Asks Probe of Wallgren's Reported \$50,000 Winning

By WILLIAM F. McMENAMIN

WASHINGTON, March 8 (UP).—Sen. Cain (R.-Wash.) today demanded an investigation of reports that Mon C. Wallgren won \$50,000 in a "crap game" with Johnny Meyer, contact-man for millionaire planebuilder Howard Hughes.

Cain raised the issue at the start of what he billed as a 16-hour Senate speech against President Truman's nomination of Wallgren, former Democratic Governor of Washington, to be chairman of the National Security Resources Board.

Wallgren immediately branded the story "entirely false—there's not one word of truth in it." He said he never won "a single dollar, not even a penny," from Meyer and "I know of no such crap game at Palm Springs at all."

Takes Off Shoes

Mrs. Cain, who recently sued for divorce in Tacoma, Wash., was among the gallery spectators as Cain took off his shoes, put on comfortable carpet slippers and started reading from a mountainous pile of documents.

The Washington Republican began by repeating his previous charges that Wallgren is "soft" toward Communists and generally incompetent to hold the \$14,000-a-year defense post.

Then he dropped his bombshell. He demanded that the Senate Armed Services Committee subpoena columnist Drew Pearson to

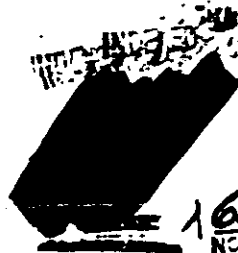
"Pearson told me that Wallgren won \$50,000 in a crap game from Johnny Meyer in Palm Springs, Calif., about three years ago," Cain said.

ured two years ago in a Senate investigation of aircraft contracts awarded by the U. S. Air Force.

Cain quoted Pearson as saying the FBI had started and then dropped an investigation of the alleged crap game and that some FBI officials thought it might have been "linked with a plane contract."

Describing Pearson as a man with "a magnificent disregard for accuracy," he remarked:

"I think the committee should interrogate a man who talks this way over the phone. Pearson should eat his words if they are not true."

Cain's mention of Meyer caused a stir in the chamber. It was Meyer's testimony that helped lead to the perjury conviction of Maj. Gen. Bennett E. Meyers, Air Force procurement officer.

Referring to Wallgren's close friendship with Truman, Cain said it is "time the Senate served notice that government by cronies must end."

Informed by phone of Cain's speech, Wallgren told the United Press:

"In the first place, I don't think Pearson said that.

"I don't know where such stories come from. The entire thing is false. There's not one word of truth in it. I know of no such game. I didn't win a single dollar, not even a penny, from Mr. Meyer."

Wallgren went on to say that he considers the whole thing part of Cain's "personal" attack on him.

Wallgren and Meyer Nightclub Cronies

Men Wallgren and Johnny Meyer, high-powered Page 1 press agent and tab-singer, were a pair of gay birds in the late spots during 1946 and 1947, according to Cafe Society habitués.

While Wallgren was Governor of the State of Washington he was frequently seen in the company of Meyer at bars and cafes here. It was a running gag in the supper clubs that the capital of Washington had been moved from Olympia to El Morocco.

Meyer, the perfect host, always picked up the tab. Frequently the rotund publicity man enlisted visiting Hollywood beauties and New York partygirls to lend the feminine touch to these late gatherings.

Nightclubbers said Johnny's interest in Wallgren was not purely social, but was centered on Wallgren's direct pipeline to the White House.

TWA Airlines, which lacked a trans-Pacific link to complete its dream of circling the globe, held an option to purchase Northwest Airlines. Wallgren, who falls from the Northwest was instrumental in obtaining for that line the franchise which TWA was unable to get for itself.

However, it turned out that Meyer's work was wasted. Before TWA could pick up its option, the stock market picture changed considerably and TWA lost its interest in Northwest.

