India Accepts Surrender In East, Will Call Truce

THE Pakistani commander in East Pakistan surrendered his forces to India yesterday. India then announced that it would initiate unilaterally a cease-fire on the fronts in and near West Pakistan at 8 o'clock tonight.

Meanwhile, China charged that Indian planes had violated its territory, and warned India and Russia, which supports New Delhi, that "he who plays with fire gets burned by fire."

At the United Nations, India-backed by the threat of a Soviet veto—stymied Security Council peace resolutions, urging that its cease-fire move be given a chance to work.

While welcoming India's announcement of a cease-fire, the White House continued to maintain that India had been the aggressor in the conflict with Pakistan.

President Press Secretary Ron Ziegler told newsmen here that "the way you avoid war is not starting up the tanks and not putting bullets in the rifles."

By Miguel Acoca MADRID, Dec. 16 (WP)—Generalissimo Francisco Franco has finally confirmed what everybody in Spain has been talking about for months—that his frowning granddaughter, Maria del Carmen Martinez Borja Franco, 20, is going to marry Prince Alfonso de Borbon y Dampierre, 35, grandson of Spain's last king and first cousin of Spain's future king.

at one time was first in the line of succession to the throne abdicated by Alfonso XIII in 1931. Don Jaime, a deaf-mute, yielded his claim to his younger brother, Don Juan de Borbon.

Don Juan Carlos himself was reported to have been quite distressed when the marriage was first brought up but he made no protest. His wife, Princess Sophie of Greece, however, was said to be furious because she feels that it will further weaken her husband's position.

### 100,000 Workers At Volkswagen Return to Work

WOLFSBURG, Germany, Dec.  
 16 (AP).—Approximately 100,000  
 workers in six Volkswagen  
 plants ended a nine-day enforced  
 vacation and returned to their  
 jobs today, the company said.

Like other German auto firms,  
 Volkswagen had curtailed opera-  
 tions because of parts shortages  
 caused by a strike of metal-  
 workers in southwest Germany.  
 The three-week-long strike was  
 settled this week.

Resumption of work at  
 Volkswagen coincided with the  
 announcement of a new wage  
 contract providing a 7.5-percent  
 increase for the 13 months end-  
 ing Jan. 31, 1973. Management  
 said that agreement was reached

### Free Two of Three Suspects

British Search Jet to Beirut,  
 Seek Jordanian's Attackers

LONDON, Dec. 16 (UPI).—The  
 police held a Beirut-bound air-  
 liner on the ground for nearly  
 four hours today during a  
 nationwide hunt for the men who  
 shot at Jordan's Ambassador to  
 London with a machine gun yester-  
 day.

In Geneva, a parcel bomb  
 delivered to the Jordanian  
 mission to the European head-  
 quarters of the United Nations  
 exploded on opening, seriously in-  
 juring two Swiss policemen and  
 a fireman. The ambassador was  
 unharmed.

Officials at Heathrow Airport  
 said that policemen had search-  
 ed "every inch" of the British  
 Overseas Airways Corp. VC-10  
 jet and all 108 passengers.

They took off a Palestinian  
 couple, Mr. and Mrs. Imajin W.  
 Sleman, and questioned them at  
 a police station. They were later  
 released.

A man picked up about the  
 same time at Gatwick, London's  
 other major airport, was kept in  
 custody.

A BOAC spokesman called the  
 search "the most intense and  
 thorough we have ever had in  
 one of our aircraft." It was part  
 of the hunt for two men who  
 attacked Ambassador Zaki al-  
 Rifai as he drove to work.

The assassination attempt  
 came less than three weeks after  
 gunmen in Cairo killed Premier  
 Wasfi Tell of Jordan.

Mr. Rifai, a close friend of  
 King Hussein, was resting com-  
 fortably under armed guard to-  
 day at Fitzroy Nuffield Clinic  
 after surgery on a wounded  
 hand. His wife said another  
 operation would be performed  
 next week.

The police also guarded King  
 Hussein's two sons when they  
 left on a Royal Jordanian Air-  
 lines jet for Amman on their  
 year-end holidays. Prince Ab-  
 dullah, 9, and Prince Faisal, 8,  
 attend private schools outside  
 London.

