Refugee Right Loses Majority in Iceland Vote

Premier Hafstein Says Coalition Will Resign

REYKJAVIK, June 14 (UPI)—Premier Johann Hafstein announced today that his Social Democratic conservative coalition government would resign as a result of its defeat in Iceland's general elections yesterday.

Mr. Hafstein's 13-year-old coalition lost control of the Althing, the world's oldest parliament, as the voters of this island nation in the North Atlantic swung to the left.

"I will resign," Mr. Hafstein told a Reykjavik newspaper. He said that he would hand his resignation to President Kristian Eldjarn later today.

Political observers predicted the formation of a new government of the left, composed of the Social Democrats, the Progressive party, the Peoples Alliance and the newly founded Liberal Left.

Five Seats Won

The party, founded a year ago and led by Iceland's Confederation of Trade Unions leader, Hannibal Vladimirsson, won five seats in the 60-member Althing.

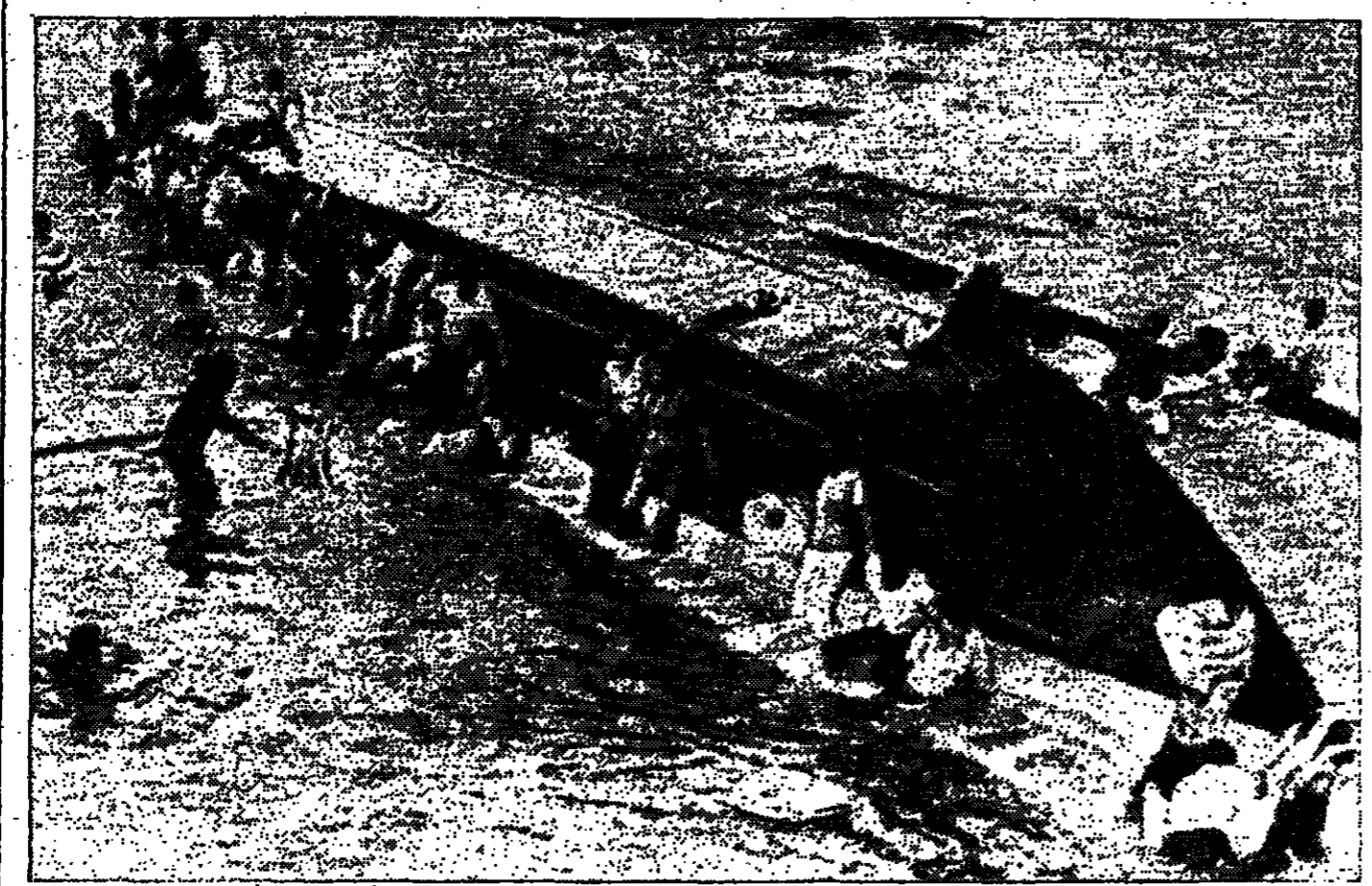
Of the two coalition parties, the Social Democrats lost three of their nine seats and Mr. Eldjarn's own Independent (conservative) party one of its 23 seats.

