to left and downwards.

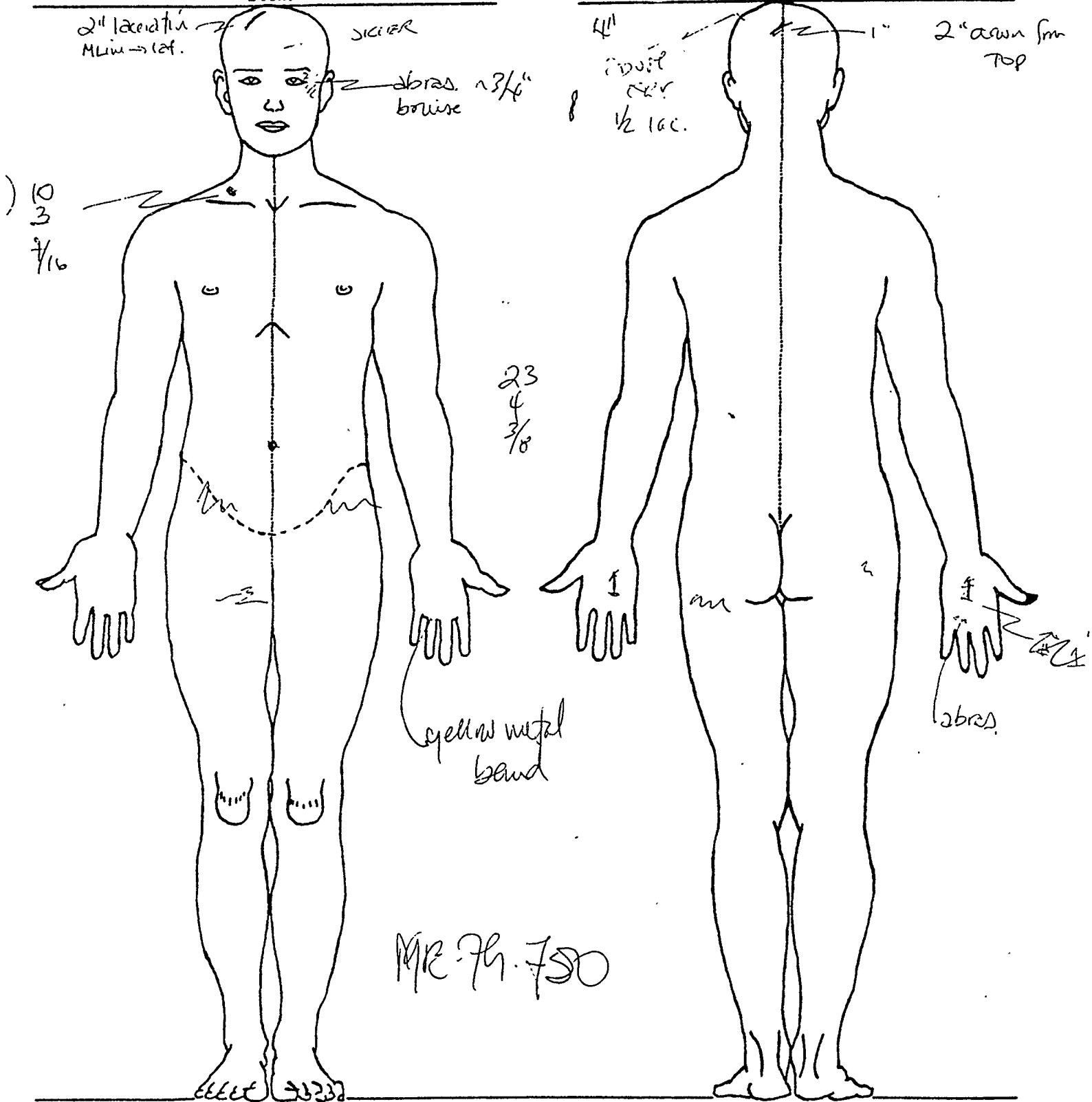

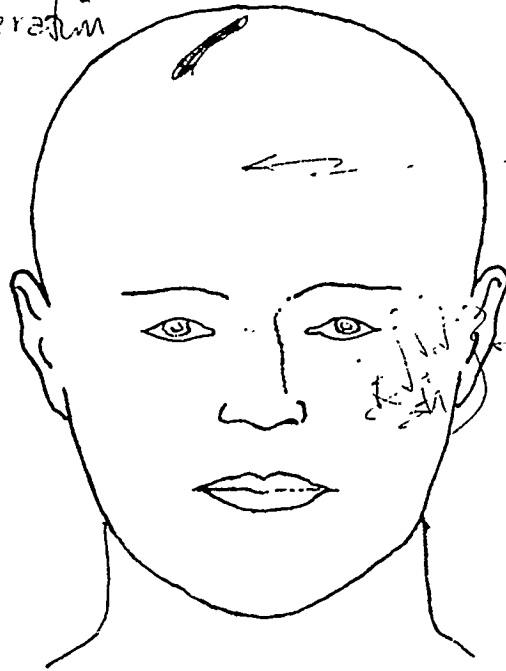

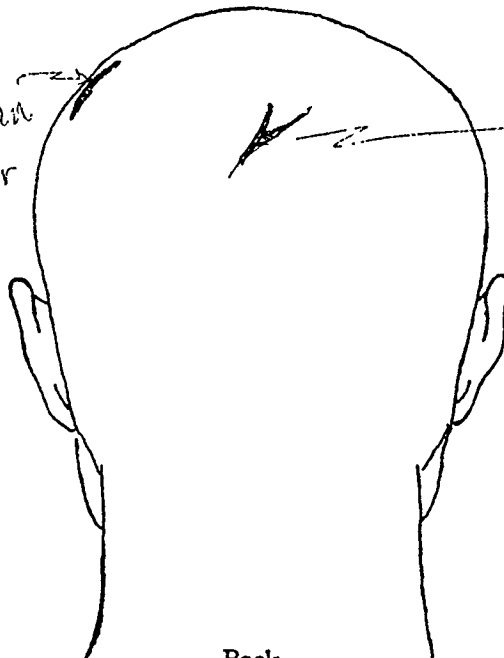

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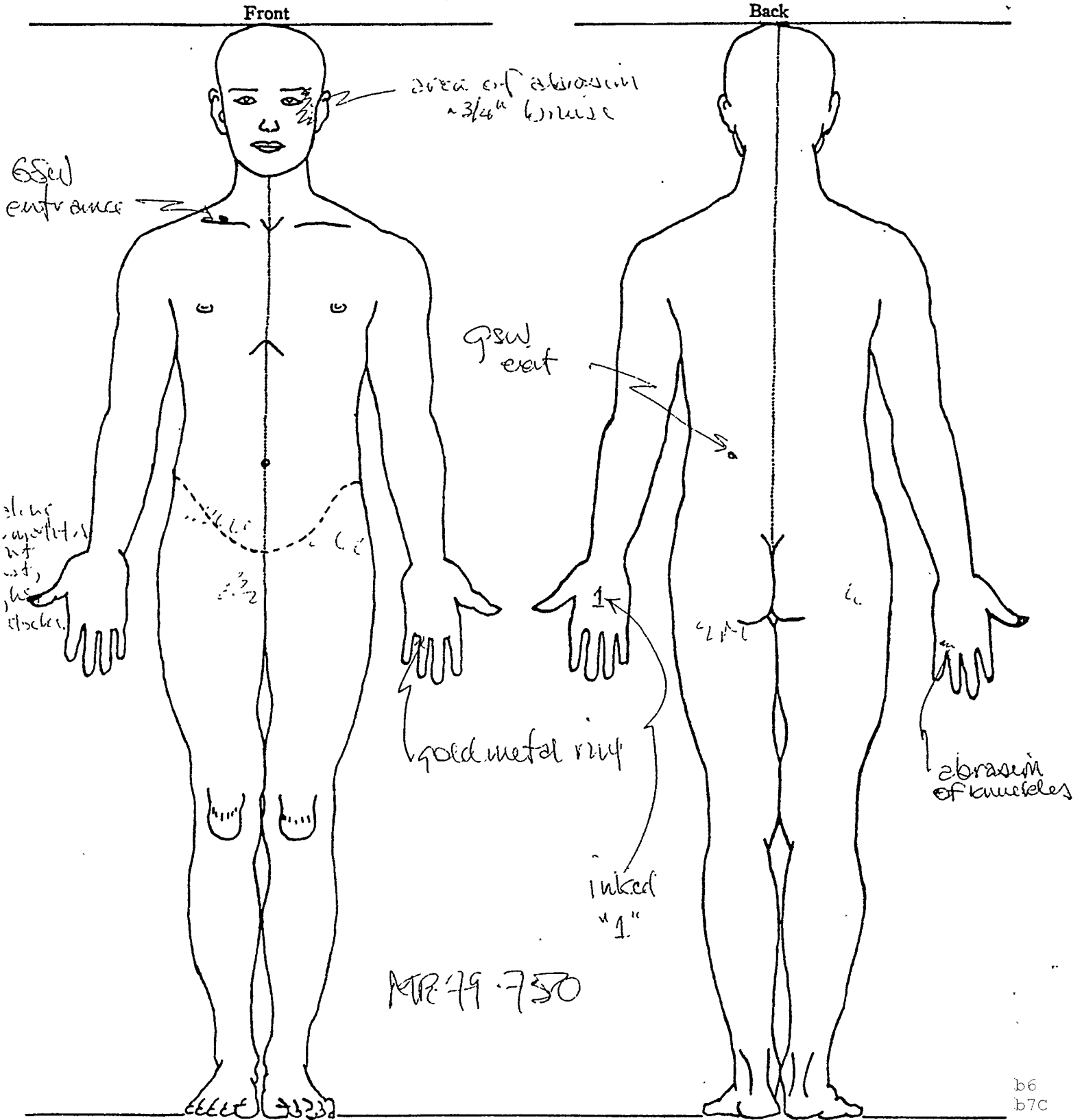

SUMMARY AND COMMENT

This was a 31 year old white male who was shot during an Anti-Ku Klux Klan demonstration in Greensboro. He was apparently dead on the scene.

Autopsy reveals a single gunshot wound that passed from the right upper chest through both chest cavities injuring the lungs bilaterally, lacerating the aorta and trachea, striking a portion of heart, spleen and ultimately exiting the body. This caused extensive internal bleeding and in my opinion constitutes the cause of his demise. Also present on the body were three lacerations of the scalp. These are compatible with blunt trauma and most likely represent three separate blows. There is also a small area of abrasion and bruising over the left eye.

An alcohol level on blood drawn at autopsy was negative.

DESCRIPTION OF WOUNDS

GUNSHOT WOUND NUMBER ONE

This is a gunshot wound of the left shoulder, the entrance located 13 inches down from the top of the head and 9 1/2 inches to the left of midline. The wound is rounded approximately 1/4 inch in diameter. No soot or stippling is noted about the wound. Examination of the clothing present with the body reveals holes in the appropriate garments at that point. No soot or stippling noted on those garments.

The wound tract passes into the muscular tissue of the arm to the head of the humerus. The projectile, a lead buckshot type particle, is recovered against the head of the humerus.

GUNSHOT WOUND NUMBER TWO

This is a gunshot wound of the left lateral chest located 21 inches down from the top of the head and 6 inches to the left of midline in the anterior axillary line. The wound is generally rounded approximately 1/4 inch in diameter. No soot or stippling is present around this wound. Examination of the clothing with the body reveals appropriate defects in this location. There is no soot on the clothing.

Internally the tract passes into the left chest cavity between the 6th and 7th ribs, passes through the left lower lobe of the lung, and passes out the chest cavity between the 10th and 11th ribs posteriorly. The projectile, a lead buckshot type similar to the one recovered from wound number one, is recovered from the soft tissues of the back in an area of hemorrhage, 23 1/2 inches down from the top of the head and 4 inches to the left of midline.

GUNSHOT WOUND NUMBER THREE

This is a gunshot wound of the left chest, the entrance located 20 inches down from the top of the head and 3 1/2 inches to the left of midline. The wound is generally rounded approximately 1/4 inch in diameter. No soot or stippling is noted about the entrance in the skin. Examination of the clothing on the body reveals appropriate defects. No soot is present on the clothing.

Internally the tract passes into the left chest cavity between the 5th and 6th ribs, passes through the tip of the lingula of the left upper lobe, enters the pericardial sac, passes through the heart entering in the anterior right ventricle adjacent to the septum, passing through the septum out into the left ventricle and exiting the left ventricle posteriorly. It passes out of the pericardial sac and perforates a small portion of the medial inferior posterior left lower lobe. It also passes through a portion of the diaphragm. The bullet passes out of the chest cavity just adjacent to the 12th rib and is recovered from the tissues of the back approximately 25 inches down from the top of the head and 2 1/2 inches to the left of midline. The projectile recovered is a buckshot type lead one similar to the to previously described.

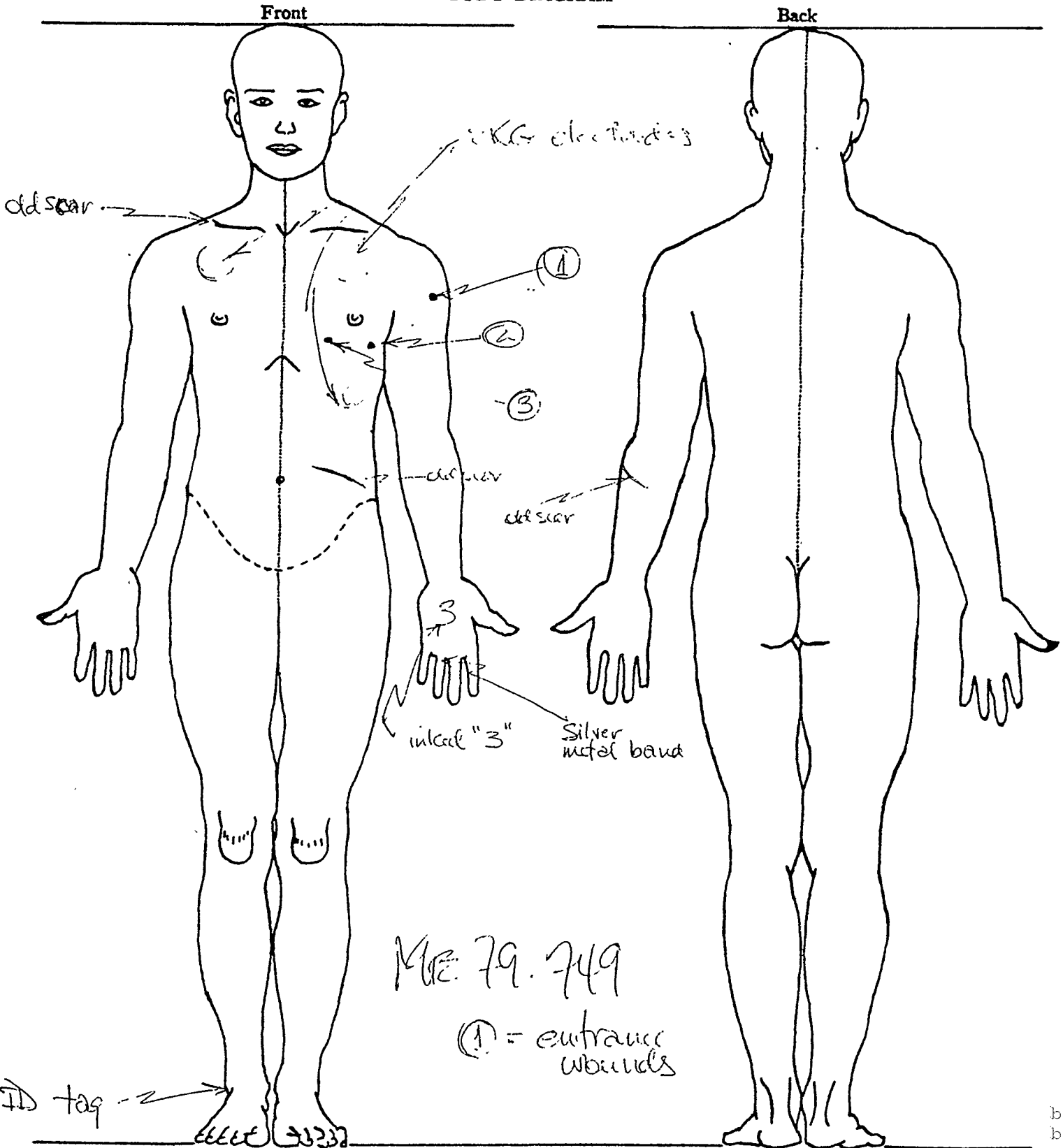

GROSS and MICROSCOPIC DESCRIPTION

SEROUS CAVITIES: Clear without abnormal fluid accumulation.

PLEURA: No hemorrhage or thickening.

PERITONEUM: Unremarkable.

PERICARDIUM: Unremarkable.

HEART: 260 grams. Epicardium normal. Atria and ventricles unremarkable as are all four valves. Coronary arteries patent with minimal atherosclerotic change. Myocardium unremarkable with no fibrosis or infarcts. Aorta and great vessels show minimal atherosclerosis.

LUNGS: Right 300 grams, left 270 grams. Pleural surfaces smooth. Bronchi unremarkable without hemorrhage. Trachea also unremarkable. No evidence of consolidation or hemorrhage in lungs. Pulmonary arteries without thromboemboli.

LIVER: 1220 grams. Soft and brown. Architecture intact without fibrosis. Capsule smooth. Gallbladder contains approximately 5 cc. of green-black bile. Extrahepatic biliary tree patent without dilatation.

SPLEEN: 110 grams. Soft and red. Capsule intact.

