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Tories Reduce Taxes, Endorse Inflation Curb

By Anthony Lewis LONDON, July 19 (NYT)—The Conservative government took a bold gamble today on a new policy intended to recharge the slumping British economy and at the same time reduce inflation.

East Bengali Leader to Be Put on Trial

Mujibur Could Get The Death Penalty LONDON, July 19 (NYT)—President Yahya Khan of Pakistan said in an interview published here today that Sheikh Mujibur Rahman, the East Bengali leader, would be put on trial "very soon."

The trial would be by a military court, he said, and would be held in secret. He did not give the precise charge, but he said it would carry the death penalty—subject to confirmation by himself as president.

The interview appeared in this morning's Financial Times of London. It was by Neville Maxwell, a former correspondent of the Times of London.

Sheikh Mujibur headed the Awami League, which won virtually every East Pakistani seat in last winter's Pakistani elections.

The president said his government was considering withdrawing troops from the Commonwealth.

He contrasted Britain with the United States, which has not conditioned aid on any political solution.

There was a stern warning to India in the interview. Gen. Yahya said he knew there were 24 camps in India to train Bengali guerrillas.

Their function, he said, would be to repress the 6 to 7 million refugees now in India that make sure returning refugees suffered no penalties.

Jordan Asserts It Caught All But 200 Guerrillas

By Eric Pace AMMAN, Jordan, July 19 (NYT)—Jordan's premier, Wasil Tell, said today that his troops had "rounded up" 2,500 Arab commandos in the past week and that only about 200 remained at liberty.

Speaking at a news conference, Mr. Tell also said that "subversive" commando groups such as the leftist Popular Front for the Liberation of Palestine will not be allowed to operate from Jordan from now on.

The news conference, held mostly in Arabic, seemed meant to proclaim to the Jordanian public and the Arab world that the Jordanian government triumphed in last week's fighting in north Jordan.

Mr. Tell, who is known for his toughness, spoke with newsmen for 75 minutes at a heavily guarded television station at this village seven miles south of Amman.

By some accounts, however, some of the commandos were being held in other places, including a camp near Amman airport.

Mr. Tell indicated that the captives were being processed and divided into the categories of "good" and "bad."

Israel opened its arms to guerrillas who crossed the Jordan River rather than face the Jordanian tanks and troops hunting them down on the East Bank.

An Israeli military official said the guerrillas' military capabilities in Jordan are nonexistent following a week of fighting with King Hussein's troops and the exodus that began Saturday.

The ambitious claims of extremist movements have been shattered, and their standard bearers have found a kind of refuge in the country which they swore to destroy.

Israel spotter planes and patrols were increased along the Jordan River to pick up the guerrillas, some of whom waved white flags before crossing.

The guerrillas, who surrendered to the Israelis, mainly members of the Fatah group, told interrogators they had seen Jordanian troops kill wounded Palestinians and others who tried to surrender.

Israeli military officials said Syria and Iraq had refused to allow the fleeing guerrillas to enter those countries.

They said the Jordanians appeared to be "holding mopping up operations in the Jordan valley today," at some points in Jordan are nonexistent following a week of fighting with King Hussein's troops and the exodus that began Saturday.

Chou Says Nixon Took Initiative

By John Burns Peking, July 19.—Premier Chou En-lai was reported to have rebuffed a visiting French group here last night that it was not he but President Nixon who took the initiative in proposing the President's visit to Peking.

When the journalists followed up by asking if Mr. Chou was happy at the prospect of receiving the U.S. President, the premier reportedly referred them back to the three-paragraph announcement.

The key paragraph in the announcement read: "Knowing of President Nixon's expressed desire to visit the People's Republic of China, Premier Chou En-lai, on behalf of the government of the People's Republic of China, has extended an invitation to President Nixon to visit China at an appropriate date before May, 1972. President Nixon has accepted the invitation with pleasure."

Mr. Chou's exchange with the journalists came at the end of a 45-minute meeting between the premier and the French delegation at the Great Hall of the People.

It was the first Western group to meet with the premier since the announcement of the visit.

In the discussion which preceded the press queries, the premier reportedly made no reference to the visit. His remarks were said to have been highlighted by his announcement that a senior Chinese minister, whom he did not name, will visit France in the fall after the meeting.

Sisco to Visit Israel in Week

WASHINGTON, July 19 (AP)—Assistant Secretary of State Joseph J. Sisco will visit Israel next week, the State Department announced today.

