Humphrey Attacks EEC on Farm Policies

By Alfred Friendly... LONDON, July 30 (UPI)—One of the most ferocious attacks on the agricultural policy of the Common Market ever heard here was launched tonight by an American—Sen. Hubert H. Humphrey, D. Minn.

From Wire Dispatches... SPACE CENTER, Houston, July 30.—Col. David R. Scott and Lt. Col. James B. Irwin successfully landed at the foot of the moon's Apennine Mountains today to become the seventh and eighth men on the moon.

It was the fourth time men had reached the earth's natural satellite. For the next three days, they will carry out a series of scientific experiments and observations that will give earth-bound scientists invaluable information concerning the origins of the planets.

Col. Scott and Col. Irwin left lunar orbit at 2203 GMT with a burst from the main engine of their landing craft, Falcon.

On it rushed, floating through the airless lunar atmosphere. The voices droned on, calmly, counting down the altitude as the Falcon coasted downward.

"Roger," Col. Scott replied. "Go for landing." And moments later: "I got a good spot."

"Then Col. Irwin began counting down by hundreds. '900 feet, 800, 700, 600... 300 feet,' Col. Irwin went on. At 15 feet, he called out, 'six percent fuel left.' Then: 'Ten feet, eight feet.'"

"Got some dust," said Col. Scott as the dirt of the valley of the Apennine was disturbed by man for the first time.

And then: "Contact," and the moon was down.

"Okay, Houston," Col. Scott announced. "Falcon is on the plain at Hadley."

Hadley is the name of a 1,200-foot canyon-like rille which, with the surrounding Apennine Mountains, makes up the most rugged of the four lunar sites visited to date.

"Everything looks good," was the space center verdict, with plenty of fuel to spare.

The landing time was 2216 GMT, ground control said.

The astronauts landed about 1,900 feet south of their planned touchdown spot.

Mission control reported 13 minutes after landing that all the lunar module's systems appeared to be in good shape, and the craft was pitched up at an angle of some nine degrees.

This is an easily acceptable angle for a safe blast-off when they rejoin the command ship in orbit next Monday.

Col. Scott surveyed the landing area and found a crater named Salyut, in honor of the Soviet manned space stations.

"We're not too far from Salyut," said Col. Scott. "I did find that."

Maj. Worden, overhead at the time, in the command ship, reported: "I had a beautiful view of the landing site, but I couldn't see anything."

Col. Scott's first description of the landing site was to Col. Irwin, obviously looking out one of the windows. "A little elevation in front of us, eh?" He was talking about the towering mountains around them.

"It is very hummocky and, as you know, in this kind of terrain you can hardly see over your eyebrows. There is very little to tell us exactly where we are in our local position."

Moments after the landing, mission control read a message from President Nixon.

"The President sends his congratulations to the entire ground crew and the Apollo-15 for a successful landing and sends his best wishes for the rest of the mission," the message read.

"We also thank the team for the support they gave us," said Col. Scott.

"Thank the President," added Maj. Worden.

The astronauts' scientific program began at 0017 GMT, about half an hour behind schedule, when Col. Scott raised the top hatch of Falcon, stood on the ascent engine and surveyed the surface like a human peering to make sure there were no big obstacles to their travel plans.

Then, the two retired for the night.

Earlier, the Apollo-15 mission faced more of the minor troubles that had been plaguing it since launch last Monday.

Around the back of the moon on their 12th orbit, with Col. Scott and Col. Irwin in the lunar module Falcon and Maj. Worden in the command ship, Falcon, as they skinned the lunar surface at an altitude of 45,000 feet, the astronauts were supposed to trigger the mechanism to separate the two craft for Falcon's descent to the moon.

When they reappeared and resumed contact with the earth, Col. Scott, sounding terse, announced that they had failed to separate.

Ground control analyzed the trouble and traced the fault to a plug which apparently had not been inserted properly. This cut off power to the undocking gear.

Maj. Worden pushed the plug in more firmly and a second attempt to separate the spacecraft was successful. It came at 1813 GMT, 25 minutes behind schedule.

The delay apparently made little difference to the landing plans.