On April 15, 1948, an agent of this office attended the East Los Angeles Lions Club to deliver a speech concerning the Bureau's work, and Representative HOLLIFIELD, being a member of the Lions Club, dropped in for a few moments in connection with his forthcoming campaign for re-election to Congress.

He voluntarily answered questions of the men assembly. One of the questions asked the Representative was, "Why did you vote as you did on the Hollywood writers?" to which HOLLIFIELD replied, "I am glad you asked that -- it will be used against me by my political opponents." HOLLIFIELD went on to explain that the Un-American Affairs Committee has been in existence for many years and has never proposed one piece of legislation. He stated that this is the object of committees of Congress, i.e., the proposal of legislation, and that the Un-American Affairs Committee had cost millions of dollars and had produced nothing to date.

He continued that in his opinion the Committee violated the basic American principle that a person was not able to confront his accusers; also that the Committee "has smeared thousands of Communists and pinkos." HOLLIFIELD stated that at the time HOWARD HUGHES was being heard by a committee that his attorney was at his side and the two of them asked questions of HUGHES' accusers.

HOLLIFIELD summarized by stating that he voted as he did to show his disapproval of the Committee's processes and that every man should be able to defend himself.

He then digressed and stated that if someone were arrested by a policeman in East Los Angeles and taken before a Justice's Court, he would be entitled to a hearing, but that this was not the case in the instance of the Hollywood writers.

To justify his stand on Communists, he said that he voted favorably on the proceedings against EUGENE DENNIS, HANS EISLER and one other Communist. However, these three did not take, or at least refused to take, advantage of the recourse

ANTI-RED PRODUCER SUED BY BIT PLAYER

Breach of Contract Action Against Fagan Mentions Hughes and G. L. K. Smith Names

Names of Howard Hughes and Gerald L. K. Smith, mentioned in a \$2500 breach-of-contract suit filed yesterday in Municipal Court by Viola Wray, onetime film bit player, against Myron C. Fagan, former New York play producer.

Fagan caused a storm of controversy early in 1948 when he charged that his anti-Communist production, "Thieves Paradise," was flosed by Red tactics at Hollywood's El Patio Theater.

In a curtain speech he gave at the reopening of the play April 12, 1948, Fagan accused theatrical Reds and fellow travelers of sabotaging the production. He named 140 members of the theatrical world as Communists or persons with Red party tendencies.

Short Run

"Thieves Paradise" first opened in Hollywood on Dec. 20, 1947, and closed after a six-day run. It dealt with Communist treachery in a mythical Balkan country.

The production ran less than a month after its reopening. Miss Wray contends in her suit, prepared by Asy. Mitchell Appel, that on May 20, 1948, Fagan sold her a one-third interest in the play for \$2500.

The action claims that Fagan allegedly told the plaintiff that he was negotiating with Millionaire Howard Hughes for the play's production. The producer, according to the complaint, refused to sign contracts offered by Hughes "because they tied him down too much."

Denial Made

Hughes' attorneys denied that their client had any contact or dealings with Fagan. Mitchell contends that Fagan and Hughes not only was involved in production of the play but also in subsequent film to be made.

Although Fagan produced the plaintiff production of the Federal play during the season, the suit contends that the defendant has dissipated his money and spent time since 1948, in lecturing and writing pamphlets to be printed by Fagan, following the closing of "Thieves Paradise." A member of anti-Communist League published by the National Guild, of which Fagan is described as national president, the suit also quotes a letterheadedly written by Fagan. This letter states:

"It is just barely possible that because of a crazy stunt Gerald L. K. Smith pulled at the Republican convention with his curtain speech which he pulled and sold there without my knowledge or consent, we had a great break."

"The press is after the and I get a guarantee from the right kind of people. It should get us the necessary support to go right New York with the play-chute and even a subsidy from the booking office."

Whistapping Hinted

"Keep this very confidential. Viola, that's why I wouldn't tell you on the phone. I know that my phone is tapped and I believe yours is, too."

