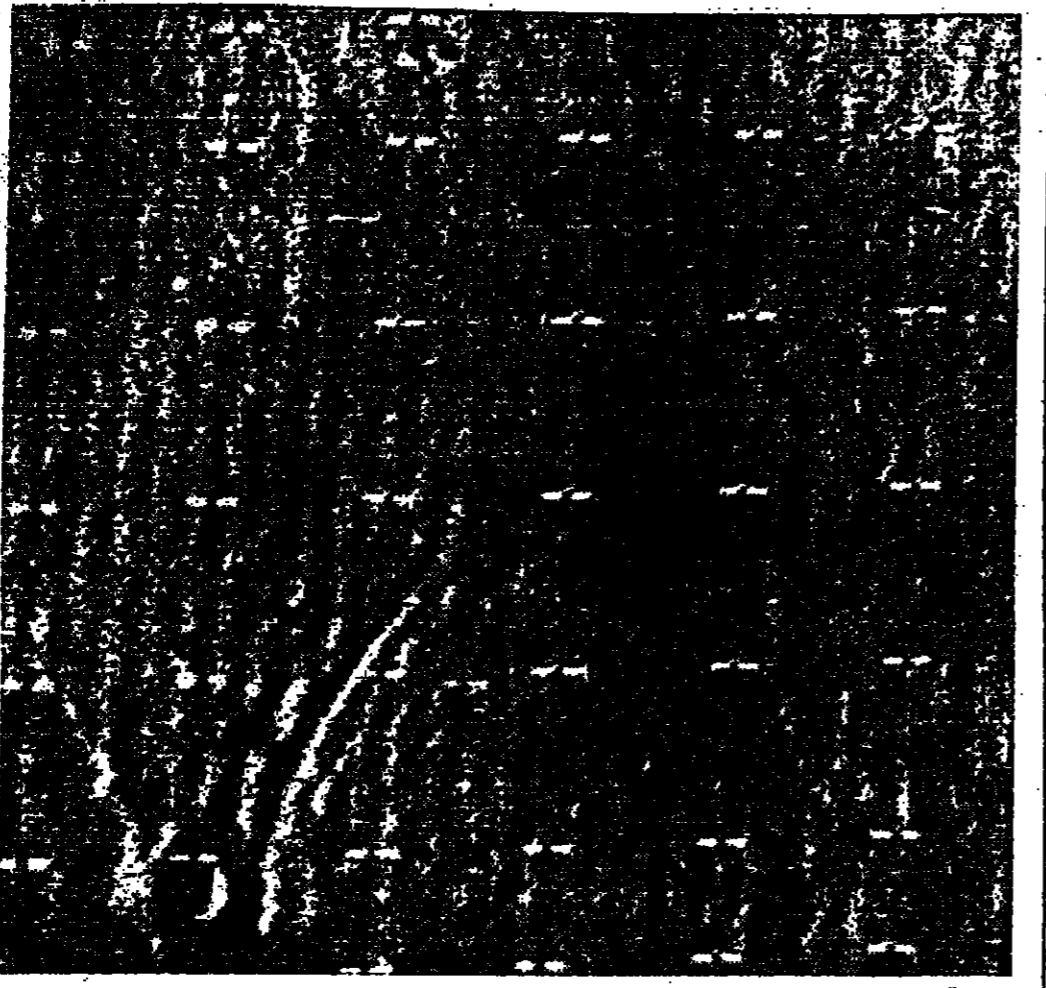

S. Payments Deficit in Quarter Sets a Record

Dale Jr. WASHINGTON, Nov. 15 (NYT)—The deficit in the U.S. balance of international payments, measured by two of the four definitions used, soared to unprecedented heights in the third quarter of this year, the Commerce Department reported today... massive deficit reflected the huge outflow of dollars in the weeks prior to President Nixon's major actions of which led, among other things, to an upward "float" of the exchange rate of some major foreign currencies... The dollar would be effectively devalued, as it has been... of the massive dollar outflow—though not its exact amount—was a major element in the President's decision to take his dramatic measures... domestic and international policy... 9.3 Billion Deficit... "net liquidity balance"—until this year had seldom exceeded a quarterly deficit of as little as \$1 billion—had a deficit of \$1.3 billion in the third quarter, the previous record of \$1.1 billion in the second quarter... U.S. Indicts a Colonel in France