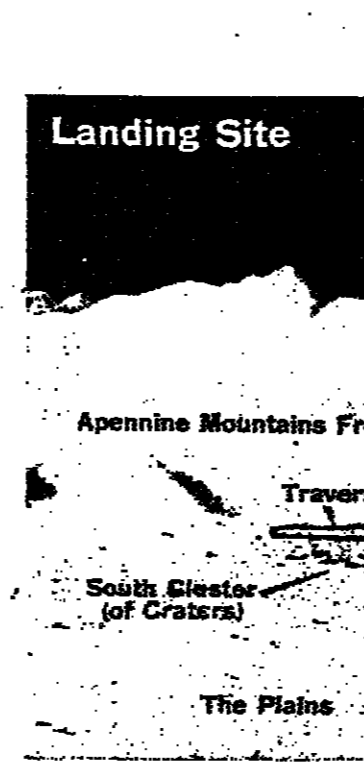
The only effect of the 25-minute delay was to throw off the picture-taking schedule.

"You're on your own," Maj. Worden said to his companions. "Okay, good clean sep (separation)," replied Col. Scott.

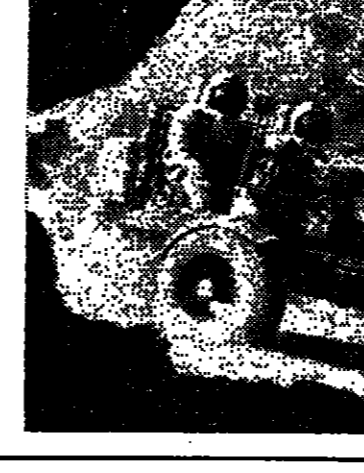
Falcon's four legs then popped into place, and the Scott-Irwin team headed toward man's fourth and most ambitious landing on the moon.

Algeria Breaks With Jordan

ALGIERS, July 30 (AP)—Algeria announced early today it was suspending "all current relations" with Jordan.

A communiqué issued by the ruling Council of the Revolution said Algeria "continues and will continue its financial, military and economic aid to the Palestinian resistance and urges it to continue the armed struggle."

The communiqué added that Algeria considered that any mediation between the guerrillas and King Hussein's regime was "a fundamental contradiction" in the fight of the Palestinian people and the aspirations of the Arab nations.

Thant Is Reported to Warn of India-Pakistan 'Disaster'

UNITED NATIONS, July 30 (UPI)—Secretary-General U Thant has warned the Security Council in a secret memorandum that humanitarian aid will not suffice to avert "potential disaster" in the India-Pakistan crisis, it was reliably learned yesterday.

He expressed his deep concern about the situation and described it as a "potential threat to peace and security" which could no longer be ignored by the international community.

Tripoli Meeting Ends Unexpectedly

BEIRUT, July 30 (UPI)—Six Arab leaders who gathered in Tripoli, Libya, for a summit conference on the Jordanian-Palestinian guerrilla crisis ended their Tripoli conference after a four-hour session at noon today and a series of bilateral meetings.

The six leaders set up a subcommittee to draft a communiqué on the conference results.

"There was complete agreement among the Arab leaders on condemning the stance of the Jordanian authorities toward the Palestinian resistance," the radio said.

They also warned Jordan against concluding a separate peace agreement with Israel and emphasized the importance of respecting the Cairo and Amman agreements and enforcing the sanctions provided for by those agreements, particularly those referred to in Article 13 of the Cairo agreement, the radio said.

The conference was called by Libyan leader Moammar Kadhafi to take action against Jordan for what he considers its "liquidation" attempt against the guerrillas.

Only four Arab heads of state responded to Col. Kadhafi's call. They are Egyptian President Anwar Sadat, Syrian President Hafez Assad and the presidents of North and South Yemen, Qadi Abdul Rahman al-Iryani and Ali Salem Kabei.

Arab Summit Session Condemns Hussein

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Sanctions Urged

The Palestine Liberation Organization has been urging Arab leaders to impose sanctions against Jordan, expel it from the Arab League and extend recognition to the organization as the representative of the Palestinian people.