PANCREAS: Normal anatomic position. Unremarkable.

ADRENAL GLANDS: Unremarkable bilaterally.

The brain shows no evidence of uncal and cerebellar tonsillar herniation or notching. The cerebral vasculature and cranial nerves are intact. The cerebellum and brainstem are unremarkable. The ventricles show no hemorrhage. There are no cerebral contusions.

SKULL: Entrance gunshot wound in right frontoparietal region as noted on Gunshot Wound Description. Just posterior to the vertex of the head and to the right is a stellate shaped laceration that measures 2 1/8 inches horizontally and 1 inch longitudinally. Its center is located 1 inch from the vertex of the head down and 2 1/4 inches to the right of the midline. There is slight underlying subgaleal hemorrhage. There is incomplete separation of the sagittal suture for a distance of 6 inches beneath this scalp laceration.

DESCRIPTION OF GUNSHOT WOUND

External. In the right frontotemporal area is a smooth oval-shaped wound measuring $1/4$ by $5/8$ inches in diameter and showing marginal abrasions. There is no soot or tattooing present. The wound is located 3 inches from the vertex of the head downward and $2 \frac{3}{4}$ inches to the right of the midline. There is slight subgaleal hemorrhage associated with the wound.

Internal. The wound tract passes through the right frontal bone with beveling directed toward the inner table of the bone. The wound tract enters the brain in the inferior lateral portion of the right frontal lobe extending through the cortex into the white matter of the frontal lobe. It passes through the white matter of the parietal lobe and extends into the occipital lobe. Three small lead fragments are found in the scalp just external to the skull. A larger deformed fragment of what appears to be a pellet fragment measuring $1/2$ by $5/8$ inches is found adjacent to the dura overlying the right occipital lobe. There is no exit wound present. Small fragment of skull with apparent metallic wipe-off is found in the wound tract in the parietal lobe.

Summary. The site of entrance of this wound is located in the right frontotemporal region. The wound tract extended in a front to back, right to left and slightly downward direction from the right frontal lobe to the right occipital lobe.

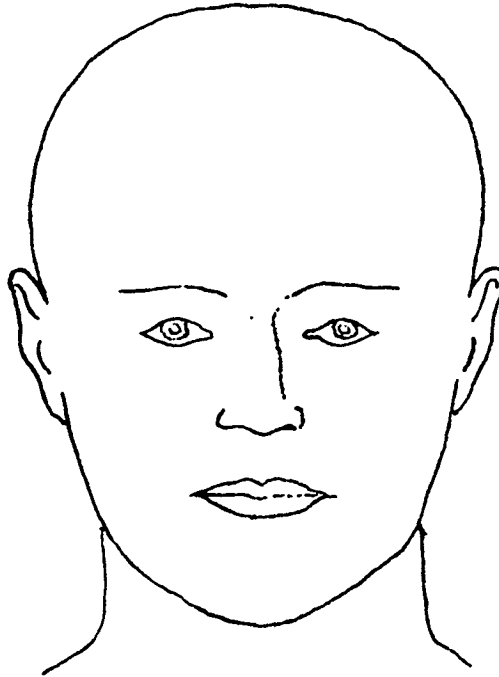

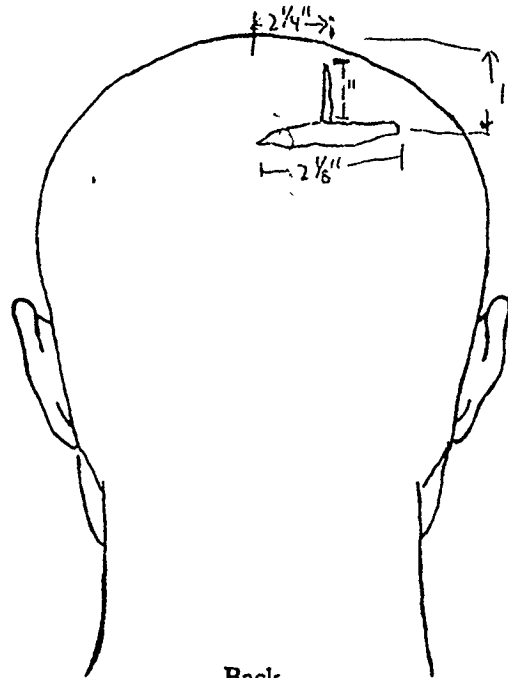

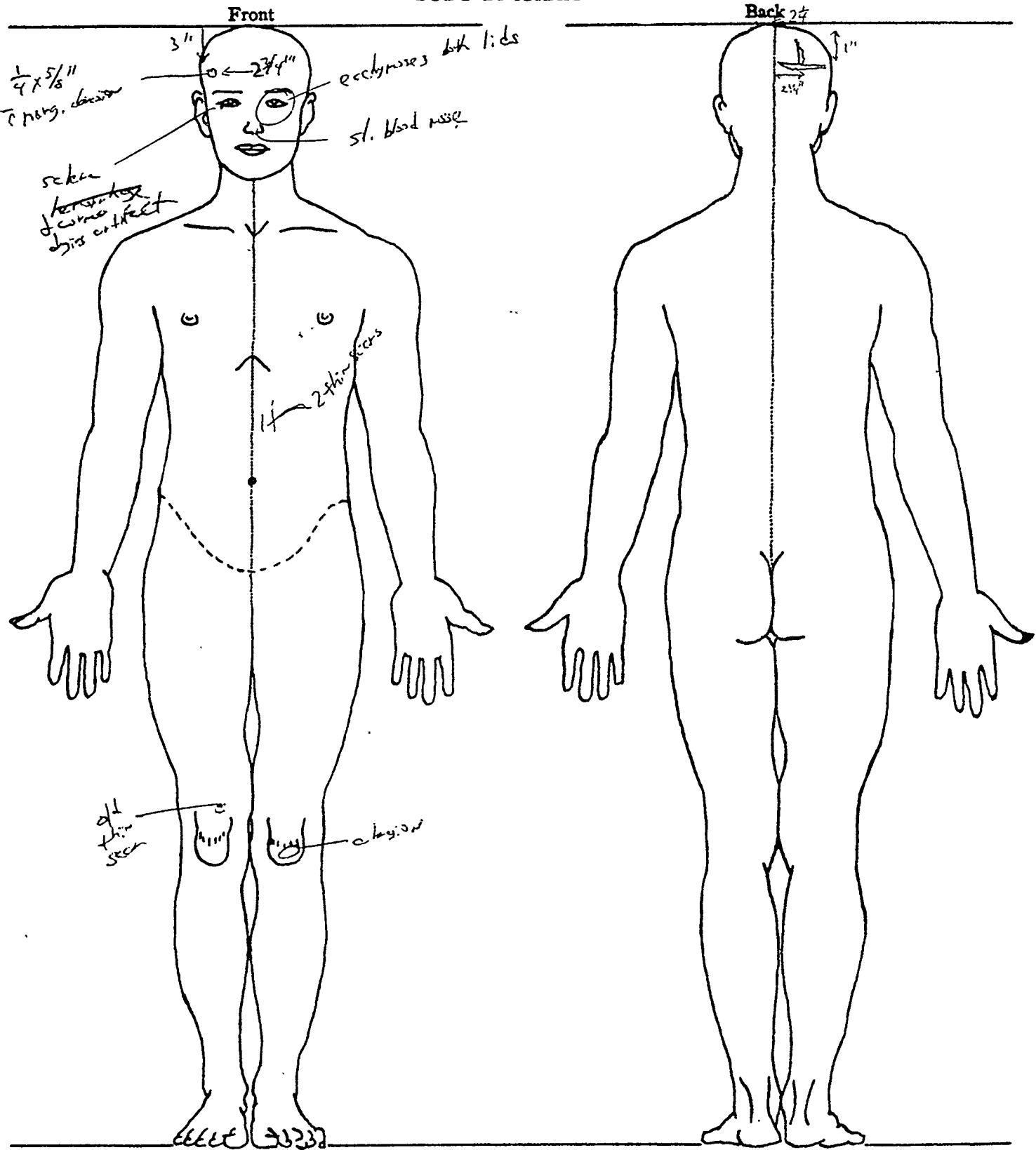

SUMMARY AND COMMENT

This 29 year old black female was allegedly shot during a rally in Greensboro, North Carolina. She was dead at the scene of the shooting. Because of the violent nature of the death, H.L. [redacted] M.D., Guilford County Medical Examiner, assumed jurisdiction and in consultation with the Office of the Chief Medical Examiner ordered an autopsy.

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Autopsy findings showed a gunshot wound with the entrance in the right frontotemporal area. The track of the wound passed from the right frontal to the right occipital lobe of the brain with extensive disruption and destruction of the white matter of the right cerebral hemisphere. Microscopic examination confirmed the extensive disruption and also showed the presence of hemorrhages in the brainstem. Other findings were of a laceration on the right posterior parietal scalp region compatible with blunt trauma.

In my opinion the cause of death in this individual was the gunshot wound to the right cerebral hemisphere. The distorted projectile that was recovered from the brain had the appearance of a buckshot pellet.

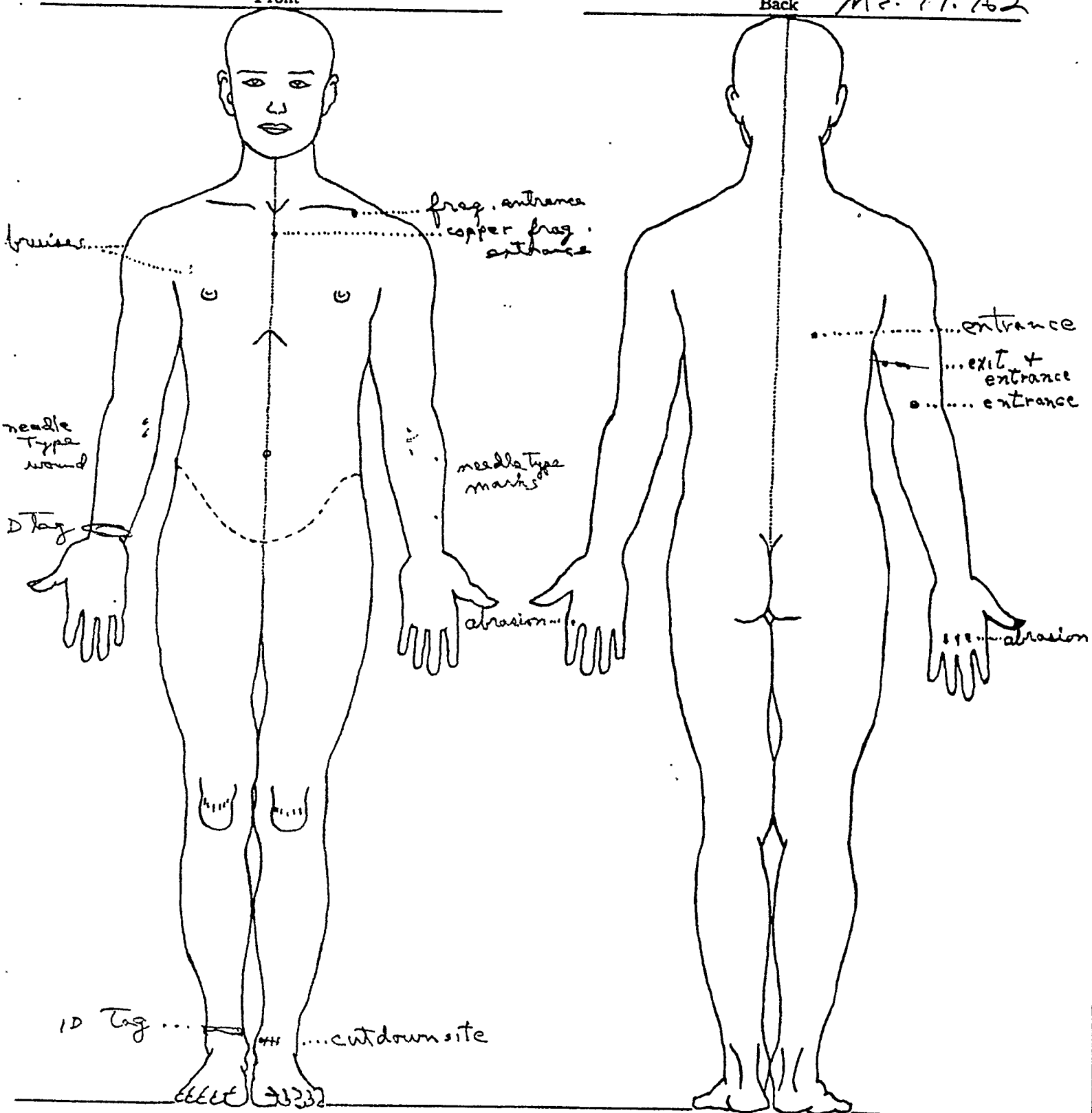

S U M M A R Y A N D C O M M E N T

The decedent is said to have received wounds late in the morning of November 3, 1979 during an episode that involved a large number of people and several weapons. The deceased was taken to the Moses Cone Hospital and neurosurgical procedures were performed. The patient is said to have made no clinical improvement post-operatively and to have expired at 10:45 a.m. on 11-05-79. As this was a violent and unnatural death, jurisdiction was assumed by Guilford County Medical Examiner Dr. [redacted] in cooperation with other authorities. Dr. [redacted] authorized autopsy in consultation with the Office of the Chief Medical Examiner.

Autopsy revealed massive and extreme brain damage. Considerable bone and cerebral substance had been removed at surgery from both sides of the head. Shotgun pellet wounds were present in the head, brain, face, sinuses, right shoulder, right arm, back and chest. All of the pellets I removed appeared to me to be of the same size. All of the wounds were consistent with the firing of a single shotgun blast. A piece of cooper jacketing was present in a superficial wound beneath the skin of the chest. This obviously represented a firing of a weapon other than a shotgun. It however, was an insignificant and superficial wound. The direction of fire was from the right of the deceased. Various items of evidence including blood sample and pellets were given at the time of autopsy to Mr. [redacted] of the Greensboro Police Department in exchange for a signed receipt. Various diagrams, photographs, slides and x-rays were prepared.

DESCRIPTION

SEROUS CAVITIES: Mediastinal shift to the right.

PLEURA: No old disease. 2 or 3 pints of blood left pleural space.

PERITONEUM: At least one pint widely disseminated.

PERICARDIUM: Pellet perforation.

HEART: 300 grams. Coronaries and great vessels have the usual take-off and distribution and show no significant narrowing. Valves and chambers properly proportioned. Myocardium red-brown and firm throughout. In line with a pellet track is a pair of holes with ragged margins, at least 1/8 inch in diameter, through left ventricle. Both holes perforate left ventricular wall.

LUNGS: 750 grams. The lingula in the left lung has a perforation. The adjacent pulmonary parenchyma is hemorrhagic. This is in line with the pellet tract.

LIVER: 1500 grams. Lower margin sharp. Parenchyma red-brown and firm throughout. Gallbladder contains a minimal amount of bile.

SPLEEN: 140 grams. Relatively bloodless and soft.

PANCREAS: Usual anatomical location and morphology.

ADRENAL GLANDS: Normal cortical and medullary tissue. Some blood in periadrenal fat on left.

G. I. TRACT: Esophagus intact. Stomach contains an ounce or two of somewhat watery material and some soft food-like particulate matter. Through the mid portion of the fundus is a perforation in the anterior and in the posterior wall. These perforations are in line with the pellet tract mentioned elsewhere. A small amount of well digested material is present in the small bowel. Appendix appears small and fibrous. The ascending colon seems slightly flexed and has adhesions.

KIDNEYS: 140 grams each. Unremarkable except for being somewhat pale and for the left kidney having a perforation near the hilum.

BLADDER: Empty. Mucosa slightly blood stained. Pellet perforation present.

INT GENITALIA: No abnormalities noted.

NECK ORGANS: No evidence of foreign body obstruction, neoplasm, unusual inflammation.

RAIN AND MENINGES: 1340 grams. Meninges clean and glistening. Convolutions have the usual arrangement. Vessels delicate. Sectioning reveals no evidence of old or recent disease.

SKULL: Scalp and skull reveal no evidence of trauma or other disease process.

VERTEBRAE: Intact.

RIBS: Fatal pellet came upwards and forwards from beneath the lower rib and extended anteriorly into the soft tissue of the left chest through the musculature between ribs 3 and 4.