During the controversy over the play's run at the El Patio, Fagan announced that Red influences were working against his career. He said, prior to the play's reopening in April, that he was informed that "through" because of his "blackout" in producing the play, he gained the advice of wing elements.

On June 4, 1948

[redacted] telephoned this office to relate that on election day DORE SCHARY and his legman, SHEPHERD GRAUBE, had made a collection from various people on the R.K.O. lot for HELEN GAHAGAN DOUGLAS stating, "We need the money now". Those solicited were asked for from \$50.00 to \$100.00, depending on the salary scale. [redacted] no one refused because the head of the Studio was doing the asking. [redacted] protested against the donation on the basis that he did not want to see DOUGLAS reelected, but he gave SCHARY a check because of SCHARY's position.

[redacted] also telephoned that he felt this solicitation might be for the purpose of swinging the election and pointed out that HELEN GAHAGAN DOUGLAS allegedly had beat her opponent, WALLACE BRADEN, by just a few hundred votes and that BRADEN is asking for a recount.

Also on June 4th this office received a telephone call from

[redacted] who related that DORE SCHARY, Executive in Charge of Production, has been conducting a pressure political campaign among the writers at R.K.O. on behalf of HELEN GAHAGAN DOUGLAS. She said some writers have given as much as \$1,500.00 because the request came from the front office. SHEPHERD GRAUBE, who has been on the R.K.O. payroll at a large salary as a Director but has never directed a picture since his arrival a year ago, was placed in charge of the soliciting.

Neely Asks Justice Dept. For Wire-Tap Information

Copy of Shimon Report on Hughes Case Sought; Fay, McInerney Confer

Chairman Matthew Neely of the Senate District Committee will press the Justice Department this week for a copy of the super-secret Shimon wire-tapping report.

The report involves the investigation into charges that Police Sgt. Joseph Shimon, now of the Fourteenth Precinct, engaged in wire-tapping activities during Senate investigation in 1947 of air and movie magnate Howard Hughes. The Justice Department now has the report.

United States Attorney General Morris Fay disclosed last night he discussed the Shimon report last week with James M. McInerney, chief of the Criminal Division of the Justice Department.

No Decision Planned

No decision was reached, Fay said, and the consultation between the two men was not held for the purpose of reaching a decision. Senator Neely (D., W. Va.) has not asked him for the report, and Fay said he does not have a copy.

Senator Neely has asked Walter Robert J. Barrick, supervising police, for Barrick's copy. It is reported wanting to release it to the Senator providing the Justice Department gives its consent.

McInerney, confirming the meeting with Fay, said last night that Peyton Ford, the assistant to Attorney General J. Edward McGrath, would have to give consent.

The Senator made his request to Barrett last week. Now in West Virginia, Neely is expected back in Washington Tuesday.

Reached in West Virginia yesterday, he said he had "no comment."

But according to highly confidential sources, Neely already has received some information concerning the contents of the report.

Three witnesses involved in this information are persons whose identities are believed to have said that Shimon engaged in wire-tapping activities in the Carlton and Marlborough hotels during the 1947 investigation of Hughes.

Multimillionaire Hughes was investigated by the Senate War Investigating Committee. The investigation led to charges and countercharges between Hughes and Senator Owen Brewster (R., Me.).

Neely's position in the Shimon report is that there may be some material in it that concerns the Senate District Committee if police were engaged in wire-tapping activities.

Lieutenant Shimon, from the middle of last year, was assigned as chief investigator in the United States Attorney's office in September, 1948. Shimon was transferred to the FBI precinct according to Mike Barrett, at the time the transfer was made. The facts found in the report...

On the evening of June 21, the Attorney General sent for me. On arrival in his office, he indicated that the Department had received, about a year ago, a "wire-tapping report" indicating that Lieut. Shimon of the Washington Police Department and others had allegedly tapped the telephones of Howard Hughes on behalf of the War Investigating Committee of the Senate;

[REDACTED] The Attorney General states that apparently this report was merely initialed into the files in the Department and had never been sent to the FBI. He indicated a desire to have an investigation made of this matter.