The radio said the six leaders also agreed on the necessity of "protecting the Palestinian resistance and the necessity of maintaining its activity from Jordanian territory."

In Pakistan, the world is witnessing a holocaust unmatched since Hitler—and 'witnessing' is the operative word...

Revision in Father's Theory Is Proposed by Anna Freud

By Alden Whitman

VIENNA, July 30 (NYT)—Alternately praising Freudians for focusing on the crucial subject of aggression and solidifying many of them for the poverty of their thinking about it, Anna Freud proposed today a significant revision in her father's theory of aggression.

Standing in the glare of television lights at the lecture in the reception hall of the former Imperial Palace here, Miss Freud told an overflow crowd of 3,000 persons at the closing session of the 37th Congress of International Psychoanalytic Associations.

"We should let a formulation of a theory of aggression wait until we know much more from our clinical studies about what really constitutes aggression," she said.

As she spoke, her apparent frailty seemed to melt away and her voice took on a vigorous, almost admiring tone.

Receiving the silver medal, Miss Freud was momentarily close to tears, which she managed to repress with a smile.

Re-examining her father's belief, elaborated in the 15 years before his death in London in 1939, that aggression is an instinct equal and opposite to the sexual instinct, Miss Freud declared:

"We do not yet know the source of aggression. Personally, I find it impossible to disregard what seems to me an elemental fact—that we are dealing with an impulse, an urge, whose aim may be dictated by environmental necessities."

Fundamental Question For psychoanalysts, Miss Freud's remark was not just a matter of semantics but a bold and fundamental question.

"I am pleased with the results of today's sessions," U.S. Ambassador Kenneth Rush said to reporters. It was the ambassadors' 26th meeting since their talks began in March of last year.

From others in the meeting, it was learned that the Americans had expressed annoyance at what they regard as foot-dragging tactics employed by the Russians.

A Russian delegate at the Berlin talks said after the meeting today that the Americans, not the Russians, were dragging their feet.

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Swimming Ban At Lake Beaches In Northern Italy VERBANIA, Italy, July 30 (AP)—Pollution has reached even the clear mountain waters of northern Italy.

Following pollution reports and closing of beaches on the Adriatic and Tyrrhenian coasts, authorities here have banned swimming in parts of Lago Maggiore, Italy's second biggest lake, one fifth of which is in Switzerland.

The Bellinzago resort on the Ticino River has also been closed by the mayor and, in Carpiagnano, farmers have reported a high mortality rate among cattle grazing near the Sesia River.

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Health authorities said that the water was dangerously polluted by sewerage drains pouring into the lake. Posters have gone up on many beaches to prohibit swimming.

France Appoints Anti-Drug Chief

PARIS, July 30 (AP)—France has named its No. 1 gangbuster as head of the national narcotics bureau in a move to step up the war on the drug traffickers who have made this country the key source of hard drugs for the United States.

Interior Minister Raymond Marcellin announced yesterday that Divisional Commissioner Francois Le Mouel would head the Central Office for the Repression of Illicit Traffic in Narcotics.

Mr. Le Mouel, Mr. Marcellin pointed out in a communique, created the national anti-gang squad in 1964 and has since obtained "remarkable results" against top French gangsters.

The current acting head of the drug squad, Divisional Commissioner Michel Nocquet, has been promoted to the police general staff to oversee the operation.

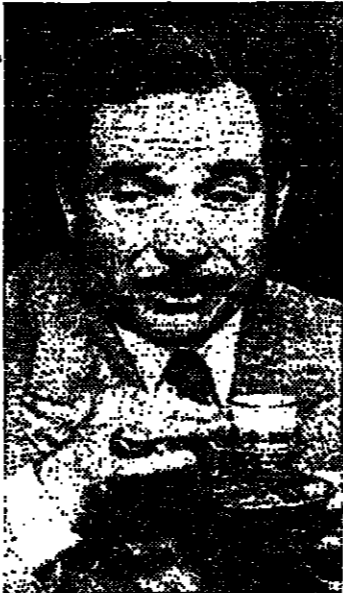
Catching Up On Worthy Paris Movies