NEWARK, N.J., Nov. 15 (UPI)—A federal grand jury charged today that a French intelligence colonel solicited one of his former employees to smuggle \$12 million worth of pure heroin into the United States and masterminded the details of the operation... A three-count indictment announced by U.S. Attorney Herbert J. Stern charged Col. Paul Fournier of the French counter-intelligence service, Service de Documentation et Contre-espionnage, and his former subordinate, Roger Delouette, with conspiracy, unlawful importation and concealment of the 96 pounds of heroin seized last April in Port Elizabeth, N.J... Mr. Delouette was arrested when he went to the port to claim the foreign car shipped here in his name... Concealed under the floorboards were the drugs... No Bail Fosted... Mr. Delouette, who according to his court-appointed attorney is his court-appointed attorney, has been "cooperating fully" with U.S. authorities, has been in jail since he was arrested in lieu of \$500,000 bail... According to the indictment, Mr. Delouette was promised \$1,200 for every kilogram of heroin he smuggled into America, and was also handed \$35,500 in French currency to buy the car to hide and transport the heroin... Mr. Delouette never picked up his \$50,000 payoff, to be made in New York, Customs agents... be used against him." Mr. Stern said both requests were denied... He stressed that his office has been cooperating fully with French authorities... The cooperation extended, he said, to allowing Mr. Delouette to be interviewed by and give statements to a French investigator shortly after he was arrested... Donald A. Robinson, Mr. Delouette's lawyer in Newark, said today he has refused to let his client answer written questions from French authorities unless he could obtain such immunity guarantees, provided under the U.S. Constitution but apparently not under French law... Mr. Delouette was scheduled for arraignment in federal court here tomorrow... Previous Indictment... As far as Mr. Delouette is concerned, the last two counts of the indictment handed up today duplicate an indictment returned against him last May 11, and would conceivably be consolidated with that prior indictment if the case comes to trial... Each count of the indictment carries penalties of a maximum fine of \$20,000 and a prison term of not less than five nor more than 20 years... French Remain Cautious... Sir Alec Starts Rhodesia Talks, to See Africans

By Anthony Lewis SALISBURY, Rhodesia, Nov. 15 (NYT)—Sir Alec Douglas-Home, the British foreign secretary, arrived today and began what looks to be a lengthy exploration of the chances for a settlement with Rhodesia... He talked privately for half an hour with Ian Smith, prime minister in the white rebel government... The two men were then joined by assistants for a longer session... Perhaps more significantly, Sir Alec arranged an intensive program of talks with leading Africans over the next several days... He is evidently going to explore their willingness to accept a compromise settlement lacking any early hope of political power for the Africans... Rhodesia has more than 5 million Africans and about 240,000 whites... Educational and income qualifications for voting make the whites politically dominant, and the rebel constitution excludes majority rule at any point... Sir Alec asked to see the two African nationalist leaders who have been held by the government for years... Joshua Nkomo is in a remote camp, under a restriction order... The Rev. Ndabantanga Sithole is in prison for conspiring to assassinate government officials... The Rhodesian side said nothing publicly about the request... But it is expected to bring at least Mr. Nkomo in to meet Sir Alec, probably on Thursday... The Rhodesians are more reluctant about Mr. Sithole, because he is in prison... But they may say "yes" to him also... Four other men who were held without trial under emergency regulations but have been released are scheduled to see Sir Alec on Wednesday... One of the four, Michael Mawema, indicated in an interview today that Africans generally are more amenable to a settlement with the white minority than they would have been even a few years ago... Dacca Claims Foes Invaded India Says 135 Pakistanis Died In Incursion and Biggest Clash

