11                    F. M. Turner, Dallas Police Department Detective, was  
12     riding in the pilot car of the motorcade, possibly 3 minutes in front of  
13     the motorcade, with Detective Sankel and Chief Lumpkin. They were on  
14     the Stemmons Freeway when they first heard something was wrong. They  
15     went to Parkland Hospital and after President Kennedy and Governor  
16     Connally were unloaded, they went back to the Texas School Book De-  
17     pository Building. In the meantime they shook down a boxcar or a  
18     caboose in the railroad yards. Turner talked to some witnesses and  
19     then went over to the Sheriff's office and talked to Arnold Rowland who  
20     said they saw a man standing in the background of an open window two  
21     floors from the top who appeared to have a rifle with a scope on it. The  
22     man was standing on the west part of the south side of the building. Row-  
23     land thought it was a security man and that is why he made no issue of it.  
24     Rowland saw a white man. (p. 127.) He also interviewed Ronald Fischer  
25     and Bob Edwards who said they saw a white man in his 20's standing on  
26     the fifth floor of the TSBD Building in the east window with an open-necked