Complete results from the nation's eight election districts showed that the People's Alliance had kept its ten seats and that the Progressive party retained 17 of its 18 seats.

8 Given Long Terms In Sardinian Abduction

NUORO, Sardinia, June 14 (AP)—Five men and three women were convicted yesterday of the abduction three years ago of a Cagliari merchant. They received sentences varying from 40 to 60 years in prison. A woman accused of complicity was condemned to five years in jail.

The sentences were considered unusually severe. A ten-year sentence has been customary in Sardinian kidnapping cases. But recent abductions, including that of a 13-year-old girl found murdered in Geneva last month, have led to public demands for a return of the death penalty. The eight were convicted for the kidnapping of Luigi Moralis in March, 1969. A \$128,000 ransom was paid in the case.

N. Ireland Leader Condemns Orangemen's March Attempt

BELFAST, June 14 (UPI)—Northern Ireland's Prime Minister Brian Faulkner today said that there was "no excuse" for an attempted march yesterday by Protestant Orangemen in Dungiven that was ended by a volley of nausea gas and rubber bullets.

Mr. Faulkner said that the march, like all others in the troubled province, had been banned by government order and that "we will continue to follow our consistent policy on parades."

About 1,000 policemen and British troops fired volleys of gas and rubber bullets into the ranks of about 1,200 Protestants to stop their intended march into the center of Dungiven, a market village of 1,500 residents—most of them Roman Catholic. The village is about 70 miles west of Belfast.

Earlier today, a bomb explosion damaged police living quarters in Londonderry, climaxing a night of violence in which crowds of youths stoned security forces and tossed gasoline bombs.

Two constables in bed when the explosion occurred were shaken but otherwise unhurt, an army spokesman said. The blast extensively damaged the front of the house on Queen Street.

In Belfast, the army spokesman reported three explosions late last night. There were no injuries. He said that two were at the rear of a former Royal Ulster Constabulary driving school and the third at a store near an army billet.

Chad Cholera Kills 1,500

FORT LAMY, Chad, June 14 (Reuters)—The cholera outbreak in Chad has now claimed about 1,500 lives, the Chad press agency reported today.

Albania Follows Peking, Will Get First Yugo Envoy

BELGRADE, June 14 (UPI)—President Tito named a 38-year-old Communist party official today as Yugoslavia's first ambassador to Albania after years of tense relations between the two Balkan neighbors.

Jovan Pecanovic, the new envoy to Tirana, will be Yugoslavia's youngest ambassador.

Relations between Yugoslavia and Albania have been tense during most of the postwar period. The Communist leadership of the tiny Balkan state—Peking's lone European ally—had accused Mr. Tito's regime of "revisionism."

But when China and Yugoslavia exchanged ambassadors in 1970, Albania followed Peking's normalization trend toward Yugoslavia.

Albania and Yugoslavia had relations through legations, which have been headed since 1958 by chargé d'affaires. For the first time in their history, they now will have diplomatic representation at ambassadorial level.

Record Turnout In Malta Voting

VALETTA, Malta, June 14 (UPI)—A record 94.7 percent of the voters cast ballots in the Malta general election that ended today. The outcome could determine this Mediterranean island nation's strategic role in the East-West confrontation.

Election officials said that the results of the balloting would be known tomorrow.

Prime Minister Giorgio Borg Olivier's pro-Western Nationalist party faced a challenge from Dom Mintoff's Labor party, which favors a more neutral stance.

Los Angeles Bombs Laid to Mexico Riots

LOS ANGELES, June 14 (Reuters)—A blast shattered windows in the front of the Mexican government tourist bureau shortly before midnight in the fourth bomb attack against Mexican institutions in three days here.

An anonymous call to a radio station said the bombs were in retaliation for the killing of Mexican students during riots in Mexico City last week.