NEW DELHI, Nov. 15 (Reuters)—An Indian spokesman said today that this country's forces have killed 135 Pakistani soldiers in the biggest border clash since friction built up during Pakistan's suppression of the spring uprising in East Pakistan... At a news conference held shortly after the start of a debate in Parliament on the very serious border situation, the government aide said the 135 Pakistanis killed were among 2,300 who crossed the border Friday in the Shikarpur area of India's West Bengal state... The Pakistanis, comprising four battalions, attacked a border post in the area, about 75 miles north of Calcutta, the Indian spokesman said... After India's paramilitary border security force called in regular army units as reinforcements, he said, the Pakistanis were driven back... They had advanced one or two miles into Indian territory, the spokesman said... He added that Indian troops, without going into Pakistani territory, captured large quantities of Pakistani arms... The Indian spokesman did not list the number of Pakistanis wounded or captured, but said that India's casualties were much less than Pakistan's... He said six Indian soldiers were missing... All-Out Threat Seen... Defense Minister Jagjivan Ram told Parliament today that Pakistan had placed almost its entire armed forces on India's borders to back up a threat of total war... The border situation is "very serious indeed," Mr. Ram said... "Reports received by us indicate preemptive strikes on our airfields as part of their plans," he said... Pakistan's armored divisions were in a complete state of readiness, poised to strike... Prime Minister Indira Gandhi told Parliament that Western countries she had just visited now realized that a political solution to the East Pakistan crisis could be found only if the elected leaders of the East were brought into negotiations... Mrs. Gandhi said she hoped that international efforts would make the Pakistani president understand that no good could come of saber-rattling or of forcing a military conflict on India... But she affirmed in her report on her six-nation tour: "We are prepared, to the last man and woman, to safeguard our freedom and territorial integrity..." In Washington, Pakistan's Foreign Secretary, Sultan Mohammad Khan, said today that his country was facing a state of war on the Indo-Pakistan border... 6 Prisoners in Dacca... Dacca, East Pakistan, Nov. 15 (AP)—The Pakistani Army today presented before national and foreign correspondents six Indian soldiers it said were captured by Pakistani troops in action Friday night on East Pakistan's western border... The Pakistanis claimed Indian regular forces were involved in attacks on Pakistan territory, across from Shikarpur in India... The Pakistani troops said that they had killed 24 Indian soldiers and captured 6... Naik Tara Prata Joshi, one of the Indian soldiers, said that two companies of Indians had attacked a Pakistani village Friday night and had intruded two miles inside East Pakistan's border district of Kusthida Shen... China 'Determined' to Free Taiwan

UNITED NATIONS, N.Y., Nov. 15 (Reuters)—China tonight declared its determination to liberate Taiwan in its first statement to the General Assembly... Deputy Chinese Foreign Minister Chiao Kuan-hua launched into a sharp attack on American policy at the end of a day in which 55 member nations, including the United States, had expressed a warm welcome to the People's Republic of China... He called for the withdrawal of American troops from Taiwan and declared China's determination to liberate the territory... He called for the withdrawal of American troops from South Korea and unification of that peninsula and affirmed China's support for the "Palestinians and other Arab peoples" in the Middle East... No one had the right to make deals behind the back of the Arabs, Mr. Chiao said in his wide-ranging policy statement... Mr. Chiao said the "just cause" of the African peoples in the struggle against colonialism would surely triumph... Noting that China was a founding member of the UN he said that after the overthrow of the "reactionary rule of the Chiang Kai-shek clique," it should have come as a matter of course that the new regime assumed the Chinese seat in the UN... It was only because of the obstructions caused by the United States that the legitimate rights of the People's Republic of China had been denied, he said, and the "Chiang Kai-shek clique, long repudiated by the Chinese people, was able to usurp China's lawful seat in the UN..." At least this state of affairs had been set right, he said... Earlier, U.S. Ambassador George Bush joined the welcoming diplomats who expressed the hope that Peking's presence would help create world harmony. The United States had made a last-minute decision to join the list of those making welcoming addresses... "Speaking as a representative of the host country," Mr. Bush said, "the United States joins in welcoming to the United Nations (Continued on Page 2, Col. 4)

Vietnam GI Total Reportedly To Drop to 55,000 by June 30

By William Beecher WASHINGTON, Nov. 15 (NYT)—Administration sources said today that Gen. Creighton W. Abrams had been directed to plan on a tentative force reduction of 130,000 to 165,000 United States troops in Vietnam by next June 30... This would mean that the American force there would be down to 30,000 to 55,000 men by midsummer... The sources said this official guidance was provided by Defense Secretary Melvin R. Laird a week before President Nixon announced that a total of 45,000 troops would be withdrawn in December and January... "But Gen. Abrams simply cannot plan on a month-by-month basis," a senior official explained... "He must have long-range guidance to do his job properly..." Gen. Abrams, who is commander of all United States troops in Vietnam, was also told that a decision will not be made until the summer whether to level off with a residual force of about 30,000 to 55,000 men or to continue modest cuts until there is merely a small military advisory group attached to the American Embassy in Saigon... 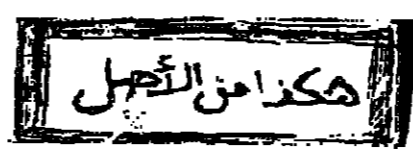