The precise timing of the long-expected visit is still to be worked out, Mr. Sisco, the government's number one expert on the Middle East, is expected to discuss with Israeli officials a range of issues including both the U.S.-proposed reopening of the Suez Canal and the Israeli request for more American Phantom fighter-bombers.

Called a Communist Sympathizer

A Major Reported Seizing Power in Sudan

BEIRUT, July 19 (Reuters)—Maj. Hafeez Atta, 36, a former vice-president who was dismissed for Communist sympathies, seized power in Sudan today, Radio Cairo reported.

He was quoted by the radio as saying in a broadcast that his coup was intended to correct the revolutions of 1958 and 1969.

On Nov. 17, 1958, the army took over the government and Lt. Gen. Ibrahim Abboud came to power. He handed control to a civilian administration in 1964, but the government was taken over by a ten-man revolutionary council on May 25, 1969, under the chairmanship of Col. Gaafar Numeiri.

denial palace had been surrounded by tanks. Khartoum airport was closed.

It said Maj. Atta was dismissed from the Sudanese Revolutionary Council last November, along with Lt. Col. Bahdar Noor and 344. Osman Mamadallah.

In dismissing the three, President Numeiri said they had been won over by "subversive elements" and had communicated decisions taken at Revolutionary Council meetings to the Communist party, UFT reported.

The Sudanese Communist party is the biggest in the Arab world.

[Last Feb. 11, President Numeiri ordered a crackdown on the Communists.

Internal Problems [Sudan has been plagued with internal problems, mainly centering on the Communist party, ever since President Numeiri took over. It was because of these internal problems and the ten-year-old rebellion in south Sudan that Sudan did not join

the proposed federation of Arab republics along with Egypt, Libya and Syria.]

Maj. Atta promised democracy for all popular organizations—seen here as a possible reference to the banned Communist party—and announced that the region of the southern Sudan would be granted home rule.

Moslem Arabs of the north broke up more than two-thirds of the Sudan's 15 million population and have dominated the black Africans of the south. At nearly one million square miles, the Sudan is Africa's largest country.

In his radio statement, Maj. Atta referred to "the liberation of [Sudan] occupied land, the Palestinian revolution and the Palestinians' right to determine their destiny."

He said: "The masses were looking forward to development and struggling to achieve it. They were not looking for salvation at the hands of people who grab authority."

Thieu Lays Responsibility For Diem's Death on Minh

SAIGON, July 19 (UPI)—President Nguyen Van Thieu struck back at his political rivals tonight, calling Gen. Duong Van (Big) Minh a "coward and a liar" and insisting that the presidential elections this fall would be fair and honest.

In his first public rebuttal of a series of charges by Gen. Minh who is retiring, Thieu accused his most serious potential challenger of responsibility for making "absurd and dangerous statements." He pledged democratic elections on Oct. 3 and said that he would welcome foreign observers "who could go anywhere they want in the country."

Thieu defended his role in the coup. He denied that the 5th Infantry Division, which he had commanded, had come late to the palace. "The only order I gave was to attack the palace at the last minute," Mr. Thieu said. "It was not one of my first targets. It is slanderous to say that I came late. Diem and Nhu managed to escape because the palace was not under siege. If Gen. Minh does not know it, he was misled by someone else that day."

Mr. Thieu insisted today that throughout the planning of the coup, he had insisted that Diem be brought before a court-martial. He said that he was shocked to learn that Diem and his brother were killed in the armored carrier bringing them from Cholon to the general staff headquarters.

When I learned Diem and Nhu were killed," the president said, "I went to the armored carrier, ordered the soldiers to open the tail gate, and laid the bodies of the two late leaders and turned away."

Who is Responsible? "Did Gen. Minh order the assassination? That I don't know. I don't know who ordered that. But I do know that, the night before, officers, including Gen. Minh, met at the general staff to decide about the fate of Diem and Nhu. I don't know what decision they took. But Diem and Nhu were killed the next day."

Relative Quiet Marks the War in S. Vietnam

SAIGON, July 19 (UPI)—A few routine attacks punctuated an otherwise quiet Vietnam war today.

In an attack Communist rockets hit the big U.S. helicopter and artillery base at Phu Loi, 13 miles north of Saigon, for the second day. U.S. military spokesmen said the attack caused light damage and no personnel damage.