PELVIS: Some hemorrhage associated with buckshot pellets primarily entering from left

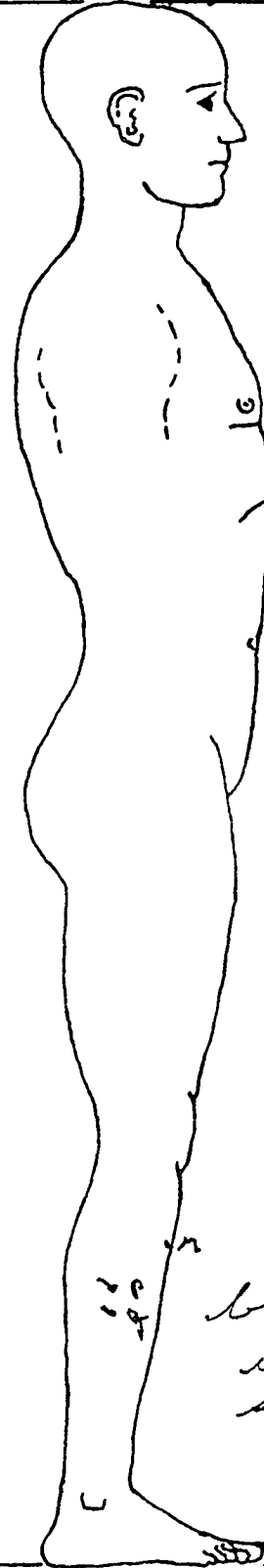
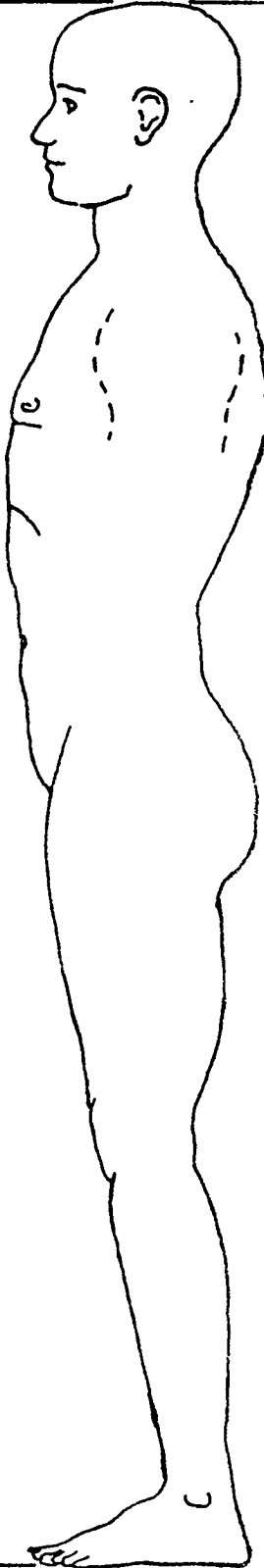

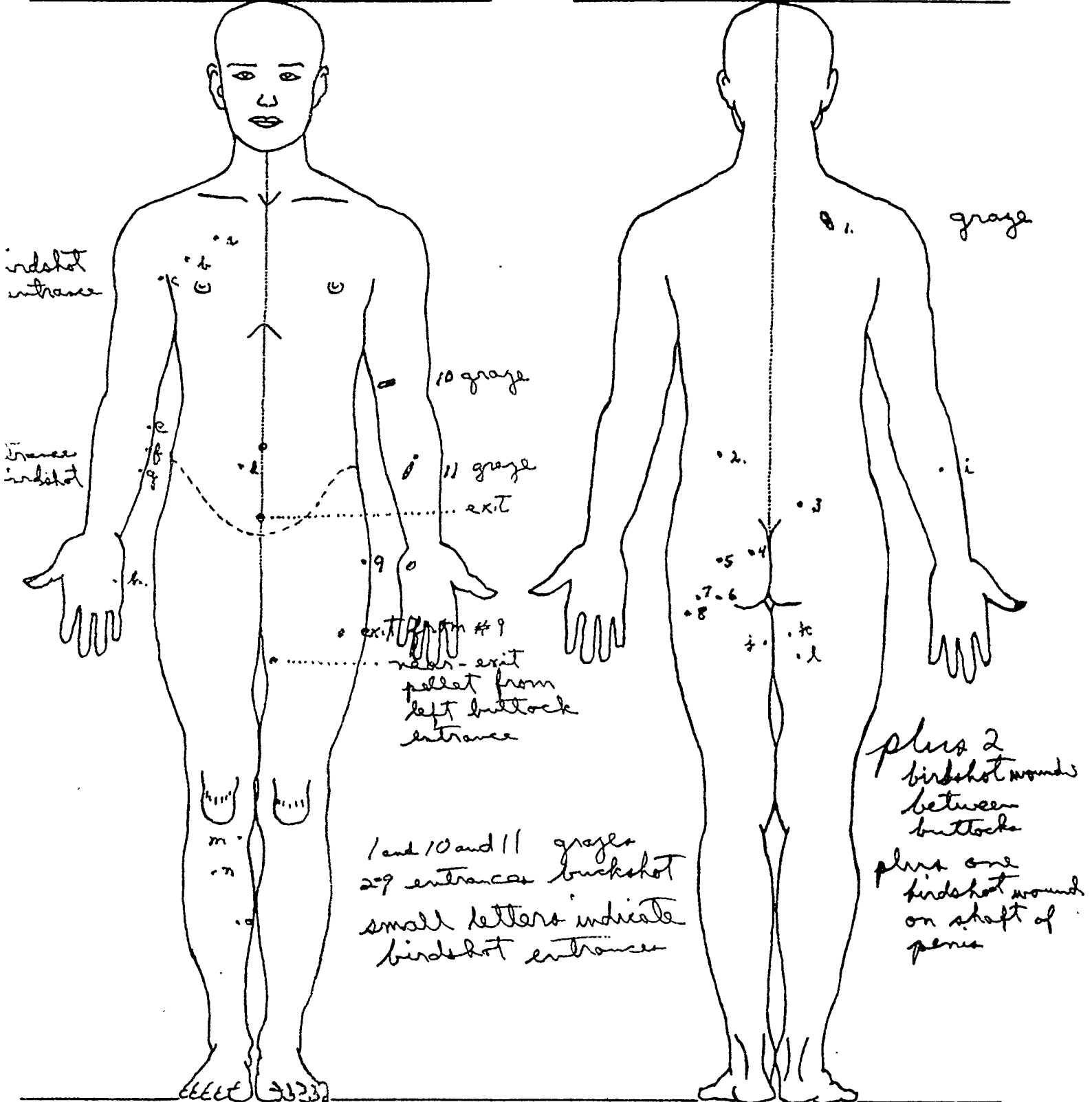

SUMMARY AND COMMENT

The decedent is said to have died on the scene in an affray in Greensboro late in the morning of 11-03-79 that involved many people and several weapons. As this appeared to be a violent and unnatural death jurisdiction was taken by Guilford County Medical Examiner Dr. [redacted] in cooperation with other authorities. Dr. [redacted] authorized autopsy in consultation with the Office of the Chief Medical Examiner.

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The significant wound(s), as far as serious injury was concerned, was that of several buckshot type lead pellets that entered the left buttock and lower back area. The large pellets were in my opinion all of the same size and were probably from a single firing. All of the wounds from large pellets including the grazes can easily be accounted for by a single charge of pellets. It is likely that there would have been survival of all except one in the left lower back which went up and forward and through several significant structures including the heart. There was also a superficial sprinkling of small birdshot type pellets, all of which appeared to be of the same caliber. I have great difficulty being certain that all of these pellets were from the same firing. At least some of these pellets came from the direction of the decedent's feet so that they went under the skin and upward in his leg and up and into the buttock and perianal area. It is my opinion that death occurred rapidly after receiving the wound with the large pellets. Toxicological examination revealed no alcohol present in the blood at the time of death. I found no other significant injuries or disease processes. Death was from a load of buckshot type lead pellets moving upward and forward and somewhat to the right, relative to a standing erect person. I do not mean to imply that he was standing and erect at the time of receiving the wounds. Various diagrams, charts, slides and photographs were prepared. Various items of evidence were given to Mr. [redacted] of the Greensboro Police Department at the time of autopsy in exchange for a signed receipt.

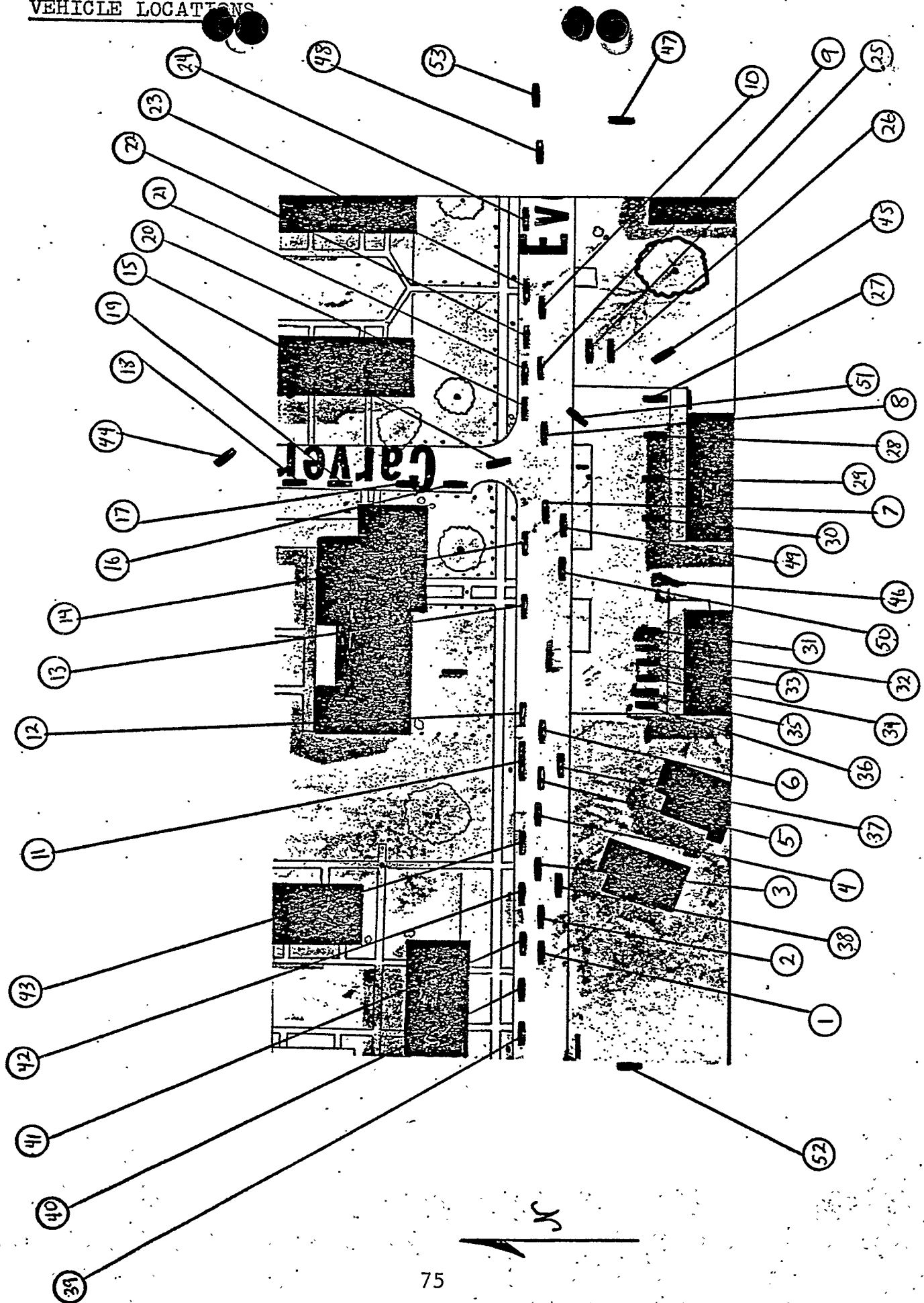

The following is a summary which includes a current analysis as of January 25, 1980, of the identity of individuals who killed and wounded CWP members. This analysis is based on information from interviews, film and photo evidence, autopsy reports, and laboratory examination. It is not conclusive as additional information from laboratory examinations may be more definitive. The "Q" and "K" numbers correspond with the FBI Laboratory reports.

Page 6 of the Report of SA [redacted] dated December 10, 1979, at Charlotte, North Carolina, is being duplicated on the following page to assist in identifying the position of the vehicles at the time of the shooting. A more complete description of each vehicle is set forth in the December 10, 1979, report.

CESAR VINCENT CAUCE

CAUCE was killed by a single shot compatible with a rifle or a pistol round. This entered under the right collarbone and through his chest descending through the body and exiting the lower left center of his back. The autopsy report indicates the entering wound was seven-sixteenths of an inch, and the primary cause of death was a severed aorta. There were no fragments of a bullet recovered from his body. The FBI Laboratory examination failed to express any opinion on the type of weapon which was used to kill CAUCE. There were shell casings (Q332 through Q340) identified as coming from a .223 caliber rifle. These casings were all found at the scene and came from an AR180, Remington rifle (K-46). This weapon was located in a rock quarry in the vicinity of Winston-Salem, North Carolina. Synchronization of video TV films by the FBI Laboratory indicate that [redacted] was firing the AR180 rifle and at the same time it appears CAUCE lurches as if struck by a bullet. However, there is no further information on analysis which indicates that the high-powered AR180 actually killed CAUCE. The video film also showed that [redacted] struck CAUCE with a 2x4 and knocked him to the ground. The film also shows [redacted] attempting to strike CAUCE as CAUCE was attempting to get up from the ground. [redacted] is hit and falls to the ground at approximately the same time that CAUCE lurches, possibly struck by a bullet.

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MICHAEL RONALD NATHAN

NATHAN was struck with multiple shotgun pellets to the right shoulder and head. The autopsy report indicates this was consistent with one single shotgun blast and described the lead pellets removed from the body as buckshot. The cause of NATHAN's death was intensive brain damage from the shotgun wound. NATHAN survived approximately two days in the hospital following the shooting but never regained consciousness. The FBI Laboratory examination indicated that all the pellets which could be identified from the body of NATHAN were #4 buckshot. The remaining lead pellets, which were not identified, could not be identified further because of mutilization. The specimens from NATHAN's body were as follows:

- Q183 Copper fragment which left a superficial wound;
- Q180 Lead pellet;

Q181 Lead pellet;
Q182 Undetermined fragment;
Q186 #4 buckshot
Q187 #4 buckshot
Q189 #4 buckshot

One of the weapons taken by the Greensboro Police Department from the Ford van was described as a 12-gauge shotgun, serial number 5B6964, and indicated as K-8 in the Laboratory report. ATF has determined that this weapon was known to have been purchased by [redacted] Shell casings recovered from the scene indicate that this 12-gauge shotgun fired specimens Q252, Q253, Q254, Q257, and Q258. All of these casings were located on Everitt Street in the vicinity of where the Ford van was parked during the shooting. The casings Q253 and Q254 were loaded with #4 buckshot, and casings Q257 and Q258 were loaded with 00 buckshot. Photographs from the Greensboro Police Department taken from the rear of the caravan identify [redacted] as firing a shotgun-type weapon from the right rear (passenger side) of the vicinity of the Ford van. TV video film shows occasional glimpses of [redacted] possibly with a weapon, as seen through the window of the van, standing outside the van. The statements provided by [redacted] and [redacted] are consistent with the fact that [redacted] was firing a shotgun in the direction of the CWP. The time sequence and the direction of fire are consistent with the possibility that he killed NATHAN.

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WILLIAM SAMPSON

SAMPSON was struck by three shotgun pellets, one in the left shoulder and two in the left chest. The autopsy report description of the lead pellets removed from his body is that they were apparently buckshot. The cause of death was due to the penetration of the heart and lungs by shotgun pellets. These lead pellets removed from the body and examined by the FBI Laboratory (Q215, Q216, and Q217) indicate that they are #4 buckshot. Weapon K-8, see above, was located by the Greensboro Police Department in the Ford van at the time of the arrest of the KKK/Nazis in the Ford van. Last ownership of the weapon, as indicated above, was [redacted] This shotgun owned by [redacted] was known to have fired #4 buckshot. (See description of shotgun shells Q253 and Q254 above.) As in the case of NATHAN, the position of SAMPSON and

the line of fire from the vicinity of the van indicate that [redacted] may have killed SAMPSON.

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JAMES MICHAEL WALLER

The autopsy report on WALLER indicates that he was struck with lead pellets which entered his back and legs and buttocks. The lead pellets ascended in his legs upward towards his buttocks. Some of the pellets were identified as birdshot. WALLER was also struck by buckshot in the lower left back and buttocks area. Buckshot passed through his kidney, spleen, bruising his heart, and caused death rapidly. The FBI Laboratory identified pellets removed from WALLER's body as #6 birdshot, (Q205 through Q213). Q203 and Q204 which was removed from WALLER's body was identified as 00 buckshot. A 12-gauge shotgun (K-7) was recovered at the scene of the shooting. This weapon was found in a grassy area. Shell casings Q241, Q251, and Q255 were recovered in the vicinity of the shooting. These shell casings fired 00 buckshot. Q241 casing was found at the corner of Everitt and Carver Streets, Q251 was found in the vicinity of vehicle #22, and Q255 was found in the vicinity of vehicle #23. This weapon was established by ATF as having been purchased by [redacted] a member of the CWP, who was present during the entire shooting incident. The statements of [redacted] indicate that he admits firing this weapon. He also admits obtaining this weapon during a fight and struggle on the grass near the corner of Everitt and Carver Streets. [redacted] claimed that he obtained this weapon from a black male with a beard, and it should be noted that victim JAMES MICHAEL WALLER had a dark beard. [redacted] admits that he threw the weapon away on the grass in the vicinity of Everitt Street. The video TV film indicates that [redacted] was firing a shotgun from the vicinity of a pickup truck at the corner of Everitt and Carver Street. WALLER is seen in the film running and falling near the area where his body was recovered. The struggle for the weapon between WALLER and [redacted] apparently took place prior to the heavy barrage of shooting and probably before [redacted] began shooting. If WALLER was carrying this shotgun, it is consistent with the film which indicates that the owner of the weapon, [redacted] was not carrying the shotgun during the incident. [redacted] admits that he was firing #6 birdshot. It is also consistent with the film that WALLER was struck by the birdshot being fired from [redacted]'s shotgun.