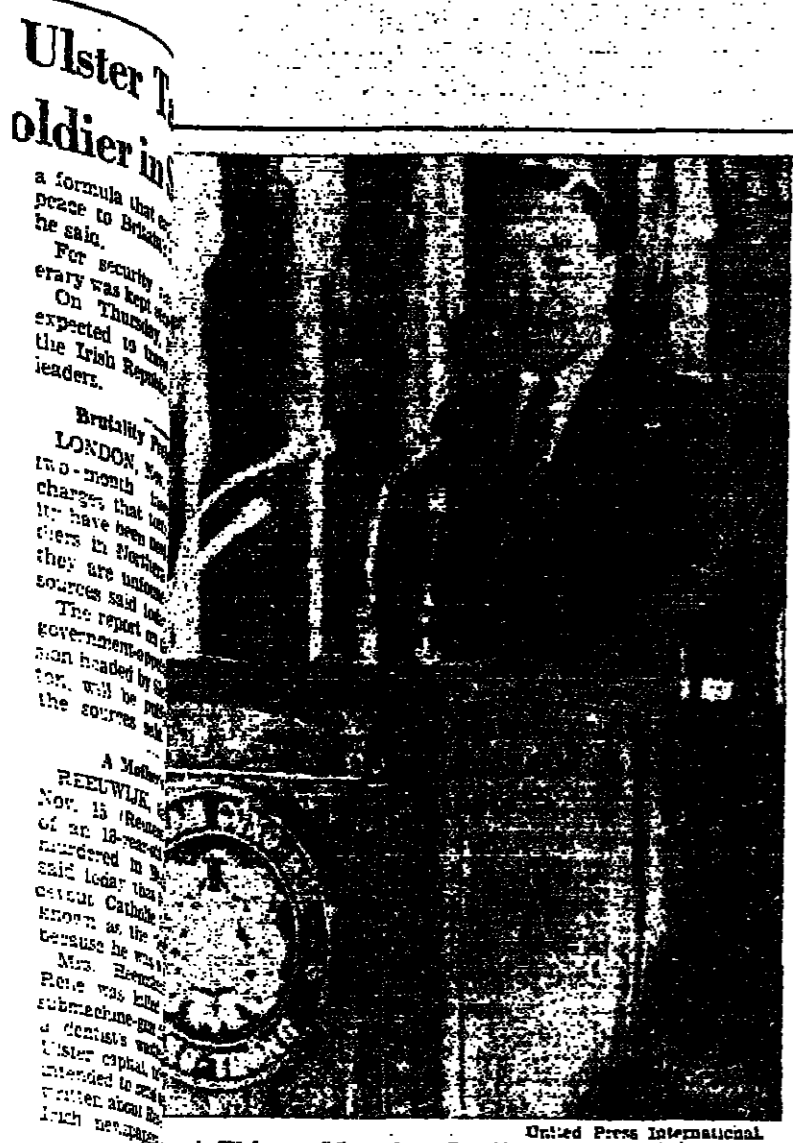

SIMBAMWENI TO UNYANYEMBE, April-June, 1871.—Contrary to expectation, the Expedition was not able to start at the end of two days; the third and the fourth days were passed miserably enough in the desponding valley of Ungeregeri.

Yet, you can grumble and curse and swear at me at my own table. Do you realize where you are? Do you know that you are my servant, sir, and not my companion?"

SIMBAMWENI TO UNYANYEMBE, November, 1971.—Contrary to expectation, the Second Herald Expedition is not able to leave Simbamweni at 5 a.m., owing to the intervention of Prince Namor and the black mamba. A mamba will attack a man without provocation and death may supervene in three minutes if the bite is 'full' and strikes the heart or neck or a blood vessel." "The black mamba," adds "Meteor," has been known to attack wounded and helpless Africans and Europeans," which is damned white of it.