For 40 hours, B-52 bombers pounded North Vietnamese installations south of Firebase Fuller, which forms the northwest corner of a defense line along the Demilitarized Zone between the two Vietnams. North Vietnamese forces mortared Firebase Fuller earlier in the day, without causing significant damage.

Saigon Renews Bid to Hanoi For Talks on Reunification

SAIGON, July 19 (Reuters)—The Saigon government commemorated the 17th year of Vietnam's division today with renewed offers to Hanoi to hold direct talks on reunification and an immediate cease-fire.

A statement issued for the July 19 National Day said that sending reunification talks to the two sides of Vietnam, North and South, "should be able to exist peacefully."

Diplomats in Saigon saw the statement as a straight reaffirmation of Saigon's known positions.

Bell Reports Pact Ending Phone Strike

500,000 in U.S. Get Three-Year Package

WASHINGTON, July 19 (UPI)—A contract settlement has been reached between the Bell System and a half million telephone repairmen, installers and operators who struck six days ago for higher wages, the company announced today.

The company said the agreement provided for a 31 percent increase in wages and other benefits over three years, including 16 percent the first year.

A Bell spokesman said the settlement was worked out in bargaining sessions between 22 regional organizations within the Bell System and the Communications Workers of America.

CWA President Joseph A. Beirne said the pact would cost Bell nearly \$4 billion. He said he had ordered the striking workers to begin returning to their jobs at midnight EDT tomorrow.

But he said the agreement must still be approved by members in a secret mail ballot. "If our members do not ratify, our strike will recommence on or about August 19," Mr. Beirne said.

The main issue in the dispute had been wage increases and how they would be distributed. In going on strike, the union argued that the company's proposals would widen differences in pay between men and women employees and perpetuate regional and job pay differentials.

Postal Marathon

Meantime, negotiators for postal unions and the new postal service were reported near agreement on a contract for 750,000 mailmen after a marathon bargaining session that lasted more than 24 hours.

Postal negotiators met almost continuously starting at 9 a.m. EDT yesterday (1900 GMT), with only a brief lunch break and an hour-and-a-half breakfast break today.

On the rail front, attempts to settle the strike against the Southern and Union Pacific Railroads and avert a strike against six more lines were blocked by what John P. Hiltz Jr., spokesman for the nation's rail carriers, called an "insurmountable obstacle."

Mr. Hiltz said the United Transportation Union demanded that their nonstriking members be paid on the basis of old work rules during the current walkout. Management has ordered the old rules suspended.

Meanwhile, the striking International Longshoremen's and Warehousemen's Union and the employer representative, the Pacific Maritime Association, were reported far apart on terms for settling a walkout which has shut down 24 West Coast ports. No talks have been held since the strike began July 1 at the expiration of a contract.

Philippines Deny Chinese Charges On Disputed Isles

HONG KONG, July 19 (Reuters)—China has alleged that the Philippines sent troops to the disputed Spratly Islands in the South China Sea and said that it would not tolerate Filipino violations of its territorial sovereignty over the islands.

Heroin Use Found in 4.5 Pct. Of 22,000 GIs Leaving War

SAO CLEMENTE, Calif., July 19 (UPI)—Tests of 22,000 American servicemen leaving Vietnam showed that 4.5 percent of them had been using heroin, according to President Nixon's special assistant on drugs.

Dr. Jerome Jaffe said that this percentage was somewhat less than had been expected but the use of heroin by American troops in Southeast Asia remained a very serious problem.

Dr. Jaffe reported to President Nixon Saturday after a ten-day trip to Saigon and other stops in Southeast Asia. He said the President was pleased with recent progress in the treatment of hard-drug users among servicemen but that he believed "that it remains a major problem."

Dr. Jaffe said at a news conference following his meeting with the President at the Western White House that the 22,000 departing servicemen who were given urine tests to detect drug usage did not represent a cross-section of American troops there. He also said there was no indication that all of those who showed opiate traces were addicted to heroin.

Early Estimates

Dr. Jaffe said the emergency treatment program was set up under preliminary estimates that 10 percent of departing servicemen were using heroin in some form. Other estimates, some from physicians in Vietnam, had estimated an even higher percentage.

Under the special program, all men leaving Vietnam are given urine tests to detect the presence of opium, from which heroin is made. If any trace is found, the serviceman is assigned to a treatment center. After seven days, those found to be addicted are moved to the United States for more intensive treatment before discharge or reassignment.

