Boston Museum's Raphael Being Returned to Italy

WASHINGTON, Sept. 10 (AP)—A \$15 million Raphael, the pride of the Boston Museum of Fine Arts before Italy said it had been smuggled, will be returned to the Italian government, the U.S. Treasury Department said today.

The department said the painting had been smuggled by a museum employee, but would not name him or say whether he would be prosecuted. The Justice Department also refused any information and the Italian Embassy said only that it was "gratified."

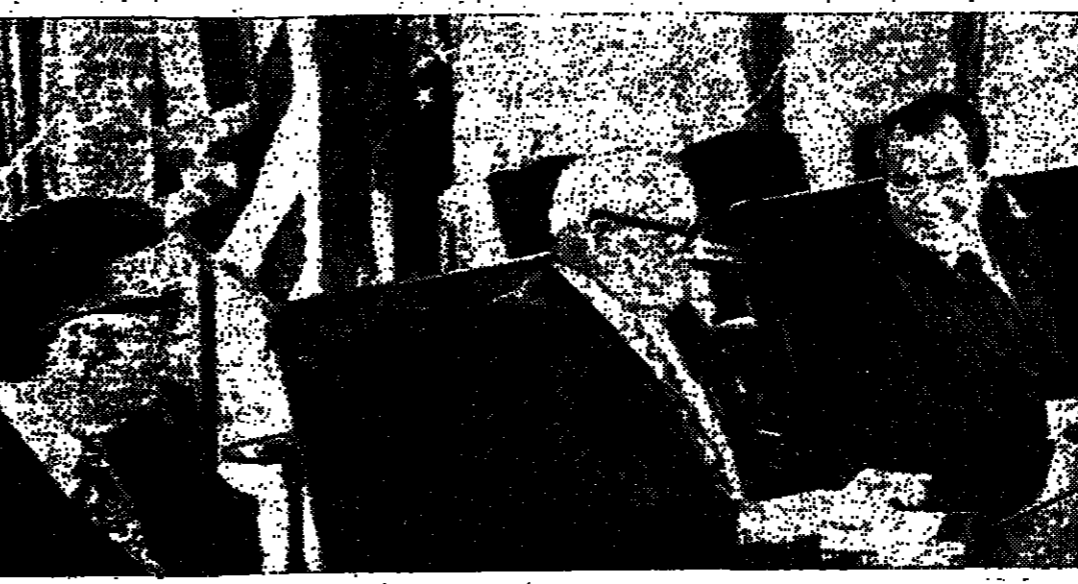

6 Held in U.S. School Bus Blasts

DETROIT, Sept. 10 (UPI)—FBI agents yesterday arrested six men, including the former grand dragon of the Michigan Ku Klux Klan, and charged them with conspiracy in the bombing of 10 school buses in Pontiac Aug. 30, one week before a court-ordered desegregation program began.

The six were charged with conspiracy to violate federal bomb laws, conspiracy to obstruct federal court orders and conspiracy to violate the 1968 Civil Rights Act.

Among those arrested was Robert Miles, 46, of Howell, who resigned last spring as grand dragon but probably still runs the show, according to Ralph Guy Jr., U.S. attorney for the Eastern District of Michigan.

Wallace Elwood Fruit, 29, of Detroit, Mich., a state officer in the Klan, also was among those seized.

Pontiac has been the scene of several days of demonstrations and picketing by angry white parents over the busing issue. One of those arrested, Alexander Distel Jr., 28, of Clarkston, was active in the first two days of protest since school opened Tuesday.

Following the bombings of the 10 buses, the FBI entered the case. Agents also were present when schools opened Tuesday. The six arrested all were described by Mr. Guy as members of the Klan. The FBI in Washington connected only Mr. Miles and Mr. Fruit with the Klan.

The government said the alleged conspiracy began at a July 4 picnic of the Klan at Lake Odessa near the small rural community of Vassar. It charged that a number of meetings were held, and the bombing was planned by the six.

The government said a report on the results of the bombing was made at a regularly scheduled meeting of the Michigan Klan Sunday. That meeting was held at the Miles farm, 35 miles west of Pontiac.

Three days later, the government said, the six accused and other unnamed persons met and discussed additional acts of violence and destruction involving the school buses.