Student Battle Fatal to Eleven Mexico City Attack Blamed On Rightist Foes of Regime

MEXICO CITY, June 14 (NYT)—Government sources indicated yesterday that the right-wing extremists who attacked student demonstrators here Thursday, killing at least 11 persons and wounding more than 180, belonged to an organized and trained force supported by conservative opponents of President Luis Echeverría Alvarez.

The sources said there was evidence of collaboration between the Mexico City police and the right-wing force, known as the "Hawks" who were allowed to pass through a police cordon to attack the leftist demonstrators. Witnesses said leaders of the Hawks had conferred with police officials before they began firing on the marchers.

The sources said that opponents of Mr. Echeverría's liberal social and economic policies were supported by the mayor of Mexico City, Alfonso Martínez Domínguez, who was leader of Mr. Echeverría's Institutional Revolutionary party during the previous administration of President Gustavo Díaz Ordaz. Mr. Echeverría has not met with the mayor since the incident.

The president ordered an investigation of the incident. The investigation is led by Attorney General Julio Sánchez Vargás, who Saturday night toured the riot scene with Education Minister Victor Bravo Ahuja, a close supporter of Mr. Echeverría.

No Explanation Given

In a news conference Thursday night, Mayor Martínez Domínguez said he would not tolerate disorders, but he did not explain why heavily armed police units had made no attempt to stop the fighting on Thursday.

The opposition National Action party rejected the mayor's assertion that the battle had been between uncontrollable extremists of the left and the right, and it termed his press conference statement "untruthful and inadmissible."

Students at the National Autonomous University of Mexico have demanded Mr. Martínez Domínguez's resignation. The university authorities themselves said that the rightist attackers had been "organized by elements with considerable economic and material resources."

It is not yet clear whether the president, who has been in power only since last Dec. 1, is strong enough to dismiss the mayor, one of the most powerful men in the president's party.

In a somber mood Saturday, the 49-year-old president said, "This is a question of violent and sterile acts aimed unjustly at creating a problem for the government of Mexico, a problem which harms popular interests."

Embassy Protest in Denmark

COPENHAGEN, June 14 (AP)—About 15 Danish and Latin American youths invaded and occupied the Mexican Embassy today to protest "the Mexican government's massacre of a peaceful demonstration" in Mexico City last Thursday.

The youths, apparently the same group that staged a small, peaceful protest outside the embassy on Saturday, said they would leave the building only after getting proof that their resolution condemning "exploitation and oppression" in Mexico has been forwarded to the Mexican government. However, they left after an hour.

The embassy had called Danish police. After an initial minor scuffle, police took a wait-and-see attitude.

Output in U.S. Up .7 Percent Last Month

WASHINGTON, June 14.—U.S. industrial output, an important measure of how the economy is performing, rose a sharp 0.7 percent last month, the Federal Reserve reported today.

The increase, which put the industrial production index at 167.3 (1957-59 equals 100), follows a 0.3 percent rise in April and was the largest since a like 0.7 percent increase in January. However, the May index was 4.2 percent below the July 1969 peak and compared with an index of 169.1 in the year-ago month.

Output of business and defense equipment—which declined about one-fifth from the 1969 peak to April—rose 0.2 percent. The increase was the fourth gain in the first five months of the current year, with the only decline registered in February.

Spending Plans Cut 6 to 8 Percent By British Firms

LONDON, June 14 (AP-DJ).—British manufacturers plan to reduce their capital spending substantially this year from 1970, perhaps about 6 to 8 percent in real terms, a survey by the Department of Trade and Industry disclosed today.

The government has been expecting a fall in manufacturing investment this year, but the extent of the decline is larger than was initially forecast. A survey of manufacturers late last year indicated that investment by manufacturing industry would fall about 2 percent, in real terms, between 1970 and 1971.

EEC Approves Arbed Merger The Executive Commission of the Common Market has approved a merger that will make the Luxembourg steel firm of ARBED the fourth largest in the EEC. ARBED will cede its plant in West Germany to Roehrig's Eisen und Stahlwerke of Saarbrücken in return for 50 percent of the shares of Roehrig's, a family company with a total value of 185 million deutsche marks (about \$45 million).