SANDRA SMITH

SMITH was killed by a single shotgun lead pellet to the right front forehead. This pellet entered the head and descended into the cortex of the brain causing her death. SMITH was also struck in the rear of the head with a blunt instrument causing a deep laceration of the skull. This blow was to the right rear of the head and was two and one-half inches long. The autopsy report indicates, however, that the cause of death was not this blow to the head but the shotgun pellet to the brain. Examination at the FBI Laboratory indicated that the pellet fragments recovered from SANDRA SMITH were from 00 buckshot. As indicated above, 00 buckshot was being fired from the shotgun used by [redacted] and possibly taken from victim WALLER. The FBI Laboratory has also indicated that this buckshot pellet is from the same lot as the shotgun pellets which were taken from WALLER's body (Q203 and Q204). An analysis of the video tapes and photographs failed to indicate at what point during the fighting and shooting that SANDRA SMITH was killed. However, interviews and comments obtained at the scene indicate that she was dragged away early in the incident and placed up against the wall in the Community Center. She may have received the blow to the head during the fighting and been shot while she was being dragged toward the Community Center.

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There follows a comparative analysis of the autopsy reports and the FBI ballistic and weapons examination.

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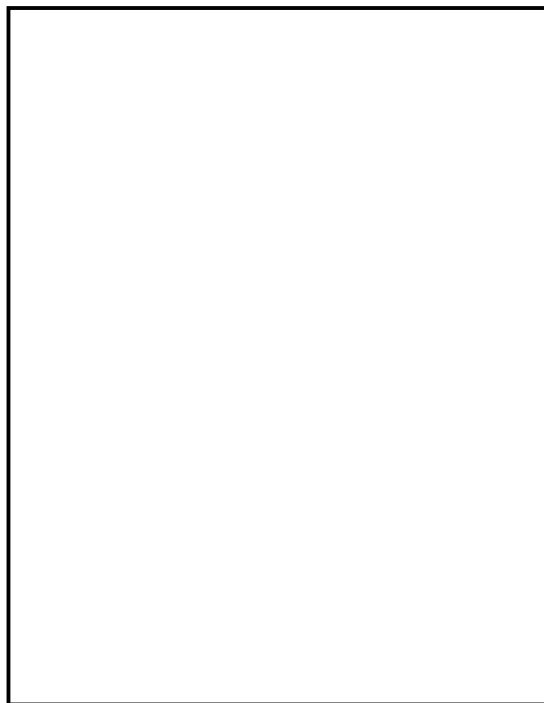

E. STATE CHARGES AGAINST KKK
AND NATIONAL SOCIALIST PARTY
OF AMERICA (NSPA) MEMBERS

On January 18, 1980, [redacted] Assistant District Attorney, Greensboro, North Carolina, advised that on December 13, 1979, the State of North Carolina indicted participants in the November 3, 1979, incident through the use of a Grand Jury impaneled in Guilford County, North Carolina. The members of the KKK and the Nazi Party who had previously been arrested on murder charges and conspiracy to commit murder charges were now under indictment and the previous charges were superseded by the Grand Jury action. The following individuals were indicted for Unlawful Taking of Human Life and for Engaging in a Riot:

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The following individuals were indicted by the same Grand Jury for Engaging in a Riot (a felony in North Carolina):



Mr. [redacted] advised that no indictment was obtained for [redacted] who was previously charged with Murder and Conspiracy to Murder. Mr. [redacted] advised that the charge Unlawful Taking of Human Life means that a jury may find the individuals

indicted as being guilty of Murder in the First Degree, Second Degree, Manslaughter, or Involuntary Manslaughter. Mr. [] further advised that the initial complaints against the above individuals charging them with Murder and Conspiracy to Commit Murder were dismissed in State Court on December 14, 1979. Mr. [] stated that all of the above individuals under indictment have made bond except [] who remains incarcerated in the Guilford County Jail.

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FEDERAL BUREAU OF INVESTIGATION

On November 14, 1979, Special Agent [redacted] was contacted by Detective [redacted] Winston-Salem Police Department, Winston-Salem, North Carolina, who advised Agent [redacted] he had just been in telephonic contact with his cousin, [redacted] and that [redacted] was currently located at a truck stop in Hinsdale, Illinois. [redacted] stated that [redacted] had called him from the truck stop, gave him his location and told him he wanted to turn himself in to [redacted] and the FBI.

SA [redacted] called the telephone number in Hinsdale, Illinois, that Detective [redacted] provided him and the phone was answered by a white male, who identified himself as [redacted]. After a brief discussion, during which [redacted] indicated to SA [redacted] that he desired to turn himself in to the FBI, SA [redacted] placed a long distance telephone call to the night supervisor of the FBI office in Chicago, Illinois. SA [redacted] through the night supervisor at the FBI office in Chicago, arranged for two agents to proceed to the Hinsdale Oasis at Hinsdale, Illinois, and take [redacted] into custody. This was accomplished without incident approximately one hour later.

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During the conversation with [redacted] he stated he saw himself on TV shooting a friend's "AR180". He stated this was a newsreel of the shoot-out which occurred in Greensboro, North Carolina, on November 3, 1979. He stated he was present during the shoot-out and did shoot a friend's AR180 rifle but did not know whether he had actually killed anyone or not. [redacted] stated the weapon he was shooting was identical to the weapon he had owned but that had been stolen from him on Friday, November 2, 1979.

[redacted] indicated he was scared and he, therefore, left Winston-Salem sometime during the day of November 4, 1979, and hitchhiked around the country, finally arriving in the Chicago area later that week. [redacted] was asked by SA [redacted] what had happened to the AR180 which he was shooting on November 3, and he stated that he had thrown it into a lake or pond and would not say where this body of water was. [redacted]

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Investigation on 11/14/79 at Winston-Salem, N.C. File # CE 44-3527

by SA [redacted] jat Date dictated 11/21/79

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would also not indicate who the weapon actually belonged to. [redacted] stated that he was aware that he was wanted in connection with the murders which occurred as a result of the shoot-out in Greensboro on November 3, 1979, and although he did admit being there and shooting this AR180 type rifle, he stated emphatically he did not know whether he had hit anyone or actually killed anyone. [redacted] sounded remorseful on the telephone and stated he was aware that he would have to pay for his mistake and realized he would have to spend some time in jail. [redacted] made only request of SA [redacted] and that was that he not be placed in a prison or confinement-type situation with Black people or with members of the Jewish Defense League (JDL).

[redacted] indicated over the telephone to SA [redacted] that during the flight from Winston-Salem, North Carolina, he had dyed his hair black and that it was no longer red in color. He indicated that his date of birth was December 19, 1951, that he was 6'1" tall and weighed approximately 240 pounds. While speaking with [redacted] on the telephone he advised he was currently wearing a blue jean jacket, blue jeans, black military type boots, and a t-shirt. [redacted] also indicated that he had a .32 caliber pistol tucked into his boot which was empty and contained no ammunition.

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This information was provided to the night supervisor of the FBI office in Chicago who in turn advised the apprehending agents and they did so recover a .32 caliber revolver on [redacted]

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[redacted] then furnished the following information:

He stated that he is, of course, familiar with the confrontation between a Klan group and a communist workers party group in Greensboro, North Carolina, on November 3, 1979, which resulted in the shooting death of certain individuals involved in the confrontation. He stated that he has no specifics concerning the shootings other than what he has gathered from reading the newspaper and listening to the radio. He went on that he is well acquainted with [redacted] leader of the North Carolina Klan Group and, in fact, had been in telephonic contact with him on the night of November 14, 1979. He stated that in that particular contact, Griffin called primarily to learn from [redacted] how best to set up a Defense Fund, it being noted that the North Carolina Klan Members involved in the shooting allegedly were associated with [redacted] group.

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[redacted] stated that he cannot recall he and [redacted] discussing the details of the shootings, but even if such information were discussed, he would not advise the FBI as to what was discussed. He stated further that he is not acquainted with a [redacted] also known as [redacted] but does not believe that he is associated with any North Carolina Klan Group as he, [redacted] knows most North Carolina Klansmen and he is certain he would know [redacted] if he were, in fact, a member of one of the klan groups. He stated likewise, he is not acquainted with anyone by the name of, [redacted] and certainly did not know if such individual took part in the Greensboro shootings or was even in the caravan of klansmen.

[redacted] was then furnished with a description of an individual who reportedly was seen in a white pickup truck near the scene of the Greensboro shootings and who, in fact, was reportedly seen to fire two shots into the air

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from a pistol, but [redacted] stated that he did not recognize the individual from the description given and again reiterated that even if he did know who this individual might be, he would not tell the FBI.

[redacted] was then asked if he would view photographs of persons possibly involved in the Greensboro shootings and identify those individuals that he recognized in the photographs and [redacted] pointed out that he would view such photographs; however, [redacted] would not identify specific individuals in the photographs, but if the FBI knew the identity of the persons, he would verify their identity.

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[redacted] was then specifically asked whether he would be agreeable to meeting with SA [redacted] at a time and place convenient for him to discuss the Greensboro incident and [redacted] replied that he did not wish to do this as he would be wasting his time. [redacted] was then advised that he could possibly be subpoenaed to testify regarding his knowledge of the matter in question and he stated that that was fine with him, but he had absolutely nothing to tell. At this the conversation was terminated.

[redacted] Road, Belews Creek, North Carolina, telephone number [redacted] was interviewed at his residence and furnished the following information:

He is presently the Grand Dragon of the Winston-Salem Chapter of the Federated Klans of America. The Imperial Wizard of the Federated Klans of America is [redacted] from Alabama. [redacted] is the Grand Dragon of the White Knights of Liberty, a group which [redacted] formed when he broke away from the Federated Klan of America. [redacted] was the Grand Dragon of the Winston-Salem Chapter of the Federated Klans of America for four or five years until January 12, 1979, when he stepped down as Grand Dragon and accepted the National Office as Imperial Klokard. It was at that time when [redacted] took office as the Grand Dragon for North Carolina.

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The Federated Klans of America has traditionally refrained from violence of any kind. The Imperial Wizard detests violence and prefers a secret organization with very little contact with the public. The North Carolina Chapter of the Federated Klans of America has adhered to these principles.

In February, 1979, the Klan had an exhibit at the Public Library in Winston-Salem. This exhibit was presented by the David Duke's Klan and not by the Federated Klans of America. [redacted] as well as other members of the Federated Klans of America, went to see the exhibit. When he got to the exhibit, there were members of the Communist Party and the Workers Viewpoint Organization (WVO) protesting the exhibit. [redacted] believes that [redacted] was one of the demonstrators but he is not sure of this. Besides the protesters, there were members of the press and TV cameras and a white male whose name he does not know but who claimed he was a member of the Communist Party from New York, stood up and said, "Instead of looking, you ought to be ripping this shit off the walls." At this point a lot of people started shouting and a group of Nazis out of Arlington, Virginia, walked into the library and there was a lot of shoving and pushing and hollering

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although no serious confrontations resulted.

[redacted] stated that the Klan and the Nazis have been associated in a general sort of way for many years. He, himself, had met [redacted], the state leader of the Nazi Party, although he does not know him well. Several months ago, a few of the members of the Federated Klans of America quit the Klan and joined the Nazis because they wished to be more politically involved. [redacted] explained that the Klan is actually a fraternal organization and does not involve itself directly in politics whereas the Nazis have as a goal to become a major political party. He stated that the Nazis do not advocate the overthrow of the U.S. Government and as a matter of fact they are patriotic citizens who wish to exert their influence in a political manner. Both [redacted] and [redacted] left the Klan to join the Nazi Party and [redacted] became a Unit Leader of that party. Although [redacted] and [redacted] split from the Federated Klans of America, the Klan has kept in contact with them, although has kept them at "an arm's length."

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In July, 1979, the Federated Klan held a showing of a film, "Birth of a Nation" in China Grove, North Carolina. This showing was arranged by [redacted] and [redacted]. The showing was not open to the public but was by invitation only and although the Nazis were not invited en masse, individual members were invited by Klan members. [redacted] and [redacted] were there. [redacted] was not at that meeting.

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Although the Klan had rented the building in which the film was going to be shown and their meeting was entirely legal, between 150 and 200 communists carrying signs, "Death to the Klan", came to the hall to protest. Some of the Communists carried guns but most of them carried either chains or clubs or other type weapons of that sort. [redacted] stated that he knew that there was potential for violence and although he had previously told his men not to come armed, he then directed them to get their weapons from their cars in case something happened. There were only two or three local policemen on the scene and one of them told [redacted] that the police would try to stop the marchers but it was obvious that the police protection was not adequate to hold off the protesters. [redacted] told his men that under no circumstances should anyone fire his weapon and he also told them not to trade insults with the Communists. The police asked [redacted] to get his men inside the auditorium so that they could talk

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to the protesters and have them disband. In order to avoid violence, both [] and [] had the men go into the hall and while they were inside, the Communists burned the Christian flag, Confederate flag and the American flag which the Klan had left outside the hall. [] stated that it was all he and [] could do to hold the men back from attacking the protesters when they saw that the flags were being burned.

[] stated that because of the fact that violence was narrowly avoided at the China Grove incident, he knew that the Communists were looking for trouble and he was afraid that any other confrontation with the Communists could easily lead to violence. He stated that he is well aware that the Communists are very devout and would readily kill for their belief. He also believes that they were looking for national recognition and were willing to martyr some of their members to achieve that recognition.

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[] also noted that [] and [] were all at the China Grove incident and all of them listened to reason and did not start any trouble. He stated that he believes it is against their nature to be violent and that they would only use violence in self-defense.

He pointed out that the Klan did not want a confrontation with the WVO and that they cooperated with the police at China Grove in order to avoid violence. He pointed out that although the Klan and the Communists were about equal in number at China Grove, the Klan had more fire power and could easily have wiped out the protesters had there been a confrontation.

In September, 1979, there was a meeting in Lewisburg, North Carolina, between the Klan and the Nazi Party and it was at this meeting that [] split away from the Federated Klans of America and formed his own group called the White Knights of Liberty. [] stated that [] used the affiliation of the Klan with the Nazis as an excuse but that the real reason that he split from the Federated Klans was because he wanted to be Grand Dragon again and [] did not want to step down. He stated that although he and [] had some differences, they are still friends and the split between them is not really that serious.

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[redacted] stated that he never received any letters from the WVO but he had heard that the WVO sent out letters to a lot of people calling the Klan in general and him and [redacted] in particular cowards and daring them to come to the march to be held in Greensboro on November 3, 1979. Because of the fact that he was well aware of the fact that the Communists were fanatical he decided not to go to the rally and he advised his men not to go. He told the men that if they wanted to go to watch, they should go as individuals and not to be identified as Klan members. To his knowledge, none of the people who went to the march were from the Federated Klans in Winston-Salem. He also advised that none of those arrested were members of the Federated Klans and only [redacted] and [redacted] used to be members of the Klan.

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[redacted] stated that in his opinion the Klansmen and the Nazis who went to the rally went only to heckle the demonstrators and they had no intention of indulging in violence. He stated that the Klansmen, as a general rule, carried their weapons in their cars and the fact that the weapons were in the trucks of the cars and not with the individuals lends credence to the theory that they had no intentions of using them. He also pointed out that he had heard that there were several dozen eggs in the van which carried a group of the Klansmen and he stated that this is further proof that the Klansmen did not intend to use firearms at the demonstration.

[redacted] stated that after seeing the films on TV from the November 3 incident in Greensboro, he recognized [redacted] as being individuals who were at the China Grove incident. He also believed that [redacted] were also there but he is not positive of this. He also stated that there were other people at the Greensboro incident on November 3 who were also at the China Grove incident but he could not say for sure which ones they were.

On January 16, 1980, Sheriff [redacted] and Detective [redacted] Lincoln County, North Carolina, Sheriff's Office, Lincolnton, North Carolina, furnished the following information:

At approximately 8:40 P. M. on January 15, 1980, Mr. [redacted] Lincolnton, North Carolina, telephone number [redacted] who is employed as a guard at the Department of Correction, Lincoln County Unit, was driving home on Ridge Road. He observed an individual running across the yard of the residence at [redacted] and entering the passenger side of a vehicle. He also observed a burning cross on the yard at [redacted]

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Mr. [redacted] recognized the individual who ran from the burning cross and entered the vehicle as [redacted] who had been an inmate at the Lincoln County Unit, North Carolina Department of Correction.

[redacted] pursued the vehicle which [redacted] entered and radioed information as to what had happened and the direction of travel from a radio in his truck. Approximately five miles from the residence of the victim, the vehicle was stopped by Lincoln County Sheriff's Officers and Lincolnton Police Officers. The driver of the vehicle was determined to be [redacted]. The passenger, as stated above, was [redacted].

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[redacted] was wearing a .44 caliber, black powder, navy arms, single-action pistol in a shoulder holster. This pistol was fully loaded.

Also located in the car was a sawed-off 16-gauge shotgun and a .22 caliber rifle, together with literature of the Communist Party and Ku Klux Klan.

[redacted]
[redacted] Cramerton, North Carolina, was charged with possession of a firearm within five years of conviction of a felony, a violation of North Carolina General Statute 14.415-1 and with burning a cross on the land of [redacted] and wife, [redacted], a violation of North Carolina General Statute 14-12.12.

[redacted] was charged with aiding and abetting [redacted] in the cross-burning in that he drove the vehicle transporting [redacted] to and from the scene of the crime.

He was also charged with careless and reckless driving, a violation of North Carolina General Statute 20-140a.

The weapons recovered from the vehicle were described as follows:

Stevens 16-gauge single-barrel shotgun,
barrel sawed off to a length of 18 3/4 inches.

Glenfield .22 caliber semi-automatic rifle,
serial number 23408753.

The .44 caliber black powder weapon carried by [redacted] is described as a Navy Arms, Ritchfield, New Jersey, single-action percussion-type revolver, fully loaded, serial number 154062.