Dr. Jaffe said his inspection of drug-treatment facilities in Vietnam showed them to be far too "primitive" but that steps were being taken to improve them.

The tests are only for opium traces. There are no general tests under way for a wide range of less damaging drugs known to be used by American servicemen.

Unemployment Among Ex-GIs Shows Decline

WASHINGTON, July 19 (UPI)—Government figures show that the unemployment rate for Vietnam veterans has steadily declined since February to a level of 8.1 percent in June—only slightly above that for nonveterans of the same age.

U.S. Warned by India of Rift Over Arms Sales to Pakistan

NEW DELHI, July 19 (AP)—Foreign Minister Swaran Singh warned today that a continued supply of American arms to Pakistan could affect the relations between India and the United States.

He told parliament: "It is surprising that the U.S. government, which has been counseling restraint to us, should have itself taken a measure which will aggravate the situation."

The minister was answering questions raised by eleven members of parliament representing all political parties.

He said India's "strong views on the supply of arms to Pakistan and the impact it could have on the peace and stability of the subcontinent have been conveyed in unequivocal terms to the U.S. government."

Mr. Singh told parliament on July 13 that India had sent a rare protest note to the United States on June 27 against continuing military shipments to Pakistan.

Church Statement Backed

The minister said information received from India's own sources confirmed Democratic Senator Frank Church's statement early in July that \$38 million worth of military equipment was still in the supply pipeline to Pakistan.

Right-wing Swatantra party member Lokanath Mishra asked if Pakistan would get additional arms from America and China or "officially as priest at the unholy marriage between Washington and Peking."

The minister replied, "Pakistan was already getting arms separately from the United States and China and the Sino-American detente will have no qualitative effect."

Denies Proxmire Claim

The minister denied the report that the United States proposed to send \$5 million worth of military aid to India this year.

He said there was "no truth" in the disclosure by Senator William Proxmire.

Acheson Judged J.F. Kennedy as 'Out of His Depth'

NEW YORK, July 19 (UPI)—Dean Acheson, secretary of state under President Harry S. Truman, considered John F. Kennedy an "indefinite man who was 'really out of his depth' as the nation's chief executive."

In an interview published today in Life magazine, Mr. Acheson also said he believed President Kennedy's reputation "is greater because of the tragedy of his death than it would have been if he had lived over two terms."

Heath Gets U.S. Assurance Of Support for EEC Entry

LONDON, July 19 (UPI)—British Prime Minister Edward Heath and a stand-in for the U.S. secretary of state traded views here today on East-West détente and European unity before an audience of 2,000 American lawmakers. There was, in the phrase Mr. Heath recently coined, a "natural relationship" between their attitudes.

Under Secretary of State John N. Irwin cheered the prime minister with a reiteration of American welcome to the prospect of British entry into the Common Market, saying that the United States was "confident that the dynamism of the European community is as much in our interest as in Europe's." In recent months some anti-marketizers have argued against Mr. Heath's campaign for

membership on grounds that America no longer favored it. Mr. Irwin cautioned, however, that the protectionist policies of the European Economic Community with respect to agricultural exports have "created problems between us."

But Mr. Heath said fears that the EEC would become "an inward-looking economic bloc which might... damage certain American economic interests" were not justified.

"So far, your experience with the EEC has been encouraging," he argued. "Trade between the community and the United States has more than tripled in the 12 years since 1958 and is still growing rapidly."

American exports to the EEC rose faster than those to the rest of the world in the last ten years, Mr. Heath noted. With British membership, "there is no reason why the increases in trade in agricultural products... should not continue," he asserted.

Speaking before the second plenary session of the American Bar Association, meeting this year in London, Mr. Heath expressed full confidence that the British Parliament would indeed decide in favor of joining the Common Market.

"I believe that in a few years' time not merely will British membership... seem natural and inevitable, but the fact that we were outside for so long will appear quite extraordinary," he said.

Departing for Secretary of State William P. Rogers, scheduled to appear but remaining in Washington in the wake of President Nixon's China initiative, Mr. Irwin reasserted American commitment to European defense.

"The administration is convinced that substantial American forces are still required in Europe," he said. "Assuming a similar approach by our allies, we plan to maintain and improve our forces, not reducing them unless there is reciprocal action with respect to the forces ranged against us."