Westinghouse, Jeumont-Schneider Westinghouse Electric may acquire up to 45 percent of the capital of SIA Jeumont-Schneider, French makers of heavy electrical equipment, according to sources close to the U.S. company. Baron Sempain of Belgium owns 60 percent of Jeumont-Schneider and Schneider SA of France the remaining 40 percent. Late in 1969 the French government vetoed Westinghouse's bid to acquire a controlling interest in Jeumont-Schneider and has since sought a "French" solution. Sources say that the new initiative comes from the French government. The offer reportedly centers on Jeumont-Schneider's heavy electrical sector, involving turbo-alternators,

being sold to a French group (Cie. Générale d'Electricité-Alsthom) with Westinghouse acquiring 40 to 45 percent of the company's remaining activities. GM Rumored Planning Wankel Auto General Motors is rumored to be readying the revolutionary Wankel engine for production, possibly in a tiny new car for 1975. GM, which will pay the Wankel patent-holders \$50 million if it puts the engine into production, says only that it is making an intensive effort to solve the problems of the Wankel engine. But the New York Times reports that the word in Detroit is spreading that GM will be building the new type of engine in the mid-1970s. The new engines could help Detroit in reducing pollution. A Wankel-powered car could be smaller and lighter than today's auto but without sacrificing passenger room or power, be smoother and less likely to need repairs, and even cost less. Because it is much smaller than today's internal combustion auto engines, there is more room under a hood for the pollution-fighting equipment, and it may be easier to build such equipment into the Wankel than into today's engine.

IOS Lost \$60.3 Million in '70

GENEVA, June 14 (AP-DJ).—IOS Ltd. said its 1970 operating loss totaled \$46.5 million and its extraordinary loss \$13.8 million, bringing the total 1970 loss to \$60.3 million compared with a 1969 profit of \$10.2 million.

HESS The Man and His Mission By J. Bernard Hutton. Introduction by Alrey N. Macmillan. 227 pp. Illustrated. \$6.95. MOTIVE FOR A MISSION The Story Behind Hess's Flight to Britain By James Douglas-Hamilton, with a foreword by Alan St. Martin's. 299 pp. Illustrated. \$9.95. Reviewed by Christopher Lehmann-Haupt

ON the evening of May 18, 1941, while Germany was preparing to attack Russia, Adolf Hitler's deputy Fuhrer, Rudolf Hess, took off in a two-engine airplane from an airfield near Munich, flew across the English Channel, and parachuted into Scotland with an urgent message of peace for the Duke of Hamilton, whom he had reason to believe would be receptive to his overtures. Even 30 years after the event, the escapade remains one of the more bizarre and puzzling events of World War II, and if not of the 20th century—one of the many aberrant incidents that made the history of the Third Reich so difficult to weigh on the scale of human values. The challenge to the historian-biographer, therefore, would seem to be only secondarily the solution to certain incidental mysteries surrounding the event—the question of Hess's wavering sanity, for instance; or the extent of Nazi collaboration in Hess's plan. The primary challenge to the historian would seem to be to knit the incident into history, to make it a part of the National Socialist rather than a scene from some bad comic opera. In "Hess: The Man and His Mission," Czech-born journalist J. Bernard Hutton is merely silly. He has tried to make Hess credible by viewing him through a National microscope, as if we the readers were right there, perched in Hess's feverish brain. BRIDGE

There are few things more embarrassing in bridge than to reach a ridiculous contract and go down. And this was South's fate on the diagramed deal, played in a match between Argentina and Chile in the recent South American championship and reported by Gabriel Chagas of Brazil in The Bridge World. North and South can make three no-trump or four hearts without difficulty, but they had some trouble in the bidding after West opened in third seat with three clubs. North's double of a three-bid is often called "optional," but "take-out" is a better term, for a partner rarely exercises the option to pass for penalties. South naturally bid three diamonds. An unorthodox penalty pass would have been worth 300 points, much less than the value of the vulnerable game for North-South. North, equally naturally, bid his five-card heart suit. South made an imaginative bid of three spades. He was willing to play four spades in the not unlikely event that North held four cards in the suit, and he was hoping to induce a three-no-trump bid if North held a club stopper. North was also willing to play in a four-three spade fit, and it did not occur to him that his partner might have only three spades. He might have reflected that with four spades, South would probably have bid the suit a round earlier. The raise to four spades ended the auction, and South found himself outnumbered in the trump suit. To add to his misery the trumps split five-two and East held the diamond queen. The contract duly went down, and South and North blamed each other for the disaster in the bidding.

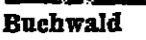