In the search of the jet for  
 Beirut, airport officials said they  
 had been stunned by its intensi-  
 ty. Christmas gifts were taken

### Egypt Sets Aims For New Jarring Mideast Mission

UNITED NATIONS, N.Y., Dec.  
 16 (UPI).—Egypt said today it  
 was "not going back to square  
 one" in the peace mission of  
 Swedish Ambassador Gunnar V.  
 Jarring, which the General As-  
 sembly asked to be reactivated.

An Egyptian mission spokes-  
 man said that Foreign Minister  
 Mahmoud Elaid, at his meeting  
 with Mr. Jarring yesterday, told  
 the Swedish mediator that he  
 should resume his mission on the  
 basis of the assembly resolution  
 approved on Monday.

That resolution, stressing the  
 "inadmissibility" of acquisition of  
 territory by force, in effect again  
 called for withdrawal of Israeli  
 forces from Arab territories oc-  
 cupied in the June, 1967, war.  
 It also called for a reactiva-  
 tion of the Jarring mission, sus-  
 pended since last March after  
 Israel failed to give specific com-  
 mitments in reply to a February  
 memorandum from Mr. Jarring.  
 Egypt gave such commitments.

### MP Charges South Africa With Spying Says Businessman in London Heads Ring

LONDON, Dec. 16 (UPI).—A  
 Labor member of Parliament  
 accused a British businessman to-  
 day of being the head of a South  
 African spy ring in London and  
 called for a government investiga-  
 tion.

James Wellbeloved, the MP,  
 said the ring had been estab-  
 lished by South Africa's Bureau  
 of State Security (BOSS) to gather  
 political and economic informa-  
 tion and to infiltrate anti-apar-  
 thoid groups in Britain.

"There was one British citizen  
 in particular, an ex-member of  
 the South African police, who  
 returned to this country under  
 orders to set up this network,"  
 Parliament was told. Mr. Well-  
 beloved identified the man as  
 John Ferrers Smith, the head of  
 a business consultant firm.

Mr. Smith was not available  
 for comment, but his attorney,  
 Lewis Ruskin, denied the charges.  
 "Mr. Smith... totally denies the  
 allegation made in the House  
 of Commons," he said. "He is  
 certainly not employed by the  
 South African security services.  
 He has never worked for BOSS."

The MP said he would submit  
 a dossier on the activities of  
 BOSS in Britain to the Home Of-  
 fice for investigation.

Mr. Wellbeloved said that law-  
 abiding organizations had been  
 infiltrated by spies and informers  
 and their premises had been  
 broken into and their documents  
 stolen.

He said also that victims "have  
 another fear—that they cannot  
 go to the police of this country  
 because they believe the police  
 are cooperating with the security  
 services of the South African  
 government."

He noted, however, that "many  
 of the activities I am complain-  
 ing about are not a breach of  
 law," but the Home Office should  
 still decide if these activities are  
 "desirable."

### Ulster Gunmen Hit Soldier, Then Fire on Ambulance

BELFAST, Dec. 16 (UPI).—  
 Gunmen critically wounded a  
 soldier in the Roman Catholic  
 Falls Road area today, then  
 shot up the civilian ambulance  
 taking him to the hospital, the  
 British Army said.

Other gunmen wounded a po-  
 liceman escorting a group of  
 schoolchildren across a busy  
 street in the Catholic Ardoyne  
 area.

An army spokesman said the  
 soldier was hit when three  
 snipers fired on a patrol in early-  
 morning darkness. Bullets also  
 raked the ambulance, but caused  
 no further injuries, he said.

The police officer was nicked  
 in the neck by bullets fired from  
 a passing car, but "was able to  
 sit up and have a cup of tea  
 afterward," the spokesman said.  
 None of the children he was  
 escorting was hurt.

Gunmen also fired at three po-  
 licemen in downtown London-  
 derry, scattering Christmas  
 shoppers but causing no injuries.  
 The attacks came as the gov-  
 ernment announced the resig-  
 nation of Sir Edmund Compton,

### Iceland to Widen Fishing Limits

PARIS, Dec. 16 (AP).—Iceland  
 formally notified the Council of  
 Europe today that it will extend  
 its fishery limits from 12 to 50  
 miles as from Sept. 1, 1972.

Britain and West Germany,  
 whose trawlers habitually fish in  
 Icelandic waters, immediately  
 protested against the move and  
 called for international negotia-  
 tions or arbitration.