Malta Parley Begun by U.K. Defense Chief

VALLETTA, Malta, July 19 (Reuters)—British Defense Secretary Lord Carrington arrived in Valletta today to talk with the Maltese prime minister, Dom Mintoff, on the future of Britain's defense and finance arrangements here.

He was accompanied by Lord Balfour, a minister of state for defense, and senior advisers and officials. He made no statement at the airport meeting between Lord Carrington and Mr. Mintoff was expected tonight at the prime minister's official residence, with formal talks opening tomorrow.

Message by Mintoff.

Lord Carrington was originally due to fly to Valletta last Wednesday. But his trip was postponed at the last moment following a message to the British government from Mr. Mintoff. The message stated that Lord Carrington's visit would not be fruitful unless he came with the intention of negotiating and not merely to explore the possibility of starting negotiations.

At the airport, the Labor party won power in a general election last month, the new prime minister said the 1964 defense arrangements with Britain—providing for £5 million a year in exchange for defense facilities—were no longer valid and he wanted them to be revised in talks with Britain.

Croatia Drafts Bill to Protect Rights of Serbs

BELGRADE, July 19 (UPI)—Croatia, the second largest state in Yugoslavia, has moved to extend new guarantees to Serbs living on its territory in an attempt to calm ethnic rivalries that have put Serbs and Croats dangerously at odds.

Draft amendments to the republic's constitution, made public by a legislative committee, would guarantee an equal position for the Serbian language, alphabet and culture in Croatia, where 800,000 Serbs mingle with 3.7 million Croats. Both groups speak nearly identical Slavic dialects, but Croats use the Latin alphabet and Serbs use Cyrillic, the Slavic alphabet.

The proposals guarantee that the official gazette would be printed in both languages. Serbs would have the right to their own schools and publications. A legislative committee on relations between the groups would be established.

The proposals will be debated by the full assembly at the end of July and then will be submitted to the public for discussion.


Lopez Bravo in Athens For 3 Days of Talks

ATHENS, July 19 (AP)—Spanish Foreign Minister Gregorio Lopez Bravo arrived here today for a three-day official visit and talks with Greek government leaders concerning mainly the situation in the Mediterranean.

Mr. Bravo is expected to confer with Premier George Papadopoulos, who is acting foreign minister, later today. Tomorrow the Spanish official will call on Crown Regent Gen. George Zorlakis and will later meet Deputy Premier and Interior Minister Stylianos Pattakos.

3,000 Flee Floods

CARACAS, Venezuela, July 19 (AP)—More than 3,000 persons have abandoned their homes and farms in the Amazon territory following extensive floods in the plains when the Orinoco River spilled over its banks.

Guinness Depot Bombed in Belfast

BELFAST, July 19 (AP)—Irish Republican Army outlaws seized 30 rifles and two machine guns during a weekend raid in Belfast, the British Army said today.

But a spokesman said the guns were for practice only and unserviceable—useless as weapons.

The arms were taken from a school in the Drunken district of Belfast. They belonged to the school's air force cadet corps.

"They were drill weapons," the army spokesman said. "To make them they would need to be completely rebuilt."

An anonymous caller told a Belfast newspaper that the raid was carried out by "an active service unit" on the IRA.

IRA Seizes 32 Guns—That Won't Fire

Earlier today, two terrorist bombs blasted a brewery depot in downtown Belfast.

Two others failed to explode and were dismantled by British Army explosives experts.

The depot is on the Grosvenor Road, bordering a stronghold of the IRA. The depot owners, the Dublin-based Guinness company,

Libyans Pass British in Tea Consumption

LONDON, July 19 (UPI)—The British have lost their title as the world's biggest tea drinkers; they've been overtaken by the Libyans.

According to the International Tea Committee, the Libyans are now in first place as the biggest per capita consumers of tea. Figures for 1969 released today show that each Libyan drank an average of 10 pounds of tea, against 9.9 pounds in Britain.

A slow decline in tea drinking has been evident here in recent years as more and more Britons switched to coffee and other beverages. But despite the per capita decline in tea drinking here, Britain's total consumption of tea still outstripped that of every other country.

House of Lords Amends Heath's Immigration Bill

LONDON, July 19 (AP)—Prime Minister Edward Heath's Conservative government was defeated in the House of Lords today on an amendment to its legislation curbing immigration.