I pointed out to the Attorney General that investigations concerning wire tapping were not normally handled by the FBI but rather were the responsibility of the Federal Communications Commission under the Communications Act.

About this time Peyton Ford, whom the Attorney General had called, came to the office with the file on this matter. The Attorney General stated that he did not desire the Bureau to conduct an investigation of wire tapping as such, that he did desire that the Bureau conduct an investigation for the purpose of determining who hired Shimon and the others engaged in this wire tapping, by whom was he paid, to whom did he turn over the results of the wire tapping. In this regard the Attorney General stated that Shimon denied that he had been employed by the War Investigating Committee; however, two others working with Shimon told that they were working for the War Investigating Committee. The Attorney General further stated that he had a very strong letter from Senator Ferguson, who was now demanding he be cleared, in which letter he vigorously stated he had no part in having any wire tapping done as Chairman of the War Investigating Committee, that he had no knowledge of any kind with reference to such activities and flatly denying every and all connections with such activities or knowledge of such activities and stating that he felt in view of the charges made by Drew Pearson that he had a right to have his name cleared. Senator Brewster also denied any knowledge concerning this matter.

The Attorney General stated that he had been a minority member of the Committee during the Eightieth Congress when this activity was alleged to have taken place and that he had no knowledge of any such activity.

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In view of this, he stated that he felt that the Bureau would have to make an investigation not of wire tapping per se but as to the activities on behalf of the Senate Committee.

The Attorney General wanted me to take the file and review it. I told him that I could not take the file; that I wanted to talk to the Director about this matter before he was given any reply in view of the fact that the Bureau did not normally conduct this type of investigation. The Attorney General again reiterated that he felt that it would be imperative that such an investigation be made and that he did not want it made by anyone other than the Bureau.

I am making arrangements to obtain the file from Peyton Ford for review.

The Washington Field Office will be orally instructed as to the nature of the investigation and every effort will be made to complete the investigation and get out of this case as rapidly as possible.

The following investigation was conducted by Special Agents [redacted] and [redacted]. This investigation is predicated upon telephonic instructions from the Bureau to Special Agent in Charge GUY HOTTEL on the morning of June 22, 1950, instructing that an investigation be instigated to determine who hired subject and others to engage in reported wire tapping in July 1947, concerning the HOWARD HUGHES case, which was being investigated by the Senate War Investigating Committee, headed by Senators HOMER FERGUSON of Michigan and OWEN BREWSTER of Maine.

It is alleged by Columnist DREW PEARSON that subject, while employed as a Lieutenant with the Metropolitan Police Department, installed a wire tap on the telephone of HOWARD HUGHES, head of Transworld Airlines when HUGHES was summoned to Washington for a Senate hearing.

At this time, [redacted] discussed briefly the investigation that he and [redacted] had conducted in instant matter and advised that his report in instant matter was very complete and he could furnish no other information of value. [redacted] was very cooperative and stated he had been instructed by MAJOR BARRETT to offer all assistance in instant case and to make available any members of the Police Department who have been previously interviewed by [redacted] and [redacted] during the police investigation in instant matter were made available by [redacted] and were interviewed by Agents [redacted] and [redacted]. [redacted] further reported that when this individual was contacted at the Carlton Hotel, he was dressed in a business suit and that when he was first contacted, this man told SHIMON that "everything is O.K." b7c/d

[redacted] and SHIMON then reportedly went to a room in the Carlton Hotel on one of the upper floors, the exact number of which [redacted] could not recall, at which place Lieutenant SHIMON removed the cover of the telephone box and showed him two screws on which to attach wires which were in turn attached to a listening headset containing one earphone. [redacted] was also instructed to place a microphone at the bottom of door to an adjoining room which was in turn connected to an amplifier in a portable radio case. [redacted] described this microphone as being the type used by deaf people as a hearing aid.