The vehicle operated by [redacted] was a 1973 Mercury Comet, two-door, light blue in color, Vehicle Identification Number [redacted]

[redacted] had papers showing that he had purchased this vehicle on January 8, 1980.

[redacted] was released on \$5,000 bond after midnight in the early a.m. of January 16, 1980.

[redacted] remains in the Lincoln County Jail in lieu of \$6,500 bond.

[redacted] refused to make any statements concerning the cross-burning, but [redacted] did advise officers that the .44 caliber weapon carried by him was purchased by one [redacted] of Camp Lejeune, North Carolina, on or about December 23, 1979, at Woolco, Inc., Gaston Mall, Gastonia, North Carolina.

Sheriff [redacted] stated that [redacted] are both white. He stated that Mrs. [redacted] is employed as a secretary at Lail Electric where one [redacted] is also employed. [redacted] was arrested at Greensboro, North Carolina, subsequent to the shooting deaths of members of the Communist Party during the demonstration held there.

Sheriff [redacted] stated that Mr. and Mrs. [redacted] state they do not recall making anti-Klan statements and can think of no reason why a cross would be burned on their property.

[redacted] Sheriff, Lincoln County, North Carolina, advised that [redacted] and [redacted] were arrested by officers of his department and the Lincolnton, North Carolina, City Police Department on the night of January 15, 1980.

At the time of arrest, [redacted] was wearing a leather shoulder holster which would accommodate a .44 caliber revolver.

In the back seat area of the automobile which [redacted] was riding in was located a .44 caliber black powder, single action revolver. This revolver was manufactured by Navy Arms, Ritchfield, New Jersey, Serial Number 154062. The weapon was fully loaded.

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Sheriff [redacted] stated that [redacted] had advised that this weapon was purchased by a [redacted] of Camp Lejeune, North Carolina, sometime around December 23, 1979, at the Woolco Department Store in the Gaston Mall, Gastonia, North Carolina.

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The weapon is described as a Model 60 REB, .44 caliber. The total price was shown as \$76.20. No serial number is shown on the sales ticket.

Sporting Goods Department personnel advised that a black powder weapon is not considered a firearm under provisions of the Gun Control Act and they are not required to maintain a record of sales of these weapons. They stated that the only reason they had a sales ticket for the weapon is that Woolco Company policy requires a sales ticket for items sold valued over \$25.00.

Mr. [redacted]'s records reveal that [redacted] was employed at Stanley Furniture from July 17, 1978, until November 11, 1979. [redacted] said that [redacted] was fired on November 7, 1979, after he had been approached on the shop floor by his foreman to report to the supervisor's office. [redacted] refused to go to the supervisor's office and was recontacted on the same date when he again refused. He gave his reason for refusal as he "did not want to report to the supervisor's office without a witness. He was then fired for insubordination.

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[redacted] added that the reason for his order to report to the supervisor's office was that [redacted] had absented himself from work on November 5 and 6, 1979, and on November 6th he called in saying only that a "friend had died" and he could not work that day. [redacted] stated that [redacted] was only to receive a reprimand for his absenteeism and they had not intended to fire him for that reason.

[redacted] said that the records show that [redacted], a machine operator, was a good worker who had never caused any problems. He was rated "good" both in quantity and quality. [redacted] said that he had no information that [redacted] had ever distributed any pamphlets at the Stanley plant and, as far as he knew, he had never talked about Communism to his fellow employees.

[redacted]'s files show that he was employed at the Donal Day General Construction Company, Charlottesville, Virginia, from December, 1977, until June, 1978. This was not verified. His employment previous to that was shown to be Superior Knitting Company, Greensboro, North Carolina, from February, 1977, until December, 1977.

He did not see who fired the shot but after hearing it, he turned and ran away from the group towards the automobile in which he traveled to Greensboro. This automobile was that of [redacted].

They went to a house located on a corner across the street from a school. They arrived at this house at approximately 10:15 A.M. At this residence, [redacted] and her husband, [redacted] were present and they advised those attending the rally what route to take and their actual rally site. They were advised to go to an area near the Morning Side Apartments for the rally. After the rally, they were to go to a local church in the Morning Side Apartments area for a conference. She advised them that if a police officer drew his weapon that they were to continue marching and continuing with their rally. Those present were broken up into "fight teams". If the Klan was to attack them, these "fight teams" were to confront the Klan in order that the other persons could leave the area. [redacted] advised that he observed several large sticks, but no guns.

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At that time, they travelled to the Morning Side Apartments area and [redacted] and his friends stood next to a chain link fence. While standing next to this fence and singing, [redacted] stated that he observed persons from the Communist Party of America and from the Workers Viewpoint Organization. These individuals were carrying signs. [redacted] advised that he was not a member or sympathizer of either organization.

While standing next to the chain link fence, [redacted] observed several white individuals in a vehicle driving by the rally site. At that time, he heard a gunshot and saw some smoke, but did not see who fired the weapon. [redacted] ran to him and told him to run also, and both ran into the nearby housing area. They went into a house of an unknown female and hid there while the shooting occurred outside. Among those hiding in the house also were [redacted] and his friend.

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When the shooting stopped, [redacted] stated that he went out and saw several persons lying on the ground and the police in the area. He went back into the house where he had sought refuge, and stayed until [redacted] brought his van to the area. At that time, they all left the area and travelled back to Martinsville, Virginia.

[redacted] advised that he had been made aware of the anti-Klan rally by [redacted] at the Budd Company, Ridgeway, Virginia. [redacted] stated that this was to be an anti-Klan rally, but did not advise that members of the Communist Party of America or the Workers Viewpoint Organization would be present. [redacted] advised that he went to the rally only to see what was going on, and not as a support or sympathizer of [redacted]

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[redacted] advised that he did not see anyone shoot a handgun or rifle, nor did he observe anyone being shot. He did not observe the anti-Klan faction carrying any type of weapons, except sticks. These were sticks that were used to carry posters and he would not consider them clubs. When the Klansmen drove to the rally site, some of the people on the street began beating the Klansmen's vehicles with the sticks.

[redacted] advised he did not know who would be an associate of sympathizer of [redacted]

On the evening following the incident of November 3, 1979, [redacted] stated that he went by the [redacted] residence in Martinsville, Virginia, upon invitation. He advised he had been

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invited there to eat, but only stopped in for a short time, at which time he observed [redacted] and the [redacted] child, a white female, approximately 2 years old.

[redacted] advised that he has never handed out any Workers Viewpoint Organization or Communist Party of America literature, but had observed [redacted] handing out such literature at the plant. He advised he has never seen her carry a weapon of any type.

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[redacted] stated that he believed [redacted] to have gotten money from an unknown source.

[redacted] was interviewed at his place of employment, the Kennedy House, Martinsville, Virginia. [redacted] thereafter provided the following information:

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He advised that he had been laid off from the Budd Company, Trailer Division, at Ridgeway, Virginia, since approximately November 29, 1979, and is currently employed as a male orderly at the Kennedy House, Martinsville, Virginia.

On November 3, 1979, he advised that he drove his 1971 GMC White Van to Greensboro, North Carolina. Among those present with him were [redacted] and [redacted]. [redacted] advised that they met at his residence in Martinsville, Virginia, at approximately 9 or 10 AM on November 3, 1979, and thereafter drove on to Greensboro, North Carolina. He advised that they went to a residence in Greensboro, North Carolina, which had been designated as a meeting place by [redacted]. [redacted] advised that he had been given a map by [redacted] in order that he could find this residence. He could not advise, however, as to who owned this house or the identity of other persons present. Once arriving at the house, he and the other people with him had coffee and talked with the various people at this meeting. [redacted] were present. After a short meeting at this residence, [redacted] advised that he and the other persons who traveled to Greensboro with him got back into his van and followed another vehicle to the rally site in a project area. He did not know the identity, however, of the persons in the vehicle that he followed.

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After arriving at the housing project site, he parked his van and the persons traveling with him began standing around and singing. He stated that they were singing Anti-Klan songs. While they were singing, someone stated that the Klan was coming, and [redacted] and the group that traveled to Greensboro, North Carolina, with him decided to leave the area. At that time, [redacted] stated that he saw some cars coming down the street and the people at the rally site on the street began yelling, "Death

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to the Klan." [redacted] and his group left the area and began walking and then started running from the immediate area. While they were running, they heard something that sounded like gunshots. [redacted] and his friends ran through the project area and went to a house, where they hid. [redacted] however, could not provide the identity of the people who owned this house and who gave them shelter. After staying in this house for some time, [redacted] stated that he and his friends left the house when things outside became quiet again. He advised that he and [redacted] went out of the house and saw that the police had arrived and observed a body on the ground.

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[redacted] stated that he was able to get to his van and those who traveled to Greensboro, North Carolina, with him left with him at this time. Although [redacted] had not ridden to Greensboro, North Carolina, with him, she rode back to Martinsville, Virginia, with he and the other people in his van. After riding in Martinsville, Virginia, they returned to [redacted] residence, at which time they sat down and talked. While the other persons present left, [redacted] stated that he took [redacted] to her residence.

[redacted] advised that [redacted] is a friend and associate. He stated that he is not a supporter of her views concerning the Communist party or the Workers Viewpoint Organization. He advised that he was not a member of either one of these organizations.

[redacted] had been advised by [redacted] at the meeting in Greensboro, North Carolina, prior to the rally, that if anyone had brought any type of guns, that they would not be able to take them to the rally. Further, [redacted] stated that only "fight teams" would have sticks.

Later after the incident concerning the shooting at the rally, [redacted] told [redacted] that the only people who were shot were on the "fight teams."

[redacted] advised that she had been laid off at the Budd Trailer Company at Ridgeway, Virginia, on November 29, 1979, on an indefinite basis. She advised that she had been employed as a shift worker, and was also a shop steward in the Local Teamsters Union that represented some of the Budd employees. Because of the layoff, however, she was uncertain of her union position at this time.

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[redacted] advised that she was not a Communist or a member of the Workers Viewpoint Organization and has no sympathies toward either group. She stated that she only went to Greensboro, North Carolina, on November 3, 1979, as a supporter to her friend, [redacted] in that [redacted] was also a shop steward at the Budd Company.

On November 2, 1979, she traveled to Greensboro, North Carolina with [redacted] and her husband, [redacted] and went to a house owned by a friend of the [redacted] family. [redacted] advised that she did not know the identity of this individual. After arriving at the house during the evening hours of November 2, 1979, however, she went to bed inasmuch as she had been up since 5 AM that day. There were several persons present at the house, making various Anti-Ku Klux Klan posters but [redacted] advised that she did not know the identity of these individuals. She further stated that she remembered [redacted] telling the people present that if they brought any type of weapons, they should not have brought weapons and therefore were to leave them at the house during the rally.

[redacted] advised that she did not see any weapons, including guns or clubs, carried by any person present who was attending the Anti-Klan rally. The only sticks that she observed being carried by the Anti-Klan protesters were the sticks used in making posters. She rode to the site of the rally with [redacted] in his van and traveling with them were [redacted]

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[redacted] and her cousin, whose identity [redacted] could not provide.

At the rally site, she and her friends stood with the other persons present, singing Anti-Klan songs. A pregnant female was handing out Anti-Klan literature, at which time [redacted] stated she noticed some cars coming down the street. Someone said the Klan was coming, and people began yelling, "Death to the Klan." Someone else stated they were "throwing firecrackers" and then someone else shouted, "They're shooting." [redacted] advised that the group she was with stayed together and began to run toward a housing area and an unknown individual let them in their house. [redacted] could not remember the exact location of this house or the identity of all the people present in the house. She stated, however, that [redacted] and [redacted] and her cousin went into the house also. They had all been instructed earlier by [redacted] and her husband to stick together if any trouble occurred. While they were in the house, someone came into the house and stated that the pregnant female had been hit by a vehicle; and thereafter, an unknown black female entered the house and stated that five of the "WVO" people had been shot.

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[redacted] advised that she did not see anyone shoot any type of handgun or shoulder weapon, nor did she see anyone shot. She advised that [redacted] had not said anything about the incident of November 3, 1979. On the evening of November 3, 1979, however, [redacted] spent the night at [redacted]'S residence in Martinsville, Virginia.

[redacted] again emphasized the fact the only reason she traveled to Greensboro, North Carolina, was to support [redacted] [redacted] in the Anti-Klan rally. After the rally and the trouble occurred, [redacted] rode back to Martinsville, Virginia, with [redacted] [redacted] and the other individuals in his van.

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[redacted] stated that she did not attend the Teamsters union meeting at Collinsville, Virginia, on November 10, 1979, inasmuch as she knew she was going to be laid off and her attendance at the meeting would not be beneficial to her.

On November 3, 1979, he was scheduled to perform a wedding ceremony at the Recreation Center in the Morningside Homes for his wife's grandmother's great-grand child, [redacted] and (FIRST NAME UNKNOWN) [redacted]. On the evening before, he was at the recreation center decorating it for the wedding when a Black male, approximately 60 years old, and a white female, in her 30's, short and chunky with brown hair, came to the Recreation Center and said that they were going to have a parade on the following morning. The girl said that they would have weapons in case something happened. She told Reverend [redacted] that he might want to have something for a weapon and that the weapon did not have to be a gun but could be a stick or anything that he could use to defend himself. She told him that there would be about 200 people at the demonstration.

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On the following morning, November 3, 1979, at approximately 10:00 AM, he drove his 1970 Chevrolet truck, blue, with a camper mounted on the trunk bed, bearing North Carolina license DH9291, to the Morningside Homes and parked it on Everitt Street across the street from his mother-in-law's house and in front of a school bus which was parked on Everitt Street. His mother-in-law is [redacted] and she resides at 1916 Everitt Street. Sometime around 11:00 AM, he is not sure of the time, he looked out the window of his mother-in-law's house and saw some cars with their lights on coming down Everitt Street. He did not pay any attention to what was going on until he heard some commotion outside and he looked out the window again and saw a yellow van parked in front of his mother-in-law's house. He then saw a man get out of the van with a long barreled gun which was either a rifle or a shotgun and shoot two shots in the air. These were the first shots that he heard. He later saw the

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man's picture on television but he could not describe the man who shot the gun into the air except that it was a white man. He then saw another white man running down the sidewalk across the street from his mother-in-law's house with two handguns. The man seemed to be shooting the handguns at the crowd of people who were standing in front of the Recreation Center of the Morningside Homes.

Reverend [] said he saw people with guns but he was unable to describe any particular person who had a gun. He stated that he did not see any Black people with guns and he was unable to tell whether the white men were members of the Klan or members of the Communist Party.

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After the ambulance arrived, he took his wife who was at his mother-in-law's house with him and his mother-in-law out of the area in his truck. He stated that during the entire incident, his wife and his mother-in-law were both in the house but they did not look out the window and, therefore, did not see anything.

Reverend [] advised that due to the fact that the police had sealed off the area surrounding Morningside Homes, the wedding which was scheduled to take place at 4:00 PM at the Recreation Center was moved to the St. Mark's Holiness Church on Gillespie Street.

Reverend [] advised that it was possible that his son-in-law, [] was in the area during the time of the shooting. He also stated that the young man who was to be married was possibly in the area around the time of the shootings.

[redacted], 782nd Maintenance Training Battalion, Company C, Fort Bragg, North Carolina, advised as follows:

During the weekend of November 3-4, 1979, he was in Greensboro, North Carolina, visiting a friend of his, [redacted] and also [redacted] who are residents of Greensboro. Between the hours of 11 a.m. and noon on Saturday, November 3, 1979, he and [redacted] had driven in his 1975 light blue Ford Granada four door bearing North Carolina license [redacted] from the residence of [redacted] to a friend of [redacted] name not recalled, who resides at a corner house approximately 200 yards down from the location where the shooting occurred. [redacted] advised that the only landmark that he could remember which was near the house that he was at when the shooting occurred was another project which is located directly across the street from [redacted] friend's house.

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[redacted] stated that once he and [redacted] arrived at the friend's house for the purpose of picking up [redacted]s children, she remained in the car and he had just exited the driver's side of the car and was standing beside his car when he noticed an American made van of light color approximately 200 yards down the street from his location and several cameramen also in that area. What drew his attention to the van was that people were exiting the van from both sides and from the rear and he initially thought that because of the cameramen they were filming a movie. [redacted] recalls standing in the same position and watching until the shooting began and remained in that position during the entire shooting thinking that he was witnessing the shooting of a movie. Both [redacted] and [redacted] remained at the car during the entire episode and remained in the immediate area until the police arrived and had calmed the situation.

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[redacted] stated that both he and [redacted] were too far from the situation to recognize anyone or to add any pertinent details to the shooting episode. He could offer no further information concerning the incident.

Synopsis:

Captain [REDACTED] Greensboro Police Department, commander on scene 11/3/79, advised immediate area of shooting sealed but interstate traffic not affected. Area is residential project, not commercial. A cleaners and a laundromat were only businesses within sealed area. Businesses not closed by incident but access not permitted until 4 p.m. on 11/3/79. Businesses are privately owned independents and not directly involved with interstate commerce. U.S. mail to be picked up from mailbox at Everitt and Carver and mail to be delivered in Morningside Project were delayed on 11/3/79, from 11:30 a.m. until 4 p.m. WXII television, Winston-Salem, N.C., affiliated with National Broadcasting Company (NBC) and owned by Multi-Media Corporation of Cincinnati, Ohio, and Greenville, S.C. Station televises into Virginia. Station suffered \$2,000 damages to its vehicle and loss of employee for four or five days because of gun shoots at incident. United Parcel Service had no deliveries affected. Duke Transit Company did not cease operation in area but re-routed buses.