The defeat came during a committee stage on the immigration bill. The amendment, proposed by Liberal peer Lord Wade, was passed by a majority of 93 votes against the government's 79.

Lord Wade's amendment called for assurances that nothing in the bill should "take away any right enjoyed by a Commonwealth citizen prior to the operation of the bill if he was ordinarily resident in the United Kingdom."

There has been speculation that the bill will not be adopted before the end of this month, when Parliament goes into its summer recess. The government hoped to enact the law this month. But informed sources said that it was doubtful whether this would be possible before Christmas.

Soviet Warships Sail Up Channel

LONDON, July 19 (AP)—A Soviet naval force was steaming up the English Channel today, the Ministry of Defense reported.

The five-vessel fleet is being carefully watched by British naval and air units, a ministry spokesman said.

A Royal Navy spokesman said it was quite unusual for a Soviet force of this size to sail up the Channel. He said the squadron should be off Dover by tomorrow.

The five vessels are headed by a 15,400-ton cruiser of the Sverdlov class. There are two guided-missile destroyers, a tanker and a 2,850-ton destroyer of the Kiltin class.

272 Skids at Denver

DENVER, July 19 (Reuters)—A United Airlines Boeing 727 skidded off a wet runway and was badly damaged when it landed here today, but rescue workers evacuated the 93 passengers and six crew members through emergency exits without injury.

Colombo Still in Coma

NEW YORK, July 19 (AP)—Joseph Colombo Sr., reputed Mafia figure, remained in a coma today, three weeks after he was shot in the head just before the Italian-American Unity Day rally at Columbus Circle. A hospital spokesman said his condition continued critical.

Algerian Visits Orient

ALGIERS, July 19 (UPI)—Algerian Foreign Minister Abdelaziz Bouteflika left today for an official visit to Communist China, North Vietnam and North Korea.

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Ex-Sen. Gerald P. Nye, 78, Isolationist Foe of Roosevelt

NEW YORK, July 19 (NYT)—Gerald P. Nye, 78, former isolationist senator from North Dakota and foe of President Franklin D. Roosevelt, died Saturday.

For 19 years, from 1925 to 1944, Mr. Nye, a Republican with a visible neo-populist content to his politics, was a powerful scourge of presidents, malefactors in public office, Wall Street bankers, munitions manufacturers and advocates of American entry into World War II. He was also, in the populist tradition, a friend to the farmer and the small merchant.

Good-looking and a persistent and forceful questioner, he made a name for himself in the Teapot Dome oil scandals of the middle 1920's and in his inquiries in the middle 1930's into profiteering in munitions sales to the American military establishment. If he did not coin the phrase "merchants of death," he at least popularized it at a time when the public was fretful and disillusioned over a war fought "to make the world safe for democracy."

Churchmen In Cape Town Decry Nazism

CAPE TOWN, July 19 (Reuters)—Forty-five leading churchmen here joined today in denouncing South Africa's political and social system as in many ways akin to Nazism.

They said that although the Pretoria government could not be accused of the atrocities that were committed in Nazi Germany, its society was basically structured on the same principles of nationalism and racism found in Hitler's Germany.

Their charges against the country's apartheid system were contained in an open letter in the multi-denominational religious magazine Pro Veritate published today.

Increased Discord Seen

The letter was expected to increase discord between the generally anti-apartheid English-speaking churches on one hand and the government and the pro-apartheid Dutch Reformed Church on the other.

One of its signatories was, in fact, a Dutch Reformed churchman, Prof. A. M. Hugo, who is at odds with his church over state policy and the church's attitude toward it.

Among the parallels the letter listed between South Africa today and Hitler's Germany were:

- Nationalism: Hitler exalted the nationalism limited to a single folk racially skin. The letter asked: "Is the dominant political ideology in South Africa not similar?"
- Racism and blood: "Are our laws against inter-marriage and extra-marital relations between white and non-white in South Africa not parallel to the infamous Nuremberg law that forbade the same thing between Aryan and Jew in Germany?"
- Secret police and informers: The homecoming of the German people with informers and the secret police system was likened to the Bureau of State Security and the Police Special Branch here—"is it so different from Nazi Germany?"
- Absolutism: Hitler gradually dismantled the rule of law in Germany and the Nazis imprisoned or banned people without trial—"which of these things is not happening in South Africa?"
- Herrenvolk: Referring to the Nazi master race doctrine, the letter said Africans were denied skilled work and there was a government edict that no white man could ever take orders from a black.