The complaint accused the six of conspiring "to willfully and knowingly attempt by force to prevent, obstruct, impede and interfere with the performance of the Pontiac School District in the exercise of its duties under an order of the United States District Court for the Eastern District of Michigan."

It said that they entered the Pontiac school-bus parking lot and maintenance area and set explosive charges designed to damage the school buses.

The six were accused of willfully and knowingly conspiring to "intimidate and interfere with... Negro students in the Pontiac School District because of their race and color."

Texas Race Incident LUBBOCK, Texas, Sept. 10 (UPI)—Police said they were fired upon by snipers early today in an outbreak of racial violence that erupted after a Negro boy, 16, was shot and killed in the hallway of an integrated high school.

Africa Lifts Curb On Funds for Israel PRETORIA, Sept. 10 (Reuters).—The South African government has announced the lifting of its ban on the transfer of funds to Israel, imposed three months ago after Israel said it was contributing money to the Organization for African Unity.

The donation had been seen here as aid for movements hostile to South Africa, although Israeli leaders described it as a purely humanitarian gift made in response to an appeal from United Nations Secretary-General U Thant.

Finance Minister Nicolaas Diederichs said that the ban was lifted after Israel decided to make the donation instead of the UN High Commission Fund for Refugees.

Mrs. Vlachos Charges U.S. Interferes in Greek Affairs

WASHINGTON, Sept. 10 (UPI)—The Nixon administration was accused yesterday of interfering in Greek domestic affairs by supporting the army-backed government of Premier George Papadopoulos.

The charge was made by Mrs. Helen Vlachos, a former Athens publisher who now lives in exile as the largest Congress to discontinue all U.S. aid to Greece. She said that U.S. aid was used by the Papadopoulos government to suppress Greek political opposition.

"All we ask is for you to stop interfering," Mrs. Vlachos told the House Foreign Affairs subcommittee on Europe. "You interfere when you give the military a new lease to continue brutality."

House Opposes Aid The session continued a series of committee hearings that threaten to block \$117 million the Nixon administration has asked for Greece for the current fiscal year, which began July 1. The House went on record Aug. 3 as opposed to giving further aid to the Papadopoulos government.

Mrs. Vlachos, who closed her two major Athens daily newspapers when the military junta seized power and imposed censorship in April, 1967, has been living in exile in London.

By withholding further aid, Mrs. Vlachos said, the United States could effectively press for constitutional government in Greece. She dismissed assertions that U.S. strategic interests in the area "override the nature of the regime" in Athens.

"It would be a sorry hour when the security of the United States depended upon the goodwill of the Greek junta and of an undisciplined army of near-mercenaries," she said.

Army Purge Reported She said the Greek Army had been purged of its most experienced officers. Since the 1967 coup, she said, about 85,000 persons have passed through various police interrogations.

"We are asking simply that the official America take sides and stop whispering 'democracy' to anti-regime Greeks while practicing the contrary," Mrs. Vlachos said. "Don't let yourself be blackmailed by the junta; they are really people who are even using American electrical equipment in torturing political prisoners."

Another witness, D. George Kousoulas, professor of political science at Howard University in Washington, testified to the contrary, that the coup in 1967 prevented a Communist takeover and had been necessary because "Greece was in need of political modernization."

The U.S. government imposed a "selective embargo" on arms aid to Greece after the coup. The embargo ended last December when the Nixon administration resumed the shipment of planes, tanks and other major equipment to Athens.

Chute Collapse On Apollo-15 Still a Mystery HOUSTON, Sept. 10 (AP)—Spacecraft engineers say that after a month of study they still don't know what caused the collapse of a parachute during the final descent of Apollo-15.

Officials said the probable cause had been narrowed to two, but now these have essentially been eliminated, leaving a mystery.

One of Apollo-15's three parachutes opened properly and then collapsed during the final 23,500 feet of the spacecraft's descent to splashdown in the Pacific Ocean.

Failure of the chute caused the spacecraft to hit the water at about 24 miles an hour, some two miles an hour faster than the normal speed. None of the astronauts was injured.

Swimmers were able to recover only one of the three parachutes for postflight analysis. The bad chute was lost. The only other clue engineers had were films taken of the descent.