DETAILS:

This report contains the results of a limited investigation requested by the Civil Rights Division (CRD), United States Department of Justice, through a letter to the FBI transmitted by FBI communication dated January 8, 1980. This CRD letter requested investigation to determine any effect the 11/3/79 incident in Greensboro, N.C., had on interstate commerce and Federal functions in the area.

Captain [redacted] District Commander, District Two, Greensboro Police Department, was reinterviewed at the Greensboro Police Department and informed that this inquiry was at the specific request of the U.S. Department of Justice.

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[redacted] reiterated that he arrived at the vicinity of the shooting on November 3, 1979, several minutes after the incident. He assumed command and ordered all police units in the city to form a large circle around the area in an effort to locate missing Klan vehicles. This tactic was not successful. Highway traffic was not stopped or interfered with in any manner. Some interstate traffic could have been traveling on U.S. Highway 29 several blocks from the scene, but this traffic was not delayed. The only area sealed was the immediate vicinity of the incident. The area was strictly within the Morningside Project. The only businesses affected were the dry cleaners and the laundromat across the street from the incident. Local traffic was re-routed, but the area is residential and there are no commercial establishments, manufacturing concerns, or businesses using vehicles for several blocks surrounding the area.

He regularly delivers mail in the Morningside Project area of Greensboro. On the morning of November 3, 1979, he was delivering mail approximately one block from the intersection of Everitt and Carver Streets, but not in visual sight of Everitt Street. He heard shots fired, but when he approached Everitt Street, the area had already been sealed off by the police. He intended to clear the mailbox at Everitt and Carver Streets and to deliver mail in the Morningside Project. The police refused him admittance to the sealed area and he returned to the Main Post Office. His supervisor, [redacted] told him to reverse his route because the second half was not in the sealed off area. [redacted] returned to his route and reversed his usual deliveries. The Everitt and Carver area received its mail at approximately 4:00 p.m. or 4½ to 5 hours later than scheduled. The mailbox at the intersection was cleared at approximately 4:00 p.m. [redacted] was paid one hour overtime by the Post Office because of the additional time he expended in completing his mail delivery on November 3, 1979.

Reverend [] Manager, Terry's One Hour Cleaners, 1822 Everett Street, was advised of the nature of the inquiry and that this investigation was requested by the U.S. Department of Justice. Reverend [] advised as follows:

He is the former owner of Terry's One Hour Cleaners, but when he became 62 years old, he sold the business to Mr. [] and Mr. [] Reverend [] continues to manage the business. Additionally, Mr. [] owns the Morningside Laundromat located next door to the cleaners. The cleaners is a small business completely owned by [] It is not affiliated with any other businesses of similar nature. It is not franchised and does not lease any of its equipment. It uses local suppliers and local employees.

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On November 3, 1979, after the shooting incident across Everett Street from the cleaners, the police sealed the area. The cleaners was not ordered to close, but customers were not permitted to get to the cleaners because the area was roped off. This sealed situation lasted until approximately 4:00 p.m. on November 3, 1979 when the police removed all barriers to the Morningside area.

Reverend [] was not present on November 3, 1979. The cleaners suffered no physical damage as a result of the incident.

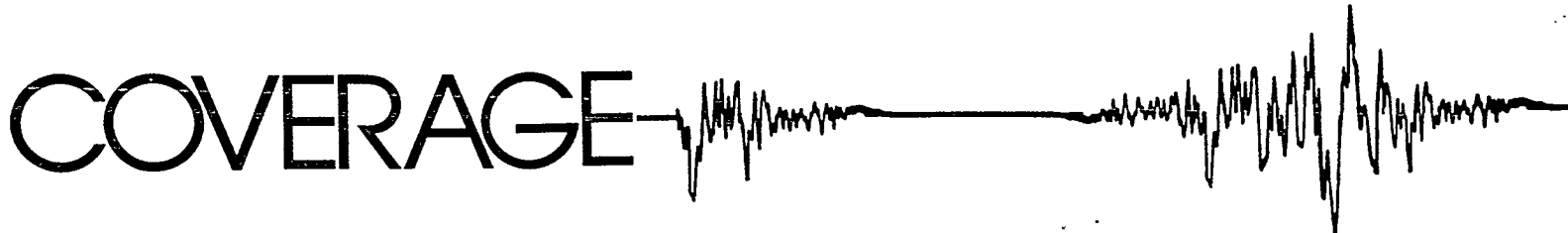

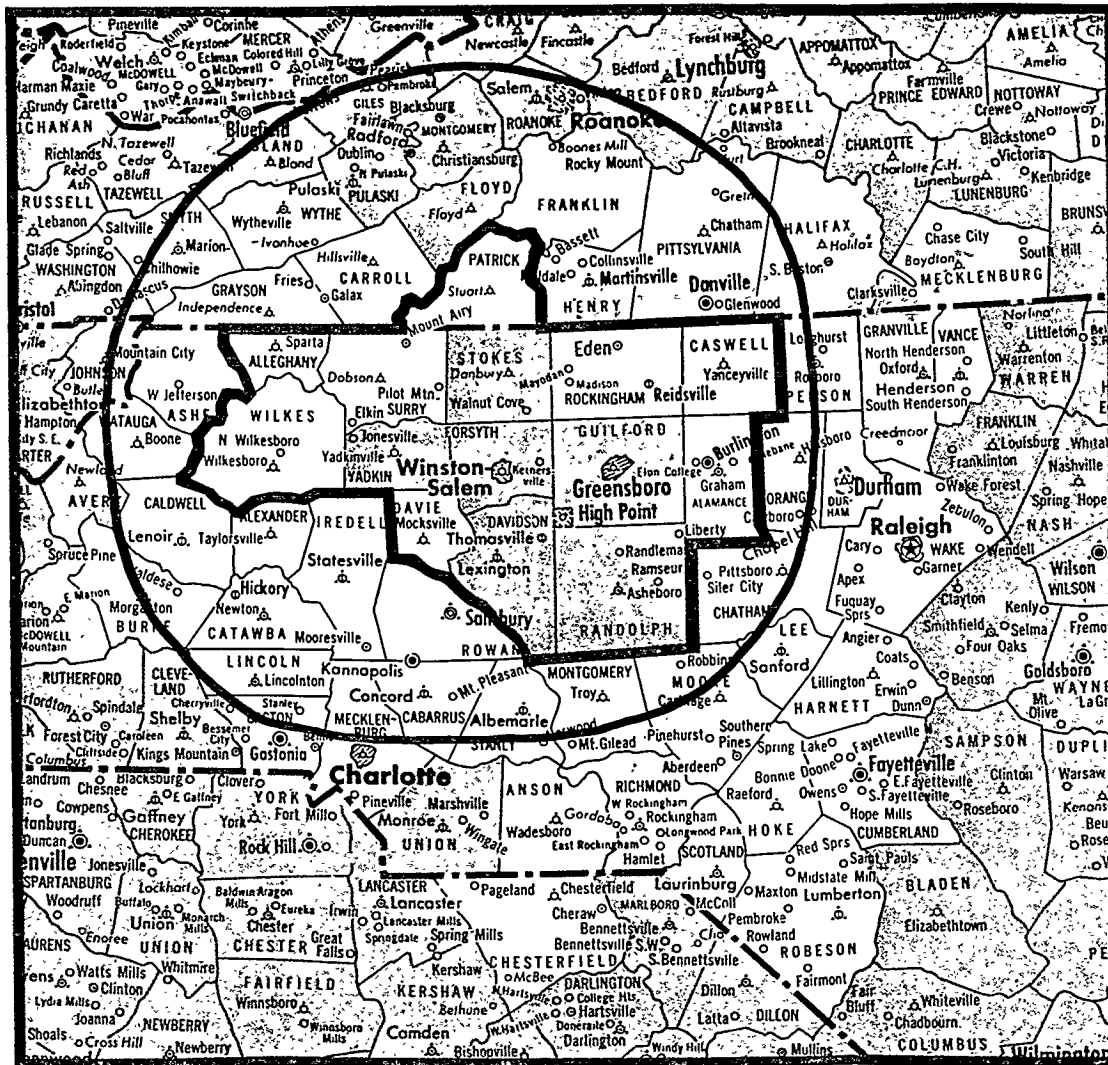

[redacted] News Director, WXII television station, 700 Coliseum Drive, was advised of the nature of the inquiry and that the investigation was at the specific request of the U.S. Department of Justice. [redacted] advised as follows:

WXII is one of the stations of the Multi-Media Corporation which owns five television stations and 14 newspapers throughout the country. The headquarters of the Broadcast Division is station WLWT, Cincinnati, Ohio, with [redacted] as President. The corporation's headquarters is in Greenville, South Carolina, with [redacted] as President. The station is affiliated with the National Broadcasting Company (NBC) using material supplied by NBC. Additionally, the station furnishes material to NBC which has been televised nationally. The coverage afforded the November 3, 1979, incident in Greensboro, North Carolina, by WXII was provided NBC and used on national news broadcasts. WXII televises into several counties in Virginia and advertisers are informed that advertisements on the station will reach into Virginia. Mr. [redacted] provided a map of the station's area coverage.

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At the Greensboro shooting incident on November 3, 1979, WXII had a crew covering the event. The crew used a 1979 white Ford station wagon bearing North Carolina license tags and clearly lettered as from WXII. This vehicle received damages from several gun shots at the incident. The glass was shot out and the fenders and doors were riddled with bullet holes. The vehicle sustained \$2,000 worth of damage and was repaired by the station.

A WXII Staff Photographer, [redacted] was wounded while attempting to film the incident. He was lost to the station for four or five days as a result of his wounds. He currently is employed at the station although he continues to have small shotgun pellets in his legs which have never been removed.

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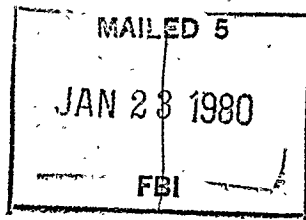

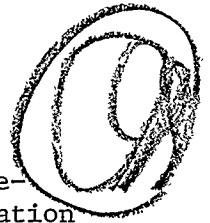

No conclusion could be reached when comparing the individual, or jacket, depicted in the Q ~~473~~ - ~~Q 474~~ Q 474 photographs with the suspect wearing a denim style jacket depicted in the Q 475 - Q 477 photographs. Insufficient views and the lack of visible identifying characteristics prevented any determination.

It was determined that the Q 460 leather jacket is the same style as the jacket worn by the suspect depicted in the Q 475 - Q 477 photographs who is holding a club and shown standing at the rear of a vehicle. One significant characteristic was noted ~~is~~ which indicates that Q 460 may be the same jacket.

Due to the lack of visible individual identifying characteristics, no conclusion could be reached as to whether Q 478 is or is not identical with a similar looking item depicted in the Q 475 - Q 477 photographs.

While the general visible characteristics of the sawed off shotgun depicted in the Q 475 - Q 477 photographs are similar to those of the K 13 shotgun, a positive conclusion could not be reached due to the lack of visible identifying marks.

Nothing else of significance was noted. A photo-montage is being furnished for your assistance.

[redacted] desired to meet with [redacted] on 2/2/80. On that date, a large anti-Klan demonstration in Greensboro sponsored by the Mobilization Committee caused [redacted] to contact [redacted] and reschedule the meeting for 2/9/80. [redacted] stated he was asked, not under oath, if he was at anytime an FBI informant. [redacted] told [redacted] that he had lied to [redacted] when he responded in the negative.

[redacted] continued in rapid succession that he was asked by [redacted] of any personal occupational contacts or contracts with FBI personnel. [redacted] admitted to [redacted] that he had performed and been paid for odd jobs by former Agents [redacted] and [redacted] and currently assigned Agents [redacted] and [redacted] [redacted] is a highly skilled carpenter, painter and general handy man who makes his livelihood at such trades). [redacted] then asked [redacted] if it was, in fact, not true that whatever occurred on 11/3/79 was his [redacted] fault.

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At this point it became apparent to SA [redacted] that [redacted] did not have additional information on the 11/3/79 incident, but had requested the interview to provide his assessment of a portion of the strategy to be used by one defense attorney in the forthcoming N. C. State murder trials. That strategy, according to comments by [redacted] involves attacking [redacted]s credibility and the credibility of the FBI because of its association with [redacted] sternly advised [redacted] to cease any discussion pertaining to [redacted]s conversations with [redacted]

[redacted] was instructed that the FBI was totally not interested in any conversation he has had or may have in the future with counsel for the defendants in this matter. He was reminded that he is not, nor will he be acting under any instructions or directions of the FBI.

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It was suggested to [redacted] that he be entirely truthful in responding to any future questions and must avoid any falsehood which may cause him to perjure himself in any judicial proceedings.

contractual agreements have been made between [] and current SAS [] or [] each of whom feels confident that cancelled checks for personal services of [] can be retrieved if necessary.

It is believed that [] may be called to testify by the defense in the forthcoming murder trial. He may be a key witness as he was an organizer of the Klan/Nazi caravan on 11/3/79. [] was again reminded that his relationship with the Bureau has long been terminated.

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Personnel assigned Greensboro have been instructed to have no further contact with []. Each Agent was advised that the Bureau cannot accept information which could reflect on pre-trial strategy to be used by the defense in this matter.

No official FBI acknowledgement has been made concerning []'s relationship with the FBI.

It should be noted that [] admitted during his interview on 11/7/79 that he was an informant of the Greensboro Police Department at the time of the 11/3/79 incident. Additionally, he briefly discussed his relationship with the FBI (See page 279 of 11/14/79 report). The 11/7/79 interview with [] has been provided the Greensboro Police Department and has been reviewed by the prosecutor's staff. The Greensboro Police Department has not admitted publicly that [] was their informant, but members of the PD did admit during FBI interview that they had an informant involved in the 11/3/79 incident. (See referenced report dated 12/10/79, pages 131 through 190). The Administrative Report of the Greensboro PD relating to the incident does not acknowledge their relationship with [].

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On 2/25/80 Chief WILLIAM SWING, Greensboro Police Department, advised that [] requested and received a brief appointment with Chief [] expressed to Chief SWING concern over Attorney []'s attack on his credibility

plus the attempt by the defense to blame the 11/3/79 incident on him. Chief SWING stated he told [redacted] the Greensboro PD would not interfere in the defense's position and merely suggested to [redacted] that he may want to consider employing a personal attorney.

On 2/27/80 [redacted], Assistant District Attorney, 18th Prosecutorial District, Greensboro, advised that the prosecution does not intend to call [redacted] as a witness, in the forthcoming trial or trials for murder relating to the 11/3/79 incident. However, in light of [redacted]'s entire conduct in the preparation and organization of the Klan/Nazi activities, [redacted] is "targeted" by the state for future prosecution on charges of participating in and causing a riot. These charges will not be filed until after the murder trials.

The Charlotte office considers [redacted]'s prior relationship with the FBI to be potentially an issue in the forthcoming state trial for murder and subsequent trials arising from the 11/3/79 incident. Understandably, [redacted] is attempting to protect his own well being. He perceives possible physical and economic harm to himself if his relationship with the FBI and the Greensboro PD becomes public knowledge. The nature of any testimony by [redacted] cannot be anticipated at this time.

Pursuant to MIOG (Sec. 137, page 622) the above is being furnished the Bureau for coordination with the Charlotte office.

By separate communication, Attention Voucher and Payroll Section, Administrative Services Division, Charlotte is furnishing a statistical review of the payments to [redacted] to insure reconciliation with FBIHQ records and to obtain the original and a copy of the signed receipts. This material will then be readily available if [redacted]'s relationship with Bureau becomes an issue. Charlotte will take no further action at this time.

Synopsis: Greensboro, N.C. Detective [REDACTED] on two occasions prior to 11:22 AM on 11/3/79, physically observed the residence of [REDACTED] Greensboro, N.C. Visual observation of the residence, persons entering and leaving residence as well as vehicles in the area resulted in no one being observed in possession of a firearm, or any firearms located in any vehicle. Observations by Det. [REDACTED] and Identification Specialist [REDACTED] Greensboro, N.C. PD of KKK caravan located at I-85 and 220, Greensboro, N.C., revealed no public display of firearms either on persons of individuals, or in vehicles being operated by them. St. [REDACTED] Corporal [REDACTED] and Patrolman [REDACTED] observed members of Workers Viewpoint Organization (WVO) at the vicinity of Windsor Community Center, Greensboro, N.C., and they likewise observed no physical display of firearms on the persons of these individuals, or in vehicles parked in the area. Sgt. [REDACTED] and Patrolmen [REDACTED] had patrolled Everitt and Carver St. periodically up through 10:30 AM on 11/3/79, and during routine patrol, noticed no visible display of firearms by any individual, or a visible display of firearms in any vehicle parked in the vicinity. After the shooting incident at Everitt and Carver St., the search of the area located a blue Honda license [REDACTED] parked on Everitt St. near the intersection of Carver which had in the rear of the station wagon three - four leather gun cases. Sgt. [REDACTED] Sgt. [REDACTED] and Capt. [REDACTED] all observed this vehicle and from the appearance of the leather gun cases, it was obvious to them that firearms were contained inside these cases, however, based upon the legal

opinion of the police attorney, [redacted] this vehicle was not searched, and the owner of the vehicle, Mrs. [redacted] [redacted] was permitted to remove the vehicle from the area.

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DETAILS:

Detective [redacted] Greensboro, North Carolina, Police Department, was interviewed at the Detective Squad Room of the Greensboro, North Carolina, Police Department, relative to his observations and surveillance of the Ku Klux Klan (KKK) caravan on November 3, 1979, at Greensboro, North Carolina.