Through the night we clunk, clatter and churn, over creek-beds, around elephant-felled trees, straight through barely-penetrable brush, stopping only for breakdowns or the truly awesome spectacle of graceful giraffes, frozen in the glare of the headlights, towering over the Rover as we skid to a halt, inches from their knees. Nineteen hours after setting out, we arrive at last at the Tabora Hotel. Still twitching, Lyn crawls out from under the hood of the Rover, rent from its moorings 50 miles back (shattering the windshield) and tossed into the back seat by the Gargantuan Hassan. Young Reported Kidnapped

SAIGON, Nov. 15 (Reuters).—The government has asked the International Control Commission to investigate claims that North Vietnamese forces kidnapped 30 children from a South Vietnamese village. The villagers of Xuyen Hiep in Quang Nam Province, 380 miles northeast of Saigon, claimed 20 girls and 10 boys, aged between 10 and 16, were abducted by North Vietnamese troops last Sept. 30 and Oct. 8. The South Vietnamese mission to the ICC claimed North Vietnamese troops forced youths over 15 to join their army and sent younger children to the North for military training after raiding villages.

Mechanical Heart Held Blameless As Recipient Dies

DETROIT, Nov. 15 (AP)—Haskell Shanks, 63, a plant security guard who was given a partial mechanical heart on Aug. 11, died yesterday at Sinai Hospital of what doctors called "kidney failure and problems related to it." Mr. Shanks had been released from the hospital Sept. 18 but was readmitted Oct. 4. A chest infection necessitated the readmission but it was brought under control "completely by the use of antibiotics," a hospital spokesman said. He said the mechanical heart—a "patch booster" acting as an auxiliary pump—"continued to perform normally right up until the very end. It must be emphasized that the demise of the patient does not appear to be related to the mechanical heart. There is no evidence of any rejection on the part of the body of the mechanical device, such as had been found in past heart transplants." The spokesman added: "A further series of patients in whom partial mechanical hearts will be implanted is being planned at Sinai Hospital."

Snow Shuts Swiss Passes

GENEVA, Nov. 15 (Reuters).—Heavy snow has closed 11 Swiss Alpine passes, including the Great St. Bernard and the St. Gotthard, Swiss motorway organizations announced today.

Reds Reported Slain S. Vietnamese in Battle

SAIGON, Nov. 15 (AP)—The battle in the Central Highlands broke the weekend. The government reported today that 163 North Vietnamese and 29 South Vietnamese were killed. Phnom Penh's radio said three rockets landed in the area, but no damage was reported. The government said it had destroyed 15 North Vietnamese aircraft and six American planes. The crash of three American aircraft and the explosion of a Vietnamese helicopter hit a mine field, the command disclosed today. North Vietnamese and three Americans were injured.