Moscow Trip Set By U.K.'s Wilson LONDON, Sept. 10 (AP)—Former Prime Minister Harold Wilson said today that he would visit Moscow next week for talks with Soviet leaders on wide-ranging questions. The trip originally was scheduled for last spring.

The Labor party leader leaves Sunday and will return Thursday. His office has not yet disclosed which leaders he will be meeting.

Mr. Wilson intends to talk about the prospects of a European security conference advocated by the Russians, Anglo-Soviet trade, nuclear disarmament and East-West relations in general.

Storm Winds Of 170 MPH Hit Honduras

TEGUCIGALPA, Honduras, Sept. 10 (UPI)—Hurricane Edith struck the sparsely settled northern coast of Honduras with 170-mile-an-hour winds today, rolling up 15-foot tides and then roaring north-northwest toward the island of Roatan.

Officials in Tegucigalpa said there had been no reports of casualties although yesterday reports said the hurricane had sunk 40 fishing boats and heavily damaged houses, leaving many persons homeless.

The officials said they based their information on shortwave radio reports from the affected areas.

Hurricane Fern, meanwhile, broke up into a driving rainstorm early this morning, flooding farms and fishing camps along the central Texas coast. Fern did little damage even though its eye passed over Matagorda, a fishing and resort town of 1,000 population, about 80 miles southwest of Galveston. As Fern moved inland it spawned two tornadoes and lightning storms in which six houses caught fire. The thousands who had evacuated their homes along the coast were returning to them.

Edith caused the most damage in the Honduran villages of Puerto Limpia and Santa Rosa de Aguan, both strapping towns on the Bay Islands northeast coast. By late today Edith had degenerated into a "minimal hurricane" after hitting Puerto Castilla.

Robert H. Simpson, director of the U.S. National Hurricane Center in Miami, had expressed fears that many villages along the coast had been "completely over-run by the sea."

"The worst danger now—and it's a very real danger—is from flash flooding in Honduras, British Honduras and as far west as the mountains of Guatemala," Mr. Simpson said. Both he and hurricane authority Arnold Sugg expressed fears that remote villages in Honduras may have been devastated.

Still another tropical depression, this one south of Bermuda, has mushroomed in strength and size and the hurricane center in Miami said it would be named tropical storm Gwenda.

Italy Reds Protest Westmoreland Visit ROME, Sept. 10 (AP)—Police charged into scores of youths demonstrating against Gen. William Westmoreland, the U.S. Army Chief of Staff, here tonight. Nine demonstrators were arrested.

Scores of boys and girls marched downtown after ending a rally in the headquarters of the Italian Communist party's Youth Federation. The rally was called to protest the visit of the general, who arrived in Rome yesterday for a short stay as guest of his Italian counterpart.

The demonstrators handed out leaflets denouncing Gen. Westmoreland as an "assassin," echoing the Communist campaign against him over his role in Vietnam. Clashes broke out when police ordered the youths to disband.

More Than 30 Hostages Held Rioters, Officials Break Off Talks at New York Prison

ATTICA, N.Y., Sept. 10 (Reuters)—Tense negotiations between state officials and rioting inmates who are holding between 34 and 36 guards as hostages at Attica State Prison broke off today.

The negotiations, which had been on all day, failed to reach a settlement.

A federal court order today barring administrative punishment of the rioting prisoners was rejected by the inmates because it did not have an official seal.

The negotiations were being held today in the presence of five newsmen, invited as observers by the prisoners. The reporters called the negotiation sessions tense and hostile.

Half the Prisoners The rioters—about half the prison population of 2,500 were said to be involved—seized hostages yesterday morning and later released eight, stripped and beaten.

A Corrections Department spokesman said two more hostages had been released, UPI reported.

The rioting apparently was provoked by an incident in which a prisoner was alleged to have been beaten and thrown into solitary confinement.

After one group of prisoners refused to form ranks after breakfast, the rebellion quickly spread. About 20 fires were set and 12 guards were injured, one seriously.

The rioters have threatened to kill their hostages if the authorities try to use force to regain control of the prison. The court injunction barring administrative punishment was issued after the prisoners refused to accept a written promise by State Corrections Commissioner Russell Oswald.