Detective [redacted] advised that he arrived for work somewhere between 9:00 and 9:15 AM on November 3, 1979, and shortly after reporting in for duty, went in his unmarked police vehicle to the vicinity adjacent to the residence of [redacted] on [redacted] Greensboro, North Carolina. [redacted] advised that prior to going to [redacted]'s residence, he met with Patrol Sergeant [redacted] and after parking [redacted]'s marked vehicle, they both proceeded in [redacted]'s unmarked vehicle and parked in a vicinity near the residence of [redacted] where they could observe individuals going to and from the residence but in particular where they could observe the vehicles parked at the residence.

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[redacted] advised from his visual observation of the area, he observed no individuals coming to or from [redacted]'s residence who were bearing firearms and that at no time in his observation of the vehicles parked in the vicinity of [redacted]'s residence did he observe any firearms visibly displayed in the windows or on the seats.

[redacted] advised that at this particular time, he was not looking for any particular vehicle, however, was interested in locating a vehicle which had been described to him as belonging to [redacted] the leader of the KKK, however, at the time of his observations, 9:30 AM on November 3, 1979, he did not observe this vehicle.

[redacted] advised during this period of time, he furnished the license number to Sergeant [redacted] who recorded the license number of the vehicles parked in this area and after obtaining the license numbers of suspected vehicles, in the area, he returned to the Greensboro Police Department.

where he obtained a print-out on the identification of these license numbers from the Division of Motor Vehicles.

After obtaining the print-out of the identity of the vehicles observed at [redacted] s residence, and giving a short briefing to the Tactical Patrol Force as well as Lieutenant [redacted] advised that he then went to the laboratory section and picked up Identification Specialist [redacted] was assigned with [redacted] for the purpose of taking photographs of any incidents which would occur during this parade by the WVO and/or the movements of the KKK.

[redacted] advised that he and [redacted] then proceeded back to [redacted] s residence on 220 South, Greensboro, North Carolina, and he made another physical surveillance of the area and during this occasion made note of additional license plates on vehicles which were parked in the area which had not been there earlier when he was there approximately at 9:30 AM. [redacted] advised that it was now somewhere between 10:30 and 10:45 AM during this second period of surveillance of [redacted] s residence. Again on this occasion, [redacted] advised that he observed no individual coming to or from the residence nor did he observe any vehicle that had a visible display of firearms.

[redacted] advised that following his recording of the license numbers of vehicles parked in the vicinity of the [redacted] residence, he and [redacted] proceeded back towards Greensboro towards 220 and I-85. [redacted] stated that at this time in the vicinity of I-85 parked along the soft shoulders near the intersection of 220, he observed the vehicles which he had seen earlier parked at [redacted] s residence and recognized them as probably being part of some of the members of the KKK. He stated that he and [redacted] then exited off the highway and came back up and parked in the vicinity of J&I Drive where they placed the vehicles in this caravan under surveillance. [redacted] advised that at his direction, [redacted] photographed the last few vehicles in the caravan as well as some of the individuals walking back and forth between these vehicles.

[redacted] advised that at this time he did not observe any weapons being visibly displayed on any individuals moving between the cars in the caravan nor did he observe any weapons displayed in the pickup truck, van, or other vehicles that he could observe in the caravan.

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[] advised that sometime after 11:00 AM, a 1962 or 1963 light blue Ford Fairlane arrived at this location and fell in behind a black pickup truck just in front of the yellow van and at this time the caravan drove off and they proceeded to follow it at a discreet distance.

[] advised that they followed this caravan up to Everitt Street where the yellow van was observed stopped at the crest of the hill on Everitt Street. [] advised that his observations were somewhat limited because of the slight incline and, therefore, he could not see anything other than the yellow van.

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During the course of his surveillance, [] advised that he was furnishing the location of this KKK caravan to the police radio network and it was during one of his transmissions that [] advised him that he had heard a gunshot. [] advised it was just a few seconds later when he started to observe the area where [] had observed the gunshot that a large quantity of fire erupted from the vicinity of Everitt Street and Carver Street. [] advised that as he moved this forward to get a better situation to observe what was taking place and to assist, was the first time that he physically observed any weapons in the hands of any individual. These were shoulder-type weapons that were in the possession of members of the KKK that were in and around the yellow van which was parked at the crest of the hill on Everitt Street.

[redacted] Identification Specialist, Greensboro, North Carolina, Police Department Laboratory, was interviewed in the Detective Squad Room of the Greensboro, North Carolina Police Department relative to his observations of the Ku Klux Klan (KKK) caravan on November 3, 1979.

[redacted] advised that on the day of November 3, 1979, he was instructed to assist Officer [redacted] from Special Investigations Division and to accompany [redacted] in his unmarked vehicle on a surveillance of the demonstration which was taking place in Greensboro, North Carolina. He stated that his mission was to take photographs as directed by Officer [redacted] of any incidents which developed which [redacted] felt was significant enough to warrant having photographs obtained.

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[redacted] advised that he signed in at 7:00 AM on that date, and that he went to the lab and began working on other matters.

At approximately 10:30 AM, [redacted] got up with Detective [redacted] and they drove over to a residence on [redacted] Greensboro, North Carolina. [redacted] recalled from conversation with [redacted] that the residence belonged to an individual named [redacted].

[redacted] advised that when they arrived near the vicinity of this residence, they stopped near a service station at the fork of a road, approximately 150 yards from [redacted]'s residence. [redacted] stated that [redacted] using binoculars, then made a visual observation of several of the vehicles parked in the area and from conversation with him, knew [redacted] had been there earlier that day and was furnishing him license numbers of vehicles he had not earlier observed at this area.

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[redacted] advised that from his observation of these vehicles, and people he saw in the area, he observed no weapons being displayed nor could he observe any weapons visibly displayed in these vehicles.

[redacted] advised that [redacted] called off license numbers to him and that he would write the license numbers down of any vehicles that [redacted] furnished him. [redacted] stated that he was not in a position where he could observe any weapons that may have been in the seat or floorboard of a vehicle, nor did he observe any racks in any vehicles that contained any weapons.

[redacted] advised that they stayed in this location just a few minutes, two or three, and that they then proceeded back towards Greensboro, north on Highway 220 towards I-85.

Shortly after 11:00 AM, while en route back towards the Greensboro area, [redacted] advised [redacted] spotted eight to nine vehicles parked on the I-85 ramp at 220 and from his previous observation, could identify them as having been at [redacted] s residence and were probably part of the KKK caravan.

[redacted] advised that they left the highway, drove back up and parked at a location on J&J Drive which they could physically observe the last three or four vehicles in this caravan. Upon [redacted] s instruction, [redacted] stated he photographed some of these vehicles and of the individuals moving back and forth between these vehicles. [redacted] stated that at no time did he observe any visible display of firearms by any of these individuals, that is, rifle or shotgun, and certainly observed no handguns visible on these individuals.

In his observation of the vehicles parked in the caravan, [redacted] advised that he could observe no weapons being visibly displayed in the vehicles.

[redacted] advised that he did have several photographs of the caravan, and in examining these photographs, he still has not observed any weapons being displayed by any individuals or in a vehicle.

[redacted] advised that when this group of vehicles left the area, Detective [redacted] began to follow them, at a discreet distance, and he followed them until their vehicles stopped at the intersection of Everitt and Willow Street, Greensboro, North Carolina. [redacted] advised that [redacted] was continually furnishing information to other police vehicles of the movements of this KKK caravan and that he was also

observing them up until the time they stopped on Everitt Street.

[redacted] advised that after the van became stopped at the crest of the hill on Everitt Street, he could hear a commotion, shouting, and he heard [redacted] transmitting over the radio that there was heckling and demonstrating taking place in the vicinity of Everitt and Carver Street. At approximately this time, he advised he saw a puff of blue smoke and heard the report of a weapon from the vicinity of Everitt Street, just back above the crest of the hill which would have been short of Carver Street. He stated that within three or four seconds after the first shot, he heard a second shot from the same vicinity, and then after that, a small fire fight erupted, all coming from the area just over the crest of the hill at Everitt Street. He stated that he and [redacted] then slowly moved up the street on Everitt Street and he began photographing what he observed taking place at the crest of the hill near the yellow van. He stated that he observed several individuals moving to and from the van and some were armed with shoulder-type weapons, and that he obtained photographs of these individuals. [redacted] advised this was the first occasion in which he observed or heard firearms on that date.

Sergeant [redacted] Greensboro, North Carolina, Police Department, Patrol Division, was interviewed at the Detective Squad Room of the Greensboro Police Department, relative to his observations of the demonstrators at Windsor Community Center, Greensboro, North Carolina, on November 3, 1979.

Sergeant [redacted] advised that on November 3, 1979, he was on patrol duty in the district which covers Everitt and Carver Street, Greensboro, North Carolina, and that his assignment for that date in addition to patrol duty would be to assign personnel from his squad to escort the members of the Workers Viewpoint Organization (WVO) during their parade which was to commence at approximately 11:45 AM on that date.

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During the course of the morning, which started at 6:00 AM for him, he made routine patrols in his district and on one occasion, between 10:15 and 10:30 AM, he patrolled through the area of Everitt and Carver Street, Greensboro, North Carolina. At that time, Sergeant [redacted] advised he observed no demonstrations taking place nor any individuals he could identify with members of the demonstration, and further observed no vehicles parked in the vicinity that appeared in any way suspicious to him.

At approximately 10:35 AM, on November 3, 1979, [redacted] proceeded by the area of the Windsor Community Center and did observe there were between 50-75 individuals at that location and that they were beginning to form up for the parade. He stated that he had Corporal [redacted] accompany him to the area of Windsor Community Center in order to locate [redacted] to discuss with [redacted] the parade route, and the fact that his officers, [redacted] and [redacted] would be escorting this group during the course of their parade.

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[redacted] advised that he was unable to locate [redacted] in the area of Windsor Community Center and that his efforts to speak with some of the demonstrators there as to where

[redacted] was located were futile. He stated that they kept chanting angry comments towards the police officers, that is, himself, and Patrolman [redacted] and that they refused to have any conversation with them. He stated one Black female in particular kept yelling at him through the megaphone and it was impossible to speak in a normal voice and to be heard by the demonstrators because of this.

Despite the hostile attitude of the demonstrators at Windsor Community Center towards the police, [redacted] stated that he observed no weapons displayed by any of the demonstrators nor in his patrol of the area did he observe any weapons displayed in any vehicles. [redacted] stated that he observed no pickup trucks or campers that had gun racks in them or where a gun could be readily seen.

[redacted] did state that because of the dress of several of the demonstrators, long three-quarter length coats, he could not determine whether or not these demonstrators had a weapon concealed upon their person, however, he certainly observed no visible display of weapons such as rifles, shotguns or handguns that could be seen by any of these individuals at the Windsor Community Center.

After his attempts to obtain [redacted] advised that he and his officers were sent back to the Washington School area where they sat awaiting the developments of the parade. He stated that after the communications were received of the gunfight taking place at Everitt and Carver Street, he and his officers responded to that location and participated in the arrest of several of the KKK members.

[redacted] advised that after a conversation with Sergeant [redacted] of the Greensboro, North Carolina Police Department, he detailed a member of his squad to guard a blue Honda which had several rifle and shotgun cases in the rear portion of it. He advised that from observation of these leather cases, it was obvious they were full as they were filled out, and laying one upon the other and all were resting very firmly on each other. If they had not been filled with weapons, the leather cases would have folded or collapsed and would not have been full-bodied as they appeared. Sergeant [redacted] advised that based upon the orders of his superior, Captain [redacted] he permitted a white female, believed to be Mrs. [redacted] to

drive off with this vehicle with the gun cases and he believes the guns in the back of the vehicle. He was advised by Captain [redacted] that at the consultation with the police attorney, these weapons could not be seized as part of the crime scene search that he was conducting with other officers at Everitt and Carver Street after the shooting incident.

Corporal [redacted] Greensboro, North Carolina, Police Department, was interviewed at the Detective Bureau, Greensboro Police Department.

Corporal [redacted] advised that he is assigned to the Patrol Unit of the Greensboro, North Carolina Police Department, and as such was on duty on November 3, 1979. [redacted] patrol responsibility on that date was to patrol his normal sector which included the Windsor Center and the area of Everitt and Carver Street, and that at 11:45 AM, he had the responsibility of escorting as lead vehicle the Workers Viewpoint Organization's (WVO) demonstration. His patrol responsibility would be to escort them as lead vehicle along the parade route.

[redacted] advised that at approximately 10:15 - 10:30 on November 3, 1979, his patrol sergeant, Sergeant [redacted] directed him to proceed with him to the area of the Windsor Community Center, and that they were to locate [redacted] and to discuss with [redacted] the parade route for that day. [redacted] advised that they never met with [redacted] and that their attempts to locate [redacted] were futile. He stated that the demonstrators at the Windsor Community Center, which included men, women and children in red berets, were all chanting and yelling at the police officers, that is, himself and Sergeant [redacted] to leave the area and he was told that they did not want to see the police within three miles of their demonstration. He stated that they were yelling, "Death to the Klan," and "Death to the pigs," as the police officers attempted to find [redacted] to discuss the parade route with him.

[redacted] further stated that one of the Black females, who he could not identify except by photograph, continued to yell at him through a megaphone and that it was impossible to speak to anyone because of the loud yelling she was doing at him.

As a result of their inability to locate [redacted] Sergeant COMER directed that he and [redacted] return to the

Washington Street School area and wait there. [redacted] advised that he monitored the communications regarding the movement of the caravan of the KKK members and assumed that they would be driving towards the Windsor Community Street area and positioned himself accordingly in order to insure that they would not get to a location where they could cause trouble with the demonstrators at the community center.

[redacted] stated, however, he then heard the broadcast of the gunshots being fired at Everitt and Carver Street, and then immediately proceeded to that location where he was responsible for and assisted in the arrest of the KKK members in the yellow Ford van.

[redacted] concluded that at no time up until the time that he made the arrest when he observed shotguns and other type weapons laying on the ground and in the van by the KKK had he observed any display of weapons by any individual on that day.

[redacted] Patrolman, Greensboro, North Carolina Police Department, Patrol Unit, advised that he is assigned to the district that normally patrols the vicinity of Everitt and Carver Street in Greensboro, North Carolina.

On the date of the parade, November 3, 1979, [redacted] advised that he was on routine patrol up until 11:00 AM at which time he was to assemble to escort the Workers Viewpoint Organization parade through that area of Greensboro, North Carolina.

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During the course of his normal patrol, [redacted] advised that he observed no weapons being displayed by any individuals nor had he observed any weapons in any vehicles parked in the vicinity of Everitt and Carver Street. He stated that it was a routine quiet day of patrol in that area.

[redacted] advised that Sergeant [redacted] and Corporal [redacted] had gone to the Windsor Community Center in order to locate [redacted] and in the meantime, he stayed by the Washington School area awaiting their return.

[redacted] advised that he had patrolled the back part of the Windsor Community area and from his vantage point he could see a crowd gathering, but could only physically observe a few people in that crowd. He stated that from his observation as he patrolled the area at the Windsor Center, he observed no display of firearms by any individuals, and observed no firearms visually displayed in the vehicles parked in the area.

[redacted] advised that after the report of the shooting incident, he proceeded towards the vicinity of Benbow and Gorrall believing the shooting was taking place at the Windsor Community Center, however, then realized it was at Everitt and Carver Street and immediately turned and went to that area where he assisted with the arrest of the members of the KKK.

Sergeant [redacted] Tactical Unit, Greensboro, North Carolina Police Department, was interviewed at the Detective Squad Room of the Greensboro Police Department. [redacted] advised that on November 3, 1979, he was in charge of a squad of police officers in the Tactical Unit under the supervision of Lieutenant [redacted]

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At 9:00 AM, [redacted] coordinated with Detective R.H. [redacted] and shortly thereafter he and [redacted] went to the vicinity of a residence on [redacted] Greensboro, North Carolina, where they parked at a 7-11 Store. He stated he then left his vehicle and drove with [redacted] in [redacted]'s vehicle to this residence, however, he could not recall the name of the individual who resided there, however, did recall it was marked by a large Confederate flag being displayed on the porch.

[redacted] advised that he and [redacted] parked behind a beer joint - convenience type grocery store, and from that vantage point [redacted] physically observed the vehicles parked in the area and furnished to [redacted] several license numbers that he wished to have recorded.

[redacted] advised from his observations at that time, approximately 9:30 AM, November 3, 1979, he did not observe any weapons displayed by any individuals in the area of this residence, nor did he observe any visible display of weapons from any vehicles parked in this area.

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After returning to the Greensboro, North Carolina Police Department, [redacted] ran the numbers through the Department of Motor Vehicles to obtain the identify of the owners of these vehicles and thereafter gave a briefing to members of the Tactical Squad regarding what was to occur on that date and the intelligence information he had gathered regarding participants.

Part of the briefing given that morning was by [redacted] the police attorney, and Sergeant [redacted] advised that that briefing was in respect to the authority of the

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police officers during this demonstration, and part of it was regarding the use of a dangerous firearm or terrorising the public with a dangerous firearm.

[redacted] advised that after the briefing, he never had an opportunity to go to Everitt and Carver Street until the reporting of the shooting incident. At this time of his arrival, [redacted] stated that the first thing he did was go a victim who appeared to be kneeling down on a grassy area just off Everitt Street and from immediate examination of the individual, he determined he was deceased. With assistance, [redacted] recalled that victim as being CESAR CAUCE.

At approximately the same time that he was examining this victim, he heard other officers and Officer [redacted] yelling at an individual to put down a gun. He stated that he immediately looked up and saw a white male standing there with a .38 Smith and Wesson revolver which was cocked. He immediately went over to this individual and disarmed him, and took the weapon from him. He stated the gun was a .38 S&W 2-inch barrel and that later examination revealed the weapon had been fired six times. At the time he disarmed this individual, the gun in the hand of this individual was still cocked.