A Push Into the Miasma

The valley is serene now, though one can easily imagine the cloying, sucking properties of the caked black clay under the moon that was Stanley's misfortune. The Mikata River proves a disappointment, shrunk to a turbid stream some 30 feet wide, but flanked on each side by thick jungle. I bid Hassan stop the Rover and push manfully into the vestigial miasma in order to visualize the terrain that was nearly Stanley's undoing. Thirty yards from the car, I am in another world. The jungle has closed about me. I am alone in a Tarsan movie, complete with sound effects. I creep forward. Suddenly I am chawed on the arm by a vicious borrasa bush, which claps its razor spikes in rickety glee at my panic. Happily, it is only a flesh wound. Several yards further on, several bushel-sized clumps of fresh manure lead me to believe that I am not alone in this wreck of the woods. I hesitate, a felicitous decision, for directly in front of me is the biggest fern-spigot snake I have ever seen. While I am not overly fond of snakes—in truth, I am able to leap tall buildings at a single bound when confronted by a defunct inch-worm—curiously I am not scared. I reason that I am too frightened to be scared. Four feet of the hideous reptile are in view, its nether regions disappearing into the underbrush. I feel no compulsion to ascertain its total length, science be damned; and though it is indeed black, I shall never know whether it was a mamba or feeling even less inclined to whistle a South American air to determine its rhythmic aptitude. In 3.28 seconds, Central African Time, we are back in the Land Rover, "we" being me and a winsome family of safu, or "safari ants," who undetected have chosen to picnic in my pants-leg. We rev up again, past an intriguing sign indicating the establishment of a new "Rump Station." Snow falls from a clump of kapok trees; a group of wandering Masai are espied on the trail out of Kilosa, the shaven-headed women chic in black robes and waist-length earrings of polished brass, the crimson-garbed man, proud and warlike, carrying a spear and a transistor radio; ostriches feed on a dry plain; mini-whirlwinds called "chimbunges" drink thirstily from an oasis of loose red dirt; mighty baobabs, the elephants of the tree world, stare impassively and baobabs nod in undisguised amusement as Hassan, torrents of sweat cascading off his wondrous belly, into a shower of blue sparks, works on a balky battery with a metal screwdriver. 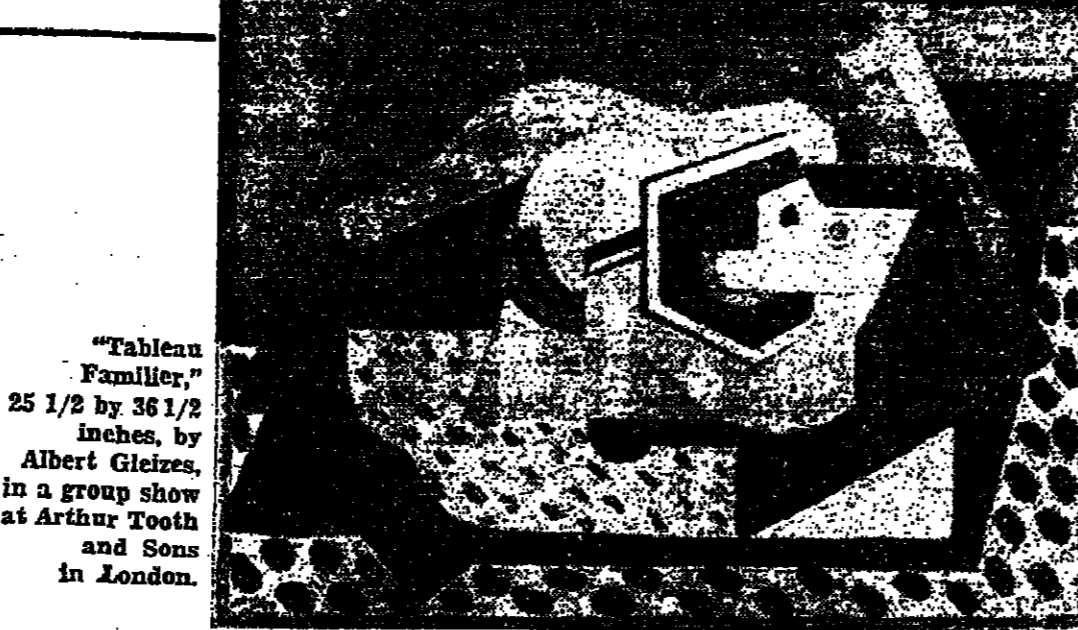

MUSIC IN LONDON

A Taste of Many Styles of Jazz

By Henry Pleasants

LONDON, Nov. 15 (UPI)—Jazz has gone through a number of stylistic cycles in the past 50 years—New Orleans/Chicago; sweet and hot big band swing; cool and hard bop, and, most recently, a frenetic extension of bop commonly known as "free."

Missing from this historical survey was big band swing; that had been taken care of recently by the hands of Benny Goodman, Buddy Rich and Harry James. Duke Ellington has been here too; but the Duke both despises and defies categorization. Without ignoring changing fashions, he has refused to be bound by them; and what he is offering, as he could hear in an admirably produced BBC-TV Omnibus program last night, is not just jazz of any particular category, but a concentration of all that is finest in the Afro-American idiom.

His genius as band leader, pianist, composer and showman is, as it has been for some 50 years, one of the glories of 20th-century music. Just about alone among all the jazzmen who have passed this way, he has not

disdained elegant, swinging, embellished lyricism. His men are virtuosos all; but they are also singers on their instruments. The others could learn a lot from him and them. If they were wise, they would.

A jazz weekend, produced jointly by Newport's George Wein and impresario Robert Paterson at the New Victoria Theatre and the Royal Festival Hall, came to an end last night with a program called "Giants of Jazz," bringing together Dizze Gillespie, Thelonius Monk, Sonny Stitt, Kai Winding, Art Blakey and Al McKibbon. They are giants, all right, but "Giants of Bop" would have been at once a more accurate and less presumptuous designation.