Pravda Cites Ethnic Bias in Employment

MOSCOW, July 19 (UPI)—The Soviet Communist party has warned local officials against giving job preferences to people on the basis of their ethnic origin.

An article Friday in Pravda, the party paper, was apparently directed both against Russians, who discriminate against Soviet minorities, and against local non-Russian officials who try to keep out Russians and others who are not members of their nationality.

The Soviet Union is a multinational country, with the leading national groups, such as Russians, Ukrainians and Belorussians, possessing their own republics. Jews comprise the only major group without its own administrative area. The Jewish Autonomous Republic, set up in the 1930s in the Far East, is Jewish in name only, with Russians making up the majority of inhabitants.

Lapses Noted

Officially, no discrimination exists in the Soviet Union and all peoples are supposed to have equal opportunities. But, from time to time, the press notes departures from the policy. And visitors to non-Russian republics frequently hear complaints from local inhabitants about growing Russian influence in their areas.

Some republics, such as Armenia, Georgia, Lithuania and Latvia, are particularly known for their local nationalism and resentment of outsiders.

The Pravda article said: "A consistent implementation of the international course of the Soviet Communist party means an irreconcilability to the smallest appearance of national segregation in the use of workers of this or any nationality."

"Not losing sight of the problem of further training of cadres of different nationalities, the party also demands strict adherence to the selection of cadres according to political and working qualities," it said.

Ireland Sets Up Conditions for Market Entry

BRUSSELS, July 19 (AP)—Ireland today won the right to bar labor from the Common Market countries for five years after becoming a member.

There will be no barriers to immigrant labor from Britain, and no difficulty about Irish workers going to the Continent, an Irish spokesman said.

Sean Morrissey, Ireland's deputy chief negotiator, also won the right to control exports of scrap iron for five years. Denmark and Britain have accepted two years.

Ireland and Britain will have the same rules for restricting movements of capital when they become members. Ireland has promised to remove a substantial portion of its restrictions on direct investment in the Common Market countries as soon as it becomes a member, and the rest in two years. After two and a half years, it undertakes to remove restrictions on personal investments, gifts, dowries and real estate purchases.

Study Says U.S. Fails to Control Meat Industry

WASHINGTON, July 19 (UPI)—A two-year consumer study published Saturday accuses the Department of Agriculture of bowing to "industry pressure" in allowing the continued widespread sale of bad meat, contaminated chicken and toxic pesticides.

The book-length study, "Sowing the Wind: Pesticides, Meat and the Public Interest," was presented at a news conference by Harrison Wellford, who led a six-man investigation of the Department of Agriculture under the auspices of consumer advocate Ralph Nader.

Among the group's recommendations are:


- Transfer of meat inspection to a new federal public health agency.
- Formation of an "independent office of consumer protection" as a counter to industry pressures on federal regulators.
- Far stronger federal efforts to analyze, monitor and control the use and effects of chemicals in agriculture.

Nixon Would Convert FDA Into Safety Unit

WASHINGTON, July 19 (UPI)—President Nixon proposed today that the 64-year-old Food and Drug Administration be converted into a new consumer safety administration with authority over household products as well as foods and drugs.

Under Mr. Nixon's plan, the new agency like the present FDA would be part of the Department of Health, Education and Welfare. The administration proposal differed from a bill sponsored by the Democrats to regulate hazardous household products under a new consumer product safety commission.

"Then what did The New York Times and Washington Post do that was so wrong?" "They printed unauthorized leaks of classified documents. For one thing it shows them in a good light, which is very important if you're a high government official. The Pentagon Papers show high officials in a bad light and that, my friend, no matter how you look at it, is treason."

TASADAY FOREST, Southern Philippines, July 19.—After shying away from its "finders" during four days of contact, the newly discovered Stone-Age Tasaday tribe lost some of its bewilderment during the weekend. Its apparent leader, a small-boned, long-haired, almost naked man named Myum, allowed a few of us to stay overnight after we had descended from the "treepots" on a "thundering bird" (helicopter).

Myum's consent was relayed through four languages spoken by three interpreters. Our camping spot was on a 3,000-foot hill, where big red-and-black hornbills nested in giant trees. Their presence throughout south-central Mindanao has raised a vast rain forest that is forever damp because the tropical sun can barely pierce the heavy canopy of foliage.