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[redacted] advised he later determined the identity of this individual who he arrested as being [redacted]

During the course of his crime scene search, [redacted] advised that he came upon a blue Honda, license [redacted] that in the back of it had three to four leather or imitation-type leather rifle and shotgun cases. He stated from the way these cases were laying in the vehicle, there was no doubt in his mind that these cases were filled with weapons because they were firm, solid, and resting upon each other and had they not contained weapons or some firm object in the interior of them, they, of course, would have been folded or collapsed and not firmed out.

[redacted] advised he reported this also to Sergeant [redacted] who assigned a member of his squad to guard this car until they could determine whether or not they could remove the weapon from the vehicle. After conference with Captain [redacted] who was in charge at this scene, [redacted] determined that the weapons could not be removed from the vehicle, and

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thereafter he believes one of the wives of one of the demonstrators who was killed, either WALLER or SAMPSON, left the area and drove the vehicle away with the weapons in the back.

Prior to letting this individual depart the area, [] advised he checked a second time with Captain [] and determined that they could not stop the vehicle or remove the weapons from it.

[] advised that in addition to recording the license number of this vehicle, he recorded the license numbers of 14 other vehicles, however, his observation of these vehicles did not show any gun cases or weapons visibly displayed in these vehicles.

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[] advised that he located one of the weapons and that was a shotgun Smith and Wesson which was on the grass up in the area of car number 23 as is displayed on the map and that was turned over to the laboratory people. [] also advised he observed a .38 type derringer in a ladies compact-type bag or cosmetic-type bag laying on the grass adjacent to the body of victim CAUCE. This was also turned over to the laboratory personnel for identification and to be maintained as evidence.

Captain [redacted] Greensboro, North Carolina Police Department, was interviewed at the Detective Squad Room of the Greensboro Police Department.

Captain [redacted] advised that after being notified of the shooting incident at Everitt and Carver Street, Greensboro, North Carolina, on November 3, 1979, he proceeded to the area and shortly after arriving, received information from his sergeants of a Honda vehicle parked on Everitt Street in which there were two or more gun cases. [redacted] advised that he personally observed this vehicle. As best he can recall, there were two cloth or leather-type vinyl gun cases in the vehicle and they obviously contained weapons because they were firm, solid, and resting upon each other.

Sergeant [redacted] and Sergeant [redacted] both reported this to him, and both requested permission to seize the weapons as part of the crime scene search, however [redacted] advised he immediately contacted police attorney, [redacted] and [redacted] questioned him as to whether or not the guns were in cases, or visibly displayed. He advised the guns were in cases and you could not actually see the weapons. [redacted] also wanted to know if the vehicles were locked or open, and [redacted] to the best of his knowledge believed the vehicles were locked at this time of their observation. [redacted] also questioned as to whether or not these weapons were any immediate threat to the officers in that a demonstrator or someone could get access to them and remove them and threaten the officers. [redacted] advised that in his opinion, since the vehicles were locked and in gun cases, they were no immediate threat, however, he still believed that they were weapons that could have been used in this shoot-out on the street.

[redacted] was advised by police attorney [redacted] that he did not believe they could legally seize the weapons at this time, however, if any person attempted to remove the weapons, from the cases or remove them from the vehicle, the police would have the authority to take possession of them.

[redacted] advised that no one attempted to remove the weapons from the vehicle nor attempted to obtain access

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to them other than the wife of one of the dead demonstrators driving off with the vehicle and the weapons in it. Result of examination:

This report supplements the FBI Laboratory report relating to this case dated December 19, 1979. For a detailed listing of the previously submitted weapons, please refer to that report.

No microscopic marks of value for comparison purposes were noted in the following specimens: Q411 through Q422, Q451, Q452, Q485 through Q490, Q492, Q494, Q495, Q498 through Q1035, Q1039, Q1040, Q1045, Q1048 through Q1054, Q1058, Q1061 through Q1077, Q1079, Q1081 through Q1374, Q1376 through Q1417, Q1419 through Q1537 and Q1546 through Q1949. The absence of microscopic marks in the above-listed specimens precludes their association with any of the previously submitted weapons.

The firing pin impression in the Q423 cartridge was identified as having been produced by the K6 derringer. The Q424 cartridge case was identified as having been fired in K6.

Specimens Q425 through Q450 are 5.56mm (.223 Remington caliber) cartridges of both commercial and military manufacture. These cartridges bear extractor and ejector marks. However, the microscopic characteristics present in these marks could not be associated with either of the previously submitted K46 and K15 weapons.

The following specimens bear limited microscopic marks of value for comparison purposes; however, they could not be asso-

ciated with each other or with any of the previously submitted weapons: Q453, Q496, Q497, Q1041, Q1042, Q1055, Q1375, Q1418 and Q1545. The Q454 through Q457 shotshell and the previously submitted Q251 shotshell casing were identified as having been loaded into, extracted and ejected from the same shotgun. It is noted that the previously submitted Q251 shotshell casing was identified as having been fired in the K7 shotgun.

The Q458, Q483 and Q484 metal fragments are too mutilated to determine their source(s) and bear no microscopic marks of value for comparison purposes.

Based on weight, specimen Q459 appears to be a mutilated 00 Buck shot pellet fragment.

The FBI Laboratory maintains no data or records which would identify the source of the Q469 tag.

Twenty-two lead shot pellet fragments were removed from the Q475 through Q481 fence posts. These fragments are too mutilated to determine their original size(s).

Specimen Q482 is a .25 Auto caliber cartridge case of Remington-Peters manufacture. Based on differences in breechface marks and firing pin impressions, it was determined that Q482 could not have been fired in the previously submitted K22 pistol.

The Q491 and Q493 shotshells were identified as having been loaded into, extracted and ejected from a single weapon. However, the microscopic marks utilized in identifying specimens Q491 and Q493 with each other could not be identified with any of the previously submitted shotguns.

The Q1036 through Q1038, Q1043, Q1044, Q1046, Q1047, Q1056, Q1057, Q1059 and Q1060 shotshells were identified as having been loaded into, extracted and ejected from the K8 shotgun.

Specimens Q1078 and Q1080 are .30-30 Winchester caliber cartridges which were identified as having been loaded into, extracted and ejected from a single weapon. It is noted that no .30-30 Winchester caliber weapons have been submitted to the FBI Laboratory in this case.

Specimens Q1541 through Q1544 are .30-30 Winchester caliber cartridge cases which were identified as having been fired in a single weapon. The extractor marks present in the Q1541

through Q1544 cartridge cases are different from the extractor marks in the Q1078 and Q1080 cartridges.

No microscopic marks were noted in any of the submitted ammunition or ammunition components which could be associated with the Q1538 through Q1540 magazines.

No conclusion could be reached when comparing the individual, or jacket, depicted in the Q472 through Q474 photographs with the suspect wearing a denim style jacket depicted in the Qc475 through Qc477 photographs. Insufficient views and the lack of visible identifying characteristics prevented any determination.

It was determined that the Q460 leather jacket is the same style as the jacket worn by the suspect depicted in the Qc475 through Qc477 photographs who is holding a club and shown standing at the rear of a vehicle. One significant characteristic was noted which indicates that Q460 may be the same jacket.

Due to the lack of visible individual identifying characteristics, no conclusion could be reached as to whether Q471 is or is not identical with a similar looking item depicted in the Qc475 through Qc477 photographs.

While the general visible characteristics of the sawed-off shotgun depicted in the Qc475 through Qc477 photographs are similar to those of the K13 shotgun, a positive conclusion could not be reached due to the lack of visible identifying marks.

Nothing else of significance was noted. A photomontage is being furnished for your assistance.

The remaining requested examinations are continuing and you will be subsequently advised of the results and as to the disposition of the submitted items.

On 3/21/80, SA [redacted] United States Air Force (USAF) Office of Special Investigations (OSI), Headquarters Detachment, District 10, Randolph Air Force Base (AFB), San Antonio, Texas, furnished the following information:

On 3/17/80, [redacted] Medina Air Base, San Antonio, Texas, advised he had returned home on leave to Murfreesboro, North Carolina, during February, 1980. While there on 2/22/80, he had a conversation with his former supervisor, Mr. [redacted] Civilian, Director of Transportation, Choanoke Area Development Association (CADA), Murfreesboro, North Carolina. During the conversation, [redacted] informed [redacted] that a research associate for whom [redacted] had worked at the North Carolina Agricultural and Technical University, Greensboro, North Carolina, was married to a spokesman for a Communist Party (NFI). The research associate was identified by [redacted] as Mrs. [redacted] [redacted] worked as a student research assistant for Mrs. [redacted] from 1974 until 1976, while attending college.

[redacted] told [redacted] that he had seen an interview on television during September, 1979, regarding some demonstrations between the Ku Klux Klan and a Communist Party (NFI) which were held at Greensboro, North Carolina. During the demonstrations, gunfire erupted and five Communists were killed. The interview on television featured Mr. [redacted] and [redacted] told [redacted] that Mrs. [redacted] was standing beside him at the time. [redacted] stated he had no idea that Mrs. [redacted] was married to a member of the Communist Party until informed by same by [redacted].

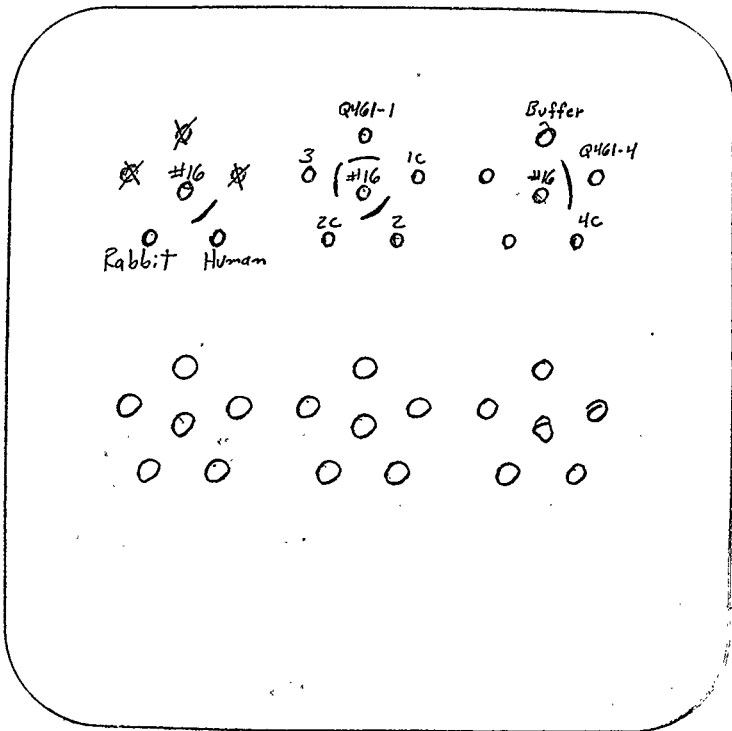

On May 7, 1980, [REDACTED] Greensboro Police Department, Intelligence Unit, Greensboro, North Carolina, furnished the following information:

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On May 2, 1980, a Guilford County Grand Jury meeting at Greensboro, North Carolina, returned a True Bill of Indictment charging [REDACTED]

[REDACTED] all members of the Communist Workers Party (CWP) with one count each with Engaging in a Riot, a felony in the State of North Carolina under North Carolina Section 14-288.2. Punishment for anyone convicted under the statute is a fine of up to \$10,000 or imprisonment of up to five years or both.

The same Grand Jury also charged [REDACTED] both members of the Ku Klux Klan (KKK) in a one count indictment each with Engaging in a Riot in violation of the same statute. The Grand Jury charged [REDACTED] whose affiliation, if any, is unknown, with Inciting a Riot, which is a similar charge under the North Carolina Section 14-228.2 and is punishable under the same provisions as were all others indicted. Bond was set for each subject at \$15,000 cash.

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The indictments of the above individuals came as a result of their participation at an anti-Klan rally held in Greensboro, North Carolina on November 3, 1979, sponsored by the CWP. This rally ended in a confrontation between CWP members and members of the KKK and Nazi Party, resulting in the death of five CWP members and the wounding of several others. Review of film coverage of the actual confrontation

and shootout as well as interviews with pertinent witnesses on the scene reveal active participation on the part of the individuals indicted to such a level to distinguish them from others who were present, but not indicted. The Grand Jury had previously indicted 13 KKK and Nazi Party members, with various charges of murder and inciting a riot as a result of their participation in the November 3, 1979 incident.

As a result of the Guilford County Grand Jury action, charging felonies against a total of 19 individuals, the District Attorney, Guilford County, North Carolina, on May 5, 1980, dismissed misdemeanor charges of Inciting a Riot and Being Armed to the Terror of the Public against CWP members [REDACTED] and [REDACTED].

[REDACTED] These three individuals had been initially arrested on November 3, 1979 in the aftermath of the shootout. Of the three, only [REDACTED] was not subsequently indicted by the Grand Jury.

All the CWP members and KKK member [REDACTED] were arrested on May 2, 1980 and have since made bond. KKK member SHERER is confined in the County Jail, Lincolnton, North Carolina, on unrelated local charges and a detainer was filed against him on May 2, 1980. SIMS has not been arrested, though he is believed to be residing in the Greensboro, North Carolina area.

The National Headquarters of the Communist Workers Party (CWP), previously known as Workers Viewpoint Organization (WVO), is located in New York, New York. The group follows the teachings of Marx, Lenin, and Mao-Tse-Tung. CWP leaders claim to support a revolution in the United States to overthrow the existing economic and political order. CWP members believe their brand of Communism is purer than the Communism of the Soviet Union or the Peoples Republic of China. Five leaders of the North Carolina CWP were killed on November 3, 1979, in Greensboro, North Carolina, in a shootout with members of the Ku Klux Klan and the National Socialist Party of America, also known as Nazi Party.

A characterization of the National Socialist Party of America, also known as The American Nazi Party, is attached as an appendix to this memorandum.

NATIONAL SOCIALIST PARTY
OF AMERICA (NSPA)

On July 27, 1976, Circuit Court of Cook County, Illinois, Judge Walter P. Dahl, lifted a temporary restraining order entered against Frank Collin, leader of the National Socialist Party of America (NSPA) (see appendix), which had prohibited Collin from causing any racial disturbances on Chicago's Southwest side. Judge Dahl's ruling was on a request by the City of Chicago for a permanent injunction to stop Collin from making inflammatory remarks that could lead to violence.

Judge Dahl was quoted in an article in the July 28, 1976, edition of the "Chicago Tribune", section 1, page 5, as saying: "our ability to claim that we live in a free and democratic society rests on our ability to tolerate the actions of people such as the defendant."

Frank Collin was quoted in the same article as saying: "We have now the freedom to pass out our literature without fear of it being seized by the police."

NATIONAL SOCIALIST PARTY OF AMERICA

The National Socialist Party of America (NSPA) is a Chicago area splinter group formed out of the National Socialist White Peoples Party (NSWPP) which is headquartered in Arlington, Virginia. The NSPA has no affiliation with either the national or Chicago chapter of the NSWPP organization. The NSPA adheres to the concept of a "National Socialist" movement similar to that advocated by Adolf Hitler and the German Nazi Party. The NSPA disseminates a line of hatred against Jews, Negroes, and communists through rallies, a locally produced newspaper "New Order," and leaflets. Headquarters of the NSPA are located in Chicago.

APPENDIX

NATIONAL SOCIALIST WHITE PEOPLE'S PARTY (NSWPP) Also known as The American Nazi Party, American Nazis, The World Union of Free Enterprise National Socialists, The George Lincoln Rockwell Party

The American Nazi Party - The World Union of Free Enterprise National Socialists was organized by George Lincoln Rockwell on February 26, 1959, based upon the concept of an international "National Socialist" movement, as espoused by the German Nazi Party, which was headed by Adolf Hitler. On January 1, 1967, the official name of this organization was changed to National Socialist White People's Party. The NSWPP supports and follows the line of hatred against blacks, Jews and communists through various propaganda media, demonstrations, and other publicity-seeking devices for the purpose of seeking a legitimate dominant political party within the United States and in foreign countries. Headquartered in Arlington, Virginia, the NSWPP is currently led by Matthias Koehl, Jr.

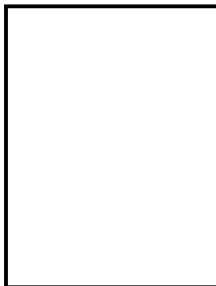



NOTE: The judge in this case has ordered that the prosecutor turn over all reports to the defense by 5/22/80. There is no way SA [redacted] can have the examinations finished by that time. Mr. Greesom has asked that a letter be sent setting out a deadline and the reasons for it.

This case involves a shooting incident between Klansmen and members of the Communist Workers Party in Greensboro on 11/3/79. Reports dated 12/19/79, 1/7/80, 1/14/80 and 1/23/80 have been furnished. The submissions in question involves shotshells and cartridges (Q475 through Q1949) for the purpose of comparing their lead compositions with lead compositions measured in specimens handled in previous submissions. SA [redacted] has been in contact with [redacted] Greensboro PD and Greesom many times since this submission was received in February for the purpose of limiting the number of specimens necessary to examine and to keep them abreast of our progress. As of 5/20/80, [redacted] has 150 specimens left for irradiation. This will be completed by 5/22. He then must evaluate his data and produce a final report. [redacted] advised that the judge is giving the prosecution a "rough time" in this case. He stated that the judge thinks the prosecution is "dragging its feet" and [redacted] hopes that this letter will inform the judge of the magnitude of the lead analysis.