The prisoners, mostly black and Puerto Rican, have accused the administration of racism. Among

Waste Dumping Control Measure Passed by House WASHINGTON, Sept. 10 (AP)—A bill to control dumping of harmful wastes in oceans, coastal waters and the Great Lakes, with a ban on disposal of chemical and biological warfare agents at sea, was passed today by the U.S. House of Representatives by a vote of 304 to 3.

The bill, which now faces a vote in the Senate, would bar transporting and dumping at sea of radiological, chemical or biological warfare agents and high-level radioactive wastes. It would prohibit waste dumping unless authorized by permit from the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) or the Corps of Engineers.

Violations could produce an EPA-assessed penalty of up to \$50,000. Persons convicted of knowingly violating the regulations could be fined up to \$50,000 and imprisoned up to a year. Each continuing day of violation is considered a separate offense.

Ending the Game of 'Chicken'

A welcome mutual maturity is indicated by the decision of the Soviet Union and the United States to open talks aimed at ending the game of international "chicken" which the military ships and planes of the two countries have played with each other for years. At least once a month a plane has buzzed a ship at sea, or a Soviet trawler has intruded on the course of an American destroyer, or some other incident has occurred in which far too great a risk of collision has been taken in order to prove a senseless point of national *machismo*. And in fact there have been collisions: the surprise is that they have not been more numerous and serious and that, politically, they have not gotten out of hand.

Barriers to Trade

President Nixon's emphasis on "America's own interests" rather than those of the free-world economy as a whole, clearly was designed to appeal to the nationalist and protectionist sentiment in Congress. The loud applause he received for it—and the little notice taken of his reaffirmation of traditional free-trade principles—underscored the danger of the course on which the administration is now embarked in international monetary and trade policy.

International Opinion

Brandt's Eastward Journey
Brandt's visit to the Soviet Union might be useful for all European nations. It is a logical consequence of the increasing contacts between East and West. It can only be hoped that these talks will open the road to an agreement corresponding to the conciliation between West Germany and the Communist states.

Mr. Bhutto's Bid
Mr. Bhutto's push for power comes a week or so after a double effort by President Yahya to improve the depressing situation in East Pakistan. The first was to replace the military governor, Gen. Tikka Khan, whose ruthless use of his troops had prevented the secession of Pakistan's eastern wing. The second was to declare a general amnesty, which apparently extended to almost everybody except Sheikh Mujib, the Eastern autonomist leader, who is being tried—unfortunately wholly in secret—on capital charges. It is too early to assess the response, but the prospects are not encouraging.

Boon and Europe
The world monetary crisis is imperiling European unity. Is West Germany turning its back on Europe? Its extraordinary success, as well as deserved success, the superiority complex which visibly results from this, the dialogue which it is initiating with Moscow and the East—which will be much more rewarding than our own—its position of privileged partner of the U.S.—whereas we have relentlessly attacked the dollar—its quiet but flawless foreign policy—does not all that lead it irresistibly to look farther (than Europe) and to go it alone? The time has thus come, if we do not want the worst to happen very soon—that is to say, an irreversible disintegration of Europe—to remind the powerful partner of its moral obligations and of the community spirit.

U.S. Dominates Meet in Russia

MINSK, Soviet Union, Sept. 10 (AP)—Mark Spitz and the American men's freestyle relay team set world records tonight as the U.S. team took a commanding lead in a three-day meet with the Soviet Union and Britain.

Spitz, a 21-year-old Indiana University senior, led off the 4x200-meter freestyle relays with a world record, 1:53.5 minutes, to surpass the mark he set last week in Leipzig, East Germany, of 1:54.2.

Jerry Heldenreich, Fred Tyler and Tom McBrean then finished up the relay in a world mark of 7:43.28 to equate the record set last month by the American Pan Am team when it swam 7:45.8 at Cali, Colombia.

The American team again tonight won nine of 10 events on the program, including four double victories by the American girls. And after two days, the U.S. squad led the meet with 222 points to 139 for the Soviet Union and 99 for Great Britain.

"We were pointing for a world record in the relays and are very happy we got it," said Ken Treadway, U.S. team leader.

Last night, the American girls' 4x100-meter freestyle grabbed a world record in 4:00.7.

Billie Daniel, a 21-year-old junior at the University of Pennsylvania, equaled her own world record of 2:18.4 in the 200-meter butterfly.

Treadway said: "She was trying to break the record but didn't come in fast enough in the last 50 meters."