It was also reported by [redacted] that from general talk around the office two or three weeks before he actually went to the Carlton Hotel, that Lieutenant SHIMON had intimated going to Capitol Hill for a big assignment for "the" Senate investigating committee. [redacted] further reported that the name of HOWARD HUGHES had not been mentioned until he went to the Carlton Hotel and to the best of his recollection, Lieutenant SHIMON mentioned "HOWARD HUGHES investigation" while en route to the Carlton Hotel.

[redacted] stated that after these verbal instructions by SHIMON, he accompanied SHIMON back to SHIMON'S office in the U. S. Attorney's Office and that SHIMON directed him to return to the Carlton Hotel at approximately 6:00 p.m. that evening, which he did and remained there until approximately 11:00 p.m., but because no conversation was overheard, the plant was discontinued at this time. [redacted] stated that he thought the room in the Carlton Hotel was occupied by bodyguards of HOWARD HUGHES. b7c/d

The following morning, Lieutenant SHIMON telephonically instructed [redacted] return to the Carlton Hotel that afternoon and resume the telephonic surveillance. [redacted] did this and SHIMON arrived at the hotel room shortly after dark. There had been no activity on the wire at this time and upon SHIMON'S arrival, he stated that the "advance men" had all moved to a suite at the Mayflower Hotel, that HOWARD HUGHES was expected there, and that he could go home. It should be pointed out at this time that [redacted] advised that in his original statement to the Police Department he had stated that the unknown man believed to be from the telephone company had been in the room on the first night after he [redacted] and SHIMON had been to the room in the afternoon. [redacted] at this time, stated that to the best of his knowledge, the unknown man had been there when he and SHIMON had first gone to the Carlton Hotel, and that he was quite possibly in error in this regard in his statement to the Police Department. [redacted] further stated that he had received specific instructions from SHIMON to take down all conversations on the phone in longhand as rapidly as possible and at no time, either at the Carlton or the subsequent tap at the Mayflower Hotel, should he use discretion in what information to take down. He was instructed to take everything down possible, to be particularly careful of figures and that there was absolutely no indication from SHIMON'S instructions that the purpose of the tap was to locate any individual or individuals, and that it was for general coverage.

[redacted] stated that he was instructed shortly after the Carlton Hotel coverage to report activities from a telephone tap at the Mayflower Hotel and that he went to a room in the Mayflower Hotel the next day with Lieutenant SHIMON, at which time SHIMON installed the same apparatus on the telephone box. At this time, however, no microphone was used in the room. He further advised that he personally assisted SHIMON in lowering a microphone in an air duct which they cut open above a room he believed to be occupied by some of HUGHES' representatives. [redacted] continued that while he and SHIMON were installing this microphone in their shirt sleeves, they were observed by a hotel employee whom [redacted] believed to be a watchman, and that this hotel employee remarked that it appeared Lieutenant SHIMON and [redacted] were having difficulty on that particular job, but that this employee did not challenge their actions.

After the installation was completed, [redacted] stated that he overheard conversations on a telephone being used by a

man named SLACK and a man named DIETRICH (ph) and from the conversations, it was apparent that these two men were employed by HOWARD HUGHES. [redacted] further reported that he also heard one of these individuals telephone Senator FERGUSON or BREWSTER, he cannot recall definitely which name, but did recall that the Senator resided in a hotel, and that after writing up this particular conversation, Lieutenant SHIMON, to whom the report was turned over, remarked laughingly, "He (or they) will get a kick out of this," and that Lieutenant SHIMON left the room for the alleged purpose of calling someone. It should also be noted that Lieutenant SHIMON asked [redacted] if he had made copies of his reports and as a matter of fact, [redacted] turned over to Lieutenant SHIMON his penciled notations, as well as the typewritten report. b7c

S. Attorney's Office to work on this job. He stated, however, that the longer the job ran, the more of the opinion he was that quite possibly SHIMON was doing this without any official instructions.