Icelandic Foreign Minister  
 Einar Agunsson said Iceland had  
 acted because drawn-out negotia-  
 tions had failed to reach any  
 agreement and "could continue  
 for years" while intense fishing  
 by British and West German  
 trawlers was continuing "to the  
 detriment of Iceland's only nat-  
 ural resource."

In Dublin today, Irish Republic  
 Premier Jack Lynch renewed his  
 call for a United Nations force  
 to patrol his country's border  
 with Northern Ireland.

Mr. Lynch first requested UN  
 troops Monday in reply to Brit-  
 ish complaints that gunmen were  
 using the Irish Republic as a  
 sanctuary. Mr. Lynch today de-  
 scribed this criticism as an effort  
 "to conceal the failure of British  
 policy in the North by attempt-  
 ing to shift the focus of atten-  
 tion to the border area."

In Belfast, police briefly se-  
 aled off the downtown area after  
 a bomb and fire damaged a  
 factory store owned by Lord  
 Mayor Joseph Cairns, but caused  
 no injuries. Police said the  
 streets were closed to allow fire-  
 men to fight the blaze in the  
 store specializing in fireplaces.

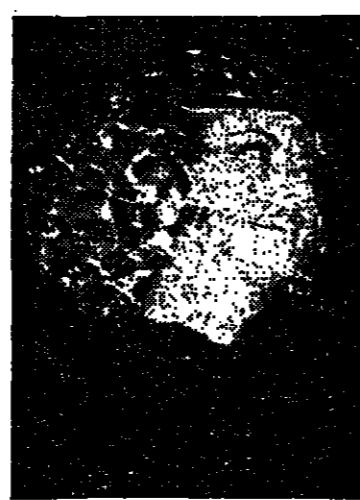

And you can get some idea what people do with themselves by looking up the gross national product (GNP), the unemployment rate, the crime rate, the per-capita income, the housing starts and the consumer loan volume.

It counts the "soup, vacuum cleaners, washing machines" and other things a housewife buys, "not how clean her home and linen may be."

Maurice Stans With Gun and Flyrod

NEW YORK, Dec. 16 (NYT)—When President Nixon told American business about the wage-price freeze on Aug. 15, one of the last to hear was his No. 1 boy on American Business, Secretary of Commerce Maurice H. Stans. "Come fishing," read the sign on the secretary's office door. He and his son were baiting the treaculant lake trout that troop through the waters of Great Bear Lake, which straddles the Arctic Circle in Canada's Northwest Territories.

"It became a challenge," he said, "to get one of every species, always an adult male. Now the Stans African Hall has one of the finest collections anywhere. There has been criticism of my killing animals, but if I'm wrong, so is every natural history museum."

Growing up in Minnesota, Stans was introduced fairly early to the muskellunge and black bass of Western Ontario. "One day I caught two 35-pound muskies," he said. "Another time, when I was in business, I was fishing at a camp you reached through lakes with five portages. One day here comes an Indian by canoe carrying an urgent message. It said, 'Telephone by Thursday at the latest and it was already Saturday. I tore the message up. My son said I caught and raised 50 fish and never heard a telephone. That's one reason I go on safaris.'"

Stans manages to keep his cool regarding the "salmon emergency" that has anglers like Ted Williams sore at the Danish netters who are taking salmon in the open seas of Davis Strait west of Greenland. The secretary, whose department took on this issue in October along with a variety of projects of the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration, seems confident that an accommodation can be reached with the Danes before they do serious damage to the salmon supply.

Including the Jets—and five should San Francisco fall on Sunday to beat Detroit and win the title in its division. The others are the Lions, who have an angry owner in Bill Ford; the St. Louis Cardinals, one of whose players was just suspended for having insulted an owner, and the Oakland Raiders, who are angry at themselves.

The Jets, working up to Sunday's final game here against Cincinnati in a most leisurely manner, have no reason for soul-searching. They attribute their failure to battle Miami and Baltimore for a division title entirely to the loss by injury of their leading offensive and defensive players, Joe Namath and John Elliott.

But is that excuse too comfortable? The Colts and Dolphins have young teams with depth and speed, the foundations for dynasties. Beginning Monday, coach Weeb Ewbank must determine whether the Jets' lightweight defensive line will do, if the offensive line backers are wearing out and the defensive backs are too numerous and too anonymous. He might also ponder the wisdom of committing another season to a quarterback with fragile knees.