Their 1945/55 style had been bracketed neatly on Friday night by the Kid Thomas Preservation Hall Band from New Orleans, old-timers all, demonstrating how jazz was in the beginning, and the Ornette Coleman Quartet, offering definitive examples of what it is now. One could say of the "giants" that they gave a pretty definitive account of how it got that way.

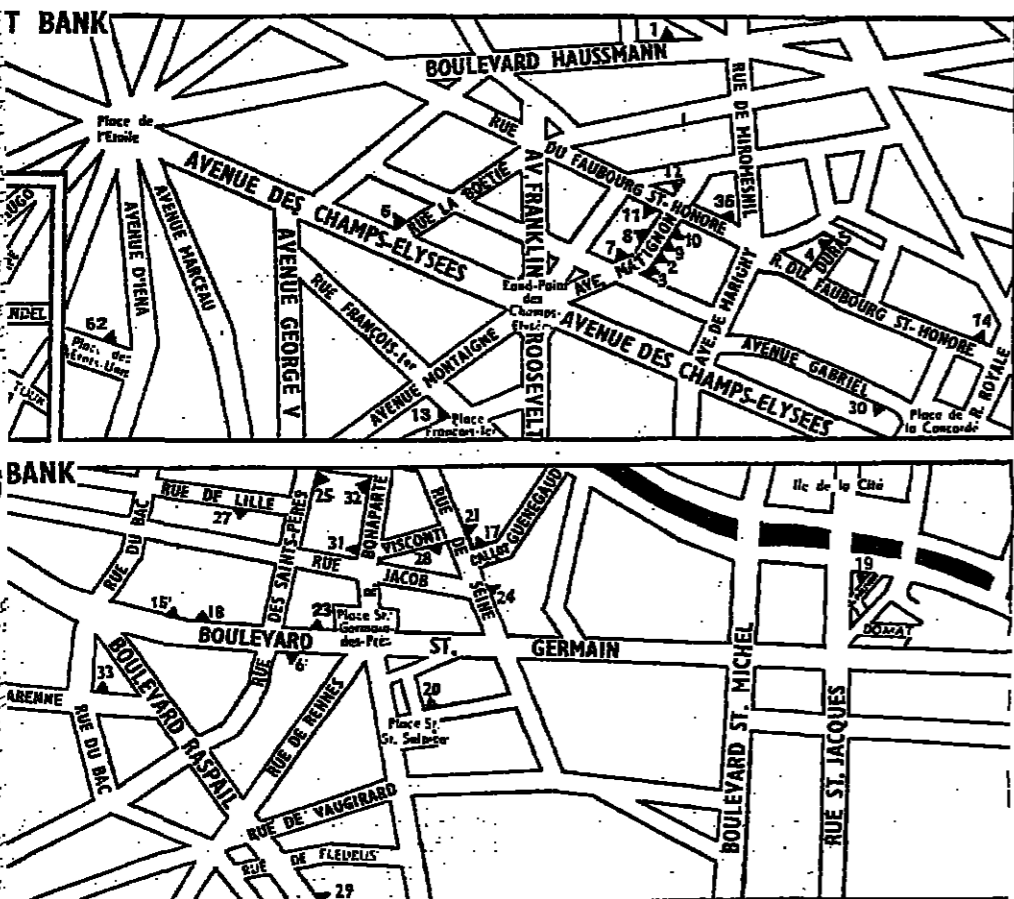

NEW YORK, Nov. 15 (UPI)—This is how The New York Times critics rate new movies and plays:

Movies

"The Tragic Diary of Zero, the Fool," despite the title and the cast credits, "is not really populated by Zero, the Fool, or Isis, the Priestess, or the King of Pentacles," says Roger Greenspun. The film, by Canadian filmmaker Morley Markson, is about three young people trying to relate to themselves and, collectively, to one another through personality games. "This film is related to fulfill it is a charge that every-one expresses in one way or another," Greenspun said, and it is one for which Markson's movie, "despite its dedication to Samuel Beckett, has no very interesting answer."

"Jack Johnson," a documentary biography of the black heavyweight boxing champion, composed of vintage footage, stills and many of Johnson's words, "emerges amazingly alive and fascinating," says A. H. Weller. Produced by Jim Jacobs, directed by William Clayton, this history "sticks to facts that do not force sympathy for its hero and that need no footnotes. These are visual and aural facts that somehow link a more detailed picture of the controversial fighter than the stage and screen versions of 'The Great White Hope.'" The

movie score is by Miles Davis. Al Bodlan wrote the screenplay.