Attorney's Office and that around the time of the HUGHES investigation, the calls from GRUENWALD to SHIMON were accelerated. [redacted] stated that he became tired and worried about this setup at which time he told SHIMON that he would not work on such an assignment again for him. [redacted] stated that he was at the Mayflower Hotel for approximately a week. [redacted] was very cooperative during the interview and the above are the most pertinent of the facts that he furnished. He corroborated generally the information that he had furnished in his original statement to officials of the Metropolitan Police Department, a photostatic copy of which is being enclosed with this letter. b7c

It is believed important to set out that it is the opinion of [redacted] which opinion, however, cannot be substantiated that SHIMON in fact was working through GRUENWALD for some airline which was competing against HOWARD HUGHES' airline and it is the further opinion of [redacted] that SHIMON was not seeking the whereabouts of any individual but was attempting to gain all information

[REDACTED] denied making the statement that JOE SHIMON received \$1,000 for every telephone tap he installed as reported by [REDACTED]

It was also reported by [REDACTED] that he thought GRUNEWALD was a contact man between SHIMON and Senator BRIDGES but he could furnish no specific information for reaching such a conclusion.

[REDACTED] Mayflower Hotel, advised on June 24, 1950, that he had been contacted in July of 1947 by Lieutenant SHIMON of the Washington Police Department for the purpose of Lieutenant SHIMON's obtaining a room at the Mayflower Hotel, and that because he thought Lieutenant SHIMON was acting on an official police case, he made arrangements for Lieutenant SHIMON to get a room. [REDACTED] stated he had no information relative to how Lieutenant SHIMON used the room and suggested that [REDACTED] of the hotel, be contacted because [REDACTED] and [REDACTED] of the Police Department had contacted [REDACTED] in locating hotel registrations of Lieutenant SHIMON.

On June 26, 1950, Special Agent [REDACTED] contacted [REDACTED] Mayflower Hotel,

and was advised that [REDACTED] has in his possession photostatic copy of registration card #613510 for JOSEPH W. DIMOND, Roanoke, Virginia, who registered July 30, 1947, and who checked out on August 11, 1947. The registration card reflects that rooms 733 and 734 were occupied at a rate of \$16 per day. First ledger account #254907 and last ledger account #275238 reflect payments were made on August 8, 1947, in the sum of \$160 and on August 11, 1947, in the sum of \$32 making a total of \$192.

[REDACTED] stated that he and [REDACTED] Washington Police Department, spent several days examining recordak films in order to locate the foregoing records. It was also reported that Mr. SLACK and Mr. DIETRICH, connected with the HOWARD HUGHES Company, had occupied adjoining rooms to room 734 occupied by the subject. A plan of a typical floor of the Mayflower Hotel showing the location of these rooms is attached.

[REDACTED] of the Washington Police Department, was telephonically contacted at [REDACTED] to ascertain if the Washington Police Department had been formally requested by any Senate Investigating Committee or Congressional source for the services of Lieutenant SHIMON. [REDACTED] advised that he had received a letter of commendation from Senator BRIDGES commending the work of Lieutenant SHIMON for services performed. [REDACTED] was unable to furnish the date of this letter. However, in his opinion it was in the latter part of 1947. At this time [REDACTED] stated that this letter and other Congressional correspondence relative to SHIMON were available at the Police Department under his supervision, and as he would return early Monday morning, June 26, 1950 he would cooperate fully with the Bureau in making these available. [REDACTED] stated that he at no time ordered SHIMON or any other member of his force to conduct any investigation relative to HOWARD HUGHES. b7c

On Monday morning, June 26, 1950, a conference was held in [REDACTED] office by Agents [REDACTED] of the Metropolitan Police Department, [REDACTED] Metropolitan Police Department and [REDACTED]. At this time [REDACTED] reiterated his previous statement that at no time, particularly in 1947, had he received any request from Senator BREWSTER, FERGUSON, or any other Senators or members of Congress to assign SHIMON or any other police officers on any assignment dealing with the HOWARD HUGHES investigation. b7c