"El Topo," directed by Alejandro Jodorowsky, was rated "vastly better than 'Fando and Lis'" by the same director, and "vastly inferior to Arrabal's 'Viva la Muerte.'" The movie resembles "not so much a well-made fiction as a prophetic book." Roger Greenspun writes. It is also "full of tests and riddles. One admiring reviewer calls it, disarmingly, 'a work of incomprehensible depth,'" says The Times critic. "But it is more nearly a work of incomprehensible breadth, and I am not persuaded," says Greenspun. "That Jodorowsky, any more than the rest of us, altogether knows what he is about."

Plays

"Love Me, Love My Children," a musical, with book, lyrics and music by Canadian Bob Swerdlow, choreography by Elizabeth Swerdlow, which opened at the Mercer O'Casey Theater, "is one of those creaking youth shows that appear to be geriatric before their time." Clive Barnes commented. Swerdlow "seems to have found the Generation Gap and stumbled right into it as if it were the Grand Canyon." The story is of Justine, who runs away to "fat city" where her sister is already on marijuana and sex. Here she hands over her virginity, becomes disillusioned with life and returns home. "The message is one of joy and peace—just like a Christmas card," Barnes said.

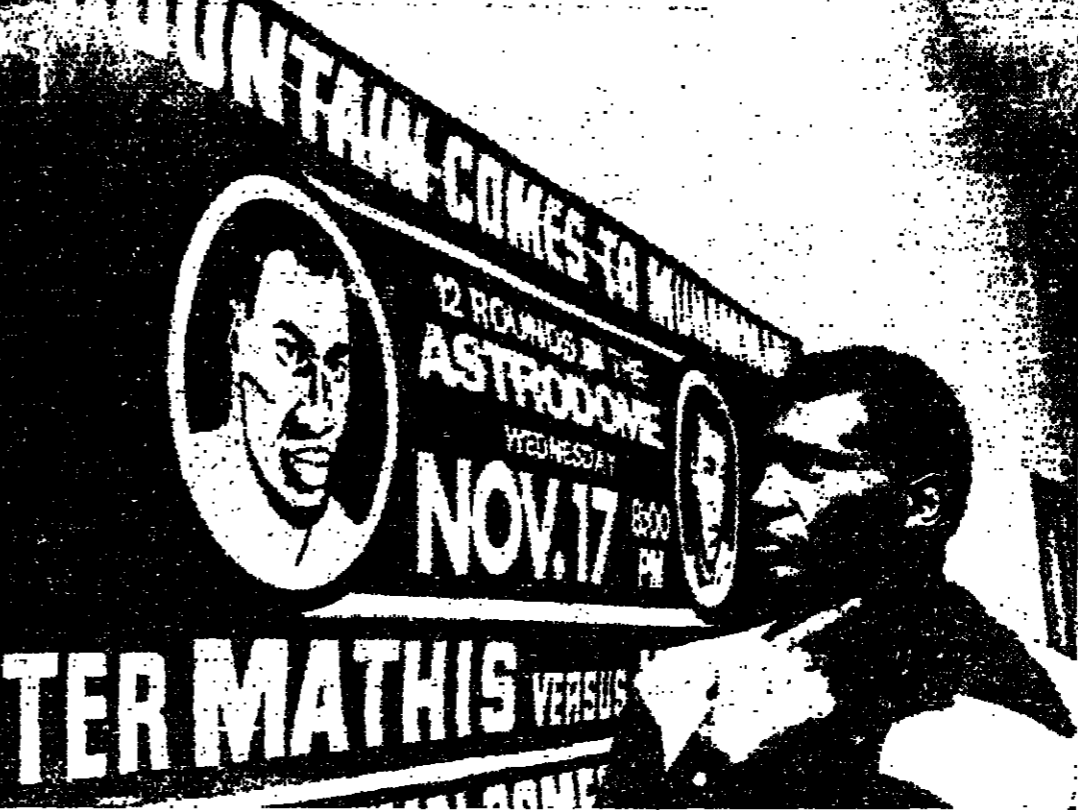
